As you may know the seventh annual Sportaccord Conference will take place in Denver, Colorado, on March 23-27, 2009. The International Olympic Committee will hold a meeting of its Executive Board during this event as will numerous other associations of international sports federations.

As one of the largest and most significant gatherings of international sports leaders ever to be held in our country outside the Olympic Games, Sportaccord is of high strategic importance for all of us, particularly considering that it comes just five months before the International Olympic Committee will make its decision on the host city for the 2016 Olympic Games in which Chicago is a candidate.

Many of the leaders traveling to Denver will be voting in the 2016 race and it is therefore critical for us that we make them feel welcome, appreciated and respected, especially upon their first arrival in the United States.

In addition to the relevance of the Chicago bid and the Olympic Games, these leaders also influence or make decisions on the event locations of hundreds of World Championships and other annual international sporting events, many of which could include future opportunities in other cities in the United States.

In order to assist Olympic Leaders in making entry into the United States faster and easier and to offer extra courtesies at our borders the United States Olympic Committee (USOC) has created the ***Olympic Leader Travel Program***. This special program has been developed by the USOC in coordination with the US Departments of State and Homeland Security and therefore has the full support of Customs and Border Protection (CBP) in Washington.

In this regard, you should be aware that representatives of the Chicago 2016 bid and the USOC will be contacting the relevant Airport Authorities in your city in order to coordinate the arrival process for Olympic Leaders transiting your airport.

I would appreciate it greatly if you would assist me in this important undertaking by designating a representative of your office who could work with your local airport officials and the USOC to assure that the Sportaccord delegates be afforded every courtesy.

Once you designate a liaison for this purpose, I would be grateful if he/she could contact Christopher Sullivan (tel. +1 (917) 428-7378, email: christopher.sullivan@usoc.org) who is coordinating our collective efforts in this regard.

The location of Chicago's competition venues and key Olympic sites was driven in part by the proximity to the city's extensive road and rail transport infrastructure, a system capable of transporting Olympic capacities today. Empowered by multiple transport options and access points, Chicago 2016's transport plan offers safe, easy and quick transport for all members of the Olympic Family and features built-in flexibility to meet the unique real-time demands of all client groups. Athletes and the Olympic Family will travel on an extensive network of Olympic Lanes during the Games, while workforce, spectators and the public will utilize the city's extensive mass transit system. As part of the sustainability drive of the Blue-Green Games, all CHICOG vehicles will run on low-carbon fuels, and existing public-transport terminals will serve all venues. The Olympic Transport Command will integrate all public and CHICOG transport services and oversee traffic management and emergency response through the city's experienced Traffic Management Authority.

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Theme 16

Proven technology to burnish the Olympic image around the world

Ranked number one in the U.S., Chicago's commercial terrestrial telecom network offers state-of-the-art technology in the service of the Games. This reliable, secure and well-tested network provides the foundation for the technology platform required to conduct and broadcast the Olympic and Paralympic Games. Fully integrated into McCormick Place, the home of the IBC/MPC, this network regularly serves large events with global simulcasts in a facility equipped for worldwide media and broadcast operations. As a world leader in technology and innovation, Chicago will draw on technical experts with firsthand experience at past Games, strong public-private partnerships and a large, passionate talent pool. In addition, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission will partner with CHICOG to support the demanding safety and communications needs of the Games. The net result will be a flawless technology operation that helps burnish the image of the Games worldwide.

The athletes are at the very center of Chicago's plan for 2016, but the media is right next door. Recognizing the critical importance of providing a great venue and state-of-the-art services to the global Olympic media, Chicago has placed the IBC/MPC in the expansive interior of McCormick Place, the largest multi-use facility in North America. Located right on the northern perimeter of the Olympic Village, McCormick Place will also be home to the Lake Michigan Sports Complex, which will host 11 Olympic and 8 Paralympic sports and be within 8 km of the competition venues for 11 other sports, allowing the media to cover many sports efficiently and cost effectively. Major and key media accommodations will be nearby, and so will all the attractions and amenities of downtown Chicago, ensuring the media has a spectacular Games experience as well. McCormick Place is equipped with the most up-to-date technology and its ample transportation mall will offer the media quick and easy access to competition venues and media accommodations.




REACHING FOR A BETTER WORLD





A POWERFUL PACKAGE OF LEGISLATION AND GUARANTEES DESIGNED TO SECURE THE SUCCESS OF THE GAMES

The City of Chicago has proactively passed all the legislation and guarantees necessary to establish the legal framework for the successful staging of the 2016 Olympic and Paralympic Games. With the comprehensive Olympic Approvals Ordinance, City Council authorized the Mayor to sign the Host City Contract and all other agreements necessary for hosting the Games, including the Joint Marketing Program Agreement. It also covered the city's obligations in The Chicago Olympic Commitments Agreement, which sets forth the city's guarantees as

required by the IOC, and the Governmental Cooperation Agreement, which establishes hosting commitments between the City of Chicago and its many governmental partners. The milestones passed by City Council include a \$500 million guarantee against any shortfall in the Games operations, an unprecedented guarantee for a U.S. Candidate City. The laws of the United States already provide strong protection for the Olympic symbols and marks, and CHICOG will draw upon the experience of the USOC to enforce these laws to their full extent.

The program will be deployed across the seven-year period of the Games to ensure ever greater ease of access for the Olympic Family and to reach CHICOG's ultimate goal of providing a warm and friendly in 2016 for the world's greatest celebration of peace through sport. For 2016, accredited persons will be able to enter the United States with a passport and their Olympic identity/ accreditation through a seamless, expedited duty- and tax-free immigration process.

As the centerpiece of the Games plan, the Village extends the vibrant lakefront corridor that embraces Grant Park, two museums, an aquarium and planetarium, Olympic Island, the IBC/MPC at McCormick Place and the venues for 21 sports. From this stunning lakefront location, 90% of the athletes will be able to reach their competition and training venues in 15 minutes or less, and after their competition will have easy access to all that Chicago has to offer. Within the Village, athletes will have convenient

access to an array of amenities from the Main Street, including a private beach, a 50m pool, a lakefront fitness area, an open-air live performance theater on the shoreline, four alternative dining cafes in the Residential Zone, free wi-fi, and a bike sharing program. All apartments will include Olympic broadcast feeds and semi-private sky terraces with intriguing views. Designed to be a highly-desirable, sustainable mixed-income residential and retail neighborhood after the Games, the Village will offer all NOCs offices with convenient proximity to team accommodations.



Chicago's depth of experience in cooperating with regional, national and international agencies to secure major events informed every phase of security planning for the Games. The result is the creation of the Chicago Olympic Public Safety Command (COPSC), an organization that integrates all relevant security agencies into a single, unified command structure that will manage all security efforts for the 2016 Games.
