SUBJECT: Call to German FM Westerwelle on the Terrorism Finance Tracking Program

Recommendation:

That you call German Foreign Minister Westerwelle to press for an extension of the Terrorism Finance Tracking Program (TFTP).

Approve _____ Disapprove _____

Background:

Negotiations to continue data transfer under the TFTP are at a critical stage. The program will end January 31, 2010, unless we can reach agreement with the EU to continue it. We must conclude an agreement before the December 1 entry into force of the Lisbon Treaty. The TFTP is a difficult issue for Merkel's new coalition: data privacy protection is part of the new government's coalition agreement and a signature issue for the Free Democratic Party (FDP). German Justice Minister Leutheusser-Schnarrenberger (FDP), a committed advocate of data protection (she resigned from the Kohl government over its data protection policies), is pushing changes to the agreement that are unacceptable to the United States and some EU members. As FDP chairman, Foreign Minister Westerwelle can override Leutheusser-Schnarrenberger on this issue.

On November 30, EU justice ministers will consider the matter. NSA Jones, AG Holder, and Secretary Geithner have all weighed in, and you mentioned the issue to Westerwelle last week on the margins of Karzai's inauguration.

The EU's review of the program, published in February 2009, confirmed that the program's strict data protections were in line with European and American privacy laws. Leutheusser-Schnarrenberger seeks changes that would go well beyond existing protections and would violate U.S. and European prohibitions on releasing law enforcement sensitive information to private persons who may be the subject of investigation. Most fundamentally, she seeks establishment of a broad right to correct or delete data, including through judicial redress, which we find unacceptable.

Austria, France, Greece, Finland, and the Czech Republic have expressed similar concerns about data privacy, but resolution of Germany's concerns are likely to resolve theirs as well. Additionally, the Dutch and Belgians, who will have the largest roles to play under the agreement, continue to discuss the specific legal mechanism to transmit the data to Treasury.

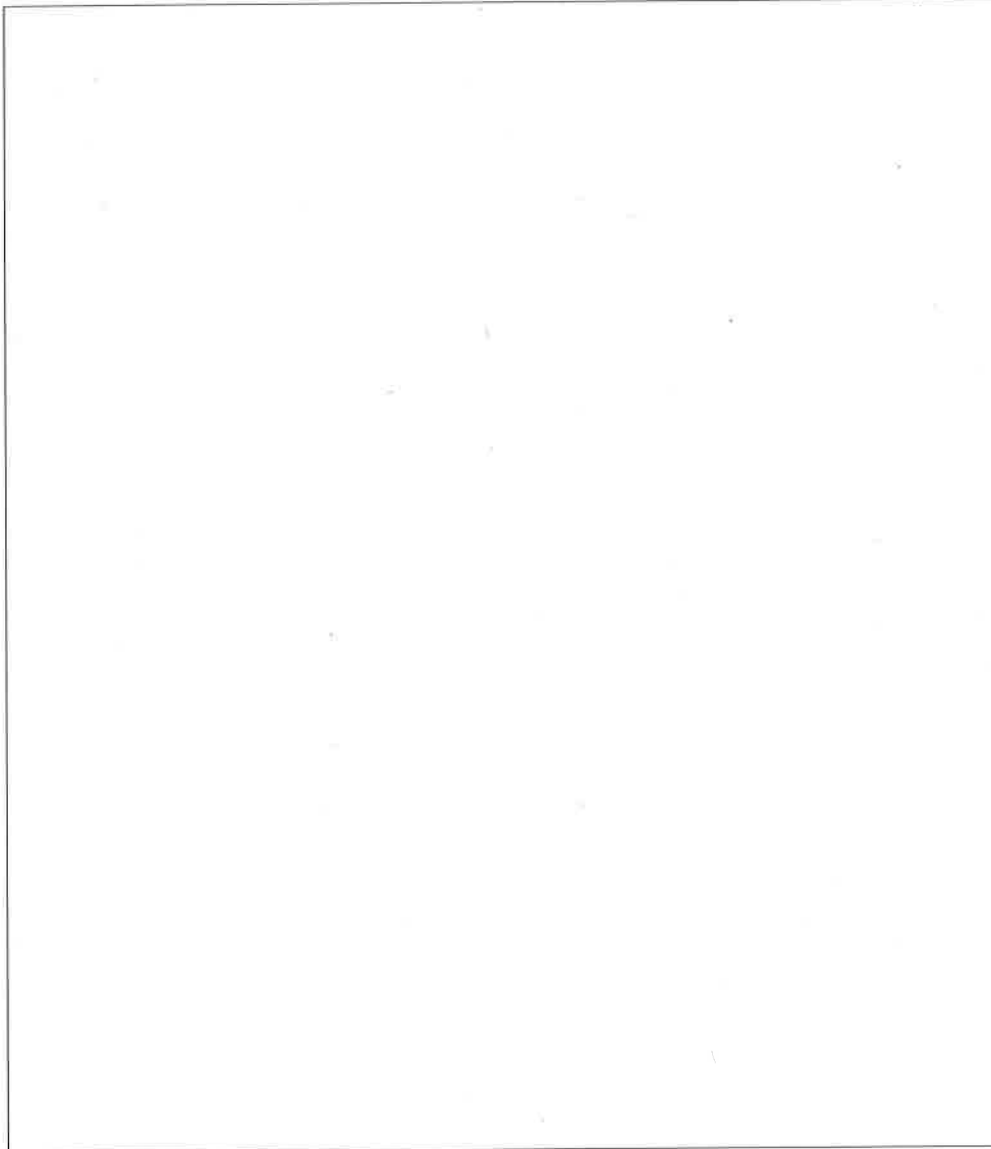

**"THE WAR IN AFGHANISTAN:
HOW A POLITICAL SURGE CAN WORK"**

**SPEECH BY RT HON DAVID MILIBAND MP
FOREIGN SECRETARY**

**NATO PARLIAMENTARY ASSEMBLY, EDINBURGH
17 November 2009**

Last week in Berlin, I watched the moving commemoration of the event that defined the end of the Cold War. The fall of the Wall twenty years ago closed a dark chapter in Europe's history. It also presaged a broader role for NATO.

Today there are many big, long term issues for NATO to address - notably relations with Russia, where we need to respond in a positive and principled way to the idea of a debate about European security architecture; cooperation with the EU, where the passage of the Lisbon Treaty creates a major opportunity for more proactive and ambitious European defence and foreign policy cooperation; and the modernisation of our internal structures, where we need to streamline decision-making, improve defence planning, slim down the bloated headquarters structures and beef up capability development.

But I make no apology for focusing my remarks on the war in Afghanistan. In each of the countries of Nato, people are wondering whether the military commitment of combat troops will be endless. My belief is that it does not need to be - if we ally to the impending decisions for force uplift, Afghan and international, a commitment to political uplift, in the key relationships between the peoples of Afghanistan, the government and the insurgency, and Afghanistan and its neighbours. Today I want to discuss how the idea of a political surge can be turned from a cliché into a reality.

The Scale of the Sacrifice

I don't need to remind this audience that total ISAF casualties this year alone stand at 469. Many more have been injured, in many cases very seriously. Many hundreds of members of the Afghan National Security Forces and the Pakistani military have been killed. We pay tribute today to each and every sacrifice made.

For the UK, this is now the bloodiest year since the Falklands war. Since January, 92 members of our armed forces have lost their lives. The Prime Minister spoke ten days ago, and again last night, about the aims of the mission - to prevent Afghanistan being used again, by al Qaeda under the umbrella of Taleban rule, as a launching pad for international terrorism; about the strategic plan - to support the development of Afghan institutions to deliver this goal; about the priorities - for Cabinet and provincial appointments, for enhancements to ANSF capacity, for action against corruption that saps the loyalty of the Afghan people; and about the next steps, starting with the inauguration of President Karzai in Kabul, where I will fly tonight.

Since this is a war, and since soldiers are being killed, it is inevitable that much of the debate about strategy concerns military posture and above all troop numbers. That is important. Secretary General Rasmussen has addressed the issue this morning. In every capital, every government and every Parliament, we will have to address the issue of what burden we should bear.

President Obama is now in the final stages of his deliberations. In the UK we support the prosecution of a serious counter-insurgency effort in Afghanistan. We do not see that as an alternative to counter-terrorism but as the best means to achieve it. And we propose to raise our already high contribution on the basis of the agreed strategy and if others do likewise.

I fully endorse the arguments for burden sharing today. But I don't want to repeat them. Instead I want to return to a theme that I outlined in a speech at NATO headquarters in July, and set out what the UK government believes to be the essential counterpart of a coherent military strategy – namely a political strategy of strength because it is comprehensive and depth because it is rooted in the life and history of the Afghan people.

We all repeat that “there can be no purely military solution”; so let's take that mantra seriously; recognise that we will only succeed in Afghanistan when our military resources and development assistance are aligned behind a clear political strategy. Without a political strategy our military are working to suppress the cancers of insurgency and instability, but not tackling their causes.

The goal of a political strategy is clear. It is to unite a critical mass of the key players behind shared goals – al Qaeda kept out, the different tribal groups kept in, and the neighbours kept happy enough to leave Afghanistan alone.

To be successful the political strategy must address three audiences. First, the Afghan people and their loyalty: the military strategy must give security, the politics confidence about governance, especially at local level. Second, the insurgency and their determination to fight; the military strategy must beat back the insurgents, the politics must provide the option to flip sides rather than fight or run away. Third, Afghanistan's neighbours; the military strategy must show that there will be no return to Taliban misrule, the politics must give them incentives to support a stable Afghan state.

This is a war in the mind as well as on the ground. Our speeches, interviews, body language are all scrutinised for the tells of clarity and resolve or confusion and weakness. This speech will not just be covered by media in the countries represented here; it will be watched at the frontier post of the Khyber Pass, by insurgents in Marjah, by ANSF trainees in Kandahar.

Governance

90% of Afghans say they do not want the Taliban back. This is our greatest strength. But they fear that the international community will tire of the war and the Taliban will return, inflicting brutal retribution on those who “collaborated” with the government.

This is the security challenge at the heart of the McCrystal Report. It requires training and mentoring of the Afghan army and police. And it requires us to support local, informal security initiatives, empowering communities that decide they want to stop the insurgents from terrorising their villages.

But security, formal and informal, is inseparable from governance. This is the first plank of an effective political strategy.

The Taleban know this. This is why they appoint shadow governors for most provinces. It is why they have systems to take up complaints against their own "officials". Why they install 'shari'a' courts to deliver swift and enforced justice in contested and controlled areas.

The Government of Afghanistan, supported by the international community, must offer a better alternative.

Many of the candidates in the Presidential election, including President Karzai himself and Dr Abdullah, argued for a wider process than the constitutionally mandated Parliamentary and District Elections next year, to take stock of the national political structures created in the heat of events after 2001. There is in the quintessentially Afghan institution of a *loya jirga* a mechanism for fashioning the kind of renewed national consensus needed to inform and underpin a new national understanding.

But for most Afghans, particularly in the areas most badly infected by the insurgency, sub-national governance is the only sort of governance that matters. The 34 *walis* – Provincial Governors – and 394 *uluswals* – District Governors – of Afghanistan, and the bodies of elders – the *shuras* – should all represent their people's views to Kabul and, and help deliver to the people the governance, the security, the elementary justice, they crave.

There are a number of good programmes to support sub-national governance: the National Solidarity Programme, for example, or the Afghan Social Outreach Programme, or the 22 000 strong Community Development Councils. But their coverage is patchy, the link to the reintegration of insurgents, and their commanders and sub-commanders, weak, and their funding far too small. In 2008, the total national budget of the Afghan Government Department responsible for local governance, the IDLG, was \$34m. That is less than \$1m a province. By contrast 1000 US combat troops costs a billion dollars a year.

A winning political strategy would select and train, empower and equip, mentor and monitor those responsible for governing the provinces and districts of Afghanistan. It would help those *walis* and *uluswals* create, through elections or other appropriate methods of consultation, truly representative local *shuras*. In turn, those *shuras* can decide the distribution of development funds, deliver the civil and criminal collective dispute resolution which is what Afghans mean by the rule of law, provide a forum for a political debate, and, under carefully controlled conditions, provide the re-entry mechanisms for insurgents seeking reintegration.

In this, there may be, as General McChrystal seems to have realised, a difference between the rural insurgency – where sympathy for the Taliban is much stronger, and where security and governance have never been delivered by conventional military or police forces – and the urban insurgency, where resentment of the Taliban and all they represent is more acute, and where the conventional tactics of Clear, Hold and Build, delivered by conventional Afghan and international forces, may have a much greater chance of gaining purchase.

The offer to the Afghan people has to be, at national and subnational level governance they can believe in. Believe in because it is there to stay. And there to stay because it goes with the grain of the ancient but continually evolving traditions on which the Afghan polity has existed as a stable but loosely confederated polity for some two and a half centuries.

Our role should be not to prescribe exactly how those traditions evolve, or the systems which reflect them are implemented, but to provide the resources without which none of this would be possible, and which will be far far less expensive than trying to suppress the insurgency by conventional military means.

Reintegration

This brings me to the second part of the political strategy: the offer to the insurgency.

The Afghan insurgency is not a monolith. There is no single authoritative leadership. Different insurgent groups operate in different localities. Sometimes they take orders from a Taliban central command in Peshawar or Quetta. Other times cooperation is purely tactical and opportunistic, or it doesn't exist at all.

By combining targeted military pressure with concrete political incentives we can change the calculations of these people and force them to reassess. This time last year the Taliban commander Ghulam Yahya claimed to control 600 fighters in Herat, western Afghanistan. But in February he was killed in an ISAF strike. Shortly afterwards his deputy was arrested by the ANP (CHECK), and the insurgent structures underneath him quickly collapsed, with former fighters returning to their villages and accepting the authority of the government.

This is just one example. But with intelligence led, targeted operations against not just individuals but key positions within the insurgent hierarchy, we can weaken the insurgency. Because the impact is not just on those individuals who are removed, but those around him who fear for their lives.

There does however, need to be a more positive offer to insurgent fighters, not just a tougher penalty. That is the significance of discussion of a National Reintegration Organisation, supported by an Afghan Resettlement fund, which can help former combatants to return to their homes, supporting them to start new lives and find new ways to make a living and support their families. The international community can provide support and funding, but reintegration needs to be led by the Afghans both at the central and at the district and community levels.

The thesis is simple. Some Afghan Taleban may be committed to global jihad. But the vast majority are not. They are conservative Pashtun nationalists. Their primary commitment is to tribe and to locality. Our goal is not a fight to the death. It is to demonstrate clearly that they cannot win; and to offer them a way back into their communities.

Once reintegration gains momentum, and the insurgency is starting to fray or crumble, we will need to support President Karzai in reaching out to those high-level commanders that can be drawn into the domestic politics, and persuaded to reject violence, renounce Al Qaeda, and live within the Afghan constitution. This will be far from straightforward. It means addressing the weaknesses of the Bonn conference, which was half hearted in its outreach and partial in its representation. But the historical lessons are clear. Blood enemies from the Soviet period and the civil war now work together in government. Former Talibs already sit in the Parliament. It is essential that members of the current insurgency are encouraged to follow suit.

Neighbours

The third element in defeating the insurgency is a new relationship with Afghanistan's neighbours. The fighters within Afghanistan draw on funding, support and shelter from beyond its borders.

Afghanistan's neighbours are motivated by a range of contradictory fears. It is not, and never has been, the UK's intention, or that of the coalition, to establish a permanent security force in Afghanistan, or colonise the country, or to use it as a base for regional dominance. But equally having driven al Qaeda from Afghanistan we do not want to leave only to have to return.

The choice on offer for the neighbours is not between stable clienthood and unstable independence. It is between an unstable state with terrorism, crime, drugs and migration destabilising the whole neighbourhood or a neutral state, where Afghanistan neighbours and the international community act transparently, recognise each other's legitimate interests and generate a consensus about how they can be balanced.

Each of the neighbours has a range of interests in Afghanistan – whether it is Iranian investments in Herat, or Pakistani interest in promoting the return of the hundreds of thousands of Afghan refugees still in Pakistan, or Russian [central Asian?] concern about drug running. Above all, they have much to gain from an Afghanistan that develops as a commercial and cultural cross-roads of South West Asia. Creating this will require the kind of long-term vision and drive that brought peace to Western Europe after centuries of conflict, or, on a much more minor scale, to Ireland long-troubled by inter-ethnic strife. But it must be done, using the habits of consultation and conciliation and rational division of labour essential to convincing each of the parties that it has more to lose from continuing conflict than it has to gain from tolerant co-operation.

The building block for better relations is the resolve shown by the Pakistani government, military and people in taking on the insurgency in Waziristan. For years, the West has lobbied Pakistani politicians and army generals about domestic

militancy. Yet despite billions of pounds in US military assistance, there was little shift in behaviour. The fight against terrorism was seen as Washington's war. That position has been transformed because Pakistani public opinion has shifted dramatically. Pakistani citizens have felt the devastating effects of terrorists turning on their own people.

The opportunity is to squeeze the life out of the terrorist threat from both sides of the Durand Line. That will only happen if Pakistan develops a new relationship with the US and the international community, based on a recognition of our interdependence and shared interests. The successful passage of the Kerry-Lugar Bill shows that the partnership with the US is based on development as well as security, and is between civilian institutions not just military ones. The first EU-Pakistan summit earlier this year was a step towards a serious relationship between the world's largest single market and one of the world's most poorest countries.

But the relationship must be two-way. The international community must address the needs of ordinary Pakistanis – in terms of jobs, education, trade and agriculture. But Pakistan must address not just the terrorist threat to its own citizens, but Al Qaeda and the Afghan Taliban who threaten our citizens. That means the current military operations need over time to address all militants who shelter Al Qaeda, as well as those who threaten Pakistan itself. It also means ensuring that the areas that have already been subject to military operations – in Swat and the Malakand Division – are reconstructed effectively and internally displaced persons resettled, so that short-term military success does not give way to longer term civilian disaffection. Finally, it means giving the people of FATA a clear roadmap towards proper inclusion in the Pakistani state, with the same rights – and responsibilities – as other citizens.

The Agenda for the next Afghan Government

This political strategy depends on an Afghan government able to act decisively in the interests of the whole country. There can be no Afghanisation without an Afghan partner.

President Karzai has made clear [HAS HE?] that he will use his inaugural speech on Thursday to set out a positive agenda for the Afghan people. We shall be there to act as witnesses to what should be a new contract between Karzai and his people. A people whose hopes were so lifted by the achievements of the years after the fall of the Taliban; and whose fears of a return to earlier, never forgotten, miseries have been awoken by the endurance of the insurgency of more recent past.

In all of these, the key will be not to try to do everything, but to decide, as part of a serious political strategy co-ordinated with the international community, what matters, and then do it as well as possible in challenging circumstances. We must focus, and focus hard, on what works, and what matters, and nothing else.

Running through everything President Karzai and his new team of Ministers do must be a serious, uncompromising, effort to address, with our help, the single most corrosive factor in the eyes of the Afghan people and the wider world: the idea that officials are acting in their own interests not those of the country. None of us is so

naïve as to think that in Afghanistan, or any other country, corruption can be eliminated overnight or completely. Nor do we deny that the vast flow of foreign funds into a country whose government's self-generated income is less than \$1bn a year doesn't play a part. But a serious start needs to be made.

The Afghan people will know, from the appointments of Cabinet Ministers and Provincial Governors, whether there is a fresh attempt to govern in their interests. And by governing in their interests, the new Afghan government will be governing in ours. Because the point about counter-insurgency is that it depends on the will of the people.

Success is achieved through valour and determination from troops – Afghan and international. We have that in abundance. But a sustainable future for Afghanistan depends on an inclusive political settlement as well as an effective Afghan security force. That is what the British Government is determined to promote.

Dear Rahm,

This week I had a long conversation with Gao Xiqing, President and CIO of China Investment Corporation (CIC), China's sovereign wealth fund holding nearly \$300 billion in assets. The CIC is currently heavily invested in Morgan Stanley (\$5 billion) and Blackstone (\$3 billion). It was a follow up to a meeting I had with him during a recent CODEL in Beijing. Since President

Obama will be traveling to China soon to meet with President Hu Jintao, I am sharing my conversation and impressions of Mr. Gao.

- The CIC is very interested in making additional investments in the US but the Chinese have serious concerns about how foreign direct investment in the United States by the Chinese will be viewed by the federal regulators and by the public.
- They are particularly interested in joint ventures with U.S. firms dealing with renewable energy and combating global warming. They will not invest in weapons, tobacco, or dirty fuels.
- The CIC is looking for signs from the White House that investments would be welcome here. They would appreciate any help that the US Government could provide in casting Chinese investments in a favorable light.
- The CIC will open a branch outside of China soon, and is considering New York City. Such a move would reaffirm New York's reputation as the financial capital of the world and would create an estimated 1,500 jobs. They are also considering locating in a third-world country, where they feel China would be more welcome. This would be a blow to New York City's reputation.
- Although I have made it quite clear how welcome they would be in New York, Mr. Gao indicated that CIC's move to New York would be much more likely to happen if a request were made from President Obama. He indicated that, if the President were to make such a request, the CIC would respond positively.
- Mr. Gao indicated that Chinese officials were encouraged by President Obama's message that China is the United States' most important trade partner. He hopes that the dialogue between the US and China will remain cooperative and constructive and will not retreat into open criticism of China's domestic or foreign policy.
- Mr. Gao also said he hoped that President Obama would express his sympathy for the victims of the May 2009 earthquake.

I hope you find this useful and will not think me at all presumptuous for passing it along. If you have any questions or suggestions for further dealings with Mr. Gao, I would love to hear them.

- By Wednesday, Israel will be launching its unilateral moratorium on settlement activity in the West Bank. The GoI will announce the moratorium as early as later today.
- I understand that the GoI will implement the moratorium by issuing orders in the West Bank forbidding new construction starts for 10 months, including on projects already approved by the government (which number in the thousands).
- Israel's moratorium will consist of.
 - No new housing construction starts and no new civilian-related infrastructure
 - No new approvals
 - No new confiscations/expropriations
- The moratorium will be limited to the West Bank. Israel has said that the only exception for new construction will be for 28 public buildings—primarily schools and synagogues—in pre-existing settlements.
- I recognize that this is less than what we all want, but its much more than any Israeli government has done before and it will, over time, result in meaningful change in the West Bank.

IF ASKED—re how much existing construction will continue?

- (We anticipate fewer than 800 buildings, most west of the barrier, are already under construction and will be completed by Israel. We will be monitoring that construction)

S/E Mitchell's Statement

- After Israel's announcement, Senator Mitchell will make a public statement about the moratorium and our peace efforts. We will say that the moratorium is significant and put it in context.
- In the statement, Senator Mitchell will restate the long-standing American position on Jerusalem: "Our policy has remained unchanged: As has been stated by every previous Administration which has addressed this issue, the United States has not accepted and disagrees with any unilateral action which could have the effect of pre-empting negotiations. The status of Jerusalem and all of the permanent status issues must be resolved by the parties through negotiations."

Territorial Context

- We believe that this moratorium will be an important step in resolving territorial issues between Israel and the Palestinians.
- [The Secretary and S/E Mitchell will say so in their statements following Israel's announcement and will describe the principle by which we believe the territorial issues of this conflict can be solved. This statement will not be our plan or vision, but it will go slightly further than what the President said at UNGA.]
- Additionally, we believe that a moratorium of this nature can help protect negotiations once they get underway. Historically, when the parties get together, there is a noticeable and significant increase in settlement activity in the West Bank. This was true during the Annapolis process, around Wye, and leading up to Camp David.

Supporting Abbas/Resuming Negotiations

- I understand that Israel's moratorium will be hard for President Abbas.
- It is our hope that the Secretary and Senator Mitchell's statement on resolving the conflict and describing the territorial aspects of doing so will help mitigate that and give Abbas something to react positively to.
- We hope that if you choose to speak out about the moratorium, you make positive or neutral statement. Negative statements will only make the situation more difficult for Abbas and more challenging in respect to getting negotiations relaunched.

Sahara Policy History**RELEASE IN

This "non paper" was prepared by the ambassador of Morocco with inputs of people who had been closely involved in the process in the late 90 and in the beginning of the 20th century.

The Sahara issue is one of the most if not the most important issue for Morocco. The stability and the security of the country are at stake. For the Moroccan people, including the Sahrawis, the Western Sahara is, as it has always been, Moroccan. They see the problem of the Sahara as an unfortunate fabrication by the Algerian leadership, back in the 70s, to destabilize Morocco and the monarchy, through the Polisario proxy, within the logic of the cold war. To solve the problem, Morocco proposed in 2007, at American urging, a plan for a very broad autonomy for the region.

Morocco believes that the future of the Maghreb should be a regional integration, with open borders and a strong cooperation between all the countries of the region, particularly between Algeria and Morocco, in all fields, namely security and economy, to address the challenges we all face (terrorism, drug and human trafficking, unemployment). Morocco, the region, Europe and the United States cannot accept nor afford the creation of a failed state in the Western Sahara, in an empty territory with no resources. It will be a heaven for all the terrorists and traffickers who are already everywhere in the Sahara apart where Morocco is.

The present state of play on this issue is a direct result of an American initiative in 1999 to change course on how best to resolve the problem. The abandonment of the referendum option has been an American policy initiative, not a Moroccan one, and it took a very difficult internal political debate for Morocco to follow the American request to propose an autonomy for the Sahara.

This paper provides a brief narrative of the development of US policy on Western Sahara from the late 1990s to the present days.

- 1- Between 1991 and 1998, it was US policy to support efforts of MINURSO to complete the registration process that was preliminary to holding a referendum on the future of the territory: whether it would be fully integrated into Morocco or become an independent state.
- 2- By 1998, it had become clear that the major problem in completing the registration was the fundamental difference of opinion between Morocco and the Polisario Front over who should be allowed to vote. The Polisario wanted to restrict the list to only those Sahrawis who had been included in the 1974 Spanish census and Morocco wanted to be sure that those Sahrawis whose origins were in the former Spanish Sahara but who had either left the territory because of Spanish mistreatment or been driven out by Spain were also allowed to vote. Because of poor design on adjudicating disputes established by the UN, it became impossible to resolve this fundamental difference. When

registration activities ended in late 1998, there were roughly 90,000 people registered to vote but there were 145,000 pending appeals. It was clear this process had failed.

- 3- Throughout 1998 MINURSO mandate renewals were on a 30 or 60-day basis in the UNSC. The State Department was pressing the embassy in Rabat to urge Morocco to make further concessions in order to get to the vote. Morocco continually affirmed that it was prepared to have a vote, but it would not allow the Polisario to rig the voter list to exclude legitimate Sahrawi stakeholders, according to the view of Morocco. Tensions were high and this argument negatively affected the relationship between the United States and Morocco.
- 4- In view of these difficulties and tensions in bilateral relations, seeing that the current US approach was neither sustainable, manageable or helpful in fostering closer bilateral relations, in December 1998 the State Department undertook a formal interagency review of the policy that included the US Ambassador in Rabat, Edward Gabriel and the political counselor, Bob Holley. This review continued into January 1999.
- 5- The policy review decided that the referendum option was no longer in the interest of the United States for three reasons. First, it was clear that the registration process had produced an impasse that could not be resolved without the mutual consent of the parties. It was a dead end. Second, the review recognized that even if a vote were somehow possible, regardless of which side won the vote, it was unlikely that the losing side would accept the outcome and that such a "winner/loser" formula would only create the circumstances for increased tension and likely renewed violence in the region. Third, it was decided that regardless of the outcome, the US would never support any initiative aiming to force Morocco to adhere to an outcome it wouldn't accept.
- 6- The review accepted the proposal that a formal decision be made to pursue a compromise, negotiated, political solution to the problem, based on continued Moroccan sovereignty in the Sahara, but with the granting of a broad and substantial (by international standards) autonomy for the territory.
- 7- A formal Action Memorandum was produced at the State Department for decision by then Secretary Albright, who approved of the policy change in February 1999, and instructed that she be kept informed of developments.

- 8- Following this change of policy, senior US State Department officials (led by Martin Indyk, then Assistant Secretary for NEA) began a series of trips to Morocco in the spring of 1999 in an attempt to persuade then King Hassan II to go along with this change of course, drop pursuit of the referendum, and accept a political solution based on this formula. At this time the US embassy was also charged to undertake a series of quiet meetings with foreign embassies in Rabat to signal this shift in US policy and try to garner support from other interested international players represented in Rabat.
- 9- King Hassan II was initially very skeptical of this approach. He lacked confidence that Algeria would be prepared to bargain in good faith on such a compromise - nor was it clear that he had much confidence in the willingness or ability of the United States to become a full partner in bringing Algeria to this point of view. In addition, there were then very influential advisors around the King (such as Interior Minister Driss Basri) who were fundamentally opposed to any "third way" or political solution to the problem. The King seemed intent to await the Algerian election and hoped to engage directly with the leading candidate, Abdelaziz Bouteflika, whom he hoped and believed would become president.
- 10- On July 19 with his advisers, and on July 20th in a meeting with Ambassador Gabriel, King Hassan II indicated his desire to agree to the American position and pursue a "political solution" to the Sahara crisis. The King said that he had come to an agreement with (now) President Bouteflika and believed a solution along the lines of the American proposal was now possible. King Hassan died three days later without this change in position being made public.
- 11- Although it was difficult for HM King Mohamed VI to reverse a 20-year course of action by his father on a major policy issue suddenly at the beginning of his reign, he quickly came to an agreement in principle proposed by Secretary Albright in a meeting with her on September 1, 1999 in Rabat.
- 12- A detailed American proposal that addressed both Moroccan and US concerns was presented to King Mohammed VI shortly thereafter, in mid-September 1999 in Tangier. The US proposal involved a sovereignty/autonomy framework, with specific modalities and proposed timelines. There were two conditions from Morocco that were also met. First, although the US could not guarantee the outcome of any final solution, the United States guaranteed Morocco that it would not support any outcome of a negotiation that

did not guarantee Morocco's sovereignty in the Sahara. Second, the United States would work actively to ensure that there would not be a renewal of hostilities in the region over this issue.

13-Following this agreement, senior State Department officers (including then NEA DAS Ron Neumann) flew to Houston to brief former Secretary James Baker, who was then the Personal Envoy for Western Sahara of the UN Secretary General. Baker agreed with the approach and undertook to shape a proposal with Morocco that was consistent with the sovereignty/autonomy approach.

14-Following a meeting with King Mohammed VI in the spring of 2000, Mr. Baker reported he was certain that King Mohammed was desirous of an internationally acceptable autonomy arrangement for the people of the Sahara, under Moroccan sovereignty.

15-After intense negotiations between Mr. Baker and Moroccan officials during the subsequent 12 months, in April 2001 Baker presented a proposal to the UN that eventually came to be known as "the Framework Agreement." Morocco, through its private deliberations with Baker, was able to quickly and publically agree to Baker's proposal. Algeria and the Polisario rejected it.

16-A few months later, Secretary Baker tried to nudge matters forward by offering the Security Council a choice among four options. At the time, he was quietly circulating that he would withdraw unless the Security Council chose a clear line of action. His options were (1) proceed with the referendum; (2) force negotiations on the Framework Agreement; (3) partition the territory (an Algerian suggestion and in total contradiction with the agreement with Morocco); or (4) abandon the MINURSO mission altogether. The UNSC failed to adopt any of these options and urged the parties to continue to cooperate with Baker to find a mutually acceptable political solution. This was as close as the Council could get to endorsing a negotiated solution based on the Framework proposal.

17-After the change of Administrations in Washington and the impasse in the United Nations, Secretary Baker became active once again, this time as an individual believed to carry great influence in the new Administration. He secretly negotiated another proposal with Algeria and the Polisario Front, which he eventually tabled in 2003 as "the Peace Plan." Baker's second proposal was fundamentally different from the

Framework Agreement, had very substantial risks and disadvantages unacceptable for Morocco. Seeking to force action, Secretary Baker strongly urged Morocco to accept the agreement and said it was his position that in the absence of progress the United States should move this issue from Chapter VI to Chapter VII under the UN Charter.

