Some points to address at international conference re Afghanistan women

- Women make more than 50% of Afghanistan population. Their voice, opinion and recommendations should be included in all peace, security and reconstruction activities in Afghanistan. Afghan women do not want symbolic representations. There are very qualified women inside Afghanistan and in Diaspora who can represent Afghan women's view on peace, security and reconstruction in Afghanistan. These women must be included in peace talks and discussions.
- Afghanistan is a signatory of 6 international human rights treaties, including CEDAW, and the Resolution 1325 and 1820. However, women are systemically kept out of peace and security issues in the country.
 - The international players always support Afghan women in policy, but in practice sometimes they go along with the decision of Afghan government in keeping women out of the important peace talks and negotiations. For example, from Bonn to Paris and now the Haag, Afghan women from government and non-government sectors are not invited. The participation of the only female Cabinet member has been very limited and symbolic. Issues such as human rights, rule of law, good governance and corruption needs to be heard from women point of view as government officials and civil society members. In my 6 years of work with the Afghan government as the senior official of the foreign ministry I have not been allowed in any of the international discussion on peace, security, reconsturtion and development.
- The vast majority of Afghan women fear the return of the Taliban or a coalition government with the Taliban. The Afghan government and its international allies must make sure effective and qualified women are at the negotiation/peace talk tables with the Taliban. The international community should not allow any negotiation without the active participation of women.
- The notion that the Afghan culture does not allow gender equality and women emancipation is nothing but a misconception. Afghan women emancipation started in early 1900s. The Taliban and other fundamentalist regimes used religion and culture as a tool to control more than half of the Afghan population for their own political benefit. Afghan women need support of the international community to get their rights back.
- Women across Afghanistan have been hit hard by the insecurity and continuous
 war between the insurgents and the Afghan army and their international allies.
 Likewise, Afghan women are hit hard with the corruption epidemic. In the last
 few years from the corrupt law enforcement and legal system to all government

> agencies, corruption, mismanagement and bad decisions have made the life of Afghan citizens worse than what it was during the Taliban.

The corruption including bad decisions, mismanagement, lack of transparency and lack of accountability starts from higher authority in the government. Lack of management and administrative skills, lack of expertise, lack of attention and negligence, nepotism, greed, fear of warlords and other higher authorities, interest in power, etc are some of the reason for the on going corruption in the government.

- Change the top leadership is not the answer to the problem of corruption in Afghanistan. A clean up of all government top officials who are known for corruption, mismanagement and bad decisions can help.
- Women are less corrupt and more capable of good governance and enforcing rule of law. The international community must make sure more women are in the position of power and decision making during the next five years. More women should be assigned at national and international top posts. Currently, in Afghanistan there is one female Cabinet member, one governor and one Ambassador while other qualified women can be more effective in peace building and reconstruction in the country.

The organizers of the African First Ladies Health Summit (see attached announcement), which will be held in Los Angeles April 20-21 were in Washington today to meet with African Ambassadors and brief them on the event.

According to the coordinator for the event, invitations have gone out to all African First Ladies. In addition, packets have been sent all US Ambassadors via FEDEX. There are a few countries that FEDEX does not serve and I will be pouching the packets to US Ambassadors at the request of the organizers (Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Cape Verde, Niger).

In addition to African First Ladies the organizers are trying to get former First Lady Laura Bush and current First Lady Michelle Obama to attend. Secretary Clinton has also been invited. UK First Lady Sarah Brown is confirmed for the event.

African First Ladies who have confirmed are: Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Niger, Mozambique, and Lesotho.

African First Ladies who are 80% likely to attend (according to the organizers) are: Uganda, Tanzania, Ethiopia.

Other First Ladies from whom they have gotten positive indications are: Rwanda, Senegal, Benin, Equatorial Guinea, Mali, and Namibia.

I suspect that African First Ladies attending will have an entourage so it is likely that you will get last minute visa requests for this event. I have put the organizers in touch with DS here regarding security and liaison with Los Angeles police and security officials.

The organizers are US Doctors for Africa, African Synergy First Ladies of Africa (Chaired by Ms. Chantal Biya of Cameroon), Rand, Vital Voices and the White Ribbon Alliance.

Other corporate partners are include GE and Proctor and Gamble. The World Health Organization (WHO) is also involved.

I will keep you posted as I get more information.

This two-day summit, focused on HIV/AIDS, maternal and child health, and girls' education, will highlight the first ladies' previous initiatives in these areas, forge new partnerships with U.S.-based agencies and corporate foundations, and identify actionable goals for the coming year.

The summit will be convened by African Synergy and USDFA. USDFA is a non-profit organization that unites the African and American medical communities in a shared fight against HIV/AIDS and other diseases. The summit will be hosted by RAND Corporation, an independent, non-profit organization that helps improve policy and decision making through policy and analysis. Organizing partners include: Packard Foundation, Proctor & Gamble, General Electric, World Health Organization, Vital Voices Global Partnership, White Ribbon Alliance, AllAfrica.com, ONE, Until There's A Cure and UCLA.

I learned last night, that Sarah Brown is 99% confirmed and is now beginning the process of arranging an official state visit. Also Hillary Clinton is planning to make at least a video (if not personal) appearance. Both Michelle Obama and Laura Bush have also been invited to be key note speakers and to chair the more intimate breakout-sessions in the second day of the conference.

