



Purpose: The purpose of this document is to provide an intelligence overview concerning Mexican Government incursions, encounters and sightings on the U.S. and Mexico borders.

Sources Used: Information contained in this report is derived from Border Patrol reports of Mexican Military and Police activity on the US/Mexico border.

Time Period: This document provides the most recent, corrected and amended information/intelligence available.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

AS OF: September 30, 2003

From 1996 to present, the U.S.B.P. Special Coordination Center has confirmed *one* hundred eighty five incursions into the United States by Mexican government personnel.

INCURSIONS

- In FY 2003, as of September 30, 2003 the U.S.B.P. Special Coordination Center (SCC) confirmed twenty-three incursions.
 - Fourteen were by Mexican Military personnel.
 - Nine were by Mexican law enforcement personnel

Four to report as of September 30, 2003

SIGHTINGS*

Eleven to report as of September 30, 2003

MEXICAN GOVERNMENT BORDER INCIDENTS - METHODOLOGY

An incident will be classified as an *Incursion*, an *Encounter* or a *Sighting*. The following methodology is used in classifying each incident.

INCURSION

<u>INCURSIONS</u> - An Incursion is defined as the unauthorized crossing of the U.S. – Mexico border by Mexican Government Personnel. It may be either intentional or unintentional.

- Armed Incursion: Mexican Government Personnel are carrying weapons.
- <u>Unarmed Incursion</u>: Mexican Government Personnel are <u>not</u> carrying weapons.

ENCOUNTER

<u>ENCOUNTERS</u> – An Encounter is any activity by Mexican Government Personnel on the Mexican side of the U.S.– Mexico Border that results in interaction between the parties involved.

- <u>Threatening Encounter</u>: Shots are fired, a weapon is pointed or objects are thrown across the U.S.- Mexico Border at LEA's, U.S. Military personnel or civilians.
- <u>Non-Threatening Encounter</u>: Mexican Government Personnel establish communications with LEA's or U.S. Military personnel on their respective sides of the Border

SIGHTINGS

<u>SIGHTINGS</u> – A Sighting is the discovery of significant Mexican Government activity, which is <u>not</u> an encounter, on the Mexican side of the U.S.- Mexico.

MEXICAN POLICE INCURSION (ARMED) - EL CENTRO / CALEXICO - On 10 October, 2002 at approximately 1130 hours, a Mexican Police Officer wearing plain clothes and identifying himself as a member of the Homicide Unit made an incursion approximately seven miles east of the Calexico Port of Entry. The Mexican Police Officer came to U.S. territory for approximately five minutes to speak to a U.S. Border Patrol Agent in regards to the six illegal aliens that he had just apprehended. The police officer presumed that the subject he was looking for was one of them. He returned to Mexico without any further incident. |
| 2. MEXICAN POLICE INCURSION (ARMED) - YUMA / YUMA - On 13 October 2002 at approximately 1115 hours, two agents working in the Yuma area of Andrade, California encountered two uniformed Mexican Police officials on a All Terrain Vehicle (ATV). This was approximately 1/10 mile west of International Boundary The two Mexican officials were wearing a patch on the uniforms that said "Policía Transito." The individuals stated they were from Mexicali, Baja California, Mexico and were supposed to be providing security for a race that was taking place in Mexico. The Agents told the individuals that they were in the United States and directed them to return to the Mexican side of the International Boundary. The two Mexican officials complied. The Agents further noted that there were two sedans visible. One appeared to be marked Mexican PD and the other was unmarked, but both had at least two occupants visible. No further incident occurred. |
| 3. MEXICAN MILITARY INCURSION (ARMED) – YUMA / YUMA - On October 22, 2002 at approximately 1045 hours an agent while on routine patrol was advised via radio that a sensor in the area of had been activated. When he arrived he encountered a military type of HUMVEE with several subjects dressed in drab green uniforms, which appeared to be military. When advised by the agent that they were on U.S. soil they were cordial and stated they were lost at which time the agent advised them to return to Mexico. They left his position and proceeded east toward Algodones south of the All American Canal on the Mexican side of the boundary line. There were no further incidents |
| 4. MEXICAN MILITARY INCURSION (ARMED) – LAREDO / LAREDO NORTH - On November 5, 2002 at approximately 1130 hours, a citizen reported seeing a Military type helicopter, possibly a Huey type, cross from the Mexican side of the border into United States airspace. The citizen described the personnel wearing Military jumpsuits and helmets and armed with what appeared to be M-60 caliber machine guns. The aircraft crossed over at about the 8-mile mark on Mines Road |
| and then traveled up river to an area The aircraft then backtracked and crossed back to Mexico. The aircraft was also identified as |

