Dear Ms. Small:

This is the final response to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), dated November 13, 2008. You have requested copies of any and all agency records dated October 2008 to the present concerning the following subjects:

1. Any and all records pertaining to a "directive" (to include but not limited to other terms for policy guidance – i.e., order, memo, etc.) requiring arrests to be approved at least by a Field Office Director (or their deputy);
2. Any records of a 72-hour-cease-and-desist order on fugitive apprehension (including but not limited to memos, correspondence, emails, assessments, reports, statistics, briefings, etc.); and
3. Records detailing the requirement for Field Office Directors to certify on proposed operations plan(s) language to the effect of: "I certify that arresting this alien will not cause media or congressional interest."

Your request was received in this office on November 5, 2008.

Your request has been processed under the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552. A search of the ICE Office of Detention and Removal Operations, ICE Office of Policy, and ICE Office of Public Affairs for records produced a total of 14 pages responsive to items 1 and 3 of your request. No records responsive to item 2 of your request were located. After review, I have determined that 10 pages will be released to you in their entirety. Portions of 4 pages have been withheld pursuant to FOIA Exemptions 2(low), 6 and 7(C).

Portions of 4 pages have been withheld as described below.

FOIA Exemption 2(low) protects information applicable to internal administrative personnel matters to the extent that the information is of a relatively trivial nature and there is no public interest in the document.

FOIA Exemption 6 exempts from disclosure personnel or medical files and similar files the release of which would cause a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. This requires a balancing of the

public's right to disclosure against the individual's right privacy. The types of documents and/or information that we have withheld may consist of social security numbers, home addresses, dates of birth, or various other documents and/or information belonging to a third party that are considered personal. The privacy interests of the individuals in the records you have requested outweigh any minimal public interest in disclosure of the information. Any private interest you may have in that information does not factor into the aforementioned balancing test.

FOIA Exemption 7(C) protects records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes that could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. This exemption takes particular note of the strong interests of individuals, whether they are suspects, witnesses, or investigators, in not being unwarrantably associated with alleged criminal activity. That interest extends to persons who are not only the subjects of the investigation, but those who may have their privacy invaded by having their identities and information about them revealed in connection with an investigation. Based upon the traditional recognition of strong privacy interest in law enforcement records, categorical withholding of information that identifies third parties in law enforcement records is ordinarily appropriate. As such, I have determined that the privacy interest in the identities of individuals in the records you have requested clearly outweigh any minimal public interest in disclosure of the information. Please note that any private interest you may have in that information does not factor into this determination.

You have a right to appeal the above withholding determination. Should you wish to do so, you must send your appeal and a copy of this letter, within 60 days of the date of this letter, to: Associate General Counsel (General Law), U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Washington, D.C. 20528, following the procedures outlined in the DHS regulations at 6 C.F.R. § 5.9. Your envelope and letter should be marked "FOIA Appeal." Copies of the FOIA and DHS regulations are available at www.dhs.gov/foia.

Provisions of the FOIA allow us to recover part of the cost of complying with your request. In this instance, because the cost is below the \$14 minimum, there is no charge.

