What worked in the second Bill Clinton term was having a respected, senior official in State (i.e., Wendy) who could bring other agencies together and lead the North Korea policy effort in Washington. One approach in the current Administration would be to have such a senior official serving both as Washington coordinator and as envoy, in which case s/he could have the stature to interact with Kang Suk Ju or the Dear Leader himself. Another model would be to have a senior line officer (e.g., EAP A/S) serve as Washington policy coordinator with another, equally or even more senior, official serving as envoy. A third model of having a Special Advisor for NE Asia Security (who would coordinate in DC and do some high-level diplomatic missions), a separate envoy (who would not be as senior), and a senior line officer with day-to-day responsibility for NE Asia, like the EAP A/S, strikes me as too many cooks in the kitchen. I would prefer either of the first two models.

I agree that we should have an early, general communication from the President to KJI (a video?) "extending his hand" and outlining the broad parameters of his approach toward the DPRK. But any direct contact with NK - even at a very general, tone-setting level - would need to be previoused to the allies and China in

I feel like I'm in limbo but trying to do what's allowable on the women's front.

I wanted to raise a few issues regarding your upcoming trip.

China - the state of female migrant workers is looming as a big challenge and exacerbated by the economic downturn. About half of the 130 million migrant workers are women. The Chinese government just announced that 20 million migrant workers have lost jobs. Women's fate is compounded by the fact that 85 million are reported suffering from domestic violence and an unknown number are victims of trafficking. According to the All China Women's Federation, 1/3 of China's 267 million families have witnessed domestic violence and 94% are of the victims are women. A Chinese court in 2008 issued the first ever protective order to a domestic violence victimso far 6 have been issued in 3 localities. A central government document now mandates police to respond to DV complaints made through hotlines and mandate the All-China Women's Federation to establish DV hotlines throughout the country. The All-China Women's Federation is committed to getting a domestic violence law approved this year. Also China has finally issued the national action plan on combating trafficking in women and children to adopt a comprehensive approach to trafficking. They have a long way to go but this represents progress.

If there's anyway to mention pressing concerns affecting women, particularly protecting migrant workers, the urgency of protecting victims of domestic violence and trafficking, it could make a difference.

If you have time to meet with any women or to include them in an already planned for discussion, there are several women (some of whom you met during your 1998 trip to China and again at Vital Voices event, as well as the representative of All-China Women's Federation, Chen Zhili). I can provide contact information if there's interest, as can Susan O'Sullivan in DRL.

Finally on HIV/AIDS

ZENG JINYAN is the wife of the famous HIV/AIDS activist and detained Hu Jia who was nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize. Sec. Rice raised his case in 2008 as he has been detained since 2007 for testifying on TV for the EU about China's human rights situation.

Zheng, his wife, was selected by TIME as one of the 100 most influential people in the world. She is under house arrest with her 2 year-old daughter for speaking out on behalf of her husband. Zheng and Hu were our messengers to Dr Gao when we were trying to get her to come to Washington in 2006. ZHENG TRANSLATED YOUR LETTER TO THE CHINESE PRESIDENT AND PREMIER, AS WELL AS THE VITAL VOICES INVITATION INTO CHINESE FOR DR. GAO. If there's anyway you could meet with Zheng it would send a strong and personal message for human rights.

I don't know where DRL and the China desk come down on all of this, but I thought you'd want to know. You have no shortage of experts in the building.

Japan - The DCM, James Zumwalt, is the Charge. He is terrific. His wife, ANN KAMBARA, is also a Foreign Service officer. She took the lead when Baker was Ambassador (strongly supported by Nancy Kassebaum at the time), to get the Japanese to address the terrible trafficking problem, which had been largely ignored. (John Miller wanted to come down hard on the Japanese and Nancy knew that would be a counterproductive strategy with the Japanese.) Nancy brought in Vital Voices to engage others from around the world and demonstrate to the Japanese that this was a global problem that we all had to address. We worked really closely with Ann who did a terrific job of pulling a regional meeting together of top governments and NGOs -- first time Japanese govt was in same room with the NGOs. It had a very positive impact and the work continues.

If you have a chance to thank Ann for her work on trafficking, it would be well deserved.

She is a huge fan of yours. She had me do a speaking tour in different parts of Japan for the embassy and I learned a great deal about the rather nascent state of civil society and the strictures on young women to leave the work force once they become mothers. This is creating a real problem as the birth rate there is dropping significantly.

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I'm sorry to put this in an email as opposed to a more readable me	mo. If you need anything additional on any of this, I'm
happy to do what I can.

Hillary

Know you are spending more time on Afghanistan as you inch closer to a POTUS decision. As such, would like to offer some thoughts. I realize I am somewhat radioactive as a result of articles and books which not only sensationalized my role in the Surge but misrepresented it Despite that, my track record on COIN and understanding of irregular warfare and what it takes to succeed, speaks for itself.

Some thoughts --We do not, now, have an effective civil/ military strategy that leads to defeat of the insurgency and a stable Afghanistan (I also believe, as you

know, McKieman, is not the leader to get us there)

-- when thinking about Afghanistan and our desires to succeed you must select options which are decisive I have learned much from our past failures in Iraq but one lesson overwhelms all others and that is: there are no shortcuts to defeating an insurgency We took these shortcuts, using a short war, minimalist, strategy for 3 years in Iraq and we came dangerously close to defeat, with potential dire consequences. We turned this around when we put into effect a decisive strategy with the right leader and the needed forces to support it. Thank God those who were advocating doing less lost to those who wanted, finally, a decisive option. These were the words I used to present it to the POTUS and the words I urged the POTUS/VPOTUS to use when examining other options which advocated less. "General, is this a decisive force that will defeat the insurgency". "General, do we have the right strategy, now, to win". Most insurgencies are defeated (75 per cent) and don't let others tell you there is no clear victory in these kind of wars. Its true the ending may have some ambiguity to it because the enemy leaves the battlefield without a surrender or comes into the political process(as in Iraq). But the outcome eventually is very clear, and we know whether we lost or won, whether the region is more stable as a result and whether our own security and interests are enhanced

-- I urge you to go for the decisive option, which means all the forces requested to include the additional 13K US forces, a robust ANA(at least 300K) required civilian capacity, necessary financing and demand a coherent civil/military strategy from the Generals that leads to victory.

--You cannot presume the generals have the right strategy to win, our own military history is that in most wars we had the wrong strategy, initially,

but in time, made the necessary adjustments. We are at that moment in Afghanistan.

--if you keep McKieman, as I suspect you will, because he enjoys high level support, then I recommend that Petraeus who is one of the best irregular warfare generals we have) be told that he must get his intellectual capital into the details of the civil/military strategy to include the needed organizational headquarters, force dispositions, force employment, the structure and ways and means to establish the rule of law and a judicial system, and the structure and plans to bring better governance at the local level, while improving the effectiveness of the central government -- I know much of COIN is largely non-mulitary and others will play a key role but none of that will matter much if we do not have the right military

-- Henry Kissinger asked me off line on one of our many discussions on Iraq as members of SECDEF policy board, what is US military strategy to defeat the insurgency? I answered, we do not have one, because we are training the ISF so they can defeat the insurgency. He answered, we will lose, Jack, just as we did in Vietnam, because our military strategy will fail to enable viable political solutions and stability and we will lose the political and moral support of the American people. He iterated further that our failed military strategy in Vietnam, for 3 years under Westmoreland, robbed us of political will(despite the fact Abrams turned it around later). He of course, was right, and his thoughts helped me to go forward with a strategy

Uribe travelled to several South American countries to explain the U.S.-Colombia negotiation of a Defense Cooperation Agreement. Chavez has painted this agreement, which includes access to Colombian alroases by U.S. aircraft, as a militarization of the region and a threat

Uribe will want to tell the Secretary what he accomplished, which was to blunt most of the criticism and win recognition that the negotiations are a bilateral issue between Colombia and the U.S. That said, he will probably highlight a very shaky environment in South America and a worry that hostility against him, Colombia and the U.S. Is just below the surface. (Ecuador's inauguration is Monday and that will be the next chance for South American leaders to gather and talk about regional issues. Because of the Ecuador-Colombia border dispute, Colombia is sending a vice foreign minister.)

In this regard, he will probably urge quick conclusion of the DCA. We have a team on the ground now and there is hope we can close the deal this month. This might require the Secretary to tail our negotiators that we want this done now, which would be best for everyone.

Secretary Clinton asked that I send you the most recent update on the welfare and whereabouts of Cynthia McKinney.

Embassy officers met with Cynthia McKinney and her companions yesterday evening/early morning and again this afternoon. They were in good health and spirits and eager to return to the U.S.

The embassy confirms that the group underwent a brief judicial process at the immigration center in Holon yesterday. The embassy learned from the immigration officer responsible for deportations that the Americans and others who had been on the FGM vessel had not yet signed forms accepting their deportation, and refusal to do so would delay their departure. The immigration officer promised that they will have the opportunity to sign in the morning.