"And this Monday, at my first, full Cabinet meeting, I will ask all of my department and agency for specific proposals for cutting their budgets. Already, members of my Cabinet have begun to trim back unnecessary expenditures. Secretary Napolitano, for example, is ending consulting contracts to create new seals and logos that have cost the Department of Homeland Security \$3 million since 2003. In the largest Department, Secretary Gates has launched an historic project to reform defense contracting procedures and eliminate hundreds of billions of dollars in wasteful spending and cost overruns. And I commend Senators McCain and Levin - a Republican and a Democrat - who have teamed up to lead this effort in Congress.

Finally, in the coming weeks, I will be announcing the elimination of dozens of government programs shown to be wasteful or ineffective. Introduction

This memo presents options on the core issue in the international climate change negotiations scheduled to conclude in Copenhagen in December – the commitments to be made by parties to reduce their emissions of greenhouse gases. In the climate world, this issue is known as mitigation. The other key issues in the negotiations involve financial and technology assistance from developed to developing countries, and adaptation assistance – helping vulnerable countries cope with the impacts of climate change.

Background - Science

Greenhouse gas emissions in the atmosphere now stand at approximately 387 parts per million of CO2 as compared to about 280 ppm in pre-industrial times. Emissions are rising by about 2 ppm per year. Global average temperature has increased by 0 78°C above pre-industrial levels. This amount of warming has already been associated with significant global impacts, including, among many other things accelerating glacier melt, putting the water security of hundreds of millions of people at risk; the rapid death of coral reefs due to heat and acidity; increase in the frequency of forest fires; and the dramatic reduction (39%) in current Arctic sea ice from levels just a decade or two ago.

The broad scientific consensus appears to be that as we pass the threshold of a 2°C increase over pre-industrial temperatures, we will start to move into dangerous territory. (That consensus is generally associated with the view that concentration levels need to stay at or below 450 ppm.) This of course is an estimate While negotiators often cite 2°C as if it were a known tipping point, it isn't. On the one hand, we may enter the danger zone at a lower temperature – may even have unknowingly entered it already; on the other hand, we may not enter the danger zone until we pass a somewhat higher temperature level

As a general matter, the estimate of what concentration of CO2 in the atmosphere is relatively safe and what is dangerous has been falling over the years. At the time of Kyoto, 500 or even 550 pm was routinely considered a useful target to aim at, whereas now, the scientific community appears to have coalesced around 450 ppm. The noted climate scientist Jim Hansen actually argues that any concentration over 350 ppm is dangerous. This shrinking target results at least in part from the fact that observed changes in the climate are happening faster than even the worst case scenarios of the modelers. Less than a decade ago, scientists predicted the Arctic would be ice free in summers in the latter part of the century, but have now accelerated that prediction to 2040 or earlier, several significant Antarctic ice shelves have recently collapsed much earlier than expected, and the level of expected sea level rise in this century has sharply increased in the past few years.

Deep concerns also center on the problem of so-called feedback loops. For example, more heat is absorbed by dark water than by white ice, so when Arctic sea ice melts on account of increased warming, it creates still more warming in a self-reinforcing cycle. The same kind of dynamic threatens to occur in the tundra – thawing permafrost could release methane, a potent greenhouse gas, and this in turn would contribute to further warming. Rates of methane release

have increased by 58% in recent decades. The tundra holds a massive amount of methane, with as much carbon equivalent as all the carbon currently in the atmosphere.

Some scientists argue that a temperature increase of 2.4°C is already baked into the system -.78°C of observed increase; .6°C temporarily stored in the oceans; and 1°C that is being masked right now by the cooling effect of aerosols that are gradually being phased out of use for health reasons This would suggest that we may already be in within the zone of tipping points for various kinds of abrupt and catastrophic climate change.

Background on Negotiations


The UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (the "Convention"), concluded at the 1992 Rio Earth Summit, is the foundation document for addressing global climate change. It set a broad framework for cooperation, with a non-binding goal for reducing emissions to 1990 levels by 2000 for so-called "Annex I" parties (OECD and former Soviet republics), but no mandatory reduction targets. The Senate easily approved the treaty, and the United States was the first developed country to ratify.


Largely because the Convention contained no quantitative goal post-2000, the Kyoto Protocol was negotiated. It took an approach to mitigation based on legally binding emission reduction targets and timetables (2008-2012) for Annex I Parties. Developing countries had no binding commitments to control their emissions. At U.S. insistence, the Protocol allows Annex I Parties to meet their targets in part through the use of market mechanisms such as emissions trading and the so-called "Clean Development Mechanism," which permits Annex I Parties and companies to obtain carbon credits in exchange for investment in low-carbon projects in developing countries. Kyoto entered into force in February 2005 without U.S. participation


Kyoto Parties are currently negotiating a second, post-2012 commitment period. Because Kyoto does not include the United States or commitments for developing countries, the 2007 Bali Conference launched talks not only for the second Kyoto round, but also for a parallel negotiating track under the Convention. There is pressure from developed countries in the Kyoto track (particularly Japan) to merge the tracks, so as to be under the same tent as the United States and China; but there is equal opposing pressure from developing countries to retain two tracks, largely to preserve the "no obligations" protection that Kyoto affords them. The interplay between the two tracks, and the ultimate disposition of Kyoto, will be an important element in the negotiations.