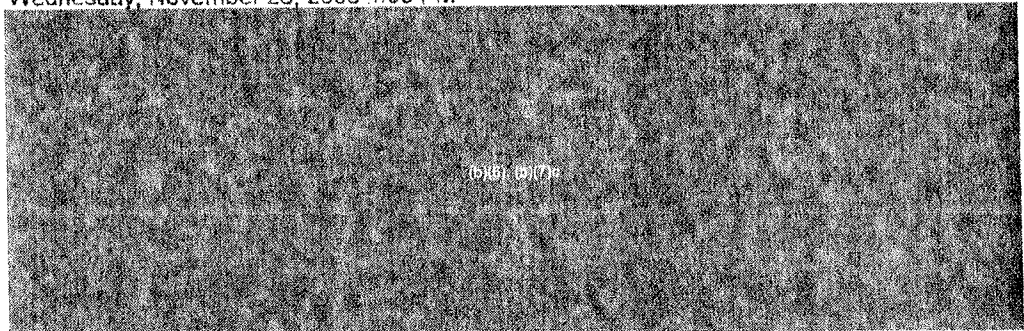

On October 31, 2008 I disseminated a directive titled "Fugitive Case File Vetting Prior to Arrest" requiring that until further notice all fugitive operations targets be reviewed personally by the Field Office Director or Deputy Field Office Director prior to any actions to arrest a fugitive target. Effective immediately that directive is rescinded. Field Office Directors may delegate this task to an Assistant Field Office Director (AFOD) or first-line supervisor assigned to a Fugitive Operations Team (FOT) within their Area-of-Responsibility (AOR), as previously addressed in the memorandum entitled "Delegation of Detention & Removal Authority". This memorandum will be re-distributed to each FOD and DFOD via DRO Taskings in a subsequent message. Each Field Office Director must continue to ensure that their fugitive operations teams and operations continue to comply with all other previously issued policy regarding the review of fugitive operations targets.