having no markings and was gray/green in color. Two pilots and three or four other

| b)(2) | personnel were seen in the aircraft. The citizen also stated that he had seen the same type of aircraft about two weeks previously and the incursions occurred everyday for about two weeks. During the incident, the citizen mentioned that he was with a USDA Officer at the time. | |

| , , , | 5. MEXICAN MILITARY INCURSION (ARMED) – YUMA / YUMA - On November 7, 2002 at approximately 0217 hours agents responded to sensor activity near the International Boundary. Upon arrival the agents located a 1992 Ford Explorer stuck approximately four feet north of the international boundary. Across from the vehicle in | |
| b)(2) | Mexico there were several Mexican soldiers and military vehicles. The location of the incident is 10 miles from San Luis, AZ. The agents made verbal contact with a captain of the Mexican military. While conversing with the Captain the agents observed six or seven bundles consistent with narcotic contraband in the rear of a military vehicle. The two subjects that had been in the Ford Explorer fled north on foot and eventually returned to Mexico. It appears the Explorer had circumvented a checkpoint by entering the U.S., and driving west along the border. Once intercepted by the Mexican military the vehicle became stuck and the subjects fled on foot. Agents report seeing several sets of footprints (jungle boots) back and forth from the vehicle to Mexico, indicating the Mexican soldiers had entered the U.S. to retrieve the contraband. The Mexican military stated the subjects had brought the contraband into Mexico where they attempted to bury it. The vehicle was negative for stolen or wants. | (b)(2) |

| b)(2) | November 28, 2002 at approximately 0845 the agent working observed an illegal entry activity about nine miles west of the Fabens Port of Entry. The agent observed two individuals on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande River, one individual along the levee on the United States side and approximately ten individuals standing along the river bank on the U.S. side. The agent noticed that the two individuals on the Mexican side were carrying military type rifles (M-16 style) and were wearing military type clothing. For officer safety reasons the agent observed all the individuals from a safe vantage point. Upon being noticed by the Agent the subjects walked back into Mexico. As the subject walked back into Mexico the agent noticed the subject that had been hiding along the levee on the U.S. side was also carrying a military type rifle and wearing military type clothing. Once on the Mexican side, the three subjects wearing military clothing waved at the agent and departed the area along with the rest. A short time later a military humvee vehicle approached the ten subjects and spoke to them. The vehicle then preceded to the leave the area after picking up the subjects. At no time did the agent observe these individuals make any threatening actions towards him. | (b)(2) |



As he approached the line near Christianson's Ranch, the Agent observed three individuals about five feet north of the International Boundary fence walking southbound. He described the three individuals as Hispanic males. All three individuals were wearing jeans and sweatshirts and one of them was carrying a camera. The agent believed that one was a member of Grupo Beta and the other two subjects were employees from the television station Univision. He then observed the three subjects jump over the International Boundary fence and meet up with approximately 15 members of the Grupo Beta. All of the members of Grupo Beta on the south side were wearing jeans and orange jackets with an unknown type of Mexican logo on the sleeve of the jacket. Also identified were four or five trucks, two orange in color, with a large logo on the side of the trucks stating Grupo Beta. No weapons were observed. The |

The soldiers then signaled to the individual and people started coming and headed to the river where the soldiers were located. The soldiers then assisted the subjects onto the raft and sent them on their way north toward the United States. (b)(2) |

The Border Patrol Agent and a Mexican soldier who identified himself as the Commander of the unit exited the vehicles and made contact. The commander stated that his unit was the 22nd Regiment of San Luis Sonora, Mexico and they were patrolling the area because many vehicles were seen entering the United States possibly carrying drugs, east of this area. All the Mexican soldiers were armed. The Border Patrol Agent reported to the Supervisory Agent in charge where he was instructed to release them. The Senior Border Patrol Agent then advised the Mexican Military personnel that they were in the United States and directed them to return to Mexico. The soldiers were cooperative and returned to Mexico with no further incident. |