Under the Bali Action Plan, the Convention track is supposed to consider "nationally appropriate" mitigation actions for developing countries (and "commitments or actions" for developed countries) that are "measurable, reportable, and verifiable." Such actions are to be supported in an unspecified manner by funding and technology provided by developed countries



For those who carried out some of these operations within the four corners of legal opinions or guidance that had been provided from the White House, I do not think it's appropriate for them to be prosecuted," Obama said.

"With respect to those who formulated those legal decisions, I would say that that is going to be more of a decision for the attorney general within the parameters of various laws, and I don't want to prejudge that," he said. "I think that there are a host of very complicated issues involved there."

As a general proposition, Obama said, "I think that we should be looking forward and not backwards. I do worry about this getting so politicized that we cannot function effectively and it hampers our ability to carry out critical national security operations."

He suggested that if Congress feels the need for "a further accounting" of the interrogation program, it ought to be done "in a bipartisan fashion, outside of the typical hearing process that can sometimes break down and break it entirely along party lines." He said that "to the extent that there are independent participants who are above reproach and have credibility, that would probably be a more sensible approach to take."

He stressed that he is not calling for a commission along those lines. "But I'm saying, if you've got a choice, I think it's very important for the American people to feel as if this is not being dealt with to provide one side or another political advantage, but rather is being done in order to learn some lessons so that we move forward in an effective way."

In response to persistent questioning later at a White House news briefing, presidential spokesman Robert Gibbs repeatedly refused to describe Obama's comments today as a shift in positions.

Obama "reiterated today that . . . we should be looking forward and not backward," Gibbs said. "The president has also said he does not believe that people are above the rule of law." He added that Obama "stated accurately

that any determination as to whether a law was broken would rightly be made not by the president, but by the chief law enforcement officer of the United States," Attorney General Eric H. Holder Jr.

Asked if Obama were envisioning a panel to investigate the interrogation policy along the lines of the commission that looked into the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks, Gibbs said the president views the 9/11 Commission as "a model for how any investigation or commission might be set up" because its members put aside party affiliations "in order to answer some very serious questions." But Gibbs would not go so far as to say Obama envisions a panel without congressional members. "I wouldn't preclude any members of congress from being part of that," he said.

This has been a difficult chapter in our history and one of the tougher decisions that I've had to make as president," he said. "On the one hand, we have very real enemies out there, and we rely on some very courageous people, not just in our military but also in the Central Intelligence Agency, to help protect the American people." They must make difficult decisions because "they are confronted with an enemy that doesn't have scruples, that isn't constrained by constitutions, aren't constrained by legal niceties," he

"Having said that, the OLC memos that were released reflected, in my view, us losing our moral bearings."

In response, the White House has said the information in the memos was already in the public domain anyway. It has argued that openly acknowledging the techniques and explicitly banning them have enhanced U.S. credibility around the world and denied al-Qaeda an important recruiting tool.

Answer:

Embassy officials have visited Mr. Anderson at the hospital on several occasions, including the day on which the incident occurred, to obtain information on his condition and monitor his welfare. On March 16, Mr. Anderson's parents arrived in Israel, and Embassy officials maintain frequent personal and telephonic contact with them. Embassy officials, including Ambassador Cunningham, have visited the hospital where Tristan is being treated. The Embassy has obtained the promise from the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs for assistance with the renewal of visas for the Anderson family, as necessary. The Embassy is also aware the family has retained prominent human rights attorney, Michael Sfard. Embassy officials will continue to provide assistance to Mr. Anderson and his family.

General Frames for each interview follow below.

1. Mikhail SOLODOVNIKOV, RTR (Russia)



Mikhail Solodovnikov is the Washington bureau chief of RTR, a position that he has held since the bureau first opened in March 2006.

Solodovnikov has reported from many of the world's hotspots, including Iraq, Afghanistan, Iran, Israel, Lebanon, Serbia, and Kosovo.

RTR has a weekly audience of 45.8 million and reaches almost 100% of Russian households. The interview will be shown on the prime "News on Sunday" program, a top-rated news wrap-up program; excerpts will be shown on the daily prime time news; and it will also be carried on the Vesti-24 all-news channel, and on their Internet site.

General Frame: Russia

- The administration seeks a future of cooperative engagement with the Russian government on matters of strategic importance, while standing up strongly for American values and international norms.
- We must not shy away from pushing for more democracy, transparency, accountability. Still, there can be no return to the Cold War. Russia is not the old Soviet Union, and this is not the 20th century.
- The administration will work with Russia on areas of common strategic interest like counter-terrorism and counter-proliferation, while pressuring Russia when it interferes with its neighbors and abuses power at home.

General Frame: Russia's walkout at the Geneva talks on Georgia

• The following statement was released yesterday in response to Russia's walkout at the Genva talks on Georgia (in Ian Kelly's name): The U.S. regrets that Russia followed the South Ossetian separatists in walking out of the Geneva discussions on Georgia on May 18 during the introductory round of remarks. The U.S. also regrets the Abkhaz decision to boycott the talks from the start. The United States is dismayed by such behavior, which contravenes the spirit of the August 12 ceasefire brokered by French President Sarkozy as well as UN Security Council Resolution 1866, both of which call for talks to contribute to security and stability in Georgia. We hope the Russian delegation and South Ossetian and Abkhaz participants will attend the talks when they reconvene on May 19.

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2. Manelisi DUBASE, South African Broadcasting Corporation (SABC)



Manelisi Dubase is the senior U.S. correspondent for South African Broadcasting. Mr. Dubasei covered the inauguration of Barack Obama, the 2008 US presidential election, the recent visits of several foreign leaders - including South African President Thabo Mbeki. He closely covers the issues relating to Africa - AFRICOM, HIV/AIDS, and development.