18-This new position of Mr. Baker took Morocco by complete surprise. It was entirely different from the position Morocco had agreed to adopt at American urging, to drop the referendum, and move towards a political solution that would protect Morocco's sovereignty in the Sahara while granting the region a broad autonomy.

19-Between April of 2003 and September of 2003 Secretary Baker as UN envoy adhered to his new proposal, but the US policy that had been agreed between the United States Government and Morocco remained in force. Given Mr. Baker's great prestige both in New York and in Washington, there was considerable confusion as to whether he spoke for himself only, or for the new Administration.

20-In September 2003 King Mohamed VI met with President Bush on the margins of UNGA to discuss both this confusion and the lack of progress in the Sahara dispute. In that meeting, President Bush made clear that Baker did not represent the United States and that only officials of the United States Government spoke for the United States. The President assured the King that the United States remained committed to the agreement that had been struck with the Clinton Administration and reaffirmed that the US would never support anything that would not be accepted by Morocco. The President did tell the King that it was imperative that if Morocco did not accept the Baker proposal, it should produce its own autonomy proposal in order to move matters forward. The President told the King that his foreign policy advisors should work closely with the US to develop an alternative proposal to present to Mr. Baker.

21-Subsequent efforts by Morocco to offer amendments to Baker's proposal failed with Mr. Baker, who refused to work on any compromise solutions with Morocco.

22-Mr. Baker, understanding that the Bush Administration had now reaffirmed its support for the agreement reached in the Clinton years and therefore adhering to autonomy under Moroccan sovereignty, resigned as Personal Envoy, in the spring of 2004.

23-Morocco was again advised by U.S. officials to move the process forward by developing its own proposal for autonomy under Moroccan sovereignty. In September 2006, The United States once again reiterated in demarches by State Department and NSC officials to the ambassador of Morocco in Washington and by the US embassy in Rabat to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, that if Morocco could produce a credible plan for a wide autonomy for the Sahara under Moroccan sovereignty and would accept to negotiate with the Polisario, the US would then state publicly that autonomy under Moroccan sovereignty was the only viable solution for the Sahara.

24-Morocco tabled its autonomy proposal at the UN in the spring of 2007. The US termed the proposal "serious and credible" and urged the parties to negotiate a settlement based on its terms.

25-Subsequent to Morocco's proposal being made public, four rounds of negotiations were held under the auspices of UN Special Envoy Van Walsum. Van Walsum then submitted his final statement to the Security Council, concluding that an independent Western Sahara was not an attainable goal. Unfortunately Algeria and the Polisario thereafter refused to meet with him, and he resigned.

26-The USG, as promised, also endorsed in a public statement, at the United Nations, as well as in official communications between the President and King Mohammed VI that "Independence is not a realistic option and that genuine autonomy under Moroccan Sovereignty is the only feasible solution".

The Morocco proposal, requested by the USG, remains on the table and, since the election of President Obama, there has been no public change of US policy, but neither has the new US administration made any statement reiterating the policy adopted by its two predecessors.

For the time being, the USG only supported publicly the UN negotiation process lead by ambassador Chris Ross.

The ambassador of Morocco, in recent meetings with US officials, said that he continues to be convinced that the fact that the US had not reiterated publicly its position is not helping the negotiation process for the following reasons:

- a. It is encouraging Algeria and the Polisario to be even less flexible. The Polisario and Algeria have been very aggressive in their statements against Morocco, but also in their attempts to destabilize Morocco from the inside, mainly in the Sahara

provinces (the only safe and stable area in the whole Sahara from the Atlantic to the Red Sea).

- b. It is instrumentalized by the Algerian press and the Polisario, who, claiming victory, pretend that the United States have changed policy
- c. It had created concerns among many people in Morocco who have the impression that the USG is backing away from the agreements it had struck with Morocco under the Clinton and the Bush Administrations.

The ambassador suggested that President Obama sends a letter to King Mohammed VI, reiterating the American position, i.e. "that independence for Western Sahara is not a realistic option and that genuine autonomy under Moroccan Sovereignty is the only feasible solution". This letter would remain strictly private until the USG and the GOM agree otherwise. Such a letter would reassure Morocco that the agreement with the United States it had accepted under American urging is still in force. It will highly help the negotiations process.

Thank you for your letter reiterating your dedication to resolving the Western Sahara dispute. I appreciate your pledge to continue working with the United Nations and the other concerned parties to reach a solution. Without such a solution, Morocco and its neighbors will not fully reap the benefits that greater regional cooperation could bring.

I was pleased by the U.N. Security Council's unanimous adoption of Resolution 1813 in April. As the representative of the United States stated on April 30, we believe an independent state in the Western Sahara is not a realistic option for resolving the Western Sahara dispute and that genuine autonomy under Moroccan sovereignty is the only feasible solution. I am hopeful that the Security Council's call for more intensive negotiations, with realism and a spirit of compromise, will lead to more substantive engagement between the parties in the framework of the U.N.-led negotiations. Morocco's serious, credible autonomy proposal provides an important starting point for negotiations toward a mutually acceptable autonomy regime that is consistent with the aspirations of the people of Western Sahara.

Thank you as well for your recent overtures to Algeria. This important step demonstrates Morocco's willingness to negotiate seriously and to improve its relations with its neighbors. I encourage you to continue these efforts, with respect both to Algeria and to the people of the Western Sahara. To that end, I urge you to make gestures in the Western Sahara -- such as moving forward with plans to implement overland family visits and improving human rights conditions -- that will improve the atmosphere of the Western Sahara talks and demonstrate the sincerity of Morocco's autonomy proposal.

The resolution of the Western Sahara conflict will improve the stability, security, and prosperity of the people of Morocco and all of North Africa. Thank you for your leadership and determination to bring an end to this dispute. The United States will continue to support your efforts to bring peace and prosperity to the Maghreb.

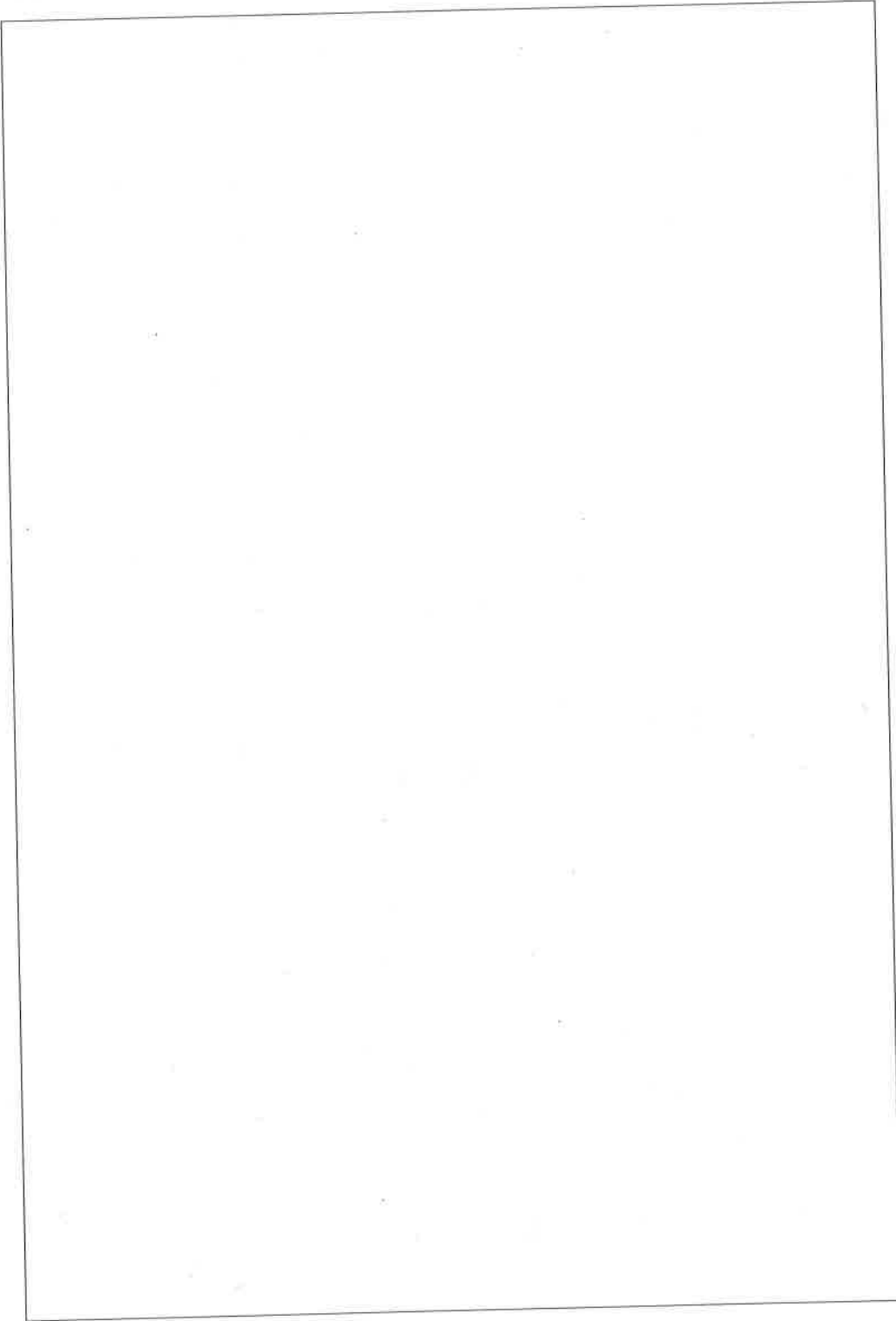

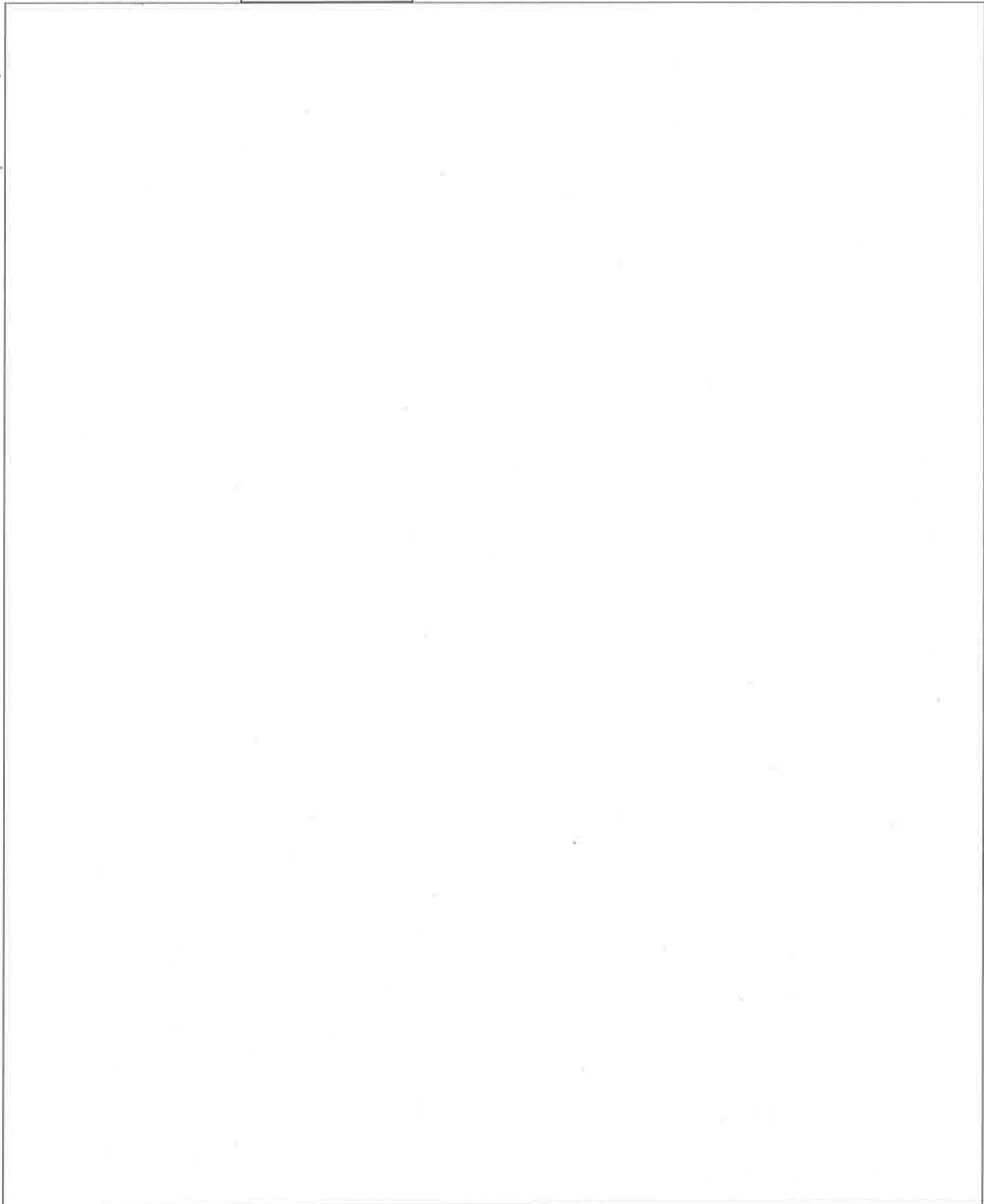

Global Development Policy

Our goal in the sixth IDPSC meeting is to further explore the key elements of a U.S. global development policy and identify areas of agreement and disagreement as we work toward a draft statement of policy.

The attached paper has four sections:

- Bullets on background and context that might be included in the framing of the policy statement
- Possible options for how the U.S. might seek to shift the global development policy agenda over the next decade (these may be complementary and are not meant to be seen as mutually exclusive)
- A statement of the goals of U.S. development policy, drawn from the President's vision and speeches
- Practical principles about how we can operate differently that might be core elements of a U.S. development policy

In our meeting on Tuesday, we hope to:

- Hear feedback on key messages in the background and context
- Identify additional options for changing the global development policy agenda and refine (and assess) those already on the list
- Discuss the big picture goals
(Note: more specific objectives and priorities will follow later, in line with the global development policy agenda we ultimately lay out)
- Hear feedback on key principles

We also welcome written comments and feedback, given the limited time we have in our formal meetings.

Outline for Discussion on U.S. Global Development Policy

I. Background and Context

What development is

- Development is a process that leads to enhanced well-being, a reduction in extreme poverty, and expanded economic and social opportunity
- Development is a process that leads to more capable states able to exercise a legitimate monopoly over the use of force, generate and allocate revenue, provide basic public goods, and protect basic rights and liberties

Why development outcomes matter to the U.S.

- U.S. interests. Critical to achieving our national security, foreign policy, and international economic objectives
- U.S. values. Reflect our commitment to alleviate extreme deprivation and suffering and to shape a world that reflects our values and beliefs
- Global collective action. Generate the capacity that must be harnessed to address transnational threats
- Development as a means. Development tools can also be useful in achieving pressing foreign policy and national security objectives, although achieving positive development outcomes requires a different, long-term perspective and sustained engagement

What we know

- Realism. Interventions in the development process by outsiders are rarely determinative of development outcomes and foreign assistance plays a minor supporting role, at best, to broader dynamics more often shaped by domestic and regional political actors and international economic conditions
- Economic growth. The key to development is sustained economic growth, which depends on rising productivity spurred by domestic policies, private capital flows, and local, regional, and international trade
- Governance. Public institutions, and the people who make them work, need to be seen as an integral part of the development process; they deliver essential policies and

services that are directly related to welfare and growth, especially when accountability mechanisms are in place; but the scope of "essential services" is necessarily much more limited at early stages of development; they are essential to sustainable and economic growth

- Country-driven. Countries - both their citizenry and their political, social and economic leadership - must take proactive responsibility for leading their own development; interventions are unlikely to be effective absent this commitment to advancing development
- Pragmatism. The challenge is to identify key points of intervention in the development process and experiment/evaluate to determine the best strategies to pursue

The global development landscape

- Diverse. The development policy space is increasingly crowded and diverse. Private resource flows for development dwarf official flows; developing economies are increasingly dependent on the global trading system; the philanthropic sector is increasingly influential in setting the agenda and delivering assistance; innovative multilateral mechanisms are changing how support for development is delivered; and new entrants, such as China, are advancing different models of development cooperation
- Notable development progress. There has been increasingly widespread (although not universal) progress in economic growth, poverty reduction and improved governance; many of today's emerging economies were developing countries a generation ago, the poorest regions are experiencing consistent growth of per-capita income, and the proportion of the world's population living in extreme poverty is on the decline
- Trends, threats, and opportunities. Over-the-horizon challenges include: the demographic transition to an aging global population in the developed world and a "youth bulge" in the developing world; growing resource scarcities driven by economic and population growth and a changing climate; and multiple and regular shocks, such as we have seen with the spread of H1N1/SARS, the global financial crisis, and the 2008 spike in world food prices, will continue periodically to shake the foundations of the global economy

- U.S. progressively a smaller player. The U.S. government continues to be the largest player in global development by virtue of our official assistance, geopolitical clout, extent of global engagement and presence, trade volumes, and non-official financial flows, but we are losing our advantage as our assistance to key multilateral institutions has declined as a share of our resources, U.S. development policy is not employed strategically to maximize impact in a given country or sector, and we have not sufficiently exerted our leadership in shaping the global development policy agenda
- A narrow agenda. The global development agenda for the past decade focused more on aid levels and meeting basic human needs than on policy or structural change; in that context, we have championed higher aid levels, for example (through both PEPFAR and MCC) and offered an innovative model (MCC), but we have not shifted the global policy debate forward from meeting the MDGs

Current drivers of the development policy agenda

- Crises. Development resources - and broader development policy attention - are held hostage, both in the U.S. and globally, to a small number of crises
- Sectors. Development policy has been the sum total of investments in a wide variety of sectors; the last decade, in particular, has seen a growing emphasis on meeting basic needs in the context of sector-based MDGs
- Budget. Foreign assistance has been the key policy tool for advancing development both inside the U.S. government and abroad, with the result that goals have been set in terms of raising volumes of assistance and programming those funds; budget is also often the starting point in considering development solutions, leading us to discount actions that are non-programmatic and non-budgetary

The U.S. status quo

- Spread thinly. The U.S. government de-facto development policy encompasses over 50 distinct objectives and priorities that reflect the accumulation of new priorities and initiatives without ever discarding old ones; the result is that U.S. development strategy involves trying to do a little bit of everything, everywhere

- Cross-purposes. Some U.S. policies and programs that affect development operate at cross-purposes, with the lack of coherence undermining the positive outcomes we aim to achieve.
- Limited scale. The U.S. is rarely engaged at a scale or with sufficient focus to enable us to achieve a significant and lasting development impact
- Absence of evidence. Evaluation efforts are designed to track money rather than to accumulate expertise about what works and what doesn't; policy and programs are too rarely driven by empirical data, for example cost-benefit analysis and rigorous evidence of impact
- Heavily bilateral. Despite widespread recognition of their many advantages, a relatively small percentage of our resources and policy attention are directed through multilateral institutions
- Overwhelmingly assistance. Although evidence of the limits of foreign assistance is generally accepted, U.S. development strategy is driven by the programming of funds in the 150 account
- Burdensome. The proliferation of actors within the U.S. government - in the absence of coherence and coordination - has substantially increased the burden on partner governments
- Focused too squarely on the short-term. Often U.S. development strategies are aimed to solve a particular problem in real time rather than a longer-term development outcome

II. The Global Development Policy Agenda in the Next Decade:
Possible Departures from the Status Quo

What are options for the United States in terms of defining the global development policy agenda for the next decade?

- **Shift from gap-filling to sustainability.** Shifting the focus from filling gaps in the delivery of services to the building and strengthening of systems that enable governments to meet basic needs and be held accountable by active citizens, with the articulated goal of graduating countries from foreign assistance
- **Expand economic prosperity and opportunity - making the global economy work for more people.** Reducing the binding constraints to growth through foundational investments and standing up a robust strategy for integrating the world's poorest countries into the global economy,

- fostering new centers of future growth, and mainstreaming development as integral to international economic policy
- **Manage transnational challenges and generate global public goods.** Focusing U.S. policy leadership and resources on the development of effective systems and a global architecture for managing collective challenges such as resource scarcity, climate change, epidemic and pandemic disease, food, and global financial flows (both licit and illicit).
 - **Change the terms of the debate and the actors at the table - from charity to mutual responsibility.** Break the tendency of development policy to be understood in terms of donors and recipients; build in expectations of mutual responsibility enforced by new global norms and standards, a more inclusive governance structure of the development institutions, and in which opportunities are created especially for political leaders that demonstrate a commitment to expanding prosperity and accountability
 - **Harness innovation for development.** Exert U.S. leadership in driving research and investment toward potential game-changing technologies in a critical subset of sectors where technological change can be transformative, e.g., health, water, agriculture, and energy
 - **Make prevention a priority.** Building the necessary international architecture for stabilization and response, while at the same time developing an agenda targeted at those countries most at risk of breakdown to stop their slide

III. Goals of U.S. Development Policy

- (1) Create conditions that allow more developing countries to become prosperous societies able to generate sustained economic and opportunity and in which citizens hold their governments accountable for the provision of security and basic services
- (2) Lessen suffering by ensuring better access by the poor to essential services and responding to crises, natural disasters, and conflict
- (3) Protect the global commons to better manage crises and transnational threats and challenges with systemic and asymmetric effects

IV. New, Practical Principles for How the U.S. Advances Development

- **Increase our understanding and impact.** Drive the policymaking process with rigorous analysis; set clear objectives and seek to measure the impact of our policies and programs; and use independent evaluation to build expertise, enhance accountability, drive innovation, and discard ineffective policies and models
- **Modernize, rationalize, and lead global architecture.** Assert U.S. leadership and commit U.S. resources to shaping multilateral institutions that we believe we need to confront collective challenges in development; reposition the U.S. to rely on these institutions by explicitly identifying those areas where we can and should rely largely or entirely on a multilateral capability
- **Do more with less.** Recognize the multiple roles the U.S. government can play in the development process and broaden our engagement well beyond assistance; determine which roles we should assume and which should be assumed by others and achieve a division of labor globally
- **Leverage U.S. commitments.** Ensure that in our actions and investments we are a force multiplier by partnering early, working multilaterally, and matching our investments with commitments by others
- **Focus our resources.** Narrow our commitments by countries or sectors to increase the likelihood of impact; commit greater resources for longer time periods with more predictability in places and in sectors where we can be catalytic
- **Ensure that policy drives budget.** Manage the budget process in such a way that policy priorities and merit drive allocations and decisions

Filipinos have been residing in the United States since the 1700s. Filipinos came to the United States as farm workers, members of the U.S. military, and professionals such as doctors and nurses. The largest migration of Filipinos occurred after the adoption of the 1965 Immigration Act, which abolished national origin quotas and permitted entry based on family reunification and occupational characteristics. The Filipino Census grew from 2,700 in 1910 to 122,000 in 1950, to 343,000 in the 1970's to 1.4 million in the 1990 and close to 2 million in the year 2000.

The 2000 Census indicates that there are approximately 1.86 million Filipinos residing in the U.S. that comprises 17.4% of the total Asian population. This community is the second largest compared to the Chinese at 2.4 million, who comprise 22.9% of the total Asian population. Total Asian American and Pacific Islander population of the U.S. is 10.6 million-- almost 4% of the overall US total population

The state with the largest number of Filipinos is California numbering at least 1 million. This is followed by Hawaii with close to 200,000 and the New York tri-state area (New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut), which is estimated to have at least 300,000. The next most populous states following in rank are Illinois, Texas, and Florida. The greater San Francisco Bay Area holds the largest city population in the U.S. mainland, which is estimated to number at least 500,000.

The Filipino-American community can be classified into four groups based on the length of time they have resided in the United States: American-borne; **newly arrived-5 years; 6-15 years; and 15+ years.**

Each group is characterized by traditional values, distinct interests, and their own rate of assimilating behavior to life in America. For **the newly arrived** to the immigrant who has lived in the United States for five years, ties to the Philippines remain strong and intact. The **6-15 year group** has acquired an acceptable sense of belonging in adapting to the lifestyle of the American mainstream. For the **15+ year group**, including the American-born Filipino, their habits are adapted to the American way of life both as a consumer and member of society. For this group, there is a clear distinction of personal relationships and affinity toward the Philippines and the United States.

Recent census figures estimate that Filipinos have a higher consumer-spending rate compared to other Asian groups. This is also balanced by a higher educational attainment by both males and females, which rank Filipinos within the top 3 alongside the Japanese and Indian communities in the Asian Pacific Islander (API) group. Close to 60 percent are estimated to hold professional

jobs while no higher than 30-40 percent hold blue-collar jobs. The Filipino average yearly income is estimated at a minimum of \$60,000—one of the highest among the API groups and by national average.

Political Overview

The previous U.S. election cycles have shown that Filipino Americans, much like Asian Americans lean towards the Democratic party and its presidential candidates.

In last year's election, 45% of Filipino Americans surveyed by the Asian American Legal Defense & Education Fund (AALDEF) were registered Democrats, and 25% of Filipino Americans were registered Republicans. Accordingly, 59% voted for President Obama, and 39% voted for Senator McCain, indicating that there might have been crossover voting. Similarly, in AALDEF's survey in 2004, 60% of Filipino Americans voted for Kerry, and 38% voted for Bush.

In the last midterm year (2006), three out of four Filipino Americans voted for Democratic candidates in their state's races. Filipino American have consistently identified economy and job creation as their most important issue for presidential candidates to address, followed closely by health care, foreign policy, education, and civil rights. In addition, Filipino Americans largely supported reducing immigration backlogs (89%) and supported a pathway to legalizing undocumented immigrants (89%), while they opposed criminalizing the undocumented (70%).

Filipinos do not have the strength in numbers as yet, though a growing minority amongst the Asian Pacific Islander (API) community. Nationally, the numbers do not translate into a powerful Filipino electorate; however, in local communities where Filipinos constitute 5-10% of the population, the community has grown to flex its political muscle at local school board, city council and county level elections.

Though the Census indicates that there are almost 2 million Filipino living in the United States, it is widely believed that Filipinos in the US are over and beyond 2 million in numbers. Due to undercount, multiple multi-racial categories, lack of outreach and education to the Filipino community, the census figures indicate a number that many believe to be low. Among the many consequences of this undercount is the smaller allocation of federal dollars that could be granted to Filipino social service based organizations besides the under represented visibility of the Filipino community.

As benefactors of the Civil Rights Act and the Voting Rights Act of the 1960's, America's anti-war movement in Vietnam, the cultural Americanization of the Filipino, and the explosion of Filipinos immigrating to the US during that period, Filipinos have begun to form a collective Filipino political identity at the beginning of the 21st century. Due to civic education and community participation, Filipinos have begun to form a collective Filipino political identity at the beginning of the 21st century. Due to civic education and community participation, Filipinos

have begun to interface and integrate with government, institutional, social, and economic processes. By doing so, this community is on track to empower itself politically and economically.

Filipinos continue to rekindle the *bayanihan* spirit in their new communities and their new homeland. Filipinos in America practice mutual support, cooperation and self-help in bringing about community activities and projects through their organizations like church, regional associations, alumni associations, cultural groups and professional clubs. Filipinos are flexible and adaptable – a reason why the community has been described as either the “silent minority” or the “sleeping giant”.

Association/Membership Organizations

The Offices of the Philippine Consulate General in the United States keep a list of membership groups and organizations in the Filipino-American community. These offices are located in San Francisco and Los Angeles, California; Honolulu, Hawaii; Houston, Texas; Chicago, Illinois and New York, New York. According to their general estimates, there are between 150 - 200 organizations in each of their areas of responsibility, which rounds to a total of at least 1,200 local community organizations in the United States.

The make-up of these organizations are the home country's provincial, city or region-based communities, except for a few clusters where they can be identified by professional and licensed affiliations, such as the medical, engineering, nursing, legal and business groups as well as interest, political and advocacy groups, like the local democratic or republican groups and the dozens of Filipino veterans' organizations

Filipinos Use of Internet and Social Networking

Filipinos and Filipino Americans, in their attempts to keep lines of communication open between the U.S. and the Philippines, have developed a strong aptitude for social networking and are extremely active to the point that the Philippines has been declared the “social networking capital of the world.” This comes on the heels of the Philippines' notoriety of the use of mobile messaging—People Power/EDSA II rallies, which led to the impeachment of former President Joseph Estrada, were mainly organized via text messaging. This adeptness at social networking comes from the culture of “*bayanihan*,” where extensive social circles are the means to personal fulfillment and professional and community advancement.

It is estimated that approximately 7.9 million Filipinos have access to and use the internet, and 6.9 million of those visit a social network at least once a month. Studies have shown that Filipinos are top photo and video uploaders, and are avid blog readers as well. Social networking

sites Friendster and Multiply cite that Filipinos are their most frequent and avid users, and have both launched Philippine sites. Facebook is also a top site, and steadily gaining Filipino users based on the usage among Filipino Americans.

Filipino and Filipino Americans' use of social networking in all aspects of their social, cultural, and political activities shows strong potential ahead. Usage indicates many possibilities for marketing and business opportunities, political education efforts, and public diplomacy efforts that skip the beleaguered Arroyo Administration and mainstream media, and deliver messages directly to Filipinos and Filipino Americans alike.

CURRENT POLICIES AND ISSUES IMPACTING THE FILIPINO-AMERICANS AND FILIPINOS IN THE PHILIPPINES

Filipino Veterans of World War II

During WWII, President Roosevelt called over 200,000 Filipino soldiers into service under the U.S. Armed Forces of the Far East. These brave warriors suffered some of the most grueling conditions of the war anywhere in the world, including the infamous Bataan Death March. After WWII, the U.S. Congress passed the 1946 Rescission Act that stripped Filipino veterans of their status as U.S. veterans. For nearly 63 years since, these soldiers have waged a different struggle for recognition of their service by the very government for whom they put on the uniform. Of the original 200,000 Filipino soldiers originally called to serve, only 18,000 are alive today.

Earlier this year as part of ARRA, Filipino WWII veterans' legislation was passed that provided these veterans with not only much needed support in their twilight years, but just as important for them is the recognition of their military service by this government. Under the new law, veterans living in the United States are entitled to a lump sum check in the amount of \$15,000 and veterans living in the Philippines are entitled to a lump sum check of \$9,000.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA) has begun to issue checks to veterans living in the Philippines and the United States. The DVA received an unprecedented number of applications. While DVA is processing the applications, some veterans have complained about the delay and confusion in getting their checks or finding out the status of their application. This program is being administered by the DVA in the Manila.

We ask that Secretary Clinton recognize the contributions of the veterans of World War II and invite them to join her at the wreath laying at the ceremony. We also ask that the Secretary commit to working with Secretary Shinseki of U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to make sure that checks are issued to those who qualify as quickly as possible.

Immigration

The majority of Filipinos immigrating to the United States do so through the family-based immigration system. In 2008 and 2009, 90 percent of immigrants from Asia came to the United States through family immigration.

Each year, the number of family members who apply for one of the visas through the family preference categories exceeds the number of visas available, meaning that family members must often wait years or even decades to reunite. More than 1.5 million qualifying family members of Asian Americans are estimated to be in these backlogs. According to the State Department

- November 2009 report, adult sons and daughters of U.S. citizens from the Philippines must wait 22 years to reunite with their family in the US and married sons and daughters of U.S. citizens must wait 18 years. This is untenable for a community that values family reunification.

In the employment-based immigration system, highly educated and skilled immigrants from the Philippines must wait up to six years before they can become lawful permanent residents. Unless a potential immigrant has a qualifying U.S. citizen or green card holder family member who can petition for them, or they have highly specialized skills and/or post-secondary education, it is virtually impossible to legally immigrate to the United States. As a result, the population of undocumented immigrants from Asia continues to rise. Undocumented immigrants are vulnerable and subject to abuses by employers and others.