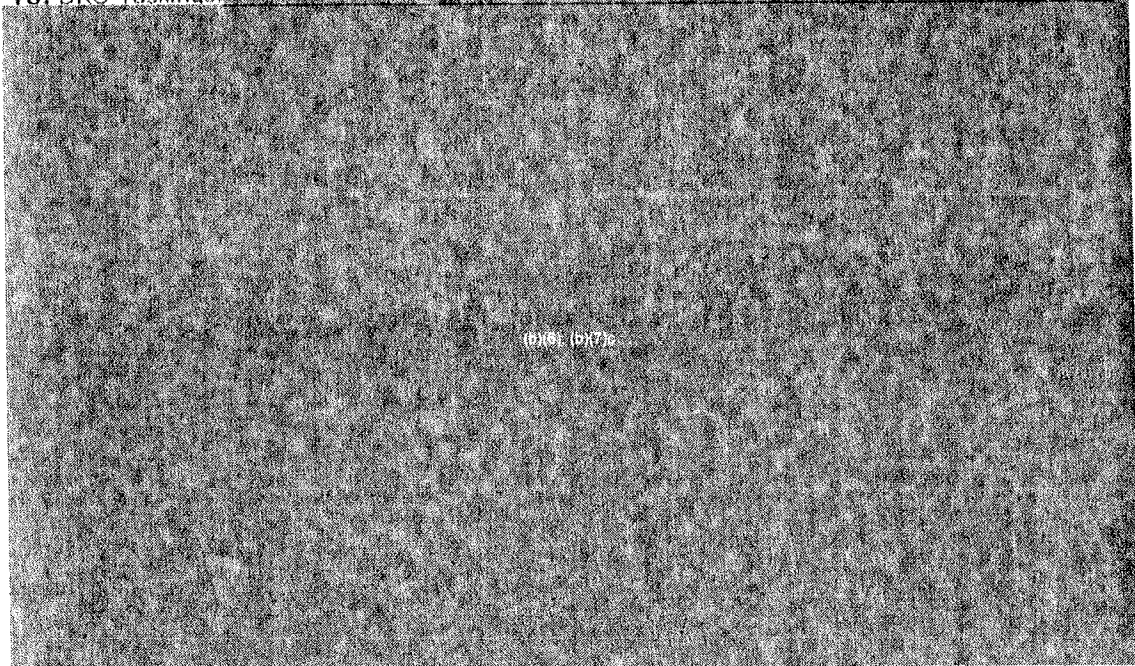

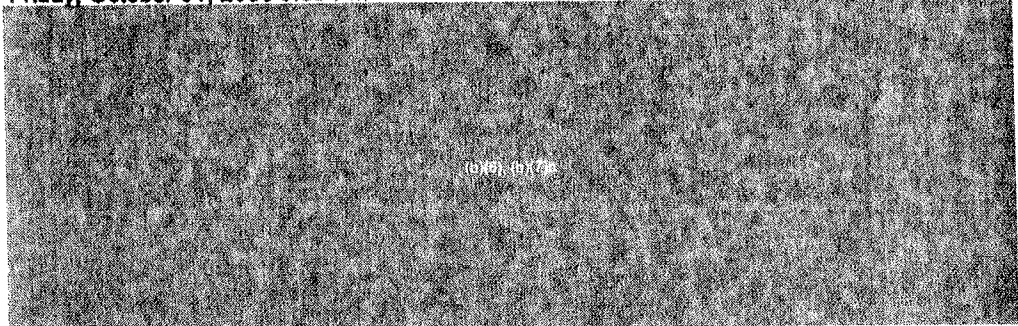
Additional verbiage must be included under the "Targets Sought" section of the Operation Plan, to wit:

Effective immediately and until further notice all fugitive operations targets will be vetted personally by the Field Office Director or Deputy Field Office Director prior to any actions to arrest a fugitive target. The FOD or DFOD should annotate the case worksheet documenting their review along with any comments or decisions with regard to proceeding or not proceeding with the arrest of that case. Any potential for negative media or congressional interest that is discovered during these reviews will be forwarded to my office by the Field Office Director or Deputy Field Office Director with a detailed case synopsis, a scanned version of the fugitive operations worksheet and any other relevant documents. A hold on any actions to proceed with arrest will be placed in the case file until I can review the case and evaluate the impact of the potential media or congressional interest.



SUBJECT: Delegation of Detention and Removal Authority

Pursuant to the authority delegated to me by the Assistant Secretary, Immigration and Customs Enforcement in Immigration and Customs Enforcement Delegation No. 0001, I hereby delegate to Supervisory Deportation Officers (SDO) and Supervisory Detention and Deportation Officers (SDDO) or officers acting in that capacity:

- (a) Authority under 8 CFR 103.6 to breach bonds;
- (b) Authority under INA §238, 8 U.S.C. §1228, and 8 C.F.R. Part 238, relating to administrative removal and expedited removal of criminal aliens;
- (c) Authority under INA §240B, 8 U.S.C. §1229c and 8 C.F.R. Part 240 to adjudicate requests for voluntary departure, including under INA §244(e) as in effect prior to April 1, 1997; and,
- (d) Authority under INA §241, 8 U.S.C. §1231 and 8 C.F.R. Part 241, relating to warrants of removal, reinstatement of removal and self-removal.

Authority to exercise orders of reinstatement under INA §241, 8 U.S.C. §1231 and 8 C.F.R. Part 241 may be exercised by any immigration officer. However, the deciding official shall not be below the level of a SDO or SDDO.

The announcement of the ICE field structure has necessitated this re-delegation, which provides authority to the Detention and Removal and Investigations Programs of ICE so as to carry out the immigration enforcement functions of ICE. In addition, the re-delegation provides authority to enter into agreements and memoranda of understanding.

This re-delegation includes the provision that the authority delegated therein can be successively re-delegated to appropriate subordinate officials.

1. Purpose

This delegation vests in the Directors of Detention and Removal and Investigations, and Field Office Directors of the Detention and Removal Program, Special Agents in Charge of the Investigations Program, and certain other officers of the Bureau of Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) the authorities described herein in order to accomplish the mission of ICE. This delegation is made through, and the exercise of any authorities herein is subject to, the authority, direction, and control of the Under Secretary for Border and Transportation Security.