South African Broadcasting is the national broadcaster of the nation of South Africa. The SABC also runs a 24-hour news channel, SABC International, which is seen in neighboring countries, such as Namibia. The television channels reach a daily audience of some twenty million.

General Frame: Sudan

- The President has made clear that it is long past time for us to directly confront the
 vast human suffering in Darfur. If we keep waiting, history will judge us harshly. Tens
 of thousands have been killed and millions displaced.
- With American leadership, the international community must act to end this genocide.
 That means exerting American influence, galvanizing the international community, and pressuring the regime in Khartoum.
- USG support to Sudan has two main goals: (1) to support the maintenance of peace between North and South through continued implementation of the 2005 Comprehensive Peace Agreement (CPA), and (2) the provision of assistance to Darfur that meets humanitarian needs and helps to resolve the conflict there.
- U.S. efforts will contribute to a better environment for good governance, increased
 availability of social services and strengthening nascent democratic policies and
 institutions. To carry out these aims and address fragility in underserved parts of
 Sudan, the U.S. is considering limited expansion of development assistance beyond
 southern Sudan and the Three Areas (Abyei, Southern Kordofan, and Blue Nile) to the
 East, North and Darfur, as security, operational and political conditions allow.
- In FY2010, for non-humanitarian accounts, we requested an additional \$36.5 million, or an increase of 10%, compared to the FY2009 appropriation. The additional funds will be used to support development programs in Southern Sudan, as well as peacekeeping, peacebuilding, and post conflict security sector reform activities.
- These will not be easy steps to implement, but the cost of inaction is too high. Ending this genocide must be a top priority.

General Frame: Nigeria

- Nigeria is important not only as an oil exporter, but also as a strategic partner.
- But the GoN has serious problems on democracy, governance, human rights, and trade/investment issues. The Yar'Adua Administration has failed to address problems which pre-date it and persist, including the need for electoral and economic reform, for establishment of better security in the oil-rich Niger Delta, and in fighting corruption.
- We intend to continue to support mutually beneficial cooperation, and to train and equip Nigerian peacekeeping forces to support regional operations, health and education, counter-terrorism programs, and trade capacity building.
- Nigeria is our largest trading partner in sub-Saharan Africa (due to oil exports), and the fifth-largest exporter of oil (11%) to the United States. It has vast untapped gas reserves.

General Frame: Zimbabwe

- The people of Zimbabwe have suffered through a man-made disaster and that man is Robert Mugabe. The destruction of Zimbabwe's economy, the repeated abuses of power, and the recent cholera epidemic have been a catastrophe for Zimbabweans, and threaten the stability of the region.
- USG support is critical for Zimbabwe as the transitional government seeks to move the country toward reform and recovery. In FY 2009, the total request (including \$45 million for the Spring Supplemental) is \$111.5 million. This represents a 27.1% increase (valued at \$23.8 million) from the FY 2008 appropriation.
- In addition to food aid and other essential humanitarian programs, we seek funds (1) to help reestablish and strengthen democratic institutions, processes and systems; (2) support social assistance to protect vulnerable populations; and (3) support monetary and fiscal policy reform and economic revitalization, specifically for the agricultural sector to help address food security issues.
- We have not seen sufficient evidence to date that Zimbabwe is firmly and irrevocably on the path to inclusive and effective democratic governance with respect for human rights and the rule of law to support broad-based development assistance or budgetary support.

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3. Abderrahim FOUKARA, Al Jazeera



Al Jazeera is a sometimes controversial 24-hour Arabic language news channel based in Doha, Qatar with 50 million viewers around the world. Al Jazeera is probably the most watched news channel in the Middle East, and many Arabs see it as a more trustworthy source of information than government and foreign channels.

General Frame: Situation with Gaza / Hamas-Fatah Reconciliation

 Egypt's work to consolidate a cease-fire in Gaza and its commitment to a Palestinian national dialogue are commendable.

 We strongly support Egypt's efforts to restore the legitimate authority of the Palestinian Authority in Gaza and ensure that any Palestinian Unity Government that might be formed accepts Israel's right to exist, renounces violence, and accepts past agreements, including security agreements.

 Egypt well understands the importance of any Palestinian unity government's being one that can advance the peace process, not derail it.

General Frame: Iran

- It is clear that the policy of non-engagement has not worked. The President was clear in his Nowruz message that we want to engage in direct diplomacy with the Iranian government. I would like to reaffirm that we are committed to an approach that addresses the full range of issues before us, and to establish a dialogue based on mutual respect, designed to explore mutual interests, and acknowledge and address real differences. We have no illusions about the difficulty of engagement or about the real differences between the U.S. and Iran. But the United States places no preconditions on these discussions.
- The United States and the international community have made clear that Iran has the
 right to peaceful nuclear energy, but with these rights come responsibilities. The U.S.
 does not condone Iran's failure to comply with its nuclear and other obligations. Iran
 needs to take steps to improve rather than undermine international confidence.
- We will remain steadfast with the international community in continuing to take
 action within existing frameworks to address Iran's illicit behaviors. We will also
 remain steadfast in our cooperation with, and commitment to our friends and allies.
 Engagement with Iran should not be seen in zero-sum terms, and will not come at the
 expense of our friends and allies.
- We take the threat from Iran very seriously. Our national security and the security of our allies is paramount. Pursuit of nuclear weapons, support for terrorism, and

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violations of international standards of human rights are unacceptable. But the present opportunity to see a change in Iran's behavior through diplomacy must be pursued. The opportunity for engagement should not be missed. We are serious about pursuing it, and encourage the Iranians to be as well.