They stated that they were searching for a reported sick female Mexican National who had entered the United States two days prior. BORSTAR was activated and responded to the site to conduct a search for the missing woman. BORSTAR Agents, Brownfield Border Patrol Agents, and the Grupo Beta Agents worked together, but were unsuccessful in finding the woman. The Beta Agents returned to México without further incident. | |

Shortly after arriving in the area, Border Patrol Agents arrested the fleeing subject and encountered a Mexican agent | |



MEXICAN POLICE INCURSION (ARMED) – EL CENTRO/EL CENTRO – On September 14, 2003, a Border Patrol Agent assigned to the Calexico, California Station working the observed an individual carrying a rifle on the south bank of the All American Canal. The Mexicali, Baja California Police Department was notified. While searching for the armed individual, Mexicali Police Officers entered into the United States territory (approximately forty yards.) After a brief incursion all Mexicali Police Officers returned to México. Mexicali Police Officers took seven people (b)(2) into custody and it is unknown if the armed individual was one of them.

Chronological Listing and Map of Incursions for FY 2003





MEXICAN MILITARY ENCOUNTER – EL PASO / DEMING - On October 3, 2002 at approximately 1520 hours, a Border Patrol Agent on duty was approached by the Mexican Police near the Columbus Port of Entry. Mexican Police advised the Agent that their robbery suspect had just illegally entered the United States. The Border Patrol Agent then responded and encountered the suspect, who was in a Present Without Admission (PWA) status. The suspect was taken into custody and entered into the ENFORCE/IDENT System. The subject was near a freight train located on the east end of Lordsburg, New Mexico and was attempting to conceal himself from the Border Patrol Agents. The subject was wearing olive and drab green clothing with military insignia. The subject also admitted to being in the Mexican military and being stationed somewhere in Cuauhtemoc Chihuahua, Mexico. The subject had illegally entered the United States on January 1, 2003, near Columbus, New Mexico and then made his way north to Deming, New Mexico to board a westbound freight train. He then jumped off the train as it sided in Lordsburg in order to look for food. The subject stated that he did not want to be part of the Military lifestyle and was in route to Phoenix, Arizona to be with friends and seek |

4. MEXICAN MILITARY ENCOUNTER – LAREDO / LAREDO NORTH - On 04 March 2003 at approximately 1925 hours, Border Patrol agents responded to a call near the riverbanks on _______ in Laredo, Texas. The agents on duty reported hearing 8 to 10 shots fired on the Mexican side of the border. Upon arriving to the area, the agents observed several suspected illegal aliens crossing from Mexico to the United States. The Border Patrol agents then proceeded to apprehend five undocumented immigrants. The immigrants stated that the Mexican military had fired shots at them. The undocumented immigrants were then transported to the Laredo North Station for processing. The Mexican Consulate was notified about the incident and no injuries to the undocumented immigrants were reported.

SECTION THREE - SIGNIFICANT SIGHTINGS

A Sighting is the discovery of significant Mexican Government activity, which is <u>not</u> an encounter, on the Mexican side of the Border, which may be of LEA interest

1. MEXICAN **MILITARY** SIGHTING (ARMED) BROWNSVILLE - On October 03, 2002 at approximately 9:15 A.M., Agents working in Brownsville, Texas reported shots fired. The agents reported that they observed a maroon vehicle on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande River approaching the river's edge. The vehicle came to a stop and shots were fired shortly thereafter. The agents observed Mexican military emerge from a brushy area near the suspect's vehicle. Two male subjects were observed fleeing the area. One male subject was apprehended near the vehicle and the second male subject jumped into the river to avoid apprehension. Mexican Immigration Officers (Grupo Beta) were summoned to the area to investigate and attempt to apprehend the male subject at large. One subject remained at large in the middle of the river. Subject remained afloat in the middle of the river and refused to grasp a life rescue line offered to him by Border Patrol Agents. No injuries were sustained to officers or any individuals involved. One male (b)(2)subject eventually surrendered to Border Patrol Agents on the U.S. side. Agents report that approximately 6 shots were fired from rifles of unknown make and model. 

trucks at the river's edge. McAllen Sector aircraft was requested to aid in this seizure in
looking for subjects on the United States side of the river. Upon arrival to the area, the
pilot advised that there was a Mexican Military camp across the river from the seizure
location with soldiers within one hundred yards of where all the subjects had crossed


Chronological Listing and Map of Sightings for FY 2003