The three Americans were visited by an Embassy Consular Officer this afternoon and said they were ready to return, so it seems possible to resolve this discrepancy tomorrow. As of 4:30 p.m. EDT, they had been moved from the detention center at the airport to a center in the nearby town of Givon where there are accommodations for them to spend the night. Our Embassy officers will contact the lawyer in the morning and will visit them at Givon detention center. The Israeli immigration officer asked that she be informed of the visit so she can smooth the way. The embassy will remain in contact with the American citizens and report on them tomorrow morning.

I will report to you tomorrow when the embassy provides further updates.

Dear Senator Dodd:

Thank you for your July 28 letter regarding the Department's negotiations with the Colombian government to conclude a Defense Cooperation Agreement (DCA), which will provide the United States access to Colombian facilities and locations and formalize arrangements pertaining to the presence of U.S. personnel in Colombia. We regret that we have not briefed you earlier on this issue. The Department understands the issue was briefed by the Department of Defense to the Senate and House Armed Services Committees, however, in retrospect, realize we should have come to you simultaneously. Before addressing your questions, allow me to make two general points about the agreement being negotiated.

- Purpose of Agreement: U.S. policy is to identify Cooperative Security Locations (CSLs) in key geographic zones in order that U.S. forces can have assured access as required to address specific contingencies. In addition to contingency access, CSLs provide logistical support and are a focal point for security cooperation activities. CSLs are designed to have little or no permanent U.S. presence, and are maintained by contractors or host nation personnel. In the Western Hemisphere, our efforts to identify CSLs have focused on disaster relief and trans-national threats, principally narcotics production and trafficking and terrorism. Building on existing agreements, the DCA would permit a U.S. government presence at agreed facilities and locations with the flexibility to address a full range of defense and security contingencies in Colombia, to the benefit of both our countries.
- Timing of Negotiations: Since mid-2008, we have been discussing with the
 Colombian government plans for a DCA. We held the first round of formal
 talks with Colombia in Bogotá in February 2009, and are scheduled to hold
 our fifth round in Washington in mid-August. The United States and
 Colombia share the goal of arriving at an agreed text during the upcoming
 mid-August talks.

As conceived, the DCA would give U.S. government forces access to several bases that U.S. Southern Command has identified as potential locations for CSLs, and formalizes arrangements we have with the Government of Colombia on protections provided for U.S. personnel operating in Colombia and for access to Colombian facilities.

Below are answers to the six questions you posed in your letter. We stand ready to brief you should you have any further questions.

U.S. Troop Presence/Benefits for Colombia: The U.S. government does not plan to increase U.S. force presence in Colombia following conclusion of the DCA. Similarly, we do not envision a permanent U.S. military presence in Colombia as a result of the DCA. As such, there will not be a requirement to develop a rotation schedule. While the overall numbers of U.S. military personnel and U.S. citizen civilian contractors vary from year-to-year, at no time do they exceed the ceiling or cap as stated by law, and that will remain the case under a DCA: the cap will be adhered to. The Department reports those numbers to Congress on a quarterly basis. At present, the limit is 800 military personnel and 600 civilian contractors.

The operational purpose of such U.S. forces that would make use of the Colombia CSLs would be to support efforts to confront trans-national threats, principally narcotics production and trafficking and terrorism, and to provide contingency support for disaster relief. Access to Colombian facilities under the DCA would have no effect on established limitations on the U.S. role in Colombian counternarcotics/counterinsurgency operations, which would remain in place.

The DCA does not contemplate the establishment of any U.S. base(s) in Colombia. That said, clearly the DCA will provide us with the flexibility to curtail or cease the use of Colombian bases, based on then-current and developing U.S. national security requirements.

The agreement does not require additional U.S. funding, hardware or infrastructure support for Colombia, and as such will not affect program funding levels. That said, DoD has determined that certain modifications and upgrades to Palanquero Air Force Base are required in order to ensure that U.S. aircraft can use that facility safely. Palanquero was chosen for these improvements because its location provides a safe operating environment and, as the most capable airfield in Colombia, the investment required to achieve the required capability would be

most cost effective. For those improvements, we have already requested \$46 million in FY 2010 military construction funding. Since those improvements are being made to durable Colombian facilities, this can be considered a net benefit for Colombia as well.

This agreement is not reciprocal, and Colombia will not gain the same access to U.S. facilities or protections and immunities as will U.S. personnel under the agreement. However, Colombia will benefit from U.S. military expertise in professionalizing the force and assistance in counternarcotics initiatives.

DCA and Nationalization: The DCA with Colombia is consistent with and supportive of our commitment to gradually reduce U.S. military assistance to Colombia and "nationalize" major elements of Plan Colombia. The DCA is an integral part of the "Strategic Partnership Phase," during which our principal goal is to ensure that Colombia remain a strong, democratic, U.S. strategic partner and the long-term sustainment of the Colombian military's acquired capabilities. As part of "nationalization," the Department's ongoing Foreign Military Financing and Counternarcotics programs in Colombia will continue to decline. The DCA is a natural part of our relationship that will progress as our partnership with South American countries continues to deepen.

Enhancing Partnership in Light of Human Rights Issues: While vastly improved over the last decade, there is no doubt that the protection of human rights in Colombia continues to be less than fully adequate, and as such is a matter of concern to the U.S. government. With increased training and reforms, the Armed Forces has indeed increased its respect for human rights, but issues such as "falsos positivos," which you raised in your letter, show far-reaching reforms have not fully taken hold.

Both the Colombian Prosecutor General's Office and Ministry of Defense have responded strongly to allegations of extrajudicial killings raised over the last two years. The Prosecutor General's Office established a sub-unit within its Human Rights Unit dedicated solely to investigations of crimes of this nature. While some of these investigations are slow going, due to lack of evidence or other factors, progress in investigating the Soacha murders shows the commitment of the Office to securing justice in the cases. In the 13 murders associated with that case, the Office has opened investigations against 75 members of the Armed Forces, which are progressing and are at various stages. It is noteworthy that the military dismissed these individuals, so that they could be processed for these crimes, through the civilian justice system. The military has a continuing obligation to

collaborate fully with the justice system by providing information and access to civilian investigators, a point we make regularly and at all levels of the Colombian government and military.

The Ministry of Defense's leadership, both civilian and military, remains committed to instilling the highest respect for human rights within the Armed Forces, and to a zero-tolerance policy for abuses. In response to the Soacha and other similar murders, the Ministry immediately dismissed 51 personnel, and continues to undertake directives and reforms aimed at stemming the causes of extrajudicial killings. For 2009, reports of extrajudicial killings have diminished dramatically. As noted above, ensuring that this culture of respect is emulated at the lowest levels of the Armed Forces remains a challenge. The Colombian government will need to make further refinements to its policies to ensure that progress is irreversible.

The DCA is consistent with our determination to ensure that Colombia demonstrates true commitment and undertakes concrete action to address human rights abuses. We have made and will continue to make clear to the Colombian government that such crimes are unacceptable. We believe that the conclusion of the DCA will be interpreted as what it is: an effort by the United States to regularize its access to Colombian facilities in order to be able to execute our shared missions against trans-national threats.

Implications for other South American Nations: The DCA is intended to enhance cooperation and increase effectiveness in addressing narcotics trafficking and terrorism, threats that affect all South American nations. As noted, however, the DCA will increase our capabilities to confront these threats in Colombia, and is not aimed at any other country. It is our hope that other nations would benefit from whatever capabilities we can bring to bear as a result of the DCA; for example, surveillance missions flown from Colombian bases over Colombia could help identify and interdict narcotics and alien smuggling vessels which impact Colombia, to the benefit of all.

The Colombian government has taken the lead in seeking to ensure that other governments in South America understand the true purpose of the DCA; President Uribe himself visited a number of South American nations earlier this month to deliver that message personally. The arrangements negotiated as part of the DCA are not unusual, and in fact, we have similar agreements with most NATO members and many other countries around the world.

WHA Deputy Assistant Secretary Williams' Meetings in Cuba Establishment of Direct Mail and other Bilateral Topic

CONTEXT: On Friday, September 25, Acting WHA DAS Bisa Williams briefed interested SFRC staff on the mail talks with Cuba via conference call. The conversation focused on what was discussed at the direct mail talks. Because she was unable to discuss her entire trip, Legislative Affairs sent a follow-up email the same day offering staff who participated in the phone call another call to discuss the non-direct mail activities. Senator Bill Nelson's staff positively replied, but a time has not yet been established for the follow-up call. Senator Menendez's staffer did not reply to the email.

Bisa Williams also briefed HFAC staff on the direct mail talks with Cuba. At the end of her readout of the talks, DAS Williams had time to discuss the rest of her trip. DAS Williams toured the postal facilities, including a training facility for their postal service. She had an opportunity to travel outside Havana, which included a trip to the international medical school and to a village that was devastated during last year's hurricane season. DAS Williams hosted a luncheon for a broad cross-section of human rights activists, dissidents, former political prisoners, and independent journalists and teachers (15 total), and she also described a visit she had with four independent Cuban bloggers who do not consider themselves "dissidents" but are treated as such by the Government of Cuba. She also visited the University of Havana to press further on the ability for Cuban students to participate in our educational scholarship programs. Lastly, she attended the Juanes concert for peace where she spoke with Cuban citizens about the impressions on the importance of the concert. Staff generally seemed pleased with the briefing and asked the Department to provide updates on Cuba as



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

With the Finance Committee approving its health care overhaul legislation yesterday, the hard work of merging the Senate Finance and HELP Committee bills begins in earnest. The public option is the best-known, and probably the most difficult, of the issues Majority Leader Reid, Finance Chair Baucus and former Acting HELP Chairman Dodd must tackle. The Finance bill does not include a public option; the HELP bill does. If Reid leaves the public option out, he will anger the party's liberal base and face an amendment on the floor to include it. But if he includes the public option, he will likely lose Senator Snowe's support along with that of a few centrist Democrats.