We ask that Secretary Clinton express support for comprehensive immigration reform to reduce the backlog on family visas and to fix our broken immigration system.

Aid to Typhoon Victims in the Philippines

Typhoon "Ondoy" damaged some PhP11.060 billion in infrastructure and agriculture. A total of 1,295 school buildings were damaged including instructional materials and school equipment amounting to PhP 750 million. A total of 203,477 hectares of land incurred losses of about 329,230 metric tons of crops many of which were ready for second cropping harvest. Some 158,545 houses were lost or damaged and over 500 Filipinos lost their lives.

Many Filipino Americans organizations such as *Feed the Hungry* have raised money and donated goods to typhoon victims in the Philippines but have faced tremendous obstacles in getting assistance to the victims of the typhoon. The goods are taxed by the Philippines or not properly distributed to the victims.

We also want to emphasize the importance of rehabilitation work. Not only are we working towards ensuring that Filipino families get safely back into homes, Filipino orphans to receive proper care and guardianship, as well as receive the sufficient health care to ensure minimal suffering from the typhoons' aftermath; we also want to ensure that any aid from here on out includes resources for sustainable means of living for displaced families.

We ask that Secretary Clinton raise this issue with the Philippines government and ask for their support and assistance in providing this aid to typhoon victims.

Human Rights in the Philippines

In 2002, the Arroyo administration unleashed the counter-insurgency plan called Oplan Bantay Laya1 (OBL 1) ostensibly to curb the insurgency that has festered the country for decades. Unlike the previous programs however, this plan has been accused of targeting the legal,

democratic, civil society organizations which have been historically at the forefront of the protest movement in the country since martial law. Thus, allegedly under the Arroyo government, killings and disappearances of leaders and key members of people's organizations were committed by state security forces to silence the diverse groups who have been labeled and vilified as "communist fronts" or outright supporters of "rebel groups and communist organizations" before being killed.

The human rights group, *Karapatan*, has documented that the cases of killings began to rise in 2004, reaching its highest number in 2006 (end-year of OBL 1) with 220 victims. Trade union leaders, farmers, indigenous peoples, women, youth and activists, together with lawyers, judges and human rights workers and church people became victims of killings and enforced disappearances. The international community condemned these violations especially with the visit and findings of the UN special rapporteur, Prof. Philip Alston. Under Arroyo, from 2001 – September 2009 *Karapatan* documented a total of 1,048 victims of killings and 203 victims of enforced disappearance. From January to September 2009, *Karapatan* documentation revealed 53 victims of killings; some of them were abducted and found dead after some time of being abducted. Enforced disappearances continue to be committed with impunity. In Central Luzon, for example, the case of three persons abducted in May of this year became a big issue as the three were later freed from captivity and one of them, an **American citizen of Filipino descent, Melissa Roxas**, came out and told her ordeal of torture in the hands of her abductors whom she accused as military men.

We ask you raise these human rights issues with President Arroyo.

Philippine Presidential Elections

Filipino Americans are eligible for dual citizenship with the Philippines, which makes them eligible to vote in the upcoming national elections in May 2010. As a result, there is great interest among Filipino Americans in the upcoming elections. Filipino Americans are engaged in the national elections in the Philippines to ensure that the 2010 elections are fair and clean.

We ask that Secretary Clinton urge the Philippine government to commit to holding clean and fair elections.

We asked the small group to consider three broad sets of questions.

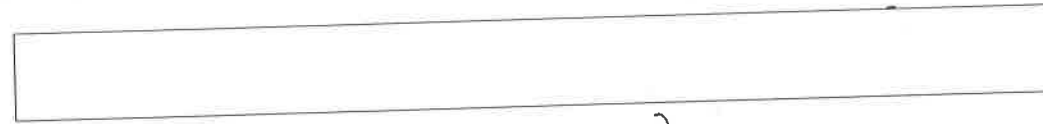

APPENDIX A

You asked for some thoughts on development diplomacy:

Many (most) development problems require more than money and technology. They require political power, whole-of-government approaches, tough choices by poor and rich countries alike, and a compact between them. Figuring out how to solve a problem is often the easy part. Building a political context in which that solution takes hold is often much more difficult.

Take agriculture and food security as an example (although obviously the same issues apply to almost all development problems).

The reason that much of the developing world has failed to ensure food security in this area over the past 25 years is not primarily because the west has failed to provide adequate money (despite what the FAO will tell you), or that development agencies haven't had enough agricultural specialists, or that international research hasn't provided the right seeds -- although all these things are required. Much more it is because developing country leaders have not prioritized rural development, have assumed that Ministries of Agriculture are the sole solution (which they aren't), have failed to allocate funds and smart people to key priorities, and have failed to show leadership in mobilizing all ministries towards a common goal of food security. It's also because leaders in rich and poor countries have failed to take the tough decisions to ensure that international and regional trade and investment systems are working properly.

Too often the G8 has seen its main contribution as announcing a few billion extra dollars (much of it repackaged money), on the implicit assumption that if there was only enough money the problem could be solved through aid programmes. This money is often essential, but will only yield results if flowing into the right environment.

Where does "development diplomacy" fit in? By bringing political, diplomatic and technical skills together it is possible to build political support for reform and to create a "compact" between rich and poor countries so that funds are provided in a way that honours leadership and example.

Thus, for example, to address food security in Africa we need much more than meetings of Agriculture ministers. We need Developing Country Presidents and Prime Ministers to bring their key Cabinet players to the table. We need Finance, Trade and Foreign Ministers to be on the same page, we need trade barriers to be brought down, the environment for private enterprise to be improved, micro-finance and safety net programmes to ensure buying power for the poor, trading infrastructure to be upgraded, and supplemental nutrition programmes working. Creating such a set of reinforcing synergies is very hard, and cannot be done by development specialists. It requires all hands on deck. As donor nations we need to use our political analysis to assess which leaders to invest in, and our sharpest diplomats to work with our best development professionals to build a political climate in Africa in order to maximise the prospects of success. If we really want to address a problem like food security, we need our top leaders to engage persistently with coalitions of leaders in developing countries (as Secretary Clinton did in New York after the Pittsburgh meeting). This then needs to be followed up tirelessly at all levels of government, using diplomatic networks in the same manner we would for political issues. This applies not just to developing

countries, of course, but equally to donor nations, which need to be persuaded to show commitment to modern country-led approaches to development assistance.

UK Experience.

In the UK we have found that our Foreign Office network has been invaluable in creating the political context for development breakthroughs. For example FCO lobbying capacity was vital in rallying support for the 2008 MDG Call to Action with both developed and developing countries to shore up commitments across a broad spectrum of players. They were also very valuable in building an environment for new approaches to health through the launch of the International Health partnership.

Other examples:

- using Ambassadors to engage at a high level to secure political support for high level campaigns (e.g. One Goal campaign on education with South Africa, Ghana and Brazil, achieving a political deal and buy in on global food security)
- in developing countries using FCO economics and governance analysis to inform DFID country plans
- using FCO missions to international institutions to achieve institutional reform objectives
- in fragile states using shared FCO and DFID understanding of the link between political settlements, state-building and core services to inform programming priorities and investment choices.

Public release will occur at the conclusion of the press conference, and at 1:00 PM EDT the Report will be available on the Internet at www.state.gov/g/drl/rls/irf. Assistant Secretary Posner will also speak at the Foreign Press Center at 1:30 PM EDT. Please see reftel for additional information on disseminating the reports at posts.

The country is an Islamic republic. Islam is the state religion, and the Constitution requires that laws be consistent with Islam. The Constitution states that "subject to law, public order, and morality, every citizen shall have the right to profess, practice, and propagate his religion;" in practice the Government imposes limits on freedom of religion. Freedom of speech is constitutionally, "subject to any reasonable restrictions imposed by law in the interest of the glory of Islam."

The Government took some steps to improve its treatment of religious minorities during the reporting period. The democratically elected Government appointed a Roman Catholic as Federal Minister for Minorities Affairs and upgraded his position to a cabinet minister. The Government allocated a 5 percent quota for religious minorities in all federal jobs, and directed provincial governments to implement the same at the provincial level. The Government also decided to celebrate Minorities' Day on August 11 every year nationwide. Despite these steps, serious problems remained. Law enforcement personnel abused religious minorities in custody. Security forces and other government agencies did not adequately prevent or address societal abuse against minorities. Discriminatory legislation and the Government's failure to take action against societal forces hostile to those who practice a different religious belief fostered religious intolerance, acts of violence, and intimidation against religious minorities. Specific laws that discriminate against religious minorities include anti-Ahmadi and blasphemy laws that provide the death penalty for defiling Islam or its prophets. The Ahmadiyya community continued to face governmental and societal discrimination and legal bars to the practice of its religious beliefs. Members of other Islamic sects also claimed governmental discrimination.

Relations between religious communities were tense. Societal discrimination against religious minorities was widespread, and societal violence against such groups occurred. Non-governmental actors, including terrorist and extremist groups and individuals, targeted religious congregations. A domestic insurgency led by Sunni Taliban elements increased acts of violence and intimidation against religious minorities and exacerbated existing sectarian tensions. An extremist insurgency increased its efforts to impose its extremist religious views on the majority. Extremists demanded that Muslims with progressive views, particularly women, follow a strict version of Islam and threatened dire consequences if they did not abide by it.

The U.S. Government discusses religious freedom with the Government as part of its overall policy to promote human rights. During the reporting period, U.S. Embassy officials closely monitored the treatment of religious minorities, worked to eliminate the teaching of religious intolerance, and encouraged amendment of the blasphemy laws.

Section I. Religious Demography

The country has an area of 310,527 square miles and a population of 173 million. Official figures on religious demography, based on the 1998 census, showed that approximately 97 percent of the population was Muslim. Groups comprising 2 percent of the population or less include Hindus, Christians, and others, including Ahmadis. The majority of Muslims in the country are Sunni, with a Shi'a minority of approximately 20 percent. According to the Ministry of Minorities Affairs, Sikhs have approximately 30,000 adherents and Buddhists 20,000. The number of Parsis (Zoroastrians), according to a Parsi community center in Karachi, dropped to 1,822 in 2009 as compared to 2,039 in June 2006. The Baha'i claimed that the number of Baha'is is growing in Pakistan, with approximately 30,000 adherents. The number of Ahmadis living in Pakistan, according to Jamaat-e-Ahmadiyya, is nearly 600,000, although it is difficult to establish an accurate estimate because Ahmadis, who are legally prohibited from identifying themselves as Muslims, generally choose to not identify themselves as non-Muslims. Some tribes in Balochistan and the North West Frontier Province (NWFP) practiced traditional animist religious beliefs; other religious groups include Kalasha, Kihals, and Jains.

Less than 0.5 percent of the population, as recorded in the 1998 census, was silent on religious affiliation or claimed not to adhere to a particular religious group. Social pressure was such that few persons would claim no religious affiliation.

No data were available on active participation in formal religious services or rituals. Religious beliefs often played an important part in daily life. Most Muslims offered prayers on Fridays, Islam's holy day. Many prayed daily. During the month of Ramadan, even less observant Muslims fasted and attended services. Approximately 70 percent of English-speaking Roman Catholics worshiped regularly; a much lower percentage of Urdu-speaking Catholics did so. Attendance at Hindu and Sikh religious services increased during festivals.

Section II. Status of Government Respect for Religious Freedom**Legal/Policy Framework**

The Constitution establishes Islam as the state religion. It also declares that adequate provisions shall be made for minorities to profess and practice their religious beliefs freely; however, the Government imposes limits on freedom of religion, particularly on Ahmadis.

A 1974 constitutional amendment declares that Ahmadis are non-Muslims. Section 298(c), commonly referred to as the "anti-Ahmadi laws," prohibits Ahmadis from calling themselves Muslims, referring to their religious beliefs as Islam, preaching or propagating their religious beliefs, inviting others to accept Ahmadi teachings, or insulting the religious feelings of Muslims. The punishment for violation of the Section is imprisonment for up to three years and a fine. Other religious communities were generally free to observe their religious obligations; however, religious minorities are legally restricted from public display of certain religious images and, due to discriminatory legislation and social pressure, are often afraid to profess freely their religious beliefs.

Freedom of speech is subject to "reasonable" restrictions in the interest of the "glory of Islam." The consequences for contravening the country's blasphemy laws are death for defiling Islam or its prophets; life imprisonment for defiling, damaging, or desecrating the Qur'an; and 10 years' imprisonment for insulting another's religious feelings. Some individuals bring charges under these laws to settle personal scores or to intimidate vulnerable Muslims, sectarian opponents, and religious minorities. Under the Anti-Terrorism Act, any action, including speech, intended to incite religious hatred is punishable by up to seven years' imprisonment. Under the act, bail is not to be granted if the judge has reasonable grounds to believe the accused is guilty; however, the bail provision of the law is selectively applied.

Any speech or conduct that injures another's religious feelings, including those of minority religious groups, is prohibited and punishable by imprisonment. In cases in which a minority group claimed its religious feelings were insulted, however, the blasphemy laws were rarely enforced, and cases were rarely brought to the legal system. A 2005 law requires that a senior police official investigate any blasphemy charge before a complaint is filed. According to nongovernmental organizations (NGOs), this law was not uniformly enforced.

The Penal Code incorporates a number of Islamic law (Shari'a) provisions. The judicial system encompasses several different court systems with overlapping and sometimes competing jurisdictions that reflect differences in civil, criminal, and

Islamic jurisprudence. The Federal Shari'a Court and the Shari'a bench of the Supreme Court serve as appellate courts for certain convictions in criminal court under the Hudood Ordinance, which criminalizes rape, extramarital sex, property crimes, alcohol, and gambling; judges and attorneys in these courts must be Muslim. The Federal Shari'a Court may overturn any legislation judged inconsistent with the tenets of Islam. In March 2005, however, the Supreme Court Chief Justice ruled that the Federal Shari'a Court had no jurisdiction to review a decision by a provincial high court even if the Federal Shari'a Court should have had initial appellate jurisdiction.

Criminal law allows offenders to offer monetary restitution to victims and allows victims to carry out physical retribution rather than seeking punishment through the court system. The "Qisaas and Diyat" law calls for either providing retribution for murder and other violent crimes (Qisaas) or compensation money to the victim of the crime (Diyat). Religious minorities claimed that the amounts of monetary restitution were far higher for minority offenders and far lower for minority victims than for Muslims.

The 2006 Women's Protection Bill amended the Hudood Ordinance and moved cases of rape and adultery to secular rather than Shari'a courts. Previously, the Hudood Ordinance often relied on harsh and discriminatory interpretations of Qur'anic standards of evidence and punishment that applied equally to Muslims and non-Muslims. If Qur'anic standards are used, Muslim and non-Muslim and male and female testimony carry different weight. Approximately 2,500 women have been released from prison since former President Musharraf ordered the release of all women imprisoned under the Hudood Ordinance. Many were unable to return to their homes because of social ostracism. A few others remained in custody, and most were housed in government-run shelters. The women, who were originally arrested under the Hudood Ordinance on charges of fornication, adultery, and possession of liquor, are now having their cases heard under the Women's Protection Bill. According to the Society for Human Rights and Prisoners Aid, the number of adultery-related cases against women considerably dropped during 2008-09.

The Government designates religious affiliation on passports and requests religious information in national identity card applications. A citizen must have a national identity card to vote. Those wishing to be listed as Muslims must swear their belief that the Prophet Muhammad is the final prophet and denounce the Ahmadiyya movement's founder as a false prophet and his followers as non-

Muslims, a provision designed to discriminate against Ahmadis. As a result, Ahmadis continued to boycott elections.

The Constitution provides for "freedom to manage religious institutions." In principle, the Government does not restrict organized religious groups from establishing places of worship and training members of the clergy. In practice, however, religious minorities suffered from restrictions of this right. District-level authorities consistently refused to grant permission to construct non-Muslim places of worship, especially for Ahmadiyya and Baha'i communities, citing the need to maintain public order. There is no official restriction on the construction of Ahmadiyya places of worship; however, Ahmadis are forbidden from calling them mosques. District governments often refuse to grant Ahmadis permission to hold events publicly; therefore, they hold their meetings in members' homes. The Government can shut down these gatherings if neighbors report hearing the recitation of Qur'anic verses.

The Government provides funding for construction and maintenance of mosques and for Islamic clergy. The provincial and federal governments have legal responsibility for certain religious properties belonging to minority communities that were abandoned during the partition of Pakistan and India in 1947. Minority communities claimed the Government did not spend adequate funds on the protection and upkeep of those properties. The Government collected a 2.5 percent tax (zakat) on all Sunni Muslims and distributed the funds to Sunni mosques, madrassahs, and charities. No similar requirement was imposed on other religious groups.

Government policies do not afford equal protection to members of majority and minority religious groups. The Ministry of Religious Affairs, Zakat, and Ushr, which is primarily responsible for organizing participation in the Hajj and other Islamic religious pilgrimages, in addition to safeguarding religious freedom, claims it spends 30 percent of its annual budget to assist indigent minorities, repair minority places of worship, establish minority-run small development projects, and celebrate minority festivals. Religious minorities questioned these figures, observing that localities and villages that are home to minority citizens go without basic civic amenities. The Ministry has on its masthead a Qur'anic verse: "Islam is the only religion acceptable to God."

The Ministry of Minorities Affairs, a stand-alone ministry since 2004, has the "aim to protect the rights of minorities as envisaged under the 1973 Constitution of Pakistan." In November 2008 Shahbaz Bhatti, a Roman Catholic, was appointed

Federal Minister for Minorities' Affairs in a move the Christian community and other religious groups throughout Pakistan welcomed. This was the first time the position had received the stature of a cabinet minister; in the past, the portfolio for minorities was entrusted to a lower-ranking official working under another federal minister.

The Government observes Islamic holy days as national holidays.

The Constitution safeguards "educational institutions with respect to religion." No student can be forced to receive religious instruction or participate in religious worship other than his or her own. The denial of religious instruction for students of any religious community or denomination is also prohibited.

Islamiyyat (Islamic studies) is compulsory for all Muslim students in state-run schools. Although students of other religious groups are not legally required to study Islam, they are not offered parallel studies in their own religious beliefs. In some schools non-Muslim students may study Akhlaqiyyat, or Ethics.

The Constitution specifically prohibits discriminatory admission to any governmental educational institution solely based on religious affiliation. Government officials stated that the only factors affecting admission to government educational institutions were students' grades and home provinces; however, students must declare their religious affiliation on application forms. This declaration is also required for private educational institutions, including universities. Muslim students must declare in writing that they believe that the Prophet Muhammad is the final prophet, another measure that singles out Ahmadis. Non-Muslims must have their religious affiliation verified by the head of their local religious community.

Parents may send children to religious schools, at the family's expense. Private schools are free to teach or not to teach religious studies as they choose.

Islamic schools, or madrassahs, are traditional institutions for Muslims seeking a purely religious education. In many rural communities, madrassahs are the only form of education available. In recent years some madrassahs have taught extremist doctrine in support of terrorism. In an attempt to curb the spread of extremism, the 2002 Madrassah Registration Ordinance requires all madrassahs to register with one of the five independent boards (wafaqs), cease accepting foreign financing, and accept foreign students only with the consent of their government. Approximately 15,725 madrassahs had registered by the end of the reporting

period; however, many civil society organizations and education experts disputed the statistics on the number of registered and unregistered madrassahs.

A 2005 framework for cooperative registration of madrassahs, including provision of financial and educational data and a prohibition on the teaching of sectarian or religious hatred and violence, remained stalled due to political upheaval and jurisdictional battles within the previous government. The Government and the independent madrassah boards had agreed to a phased introduction to all madrassahs of secular subjects, including mathematics, English, and science. The civilian government that took office in 2008 listed madrassah reform as a priority.

The Government announced, but has not approved, a uniform curriculum for madrassahs, with a more secular tone. The Chief Secretary of the Federal Madrassah Board (Wafaq-ul-Madaris), Maulana Mohammad Hanif Jalandhri, opposed this policy in April 2009, stating that no interference by the Government would be tolerated and no revision of madrassah curriculum would be accepted without consultation and approval of the Board.

All wafaqs continued to mandate the elimination of teaching that promoted religious or sectarian intolerance, and terrorist or extremist recruitment at madrassahs. Inspectors mandated that affiliated madrassahs supplement religious studies with secular subjects. Wafaqs also restricted foreign private funding of madrassahs. Examination concerns remained under active discussion with the Government. Some unregistered and Deobandi-controlled madrassahs in the Federally Administered Tribal Areas (FATA), Karachi, and northern Balochistan continued to teach extremism. Similarly, the Dawa schools, run by Jamaat-ud-Dawa, a charitable front for the banned Lashkar-e-Tayyiba, continued such teaching and recruitment for Lashkar-e-Tayyiba, a designated foreign terrorist organization. Following the November 2008 terrorist attacks in Mumbai, India, attributed to Lashkar-e-Tayyiba, the government of the province of Punjab took over management of several Jamaat-ud-Dawa institutions.

In an effort to end Taliban violence in the Swat valley, the NWFP government, led by the Awami National Party (ANP), concluded a peace deal in February 2009 with extremist organization Tehrik-e-Nifaz-e-Shariat-e-Mohammadi (TNSM) that included a commitment to implement the Nizam-e-Adl Regulation (NAR) in the Malakand division of the NWFP. In April 2009 President Asif Ali Zardari signed the NAR, making it effective. Based on previous attempts in 1994 and 1998 to establish Shari'a (interpreted locally as "swift justice"), the NAR establishes limits for deciding civil and criminal cases, re-creates qazi (religious judges) chosen by

the state, and establishes a local appeals court whose judges are selected by the Peshawar High Court. Civil society in general and the minority religious community in particular expressed concern about the effects of creating an alternative religious-based system of justice in Swat. NAR defenders pointed out that, under the Constitution, all laws must already conform to Islam. In this respect the NAR is not a new regulation.

The deal was signed with the expectation that local militants would disarm in return for the implementation of Shari'a through the NAR. After the President signed the NAR, however, the militants refused to disarm, and extended their patrols to Buner District of the Malakand Division. Amid growing incidents of violence by the militants, the army launched a military operation on April 26, 2009, resulting in the largest mass migration in the country's history since partition and clearing much of the territory claimed by the Taliban.

At the end of the reporting period, the army was completing operations in Malakand, and the area was back in the control of the NWFP government, but the NAR had not yet been implemented.

The Government does not restrict religious publishing in general; however, the sale of Ahmadi religious literature is banned. The law prohibits publishing any criticism of Islam or its prophets or insults to another's religious beliefs.

The Government, at its most senior levels, continued to call for interfaith dialogue and sectarian harmony to promote moderation, tolerance, and minority rights.

The Government does not prohibit, restrict, or punish parents for raising children in accordance with religious teachings and practices of their choice, nor did it take steps to prevent parents from teaching their children religious instruction in the privacy of the home.

There are no legal requirements for an individual to practice or affiliate nominally with a religious group; however, the Constitution requires that the President and Prime Minister be Muslims. All senior officials, including members of Parliament, must swear an oath to protect the country's Islamic identity. Government employees are not prohibited from displaying or practicing any elements of their religious beliefs.

Missionaries (except Ahmadis) are permitted in the country and can proselytize, as long as there is no preaching against Islam and the missionaries acknowledge they

are not Muslim. Missionaries are required to have specific visas valid from two to five years and are allowed one entry into the country per year. Only "replacement" visas for those taking the place of departing missionaries were available, and long delays and bureaucratic problems were common.

In accordance with the Anti-Terrorism Act, the Government banned activities of and membership in several religious extremist and terrorist groups. The Anti-Terrorism Act allows the Government to use special streamlined courts to try violent crimes, terrorist activities, acts or speech designed to foment religious hatred, and crimes against the state; however, many of the groups that the Government banned remained active.

The Government does not recognize either civil or common law marriage. Marriages are performed and registered according to one's religious group. The marriages of non-Muslim men remain legal upon conversion to Islam. If a non-Muslim female converts to Islam, and her marriage was performed according to her previous religious beliefs, the marriage is considered dissolved. Children born to Hindu or Christian women who convert to Islam after marriage are considered illegitimate unless their husbands also convert. The only way the marriage can be legitimated and the children made eligible for inheritance is for the husband to convert to Islam. The children of a Muslim man and a Muslim woman who both convert to another religious group are considered illegitimate, and the Government can take custody of the children.

The Government did not restrict the formation of political parties based on a particular religious group, religious belief, or interpretation of religious doctrine. The Government monitored the activities of various Islamist parties and affiliated clergy due to prior links to terrorist and extremist organizations. There are reserved seats for religious minority members in both the national and provincial assemblies. The seats are allocated to the political parties on a proportional basis determined by their overall representation in the assembly. The National Assembly has 10 members of minority religious groups, and minorities are represented in most tiers of local government, including union councils, tehsil councils, and district councils. Minorities were also elected to the provincial assemblies: three non-Muslims in the NWFP, eight in Punjab, nine in Sindh, and three in Balochistan.

Restrictions on Religious Freedom

The Government generally enforced existing legal restrictions on religious freedom.

Since 1983 Ahmadis have been prohibited from holding public conferences or gatherings and from holding their annual conference. Ahmadis are banned from preaching and were prohibited from traveling to Saudi Arabia for the Hajj or other religious pilgrimages. Ahmadiyya publications are banned from public sale, but they published religious literature in large quantities for a limited circulation.

The Constitution guarantees the right to establish places of worship and train clergy, but in practice these rights were restricted for Ahmadis. According to media reports, authorities continued to conduct surveillance on Ahmadis and their institutions. Several Ahmadiyya mosques reportedly were closed; others reportedly were desecrated or their construction was stopped.

Public pressure routinely prevented courts from protecting minority rights and forced judges to take strong action against any perceived offense to Sunni orthodoxy. Discrimination charges against religious minorities were rarely brought before the judiciary. According to several NGOs, cases against Christians and Ahmadis continued to increase during the reporting period; however, the judiciary, even at the lower levels, acted more judiciously in dealing with these cases as compared with previous reporting periods. NGOs reported that cases against both the local Christian and Hindu communities continued but to a lesser degree and that social discrimination remained at high levels. There was generally a long period between filing a case and the first court appearance. Lower courts were frequently subject to intimidation, delayed issuing decisions, and refused bail for fear of reprisal from extremist elements. Original trial courts usually denied bail in blasphemy cases, arguing that defendants facing the death penalty were likely to flee. As with the majority of cases in the country, many defendants appealed the denial of bail, but bail was often not granted in advance of the trial.

In contrast to previous reporting periods, there were no reports of district governments restricting the distribution and display of certain religious images, such as the Holy Trinity and Jesus Christ. Such images were openly displayed and sold in Christian communities.

Religious belief or specific adherence to a religious group was not required for membership in the ruling party or the moderate opposition parties. All political parties, except religious parties, had a separate minority wing.

Foreign books must pass government censors before being reprinted. Books and magazines were imported freely but were subject to censorship for objectionable sexual or religious content.

The Government sometimes funded and facilitated Hajj travel but had no similar program for pilgrimages by religious minorities. Due to the passport requirements to list religious affiliation and denounce the Ahmadi prophet, Ahmadis were restricted from going on the Hajj because they were unable to declare themselves as Muslims. Due to the fact that the Government does not recognize Israel, religious believers regardless of religious affiliation were unable to travel to Israel on pilgrimage. This especially affected Baha'is, since the Baha'i World Centre, the spiritual and administrative heart of the community, is located in northern Israel.

Although discrimination continued to exist, particularly against Hindus, during the reporting period, there were no reports of discrimination against Ahmadis and Christians when they applied for entry to universities and medical schools. During this period, Shi'a leaders said they were not subjected to discrimination in hiring for the civil service or admission to government institutions of higher learning.

Promotions for all minority groups appeared limited within the civil service. These problems were particularly acute for Ahmadis, who contended that a "glass ceiling" prevented their promotion to senior positions and that certain government departments refused to hire or retain qualified Ahmadis. The Government discriminated against some groups, such as Ahl-e-Hadith and Barelvi, in hiring clergy for government mosques and faculty members for Islamic government colleges.

Members of minority religious groups volunteered for military service in small numbers, and there were no official obstacles to their advancement; however, in practice non-Muslims rarely rose above the rank of colonel and were not assigned to politically sensitive positions. A chaplaincy corps provided services for Muslim soldiers, but no similar services were available for religious minorities.

The public school curriculum included derogatory remarks in textbooks against minority religious groups, particularly Ahmadis, Hindus, and Jews, and the teaching of religious intolerance was widespread. The Government continued to revise curriculum to eliminate such teachings and remove Islamic overtones from secular subjects.

Officials used bureaucratic demands and bribes to delay religious groups trying to build houses of worship or obtain land. Although Ahmadis were prevented from building houses of worship, Sunni Muslim groups built mosques and shrines without government permission, at times in violation of zoning ordinances and on government-owned lands.

Abuses of Religious Freedom

Police reportedly tortured and mistreated those in custody and at times engaged in extrajudicial killings. It was usually impossible to ascertain whether adherence to particular religious beliefs was a factor in cases in which religious minorities were victims; however, both Christian and Ahmadiyya communities claimed their members were more likely to be abused. Non-Muslim prisoners generally were accorded poorer facilities than Muslim inmates, including lack of access to spiritual resources. Conversion to other minority religious groups generally took place in secret to avoid societal backlash.

Ahmadiyya leaders claimed the Government used sections of the Penal Code against their members for religious reasons. Authorities often accused converts to the Ahmadiyya community of blasphemy, violations of anti-Ahmadi laws, or other crimes. The Government used anti-Ahmadi laws to target and harass Ahmadis. The vague wording of the provision that forbids Ahmadis from directly or indirectly identifying themselves as Muslims enabled officials to bring charges against Ahmadis for using the standard Muslim greeting and for naming their children Muhammad. According to the Rabwah-based Jamaat-e-Ahmadiya, as of April 2009, 88 Ahmadis faced criminal charges under religious laws or because of their religious beliefs: 18 under blasphemy laws, 68 under Ahmadi-specific laws, and two under other clauses.

According to data provided by Ahmadiyya leaders, at the end of the reporting period, 12 Ahmadis were in prison, of whom one was facing life imprisonment, three were facing death sentences, five had been arrested under blasphemy charges, and three others were awaiting trial. Most of the arrests took place in Rabwah, Kotli, Nankana Sahib, Kotri, and Sargodha. The Ahmadiyya community claimed the arrests were groundless and based on the detainees' religious beliefs. Several criminal cases, ranging from killings to destruction of property, were filed against prominent members of the Ahmadiyya community during the reporting period. The cases remained unprosecuted, and the accused were allowed to post bail.

On June 30, 2009, a fistfight erupted into an alleged incident of blasphemy that sparked a mob attack on a Christian community in the district of Kasur, Punjab, prompting 700 persons to flee their homes. Federal Minister for Minorities Affairs Shahbaz Bhatti offered compensation to the affected families. Several NGOs remained concerned about the incident.

On June 23, 2009, Compass Direct News reported that police imprisoned Arshad Masih, a Christian man from Gujranwala, in Sialkot jail and abused him in custody. Reportedly, police abused Masih because his father was a Christian preacher. Although he was officially charged with robbery, he was later granted bail on the strength of testimony that he was not among the robbers. Due to the physical abuse he suffered in custody, he was sent to the Allama Iqbal Memorial Hospital. According to Compass Direct News, authorities allegedly ordered him to be silent about the abuse.

On May 28, 2009, Mian Laiq Ahmad, an Ahmadi trader in Faisalabad, died after unknown assailants brutally attacked him. According to Jamaat-e-Ahmadiyya, he was the fifth Ahmadi killed in 2009 and the 101st killed since anti-Ahmadi laws were introduced in 1984.

In May 2009 two students of a seminary in Chakwal, Punjab, entered the home of an Ahmadi, Mubashir Ahmed, and tried to behead him. Neighbors intervened and saved his life, but he was severely injured. One student was caught and brought to a local police station and the other escaped. Police booked a case and were trying to find the other assailant.

