

1 briefly. Can you just give us a little bit more detail on
2 what law firm you worked for?

3 A It was a law firm which has since been dissolved,
4 Jenkins & Eals in Atlanta.

5 Q Okay. And when would that have been?

6 A The early '90s before the '92 campaign, '91.

7 Q Okay. And from the law firm you went to?

8 A Little Rock.

9 Q And can you explain to us what you did in Little
10 Rock?

11 A In Little Rock I worked on Vice President Gore's
12 staff. I helped the correspondence and scheduling. I
13 helped his personal correspondence that came into the
14 campaign office.

15 Q Were you a volunteer or was this a paid position?

16 A Both.

17 Q Okay.

18 A I started as a volunteer and became paid.

19 Q Okay. And then after that?

20 A After we won, I went to, came up to D.C., and got
21 a job with the Presidential Inaugural Committee.

22 Q And who did you work with?

23 A Craig Livingstone in the Department of Security.

24 Q Okay. I believe that, you mean, you worked for
25 Craig Livingstone after the inaugural.

1 A During the inaugural.

2 For the Presidential Inaugural Committee for 1992
3 he had the position of director of security and I was one of
4 his staff assistants.

5 Q Okay. For the inaugural.

6 A For the Inaugural Committee.

7 Q Can you tell me who you worked for in Little Rock?

8 A In Little Rock, James Day, and Laura Spinning.

9 Q And do you recall what their positions were?

10 A James Day director of advance and Laura Spinning
11 was the assistant to Roy Neal.

12 Q Okay. When did you first meet Mr. Livingstone?

13 A 1988.

14 Q And can you tell us how you met?

15 A My internship during college was with the National
16 Democratic Committee during their 1988 Atlanta Convention.

17 Q And during the convention you met Mr. Livingstone?

18 A Hmm-hmm.

19 Q Can you tell us how you met him?

20 A I was working in the chairman's office and--

21 Q Chairman?

22 A Chairman Kirk.

23 Q Chairman of?

24 A The National Democratic Committee.

25 Q Okay.

1 A And he was one of the staffers.

2 Q Did you work with him or did you just happen to
3 meet him in passing?

4 A Both. It was a little bit of both. I was doing
5 the usual things that interns do, running around, answering
6 phones, gophering. He was in the staff room and I was
7 wherever they put me that day.

8 Q Okay. And did you remain in contact with Mr.
9 Livingstone between 1988 and the 1992 campaign?

10 A He was the only contact I had in 1992 for the
11 campaign and at the time that I was interested, decided I
12 was interested in working on the campaign he was the only
13 political person I knew. And at that time he was with Ross
14 Perot and he gave me the name of James Day in Little Rock.

15 Q Okay. And then after the election, did you
16 contact Mr. Livingstone to work on the inaugural?

17 A He contacted me.

18 Q Okay. And do you remember what your position or
19 responsibilities were with respect to the Inaugural
20 Committee?

21 A Staff assistant. In respect to what I exactly did
22 for the inaugural was originally when people came in I would
23 be the receptionist, greeter. And then later began to
24 manage the badge issuance process in conjunction with the
25 Personnel Office as to who got a badge, who didn't get a

1 badge.

2 Just general staff filing, typing, whatever we
3 needed to do.

4 Q When was the first time you met Mr. Marceca?

5 A During the Inaugural Committee.

6 Q Okay. And can you tell us how you met him?

7 A He was in the office and we introduced ourselves.

8 Q Okay. Did you work with Mr. Livingstone at all
9 during the campaign, the 1992 campaign?

10 A I worked with Mr. Livingstone when he came in from
11 the road to do the inaugural, not the inaugural night,
12 pardon me, the election night advance. And that is when I
13 worked with him.

14 Q Okay. Do you know if Mr. Livingstone reported to
15 Mr. Harry Thomassen with regard to the Inaugural Committee?

16 A I would assume that he had some type of duty to
17 report to Mr. Harry Thomassen since he was the chairman of
18 the committee. Outside of that, I have no idea.

19 Q Okay. Did you know Mr. Thomassen at all?

20 A I knew he was the chairman of the committee.

21 Q Did you have personal working contact?

22 A No.

23 Q Can you tell us when you first began working at
24 the White House?

25 A February of '93.

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1 Q And in what capacity?

2 A I don't know what they originally called it, but I
3 think it was staff assistant.

4 Q Okay. Do you recall how you got your job as staff
5 assistant?

6 A Craig offered it and I said, yes.

7 Q And that would have been approximately when?

8 A February of '93.

9 Q So, basically, it was instantaneous from the Craig
10 offered it to you and the job started very shortly
11 thereafter?

12 A A week later.

13 Q Okay. Did you interview at all with Mr.
14 Livingstone or was it just an offer?

15 A No. Since I had already worked for him I don't
16 think he needed to interview me.

17 Q Did anyone in the White House Counsel's Office
18 interview you or speak with you with regard to your
19 employment at the White House?

20 A No. Other than to say, welcome, though.

21 Q Okay. Do you remember who said, welcome?

22 A People, I mean just the general office. I mean
23 specifically, no, I don't remember.

24 Q Okay. Do you remember when you started whether
25 the office had a copy machine?

1 A Yes.

2 Q One?

3 A Yes.

4 Q A fax machine?

5 A Nope.

6 Q Did you have a computer when you started?

7 A I had access to a computer. But I did not have
8 one that was strictly dedicated to me.

9 Q Okay. When you first started, do you know how
10 many computers were in the office?

11 A It depends on what kind of computer you mean.

12 Q Well, why don't you describe to us what kind of
13 computers were there?

14 A There was a Wang computer that was probably issued
15 in 1970 and then there was a 286 computer, IBM-PC.

16 Q And when you said you had access to a computer,
17 did you mean--

18 A Both of those.

19 Q Okay.

20 A The 1970 Wang computer was only data base, you
21 couldn't do anything on it.

22 Q I see. Did Mr. Livingstone have a computer?

23 A He had access to that same computer.

24 Q Okay. I understand that at some point a number of
25 additional computers were brought into the office?