But there are other potential stumbling blocks, not least of which are provisions regarding employers. The HELP bill would require most employers, except for those with fewer than 25 workers, to provide insurance to their employees and pay 60 percent of premiums or face a penalty of up to \$750 per worker. The Finance bill does not explicitly require employers to provide insurance, but it would require employers who do not provide insurance to pay a portion of any subsidy their workers receive to buy insurance. The U.S. Chamber of Commerce and other business groups frown on both approaches. And liberals worry that the Finance measure would cause employers to avoid hiring low-income people who would be eligible for insurance subsidies.

Other differences between the two bills could also emerge as major obstacles during negotiations. The HELP bill would give the Food and Drug Administration authority to approve generic competitors to biologics. The policy enjoys bipartisan support, but many liberals would like to give biologics manufacturers less protection against competitors than the HELP bill would afford them.

The HELP bill also includes a proposal to create a new government insurance program for long-term care. Democrats say that the program would be funded from its own premiums, and the CBO says that it would save the government about \$58 billion over its first 10 years, because it would pay out less in benefits than it would receive in premiums. But Republicans say the program would eventually become unaffordable while providing only a modest benefit.

Reid, Dodd and Baucus also will have to negotiate a more obscure issue: how much insurers should be allowed to charge older customers. The HELP bill allows insurers to charge older people only twice as much as they charge their youngest customers; the Finance bill limits "age rating" to four times what the young pay. AARP prefers the HELP approach. But lowering the maximum age rating would likely lead insurers to charge young customers more – increasing concerns about the affordability of insurance.

Dodd said he was optimistic the merger discussions would "go well" but declined to comment on how long he expected them to take or on what he expected the outcome to be, other than to say, "It's going to be a merger, not an acquisition, so we're in good shape."

THE PRESIDENT: Good afternoon. Today we reached a critical milestone in our effort to reform our health care system. After many months of thoughtful deliberation, the fifth and final committee responsible for health care reform has passed a proposal that has both Democratic and Republican support. This effort was made possible by the tireless efforts of Chairman Max Baucus and the other members of the Senate Finance Committee. It's a product of vigorous debate and difficult negotiations:

After the consideration of hundreds of amendments, it includes ideas from both Democrats and Republicans, which is why it enjoys the support of people from both parties. And I want to particularly thank Senator Olympia Snowe for both the political courage and the seriousness of purpose that she's demonstrated throughout this process.

Now, this bill is not perfect and we have a lot of difficult work ahead of us. There are still significant details and disagreements to be worked out over the next several weeks as the five separate bills from the Senate and the House are merged into one proposal. But I do believe the work of the Senate Finance Committee has brought us significantly closer to achieving the core objectives I laid out early in September.

Most importantly, this bill goes a long way towards offering security to those who have insurance, and affordable options for those who don't. It reins in some of the worst practices of the insurance industry, like the denial of coverage due to preexisting conditions. It also sets up an insurance exchange that will make coverage affordable for those who don't currently have it. And as the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office has certified, it will slow the growth of health care costs in the long term and it will not add a penny to our deficit.

The committee's progress over the past several weeks is the culmination of work by all five committees and numerous members of Congress over the better part of this year. We've reached out to stakeholders across the spectrum -- doctors and nurses, businesses and workers, hospitals and even drug companies. And we've considered a wide variety of ideas and proposals in an effort to find common ground.

As a result of these efforts, we are now closer than ever before to passing health reform. But we're not there yet. Now is not the time to pat ourselves on the back. Now is not the time to offer ourselves congratulations. Now is the time to dig in and work even harder to get this done. And in this final phase, I hope that we will continue to engage each other with the spirit of civility and seriousness that has brought us this far and that this subject deserves.

I commend the Chairman and the committee's members for their achievement and the example that they've set, and I look forward to continue to work with Congress in the weeks ahead. We are going to get this done.

Dear Secretary Clinton:

I write to request your help with bi-lateral negotiations with Canada on a significant environmental issue in Montana. During your confirmation process we spoke about the need to engage with Canada to find a permanent way to protect the natural resources in the North Fork of the Flathead River which drains into northwestern Montana.

I appreciate your mentioning the need to address this issue to Canadian Foreign Minister Cannon at the June 2009 commemoration of the International Boundary Waters Treaty, I know that your team met on September 11th with the Canadian government but that the scope of the meeting was focused solely on the environmental review process for mining proposals in British Columbia and Canada and that no next steps were identified.

Following Interior Secretary Salazar's visit to Montana in August—a trip I hope you will make soon we are working together on a plan to engage Canada in negotiations on this topic over the next five months. I hope this can be a joint effort with Interior and the State Department, but I need your leadership to make this a priority, assign one of your senior staff to take on this task, and work together to get bi-lateral talks started this year,

Madame Secretary,

A Hong Kong based reporter with *The New York Times* is writing a piece about the Shanghai Pavilion and would like to include your efforts on its behalf. So on Wednesday, you will speak with Mark Landler for this story. We connected Kris Balderston with Landler, and here are Kris's notes:

Mark Landler spoke to Jose Villarreal (the Commissioner General), Elizabeth and me in the last two days. Mark seems to be going down the same road with all three of us. At first he knew very little about the actual Expo but now he seems focused on the Secretary's role in bringing the USA Pavilion back to life. We all agreed that he seems to be writing a favorable story.


He specifically wanted to know about her role and whether her "political" background helped her get there (as opposed to a more traditional foreign affairs "career" Secretary). We thought that her political side helped her immediately recognize that she had a real problem with the Chinese that needed to be fixed immediately. As a problem-solving politico, she immediately went to work to fix it.

He also wanted to know if she used the WJC/HRC rolodex to raise money. We said no and noted that all of the money is being raised in the business community and not by individuals. She did not go to her political fund-raising base. We did not mention it but it is interesting that many of the early big sponsors were NY based companies like GE (\$5M), Pepsi (\$5M), Corning, Cummins, Deloitte, NYSE, and Pfizer.

He asked if S made individual calls to CEO's and we noted (as recommended by L), the only general "asks" were done on conference calls or in large groups. We also noted that she never really "asked" for sponsorships, instead she stressed the importance of getting a formidable USA presence at the Shanghai Expo that is so important to the Chinese and will attract 70 million people. This could be the largest event in human history and will go from May 1 to October 31, 2010.

We're grateful for your generosity and your steadfast belief in the importance of the expo, the American role here, and what this USA Pavilion can do to strengthen cooperation and partnership between the American people and the people of China.

It is very fitting that this expo will be here in Shanghai, one of the most dynamic and cosmopolitan cities in the world. I'm pleased to be here with President Obama and to be back in China after my first trip here as Secretary of State earlier this year. Clinton and Gates Join Forces in Debate on Afghanistan Buildup By Mark Landler and Thom Shanker The New York Times October 13, 2009

WASHINGTON — The last time the Obama administration arrived at a moment of truth in the debate over what to do about Afghanistan, Hillary Rodham Clinton and Robert M. Gates delivered a one-two punch in favor of a more ambitious approach.

Now, as President Obama leads yet another debate on whether to deploy tens of thousands of additional troops there, the secretary of state and the secretary of defense will once again constitute a critical voting bloc, the likely leaders of an argument for a middle ground between a huge influx of soldiers and a narrow focus aimed at killing terrorists from Al Qaeda, according to several administration officials.

That swing vote would put them at odds with the bare-bones approach still being pushed by Vice President Joseph R. Biden Jr., as well as the most aggressive military buildup recommended by the American commander in Afghanistan, Gen. Stanley A. McChrystal.

All of them have chosen to play their cards close to the vest, even holding back in the marathon meetings of recent weeks of the National Security Council, according to officials who attended the sessions.

But as the Afghanistan assessment moves from a broad strategy review to a detailed and potentially contentious debate on how exactly to proceed, the two secretaries are expected to carry great weight as they begin to express specific advice.

In fact, given that the president puts particular stock in Mr. Gates's view on military matters, the alliance between Mrs. Clinton and Mr. Gates, two moderate pragmatists, may be the deciding factor in a remarkably public debate that will determine the future course of the war.

It is a surprising evolution for two very different — and effective — bureaucratic players who started out wary of each other.

Their most visible public encounter came in July 2007 when, as a senator, Mrs. Clinton lashed out over what she viewed as a dismissive letter sent to her by one of Mr. Gates's deputies; she had asked whether the Pentagon planned to brief Congress about its plans to withdraw troops from Iraq. Mr. Gates's effort to mollify Mrs. Clinton came in a letter rushed by messenger to her office, and the defense

secretary later said to aides that he regarded Mrs. Clinton as very tough. But their relationship had already warmed up by the time of the Obama administration's first debate over sending troops to Afghanistan.