2. Delegations

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Secretary of Homeland Security by law, including the Homeland Security Act of 2002, as amended (HSA), and delegated to the Assistant Secretary for ICE in *Department of Homeland Security Delegation No.7030*, I hereby delegate the following authorities to the following officials, including those in an acting capacity:

- (A) Delegation to the Detention and Removal Program:
 - (1) Authorities of the Director, Detention and Removal:
 - (a) All authority vested in the Assistant Secretary for ICE by HSA §§ 102 and 441, relating to the Detention and Removal Program, of the former Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), and transferred to ICE by the President's Reorganization

Plan of November 25, 2002, as modified January 30, 2003 (Reorganization Plan);

- (b) Authority under § 103(a)(1) of the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, as amended (INA), 8 U.S.C. § 1103(a)(1), and 8 C.F.R. Part 103 to enforce and administer the immigration laws (as defined in INA § 101(a)(17), 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(17)) with respect to matters within the jurisdiction of detention and removal;
- (c) Authority under INA §§ 103(d), (e), 8 U.S.C. §§ 1103(d), (e), relating to the collection and dissemination to Congress and the public of information relating to the social, economic, environmental, and demographic impact of immigration laws;
- (d) Authority under INA § 235(c), 8 U.S.C. § 1225(c), and 8 C.F.R. § 235.8, relating to aliens who are inadmissible under security and related grounds; and

Authority pursuant to HSA § 102 to enter into Memoranda of Agreement and Memoranda of Understanding.

- (2) Authorities of Director, Detention and Removal; Deputy Assistant Director, Field Operations Division; Field Office Directors; Deputy Field Office Directors; and Officers in Charge:

Authority under § 103(a)(1) of the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, as amended (INA), 8 U.S.C. § 1103(a)(1), and 8 C.F.R. Part 103 to enforce and administer the immigration laws (as defined in INA § 101(a)(17), 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(17)) with respect to matters within the jurisdiction of detention and removal;

Authority under 8 C.F.R. § 103.6 to approve bonds issued pursuant to the immigration laws, to determine whether such bonds have been breached, and to take appropriate action to protect the interests of the United States with respect to such bonds;

Authority under 8 C.F.R. § 103.7(d) to certify official Department of Homeland Security records relating to immigration matters within the control of ICE;

Authority under INA § 212(d)(5), 8 U.S.C. § 1182(d)(5), and 8 C.F.R. Part 212 to adjudicate requests for parole, and to parole applicants for admission into the United States;

- (e) Authority under INA § 213, 8 U.S.C. § 1183, and 8 C.F.R. Part 213, relating to the admission of aliens on giving bond or cash deposit;
- (f) Authority under INA § 215, 8 U.S.C. § 1185, and 8 C.F.R. Part 215, relating to the exercise of departure control authority;
- (g) Authority under INA § 217, 8 U.S.C. § 1187, and 8 C.F.R. Part 217, relating to aliens admitted under the Visa Waiver Program;
- (h) Authority under INA § 235(b)(1), 8 U.S.C. § 1225(b)(1), and 8 C.F.R. Part 235, relating to the detention and removal aspects of expedited removal;
- (i) Authority under INA § 235(d), 8 U.S.C. § 1225(d), including but not limited to administering oaths, taking evidence, and requiring by subpoena the attendance and testimony of witnesses, and the production of books, papers and documents;
- (j) Authority under INA § 236, 8 U.S.C. § 1226, and 8 C.F.R. Part 236, relating to detention of aliens;

- (o) Authority under INA § 250, 8 U.S.C. § 1260, relating to the removal of aliens who have fallen into distress;