• We will consider relaxing sanctions should diplomacy produce progress, and we begin

to overcome our differences.

General Frame: Israel & The Palestinians

• The status quo is unsustainable. The U.S. is committed to advancing the two-state solution where Israelis and Palestinians can live side-by-side in their own states with peace and security.

• The U.S. remains committed to Israel's security and to peace and prosperity for all of

the people of the region.

 Both Israelis and Palestinians must take the steps that are necessary to build confidence, must uphold their commitments, and must overcome longstanding passions and the politics of the moment to make progress toward a lasting peace.

• The two-state solution is in the national interests of the United States and in the

national interests of Israel.

General Frame: Jordan

• Jordan is a steadfast partner on Middle East peace, regional security including Iraq, counterterrorism, and other high-priority initiatives. Jordan actively promotes interfaith dialogue and moderation.

• The administration's FY 2010 requests for Jordan demonstrate continued strong support for the Government of Jordan (GOJ). Jordan is a lower middle income country facing significant challenges in unemployment and poverty. It faces a lack of natural resources, a growing population, and persistent threats of national and regional terrorism.

• Our support enhances Jordan's internal stability, growth, and capacity to promote

peace throughout a troubled region.

General Frame: Saudi Arabia

• Saudi Arabia, a leader in both the Arab and Muslim worlds, is a dedicated U.S. ally in the Middle East. The Saudis are essential partners on a wide range of regional security issues, ranging from Afghanistan and Pakistan to Sudan. In particular, advancing U.S. goals with respect to Iran and Middle East peace requires working closely with the Saudis.

 Since the September 11, 2001, attacks on the United States, and the Kingdom's own confrontation with Al-Qaida beginning in 2003, we have built a close partnership C05957496 IED U.S. Department of State Case No. F-2015-06322 Doc No. C05957496 Date: 05/10/2017

focused on combating terrorism and defeating extremist ideology. The Kingdom fully supports U.S. counterterrorism efforts.

• While the Kingdom is an essential partner for U.S. regional security and counterterrorism objectives, we fully recognize its considerable shortcomings in terms of human rights inside the Kingdom, including the treatment of women and religious minorities. We are committed to diplomatic engagement with the Saudi authorities to press for greater openness and respect for human rights.

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General Frame: Syria

- The Administration has focused on advancing U.S. interests through direct dialogue with Syria. This is not engagement for engagement's sake. Rather we are undertaking these efforts after careful consideration and preparation, focusing on results.
- Syria can play a constructive role and make choices that promote regional stability. Syria's actions impact a number of U.S. regional priorities including a comprehensive Arab-Israeli peace, a stable Iraq, an independent Lebanon, and counterterrorism and non-proliferation cooperation.
- On February 26, NEA Acting Assistant Secretary Jeffrey Feltman met with Syrian Ambassador to the United States Imad Mustapha. On March 7 Feltman and Dan Shapiro, the National Security Council's Senior Director for the Middle East, traveled to Damascus for a follow-up meeting with Syrian Foreign Minister Walid Muallim, Deputy Foreign Minister Faisal Miqdad, and Presidential Advisor Bouthana Shaaban.
- These have been serious, frank discussions about issues of concern for both sides.
- We talked about a mutual desire for a secure, stable Iraq and a comprehensive peace that includes a two-state solution and peace agreements between Israel and its neighbors, Lebanon and Syria.
- We also discussed issues where we have differences in opinion. These include regional threats such as nuclear and other non-conventional weapons programs, as well as terrorist groups.
- We will continue to use dialogue as a means to discuss concerns shared by the U.S. and the international community. We will base any future decision on issues such as returning a U.S. ambassador or easing sanctions on an assessment of Syrian actions and determination that such steps will advance U.S. interests.

Executive Summary

Haiti, with a population of 8-12 million, is the poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere. Eighty percent of the population lives in rural settings. However, the country's development agenda has been interrupted by decades of political turmoil and intermittent conflict, which as contributed to environmental degradation, chronic hunger, disease, limited access to clean water, health care, education and essential medicines. What is needed is a comprehensive development solution, combined with community participation and leadership, to enable communities in Haiti to lift themselves out of poverty to ensure populations that are healthy and economically productive.

Given the need to impact the extreme inequality and poverty in the Caribbean and Latin America, the Earth Institute is looking to partner with the Global Institute for Community Health and Development at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine, in partnership with the Green Family Foundation and The Drobny Global Advisors, to extend the Millennium Villages Project (MVP) to the western hemisphere, and, in particular, to Haiti. As a result, the Marmont Millennium Village Project was proposed. This project aims to integrate the interventions needed to achieve the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) at the district level in a five-year timeframe. The project will focus on promoting human security by empowering villagers to implement a comprehensive set of cost rural development strategies. Costing is based on the cost structure recommended by the UN Millennium Project. The project brings together institutions from various sectors to work with communities to ensure participatory decision-making. It employs new science-based technologies and is focused on the quantifiable, time-bound targets set out in the Millennium Declaration. Implementation is guided by a needs assessment and surveys carried out in the early stages of the project. This project provides a basis for scaling up and integrating best practices in areas of agriculture, nutrition, health, energy, water, and the environment to improve people's livelihoods, survival and dignity throughout Haiti.