At a White House meeting in mid-March, in which the counterinsurgency policy was initially presented, Mr. Biden famously began to stake out his position that a larger military presence in Afghanistan could breed resentment among Afghans and would be politically untenable at home.

Mrs. Clinton, who weighed in next, disagreed, according to people who took part in the session. She threw her support behind the counterinsurgency policy and more troops, saying she believed the American people could be won over. Mr. Gates, immediately following her, also endorsed it, though he granted Mr. Biden's point that there were risks of a backlash among the Afghan people.

"There is a very close meeting of minds between them," said Bruce Riedel, now a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution, who led the policy review on Afghanistan and Pakistan. "They both believe there is a threat, the threat is serious, and that we need to take the appropriate steps to respond."

Though their backgrounds are very different — Mrs. Clinton a product of electoral politics who is still looking to her future, and Mr. Gates from the world of intelligence at the end of a long government career — they have found common cause on issues well beyond Afghanistan.

Last spring, several administration officials said, Mrs. Clinton backed Mr. Gates when he appealed to the president to fight the release of a trove of photographs documenting the abuse of prisoners in Iraq and Afghanistan by military personnel.

The White House initially did not oppose the release of the photos. But after top military commanders and local leaders in Iraq and Afghanistan objected, Mr. Gates asked Mr. Obama to reconsider. Mrs. Clinton added her voice to the effort, these officials said, having just returned from a visit to Baghdad, during which the commander in Iraq, Gen. Ray Odierno, warned her that a fresh uproar over photos would subject the troops to reprisal and endanger the mission.

Mr. Obama changed his mind and has appealed to the Supreme Court to keep the photos from being released.

Mrs. Clinton and Mr. Gates are also in tune on Iran, sometimes to an uncanny degree. On Sept. 27, they appeared on rival Sunday morning talk shows, both warning Tehran that if it did not negotiate over its nuclear program, it would face harsh sanctions. In their hard line toward Iran, Mrs. Clinton and Mr. Gates differed from senior National Security Council officials, who were initially more optimistic about the prospects for engagement, according to a senior official.

Richard L. Armitage, a former deputy secretary of state who witnessed the caustic relations between his boss, Colin L. Powell, and the former Pentagon chief, Donald H. Rumsfeld, during the Bush administration, said Mr. Gates had told him he found Mrs. Clinton "tough-minded, clear and focused."

"I wouldn't suggest that they agree on every issue," Mr. Armitage said. "But what it does do is eliminate some of the intramural tensions between the secretary of defense and the secretary of state."

Those tensions have often been epic, whether it was the feuding between Caspar W. Weinberger and George P. Shultz during the Reagan administration or the sniping between Mr. Rumsfeld and Condoleezza Rice in the latter part of the Bush administration.

For all the solidarity, the partnership between Mrs. Clinton and Mr. Gates is based on pragmatism rather than personal affection. "Secretary Gates is very businesslike and in Secretary Clinton he has found someone he can do business with," said Geoff Morrell, the Pentagon press secretary.

Mr. Gates has called for a reinvigorated, better-financed State Department, so that diplomats can pick up some of the nation-building tasks that have fallen to soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan. That is consistent with Mrs. Clinton's vision of a more muscular American diplomacy, not to mention her own ambitions as the chief diplomat.

Mr. Gates, officials note, is in a position to be magnanimous with little left to prove. And he is the indispensable man, since his department controls so much money and so many troops. Mrs. Clinton, by contrast, runs a department that is fighting to regain its stature after years in eclipse. She may also hope for a political future.

Seated next to each other on a stage at George Washington University last week, the two looked like comrades-in-arms as they discussed the Iranian nuclear threat, the war in Afghanistan and the blossoming ties between the State Department and the Pentagon.

"Bob has a lot of experience, which I certainly appreciate, and also a good sense of humor, which makes everything a little bit better," Mrs. Clinton said of their frequent meetings.

Nobody seemed more pleased than Mr. Gates, a survivor of decades of Washington's bureaucratic battling. "Most of my career, secretaries of state and defense weren't speaking to each other," he said. "And it could get pretty ugly, actually."

After their very public joint appearance, the two decamped secretly to the Blue Duck Tavern, a sleek restaurant nearby, where, according to people close to both, they kicked around policy options on Afghanistan over a long private dinner.

SUBJECT: State and CA Handling of Passport and Visa Functions

During a January 3 appearance on ABC's Sunday morning interview program, "This Week," Senator Joseph Lieberman stated:

"I believe, incidentally, that we ought to take a look at taking that visa application and admission responsibility function from the State Department. It doesn't really fit with foreign policy anymore. And in an age of terrorism, I think the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) ought to be handling visas abroad."

This echoes comments from some quarters in 2002, prior to passage of the Homeland Security Act. That legislation left the visa processing function with State but shifted authority with regard to visa policy to DHS.



The State Department and the Visa Function

RELEASE IN

- The Department of State is at the forefront of interagency cooperation and datasharing to improve border security. We make all of our visa information available to other responsible agencies, and we have specifically designed our systems to facilitate comprehensive data sharing with relevant agencies in the USG.
- The Department has developed visa procedures, policies and systems with full recognition that we are a vital part of a multi-agency team supporting border security. We work closely and effectively with DHS. Reorganizing this team would be disruptive and inefficient.
- The current authorities and responsibilities of the Department make it the only
 agency in the U.S. government that can take a comprehensive view of the visa
 process and its impact on the full range of U.S. national interests.
- The global presence and personnel structure of the Department give it unique advantages in supporting the visa function with highly-trained and dedicated personnel available for worldwide service.
- There would be enormous practical problems with personnel and revenue involved in shifting the visa function to another agency. Time and resources would be taken away from core border security matters by such a move.
- The Department of State has specific strengths in the tools required to
 administer visa policy. Among the important considerations is the judicial
 doctrine of "consular non-reviewability," which protects consular visa
 adjudication decisions from challenge by aliens for reasons including the
 foreign policy implications of those decisions. Removing the visa function
 from State would suggest that foreign policy is not an important consideration,
 thereby putting the doctrine at risk.

The Role of Visas in Foreign Policy

- Issuance and refusal of visas have a direct impact on foreign relations. Visa
 policy is a critical tool in diplomacy, and visa-related concerns sometimes
 even concerns related to a particular visa application can quickly become a
 significant bilateral problem that harms U.S. interests if handled without
 consideration of foreign policy implications.
- Adjudication of visas for controversial figures, including leaders of problematic regimes, prominent individuals with checkered pasts, and delegates to international bodies, requires a full review of U.S. government equities, including foreign policy equities, and the Secretary of State needs to retain the authority to make those determinations.
- The conduct of U.S. visa policy has a direct and significant impact on the treatment of U.S. citizens abroad. State is in a position to anticipate and weigh those consequences.
- Consular officers are the public face of American diplomacy. They understand
 that serving the U.S. national interest starts with border security, but includes
 facilitation of legitimate travel, trade promotion, and educational exchange. A
 review of the categories of nonimmigrant visas, such as diplomats and other
 foreign officials and investors, highlights the extent to which visa issues are tied
 to foreign policy and bilateral relations.
- Officers devoted to visa adjudication are highly qualified, highly trained, and highly motivated professionals committed to a career of serving the U.S. overseas. Even those beginning foreign affairs careers are fully-prepared and closely supervised by experienced officers who review adjudications every day.
- Department of State personnel bring a unique mix of local knowledge and objectivity to the visa function. Visa adjudicating officers generally rotate after a tour of duty of two years or less, allowing them to maintain professional distance from and remain fully committed to their duties.
- The U.S. is still struggling with a perception abroad that we do not welcome foreign visitors. We must enforce border security without sacrificing U.S. strategic interests in promoting economic activity, attracting professional talent, and furthering academic and cultural exchange.

Global Presence: State Uniquely Resourced to Provide Visa Services

- The U.S. visa process requires personal interviews and biometric collection, both of which require direct interaction between the applicant and consular officers. The State Department is uniquely, globally positioned to meet this need.
- No other U.S. foreign affairs agency has a comparable global presence, and
 even those agencies with a presence abroad do not have a work force committed
 by law and regulation to serving anywhere in the world.
- Our 246 consular sections, in 167 countries, are staffed by 1,545 officers, 3,953 locally engaged staff and 75 full-time Diplomatic Security agents devoted to anti-fraud efforts. These employees have the foreign language skills necessary to stay abreast of local trends and conduct visa interviews; 1,067 of our consular officer positions require fluency in one of 65 local languages.
- Our highly qualified and well-trained staff understands foreign cultures and follows overseas political, legal, and economic developments in a way that gives us special expertise over matters directly relevant to the full range of visa ineligibilities. We are also on the ground to coordinate data sharing with foreign governments, and we communicate with them directly on a regular basis.
- Training gives our officers particular expertise in identifying individuals who possess fraudulent documents; are imposters, or are otherwise attempting to enter the United States improperly. In FY09, the Consular Training Division at the Foreign Service Institute provided 694 officers with basic consular training a 31-day course that includes two weeks of security-related training, including subjects such as recognizing and combating fraud, terrorist mobility and alien smuggling. Since FY02, 3,907 officers have completed this training at a cost of \$13 million.
- Officers who have chosen consular work as their career path receive continuing education, including courses in fraud prevention and advanced security namechecking. In FY09, 2,482 employees attended advanced consular training courses that address border security in whole or in part.