- (p) Authority under INA §§ 262-266, 8 U.S.C. §§ 1302-1306, and 8 C.F.R. Parts 264 and 265 to register and fingerprint aliens in the United States, and exercise other functions relating to registration and change of address;
 - (q) All authorities provided by INA § 287, 8 U.S.C. § 1357 (except for § 287(g)), and 8 C.F.R. Part 287 (except for §§ 287.10 and 287.11);
 - (r) Authority under INA § 290, 8 U.S.C. § 1360, to maintain a central file, and other records systems and files necessary and appropriate for the operations of ICE; and
 - (s) Authority to exercise prosecutorial discretion in immigration enforcement matters, including determinations relating to withdrawal of an application for admission, voluntary return, or deferred action.
- (3) Authority to perform other such functions as I may direct.
- (B) Delegation to the Investigations Program:
- (1) Authorities of the Director, Investigations:
 - (a) All authority vested in the Assistant Secretary by HSA §§ 102 and 441, relating to the Investigations Program, of the former INS, and transferred to ICE by the Reorganization Plan;
 - (b) Authority under § 103(a)(1) of the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, as amended (INA), 8 U.S.C. § 1103(a)(1), and 8 C.F.R. Part 103 to enforce and administer the immigration laws (as defined in INA § 101(a)(17), 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(17)) with respect to matters within the jurisdiction of investigations;
 - (c) Authority under INA § 103(c), 8 U.S.C. § 1103(c), and 8 C.F.R. Part 103, including the authority to enter into cooperative agreements with State and local law enforcement agencies for the purpose of assisting in the enforcement of the immigration laws;
 - (d) Authority under INA §§ 103(d), (e), 8 U.S.C. §§ 1103(d), (e), relating to the collection and dissemination to Congress and the public of information relating to the social, economic, environmental, and demographic impact of immigration laws;

- (e) Authority under INA § 235(c), 8 U.S.C. § 1225(c), and 8 C.F.R. § 235.8, relating to aliens who are inadmissible under security and related grounds; and
 - (f) Authority pursuant to HSA § 102 to enter into Memoranda of Agreement and Memoranda of Understanding.
- (2) Authorities of Special Agents in Charge, Deputy Special Agents in Charge, Associate Special Agents in Charge, Assistant Special Agents in Charge and Resident Agents in Charge:
- (a) Authority under § 103(a)(1) of the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, as amended (INA), 8 U.S.C. § 1103(a)(1), and 8 C.F.R. Part 103 to enforce and administer the immigration laws (as defined in INA § 101(a)(17), 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(17)) with respect to matters within the jurisdiction of investigations;

Authority under 8 C.F.R. § 103.6 to approve bonds issued pursuant to the immigration laws, to determine whether such bonds have been breached, and to take appropriate action to protect the interests of the United States with respect to such bonds;

Authority under 8 C.F.R. § 103.7(d) to certify official Department of Homeland Security records relating to immigration matters within the control of ICE;

 - (h) Authority under INA § 235(d), 8 U.S.C. § 1225(d), including but not limited to administering oaths, taking evidence, and requiring by subpoena the attendance and testimony of witnesses, and the production of books, papers and documents;

- (i) Authority under INA § 236, 8 U.S.C. § 1226, and 8 C.F.R. Part 236, relating to detention of aliens;
- (j) Authority under INA § 238, 8 U.S.C. § 1228, and 8 C.F.R. Part 238, relating to administrative removal and expedited removal of criminal aliens;
- (k) Authority under INA § 239, 8 U.S.C. § 1229, and 8 C.F.R. Part 239 to place aliens in removal proceeding by issuing a Notice to Appear (NTA), and to cancel such NTA before jurisdiction vests with the Executive Office for Immigration Review of the Department of Justice (EOIR);

Authority under INA § 241, 8 U.S.C. § 1231 and 8 C.F.R. Part 241, relating to warrants of removal, and reinstatement of removal;

Authority under INA § 250, 8 U.S.C. § 1260, relating to the removal of aliens who have fallen into distress;

Authority under INA §§ 262-266, 8 U.S.C. §§ 1302-1306, and 8 C.F.R. Parts 264 and 265 to register and fingerprint aliens in the United States, and exercise other functions relating to registration and change of address;

Authority under INA § 274, 8 U.S.C. § 1324, and 8 C.F.R. Part 274, including but not limited to alien smuggling, seizure, and forfeiture;