This unique initiative will demonstrate how a typical district of approximately 12,000 people can make considerable progress towards achieving the MDGs despite centuries of poverty and conflict. The program combines three interlinked components: (i) community participation and leadership, (ii) appropriate science-based innovations and local knowledge, and (iii) an action-plan for the time-bound and targeted objectives of the MDGs. Simultaneously, the project will investigate the potential for replicating village (district) level successes at the national level and having district level experiences shape national policy. The project has the potential to offer practical solutions to address issues of hunger, poverty and disease.

The project will be carried out by the Global Institute and its affiliated NGO, Project Medishare, in partnership with local communities, district government, national government, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), and UN Country Teams. To ensure ownership and sustainability, local capacity-building initiatives will be undertaken at all stages of the program to prepare communities to take over as an exit strategy. Additional funding will be sought from philanthropy and other sources.

This project is linked directly or indirectly to the Haitian Government's National Poverty Reduction Strategy Plan (DSNCRP) based on the following four (4) pillars:

- 1. enhancing National Security
- 2. Revitalizing the Economy
- 3. Strengthening Governance and the Rule of Law
- 4. Rehabilitating Infrastructure and Delivering Basic Services

Pillar three, strengthening governance and the rule of law, needs to be undertaken not only at the national level but also through strengthening communities to play a greater role in local planning and development. The community-based approach of the Millennium villages fits perfectly into this model. The project also has direct links to pillars two and four – revitalizing the economy and rehabilitating infrastructure and delivering basic services. Overall, the project can be seen as the implementation of the DSNCRP at the district level.

The Millennium Village Concept

Haiti's Development Challenge

Haiti faces one of the world's starkest challenges in achieving the MDGs by 2015. The number of Haitians living on less than \$1 per day has risen over the past decade and is only now beginning to level off at approximately eight million people. An overwhelming share of the region's rural communities are caught in a poverty trap characterized by chronic hunger, disease, income poverty, and poor access to clean water, health care, education, essential medicines, electricity, sanitation, communication, and transport. Malaria, HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and other diseases result in high child mortality rates in part because children's immune systems are severely hampered by malnutrition. These same problems reduce farm labor productivity and investments in farming, degrade environments on which people's livelihoods depend, inhibit children's capacity to learn, prevent girls from attending school, and perpetuate the poverty trap for another generation.

Millennium Development Goals (MDGs)

GOAL 1: Eradicate Extreme Hunger and Poverty

GOAL 2: Achieve Universal Primary Education

GOAL 3: Promote Gender Equality and Empower Women

GOAL 4: Reduce Child Mortality
GOAL 5: Improve Maternal Health

GOAL 6: Combat HIV/AIDS, Malaria and other Diseases

GOAL 7: Ensure Environmental Sustainability

GOAL 8: Develop a Global Partnership for Development

Perhaps the core challenge to achieving the MDGs in rural Haiti lies in channeling the admirable ambitions of international agreements into practical breakthroughs on the ground. This problem is endemic when development planning flows from the top down. The MVP model particularly when married to the track record of UM, its affiliated NGO Project Medishare, and the track record of the Green Family Foundation's hands-on, "bottom-up" philanthropy creates a viable alternative to address the needs of rural Haiti.

Today, dozens of African countries have made enormous strides in preparing MDG-based national strategies, but not a single one has been implemented in the Western Hemisphere. The most fundamental barrier to implementation is a lack of resources, including technical assistance and institutional support from UM (and University of Florida, in the realm of agriculture) philanthropy, particularly the Green Family Foundation and in-kind contributions of land and labor by the Marmont community themselves make the MVP model of implementation very different from it's African counterparts, which received necessary funding "up-front".

Introduction to the Millennium Villages Projects

The first Millennium Villages were launched in 2005 in an effort to establish proof of concept for broad-based, community-led rural development strategies to achieve the MDGs in Africa. Anchored in the findings of the UN Millennium Project's 2005 final report to the Secretary-General, *Investing in Development: A Practical Plan to Achieve the Millennium Development Goals*, the Millennium Villages are based on a single powerful idea: Impoverished communities can transform themselves by 2015 if they are empowered with proven powerful, practical interventions. By investing simultaneously in interventions across a multitude of sectors, including health, food production, education, access to clean water, and essential infrastructure, impoverished villages are able to get a foothold on the bottom rung of the development ladder and begin to experience self-sustaining economic growth.

The Millennium Village Concept (Cont'd.)

Introduction to the Millennium Villages Projects (cont'd.)

The implementation of the Millennium Villages as an integrated regional program across Africa was critically important to generate greater momentum towards achieving the MDGs across Africa. At present, during the first phase of the project, MVPs reach hundreds of thousands of people in 68 village sites, across ten countries and in each of the major agro-ecological zones of the continent. The MVPs provide convincing evidence that (i) the combination of regionally specific, science-based interventions and local ownership is an effective means of alleviating extreme poverty regardless of agro-ecological or political conditions, (ii) reaching the benchmarks proposed in the MDGs is achievable and within the cost estimates, and (iii) international aid commitments can be translated into on-the-ground, concrete investments that enable communities to get out of extreme poverty. Finally, the MVPs implementation will demonstrate its ability to garner the support of the political leadership in each country where it is implemented. The leadership of African countries working collectively on one project embodies the type of shared international effort that is crucial to achieving the MDGs.

