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MR. SCHANZER: Okay. It's just that our records show that requests were being made all through this period to the FBI, so, I'm just trying to figure out.

THE WITNESS: To the best of my knowledge, Tony was going through and striking the names or he had gone through and struck the names that should not have been on that list.

MR. SRERE: To the extent you could recognize them.

THE WITNESS: Yes, to the extent that we could recognize them.

MR. SRERE: It's one thing a Bush or a Quayle and another thing to strike Mr. [name deleted].

BY MR. HIRSHLAND:

Q When did you first learn that the Office of Personnel Security had received BI's of prior administration officials who, in fact, no longer had access to the White House or had a need for a pass?

A Specifically? Specifically, I don't remember when I first learned it.

Q Okay.

A I do know that after everybody was aware of it that we did say, well, what are we going to do.

Q Everyone was aware of the list being complete or the FBI files actually coming into the office?

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1	A Of the files coming into the office of people who
– 2	had not been there.
. 3	Q Of people who no longer had access
4	A Who were no longer working there.
5	Q So, therefore, there was no need for the files; is
. 6	that correct?
7	A No.
8	Q Okay.
9	A According to what we were working off of, they all
io	had access. They all were active because the important
. 11	thing to note is that on this list that we received from the
. 12	Secret Service, it listed all active permanent passes, which
. 13	means that in the computer, as far as the Secret Service was
14	concerned, these were people who had access.
15	Q Okay. I'm just trying to clarify. Did the report
. 16	actually indicate whether an entry was for an active or
17	inactive individual?
18	A Active. That's what we requested was all active
. 19	permanent passholders.
20	MR. SCHANZER: Is there anything on the list that
21	indicated whether
. 22	THE WITNESS: Yes. There was a section that said
.23	active. There was, like, a column. You had the name. Oh,
24	God, you can configure it to get anything you wanted, but it
- 25	had, like, the name, and I think at the topI can't

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remember if there was--if on the list that we used if there was a column that said active or if on the top it said active permanent passholders or active E passholders.

BY MR. HIRSHLAND:

- Q But you recollection is that somewhere on the actual list--
 - A It said active.
- Q Okay. Well, at some point, did you or someone else in the office recognize that an FBI file had been sent to the Office of Personnel Security for someone who, though they may have been on that list, in fact, was not active?
 - A Yes.

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- Q Do you recall when--who recognized that and when?
- A No, because it was like in the day-to-day.course of things. I do recall that when we found out about it, we said, well, how can we rectify this problem, and a lot of the previous backgrounds that we were requesting were for White House operations, which if you look on the list, it will break it down by, like, National Security Council, Office of Vice President, C&P, or, you know, whatever office they were working in.

White House Operations covered everybody,
everything that was not specific towards the Office of Vice
President, and there was no way we had of knowing whether
this person was in the Office of Presidential Personnel,

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person was in Council's Office, whether this person was in Domestic Policy, Cabinet Affairs, where this person was, and when we get the backgrounds back, it says, Suzie Que in the Office of Presidential Personnel. So it's at that point that we would have, okay, we can now go to the Office of

whether this person was in Correspondence, whether this

8 still here.

And when we were working off of that list, we came to the realization that anybody that was listed as White House Operations, there was no way we were going to be able to know where in the White House they worked. It was literally impossible based on the list that we had to know, because it still said active, where they were, and so--

Presidential Personnel and say where is Suzie Que, is she

Q Do you remember this was first--was it while Tony was still there?

A It was while Tony was still there.

Q Okay.

A And what we decided was since Tony was going through it at a moderate pace--I mean, he wasn't barreling through it. He was going pretty slow--that he was doing the offices that he could saying, okay, is this person still here and whatnot, but, like, the White House Operations, he was going through and saying we're going to request these because we have no idea where they are. There was no way

that we could come up with, that we could figure out, how can we find out who these people are, because we were also looking for ways to save ourselves some work.

Q Right.

A So, basically, what ended up happening was with White House Operations, those listed under White House Operations, the best way we could figure out who they were and where they were and if they were still there was to request the background. There was no other way. Nobody else had records. It was all archived.

Q I see. Do you recall--

MR. SCHANZER: Who is we?

THE WITNESS: The Office of Personnel.

MR. SCHANZER: Who were you working with at this point when you said when we figured this out? Did you have discussions with Mr.--

THE WITNESS: Craig. Craig, Tony, Lisa. We all sat down and tried to figure it out.

BY MR. HIRSHLAND:

- Q Do you know if Bill Kennedy at any point was apprised of the situation or asked for advice?
 - A I don't know specifically.
- Q So what was the plan for--once the--you had this--what you understood to be over-inclusive list of White House Operations.

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A Uh-huh.

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Q You said you all sat down and figured you had to order the BI's first. What was kind of step two once the BI's came back? What was the plan of attack then?

A Once we found out that Suzie Que was working in the Office of Presidential Personnel, Tony would then call Office of Presidential Personnel and try and track down Suzie Que.

He would call whoever the staff contact, staff director, whoever that person was, and say where is Suzie Que in your office. We don't know. You might want to try here. And so he would sort of be following a trail to find out who they were. If he could not find them, then the file was slated to be archived, since they didn't work there.

Q Do you know--when they were slated to be archived, were they put on a separate shelf in the volt, for example?

A Yes. They were put on the other side of the volt in one of the bins on that other side.

Q Do you know while you were there, were they referred to as Tony's files?

MR. SCHANZER: Or the dead files?

THE WITNESS: That sounds familiar, but to be honest, I don't remember.

MR. SCHANZER: Do you do this process for, let's say, NSC people as well?

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