On April 17, 2009, authorities released from prison Catholics James Masih and Buta Masih, who were convicted of blasphemy and sentenced to 10 years in prison in November 2006 for allegedly burning a Qur'an.

On March 4, 2009, 15 Ahmadis were charged under Section 298c of the Penal Code for calling their place of worship a mosque and for offering Eid prayers there. They were also charged with posing as Muslims. According to reports, the arrests were the result of a business dispute.

A 17-year-old student, Naveed Aziz, and Pastor Shafiq Masih were accused of blasphemy in January 2009 when a fellow student noticed "blasphemous material" in Aziz's bag.

In January 2009 police arrested four Ahmadi teenagers and an adult in Layyah, Punjab, on charges of blasphemy. Because there was no supporting evidence, the accused were not indicted; however, they remain incarcerated more than five months after their arrest. Some local clerics reportedly attempted to incite communal tensions following the incident. Allegedly, a local Member of the National Assembly from the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz party, Saqlain Shah, provided political support for the agitation. At the federal level, the Ministry of Minorities Affairs tried to win the release of the teenagers but had not succeeded by the end of the reporting period.

In January 2009 police arrested Hector Aleem in Rawalpindi on charges of sending a blasphemous text message from his cell phone. After a hearing by an antiterrorism court, Aleem, who is a member of an agency that works for Christians' rights, was cleared of the blasphemy charges but not of abetting a crime. A government official told Compass Direct News the decision was heavily influenced by religious extremists telling the judge, "If you release him (Aleem), then we will kill him outside."

In January 2009 an Ahmadi shopkeeper, Saeed Ahmed, was shot and killed in Kotri, Sindh Province. Ahmed was killed because of his faith, a spokesman for the Ahmadiyya community claimed in a press release.

In September 2008 authorities arrested 10 Ahmadis under Ahmadi-specific sections of the Penal Code. On October 11, 2008, eight more Ahmadis were arrested using the same case number and under the same sections of the code.

The Punjab provincial government permitted Muslim religious leaders to hold an anti-Ahmadi conference in Rabwah on September 7, 2008, on the anniversary of the constitutional amendment that declared Ahmadis as non-Muslims.

In 2008, an antiterrorism court acquitted five persons who were arrested for the 2005 attack on Ahmadi worshippers in Mandi Bahauddin, Punjab that resulted in the killing of eight and injuring of 20.

In March 2008, police arrested Ahmadi Altaf Husain in Kabeerwala on charges of desecrating the Qur'an. Altaf Hussain was released in July 2008 by a District Court in Khanewal, Punjab.

There was no update in the January 2008 arrest of an Ahmadi in Wazirabad, Punjab, on charges of distributing Ahmadi-related pamphlets. He was granted bail in March 2008 and forced to leave the area after receiving numerous death threats.

In January 2008 police in Nankana Sahib, Punjab, charged an Ahmadi businessman, Manzur Ahmed, with destroying pages that included religious inscriptions. At the end of the reporting period, he remained behind bars for destruction of holy material.

In September 2007 police accused Mumtaz Ali, an Ahmadi, of subscribing to, receiving, and subsequently distributing the newsletter of the local Ahmadiyya community. He was taken into police custody for 10 days and released because of his age. He died in October 2007, but police refused to drop the charges and threatened his family with imprisonment if the household continued to receive the newsletter. The family has left Rajan Pur, Punjab, and moved to a different city.

In November 2007 three Ahmadis were arrested in Sargodha, Punjab, on charges of proselytizing when they invited other locals to their places of worship. They were given bail in mid-February 2008. There was no update on this case at the end of the reporting period.

In December 2007 Larkana police arrested 21 Ahmadis on charges of gathering and worshipping like Muslims after neighbors told the police that they heard Islamic verses being recited in the home of one of the members. All involved were released by the end of the reporting period.

Authorities routinely used blasphemy laws to harass religious minorities and vulnerable Muslims and to settle personal scores or business rivalries. Authorities detained and convicted individuals on spurious charges. Judges and magistrates, seeking to avoid confrontation with or violence from extremists, often continued trials indefinitely.

According to the National Commission for Justice and Peace (NCJP), in 2008 at least 75 persons were victimized in 24 cases registered under the blasphemy laws. Punjab had the largest share, with 67 percent of the blasphemy allegations and cases registered; 21 percent of the cases were reported in Sindh. Of the 75 persons, 26 were identified as Muslims, six Christians, and two Hindus. The number of Ahmadis is unknown. In addition to the Ahmadis charged in 2008, police charged the entire Ahmadi populations in Rabwah and Kotli with blasphemy in June 2008 for celebrating 100 years of Caliph-ship and constructing a mosque for the

community. The NCJP stated: "Generally we do not request bail because of security. Blasphemy suspects are often safest in prison under police protection."

On June 18, 2008, Mohammad Shafeeq Latif was sentenced to death for blasphemy after he allegedly defiled the Qur'an and used derogatory language to refer to the Prophet Mohammad. Shafeeq was arrested in 2006. He remained jailed in Sialkot, Punjab.

In June 2008 six Ahmadis were arrested and charged with blasphemy in Kotri, Sindh. The arrests took place after a dispute over construction of an Ahmadiyya prayer center and protests from mullahs of Tahaffuz Khatam-e-Nabuwwat, an anti-Ahmadiyya religious clerical group.

According to Compass Direct News, in May 2008 police arrested Robin Sardar, a Christian, after a mob attacked his home in Punjab because he had allegedly committed blasphemy. Sardar, who denied the charges, was held in Punjab's Gujranwala Central Jail. His wife and six children abandoned their home for fear of new attacks. According to reports, local Islamist groups threatened to kill Sardar if he was acquitted. On November 4, 2008, Sardar was released after his accuser indicated there had been a misunderstanding.

In May 2008 Muslims filed a blasphemy case against Pastor Frank John when he was conducting a religious convention at Green Town Christian Colony, Lahore, Punjab. When Christians gathered for the convention, local Muslims stated that no one would be allowed to use the speakers for prayers. The police filed a first information report (FIR) against the pastor on May 3, 2008. Pastor John was not arrested, although tensions between the Christian and Muslim communities remained.

In April 2008 in the Karachi Korangi Industrial Area, employees beat to death Jagdesh Kumar, a Hindu employee, after he allegedly made blasphemous comments against Islam. Factory guards attempted to save Jagdesh by taking him into protective custody, and a small contingent of police was called. The Karachi police superintendent later suspended the police officers after it was determined they did not take the appropriate actions to save the employee's life.

By the end of the reporting period, a case had been registered against Abdul Malik, a resident of Burewala, Punjab, for making derogatory remarks against the Prophet Muhammad in September 2007, but he had not been arrested. Islamic

organizations staged several protests throughout Lahore, demanding that Malik be arrested and punished for the alleged blasphemy.

Younis Masih, a Christian, remained under a death sentence on blasphemy charges for allegedly insulting the Prophet Muhammad during a dispute with a Muslim cleric about loud music accompanying a nighttime religious ceremony. In May 2007, the district court in Lahore sentenced Masih to death. The case was on appeal at the end of the reporting period.

At the end of the reporting period, Sattar Masih, a Catholic Christian beaten by a mob and arrested by police in 2007 for allegedly writing blasphemous words against the Prophet Muhammad, remained in prison. Police reportedly tortured him in prison to obtain a confession.

At the end of the reporting period, Salamat Masih remained in prison and his family in hiding after officials accused him and four members of his family, all Christians from Toba Tek Singh, of desecrating papers bearing the Prophet Muhammad's name in 2007.

In March 2007 a mob of Muslims attacked Amanat Masih, a Christian, for allegedly desecrating the Qur'an. Police arrested Masih for blasphemy. At the end of the reporting period, he remained in prison.

In September 2006 police arrested five Ahmadis working for an Ahmadiyya publication, *Al Fazl*, on blasphemy charges. According to Jamaat-e-Ahmadiyya, all were released but police gave them strict warnings to stop publishing. The provincial and district governments were pressured to shut down the publication activities of all Punjabi Ahmadis after this case.

In July 2006 courts released on bail Hafiz Afzal Rehman and Haji Latif, who had been held in a Lahore prison on blasphemy charges since 2004. Their trials were pending, and both men were on bail with no hearings set at the end of the reporting period.

Minority communities claimed the Government was complicit in seizures of their property by Muslims and that the policy of dismantling illegal slum settlements disproportionately targeted minority communities. These groups also accused the Government of inaction in cases of attacks by extremist groups on places of worship that belonged to minority groups.

There were no updates on the July 2007 case of a Chinese Uighur Muslim who was reportedly detained and forcibly returned to China. There were no reports that the individual was arrested because of his religious beliefs. There were credible reports that the Government of China has tortured and executed Uighur Muslims who have been forcibly returned.

The Government did not subject individuals to forced labor or enslavement based on religious beliefs; however, minority community leaders charged that the Government failed to take adequate action to prevent bonded labor in the brickmaking and agricultural sectors. Christians and Hindus were disproportionately victims of this illegal practice.

Forced Religious Conversion

Forced and coerced conversions of religious minorities to Islam occurred at the hands of societal actors. Religious minorities claimed government actions to stem the problem were inadequate. Representatives of the Hindu community in Sindh claim 15 to 20 Hindu families per year were subject to forced conversion (usually related to familial debts). Human rights groups highlighted the increased phenomenon of local actors kidnapping young Hindu women, particularly in Karachi and other parts of Sindh, forcing them to convert to Islam, and then forcing them to marry their kidnappers.

In September 2007 Muhammad Ramzan abducted Tahira Salamat, a Christian from Multan, forced her to convert to Islam and then to marry him. At the end of the reporting period, Salamat was living with Ramzan, and the Lahore High Court had closed the original case against Ramzan. According to the NCJP, the case was withdrawn after Salamat submitted statements that she had willingly converted and was living with her husband without any pressure.

In April 2009 a minority minister in the Sindh Assembly claimed 18 Hindu women had been abducted and forced to convert to Islam, and that one of them was allegedly killed.

According to NCJP, several cases of forced conversion and abduction were reported in Punjab Province in Faisalabad, Lahore, and Gujranwala. Of the 39 women who were abducted and forced to convert in 2008, 34 cases occurred in Lahore alone, as recorded by the NCJP. A majority of these women were Christian, and two were Hindus.

On March 29, 2009, Sana, a Christian woman, was abducted, raped, and forcibly converted to Islam in Sainwala, Punjab.

There were no reports of forced religious conversion, including of minor U.S. citizens who had been abducted or illegally removed from the United States or who had not been allowed to be returned to the United States.

Persecution by Terrorist Organizations

There were several incidents involving the abuse of religious groups by individuals or organizations designated as terrorist organizations by the U.S. Secretary of State under Section 219 of the Immigration and Nationality Act and by armed sectarian extremist groups with strong links to such organizations.

Sectarian violence continued in different parts of the country during the reporting period, with attacks on the Shi'a minority, particularly in D.I. Khan, Quetta, Tank, D.G. Khan, Gilgit, and Kurram Agency.

Throughout the reporting period, attacks, threats, and violence by Islamic extremists increased across the country, especially in the NWFP.

More than 300 Sikh families left the Malakand and Swat valley area in the wake of ongoing military operations. Most of the displaced families took refuge in Gurdwara Punja Sahib in Hasanabdal. There are approximately 6,000 Sikhs in Swat, the second largest minority (after Christians) in the restive valley.

Targeted assassinations of clergy remained a key tactic of several groups, including banned sectarian organization Sipah-i-Sahaba (SSP), terrorist organization Lashkar-i-Jhangvi (LJ), and sectarian organizations Sunni Tehrike (ST) and Sipah-i-Mohammad Pakistan (SMP). SSP and LJ targeted both Shi'a and Barelvis, whereas ST and SMP targeted Deobandis.

Throughout the reporting period, there were numerous reports of Islamic militant attacks on barber shops and stores selling music in the NWFP and FATA.

LJ continued attacks on houses of worship and religious gatherings during the reporting period.

Al-Qa'ida-linked organizations maintained networks in the country, and its supporters periodically issued anti-Semitic statements.

On June 12, 2009, a suicide bomber attacked a mosque in Nowshera during Friday prayers, killing 10 and injuring 100 persons. On the same day, Dr. Mufti Sarfraz Naeemi and five others were killed in a suicide bomb blast at Jamia Naeemia in Lahore. Seven others were injured in the attack. According to news reports on the cleric's killing, Naeemi's followers believed he was targeted because of his vocal support of military operations against the Taliban whom he publicly opposed.

On June 5, 2009, a suicide attack at a mosque in Upper Dir killed 42 and injured 70 persons.

On June 2, 2009, Lashkar-i-Islam imposed a fee on all Sikhs, Hindus, and Christians of approximately \$12 (1,000 rupees) per year.

On April 15, 2009, the Supreme Court granted bail to Maulana Aziz, brother of Red Mosque leader Abdul Rashid Ghazi and prayer leader at the time of the 2007 confrontation between militants and the army. Aziz was awaiting trial on 27 charges ranging from abetting terrorists to illegally occupying a building. On May 2, 2009, media reported that the Capital Development Authority (CDA) allotted 12 acres of land in Islamabad for reconstruction of the Jamia Hafsa seminary, which had been demolished during the military operation in 2007. In July 2007 the Red Mosque (Lal Masjid), in Islamabad, became the focus of a bloody confrontation between the army and militants inside the mosque. The mosque leaders and thousands of male and female students in adjacent seminaries declared imposition of Shari'a as their main aim and occupied a school library. Through a series of unlawful activities, they challenged the authority of the "un-Islamic" government and called for jihad against authorities. The militants kidnapped brothel owners, policemen, and foreign massage parlor workers and announced the set-up of Islamic courts. Fighting erupted when militants fired upon security forces attempting to cordon off the mosque, resulting in the deaths of 10 security personnel and approximately 79 militants, including the mosque's leader, Abdul Rashid Ghazi. The military operation prompted the Government to renew its efforts to curb the teaching of extremism in madrassahs across the country. The Supreme Court ordered the mosque to be reopened in October 2007 and also ordered reconstruction of the madrassah.

In April 2009 the Taliban began to extort money under the guise of a jizya tax (traditionally a tax on non-Muslims paid in exchange for government protection) in Orakzai Agency, FATA. In response to extortion and attacks, some members of the Sikh community fled the area after paying approximately \$240,000 (20 million

rupees) as jizya tax after the Taliban forcibly occupied their homes and kidnapped a Sikh leader, Kalyan Singh.

On April 22, 2009, a mob attacked a Christian locality, Tiaser Town, in Karachi, Sindh, after threatening signs were posted on the walls of a church stating that Christians should either convert or pay the jizya tax. One person, Irfan Masih, was killed and three others injured in the attack; several houses belonging to Christians, shops, and three churches were ransacked. The attacks came amid fears of growing Talibanization in Karachi, where minority groups had been subjected to violence in the past.

On April 11, 2009, militants occupied and closed to the public a shrine of Sufi saint Pir Baba in Buner, NWFP.

On March 13, 2009, the anti-terrorism court in Karachi released five Lashkar-i-Jhangvi activists, including Mohammad Atif, Mohammad Arshid, Mohammad Asif, and Zubairuddin Shahjeel, who had confessed to assassinating seven Christian staffers of the Committee for Justice and Peace in 2002, including Edwin Moon, its former director.

On March 5, 2009, militants blew up a 17th-century shrine of a Sufi saint and highly respected Pashto poet, Abdul Rahman Mohmand, commonly known as Rahman Baba, at Hazarkhwani, Peshawar, NWFP. No one was injured in the blast, but the grave and mausoleum of the Sufi saint sustained severe damage. Caretakers said they had received a warning letter from purported Taliban militants three days before the attack threatening to blow up the mausoleum if women continued to visit.

On March 2, 2009, a mob attacked a Presbyterian church in Songo, Punjab, where congregants had gathered for prayers. The attack left one woman dead and 28 persons injured.

In February 2009 an official security agency in Punjab issued a warning that terrorists planned to attack 365 religious centers and business enterprises of Ahmadis in the province.

On February 20, 2009, a suicide blast at a Shi'a funeral procession in D.I. Khan, NWFP, killed more than 31 persons and injured several others.

In December 2008 Father Sohail Patrick, a Catholic parish priest in Kohat, NWFP, received a threatening letter and telephone calls.

On October 7, 2008, local Taliban blew up the Convent Girls School in Swat, NWFP, run by (Sri Lankan) Apostolic Carmelite Sisters. According to the media, the school building was destroyed. There was no loss of life because the school and the convent had been closed and vacated a few days before.

In October 2008 St. Joseph's High School, Kohat, NWFP, received a letter from religious extremists that contained insulting remarks against Christianity. The sender also accused the school administration of "enforcing" Christianity on the Muslim students and teachers. According to the NCJP, in January 2009, the Taliban allegedly kidnapped a Hindu student at St. Joseph's High School and demanded a ransom of approximately \$247,000 (20 million rupees).

In October 2008 Mardan, NWFP, police rescued a Hindu boy, Omraj, whom the Taliban had kidnapped on August 26, 2008. The Taliban had demanded a ransom but released the boy after intervention by local influential tradesmen.

In October 2008 a suicide blast targeting the house of a Shi'a member of the National Assembly (Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz), Rashid Akbar Niwani, killed 25 persons and injured 62, including Niwani, in Bhakkar, Punjab. The police linked the attack to a sectarian militant group with ties to Al Qaida and the Taliban.

In August 2008 sectarian clashes erupted between Shi'a and Sunni groups in Kurram Agency, FATA. As a result of continued clashes, nearly 700 persons reportedly died between August and November 2008, and thousands were displaced. A tribal jirga in Islamabad comprising 100 members of both sects, including parliamentarians, agreed to end the sectarian violence on September 25, 2008.

Kurram, is the only tribal agency with a significant Shi'a population, approximately 42 percent of the region's 500,000 inhabitants. Sectarian animosity in Kurram Agency has historically spilled over into sporadic clashes. In 2008, militants increasingly began to exploit these clashes to gain control over key transit points in Kurram linking Pakistan and Afghanistan.

Improvements and Positive Developments in Respect for Religious Freedom

The Government took steps to bolster religious freedom during the reporting period, including efforts to end the Sunni/Shi'a violence in Kurram Agency, FATA, through negotiations and peace talks.

The Government appointed Shahbaz Bhatti as Minister for Minorities Affairs and Jamshaid Rehmatullah, another Christian, as judge of the Lahore High Court. Minority groups viewed both actions as a positive sign.

In November 2008 Prime Minister Yousuf Gilani gave approval for the reformation of the National Commission for Minorities (NCM), which had been set up in 1993 to recommend steps for ensuring effective participation of minority groups in national life and to review any anti-minority discriminatory policies or laws. He also declared August 11 as National Minority Day, to mark the day when the country's founder, Muhammad Ali Jinnah, delivered his first speech to the Constituent Assembly of Pakistan, promising freedom of religion to all religious groups.

In May 2009 the Government approved a 5 percent quota in federal jobs for minorities. The Minorities Affairs Minister called the measure a milestone toward equality and opportunity for minorities in the country.

On May 28, 2009, the Government celebrated the first Minorities' Solidarity Day, including a convention in which the Prime Minister announced establishment of an interfaith complex to house a minorities' museum, a library of faiths, and a common place of worship.

The Government continued to celebrate 10 religious festivals of minority groups at the national level. The Baha'i community welcomed the declaration of a holiday on their religious festival, Eid-e-Rizwan.

The World Council of Religions in Islamabad, assisted by leaders from Islamic, Christian, Hindu, Sikh, Buddhist, and Parsi communities, continued to organize interfaith dialogue sessions throughout the country. The Ministry of Religious Affairs and the Council of Islamic Ideology continued to organize smaller interfaith meetings and dialogue sessions. Following these meetings, Deobandi and Jamaat-e-Islami religious and political leaders significantly toned down anti-Christian and anti-Hindu rhetoric.

In January 2009 Adiala Jail became the first prison in the country to have a church on its premises. The local Christian community and an estimated 250 Christian

inmates of the prison celebrated the construction, made possible by donations from local Christians.

On April 16, 2009, two brothers accused of blasphemy were released from prison after police and Christian groups reached an out of court settlement in Narowal, Punjab.

On April 15, 2009, Sindh Provincial Minister for Minorities Affairs Mohanlal Kohistani announced a grant of \$1.23 million (100 million rupees) as financial assistance for poor, disabled, and handicapped members of the Hindu community. The Sindh government announced it would give back the Hindu Gymkhana (sports arena) to the Hindu community.

Section III. Status of Societal Respect for Religious Freedom

Relations among religious communities remained tense. Violence against religious minorities and between Muslim sects continued. Most believed a small minority was responsible for attacks; however, discriminatory laws and the teaching of religious intolerance created a permissive environment for such attacks. Police often refused to prevent violence and harassment or refused to charge persons who committed such offenses.

Mobs occasionally attacked individuals accused of blasphemy and their families or their religious communities. When blasphemy and other religious cases were brought to court, extremists often packed the courtroom and made public threats against an acquittal. Religious extremists continued to threaten to kill those acquitted of blasphemy charges. High-profile accused persons often went into hiding or emigrated after acquittal.

Ahmadi individuals and institutions long have been victims of religious violence, much of it organized by religious extremists. According to a spokesman for the Ahmadiyya community, since the promulgation of anti-Ahmadi laws in 1984, 101 Ahmadi have been killed on religious grounds.

According to the press section of the Sadr Anjuman Ahmadiyya, 1,033 anti-Ahmadiyya statements were printed in Urdu national newspapers in 2008, an increase of 59 from the previous year.

On March 14, 2009, unknown assailants killed two Ahmadi doctors, husband and wife, at their residence in Multan. According to reports, both showed signs of

physical abuse, and none of their belongings were taken from their home. The Ahmadiyya community claimed the killings were religiously motivated.

On October 29, 2008, a man attacked Dr. Muhammad Aslam, an Ahmadi, at his clinic in Haripur, NWFP. According to reports, the attacker stabbed the doctor four times before being apprehended. The doctor survived.

In September 2008 a former federal minister and host of a popular religious television show declared on air that killing Ahmadis was the "Islamic duty of devout Muslims;" at least two Ahmadis were killed in Sindh within 48 hours of this declaration. Dr. Abdul Mannan Siddiqui, district president of the Ahmadiyya community in Mirpur Khas, Sindh, was killed on September 8, 2008, at his hospital in Mirpur Khas. He was attending to patients when two assailants shot him. The other victim, Seth Muhammad Yousuf, district amir of the Ahmadiyya community Nawab Shah, Sindh, was killed in broad daylight in a local bazaar. Taking serious note of the killings, the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan (HRCPP) called for urgent action to protect minorities and to stop hate-preaching in the media. At the end of the reporting period, the the government continued to stall investigation into the deaths.

In September 2008 extremist elements at Kunri, Sindh, mounted a sustained campaign of agitation and persecution against Ahmadis that resulted in angry processions and attacks on Ahmadi homes. The agitators urged police to register blasphemy cases against Ahmadis. Two Ahmadis were arrested and remained incarcerated at the end of the reporting period.

An Ahmadi pharmacist, Sheikh Saeed Ahmad, was shot and killed, reportedly by religious zealots, on September 1, 2008, in Manzoor Colony, Karachi, Sindh. He died on September 13, 2008.

On September 10, 2008, an Ahmadi, Daud Ahmad Joyia, was fired several weeks after his appointment as a lecturer at Cadet College, Kallar Kahar, Punjab, when the college administration learned of his beliefs.

In September 2008 the Tehrik-e-Khatme Nabuwwat, based in Toba Tek Singh, Punjab, issued a Ramadan calendar that devoted nearly 70 percent of the space to hate propaganda characterizing Ahmadis as infidels, cursed, and apostates.

On June 5, 2008, the principal of Punjab Medical College (PMC) expelled 15 female Ahmadi students and eight male students accused of preaching Ahmadiyyat

at the university. The same day, students at the school had gone on strike, demanding the expulsion of all Ahmadi students. The college formed a committee to resolve the case. In October 2008 the Health Department of Punjab permitted 15 of the 23 Ahmadi students to continue studies at the PMC. At the end of the reporting period they were attending the college, and the female students resided in a hostel. The Government, with approval of the Punjab Chief Minister, issued a notification for the eight other students, three male and five female, to be transferred to other colleges. No case was registered against any of the non-Ahmadi students or teachers who precipitated the strikes and riot.

In September 2008 the annual Anti-Ahmadi, Khatam-e-Nabuwwat (End of Prophethood) Conference was held in Lahore, Punjab, where clerics declared their drive against Ahmadiyyat would continue until it was eliminated from the country.

Violence against and harassment of Christians continued during the reporting period.

On April 9, 2009, the Session Court, Sargodha, ordered the arrest of a Muslim man accused of raping the daughter of one of his Christian tenants at gunpoint in a small village in Sargodha District, Punjab, on November 6, 2008.

In another case, on April 6, 2009, police arrested four of six assailants accused of attacking Christians in Cheecha Watni, Punjab, in January 2009. The perpetrators had ransacked Christian and Muslim houses in Cheecha Watni and gang-raped a 14-year-old Christian girl in front of her family. The arrests came after the victims' Muslim employer, brick kiln owner Muhammad Akram Khan, filed a lawsuit against the suspects. Khan vowed to bring to justice the two remaining suspects. Police recovered the stolen items and returned them to the Christian families.

In April 2009, at a district court in Nankana Sahib, Punjab, police cleared three men accused of raping a 13-year-old Christian girl despite eyewitness accounts and medical evidence. The girl was reportedly twice abducted and raped by Waqas Sadiq and Yousaf Sadiq with the help of Mohammad Shahbaz, and was threatened with death if she revealed the attack to authorities. Lawyers representing the victim accused the suspects' relatives of bribing police.

In May 2008, a Christian, Adeel Masih, was reportedly tortured and killed in Hafizabad by the family of a Muslim girl with whom he allegedly had a relationship. In July 2008 police arrested her father and uncle for murder, but on April 1, 2009, the Gujranwala Sessions Court cleared the suspects of all charges.

A March 2009 attack on a church and the surrounding neighborhood in Sangu-Wali, a village in Gujranwala, Punjab, left a woman dead. The attack was believed to be prompted after a Christian filed a robbery complaint against a local Muslim who, along with his friends, indiscriminately preyed on the community.

In June 2008 two sisters, ages 13 and 10, were kidnapped in Multan on their way to visit a relative. Reportedly, one of the kidnappers married the older girl and requested custody of both girls, alleging that both had willingly converted from Christianity to Islam. The older sister testified before the Lahore High Court that she was 17 years old and had converted and accepted the marriage willingly, despite her parents' assertion of her age. In September 2008 the judge decided to grant custody of the younger girl to her Christian parents and to allow the older one to make her own decision. She chose to remain with her new husband. In October 2008, the younger sister stated they had been raped and forced to convert to Islam. While traveling to and from the court in Lahore, the three lawyers who represented the family were threatened.

Hindus faced societal violence, often directed at temples, during the reporting period. In April 2009 *Dawn* newspaper reported that extremists attacked a Hindu religious festival, Holi, not far from the border with India, setting fire to a Hindu temple and destroying several shops. Societal violence was due in part to bias against Indians and those perceived to be of Indian origin.

The Hindu community living in Sindh Province reported they were increasingly the target of kidnappings for ransom; however, the incidence of abductions has risen exponentially throughout the country. Criminals targeted Hindu businessmen for abductions, particularly in Karachi, Sindh. Hindus claimed they were forced to pay ransom because police did little to recover kidnapping victims.

Despite recent attacks against Sikhs in the FATA, societal violence against the Sikh community remained comparatively rare.

Ismailis reported they were the objects of resentment of Sunni Muslims due to their comparative economic well-being. Ismailis reported they frequently faced societal pressure to adopt conservative Islamic practices or risk being socially ostracized.

Anti-Semitic articles were commonly found in the vernacular press, especially tabloid newspapers, although there were no known Jewish communities in the country.

Some Sunni Muslim groups published literature calling for violence against Ahmadis, Shi'a Muslims, other Sunni sects, and Hindus. Some newspapers frequently published articles that contained derogatory references to religious minorities, especially Ahmadis, Hindus, and Jews.

Discrimination in employment based on religious affiliation appeared widespread. Christians had difficulty finding jobs other than those involving menial labor, although Christian activists stated that the situation had improved somewhat in the private sector in recent years.

Section IV. U.S. Government Policy

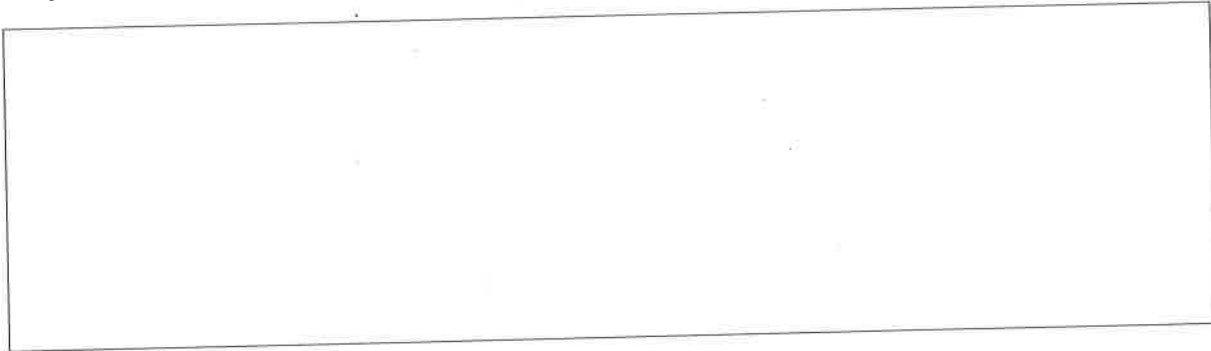
U.S. Embassy officers maintained a dialogue with government, religious, and minority community representatives to encourage religious freedom and discuss the blasphemy laws, the Hudood Ordinance, the implementation of the NAR in the NWFP, curriculum reform in public education and madrassah education systems, treatment of the Ahmadiyya and Christian communities, and sectarian violence. Embassy officials, including the Ambassador, met with leaders from communities of all religious groups and non-governmental organizations working on religious freedom issues. Embassy officials also raised with parliamentarians the treatment of Ahmadis.

As part of its overall public education reform program, valued at \$90 million (7.27 billion rupees), the U.S. Government provided substantial financial support to the Government's curriculum reform initiative, which included eliminating the teaching of religious intolerance.

After the negotiators agreed to the text (drafted by Craig Kelly and OAS rep Victor Rico), both sides broke to consult with their principals.

We are in the negotiating room waiting to resume talks. Micheletti's negotiators have arrived and indicated that he accepts the compromise text. We are now waiting for Zelaya's people to arrive. They want to meet with us before returning to the dialogue table, which almost certainly means they have changes.

We will see what happens and keep you informed.

During its December plenary in Paris, the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) Working Group on Bribery formally rolled out a revised recommendation enhancing our ability to enforce the OECD Anti-Bribery Convention, launched a global anti-bribery awareness campaign, and celebrated International Anti-Corruption Day. The United States was re-elected to the seven-member working group steering committee and led the group's discussions on finalizing a questionnaire to be used during a third round of peer reviews, a key element of the working group's effectiveness. The United States will be the first country reviewed in the new cycle, beginning in 2010.

Your pre-recorded video message opened the OECD's International Anti-Corruption Day celebration and was a resounding success. It is currently posted on the organization's website (www.oecd.org). Commerce General Counsel Cameron Kerry represented the U.S. government at the meeting in Paris and emphasized the importance of convention enforcement and accession by key trading partners like Russia and China. Secretary Locke, OECD Secretary General Gurria, and USOECD Ambassador Kornbluh delivered opening remarks at a simultaneous video-linked event in Washington.