Early results from the MVPs demonstrate the feasibility of rapid progress if poor communities are empowered with the practical tools to achieve the MDGs. For instance, crop yields have increased by an average of three-fold within the first season of cropping. Health conditions have improved especially with malaria morbidity being reduced dramatically through the distribution of treated bed nets. Water and sanitation has improved. And significant gains have been made in education, with record attendance and performance, especially with the introduction of a school feeding program that was supported by food grown in the villages.

What are the criteria for a "Millennium Village"?

For a rural development project to be defined as a "Millennium Village," a number of criteria need to be met:

- The overall objective is to enable communities to escape the poverty trap and build the base for a sustainable economy.
- The approximate size of the community is at least 5,000 people (going up to clusters of about 50,000) to ensure that the lessons learnt are applicable for wider scale up by government and other partners.
- Integrated interventions are implemented to reach the entire population across agriculture, health, energy, water, sanitation, nutrition, environment, infrastructure, and business development simultaneously to achieve the MDGs.
- The project must be approved and supported actively by government at national, district and local levels.
- Community mobilization and leadership in the planning, decision-making and implementation of interventions through community leaders and committees is crucial for the success of the project.
- The financing framework of the project is in the range of approximately \$110 per capita budget, including local and government contributions and will be secured for a starting period of five years. In some sites, depending on the needs, this amount could be higher or lower (see section on budget below). Of this amount, \$10 per capita is expected as local contributions, \$30 from the government, and \$70 as outside investments.
- The project will link into existing institutional structures and aim to strengthen local district administration capacity.

Millennium Villages in Haiti

Why Millennium Villages in Haiti?

In 1793, slaves imported from West Africa rose up in revolt against their French masters. In 1805, Haiti declared it's independence from France. Shortly thereafter, faced with a choice of returning to the sugar plantations for work, the overwhelming majority of these former slaves "voted with their feet," leaving the plantations on Haiti's coastal plains for the mountainous interior, in effect accepting a subsistence existence as a price of their freedom.

This brief review of Haiti's history is necessary to understand why the Millennium Village model is so well suited to Haiti:

1. 80% of Haitians live in small, rural agrarian communities.

2. The culture and social organization of Haiti is essentially West African.

3. The headline grabbing problems of Haiti's cities all stem from the collapse of its rural economy.

Additionally, Haiti is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere. Over the last 25 years, Haiti has become a more impoverished nation. Real per capita GDP now equals only 70 percent of 1980 GDP. In terms of the Human Development Index, Haiti continues to occupy one of the last positions (ranking 153 out of 177 countries, with over 50 percent of the population living below the US\$1 a day poverty line and 76 percent of the population living below the poverty threshold of US\$2 per day). On average, the poorest households (55 percent of the population) have a daily per capita income amounting to only 44 percent of the poverty line, or US\$0.44.

The 2008 State of Food and Agriculture Report by The Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) states that Haiti is one of 22 countries considered especially vulnerable owing to a combination of high levels of chronic hunger (above 30 percent under-nourishment); high dependency on imports of petroleum products (100 percent in most countries); and, in many cases, high dependency on imports of major cereals (rice, wheat and maize) for domestic consumption. Haiti is especially vulnerable as they present a high level of all three risk factors (FAO, 2008).

That said, there are several factors that dictate that now is the time to initiate Millennium villages in Haiti:

- Haiti has emerged from political turmoil into a stage of relative political stability. In 2007, the
 Haitian Government finalized the 2008 2010 National Poverty Reduction Strategy Plan
 (DSNCRP) to confront these challenges and put forth a concerted effort to achieve the Millennium
 Development Goals (MDG's). The Government of President Rene Preval has shown a strong
 commitment to achieving the MDG's and improving the standard of living for all Haitians.
- 2. Recent natural disasters confirmed the failure of the top down approach and the need for local, sustainable, community driven projects.
- 3. Haiti is fortunate to have two external agencies The Global Institute for Community Health and Development at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine, and the Green Family Foundation with a track record of collaboration with local communities and a commitment to address the problems of rural Haiti to implement the Millennium Village Project.

Benefits of Establishing Millennium Villages in Haiti

The potential benefits of investing in the Millennium Village Project in Haiti are enormous. Among other benefits, this initiative will:

 Provide a proof-of-concept of multi-sectoral rural investments that can deliver practical, measurable development outcomes on the ground and show that the MDGs can be achieved in a post-conflict setting in rural Haiti in five years.

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Millennium Villages in Haiti (Cont'd.)

Benefits of Establishing Millennium Villages in Haiti (cont'd.)

- 2. Build capacity in community empowerment and strengthen the technical capacity of local and district government officers and NGOs to implement and maintain MDG interventions through the implementation of practical strategies in successful rural development.
- 3. Provide practical lessons for scaling up village-level interventions to achieve the MDGs and strengthen the efforts of the government of Haiti and its development partner in preparing and implementing MDG-based development strategies.
- 4. Provide concrete and sustainable benefits to rural communities through good governance and comprehensive MDG-based development policies, emphasizing community participation and leadership of rural communities - a "bottom-up empowerment" - that will enable villages to lift themselves out of the poverty trap.
- 5. Combine proven, science-based interventions with the best local knowledge, through community participation and leadership in design, implementation, monitoring and evaluation.
- 6. Together with the village community, create business plans for income-generating activities that will improve the livelihoods of community members and pro vide a means of sustaining many of the interventions and finding a way out of the "poverty trap."
- 7. Provide a platform for a wide range of stakeholders to work together. This would include local, district, provincial and national governments, civil society, development partners, UN specialized agencies, funds and programs, and the international scientific and medical communities.