- (q) Authority under INA §§ 274A, 274C, and 274D, 8 U.S.C. §§ 1324a, 1324c, and 1324d, to administer and enforce provisions relating to unlawful employment of aliens, document fraud, and civil penalties for failure to depart;
- (r) All authorities provided by INA § 287, 8 U.S.C. § 1357 (except for § 287(g)), and 8 C.F.R. Part 287 (except for §§ 287.10 and 287.11);
- (s) Authority under INA § 290, 8 U.S.C. § 1360, to maintain a central file, and other records systems and files necessary and appropriate for the operations of ICE;

- (t) Authority under 8 C.F.R. § 292.2, relating to requests for recognition of organizations and representatives;
- (u) Authority under 8 C.F.R. § 292.3, relating to professional conduct for practitioners;
- (v) Authority under INA § 294, 8 U.S.C. § 1363a, relating to undercover investigations;

Authority to investigate alleged civil and criminal violations of the immigration laws, including but not limited to alleged fraud with respect to applications or determinations within the jurisdiction of CBP or the BCIS, and to make recommendations for prosecution or take other appropriate action when deemed advisable; and

Authority to exercise prosecutorial discretion in immigration enforcement matters, including determinations relating to withdrawal of an application for admission, voluntary return, or deferred action.

- (3) Authority to perform other such functions as I may direct.

3. Reservations

- (A) The above delegations of authority by the Assistant Secretary for ICE in no way limit the functions, rights, privileges, powers, and duties vested in the Commissioner of CBP or in the Director of the BCIS by law, including authority provided by the above listed statutes or any delegation from the Secretary of Homeland Security.
- (B) Nothing in this delegation is intended to grant or provide authority or jurisdiction over any determination or matter within the sole authority of the Executive Office for Immigration Review of the Department of Justice.

4. Re-delegations

Unless otherwise proscribed by statute, Executive Order, or the terms of this delegation, the powers, authorities, responsibilities and functions delegated herein may be re-delegated in writing by the Directors of Detention and Removal or Investigations or by the Field Office Directors or Special Agents in Charge to appropriate subordinate officials of ICE, and may be successively re-delegated to other officers or employees of ICE qualified to exercise the authority.

Nothing in the re-delegations to officers and employees of ICE provided by this delegation shall be construed to limit the exercise by the Assistant Secretary of such authority, or his authority to direct and control such officers and employees in their exercise of re-delegated authority.

Nothing in the re-delegations to officers and employees of ICE provided by this delegation shall be construed to authorize any officer or employee of ICE to perform any function or exercise any authority that has not been delegated to the Assistant Secretary.

Nothing in this delegation, including any re-delegations, shall be construed to authorize any officer or employee of ICE to perform any immigration officer, customs officer, law enforcement or other function unless such officer or employee has completed the training and possesses the qualifications prescribed for such function.



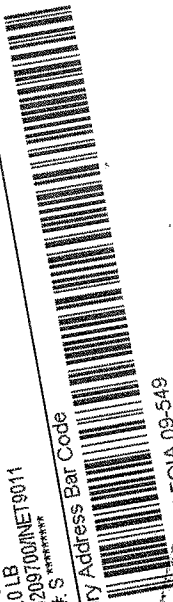

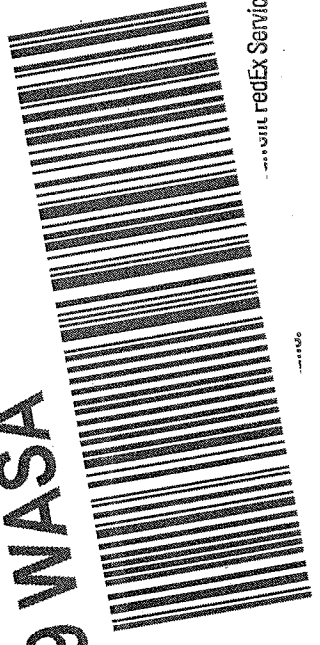