Convention enforcement remains a key issue for U.S. international businesses and the revised recommendation, although not legally binding, will enhance our ability to monitor and enforce the convention, thus helping to level the playing field for U.S. industry and promote the rule of law. The United States has also proposed an annex to the revised recommendation, which includes compliance and good practice guidance for companies. We expect the Working Group on Bribery to approve its inclusion in the recommendation in the coming weeks.

Following the President's request that the OECD work with countries interested in ratifying the convention, we will work with OECD accession candidates, such as Israel, Russia, and others.

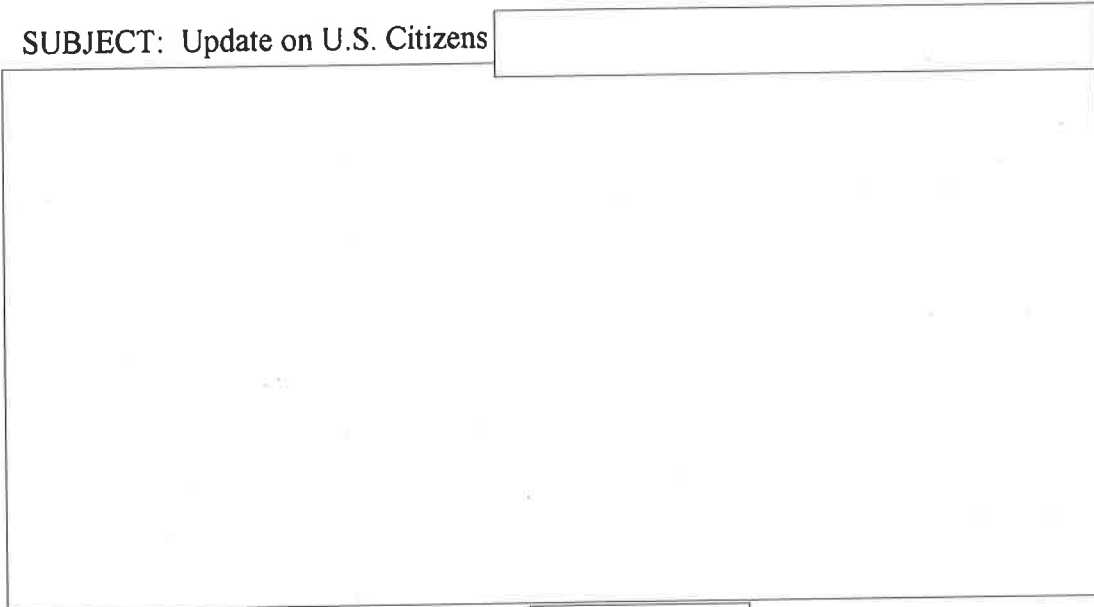

The five QDDR working groups have now produced voluminous interim reports summarizing deliberations from October to early December. These reports contain a mass of insights, ideas and identified deficiencies. These derive from a mutual learning process among the State and USAID QDDR participants, including analysis by 20 sub-groups, surveys sent out to the field, and broad outreach to actors beyond State and USAID. We are now beginning to draft an Interim Report that will serve as the basis for public briefings toward the end of January and may be directly distributed. At the same time, we are asking the Working Groups to answer some specific questions based on the Co-Chairs' response to their reports.

We are now concluding Phase I and turning to Phase II. In this phase we will narrow the broad spectrum of capabilities identified in Phase I to focus on specific areas where we can develop work plans to achieve actual organizational change. Many former reports have come to some of the same conclusions that the QDDR is likely to reach, yet they were unable to get their recommendations implemented. The QDDR must be different.

The interim reports provide at least preliminary recommendations and raise some fundamental questions that are sufficiently far-reaching as to change the way State and/or USAID do business. Many of these issues will require the expenditure of political capital and a willingness to disrupt the status quo. This memo summarizes the desired impacts formulated by working group, identifies key issues that have surfaced repeatedly in their discussions, and lists some of their most promising recommendations. (Note that these are only partial lists; final recommendations must be made in the context of a more systematic identification of a particular capability to be developed.) Each section then identifies likely future directions as to which your guidance would be helpful at this stage. Finally, the memo lists a set of cross-cutting ideas and proposals raised by multiple working groups.

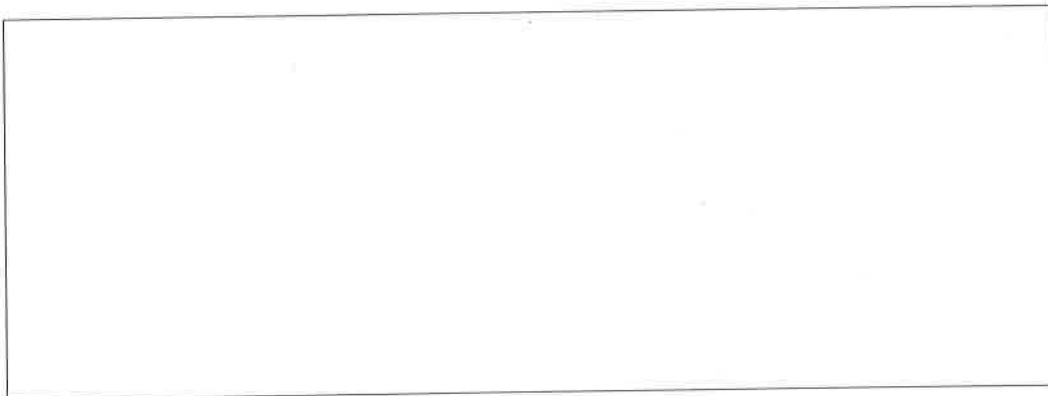

WORKING GROUP I – Building a Global Architecture of Cooperation

Summary Statement: We want to advance U.S. interests and solve global problems by mobilizing and leading collective action through deeper and broader bilateral relationships and regional and multilateral diplomacy, as well as through non-state partners. We want to advance our national agenda and shape global norms through the proactive use and capacity building of multilateral organizations. We want to communicate strategically and effectively within and outside our institutions to share relevant information, build stronger relationships, and advance our diplomatic and development agendas.

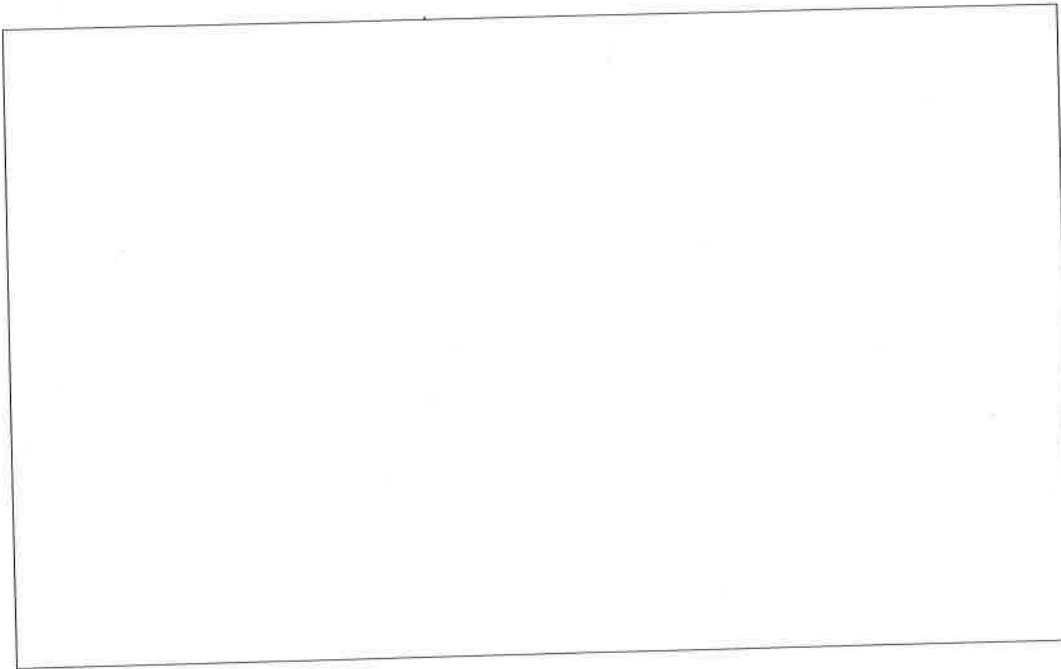
Key Issues: The working group is rethinking our global posture – how we deploy and position ourselves globally to engage more effectively bilaterally, particularly with rising powers, multilaterally and with corporations, foundations, NGOs, and other non-state partners. The group is examining possibilities for (i) a more decentralized in-country presence that would permit systematic engagement with non-state partners and local communities while at the same time allowing for centralized coordination from the embassy and (ii) regional organization in the field that would facilitate cross-border planning, coordination and solutions to transnational issues like climate change and terrorism. Other issues include a more systematic and integrated approach to bilateral strategic dialogues that would support them more efficiently and identify a desired progression from dialogue to deliverables. Note that the QDDR report will integrate many of the recommendations made by Judith McHale in her public diplomacy strategy.

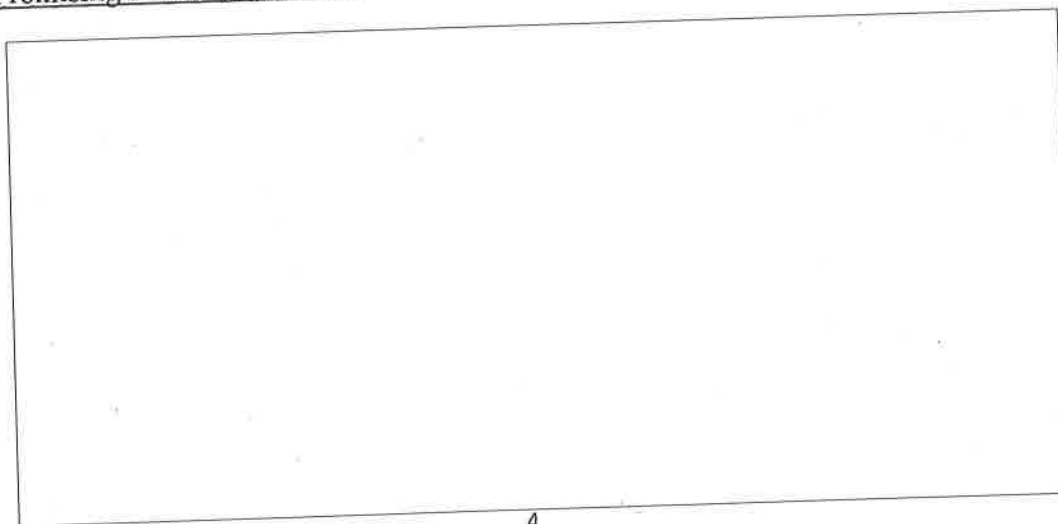


WORKING GROUP II – Leading and Supporting Whole of Government Approaches

Summary Statement: We want to be able to lead and support whole of government solutions to foreign policy challenges and opportunities by putting forward integrated policy positions and operational plans grounded in recognized diplomatic and development expertise. In country, we would lead by virtue both of Chief of Mission authority and our ability to marshal capabilities of USG agencies, local governments, organizations and citizens towards common objectives. In Washington we would lead by virtue of our ability and commitment to “see the whole,” demonstrated expertise, our strategically coordinated planning and budgeting, and our leadership and management skills.

Key Issues: Working Group II continues to struggle with two fundamental issues that will define the State-USAID relationship and affect our ability to lead other agencies: (i) when State and/or USAID should lead the interagency and when it should support other agencies and (ii) how to structure the State-USAID relationship across multiple functional areas so that our diplomatic and development efforts are mutually-reinforcing, collaborative, and effective. The comparative advantage of State and USAID in providing leadership is our combined strategic vision and ability to bring cross-cutting, multi-disciplinary insights and expertise to operational challenges. The group is identifying best practices of State-USAID collaboration and coordination across multiple functions, including policy, planning, implementation and oversight. They would benefit from a description of any existing thinking on the parameters of State and USAID’s future organizational relationship.

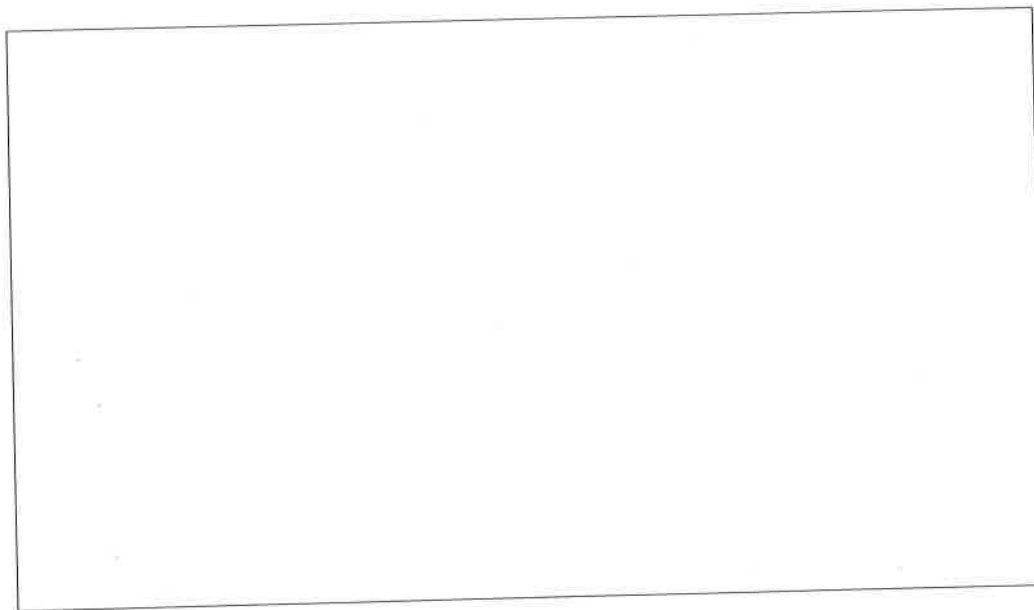

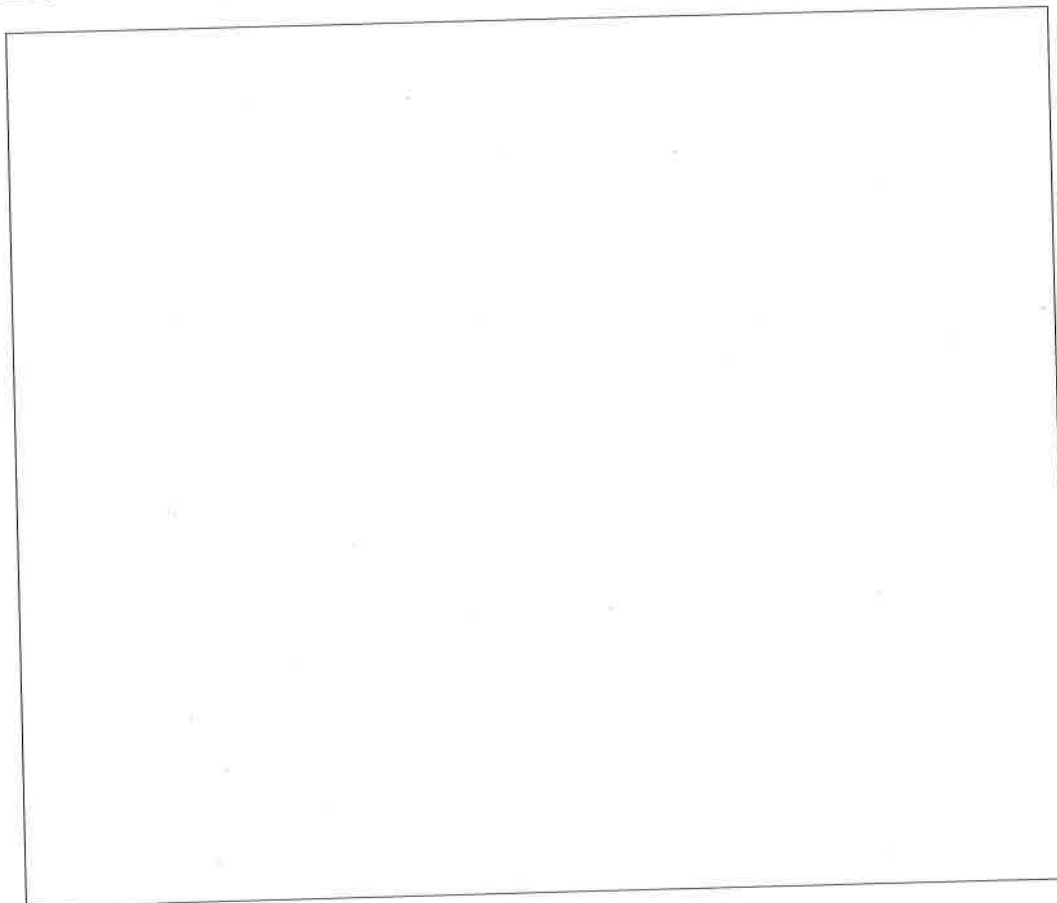

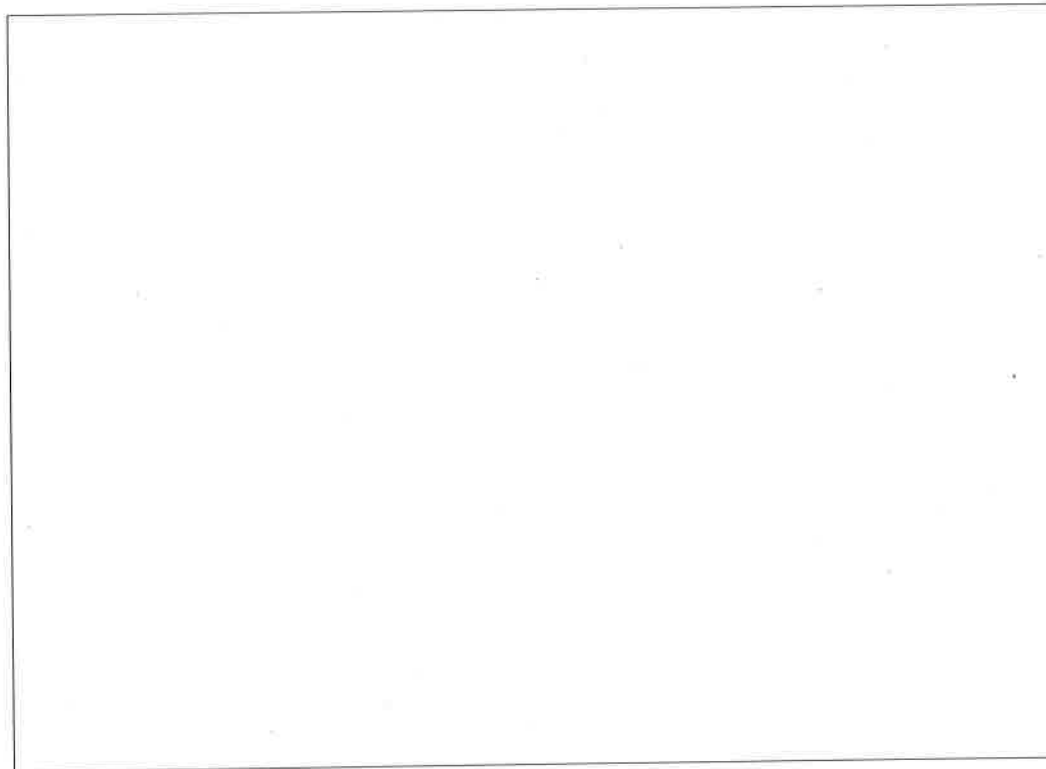

WORKING GROUP III: Investing in Building Blocks of Stronger Societies


Summary Statement: We want to leverage diplomacy and development to build strong societies by achieving measurable, sustainable progress in security, economic growth, democratic governance and the rule of law, and human security. In each of these areas, we want to apply world-class approaches and methodologies rooted in best practices of aid effectiveness. We want to coordinate with other donors and collaborate with non-state partners; leverage the strategic benefits of multilateral institutions; support country plans and build local capacity to achieve transformational change.

Key Issues: Group discussions have highlighted the tension between country-based planning versus centrally planned sector initiatives. There is general agreement in the group that the answer should not be "either/or" -- initiatives in health, food security, and education can meet critical country needs -- but current funding constraints, planning and implementation practices tend to crowd out other necessities for sustainable, country-based change such as effective, accountable governance and economic growth. The group will have to focus much more carefully on the core elements of effectiveness and achieving outcomes, a filter that will help shape final recommendations about where to develop real excellence.

Another challenge is how to integrate sector-specific global initiatives into locally-owned development strategies. The working group would benefit from clear guidance on any overarching principles they should consider.


The group has identified gaps in the USG's ability to achieve measurable, sustainable impact in the areas of civilian security sector reform, justice sector reform and rule of law. Given State and USAID's comparative advantage in providing strategic vision and a cross-cutting perspective, we are well-positioned to provide leadership in policy, strategic guidance, methods and approaches, as well as inter-agency coordination in these areas. At present, however, our limited capabilities undermine our ability to lead and to make measurable progress in the field. Although multiple agencies have a role in implementing security, justice and rule of law assistance, there remains a need for leadership, stronger doctrine, and a USG strategic framework. State and USAID leadership in these areas would first require a high-level decision and commitment to invest in these areas as well as concrete steps towards strengthening our approaches and methods.

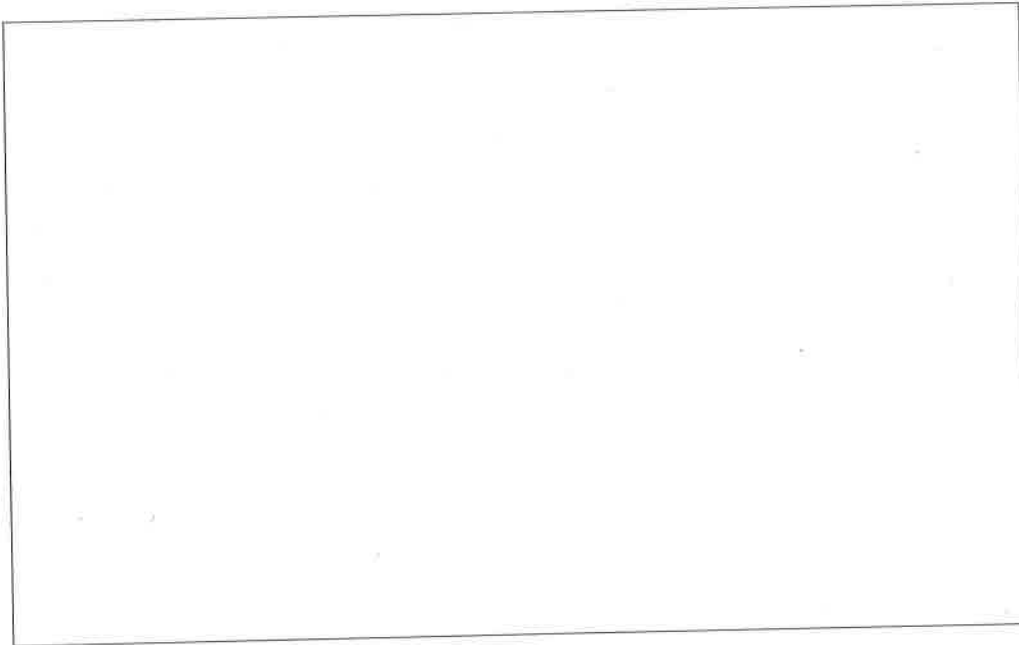

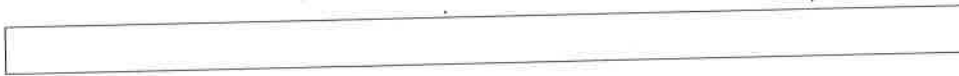

WORKING GROUP IV: Preventing and Responding to Crises and Conflict

Summary Statement: We want to be able to choose which crises and conflicts we respond to based on clearly defined national security and/or humanitarian criteria and then to be able to respond with a civilian-led and highly operational capability, as well as improve prevention of crises and conflict through better decision making, improved technical knowledge, and more effective, actionable solutions. We want to be able to effectively deploy civilian experts with a range of specialized skill sets beyond just stabilization and reconstruction, with a more nuanced risk management perspective, and with a clarified and complementary role to that of military forces.

Key Issues: The group is discussing the idea of a new conceptual framework, one that includes not only stabilization and reconstruction (which often resembles the military's approach to stability operations) but begins with an emphasis on prevention and continues through active crises or conflicts, peacemaking and sustained peace building. This approach will require greater understanding of the causes of and solutions for violent conflict, insurgencies, mass atrocities, and weak, failing states and must identify the specific capabilities and skill sets that will allow us to implement those solutions. Critically, we must develop an analytical framework, linked to national security considerations, to determine when, where, how, and for what purpose we should use these capabilities and to assess possible trade-offs. Broadening the scope of humanitarian relief work, for



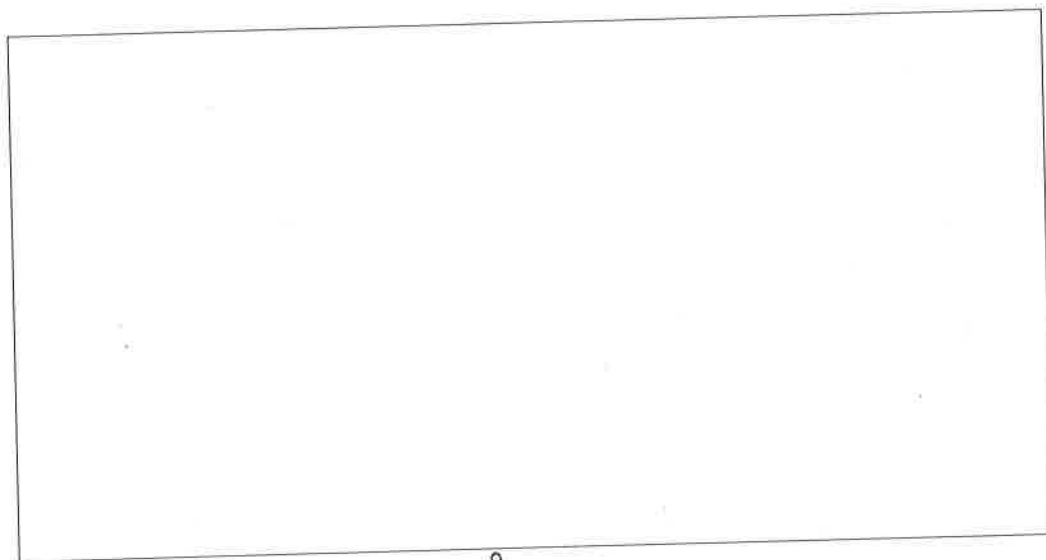

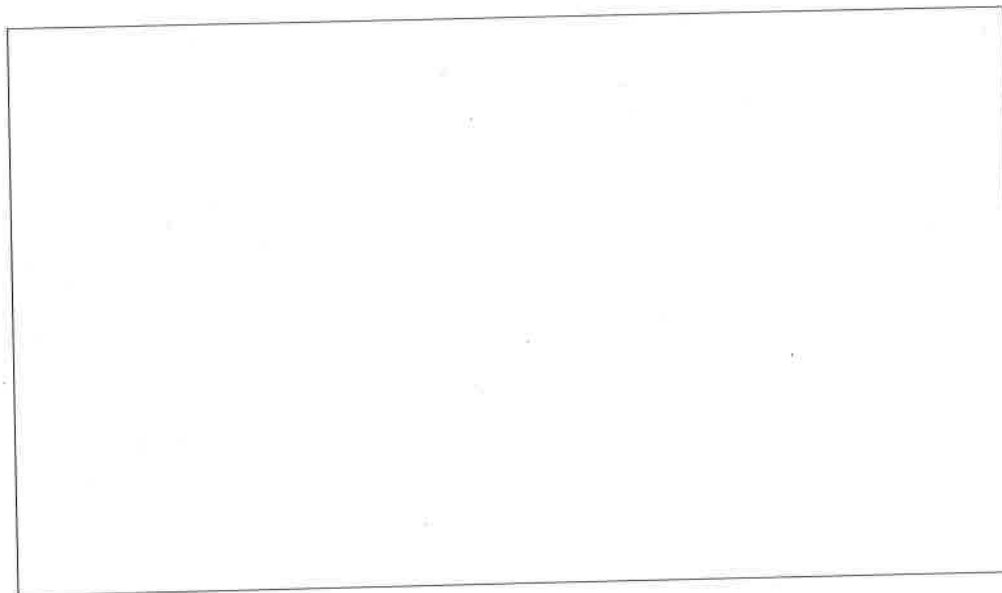

WORKING GROUP V: Building Platforms for Success

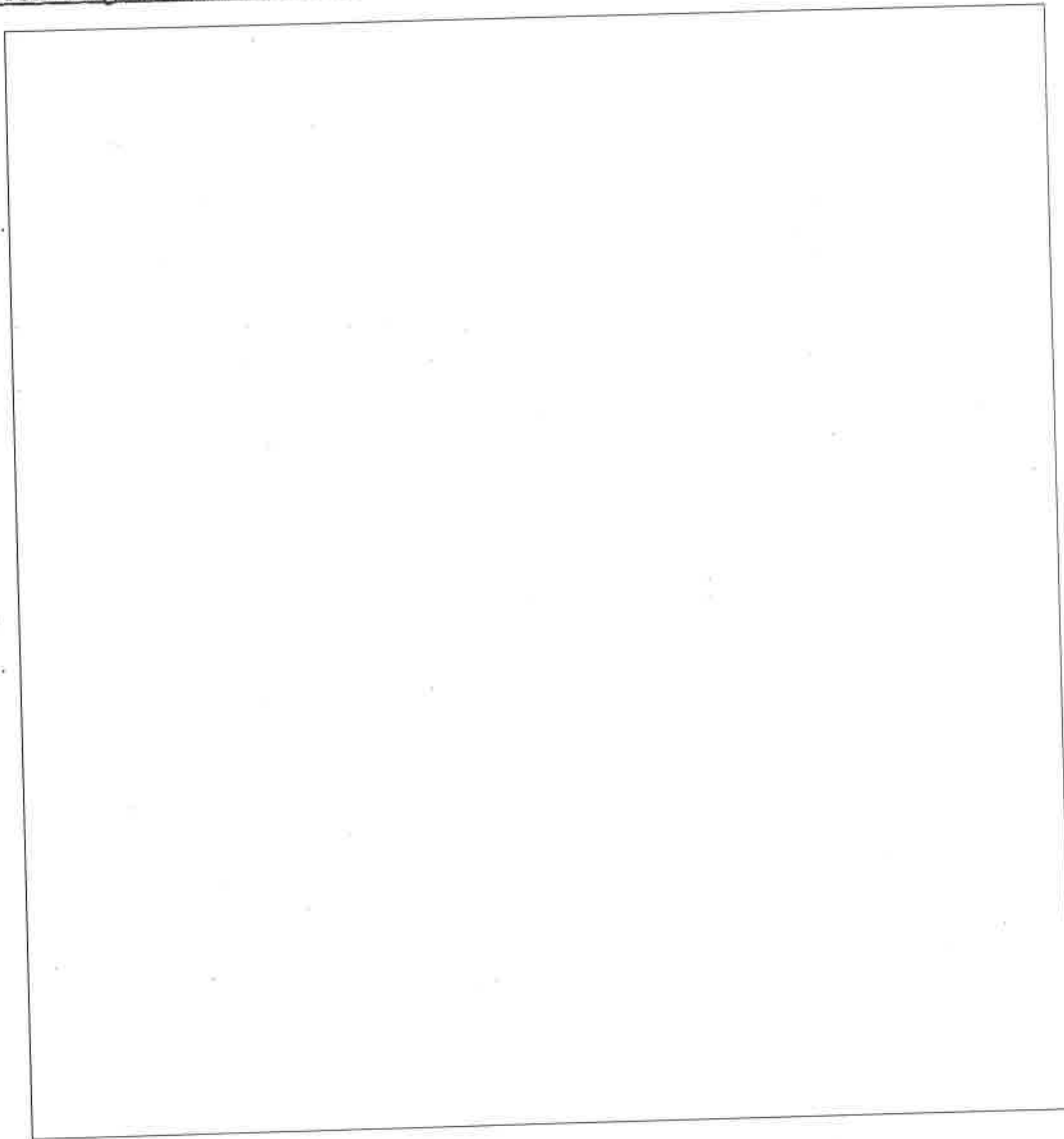
Summary Statement: We want a highly skilled, flexible workforce with new skills to support policy priorities and address modern global challenges. This workforce includes a balance of direct hires and contractors struck by applying fair, transparent principles that govern outsourcing to contractors and NGOs from the U.S. and other nations. We want to streamline management platforms where it meets our needs and allows us operate more efficiently and effectively. We want to manage resources effectively and consistently link policy objectives, planning, resource requests, program information, and performance data to evaluate impact.

