they were currently filling them out or that they had departed the White House.

MR. SCHANZER: Okay; what significance did you attach to the fact that the people that you had requested FBI background files on were actually no longer with the White House?

THE WITNESS: From my understanding, I really didn't attach that big a deal to them, because I didn't, one, know who these people were. I just assumed that a majority of them were just people who had maybe stayed over a day, a month or what not, and then, they had departed the White House after saying okay, hi, new personnel; this is the way it's been done; okay, now that I've trained you, bye. And so, I just--

BY MR. HIRSHLAND:

Q Like Ms. Gemmell.

A Like Ms. Gemmell, exactly; exactly like Ms. Gemmell. That was what I assumed these people were.

MR. SCHANZER: And you came to that belief by getting these responses from the agencies.

THE WITNESS: By getting the responses that they had left.

MR. SCHANZER: Now, when you learned that somebody had left, what would happen to their FBI background file that was, I guess, currently in Room 84?

THE WITNESS: It was currently contained in the vault, and what we had said was that--pardon me; or what I should say we had established was that we created a drawer that all people who had been--

MR. SCHANZER: When you say we, who was aware at this point?

THE WITNESS: The office, just the office in general. Everybody in the office knew that we had gotten background investigations of people who were no longer working there. And in some cases, we didn't know when they left. And in some cases, it was not very clear as to when their departure date was.

MR. SCHANZER; Did Mr. Livingstone know that?
THE WITNESS: No.

MR. SCHANZER: Why do you believe that Mr. Livingstone didn't know that you had gotten files on people who--

THE WITNESS: Oh, oh, oh; I thought you meant that he didn't know what their departure date was.

MR. SCHANZER: No, I'm sorry.

THE WITNESS: No, he did know that we had gotten files on people who were no longer there.

BY MR. HIRSHLAND:

- Q Did Mr. Kennedy know?
- A I do not know.

And we had set up--the office in general had set up--a file drawer that was to be slotted for files, FBI backgrounds, that were to be archived because these people were no longer at the White House.

MR. SCHANZER: Did it come to the offices' collective knowledge at some point that not only did you have files on people who may have left during the Clinton administration but people who, indeed, had never even been in the Clinton administration?

THE WITNESS: We eventually did discover that there were a few individuals who had left at the transition period. We just assumed that it had been a glitch in the computer that they had come up active, that we didn't know that Joe Blow had left.

MR. SCHANZER: When you say that they had come up active, do you mean that they appeared on a list--

THE WITNESS: On the list.

MR. SCHANZER: --that you assumed was only active passholders?

THE WITNESS: Yes, that they appeared on that list.

MR. SRERE: You say assumed it was only passholders; I think she testified they asked the Secret Service for a list of active passholders and that that is what the Secret Service gave them. So, to the Secret

Service, which has control over the White House access, the Secret Service thought these people were active.

MR. SCHANZER: Correct; okay.

Now, when you came to this--well, I'm sorry, I've lost my train of thought. How did you come to this knowledge, understanding, that you may actually have files on people who had never been in the Clinton administration? .

THE WITNESS: When it got to the point where we were requesting passes -- or, I'm sorry, not passes but background investigations -- on people, and we found out that under the White House Operations, it fell that they were with the Office of Presidential Personnel or they were with a Presidential department.

MR. SCHANZER: Was this when you got to the part of the update project dealing with White House staff?

THE WITNESS: Yes, with the --

MR. SCHANZER: Separate and apart from GSA.

That is my recollection, yes. THE WITNESS:

MR. SCHANZER: Separate and apart from NSC; is that correct?

> · THE WITNESS: Yes.

BY MR. HIRSHLAND:

Q And are you saying that that part of the process had already been done for those other departments or --

It was all being done at the same time. Nancy had

started off -- if my understanding is correct, Nancy had started off with certain offices, and I basically became 2 3 aware that by accident, we had requested files of people who were no longer at the White House. I became aware of the 4 5 fact that we requested the files of some people who had not been at the White House since the Clinton administration 6 7 took over when we actually started receiving those departments that fall under the umbrella of White House 8 9 Operations. 10 MR. SCHANZER: Our records seen to indicate that

MR. SCHANZER: Our records seen to indicate that the FBI's report is that these requests for those files were made beginning in December, and they went through all the way to February. Do you know when you became aware that certain White House staff people had files requested, and they had never been in the Clinton administration?

THE WITNESS: I don't know specifically, but if I had to--

MR. SCHANZER: Is that consistent with your recollection, that time period? Is it around then?

THE WITNESS: Consistent with my recollection is that it was in the winter, and it was cold.

MR. HIRSHLAND: Sorry; I'd like to clarify for the record. We have some information that such files were also being requested earlier in the fall, but we don't need to get into the details of that. Just so you know that that is

MR. HIRSHLAND: Yes.