Integrity of the Visa Process

- In FY 2009, the Department of State issued 5,804,180 visas and refused 1,885,017 visas. We are prepared to make the hard decisions of denying visas and ready to stand by our determinations.
- Interagency cooperation, application screening and the visa process as a whole
 are considerably stronger than they were in 2001. Entries in the Consular
 Lookout and Support System database have grown by more than 400 percent
 since 2001. We have incorporated fingerprint and facial recognition checks
 into the screening process, and have made additional fraud detection tools
 available to consular officers.
- We are in the vanguard of efforts to increase interagency connectivity and communication, and our record in utilizing shared data and making data available to other agencies is outstanding. Visa revocation and lookout data is shared in real time with DHS in a manner that is accessible to other agencies.
- We give other agencies immediate access to over thirteen years of visa data, and they use this access extensively. In November 2009, more than 16,000 employees of DHS, Defense, the FBI and Commerce made 920,000 queries on visa records.
- The Department and its consular officers extensively use information from other agencies to ensure visas are not granted to those who pose a threat to our national security. Biographic data is checked against more than 11 million FBI records, 5 million DHS lookouts, 260,000 DEA records, and 430,000 lookouts from the Terrorist Screening Center. Fingerprints are checked against tens of millions of records in the DHS IDENT and FBI IAFIS databases. Facial recognition checks are run against 83 million records, including 110,000 from the Terrorist Screening Center. A pilot project is underway to include screening against DOD iris scan records.
- We are continually upgrading and enhancing our procedures. We have already
 instructed consular officers to include any visa issuance information in Visas
 Viper reports, and are deploying an all-electronic nonimmigrant visa
 application system to all posts this year. We are working with our interagency
 partners to further improve information sharing, visa applicant screening, and
 revocation procedures.

Practical and Structural Concerns

- Multiple agencies play roles in administering our immigration laws, but the
 most significant are the Departments of State and Homeland Security. This
 division of responsibility not only recognizes the differing expertise and
 capacities of these two agencies, but also creates a checks and balances system.
 Consolidation into a single entity would remove the critical safeguards and
 benefits of the current system.
- The deliberative process resulting from these checks and balances ensures that both State and DHS evaluate applications for admission to the United States, bringing the expertise of both agencies to bear in making assessments and providing for a valuable twofold review of admissibility.
- Recognizing that the visa adjudication function is performed by thousands of
 officers who have received extensive training specific to that work, it is difficult
 to fathom how the visa function could be moved out of State without a massive
 reorganization of both agencies that would take years and untold costs to
 accomplish. It would divert resources from securing the border to bureaucratic
 turf building and reorganization.
- Visa fee revenue was approximately \$927 million in FY09. Those revenues are
 the major funding source for a broad range of consular services (including
 protecting the welfare of U.S. citizens abroad) and help support the activities of
 Diplomatic Security, State's IT operations, and the Foreign Service Institute.
 Loss of this revenue would severely and adversely affect State.
- With Congressional approval to retain visa fees, State has been able to build state-of-the-art computerized databases, training and fraud prevention programs, and information collection and analysis programs directed at detecting terrorists and other mala fide visa and passport applicants. Our robust databases are shared with a number of U.S. government agencies.
- Officers entering the Foreign Service are given consular assignments in their first and/or second tours. These assignments include service in visa adjudication. This practice assures that all Foreign Service Officers (FSOs) understand State's critical consular mission and gives officers valuable experience interacting with the foreign public.

The State-DHS Relationship

- The Departments of State and Homeland Security have a close and cooperative relationship, the legal framework for which was established in a 2003 MOU following enactment of the Homeland Security Act. DHS has responsibility for visa policy and the State administers the visa process.
- There is extensive information sharing on numerous levels, including the largest cooperative arrangement on biometric data sharing in the U.S. Government.
- The two Departments share information on document security and fraud prevention, and each has unique expertise in this area. This cooperation has facilitated the introduction of e-passports and the production of a new generation of secure travel documents under the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative.
- Visa processing involves interwoven layers of screening performed by both State and Homeland Security. DHS reviews and adjudicates petitions required for immigrants and certain categories of nonimmigrants, prior to their applications for visas. State interviews and adjudicates the eligibility of individual visa applicants. The Department of Homeland Security's National Targeting Center and overseas Visa Security Units further examine travelers bound for the United States. Our Departments have cooperated fully to make these collaborative efforts succeed.
- Collapsing the current multi-layered approach to visa issuance down to a single-agency responsibility would diminish the U.S. response to border security challenges. It would also eliminate the opportunity for the Department to bring its expertise to bear on the process of identifying mala fide travelers.
- The Department of State has proven itself agile, adaptive, and proactive in implementing new biometric technology and establishing new information technology, new adjudication procedures, new fraud detection programs and new oversight mechanisms to stay ahead of evolving border security threats.
- State designs its visa procedures and records to give DHS maximum operational access to all biometric and other data collected in the visa process. DHS personnel at U.S. ports-of-entry have real time access to notes our officers have made on every visa case, and can see all processing State has performed.





Despite taken measures, as of 01 June 2009 there was no answer nor from the FBI, neither from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service officer J. Choi. successfully passed an Thus, after on 30 March 2006 interview and the English language, U.S. history and government tests, the process of his naturalization in the United States was suspended and such situation lasts more then 3 years. It should be said that delay of the U.S. naturalization process is not unusual fact - such things must be frequent if American practice and it would not surprise anyone if not several inexplicable factors: First: time of suspension of this process is too long. We do not know statistics, but venture to say that halting of naturalization process for more then 3 years must be kind of "record" among other similar cases; Second: this is ignoring of sent requests and absolute silence for all this long period of time from the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service as well as from the U.S. FBI; Third and the main: as it was mentioned before, after successful interview and exams on 30 March 2006 the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service officer, Mrs. J. Choi said that an official reason of the naturalization process delay was that «background check has not been completed yet». During the interview this reason sounded so unnatural that even the officer J. Choi herself could not hide her discontent and surprise. If the FBI rejects your fingerprints twice, you may be asked to provide police clearances for each place you have lived in the past 5 years.

You will need to contact the police departments in the places you have lived to get these clearances

While the FBI is checking your background, USCIS will be locating your immigration file.

Thus, in was absolutely obvious that by 06 January, 2006, i.e. by the moment when the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service sent the notice of interview appointment date, the background check of has already been completed and positive answer of criminal background check have been receive from the FBI. But on 30 March 2006 is "suddenly" turned out that «required security check – pending».

It was clear that exactly during this period of time – since 06 January until 30 March, for these 3.5 months something extraordinary had happened which so dramatically changed the course of that process.

It verv suspiciously concurred with events, about which threateningly warned and which took place after meeting with the then Prime-minister of Georgia Zurab Nogaideli. If there is a failure to make a determination under (INA) # 335 (8 U.S.C. #144b) before the end of the 120-day period after the date on which the examination is conducted under such section, the applicant may apply to the United States District Court for the District in which the applicant resides for a hearing on the matter. Such court has jurisdiction over the matter and may either determine the matter or remand the matter, with appropriate instructions to the Service to determine the matter.
The statue provides that if more than 120 days have passed since the naturalization interview, the applicant can seek judicial relief.
Please be advised that of this matter is not adjudicated within the prescribed 120 days (on or about July 28, 2006), I have been authorized to exercise the applicant's right to seek judicial review of this application for naturalization.

There are strong reasons to suggest that apart from the above listed 8 cases, in at least 5 cases people have been declared in international retrieval of Interpol for political and / or personal reasons.

Probably, the most attractive example of usage of Interpol for his political goals, and also illustrative example of immorality of Mikheil Saakashvili is his personal enmity and hate towards his former political opponent Aslan Abashidze, who is currently is in fictitious retrieval of Interpol, as everyone on this earth know where and why Aslan Abashidze is.

It will be recalled that after the so-called Tbilisi "Rose Revolution", after seizure of power in Georgia in 2003 and accession to the throne of the "President" of the country in January 2004, Mikheil Saakashvili by analogical methods arranged in Batumi "Adjarian Revolution" and overthrown Aslan Abashidze from his post of the leader of the Autonomous Republic of Adjara. At that time Georgia was on the verge of civil war and only resignation of Aslan Abashidze from his post saved the country from bloodshed. And then Mikheil Saakashvili as the president of the state publicly, from the TV screens gave Aslan Abashidze political guarantee from possible criminal prosecution. Such guarantee of the president Mikheil Saakashvili reaffirmed to the government of Russia, where presumably could have emigrated then Aslan Abashidze. Having received the guarantee of inviolability, on May 6, 2004 Aslan Abashidze left the country and went to Moscow together with his family.

As soon as Aslan Abashidze left the country and Mikheil Saakashvili laid his hands on power in this autonomous republic he barefacedly retracted his presidential guarantees131 and forgot his public promises. On December 05, 2005 the Office of Prosecutor General of Georgia instituted legal proceedings against Aslan Abashidze and later on declared him wanted. Mikheil Saakashvili began to demand from Russia extradition of Aslan Abashidze. Concerning this issue during one of press conferences Mikheil Saakashvili and the then president of the Russian Federation Vladimir Putin even had high words 132.

