A I mean that I personally have a memory that there were about 50 files that we had slated to be archived, but when we archived, we archived by the box. We couldn't just

BY MR. HIRSHLAND:

Q But you-how did you know that the people they were talking about weren't new employees?

A Because Tony did not read the investigations of the new employees as part of his job. As part of his job, he reviewed the old--the background investigations that came