Key Issues: Working Group V is addressing a broad range of management systems that will ultimately help implement recommendations from other working groups. In its discussion on outsourcing, the group has begun to develop a list of areas that are inherently governmental responsibilities, including bilateral and diplomatic outreach and policy dialogue, project design, management of evaluation, contracting performance monitoring, asset management, and high level information technology functions, and will refine and expand these areas as they move forward. It has noted the importance of differentiating in principle between providing grants to non-government organizations and direct contracting for particular services.

The group is also looking at best practices and trying to develop objective criteria for integration of administrative services in a way that optimizes service delivery to both State and AID while reducing fully loaded costs. Another vital issue,


particularly for AID, is the ability to hire and rebuild at all levels, particularly in mid-career, while at the same time making sure that career opportunities for traditional FSOs are not hampered. Greater flexibility in our human resource systems will also be necessary to respond more quickly and effectively to crises on the ground. Finally, the group has identified a set of capabilities for further discussion that will allow us to link more effectively foreign assistance with operations. Note that this group's work depends critically on recommendations made by other groups, such as the various proposals for more flexible hiring structures discussed in the section on cross-cutting issues below.





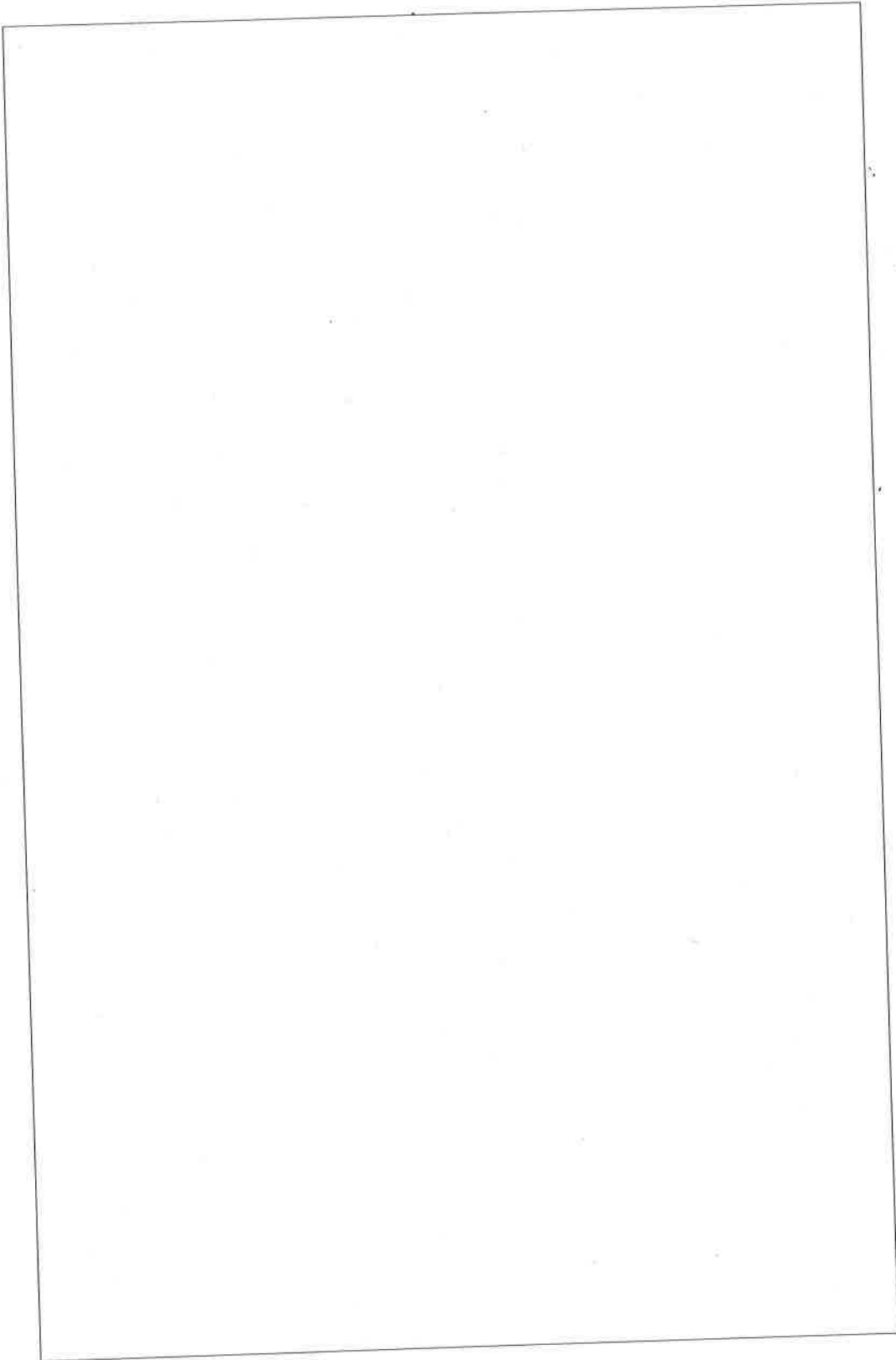
To date, the QDDR has operated through its five working groups and roughly 20 sub-working groups. They have done excellent work and you will have a chance to engage them on any of the issues above that you would like to question or hear more about. Going forward, however, we will be looking to narrow the QDDR focus to be able to develop detailed implementation plans. In choosing which issues to pursue, it is worth getting a different perspective on the work done to date by noting the issues that have repeatedly surfaced from multiple working groups. Those issues may still need to be pursued in terms of very specific capabilities, but they offer a roadmap to major and widely felt deficiencies.

Expanding the Agenda

As we institutionalize the security agenda, we will focus more on economic competitiveness and energy in 2010. To date, macroeconomic recovery has absorbed 70% of the economic agenda. Trade disputes have taken up 25%, leaving a small residual to advance Mexican and U.S. competitiveness in a global economy.

Having spoken with all major industrial and service groups, it is striking that we cannot produce globally-competitive cars and tractors in the United States without integrating our production lines with Mexico. We are working to document this –

but the anecdotal evidence is profound. While we may lose some jobs in some sectors to Mexican labor, on the whole we would lose more if Mexico did not help us to reduce our production costs. These are key areas where we will focus attention:

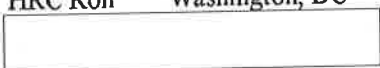

Secretary Clinton, this is a brief update on the situation in Khartoum. The latest reports indicate that the NCP and SPLM are in negotiations to reconsider the amended Southern Sudan referendum language passed by the National Assembly. The legislature will reconvene on December 28, and our hope is that a new agreed-upon law will be tabled and passed at that time with no further amendments. The parties are also in discussions to ensure the Abyei referendum and popular consultations bills are passed without amendment, as previously agreed. We trust that these negotiations will stave off further crisis and ultimately allow the three bills to be passed by consensus, allowing for credible referenda and popular consultations processes over the next 12 months and preventing further disruptive moves.

In my conversations with NCP Second Vice President Ali Osman Taha and NCP Presidential Advisor Dr Ghazi Atabani yesterday, both reaffirmed the NCP's commitment to the agreements reached with the SPLM on December 13. The NCP party leadership will be under great pressure to control any hardliners within the National Assembly and to prevent further tensions over these laws, particularly from those who seek to amend the deal reached on the Abyei referendum law. We continue to remind the NCP that despite our objections to the final version of the controversial National Security Act, we expect that state security services not to abuse their powers by harassing and detaining opposition voices throughout the electoral period.

On a more positive note, Chad's Foreign Minister Faki arrived in Khartoum today for discussions on Chad-Sudan bilateral relations and possible reinvigoration of the Dakar

Agreement. This is a very positive step toward peace in Darfur and we applaud the initiative by both governments. We will keep you updated if there are significant changes in Khartoum. In the meantime, Merry Christmas and happy New Year, Scott

Madame Secretary, I'm writing to update you on some developments in Khartoum that you may receive inquiries about over the next few days. As I previously reported, the two CPA parties reached an agreement on 13 Dec on three major pieces of legislation to implement the peace agreement, avoiding for the moment a full-blown political crisis in Khartoum. The parties agreed on text for each of these three laws (the Southern Sudan referendum law, the Abyei referendum law, and the Popular Consultations law) to be introduced and passed through the National Assembly before it recessed on 23 Dec (now extended to 7 Jan 10). At the same time, the parties agreed to continue discussions on two outstanding issues—the National Security Act (governing the powers of the National Security Services) and the disputed census results.

The National Security Act

Yesterday (Monday), the ruling NCP introduced and passed a minimally revised National Security Act through the Assembly using its 52% "mechanical majority." Although both we and the SPLM believed the NCP would likely pass this bill with its majority, we had hoped that the NCP would include some of the additional safeguards we all suggested be added to the bill to protect the rights of Sudanese citizens. I have strongly conveyed to the NCP that this law must not be used to curtail the political activities of opposition parties and that the international community will continue to monitor the election process to ensure it remains free and fair to the maximum extent possible.

Unfortunately, this development has caused some to doubt that elections in Sudan can be credible. I continue to believe the high turnout for voter registration last month (81 percent of eligible voters) was a solid indication that the Sudanese people want to be heard in this election—we must show our strong support for national and legislative elections. At the same time, we must remember that this will be the first elections in 24 years and that the electoral process will be conducted in a post-conflict environment that is filled with mistrust. Long-term democratic transformation of Sudan will have its challenges; we must be careful to manage expectations without being overly pessimistic about this fledgling democratic process.

The Southern Sudan Referendum Bill

In addition to the election issues, there's an even bigger and more immediate crisis brewing in Khartoum. Despite the 13 Dec Bashir-Kiir agreement on language governing the Southern Sudan referendum bill, it appears the NCP attached several amendments to the bill before passing it today with the party's mechanical majority. The amendments allegedly alter the voting locations for Southern Sudan residents and require agreement on post-referendum modalities before holding the referendum (a "no go" for the SPLM). The NCP has also signaled its intention to introduce amendments to the Abyei referendum bill tomorrow that alter

the carefully negotiated language on voter eligibility. If these reports are true, NCP's actions are likely to drive the parties farther apart and to make follow-on negotiations even more difficult.

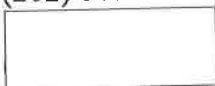
The SPLM has decided to boycott the National Assembly again and is now holding "crisis meetings." We are attempting to convince the NCP of the need to walk back the Southern Sudan language (possibly through a veto by President Bashir to give the National Assembly another opportunity to pass a better bill) and to avoid amendments to the Abyei bill. Additionally, we plan to increase pressure on the NCP by releasing the press statement outlining our concerns in the next few hours (I'll forward the PA statement as soon as it has been fully coordinated). I'll keep you posted as events develop over the next several days. Despite the challenges of Sudan, we'll make time to celebrate this special holiday and to pray for "peace on earth." Scott

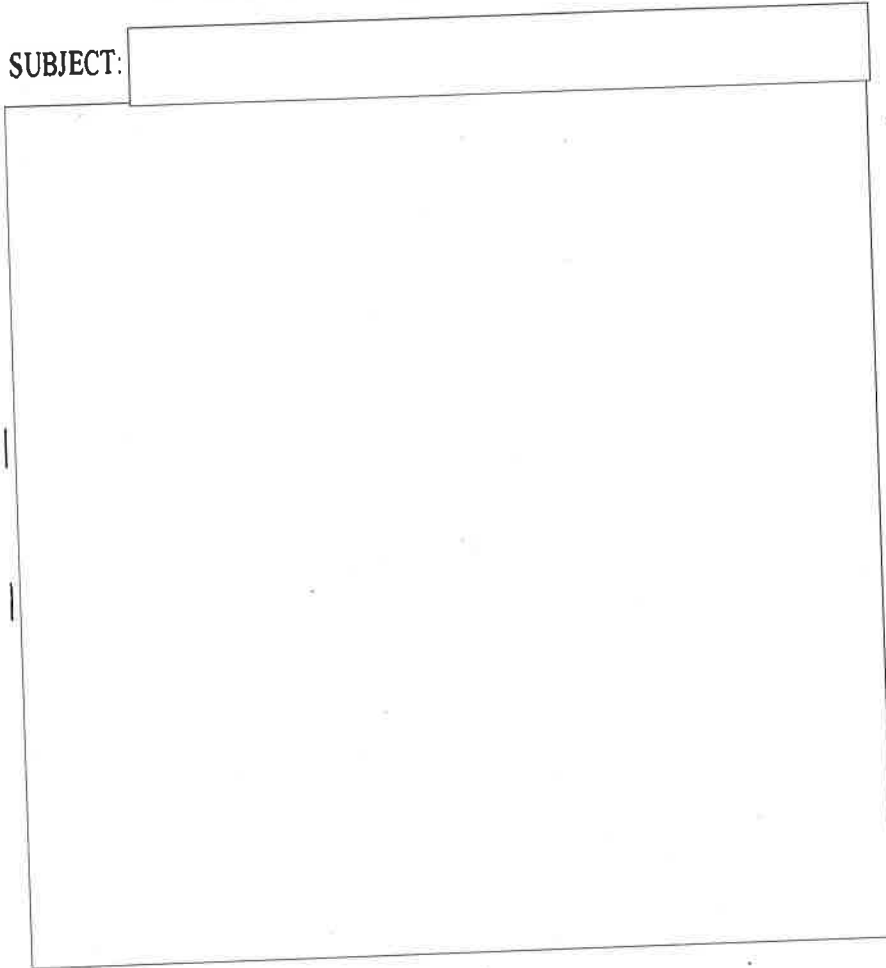

Current Situation on the Ground

Q. What is the current situation on the ground?

- The United States is fully committed to assisting Haiti through this crisis.
- The situation on the ground remains fluid, with our understanding of the full extent of casualties and damages continuously evolving.
- We have reports of U.S. citizens injured and are working to confirm and assist as conditions permit. Telecommunications are extremely difficult.
- We are checking on the status of the airport and hope to have more information at first after daybreak.
- U.S. citizens in Haiti should remain in shelter, avoid damaged structures if possible, and obey all instructions from local authorities. If exposed when an aftershock hits, seek shelter immediately or try to get to open space, away from buildings and other structures. If indoors, take shelter under a heavy table or desk, or in a doorway.
- U.S. citizens in Haiti are urged to contact the Embassy via email at ACSPaP@state.gov to request assistance. U.S. citizens in Haiti can call the Embassy's Consular Task Force at 509-2229-8942, 509-2229-8089, 509-2229-8322, or 509-2229-8672.
- People outside of Haiti with information or inquiries about U.S. citizens in Haiti may reach the Haiti Task Force at 1-888-407-4747. For callers outside the U.S., please call 202-501-4444.

Q. How many fatalities? Injuries?

- A number of structures have collapsed and serious casualties have occurred. Exact numbers of deaths and wounded are currently unknown, but there is no doubt about the severity of the situation.
- There are unconfirmed reports of one U.S. citizen fatality. We are in communication with the U.S. citizen's family.

Q. What is the status of the airport?

- Several aircraft, including an American Airlines flight, took off after the earthquake, but there are reportedly no flights flying in or out at this time.
- There are multiple reports that the airport tower has collapsed. However, we understand the tarmac may be operational and hope to have confirmation shortly.

Background: On January 12 at approximately 5:30 p.m., an earthquake measuring 7.0 on the Richter scale struck near Port-au-Prince, followed by multiple aftershocks. Additional aftershocks remain a possibility. Witnesses reported damaged buildings throughout the capital, including the president's residence and century-old homes nearby, and the Associated Press reported that a hospital collapsed. President Rene Preval is safe, but there was no estimate of the dead and wounded Tuesday evening. The headquarters of the UN peacekeeping mission in Port-au-Prince and the Canadian Embassy are among many buildings that have collapsed. The U.S. Embassy is working to ascertain the extent of the damage and check on the status of U.S. citizens around the island.

Q. What is the status of the U.S. Embassy and Embassy personnel?

- There are 172 personnel under Chief of Mission authority. We have activated the Warden system to reach out to our Embassy community, but have accounted for all but two U.S. direct hire personnel. We understand the Embassy building itself is sound. 8 wounded, 4 seriously requiring medevac.

- The U.S. Embassy has exhausted medical supplies, and local hospitals are filled to capacity.
- A request for ordered departure is planned. Approximately 80 Embassy employees, spouses, and children will be departing. We will be withdrawing non-emergency personnel.

Q. How many U.S. Citizens are in Haiti?

- There are approximately 45,000 U.S. citizens in country.

Q. How many potential evacuees are in Haiti?

- Not all U.S. citizens register with U.S. embassies abroad, but we estimate the total number of potential evacuees to be 84,000 based on the number of citizens registered at the Embassy and historical numbers of U.S. citizen visitors.

Q. What is the security situation in Haiti?

- So far the situation is calm but we are monitoring it closely.

USG Assistance

Q. What has the U.S. been doing to help in the immediate aftermath?

- We have reached out to the Government of Haiti to begin the process of assessing what Haiti needs and to expedite the flow of assistance to Haiti.

Q. What is the U.S. doing to reach out to Americans in Haiti?

- The U.S. Embassy in Port-au-Prince has activated the Warden system to reach out to our U.S. citizen community.

- The U.S. Embassy in Port-au-Prince has set up a task force at the Embassy which is taking calls as conditions permit. Q. How many people have called in? What is the wait time?

- Since the crisis began, the Consular Call Center has handled 649 calls. The Haiti Task Force and Embassy Port-au-Prince have logged 351 call in the Crisis Task Force software application.
- Call center wait time is currently 20 minutes.

Q. Who is coordinating the response for the U.S.?

- The United States has launched a multi-agency effort. The U.S. Department of State, the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), the U.S. Department of Defense, and the U.S. Coast Guard are engaged.
- The U.S. Department of State is responsible for the protection and evacuation of U.S. citizens abroad. It also is responsible for managing crises and for facilitating interagency communication and coordination. It provides current information for decision makers and policy makers and directs the operations of U.S. embassies and consulates overseas.
- USAID through its Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA) provides funds for immediate disaster relief or rehabilitation – not for long-term reconstruction. Relief assistance is provided to save lives and reduce human suffering. However, USAID/OFDA assistance may be provided for as long as the disaster requires emergency humanitarian assistance. USAID's Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (USAID/OFDA) is responsible for providing international disaster assistance and coordinating the USG response to declared disasters in foreign countries.

- 5 -

- Assessment teams are deployed to provide OFDA/Washington and post with information and recommendations to make timely decisions regarding the USG's disaster response. USAID/OFDA's assessment teams are typically comprised of sector specialists (e.g., experts in health, nutrition, agriculture, water/sanitation, shelter, geohazards, logistics, and disaster management), as well as supervisory staff familiar with USAID/OFDA policies and procedures;
- USAID/OFDA may provide disaster relief commodities (e.g., blankets, plastic sheeting, water containers, or other essential relief commodities) from USAID/OFDA's various stockpiles when appropriate; and
- USAID/OFDA provides funding to non-governmental organizations (NGO) and international organizations to implement emergency program assistance for disaster response activities. NGOs working directly with the disaster victims are USAID/OFDA's preferred funding recipients.
- The Emergency Action Committee (EAC) at the U.S. Embassy in affected countries, in this case Haiti, liaises with the host government to ensure efficient coordination and delivery of external assistance. The EAC coordinates with U.S. government agencies to ensure prompt and efficient distribution of assistance.

Q. What actions have been taken by the U.S. Department of State?

- The Department of State is in the midst of disaster response efforts. We have a Task Force talking to people on the ground in Haiti and elsewhere in the region to continually update our understanding of the situation on the ground and coordinate interagency response.
- We are responding to queries from private U.S. citizens about the welfare of their relatives and friends who are in Haiti through a call center and task force dedicated for this purpose.

Q. What actions have been taken by USAID?

- 6 -

- The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA) is leading our disaster assistance response. USAID is deploying two 72-person Disaster Assistance Response Teams to Haiti.
- One of the questions we will address at first light is the condition of the airport to determine at what point we can put teams on the ground.
- Once the Disaster Assistance Response Team and the rescue teams arrive they will be doing assessments to determine what immediate relief assistance is needed. They also will be coordinating with other assistance partners on the ground on the delivery of relief supplies.
- In addition, a Washington D.C.-based Response Management Team has been created to support the Disaster Assistance Response Team.
- OFDA's Disaster Assistance Response Teams are comprised of the Fairfax County Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) Team and the Los Angeles County Search and Rescue Team. The USAR teams will be composed of up to 72 personnel, 6 search and rescue canines, and up to 48 tons of rescue equipment.

Q. What other resources are at OFDA's disposal?

- The USAID/OFDA Regional Office in San José, Costa Rica, is in communication with the assistant/mission disaster relief officer in Haiti and working to obtain damage assessments and further information from consultants on the ground.
- Three USAID/OFDA disaster management consultants in surrounding countries are on stand-by to support the response.

Background: A 72-person Disaster Assistance Response Team will be deployed within 24 to 48 hours. The team is comprised of emergency managers and planners, physicians and paramedics and includes specialists in the fields of structural engineering, heavy rigging, collapse rescue, logistics, hazardous materials, communications, canine and technical search. The Fairfax County

- 7 -

Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) Team was established in 1986 as a domestic and international disaster response resource. It is comprised of approximately 200 specially trained career and volunteer fire and rescue personnel, with expertise in the rescue of victims from collapsed structures following a natural or man-made catastrophic event.

Q. What actions have been taken by the U.S Coast Guard?

- Three U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) Cutters – with limited drinking water production, one medic on board, and some medical supplies – are en route to Haiti. The first will arrive after 0800.
- Two USCG C-130s will do an aerial assessment of the damage at first light.

Background: 2 Coast Guard Cutters. Larger cutters (over 180 feet (55 m) in length) are controlled by Area Commands (Atlantic Area or Pacific Area). Smaller cutters come under control of District Commands. Cutters usually carry a motor surf boat and/or a rigid-hulled inflatable boat.

Q. What actions have been taken by the U.S. Department of Defense?

- The U.S. military will insert teams to secure and make functional the airport. We understand the airport could be operational within 24-48 hours.
- Aircraft of various sizes and from various locations are dedicated to providing support.

Background: There are two C-130 aircraft in the area. There are also helicopters from multiple locations. The USNS Comfort hospital ship is in Baltimore, MD and has been ordered to get underway to Haiti.

International Response/Assistance

- 8 -

Q. What are other countries doing to help?

- Chile, the Dominican Republic, the United Kingdom, Canada, Jamaica and many others have offered support, with more expected. The Dominican Republic has offered 6 helicopters and other unspecified assistance.
- Taiwan plans to send two teams totaling 55 rescue experts and four dogs. Taiwan's Red Cross and other humanitarian relief organizations and proposing aid donations as well.
- The Government of the Netherlands is proposing to send an urban search and rescue team and establishing an emergency fund. A final decision will be made later today.
- The Inter-American Development Bank has offered \$200,000 in disaster assistance.

Q. What actions have been taken by the UN?

- The UN has teams of engineers clearing the Route del Mas and Avenue John Brown -- two major arteries that connect the neighborhoods in the East of Port-au-Prince with neighborhoods in the West and the Port. These are critical routes to move heavy equipment where needed.

Q. What countries have requested assistance?

- Canada has requested assistance for its diplomats due to the destruction of its Embassy. Canadian citizens have requested assistance in communicating with their government.
- Ireland requested assistance in determining the welfare of a number of its citizens.

Q. I have family or friends living or traveling in Haiti. How can I find out about their whereabouts?

- The State Department Operations Center has set up the following number for Americans seeking information about family members in Haiti: 1-888-407-4747 (due to heavy volume, some callers may receive a recording). Our embassy is still in the early stages of contacting U.S. citizens through our Warden Network. Communications are very difficult within Haiti at this time.
- The State Department has also created a task force to monitor the emergency. People outside of Haiti with information or inquiries about U.S. citizens in Haiti may reach the Haiti Task Force at 1-888-407-4747. For callers outside the U.S., please call 202-501-4444.
- Post has issued a warden message advising the U.S. citizen community of conditions in Haiti.

Background: CA is clearing a Travel Alert for dissemination. Post will request ordered departure. SOCOM is working with post to evacuate critically injured official and private U.S. citizens. Logistics to evacuate uninjured non-essential personnel and private U.S. citizens have not yet been considered.

Q. How many people have called in? What is the wait time?

- 10 -

- Since the crisis began, the Consular Call Center has handled 649 calls. The Haiti Task Force and Embassy Port-au-Prince have logged 351 call in the Crisis Task Force software application.
- Call center wait time is currently 20 minutes.

Q. What can I do to help?

- For those interested in providing financial assistance to Haiti immediately, donors can text "HAITI" to "90999" and a donation of \$10 will be charged to their cell phones and transferred automatically to the Red Cross to help with relief efforts.
- The most efficient and effective way to help those affected by a disaster overseas is to make a monetary donation to a humanitarian organization that is implementing relief programs in the affected region. There are several different ways to go about identifying such organizations:
 - The Center for International Disaster Information (CIDI) will often have links to various organizations that are responding to a disaster.
 - InterAction, an association of non-profit humanitarian organizations, may have a list of responding members on its website. Check InterAction Members Respond: How You Can Help to see if the particular disaster is listed.
 - Global Giving may have specific disaster-recovery projects listed that can be supported.
 - Other organizations that may also have information on responding organizations include The Better Business Bureau's Wise Giving Alliance, The American Institute of Philanthropy, GuideStar, and Charity Navigator.
 - News and search engine websites sometimes have lists of responding organizations. Check CNN, MSN, Google, Yahoo, or the website of your local newspaper or television station. The United Nations maintains a website called ReliefWeb, which is a repository of information, listed by disaster, submitted by responding humanitarian organizations.

12 FAH-1 Annex J 1.1 Purpose

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

- a. This annex provides information and guidance to posts on coordinating and managing U.S. Government assistance to foreign countries in response to natural and man-made disasters. The U.S. Agency for International Development's (USAID) Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA), a part of the agency's Bureau for Democracy, Conflict, and Humanitarian Assistance (DCHA), is the lead agency for this assistance.

NOTE: Assistance to U.S. citizens and post personnel victims of a disaster or major accident is covered in Annex I. This annex (J) deals strictly with the assistance to the host country.

- b. There is a need for continuous OFDA/Mission collaboration in the planning process for disasters as well as the requirement for regular and sustained communications between the mission disaster relief officer (MDRO), and USAID/OFDA regional advisors and coordinators to ensure that U.S. Government emergency assistance is timely, appropriate, and effective.
- c. The information provided in this annex expands on the USAID/OFDA guidance provided in the OFDA annual cables and should be used in conjunction with USAID Automated Directives System (ADS) 251 on disaster assistance. Posts are encouraged to contact USAID/OFDA regional advisors and coordinators for additional information, guidance, and clarifications.

12 FAH-1 ANNEX J 3 SUDDEN-ONSET DISASTERS

12 FAH-1 Annex J 3.1 Background

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

There are some situations that develop into a disaster rapidly, causing severe damage, injury, or loss of life, which overwhelms local response capabilities and may qualify as a disaster. Examples of these include: earthquakes, flash floods, transportation accidents (such as airline or train), industrial accidents, and acts of terrorism. If the incident is one that develops gradually, follow the procedures in 12 FAH-1 Annex J 2.

12 FAH-1 Annex J 3.2 Procedures for a Sudden Onset Event That May Qualify as a Disaster

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

Using the checklists below, post must list the procedures to follow in the event a situation suddenly occurs that may meet the definition of a disaster. Due to the circumstances of the evolving event, implementation of some procedures may actually take place in a different order or not at all. Post should break the procedures down functionally and then organize them sequentially. Sample procedures containing Department guidance are listed. Additional roles can be added as needed. Refer to 12 FAH-1 H-200 for descriptions of functional duties and designation of personnel.

12 FAH-1 Annex J 3.2-1 Actions for Person Receiving Information

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

Obtain as much information as possible.

Geographic location and/or scope of the situation

The estimated total number of people affected including killed, injured, and displaced/homeless

Damage to infrastructure, crops, livestock, and other components of the physical environment

Potential host country and other donor efforts/contributions

Needs assessment information that is available

Notify the incident commander. (Post should list here the name and contact numbers for the primary and alternate incident commander.)

12 FAH-1 Annex J 3.2-2 Actions for Incident Commander

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

Assess the incident.

The magnitude of the disaster including effects on food security, health and sanitation, shelter, logistics and management, and infrastructure.

The response capacity of the host government

The response capacity of the existing donors and non-governmental organizations (NGOs)

Coordinate with relevant USAID/OFDA regional advisor.

Notify the Emergency Action Committee (EAC) chair and COM of the situation. (Post should list here their names and contact numbers.)

Begin a chronological event log.

Collect relevant documents, plans, maps, etc.

Contact the disaster coordinator for the host government. Confirm host government request for, or willingness to receive, U.S. Government assistance. (Post should list here the organization's contact names and numbers.)

Review the list of local support and expertise ((see 12 FAH-1 Appendix 2) to determine if any skills would be useful in the given situation.

Respond to the incident scene to conduct a field visit for the initial assessment of scope and needs (consult with the RSO on security).

Consult with the OFDA regional advisor and/or OFDA/W staff to alert in advance of disaster declaration.

OFDA Response Team Leader, Michael Marx 202-712-0853 or through the Department's Operations Center after normal business hours

Refer to 12 FAH-1 H-025.1 and the annual OFDA guidance cable for OFDA response options

If warranted, send disaster alert cable

Identify key response partners. Compile funding, commodity, logistics, transport and technical assistance requirements for OFDA. (Post should list here the organization's contact names and numbers.)

12 FAH-1 Annex J 3.2-3 Actions for Emergency Action Committee

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

On behalf of the COM, liaise with the host government and other donors to ensure efficient coordination of external assistance. (List the contact information for the host governments and other organizations including contact names and numbers.)

Coordinate, as appropriate, with U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) officials including Embassy Defense Attache' Officer.

Consider the need for TDY assistance such as disaster specialists, stress management, engineers, security support, HazMat Team, National Transportation Safety Board specialists, etc. Request OFDA or other agency assistance through the Department's Operations Center.

Contact the Department's Operations Center (202-647-1512).

Apprise them of the situation

Consider recommending 'MINIMIZE' travel advisory

In consultation with PA/PRS, develop a public affairs strategy (see EAP Chapter 400)

The COM can send a disaster declaration via cable, preferably after phone or email consultation with OFDA.

In the disaster declaration cable, the COM can request up to \$50,000 for immediate disaster relief from USAID/OFDA (see OFDA Annual Guidance Cable) and additional resources may be requested after the initial declaration based on assessed need

The cable must provide a clear description of how these funds will be used and through what organization the funds will flow

Provide an advance copy of the cable, sent by fax (202-216-3706/3707) or email to the post OFDA contact

12 FAH-1 ANNEX J 4 DECLARED DISASTER

12 FAH-1 Annex J 4.1 Background

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

- a. USAID/OFDA funds are to be used for immediate disaster relief or rehabilitation - not for long-term reconstruction. Relief assistance is provided to save lives and reduce human suffering. *Disaster* rehabilitation is intermediate-term activities to assist disaster stricken populations in their efforts to return to self-sufficiency. USAID/OFDA will consider the relief phase completed within 60 days after a sudden disaster occurs, unless the post requests and USAID/OFDA approves an extension of the initial response period. However, USAID/OFDA assistance may be provided for as long as the disaster requires emergency humanitarian assistance. Relief assistance for ongoing disasters, such as drought and civil strife, require a re-declaration cable at the beginning of each new U.S. Government fiscal year (October 1). Post needs to consider whether a renewal of a disaster declaration in a new fiscal year is required.
- b. Post must stay in contact with the OFDA regional advisors. Post must ensure that all of the guidelines outlined in USAID Automated Directive 251 and the OFDA annual guidance cable are followed to properly account for funds dispersed.