But despite such deep international resonance Interpol didn't react to this commonly known fact and violating the Article 3 of its own Constitutions forbidding usage of Interpol for political purposes still fictitiously retrieves Aslan Abashidze. Fictitiously because, as it was already said, everybody knows where and why Asian Abashidze is, and because, except Interpol everybody knows where to find him.

This is concerning political aspects of this fictitious international retrieval declared by Interpol. And now about moral aspects, personal enmity and hatred of Mikheil Saakashvili towards "wanted" person.

Personal hatred towards Aslan Abashidze was such strong that when Saakashvili became a president of Georgia and Aslan Abashidze still was the head of the Autonomous Republic of Adjara, during political aggravation Mikheil Saakashvili publicly, from the TV screens contemptuously called him "dwarf" and "little man", despicably and humiliatingly indicating at his low stature.

And when Aslan Abashidze was banished from the country his children, Giorgi and Diana were barred from entry to Georgia even for visiting grave of their mother. In contravention of all universal values Georgian authorities still do not allow them to mourn over the grave of their untimely passed away mother. When on June 20, 2004 Diana Abashidze came to Batumi to the obit of her mother, for 3 days she has been taken to the police for interrogation. Even the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Russian Federation had to step in and express its protest 133 concerning these frequent questionings of daughter of the former head of the republic Adjara, Aslan Abashidze. But, according to the then minister of the Internal Affairs of Georgia, Irakli Okruashvili, guarantees to Aslan Abashidze and members of his family do not apply to the territory of Georgia. Eventually, after Diana Abashidze was released she was warned that neither she nor her brother or any other member of their family should ever come to Georgia.

Enmity and hatred of Mikheil Saakashvili did not amount to nothing more than these bans. On May 06, 2007 he came to Batumi to celebrate 3rd anniversary of banishment of Aslan Abashidze from Georgia and seizure of full power in this autonomous republic. Visit of Saakashvili of these celebrations in Batumi was "marked" by two barbaric events: practically at one and the same time door of Abashidze's apartment in Batumi was burned up and the tomb and the last shelter of his wife Maguli Gogitidze in the village Gantiadi was unearthed and violated. As it was mentioned above, Mikheil Saakashvili has used Interpol for settling his personal scores with people, towards whom he didn't even try to hide his enmity and hatred. This international organization - Interpol became a kind of retribution weapon and instrument for settling personal scores in Mikheil Saakashvili's hands.

And Interpol without proper check and recheck obediently fulfils any requests of the revolutionary regime of Saakashvili. Like in case of Aslan Abashidze, when Interpol did not express interest and did not checked commonly known scandalous case about political guarantees given to him by Saakashvili, it did not check other requests of the post-revolutionary country, where the process of reprisal and persecution of the former ruling classes and certain layers of the society, characteristic for revolutions in general, was in process. Such was the letter i received then from the Secretariat to the Commission for the Control of Interpol's Files. Respectful in form and splendid masterpiece of classical bureaucracy in content. After reading this letter a number of serious questions arise. But wording of these questions is applies to the competence of qualified lawyers knowing specificity of Interpol and international law, consequently our aim is not consideration of these legal bearings. Here we would like to put a question from absolutely different angle of view and focus attention on other, no less important aspects of that letter.
(a) Basis human rights and legal framework of Interpol's activity

(c) Basic human rights and legal framework of Interp

By that letter the Interpol Commission communicates to a person, whom Interpol has declared in international retrieval and has issued circular notification Red Notice for his caption and extradition, that:

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Firstly: Interpol's Commission "is not authorized to inform" him if in Interpol's files there is any information concerning him. I.e. they do not say if they possess such information. And according to the essence of that juridically tangled letter the impression is that Interpol has no such information at all or has, but in minimal or insufficient quantity to issue circular notification Red Notice for arrest and extradition of that person. And "the principle of national sovereignty and indirect data access" indicated in that letter is one of circumstantial evidences of that, and in general, the whole content of that letter indicates to that.

Thus, judging by that letter it looks as if Interpol has issued circular notification Red Notice) of his caption only on the basis of that "...indirect data access".

Secondly: In that letter it is told that even if Interpol had any information the Commission was not able to give him concerning access to such information. And it is written by the Secretariat of Commission, which is engaged in control of Interpol's files and which is usually provides people with requested information. In principle, this is one of fundamental function of work of the mentioned Commission. Thus, the conclusion is that on the basis of standard requests this commission provides other people with information, but it was not able to satisfy request of concerning provision him with such information "even if Interpol had any". But ensuing from basic then what about individual rights of human rights, specified by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adopted by the United Nations General Assembly 10 December 1948 at the Palais de Chaillot, Paris.

Basic human rights specified by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights is a basic foundation and main principle of Interpol's activity, the Constitution of which is directly obliges it to act in the spirit of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and places an obligation on Interpol to guarantee observance and respect of human rights in its activities 167. And Interpol openly proclaims this norm at its web page, where we read the following:

In application of Article 2 of its Constitution, the Organization acts in the spirit of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights'. This provision places an obligation on Interpol to ensure that, in the conduct of its activities, human rights are observed and respect for them encouraged.

Sounds great, but one question appears: and where are individual or civil He has no rights, has he? As long as individual rights, which are often called civil rights, are rights of each human being and are considered as inherent and inalienable for every person. And these rights are necessary for safety of life, dignity and freedom of a person.

Interpol criminates a man through the world and starts "hunting" for him in 187 countries. Besides, this organization does not even want to provide him

information so that he would be able to protect himself and present documents in his defence. The question is: what about universally recognized right of the Article 10 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which reads that everyone is entitled in full equality to a fair and public hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal, in the determination of his rights and obligations and of any criminal charge against him? Does not this regulation concern Interpol at all? Organization, which is the international law enforcement agency - Interpol.

A person addressed them with request to give him information, and they do not give even that information, which will help him to avoid threat to his individual rights. Do not give and declare that would not give "even if Interpol had" it. I don't know what would say human rights advocates, but for ordinary citizen it sounds cynically and wildly. It appears that there is an evident contradiction between basic human rights and legal framework of Interpol's activity. But we are not to judge it - it's up to qualified specialists.

Thirdly: in that letter the Secretariat of the Commission for Control of there, where request of his Interpol's Files persistently sends arrest comes from.

We would remind several quotations from that letter:

- ... in application of the principles of national sovereignty and of indirect access to information held by Interpol....
- except when it has obtained authorization from the competent authorities of the country(s) concerned to disclose to you the existence or not of information concerning you in the Interpol General Secretariat's files.
- ... but that it has not been authorized by the Interpol National Central Bureau (NCB) in Georgia to disclose to you additional information concerning you in the Interpol General Secretariat's files.
- ... Commission is not empowered to deal with national files. This can only be done by the appropriate judicial authorities or national police. You can therefore contact the competent authorities in Georgia.
- So, the Commission of Interpol has "passed the buck" of information inquiry of to Georgia, from where request of his arrest has come.

(d) What should Commission for Control of Interpol's Files have known

Such behaviour of the Interpol's Commission can be understood and justified only in four cases:

- If the Secretariat of the Commission for Control of Interpol's Files does not remember that the Article 3 of the Interpol's Constitution has established strict limitation, which reads that:
 - "It is strictly forbidden for the Organization to undertake any intervention or activities of a political, military, religious or racial character."

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(2) If the Commission for Control of Interpol's Files does not know that there were cases, when these or those national countries have misused Interpol to suit their own ends; if it does not know that there were cases when these countries, due to political motives with help of Interpol declared innocent people in international retrieval and issued circular notification Red Notice for their arrest and extradition to those countries, where they were so "eagerly" awaited.

If the Commission for Control of Interpol's Files does not remember such cases, we can remind them one, for example, right now:

June 26, 2002

The international law enforcement agency Interpol has dropped an arrest warrant against Akezhan Kazhegeldin, a leading opponent of Kazakhstani President Nursultan Nazarbayev, after deciding the available evidence did not support the charges against him and were politically motivated.

In a June 11 letter to Kazhegeldin's lawyers, Interpol Secretary General Ronald K. Noble said the agency has deleted the arrest order, or "Red Notice" from its files, and had notified member countries of its decision. Noble wrote that the decision was based on Article 3 of Interpol's Constitution, under which "it is strictly forbidden for the organization to undertake any intervention or activities of a political, military, religious or racial character."

"The illegal misuse of Interpol to harass exiled political opponents [of Nazarbayev] cannot be tolerated," Both continued. "It is therefore most significant that the secretary general has now determined that the Kazakh activities violated Article 3 and that they will be precluded from continuing to misuse the process."

Noble noted in his Interpol letter that the Kazakhstani government can appeal his decision either to Interpol's Executive Committee of to the agency's General Assembly. Noble added that an individual interpol member state with a bilateral extradition treaty with Kazakhstan could detain and send Kazhegeldin back to Almaty for trial, if it wishes to do so.