12 FAH-1 Annex J 4.2 Procedures After A Disaster Has Been Declared

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

Using the checklists below, post must list the procedures to follow once a disaster has been declared and U.S. Government assistance is approved. Due to the circumstances of the evolving event, implementation of some procedures may actually take place in a different order or not at all. Post should break the procedures down functionally and then organize them sequentially. Sample procedures containing Department guidance are listed.

Additional roles can be added as needed. See 12 FAH-1 H-200 for descriptions of functional duties and designation of personnel.

12 FAH-1 Annex J 4.2-1 Actions for Incident Commander (MDRO)

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

- Prepare documentation for \$50,000 grant for RCO/MD & receiving organization (e.g., Red Cross/Crescent or NGO) signature.

- Arrange for entry, transportation, lodging, local situation briefing, cash, arrival kits, etc. for arriving OFDA personnel.

- Arrange for entry and customs clearance for USAID/OFDA relief commodities.

- Monitor distribution of relief commodities to ensure they reach the affected population. Designate consignee at port of entry.

12 FAH-1 Annex J 4.2-2 Actions for Emergency Action Committee

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

- If funding beyond \$50,000 is required, contact OFDA for approval and assessment assistance.

- Maintain contact with the Department's Operations Center or task force as appropriate. Develop a public affairs strategy in coordination with PA/PRS.

- Cable regular, numbered situation reports to OFDA/W and the regional advisor that updates and expands on the initial disaster declaration cable.

- Organize an 'after action review' meeting upon completion of the relief effort.

- Draft a final summary report upon conclusion of the relief effort.

12 FAH-1 Annex J 5.2 Assessment of Host Country Disaster Response Capabilities

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

Post must include a completed copy of the form below in the EAP to describe the host country capabilities and limitations for disaster response.

12 FAH-1 H-025 OTHER NON-STATE AGENCY SUPPORT

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

Agencies with sizable staffs abroad such as the Department of Defense, USAID, the Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Justice and the Peace Corps have an obvious interest in any situation involving their personnel abroad, as do any of the other departments and agencies of the Federal Government with smaller contingents abroad. Agencies with important responsibilities in crisis management organization and action are listed below.

12 FAH-1 H-025.1 U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID)

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

- a. USAID's Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (USAID/OFDA) is responsible for providing international disaster assistance and coordinating the USG response to declared disasters in foreign countries. In addition to responding to the immediate needs of disaster victims, USAID/OFDA seeks to address the underlying hazards and vulnerabilities that create disaster risks and exacerbate impacts through support for programs in disaster mitigation, preparedness, and training. (Note: USAID/OFDA's responsibility and authority is specified in the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, Sections 491-493.)
- b. USAID/OFDA response options: In addition to releasing up to \$50,000 of disaster assistance funds, USAID/OFDA has several different options for providing disaster assistance including those listed below. Please refer to the annual OFDA Guidance Cable for additional information. (Note: A disaster declaration is not required for the deployment of regional advisors, or assessment teams.)
 - (1) Regional Advisors: In addition to the pre-disaster guidance that USAID/OFDA regional advisors can provide, they also assist in donor coordination and liaison, assessments, monitoring and reporting, logistics for relief commodities, communications with OFDA/Washington, and other aspects of post's relief effort;
 - (2) Assessment Teams: Assessment teams are deployed to provide OFDA/Washington and post with information and recommendations to make timely decisions regarding the USG's disaster response. USAID/OFDA's assessment teams are typically comprised of sector specialists (e.g., experts in health, nutrition, agriculture,

water/sanitation, shelter, geohazards, logistics, and disaster management), as well as supervisory staff familiar with USAID/OFDA policies and procedures;

- (3) Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART): USAID/OFDA's Director, with the concurrence of the U.S. Ambassador or acting Chief of Mission in the affected country, may deploy a DART based on the magnitude and severity of the disaster. A DART is a team of disaster specialists who deploy to assist a post or posts in managing the USG response to a disaster (see the OFDA Field Operations Guide).
- (4) USAID/OFDA Relief Commodities: USAID/OFDA may provide disaster relief commodities (e.g., blankets, plastic sheeting, water containers, or other essential relief commodities) from USAID/OFDA's various stockpiles when appropriate; and
- (5) NGO/IO/U.N. Funding: USAID/OFDA provides funding to non-governmental organizations (NGO) and international organizations to implement emergency program assistance for disaster response activities. NGOs working directly with the disaster victims are USAID/OFDA's preferred funding recipients. NGOs do not have to be U.S.-based, nor do they have to be registered with USAID. USAID/OFDA solicits post's knowledge and experience with the NGO community before reaching a funding decision. The local Red Cross/Red Crescent societies can be supported with USAID/OFDA funds through grants to the American Red Cross, the International Committee of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Society (ICRC), and/or the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) in Geneva, Switzerland.

How Can I Help? (from ofda's site)

Humanitarian Organizations Working in the Disaster Region

The most efficient and effective way to help those affected by a disaster overseas is to make a monetary donation to a humanitarian organization that is implementing relief programs in the affected region. There are several different ways to go about identifying such organizations:

- USAID may have a list on its website. Check USAID's home page to see if the particular disaster is listed. If it is, click on the link, and then look for the "How Can I Help?" box.
- The Center for International Disaster Information (CIDI) will often have links to various lists of organizations that are responding to a disaster.

- InterAction, an association of non-profit humanitarian organizations, may have a list of responding members on its website. Check [InterAction Members Respond: How You Can Help](#) to see if the particular disaster is listed.
- [Global Giving](#) may have specific disaster-recovery projects listed that can be supported.
- Other organizations that may also have information on responding organizations include [The Better Business Bureau's Wise Giving Alliance](#), [The American Institute of Philanthropy](#), [GuideStar](#), and [Charity Navigator](#).
- News and search engine websites sometimes have lists of responding organizations. Check [CNN](#), [MSN](#), [Google](#), [Yahoo](#), or the website of your local newspaper or television station.
- The United Nations maintains a website called [ReliefWeb](#), which is a repository of information, listed by disaster, submitted by responding humanitarian organizations.

Selecting a Humanitarian Organization to Support

There may be many organizations accepting donations for a particular disaster. Selecting which one to support is an important part of the donating process.

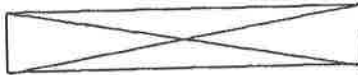

Evacuations

"No Double Standard"

The "No Double Standard" policy requires private U.S. citizens be given the same evacuation opportunities/assistance as official Americans (see 7 FAM 1862). It is Department policy to make available to private Americans any evacuation option planned for the official U.S. Government community, when appropriate and feasible. A Travel Warning will be issued when either Authorized or Ordered Departure is approved and must include information about those evacuation options.

Priorities for Evacuation Assistance

As a general rule, per 12 FAH-1 Annex K (see Addendum 3.3) the priorities for evacuation assistance are the following:

- 1.
1. Priority I: U.S. citizens
2. Priority II: Dependents of U.S. citizens
3. Priority III: Eligible TCN and FSN employees of the U.S. Government
4. Priority IV: Eligible non-U.S. citizens who are seriously ill or injured or whose lives are in imminent peril (but who do not qualify for a higher priority)
5. Priority V: Other eligible persons

This list may be adjusted depending on local circumstances and evacuation resources. 7 FAM 1863 provides additional details about certain of these categories. LPRs who do not fit under Priority II should be considered under Priority IV or V at the discretion of the Chief of Mission in consultation with the Department.

Third Country Nationals

The USG is under no specific obligation to provide evacuation assistance to any third countries. 12 FAH-1 Annex K Addendum 2.4 provides additional information about potential space-available, reimbursable assistance. Consular sections are encouraged to consult regularly and potentially coordinate with consular corps colleagues throughout an evacuation.

Promissory Notes

Finalize your eligibility policy with CA as early as possible so that you can communicate this requirement to potential evacuees through townhall meetings and warden messages. **Make sure to highlight documentation and promissory note requirements.**

- By law, any private citizen receiving evacuation assistance is required to sign a promissory note agreeing to reimburse the government for some of the evacuation costs. 7 FAM 1800 Appendix D provides information about crisis evacuation loans and evacuation documentation.
- Post must transmit the completed, original Form DS-3072 promissory notes (the entire form) to the Department by registered pouch, express mail, or by hand delivery. Transmission instructions and addresses can be found in 7 FAM 1880 Appendix D. Post should also make a photocopy or scanned copy of the promissory notes prior to mailing or having them hand carried. E-mailing a scanned copy of the document is not/not a substitute for transmission of the original hard copy.

Evacuation and Priority of AmCits and Third Country Nationals (TCNs)

Below are four FAH cites concerning the evacuation of AmCits and TCNs.

In Addition, the following rules generally apply in determining eligible TCNs:

- An AmCit adult can be accompanied by their TCN spouse and TCN children.
 - Adult TCN dependents (e.g., grandparents) usually do not qualify.
- An AmCit child can be accompanied by one TCN guardian.

12 FAH-1 Annex K Addendum 3.3 Priorities for Evacuation

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

As a general rule, the priorities for evacuation assistance are the following:

- (1) Priority I: U.S. citizens
- (2) Priority II: Dependents of U.S. citizens
- (3) Priority III: Eligible TCN and FSN employees of the U.S. Government
- (4) Priority IV: Eligible non-U.S. citizens who are seriously ill or injured or whose lives are in imminent peril (but who do not qualify for a higher priority)
- (5) Priority V: Other eligible persons

12 FAH-1 Annex K 2.4 Coordination With Other Foreign Missions

(CT:EPH-35; 11-30-2005)

- a. At the discretion of the COM, in coordination with the Department, assistance may be extended to other foreign nationals when humanitarian or U.S. national security interests dictate. If possible, the post must obtain prior approval from the Department before offering evacuation assistance.
- b. Points to cover in such local discussions may include:
 - (1) The U.S. Government will consider evacuating third-country nationals (TCNs) and host-country nationals on a case-by-case, space available, and reimbursable basis when doing so serves U.S. interests and the passenger(s) has appropriate

Evacuations of U.S. Nationals: FAQs for Host Governments

Question 1: Can the USG explain its criteria for recommending its nationals to evacuate from a crisis area? What kind of events does the USG suppose will trigger such an evacuation recommendation?

Response: Under the Diplomatic Security Act, the Secretary of State, and our Chiefs of Mission, are responsible for the protection of all American citizens abroad – private and official. The decision to order official personnel from a country and to recommend that private citizens depart is the result of an extensive consultative process involving the Chief of Mission and various offices in the Department of State.

For official personnel, the State Department has two levels of departure status – authorized departure and ordered departure. Official Americans (often limited to family members only) can return to the United States at USG expense under authorized departure status. Under ordered departure status, the Chief of Mission compels certain official personnel to return to the United States. Private American citizens are notified of these actions, and are notified of USG recommendations to depart through a variety of public media. The U.S. Government cannot order private American citizens to leave a foreign country. It can only advise and try to assist those who wish to leave.

The criteria used to reach a decision to authorize or order departure of official personnel or recommend that private citizens depart are highly dependant on the circumstances of the crisis and the country in which it is occurring. However, the safety of American citizens is the most important consideration. Each U.S. Mission develops internal guidelines (known as "tripwires") for the use of the State Department and the Chiefs of Mission in analyzing an on-going crisis situation. These tripwires do not mandate actions or departure orders, but can be helpful in preparing for and responding to a crisis.

When a crisis escalates to a point where additional logistical assistance is required, the State Department's Executive Secretary convenes an inter-agency task force to coordinate the USG response to the crisis. The task force works closely with the Chief of Mission to resolve the crisis and ensure the safety of American citizens. Sometimes during a crisis, commercial transportation entering and leaving a country is disrupted. If this happens, and if it appears unsafe for Americans to remain, the U.S. Embassy and consulates work with a task force in Washington to charter special air flights and ground transportation to help Americans (and in some instances other evacuees) to depart. In rare situations and as a last resort, U.S. military assistance is requested to assist Americans in safely departing a crisis area.

Regarding the type of events that will trigger a departure or evacuation, we refer you to the attached document entitled "Drawdown / Evacuation of U.S. Diplomatic Posts Since 1988 under Authorized and Ordered Departure Authority." This document provides a list of past events that have triggered an authorized or ordered departure of official Americans. [See S/ES-O/CMS Intranet site.]

Question 2: Do American evacuees have any specific IDs for evacuation purposes or otherwise pass a screening equivalent to an immigration check?

Response: To be eligible for evacuation, American evacuees must present a U.S. passport or other proof of U.S. citizenship and identity. Immediate family members of U.S. citizens, or non-American citizen adult escorts of U.S. citizen minors must present a travel document valid for entry into the United States, like a "green card," a non-immigrant visa, or a passport valid for Visa Waiver Program travel. In addition to having passports, evacuees in U.S. military-assisted evacuations may be given bar-coded bracelets for tracking evacuees. Those without proper documentation will be dealt with in a case-by-case basis, and may be required to obtain emergency documentation.

Question 3: What kinds of tasks does the USG expect the personnel of a government receiving USG evacuation assistance to conduct? What kinds of tasks would the USG expect from a country providing a safehaven or transit location?

Response: At the embarkation points, a government receiving USG evacuation assistance could be expected to provide document screening, confirmation of citizenship and information about its nationals' eligibility to enter the safe-haven country. It may be asked to provide interpretation and crowd control assistance, confirm passenger boarding lists, conduct public outreach to its citizens regarding procedures and schedules, and handle interactions with non-national family members of its citizens who are refused boarding on USG-chartered or USG-provided transport. USG personnel would be performing the same tasks for American evacuees.

At safe haven points, the government receiving USG assistance might be asked to provide meet and greet services, interpretation, accommodations or assistance in arranging accommodations, and assistance in determining eligibility for further travel for its citizens and their family members. The USG could request that a government offering a safehaven or transit location provide meet and greet assistance, immigration services, food, shelter, security and medical assistance.

In the 2006 Lebanon evacuation, for instance, Cypriot immigration officials expedited processing for those arriving, and the Cypriot government set up an emergency shelter at the Cyprus International Fairgrounds that accommodated up to 3,000 people at a time. The shelter offered families hot meals, showers, cots and basic toiletries, as well as medical attention. More than 150 volunteers from U.S. embassies around the world joined Embassy Nicosia's staff to register new arrivals, issue more than 75 emergency passports and help process 150 humanitarian parole applications. More than 85 percent of the arrivals were moved onto USG-arranged charter flights within 24 hours of arrival in Cyprus. Cypriot immigration authorities provided extra staff to process those departing.

Turkish immigration authorities met the over 1700 evacuees arriving in Adana, Turkey at the port and expedited their entry into Turkey. Red Crescent volunteers also met and provided medical assistance as needed. Evacuees were then transported to Incirlik Air Base where they were housed in dormitory style housing.

Question 4: What is evacuation documentation?

Response: Proof of citizenship and identity (such as a passport), other travel documents valid for entry to the U.S (such as a green card) and the DS-3072 "Emergency Loan Application and Evacuation Document".

Question 5: What roles are expected of additional consular personnel and other crisis management experts who may request entry into a crisis country?

Response: Roles of additional consular personnel and other crisis management experts will depend on the type of crisis. For example, in a major accident or disaster, consular personnel will help identify U.S. citizen victims and survivors, interview survivors and make sure they are receiving adequate care, make sure next of kin are notified, support uninjured survivors who may request assistance; check local hospitals and morgues for U.S. citizen victims; and conduct "welfare and whereabouts" searches for U.S. citizens believed to be in the affected area.

In the Lebanon assisted departure, 140 consular personnel from other U.S embassies around the world joined staff in Beirut, Cyprus, and Turkey. Non-consular staff/crisis management experts also traveled to the three posts, to assist in the logistical and public diplomacy efforts that were essential to the consular effort (e.g., contracting buses, supporting the influx of USG officials, etc.). More specifically, in Beirut consular staff sorted U.S. citizens into three groups: those with valid passports and visas; those with minor documentary problems, such as expired passports; and those with major problems, such as no documentation. They coordinated boarding of USG-chartered transport,

clarifying departees' boarding eligibility and obtaining boarding lists for the Department task force. In Cyprus and Turkey, they registered new arrivals, issued emergency passports and helped process visas or the appropriate travel documents for entry into the U.S. for American citizens' immediate family members, as necessary. After settling the evacuees in safehaven locations, the consular officers and assistants provided 24/7 information and assistance to the citizens, resolved the citizen's minor or major documentary problems, and helped manage the boarding procedures for departure flights to prevent unauthorized departures and to generate an accurate boarding list.

Question 6: Does the American evacuees' health insurance apply in case of war, natural disaster, etc?

Response: It depends on the individual's health insurance plan. Individuals will have to use personal funds if their health insurance does not cover. The USG urges, but cannot require, private Americans to obtain health insurance, including travelers' medical insurance for short-term visitors.

Question 7: Can the USG reimburse a host government for the cost of emergency medical services provided to American evacuees, including non-U.S. nationals?

Response: In general, medical expenses are the responsibility of the traveler. The USG may reimburse a host government for the cost of emergency medical services only with respect to US citizens and only in certain limited circumstances where the USG has statutory authority to pay for the services, including for USG employees and certain destitute U.S. citizens (on a reimbursable basis to the extent feasible) as addressed in the Basic Authorities Act. Questions regarding reimbursement for non-U.S. nationals should be directed toward their governments.

§ 4802. Responsibility of Secretary of State

How Current is This?

(a) Security functions

(1) The Secretary of State shall develop and implement (in consultation with the heads of other Federal agencies having personnel or missions abroad where appropriate and within the scope of the resources made available) policies and programs, including funding levels and standards, to provide for the security of United States Government operations of a diplomatic nature and foreign government operations of a diplomatic nature in the United States. Such policies and programs shall include—

(A) protection of all United States Government personnel on official duty abroad (other than Voice of America correspondents on official assignment and those personnel under the command of a United States area military commander) and their accompanying dependents;

(B) establishment and operation of security functions at all United States Government missions abroad (other than facilities or installations subject to the control of a United States area military commander);

(C) establishment and operation of security functions at all Department of State facilities in the United States; and

(D) protection of foreign missions, international organizations, and foreign officials and other foreign persons in the United States, as authorized by law.

(2) Security responsibilities shall include the following:

(A) Former Office of Security functions

Functions and responsibilities exercised by the Office of Security, Department of State, before November 11, 1985.

(B) Security and protective operations

(i) Establishment and operation of post security and protective functions abroad.

(ii) Development and implementation of communications, computer, and information security.

(iii) Emergency planning.

(iv) Establishment and operation of local guard services abroad.

(v) Supervision of the United States Marine Corps security guard program.

(vi) Liaison with American overseas private sector security interests.

(vii) Protection of foreign missions and international organizations, foreign officials, and diplomatic personnel in the United States, as authorized by law.

(viii) Protection of the Secretary of State and other persons designated by the Secretary of State, as authorized by law.

(ix) Physical protection of Department of State facilities, communications, and computer and information systems in the United States.

(x) Conduct of investigations relating to protection of foreign officials and diplomatic personnel and foreign missions in the United States, suitability for employment, employee security, illegal passport and visa issuance or use, and other investigations, as authorized by law.

(xi) Carrying out the rewards program for information concerning international terrorism authorized by section 2708 (a) ⁽¹⁾ of this title.

(xii) Performance of other security, investigative, and protective matters as authorized by law.

(C) Counterterrorism planning and coordination

Development and coordination of counterterrorism planning, emergency action planning, threat analysis programs, and liaison with other Federal agencies to carry out this paragraph.

(D) Security technology

Development and implementation of technical and physical security programs, including security-related construction, radio and personnel security communications, armored vehicles, computer and communications security, and research programs necessary to develop such measures.

(E) Diplomatic courier service

Management of the diplomatic courier service.

(F) Personnel training

Development of facilities, methods, and materials to develop and upgrade necessary skills in order to carry out this section.

(G) Foreign government training

Management and development of antiterrorism assistance programs to assist foreign government security training which are administered by the Department of State under chapter 8 of part II of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2349aa et seq.).

(b) Overseas evacuations

The Secretary of State shall develop and implement policies and programs to provide for the safe and efficient evacuation of United States Government personnel, dependents, and private United States citizens when their lives are endangered. Such policies shall include measures to identify high risk areas where evacuation may be necessary and, where appropriate, providing staff to United States Government missions abroad to assist in those evacuations. In carrying out these responsibilities, the Secretary shall—

- (1) develop a model contingency plan for evacuation of personnel, dependents, and United States citizens from foreign countries;
- (2) develop a mechanism whereby United States citizens can voluntarily request to be placed on a list in order to be contacted in the event of an evacuation, or which, in the event of an evacuation, can maintain information on the location of United States citizens in high risk areas submitted by their relatives;
- (3) assess the transportation and communications resources in the area being evacuated and determine the logistic support needed for the evacuation; and

(4) develop a plan for coordinating communications between embassy staff, Department of State personnel, and families of United States citizens abroad regarding the whereabouts of those citizens.

(c) Oversight of posts abroad

The Secretary of State shall—

(1) have full responsibility for the coordination of all United States Government personnel assigned to diplomatic or consular posts or other United States missions abroad pursuant to United States Government authorization (except for facilities, installations, or personnel under the command of a United States area military commander) ^[2]

(2) establish appropriate overseas staffing levels for all such posts or missions for all Federal agencies with activities abroad (except for personnel and activities under the command of a United States area military commander or regional inspector general offices under the jurisdiction of the inspector ^[3] General, Agency for International Development).

(d) Federal agency

As used in this subchapter and subchapter III of this chapter, the term "Federal agency" includes any department or agency of the United States Government.

Our Ambassador in Haiti has been in contact with President Preval. Preval expresses his tremendous gratitude for the outpouring of assistance to Haiti. (INSERT HERE IF OBAMA WAS ALSO ABLE TO SPEAK WITH PREVAL.... I DON'T HAVE LATEST ON THIS)

Priorities of the Haitian Government, are as follows, in priority order:

1. Search and Rescue: Search and rescue teams with requisite equipment including heavy machinery for removal of debris.
2. Medical Assistance: Haitian health care system is operating extremely limited. Haiti is in great need of doctors, nurses, medical supplies, and mobile medical clinics to attend to the wounded.
3. Communications Equipment: Land and mobile networks are down and the Haitian Government is having great difficulty communicating with each other and with the rest of the country. USAID and Southcom are helping with this, but the need is great.
4. Energy: Haiti's electrical grid is extremely weak to begin with and is now fully inoperable. Preval is looking for assistance in the form of generators or electricity barges.

The USG is providing assistance through four main channels:

- o State Department: Communications and coordination. In the first 24 hours of this crisis, USAID is providing \$10 million to focus on immediate life saving needs such as search and rescue. The United States will provide substantially more assistance as additional needs are identified to help Haiti and others in the region. We are committed to Haiti's future.
- o USAID: Humanitarian relief in the form of three 70-80 person search and rescue teams. USAID is also coordinating medical care, disaster assessment, distribution of aid.
- o DoD: A Special Ops Wing is coming in to establish airport control and security. An aircraft carrier will arrive in 48 hours and a hospital ship will depart Baltimore for Haiti today.

o Coast Guard—our coast guard is moving four large cutters toward the Haiti port to support with relief and helo pad infrastructure.

We encourage you to provide in whatever way you can, but especially in response to the four priorities outlined by the Haitian Government. We are very concerned about MINUSTAH's ability to maintain command and control in the near term given the heavy casualties we understand they may have sustained. We will be looking carefully at how we may need to supplement the UN force in the near term to perform basic security and coordination operations on the ground.

Country-Specific Notes:

Canada: Second biggest donor also very big in the Haitian security sphere. We will need to lean on them for help in this sphere given MINUSTAH losses.

Dominican Republic: We are enormously appreciative of all the President Fernandez has already done to help with this relief effort (he has deployed his helos). Ask what exactly they think they can contribute on all four GOH priorities. We may want to suggest that we could reimburse them for their expenses. Given their proximity they have an obvious comparative advantage and we really need their help.

Brazil: Brazil is the obvious leader in Latin America on all things Haiti. We may want to work the energy angle with them. Perhaps they can supply emergency generators, etc?

Colombia: Given their increased involvement in Haiti, we want to reach out to say that we would welcome their support in the security sphere given MINUSTAH losses.

IADB: Ask Luis Moreno if we can set up a trust fund/emergency flash appeal to pool recovery/rebuilding funds. In situations like these we often get many commitments for relief but little for recovery. This is going to require a lot of building back. Also ask them about roads.

EU: Roads, roads, roads. Roads and bridges are destroyed and this is EU real strong suit—and they are very big in this sector right now. Also search and rescue (UK and France are sending teams). They are bi

USG Response to Haiti Earthquake

Coordination

- We are in touch with the Haitian Government as we are assessing Haiti's needs and expediting the flow of search, rescue, and assistance to Haiti.
- The U.S. has launched a multi-agency effort. The Department of State, the Agency for International Development (USAID), the Department of Defense, and the Department of Homeland Security (including the Coast Guard) are engaged.
- There has been significant outreach and offers of assistance from the international community.
 - **NOTE:** Those reportedly offering assistance include: Brazil, Dominican Republic, Taiwan, Inter-American Development Bank, World Bank, Red Cross, China, Morocco, Chile, Argentina, Costa Rica, Mexico

State Department

- **AmCits.** There are approximately 45,000 U.S. citizens in Haiti. The U.S. Embassy in Port-au-Prince has activated the Warden system that enables us to reach out to our U.S. citizen community in country.
- **Embassy/Personnel/Evacuations.** Key facts:
 - There are 172 personnel under Chief of Mission authority.
 - The US Embassy structure remains intact.
 - We have approved ordered departure for approximately 80 Embassy spouses, children and non-emergency personnel.
 - US Coast Guard (USCG) C-130 planes evacuated 42 non-emergency personnel and 72 private American citizens to Santo Domingo January 13 (total 114)
 - 150 private Americans now at the Embassy will be evacuated via military aircraft at 0900 EST January 14.
 - 160 private Americans will report to the airport the morning of January 14 to prepare for a second round of MilAir flights.
 - The USCG is sending two C-130 planes January 14 with the capacity to evacuate 140. The flights are scheduled to depart Port-au-Prince for

Santo Domingo at 1000 EST on January 14 and may be able to conduct two additional evacuations each during the day.

- USCG conducted a MEDEVAC of 9 critically injured people from US Embassy in Port-au-Prince to GTMO.
- Iceland Air delivered a Search and Rescue (SAR) team and then transported approximately 49 private Americans to Nassau. U.S. Embassy Nassau provided assistance on their arrival.

- **Operations:**

- **Ops Center:** We are operating an 18 person 24 hour task force task force in Washington as well as a 20 person 24 hour Consular Affairs task force in Washington responding to all inquiries from the public. This operation is providing seamless service in spite of handling record-setting call volume.
- **In Port-au-Prince:** Six consular officers will arrive within 48 hours to assist consular section with assisting Amcits.
- Embassy Santo Domingo are sending 800 lbs of medical supplies and a regional nurse via air.
- Diplomatic Security is sending an 18 person mobile security team with six pallets of medical supplies on January 14.

- **Evacuating the Spanish Ambassador.** Embassy Port-au-Prince reports the Spanish Ambassador to Haiti is injured and is at the U.S. Embassy. As he appears to be [REDACTED] the USCG plans to evacuate him on the helicopter that is delivering the remaining DART team members expected to arrive at 0230 EST.

USAID

- **Disaster Assistance Response Teams (DART)**

- Disaster Assistance Response Team members arrived on January 13.
 - DART and mission personnel met with Haitian government officials to coordinate disaster response.
 - Four DART members who were previously not granted landing clearance now are scheduled to arrive at 0230 EST via USCG helicopter. The initial cause of landing clearance denial has been remedied.

- **Search and Rescue (SAR) Teams**

- 72 members of the Fairfax County SAR arrived the evening of January 13.
 - Fairfax SAR set up a base of operations at the embassy, conducted an initial survey, and identified priority targets for January 14.
 - Fairfax SAR cleared one American embassy residence but found no remains or survivors, attempted to visit MINUSTAH headquarters but could not enter the compound, and could not reach the Hotel Montana because of blocked roads.
- Miami and Los Angeles SAR teams are arriving early January 14.
- **Emergency Response Assistance.** On January 13, U.S. Ambassador to Haiti Kenneth H. Merten declared a disaster due to the effects of the earthquake. In response, USAID provided an initial \$50,000 through the U.S. Embassy in Port-au-Prince for the implementation of an emergency response program. USAID plans to provide additional assistance in accordance with the findings of the DART team and humanitarian community assessments, as access to affected groups expands over the coming days.
- **Food Assistance.** USAID's Office of Food for Peace has contacted all active P.L. 480 Title II emergency food assistance implementing partners in Haiti to determine the availability of commodity stocks in-country and the capacity of organizations to reach earthquake victims.
- More than 10 on the ground

Department of Defense

- DoD personnel are on the ground working with Embassy staff, Haitian, UN, and international officials to assess the situation and facilitate follow on U.S. military support.
 - The U.S. Navy Aircraft Carrier USS Carl Vinson is due to arrive January 14 with fourteen helicopters.
 - The Marine Expeditionary Wing (amphibious ship with helicopter capability) will arrive on January 15 w/2000.
 - The U.S. Army 82nd Airborne is due to arrive on January 15.
 - The U.S. Navy Destroyer USS Higgins will arrive January 16.
 - The U.S. Navy Hospital Ship USNS Comfort will arrive on January 22.

Coast Guard (USCG)

- USCG is assisting with the evacuation of US personnel (see above section on Embassy/Personnel/Evacuations).
- Three USCG Cutters – with helo platforms, limited drinking water production, one medic on board, and some medical supplies – are en route to Haiti.
- The UN delegation – including UN ASYG Mulet – will be transported by USCG C-130 planes and arrive in Port-au-Prince by 0900 EST January 14 to begin an assessment of the situation and to stand up UN relief efforts.