(3) Such behaviour can be understood and justified if the Commission for Control of Interpol's Files does not know that eastern and Caucasian countries of the former Soviet Union are distinguished for application of illegal and fabricated criminal cases against their opponents and adversaries, and that Georgia is a "leading" country among these countries in recent years. And that after the so-called "Rose Revolution" cases of misuse by that country of Interpol against people representing former political and business circles became frequent. In other words, Interpol should at least be cautious to such kinds of requests after any revolution - be it in Cuba, in Georgia or somewhere else.

After all, it is characteristic for all revolutionaries to settle political scores with representatives of old regime.

- (4) And the last, such behaviour of the Commission for Control of Interpol's Files can be understood and justified if it did not know that the National Central Bureau of Interpol in Georgia is under direct authority of the Ministry of Internal Affairs of Georgia and that this ministry is not just a police establishment, as uninformed people may think, that behind this deceptive and slyly "disguised" name is hidden a real repressive-punitive monster, which was established in 2004 as a result of the so-called "reforms" of Georgian revolutionary-president Saakashvili. Then, under this ministry with ordinary and harmless title, were united:
 - (a) MIA Ministry of Internal Affairs under subordination of which were all police stations of the country, traffic police, patrol service, special mission units and other security, defence and law enforcement agencies;
 - (b) former KGB, and during Shevardnadze MNS Ministry of National Security with it infrastructure including special mission units and subversive, the so-called "partisan" detachments.
 - And also with developed functions of counter-intelligence, with widely ramified system of wiretapping, radio engineering surveillance and the whole network of informers and spies;
 - (c) sub-units of Internal Forces of Georgia dislocated in Tbilisi and Zugdidi with its heavy armoured military equipment and combat units;
 - (d) frontier police of Georgia controlling land frontier and maritime boundaries of the country affiliating special task sub-units and etc.

So, as a result of "reforms" absolutely all security, defence and law enforcement agencies, except army, have become a part of this ministry. After gathering of all these security, defence and law enforcement agencies in one single ministry it was necessary to disguise the real character of that repressive-punitive monster and to disguise it so that it would be associated with something quite peace-loving - as ordinary police. That's why this hybrid of all security, defence and law enforcement agencies has an ordinary title -Ministry of Internal Affairs of Georgia.

Such "reform" was carried out in revolutionary Georgia in the 21st century, a "reform" which gave birth to the real repressive-punitive monster, and an ordinary police assume clear aspect of real political police.

And also, if that Interpol Commission did not know that the above mentioned "reform" carried out in the law enforcement agencies of Georgia in 2004 is exactly like the "reform" carried out in 1939 by Reichsführer SS and chief of German police Heinrich Himmler, when he created a governing body of political intelligence and security police of the Third Reich — RSHA — (Germ. Reichssicherheitshauptamt) Reich Main Security Office or Reich Security Main Office, which then consolidated:

- SD (Germ. Sicherheitsdienst Reichsführer-SS Eng., SD, or Security Service)
- Gestapo (contraction of Geheime Staatspolizei: "Secret State Police")
 and
- Kripo (contraction of Kriminalpolizei: "Criminal Police")

Perhaps we can add only that the international military tribunal in Nuremberg, SS and GESTAPO are recognized criminal organization.

Thus, the Interpol Commission could be understood and forgive if it did not know that in the 21st century Saakashvili "reformed" Georgian law enforcement system according to the Nazi SS with its RSHA and GESTAPO, when he consolidated in one organization structures of national security and criminal police.

If it didn't know then it can be understood. But in principle it should have known. Should have know at least because this country is a member of Interpol and on the basis of its requests Interpol declares people in international retrieval and sends circular notification Red Notice to 187 countries for arrest and extradition of these people. That's why it was obliged to know what ALL Georgia knew — that once they came to power, young revolutionaries of Mikheil Saakashvili began to carry out mass arrests and mass repressions. That arrests and repressions of people were carried out according to a priori drawn up "black lists" and by the personal "order" of Mikheil Saakashvili.

The commission for Control of Interpol's Files should have known that, as it was stated in the beginning of the document, nobody in Georgia recognizes presumption of innocence for a long time and that the man called today the President of the state publicly, openly and impudently, with deep contempt abuses and insults citizens of "his own" country from TV screens, and calls them:

The same publicly insulted people the President of the state, Mikheil Saakashvili contemptuously calls from TV screens "elements" - i.e. in his mentality there is total and complete segregation of residents of that country into categories of "human" and "subhuman".

The Interpol's Commission should have also known that with no investigation or trial, the President Mikheil Saakashvili gives from TV screens unlawful orders and direct criminal instructions: "to kill on the spot", "to get no matter what it takes" and "to arrest", "to banish from the country", "to prevent to freely gad about Georgia" these, according to him, "pigs", "scoundrels", "little men" and other "elements" and "subhuman" living in today's Georgia

The Interpol Commission should have known also that at his annual public speech in the Parliament of Georgia on 14 February, 2006 Mikheil Saakashvili officially proclaimed "zero tolerance" as the state and political doctrine of the country. The Interpol Commission should have known also that like Adolph Hitler during his rancorous speeches, Mikheil Saakashvili during proclamation of this declaration on inhuman policy of the state has driven into ecstasy and started to yell from the tribune of the Parliament as half-crazy to the whole country "ALL TO PRISON!!! ALL TO PRISON!!!". Maybe after seeing of the video of that evil yell public speech of the modern Führer the Interpol Commission could have understood what regime is raging in today's Georgia and where and whom they have "passed the buck" request of

(e) They should have been extremely cautious and attentive

Thus, ideally Interpol and its Commission should have known about all that and should have been extremely cautious and attentive to each inquiry of that country - Georgia, with request to find, arrest and extradite someone to that country. The Commission for Control of Interpol's Files should have been more cautious and extremely attentive to those inquiries received from people, whose search and arrest have been requested by Georgia.

We do not possess Interpol statistics data about how many people have been declared in international retrieval by this organization and how many of these wanted people have addressed at their own will Interpol and let them know their home address. We have no such statistics, but common sense suggests that such fact of voluntary cooperation of wanted people with Interpol should not have mass character. Such cases must be rare, if not a one-off. At least, as far as we know, as of today, from 49 persons declared in international retrieval of Interpol from Georgia, NONE has even tried to contact Interpol, not to speak of revealing information about their place of residence and in addition, of sanding copy of a passport.

been addresses by wanted by Interpol person and by all his behaviour - by his openness and readiness of full cooperation with Interpol, demonstrated his confidence in his innocence and his rightness. I.e. it was that rare, or a one-off case from enormous mass of ordinary cases, in which that Interpol Commission was engaged every day. And in general, from "Georgian cases" it must have been the first and the only case. Bur despite that the Interpol Commission did not even deign to find out if there were any ground to suppose that the case of that man may fall under the Article 3 of the Constitution of Interpol. No, it took no back to "the competent actions - it "passed the buck" of authorities of Georgia". And who should check if these "competent authorities in Georgia" violate the mentioned Article 3 of the Constitution of Interpol? These "competent authorities in Georgia" themselves? Authorities of the country, the president of which not only doe not recognizes presumption of innocence of these people, but also calls these people abusive epithets, such as: "pigs", "bustards", "scoundrels" and other insulting man-hating expressions. By the way, one of those, whom Saakashvili has publicly called "pig" from the TV screen, was Aleksandre Gotsiridze, declared by Interpol in international retrieval. Furthermore, on April 21, 2004, at the briefing in the State Chancellery in Tbilisi the President of the country in presence of journalists publicly declared 169.

"I have requested from the Prosecutor General to institute criminal proceedings against Aleko Gotsiridze, who owns the company "Tbilgas",

- then the head of the state added:

"- "Aleko Gotsiridze is a real bandit",

and emphasized:

"tomorrow is a deadline when I should be informed about his dismissal and confiscation of his shares in the company "Tbilgas", which he owns absolutely illegally".

Even this one example demonstrates completely illegal action of the president Mikheil Saakashvili and shows how he gives direct orders: (1) to institute criminal proceedings and to arrest one of citizens of his country and (2) to confiscate shares of this man and (3) without no investigation or trial proclaims this man "real bandit" and criminal. When a man, who holds the post of the President of the country and who should be a guarantor of observance of the Constitution of the state, so openly and impudently violates all laws of the country and in the first place, the basic law – the Constitution of the state, every sensible person can imagine what illegality reigns in that country. Here is whom and in what helps Interpol so recklessly – we repeat that exactly that man – Aleksandre Gotsiridze have been declared by Interpol in international retrieval. And the question is not if he is declared wanted correctly or not. But that represented danger to Saakashvili's regime - it could create precedent and as a result Red Notice could have been annulled by other people, persecuted by revolutionary regime of Saakashvili by political motives. Justification of even some of them could have caused serious political loss to his regime. Consequently, Saakashvili's people had to act, and to act as soon as it possible. I heard many similar comments: from old friends -Susie Stern said it was "pitch-perfect"; 2 young men from LA who had been big supporters (one Iranian-American), women at my afternoon panel who proudly reported they had campaigned for you --to someone I met for first time - a man who had lived in California and Israel -who thought the speech was "masterful"

There were also some concerns: Factually, that the square dedication was not by Hamas ("This was not Gaza but Ramallah"); and of course several on the theme of wishing disagreements should be expressed privately.

However, I also heard from fairly senior AIPAC senior staff that they consider this a WH problem -not State -some in very personal terms.