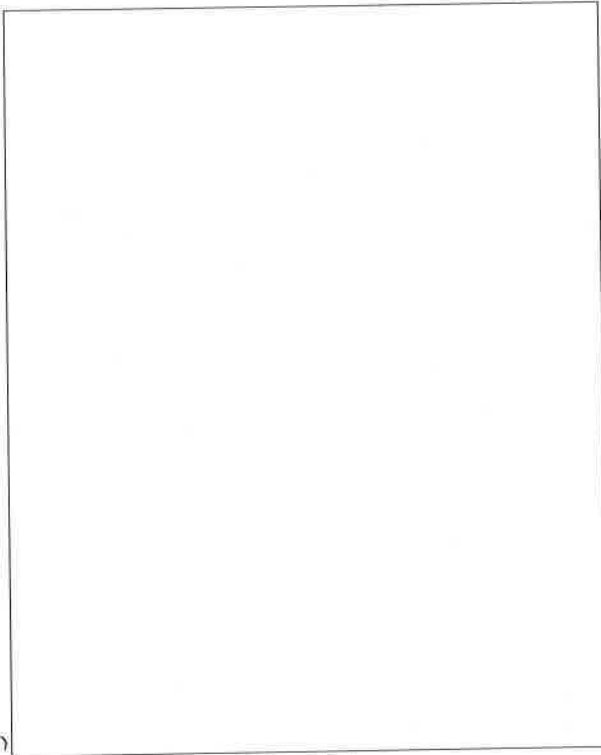

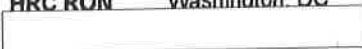

- **Airport Ops:** Haitian PM signed MOU allowing USG control and prioritization of airport operations (1600, 1/14, SITREP).
- **Deteriorating Security Situation:** Private AmCits are reporting robbery of their food, water, and other essential relief material (1500, 1/15, E-mail from AmCits).
- **Amcit Medical Cases/Casualties:** It is now confirmed that AmCit Stephanie Jean-Charles, the daughter of a USAID employee in Haiti, was killed in the earthquake. (2000, 1/15, internal e-mail)
- **USG Humanitarian Assistance:** AID has committed to providing 600,000 Humanitarian Daily Rations (HDRs) beginning immediately. A USAID/FFP ship is expected to arrive on January 17 in the port of LaCayes, 100 miles southwest of Port-au-Prince. The vessel is carrying commodities that will feed approximately 130,000 people for 30 days. A second ship carrying more than 6,100 MT of pre-positioned food aid is scheduled to arrive in Haiti on January 28. Additionally, the aircraft carrier USS Carl S. Vinson is now on station in Port-au-Prince harbor, and will be providing helicopter lift support for water and humanitarian supplies. (1000, 1/15, internal)
- **Pressing Issues:** The PaP plumbing system is slowly being restored, but large portions of the city's water and power grid are not operational. Water has become a critical problem in some areas of the city. (0000, 1/16, USDAO Sitrep #12)
- **Pressing Issues:** The fuel delivery pier in Port-au-Prince harbor is damaged and no fuel can be delivered to the tank farm at the port. An estimated two days' supply remains in bulk storage before fuel becomes scarce. The humanitarian aid organization is working to deploy an additional US-based emergency response team to assess the situation and the most pressing needs of the people of Haiti.

[redacted] works with **World Vision**, which commenced emergency relief operations in Port-au-Prince, with distributions of essential medical supplies to city hospitals. The distributions began on Wednesday, the day after the quake, despite World Vision's own offices suffering heavy quake damage. World Vision's main office building was rendered unusable, but operations continued from a second building.

[redacted] work with **Food for the Hungry**, which is on the ground in Haiti distributing blankets, rolls of plastic for temporary shelter, solar-powered flashlights, community water filters, jerry cans to collect water, and hygiene kits. On the way are clothing, more plastic sheeting, medical supplies, water purification tablets, water and food.

Thank you for your letter of 16 December 2009 on the issue of defamation of religions. Thanks also to your Deputy Assistant Secretary, Suzanne Nossel, for making the trip across the Atlantic to discuss this and your broader UN human rights agenda in spite of travel disruptions caused by the severe weather.

The United Kingdom continues to welcome the efforts of the United States to reach out to partners at the United Nations on a range of difficult issues. We supported your resolution at the September Human Rights Council that successfully found new international consensus on freedom of expression.

I also share your concern over the concept of "defamation of religions". This concept, in seeking to extend legal protections designed for individuals to religions, is incompatible with international human rights law. We share your determination to oppose those who seek to promote it and undermine human rights law.

Like the United States, the United Kingdom has argued that the focus of States should be on practical measures to challenge intolerance which give effect to existing human rights protections, rather than on developing new legal standards. It is helpful that you will present this practical focus as the more effective route to tackling discrimination and intolerance on the grounds of race or religion. For us it will be important to argue that the existing framework of human rights law provides sufficient protection to individuals with no suggestion that new legal standards are required.

I understand that my officials had a very productive discussion with Suzanne Nossel in December and will be writing to her in follow-up on the detail of your initiative. I hope our officials will remain in close contact at the UN, in London, and in Washington as this initiative progresses.

While writing on this subject I would like to congratulate you on your speech delivered to Georgetown University on 14 December. I was particularly interested in the interrelationship you saw between human rights, democracy and development and the elements you set out for the Administration's approach to human rights. Much of this chimes with my own thinking and I look forward to engaging with you on this agenda.

Dear Madam MOTB!

First of all, a belated Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you and the entire family—I trust you've been able to find SOME time for yourself despite the crushing workload and of course now, [redacted]

Been thinking about you a lot lately and must share with you that my new year's resolution was to attempt to work more closely with the boss lady in 2010. Apologies in advance :-)

To that end, I caught your speech today and it spurred me to post with you directly and follow up on a matter that you and I have discussed briefly and that we've met with State Dept officials about— as I think there is strong potential for a good fit with what you're working on and in particular, what you framed today. You know I rarely go direct to you on anything but this potential opportunity coupled with the uneasy feeling of my negligent correspondence has led me to you!

As you know, we met with Amb. Stewart last year about our training programs and expressed our sincere desire to offer our expertise in order to expand opportunities and capacity in some of the world's most troubled regions. I honestly cannot tell you how many times I yelled at the TV over the holidays as expert pundit after expert pundit commenting on the latest unsuccessful terror plot never seemed to hone in on the lack of opportunity that exists in so many parts of the world and thus, these young people are coerced into joining a destructive 'movement'. I don't see much difference with disaffected youth in this country although those who seek to do us harm in that manner have of course taken it to an entirely different level.....

Nevertheless, I feel that what we could potentially offer would help address this systemic problem, further your goals, and truly inject into the dialogue some positive stories about the United States' influence/role in the world and in particular, in areas where we may be viewed as 'occupiers' or worse. Heck, maybe as a bonus we'll even get a positive story or two about the American labor movement and/or America's Building Trades Unions but I won't hold my breath in that regard :-)

What I'm talking about is construction workforce development and on a country by country basis—as we would need legitimate partners to make this work—that would fit into the larger plan, if you will. No one can do this workforce development better than the BCTD and its affiliates. Annually, we along with our contractor counterparts invest approx \$750 million annually on workforce development. Its what we do.

As envisioned (and already put into place in some areas such as El Salvador, Poland, South Africa and Egypt) this would be a knowledge transfer program centered on education, training, apprenticeship and safety/health. We can help folks rebuild short and long term. There would be built in sustainability through trusts funded by employer contributions, it would help 'train the trainers', would get folks working on community projects where they live such as affordable housing as part of their training experience etc etc etc. It could be called the International Craftworkers Service Corps or International

Building Trades Service Corps, or the like. We would provide short term technical assistance and establish specialized corps of stand-by reservists who would serve on reconstruction efforts in the wake of natural and man made disasters (so, in a way, this is an extension of the legislation you sponsored in partnership with the building trades that set up the 2nd responders database...??). We could even model or build on some of our domestic BCTD programs here and target outreach in these countries to and among veterans, women, youth, ethnic minorities, etc. The possibilities are endless. With our help (but think fish proverb!), people in these nations would be working side by side to rebuild their countries, their communities and their lives.

Furthermore, my boss, Mark Ayers, has already been meeting with his European Building Trades Counterparts on several potential global initiatives and there is a sincere desire to partner with U.S. Building Trades unions on an effort such as this (specifically, Mark has met a few times with the head of the Italian BT who is also head of the EU Building Trades as it were.....). Perhaps this could also be an overlay to other work by the U.S. and our allies on the global stage even while we may not see eye to eye on every aspect of our country's foreign policy.

As I stated above and you know, we met with Amb. Stewart on this who has since moved on but I actually think the better fit for this wouldn't be through Asst Sec of Democracy and Human Rights but rather, USAID. So you know— this would be separate from work of the Solidarity Center which as I understand it, works through the Democracy and Human Rights channel. While the goals are ostensibly similar and certainly related, we would want to avoid being lumped in with the human and labor rights agenda solely because of our association with the AFLCIO. If we run through USAID, we could look at country budgets and cross reference those with those nations with workforce development budgets so as to build on existing capacity of sorts— and this could be countries like Afghanistan, Iraq, Egypt, etc but quite honestly, we are willing to go anywhere in the world you think serves the broader agenda and for the opportunity to advance this very worthwhile and undoubtedly patriotic duty/mission. Specifically, I think this fits with the objectives of "Education and Training, Economic Growth and Humanitarian Assistance" at USAID, but naturally, I would rely on your best judgment on how to pursue this. Perhaps now through all this rambling you can see my attempt at dot connecting here!! This may be the most serious I've ever been about a New Year's Resolution!!!

What do you think? I can put together more detailed concepts and potential budgets for you if you'd like. Whatever you need from me. I know Pres. Ayers and his European counterparts would greatly appreciate the opportunity to sit with you personally to discuss this further if you're so inclined. I would imagine much would need to be done in advance of that potential meeting therefore I would again rely on your best judgment as to where I should go and who I should work with on this. But only if you think this is worth while and something you could support and help shepherd through the vortex if we hit any snags along the way. Otherwise, between us, I'll tell the boss to move on and I'll figure something else to discuss with you as laid out in the terms of my new year's res.....!

Secretary Clinton, I returned last week from the African Union Summit in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, where I traveled with the US delegation led by U/S Maria Otero and including A/S Johnnie Carson, NSC Director Michelle Gavin, USAID Acting Assistant Administrator Earl Gast, and Special Adviser Howard Wolpe. I went to the Summit with three principal objectives:

1. To consult with the parties about implementing the remaining pillars of the CPA and beginning discussions about post-2011 issues;
2. To reach out to Sudan's neighbors to discuss the way forward in the Darfur peace talks and the North-South peace process; and
3. To coordinate efforts with the United Nations and African Union to define the roles of key international players going forward.

Consultations with the Sudanese Parties

The NCP and SPLM have, unfortunately, reached another standoff in the run up to April 2010 elections and the January 2011 referenda. The NCP is anxious to form a political partnership with the SPLM that they believe will guarantee President Bashir a first-round electoral victory. The SPLM is demanding resolution of the still-outstanding census dispute, threatening to pull their candidates from Southern seats in the National Assembly if they do not reach a deal before elections. While it seems unlikely the SPLM, who has fielded a relatively strong candidate for the presidency, will accede to a political partnership, I have argued that boycotting the National Assembly would be imprudent when the legislation needed to guarantee the referendum has not yet been completely approved.

The level of mistrust between the parties remains high. The parties continue working through these issues in Sudan, and I will return to Khartoum in 17 February to help break through this

latest impasse.

Discussions with Sudan's Neighbors

IGAD Countries

I spoke to key leaders from IGAD countries—Ethiopian Prime Minister Meles, Ugandan President Museveni, and Kenyan Foreign Minister Wetangula—to coordinate our efforts with Sudan's key neighbors to the South. All of these leaders share our concern about the consequences of renewed conflict between North and South.

We discussed the role of President Mbeki as the AU's representative to work on a broad range of issues on Sudan. All three leaders agreed that President Mbeki would speak for both the AU and IGAD in talks with the Sudanese. Furthermore, all three expressed that 1) a lack of trust between the parties in Sudan is preventing the parties from reaching the agreements necessary to stave off crisis, with both sides contributing to these tensions; 2) the South is steered by their greatest fear that the Khartoum regime will take steps to defer or delay the referenda; and 3) internal instability in the South, disunity in its leadership, and limited governance and security capacity in its government could drive instability in the entire region.

In a few weeks, IGAD plans to host a ministerial summit to formally endorse President Mbeki and to issue with the parties a plan of work for prioritizing and negotiating the post-referenda issues. They have invited me to the summit, and I plan to attend. All three countries emphasized the irreplaceable role of the United States in keeping the peace between North and South. Prime Minister Meles warned, however, that unless the US Administration overcomes its internal divisions, the parties will possibly write off the United States and thus diminish our influence and leverage in this critical period.

Chad and Libya

The 15 January agreement between Chad and Sudan to normalize bilateral relations and secure their mutual border, coupled with President Deby's trip to Khartoum on 8 Feb, has been a great achievement for us and for Darfur. If successfully implemented, it would remove a significant source of instability in the region. In my meetings with Chadian Foreign Minister Faki and Sudanese Presidential Adviser Ghazi, I discerned that the agreement is fragile and that despite an exchange of high-level visits, trust has not been institutionalized throughout their governments. I will visit Ndjamena and the border region this week (14-16 Feb) to help build more confidence in the agreement. In the meantime, I will continue to press the parties to fulfill their commitments and investigate whether the United States could provide technical assistance to enhance border monitoring efforts.

In discussions on the future of the Darfur mediation, Libyan Foreign Minister Musa Kusa expressed his lack of confidence in the peace talks hosted in Doha. He said the rebels, reveling in media attention and their plush lifestyles in Qatar, have little incentive to sign a peace deal. Meanwhile the Government of Sudan remains aloof and has largely shrugged off the responsibility it could shoulder in reaching a deal. FM Kusa therefore believed the peace talks

should be relocated from Doha to Darfur, where the Government of Sudan would hold direct negotiations with the parties to the conflict, with the region and international community serving as observers. While I agree with Minister Kusa's approach, and note that others ranging from PM Meles and FM Faki to UN SRSG for Darfur Gambari also whole heartedly agreed, it will be challenging to convince rebels and civil society alike that sufficient freedoms currently exist in Darfur for open dialogue with the Government to occur.

United Nations and the African Union

We have long suffered from a lack of UN leadership in both Darfur and the South. However, with the appointments of Haile Menkerios as the new Special Representative for Sudan (UNMIS) and Ibrahim Gambari as Joint Special Representative of UNAMID, we now have competent and experienced leaders in the UN's top Sudan posts. The challenge now is to coordinate efforts between these UN leaders, President Mbeki on behalf of the African Union, and myself on behalf of the United States and our key partners in the international community. My solidarity message to both Menkerios and Gambari was that security should be their top priority, though Menkerios sees himself playing a more strategic role in political discussions.

Next Steps

Following my meetings with the parties, the neighbors, the United Nations, and the African Union, my next steps will be to:

- Facilitate trilateral talks with the NCP and SPLM in mid-February to 1) work through the latest hurdles in CPA implementation that must be resolved before the April elections and 2) talk about the mechanisms and processes for negotiating major post-referendum issues.

- Visit Chad and the Chad-Sudan border region to encourage a continued thaw in relations and seek ways to assist in border monitoring.

- Attend the IGAD Summit in Nairobi, tentatively slated for mid-February, to reenergize the international community and initiate a process for discussing post-referendum issues.

- On the margins of the IGAD Summit, coordinate roles with the UN's Haile Menkerios and the AU's President Mbeki for what we believe will be the core political leadership team representing the international community in talks on post-referendum issues.

I look forward to our discussion on 9 Feb (assuming we're not still snow bound on Tuesday) and welcome the opportunity to brief you in greater detail on my discussions at the African Union and these next steps. Very respectfully, Scott

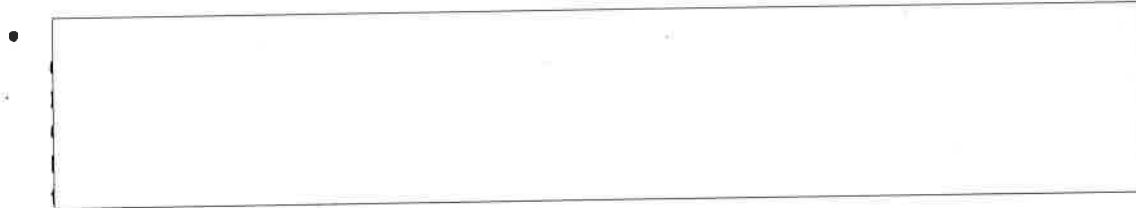

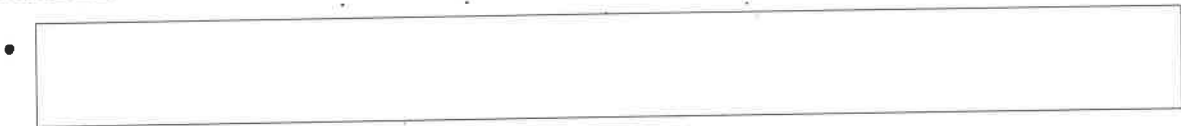

I just finished talking to Sheikh Hamad bin Jassim, the Prime Minister. Principal points:

- Qatar very honored to receive the Secretary;
- HBJ already had the news that S was coming and had already shifted meetings scheduled for the Turkish Prime Minister so that he, HBJ, could see S at 10:30 am on the 14th, followed immediately by a meeting with the Amir;
- Sheikh Hamad bin Jassim plans to attend the US-Islamic World Forum dinner, and speech by the Secretary, that night;
- He is arranging for security and for special accommodations he did not identify-- almost certainly not a hotel.
- I told him that S wants to do something in the education field with Sheikhha Mozah. He said he would check into that.
- I raised the visa processing issue, asking for a contact in his office, or elsewhere, to whom we could turn for help in such logistical matters. He said everything would be taken care of, and he gave me the name of his office director, Abdullah Sulaiti, as the principal contact for us.
- We did not discuss lunch, but it is often the practice at the Palace to host a lunch following such late morning back-to-back meetings with the Amir and PM.

If so, that would leave a full afternoon free for programming, to include an event with Sheikhha Mozah.

- I want at the beginning to thank you, and through you the Administration, for the support that you've expressed for the UN-led negotiating process on Western Sahara and for my own role in that regard.
- I know that the US finds the autonomy proposal that Morocco put forward in 2007 to be a reasonable basis for discussion. But I have always counseled the major international actors on the Western Sahara issue to avoid expressing support for a specific outcome of the negotiating process. The reason is simple: expressions of support for an outcome in the absence of effective pressure to help produce that outcome serve merely to stiffen positions on both sides and thus render the negotiations even more difficult.
- Both parties need to feel a bit uncertain about the outcome if they are to make the kinds of compromises that will be needed to produce the "mutually acceptable solution, which will provide for the self-determination of the people of Western Sahara," to quote the latest Security Council resolution and its predecessors.
- OUA, AU, and UN involvement in efforts to find a solution from the 1980's to 2005 was based on getting the parties to accept fully elaborated plans that all included some kind of referendum that included independence as an option. Jim Baker was the last UN envoy in this mode, and the key question he attempted to negotiate was who was eligible to vote. In the end, the parties were not able to agree, and he abandoned his efforts in mid-2005.
- Since then, the Security Council has pushed for a settlement negotiated directly between Morocco and the Polisario, with Algeria in the wings as an unspoken party. In April 2007, with the encouragement and help of the US and other parties, Morocco put forward an autonomy plan, but, as luck would have it, the Polisario put forward its own ideas on Moroccan-Sahrawi relations in the event of independence one day before Morocco.
- So there are now two plans on the table, and they are mutually exclusive. Morocco's envisages negotiations on the details of autonomy, with a referendum of simple confirmation coming at the end. The Polisario's envisages a referendum with independence as an option as a first step, and negotiations on the details of the chosen outcome to follow.
- My predecessor, the Dutch diplomat Peter Van Walsum, held four rounds of formal negotiations on this basis without success. Neither side was willing to discuss the other's proposals. Morocco absolutely refused to discuss the Polisario's ideas, and the Polisario stated that it was prepared to discuss Morocco's proposal only if Morocco was prepared to discuss its ideas. The last round of negotiations in April 2008 ended in acrimony, insults, and provocation. In the end, Peter burned his bridges with the Polisario and Algeria by declaring that political realism favored autonomy, even though international legality favored a genuine referendum.

■ I was appointed in January 2009 and determined that the first requirement was to reestablish an atmosphere of confidence and mutual respect between the two parties by holding informal talks with reduced delegations. The first of these took place in Austria in August and, given its limited aim, was a success. An atmosphere of dialogue and respect was established, there was progress on some confidence-building measures, and human rights were discussed, albeit inconclusively.

■ An second round of informal talks was to be convened shortly thereafter on the basis of an unprecedented Moroccan commitment to discuss the Polisario's ideas, but scheduling it fell victim to a series of events that began in early October, with both sides accusing the other of provocations and human rights violations. The dust from these did not settle until early January, after the mid-December return to Western Sahara of the Sahrawi independence activists Aminatou Haidar, who had been expelled from Western Sahara in November upon her return from receiving a human rights award in the US.

■ We now have agreement to hold a second round of informal talks in Westchester County tomorrow and the next day. Their main purpose is to have the two parties present their proposals, updated after three years, and to have each party look at the positive and negative aspects of the other's. I don't expect agreement to emerge. What I do hope is that both parties will recognize that their proposals will not be accepted by the other side, that no mechanism exists to force either party to accept the proposal of the other, and that the only way a mutually agreed solution can be reached is through the interaction of the two parties themselves. We remain, after all, in Chapter VI, not Chapter VII, of the UN Charter.

■ Once we have reached this moment, I plan to invite the parties to ponder how to proceed. If they have no ideas, I may launch my own idea, which is to have them recognize that they will not reach agreement on the final status of the Western Sahara for the foreseeable future, to have them put that issue aside, and to negotiate interim arrangements for the governance of Western Sahara for an agreed period of years, arrangements that would permit the return of the refugees in the camps around Tindouf and give the Polisario some kind of role in governance. Such a scenario holds tremendous risks for both sides, but, in the absence of more forthright action on the part of the Security Council, I see no other way out.

■ There are at least four problems with the current negotiating process:

■ First, the positions of the two parties are mutually exclusive, with very different paths to self-determination proposed: Morocco proposes negotiations on autonomy, while the Polisario proposes a referendum with independence as an option.

■ Second, no mechanism exists to force either party to accept the proposals of the other. The major international actors have important interests with both Morocco and Algeria, and they wish that the problem would go away without the need for them to exert pressure on anyone. The Security Council is very unlikely to move from Chapter VI to Chapter VII on this issue.

■ Third, the issue of human rights has acquired a significant dimension, thanks partly to actions by both parties and mutual accusations of violations, and it is sure to come up in the April debate over MINURSO's renewal. The Western Sahara conflict is one of the rare situations that involves UN peacekeeping in which potential human rights violations are not pursued. By looking at human rights as they affect Sahrawis not only in Western Sahara, but also in the refugee camps, it would be possible to create a mechanism that was balanced and fair and targeted neither side, but expressed the concern of the international community for observance of human rights standards in a situation of conflict and mutual accusations of violations.

■ Fourth, the Algerian-Moroccan dimension of this conflict remains stalemated. The Western Sahara conflict exists at two levels: at one level, a genuine independence movement that represents at least part of the Sahrawi population is pitted against Morocco's desire to annex Western Sahara. At another level, Algeria and Morocco have for decades been involved in a struggle for regional supremacy and are using the Western Sahara conflict as tool. President Bouteflika and King Mohamed VI are from different generations, with different life experiences and different interests. Figures who know them well think they can never be reconciled. In the absence of reconciliation, the lower downs on both sides will continue to avoid engagement.

■ In short, I am embarked on what many consider to be Mission Impossible, but I will continue to work with the parties to find a solution.

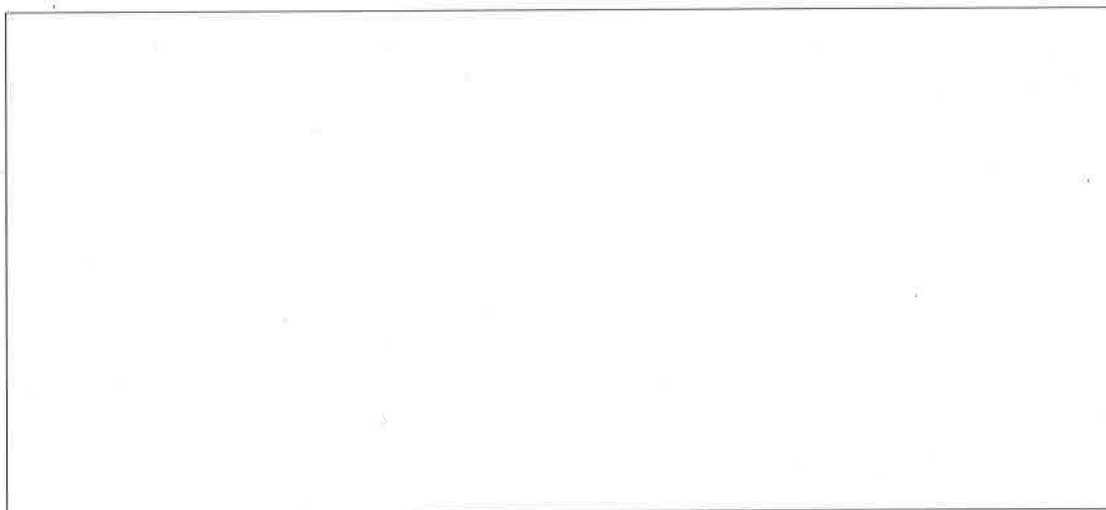

Original Draft Statement by the Secretary Submitted by Tony Blair

The United States is determined to bring about a two-state solution. Believes there is a strong basis for doing so. Believes it can be done by combining a renewed political negotiation with change on the ground, bottom up, as set out in Prime Minister Fayyad's plan for a Palestinian state.

To this end, Tony Blair, as Quartet Representative, will work in partnership with Senator Mitchell to support the political negotiation by mobilizing the efforts of the international community: (1) to build support for the institutional capacity and future governance of a future Palestinian state; (2) to improve freedom of movement and access for Palestinians; (3) to encourage further private sector investment; and (4) to bring change in the living conditions of the people in Gaza.

Global Opinion in Perspective

Arab World: Momentum from Cairo Speech Lost

Last summer saw a modest improvement in U.S. image among Arab publics. This improvement has now mostly vanished. Arabs continue to distrust Washington's intentions and feel threatened by U.S. policies in the Middle East. However, greater favorability toward President Obama compared to the United States writ large, and the attraction of American science and technology and education present opportunities to engage Arab publics.

According to a late-2009 Office of Opinion Research survey in eight Arab countries, the modest gains in U.S. image attributed to President Obama's June Cairo speech have been reversed, and overall public impressions of the United States are highly negative (Appendix Table 1).

Confidence in the United States to deal responsibly with problems in the region registers at one-third or less. In most countries that saw an uptick after the President's Cairo address, confidence has nearly returned to early-2009 levels (Figure 1; Appendix Table 2). Only in Egypt has confidence in Washington increased since June—possibly a sustained positive reaction

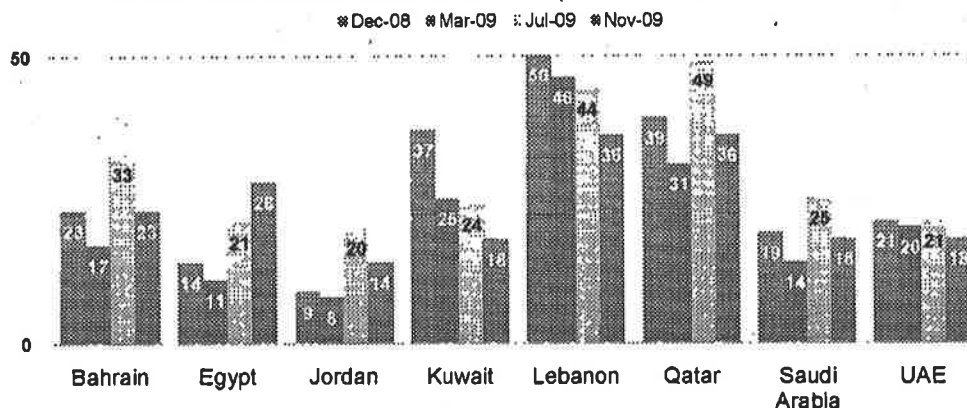
to the visit. Kuwaiti and Lebanese confidence in the United States is on the decline.

Favorability toward the United States has followed a similar pattern. Roughly 20 percent or fewer in most countries express a favorable opinion of the United States. The exception is Lebanon, where attitudes vary sharply by religious confession. While most Lebanese Christians and Sunnis are favorable toward the United States, a majority of the country's Shia hold an unfavorable opinion (Appendix Table 3).

Poor Image Rooted in Policies, Intentions
Negative views of the United States are due in part to the belief that Washington interferes in

the affairs of other countries and that U.S. regional policies represent a threat to security in the Middle East (Appendix Tables 4 & 5). These widely shared sentiments, along with the prevailing perception that the Israeli-Palestinian conflict endangers regional security, are key drivers of the United States' overall poor standing.

In addition, large majorities in most of the countries surveyed continue to believe Washington does *not* promote peace and stability around the world, help poorer nations to develop, promote democracy worldwide, seek the creation of an independent and viable Palestinian state, or promote women's rights in the world. Equally consistent with earlier surveys, Arabs are closely divided on whether the United States treats their country with respect (Appendix Table 4).

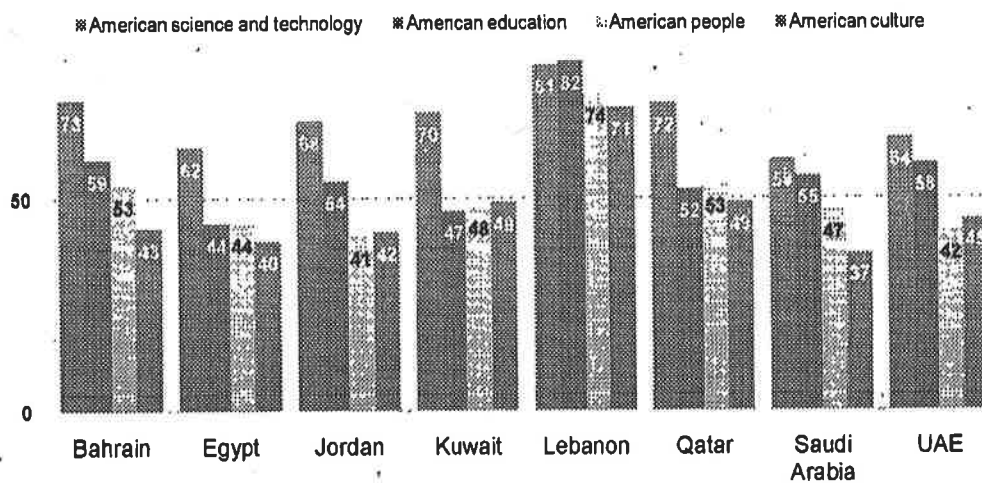
Opportunities for Engagement

Despite these predominately negative attitudes toward the United States, opportunities remain for making public diplomacy inroads in the region, as demonstrated by President Obama's Cairo speech last summer. In fact, Arab views of the President are generally more favorable than views of the United States (Appendix Table 6).

Arab publics are largely favorable toward American science and technology and American education. Views are more mixed on American culture and Americans (Figure 2; Appendix Table 7). Those who express positive opinions of these aspects of American society and of President Obama are most likely to hold an overall positive impression of the United States. Outreach efforts that draw on such strengths are likely to resonate with many among these Arab publics.





TAB 2: Background on MEPI Pilot Project for Disabled

The Middle East Partnership Initiative (MEPI) has been working to address disability rights and the empowerment of the disabled, their caretakers and the NGOs that speak for them through a pilot program in Bahrain.

The Bahraini Advocates of Special Needs Pilot Project is overseen by Freedom House and implemented by the Bahraini Association for Parents and Friends of the Disabled (BAPFD). Launched in March of 2009, it was aimed at three distinct audiences - parents of the disabled, women with disabilities and teachers of the disabled. Advocacy and awareness programs were organized together with the Ministry of Education (MOE). In the latest quarter, for example, the MOE and BAPFD held a drawing competition targeting students from public and private high schools under the slogan "One world...One Dream". The competition sought to engage and inform the broader Bahraini society - especially youth - on special needs issues. Fifty drawings were received from twenty schools. The MOE will host a ceremony this quarter to honor the 12 top works which will be published into a calendar.

It has been reported that 28 of the pilot program participants are now lobbying for the rights of the disabled using the tools, empowerment and support they received during the program. The local partner, BAPFD, has used the MEPI pilot project as a springboard to develop more programs to raise awareness and advocate for change. The media attention they received as part of the program has allowed them to grow their membership and has strengthened their message.

Lessons learned from this pilot could be applied to a partnership with Qatar. However, for reasons of Gulf States' general sensitivity toward having another Gulf State held forth as an example, and because of historic territorial tensions between Qatar and Bahrain, MEPI would refrain from specific reference to this Bahrain-based pilot.