And to repeat my own reaction -- I'll go with masterful.

- Former Prime Minister Allawi's coalition wins a two-seat plurality with 91 seats in parliament: In results released today, former Prime Minister Allawi's Iraqiya coalition edged Prime Minister Maliki's State of Law coalition by two seats, 91 to 89. The Iraq National Alliance, which includes the pro-Iranian Sadrists and the Islamic Supreme Council of Iraq, finished third with 70 seats. The Kurdish Alliance finished fourth with 43 seats. The governing coalition will need 163 seats in the 325 person Council of Representatives (COR). Allawi almost certainly will get the first chance to form a government, but will have to ally with others to reach the 163-seat threshold.
- Maliki alleges irregularities but urges calm: In his speech following the announcement of results, Maliki applauded the participation of Iraqis in the election, and explicitly dismissed any talk of a coup as a relic of the past. Yet he continued to question the integrity of the Independent High Electoral Commission (IHEC), repeated his demand for a recount in some provinces, and underlined that results were not final and that he would pursue his challenge to the results before the Electoral Judicial Panel. IHEC has determined that a recount is not warranted. We share the assessment of the UN Assistance Mission for Iraq, and both international and domestic monitors, that there is no evidence of widespread or serious fraud. UN Special Representative Melkert announced, "In the considered opinion of the UN these elections were credible."
- Approximately two weeks until certified results: Parties, including Maliki, who filed complaints that were dismissed by IHEC, now have three days to appeal those dismissals to the Electoral Judicial Panel, which then has ten days to rule on the appeal. After all complaints have been addressed, the Federal Supreme Court will certify the final results. Following certification, the COR will be seated and begin the process of selecting the next president and prime minister. This process will likely take several months, and the close results will make it more complicated.



- Election reform means foreigners imposing their will. They want to me to get rid of the IEC members and they want to impose internationals in the ECC:
 - When the foreigners say they want reform, what they really mean is that they want me to get rid of IEC Chair Ludin and IEC Director Najafi. If I don't comply, they will use this as an excuse to ensure that elections don't happen (by withholding their financial support).
 - o They will then blame Afghans for the country moving in a directionless and insecure path.
 - We shouldn't give them this excuse. Next week I will sit down with Ludin and Najafi. They have both carried out their jobs without any mistakes. They have served their country. They have submitted their resignation twice. I have refused to accept it. But we cannot give the international community an excuse to not hold elections.
- We have lessons that we can draw from the presidential and provincial elections for the
 future. There were three internationals on the ECC. We can talk at length about who they

Rep Kucinich would like to exit Gaza into Israel through Erez, but it's unclear when. Egyptian MFA has asked MOD to provide transport from Cairo to Rafah. MFA is also coordinating airport pick-up, transport within Cairo and hotel accommodations for the night of Feb 14.

POC at the Cleveland-based NGO said that the purpose of the trip to the region is to enter Gaza, and that Ohio constituents have asked Rep Kuclnich to do this. Dates could get pushed back a few days because of the stimulus vote. Rep Kuclnich's staffer Amy Vossbrinck told me she thinks Kuclnich may want to travel from Israel to Doha.

Pepsico participation in US Pavilion at Shanghai Expo:

Key point: Regarding the USA Pavillon, Pepsico is free to market its products within the USA Pavillon, offer any level of financial support it wishes, and use the USA Pavillon logo. Outside the USA Pavillon, however, Pepsico would not be allowed to market its products or use the official Expo logo, since Coca-Cola is an official Expo sponsor.

Background: Consulate Shanghai checked yesterday with the Chinese Expo Bureau and the Chinese confirmed that Coca-Cola only has exclusive industry-category rights in the <u>public areas</u> of the Expo grounds. National pavilions are free to do what they want in their 6000 square meters. We know of no instances in which the Expo Bureau has interfered in the content or financial support for individual national pavilions. In fact, in November 2008 Shanghai officials personally lobbled Pepsico's CEO Indra Nooyi to support the USA Pavilion during her visit.

Special Note: The Chinese Expo Bureau is still actively pushing for Coca-Cola to support the USA Pavilion, in response to our earlier requests to the Bureau to help steer U.S. companies to the USA Pavilion. The Bureau knows they are about to get caught in the middle of the coke wars, so if Pepsico is to come in as a large supporter of the USA Pavilion, we should let that be known asap. The U.S. private sector team is also in the midst of negotiations with Coca-Cola for support of the USA Pavilion.





You may not recall, but you and I have met many times - the first time was at a screening of my film, Good Will Hunting, which was held in Camp David in 1998 and later when I hosted a fundraiser for your Senate run at my home in LA. I'm writing you now to request an interview with you for my upcoming documentary on the dangers of the proliferation of nuclear weapons that I am producing with Jeff Skoll. By way of introduction, Mr. Skoll is the co-founder of Ebay, founder and chairman of Participant Media, which financed "An Inconvenient Truth," and many other films. A board member of the Elders, which was launched by Nelson Mandela, Richard Branson and Peter Gabriel, Skoll is also a prominent member on several other advisory boards.

My company, Lawrence Bender Productions, recently produced An Inconvenient Truth, an Academy Award- winning documentary film with Al Gore which raised awareness about climate change. This new major documentary film is set for worldwide theatrical release on the other danger that threatens civilization - the spread of nuclear weapons and the risk that they fall into the hands of terrorists. I am writing to request an interview with you regarding your views of the current nuclear weapons situation worldwide, the United States' security concerns, and the idea of eliminating all nuclear weapons globally.

As with climate change, In order to make political progress possible on this issue, we must raise public awareness. As a prominent leader in international policy, an inspiration for a new generation, and a visionary for a new 21st century global security, your views on America's security concerns and on nuclear weapons would be tremendously enlightening for the film's worldwide audience. I bring to this project two decades of experience producing highly successful films, (including such hits as Good Will Hunting and Pulp Fiction) which have been honored with twenty-one Academy Award nominations, including two for Best Picture, and have won five.

Michael Haltzel is Senior Advisor at the international strategic advisory firm McLarty Associates and Senior Fellow at the Center for Transatlantic Relations of Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies. Dr. Haltzel capped a distinguished career in public service from 1994 to 2005 as senior foreign policy advisor to then-Senator, now U.S. Vice President Joseph R. Biden, Jr., and Staff Director of the Subcommittee on European Affairs of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. He was the lead Democratic Senate staffer on NATO and Balkan policy and, as such, co-led the bipartisan ratification of two rounds of NATO enlargement (1998; 2004) and was deeply involved in the Bosnia and Kosovo campaigns. In September/October 2009, Dr. Haltzel will return temporarily to government service as Head of the U.S. Delegation to the annual two-week, 56-nation OSCE Human Rights Conference in Warsaw.

Dr. Haltzel's other previous positions include Principal of DLA Piper Rudnick Gray Cary LLP, a business law firm; Chief of the European Division of the Library of Congress; Director of West European Studies of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars at the Smithsonian Institution; Vice President for Academic Affairs of Longwood University (Virginia); Deputy Director of the Aspen Institute Berlin; and Assistant Professor of Russian and German History at Hamilton College (New York). The author of Der Abbau der deutschen ständischen Selbstverwaltung in den Ostseeprovinzen Russlands 1855-1905 (Marburg, 1977), he is also coauthor, editor, or coeditor of nine other books and is a frequent contributor to American and European newspapers, journals, and the electronic media.

In 1990, Dr. Haltzel was a member of the U.S. delegation to the Copenhagen CSCE-Conference: in 1991 a Guest Professor at the Stiflung Wissenschaft und Politik (Ebenhausen); in September 1996 an OSCE monitor for the first post-war elections in Bosnia; and in July 2004 a member of the U.S. delegation to the inauguration of Serbian President Boris Tadić. In May 2000 he spoke on trans-Atlantic security affairs at the Assemblée Nationale in Paris; in November 2005 he addressed the NATO Parliamentary Assembly in Copenhagen; in October 2006 he spoke to CDU Members of the Bundestag in Berlin; in March 2008 he testified before the U.S. Congress on NATO enlargement; and in May 2009 he spoke to the OSCE Permanent Council in Vienna on European security A member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the World Affairs Council of Washington, DC and of the Boards of Advisors of the European Institute, the American Institute for Contemporary German Studies, and Our Military Kids, Dr. Haltzel is also a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the Council's Board Committee on Washington Programs. In 1992-93 he chaired the Council's study group on nationalities and ethnic conflict in Europe. He is a member of the Cosmos Club and of the Washington Institute of Foreign Affairs.

Dr. Haltzel has been decorated by seven countries of the European Union: the Grand Cross of Commander of the Order of Grand Duke Gediminas (Lithuania); the Star of Romania; the Knighthood of the Royal Order of the Polar Star (Sweden); the Officer's Cross Order of Merit (Hungary); the Grand Decoration of Honor in Silver (Austria): the Order of the Three Stars (Latvia); and the Knighthood of the Order of the Lion of Finland. His biographic listings have included Who's Who in America Dr. Haltzel received a B.A. magna cum laude with honors in history from Yale, an M.A. in Soviet Studies and a Ph.D. in history, both from Harvard, and also studied in Berlin, Marburg, and Helsinki. He speaks German and Russian.