Haiti Specific Alterations to Millennium Village Model

As mentioned in the text of this proposal, there are four MVP features unique to Haiti:

- It is the first MVP in the Western Hemisphere;
- 2. The global economic crisis has drastically increased costs in Haiti making it impossible to adhere to the MVP guidelines and costs per village;
- 3. It was not completely funded at the time of initiation of the Project. The program is partially funded by a Miami based philanthropy, the Green Family Foundation. The University of Miami is committed to raising the balance of funding necessary; and
- 4. In contradistinction to African Millennium Village projects, though free universal primary education is supposed to be offered to everyone, this is unfortunately not the case throughout the country. Therefore, strategies to address Millennium Village goals in education will need to be modified in light of the realities of the state of educational programs in Marmont.

Project Details and Implementation Modalities

Village Identification and Scope

The first step in establishing a Millennium Village is site selection.

a) Selection criteria for the Millennium Village

A Millennium Village is defined as a cluster of rural communities with an approximate population of 15,000, with some form of local government that have committed themselves to accomplish all the Millennium Development Goals and meet the selection criteria below:

- Located in a hunger hotspot, as defined in the UN Millennium Project Hunger Task force report (January 2005), in a major agro-ecological zone. All African hunger hotspots are also considered poverty hotspots, with high prevalence of HIV/AIDS, malaria and/or tuberculosis, and lack infrastructure such as electricity, clean water and adequate sanitation. Haiti's Central Plateau also meets these criteria.
- Located in an area where physical security needs of the community and others, including project staff, are assured.

b) Scope

The 15,770 people of Marmont will be the immediate, direct beneficiaries, but there will also be immediate albeit indirect benefits for the people Thomonde (population 36,000) and Lahoye (population 25,000) that are also served by Project Medishare.


The project has been designed to ultimately benefit all impovenished people living in the rural areas in Haiti by establishing the technical proof of concept of how integrated rural development strategies can achieve the MDGs. The project will scientifically monitor the effectiveness of the comprehensive and integrated set of interventions required to meet the goals, establish the required budget, and demonstrate how the interventions can be delivered by the communities themselves or through existing government mechanisms.

Management

Overall project management will be provided by the Global Institute for Community Health and Development of the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine, which has been established based on the school's 12-year track record of pioneering health and community development in Haiti's Central Department. The Global Institute has approved a Country Manager (Ellen Powers), a person with an MPH and over 19 years of experience in developing community development programs in Haiti, and Marie Chery as the In-Country Manager. Marie Chery is a Haitian-American nurse who returned to Haiti six years ago to manage Project Medishare's programs in the Central Plateau. Project Medishare, UM's affiliated NGO in Haiti, will execute all aspects of the program on the ground. Columbia University's Earth Institute will provide technical assistance to the project and advise the government of Haiti as to policy matters related to the project. The University of Florida Institute for Food and Agriculture Sciences (IFAS) will provide technical assistance to the agriculture, water/sanitation & environment interventions of the project. A liaison (Martine Deverson) has been established in the President's office.

Project Management Structure

Advisory Bodies

A National Steering Committee consisting of the Haitian Government Ministers will be established to oversee the overall implementation of the project. The committee will provide guidance on prioritization of activities, the policy agenda, partnerships and resource mobilization strategy. The latter will include resources for scaling up the project to other universities in the country. The committee will meet twice a year to review overall progress in the implementation of the project and provide continuous strategic direction to the project. It will also liaise with the in-country UNDP office to gather additional support for the project.

Technical Assistance

The Millennium Village Management Team will receive technical assistance from:

- a) The Earth Institute for policy matters
- b) The University of Florida School of Agriculture for agricultural development
- c) The schools of Education, International Studies, and Nursing at the University of Miami

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Sustainability

The Global Institute is committed to the concept that the Millennium Village management program will be fully sustained by year 2015. It is important to note, however, that in contradistinction to millennium villages in Africa; our project was initiated with only partial funding from the Green Family Foundation. The University of Miami has therefore initiated an aggressive campaign to sustain the program that includes institutional commitment, appeals to philanthropy, and application for support from foundations and international donors.

At a local level, health activities will assuredly be sustained through Project Medishare's strong relationship with the regional Ministry of Health. We have every expectation that our agricultural program will achieve results comparable to Millennium Villages in Africa, progressing from improved subsistence farming, to increased surplus for market and ultimately to cash crop production. The most difficult aspect of sustainability will be in the education sector since Haiti's educational system is severely lacking resources.

Scalability

The Global Institute, with assistance from the local UNDP office, and the county and national government will be actively engaged in taking lessons from the project and assessing their applicability to county-wide and nationwide planning processes. It is envisioned that lessons will be integrated into MDG-based national plans and into projects supported by international donors and partners. The potential of the MV to be scaled up will depend on several factors:

- The extent to which local government and line ministries are engaged in implementing the MVs. This will require (i) including local government officials in the planning, training, and implementation of activities; (ii) seeking secondments/placements of government extension agents (agriculture, health etc.) to the project; and (iii) hiring staff that would normally be filled by the local government (if funds were available) and have those staff involved in the government planning meetings as if they were part of their own staff (these staff positions could be taken up by the government as funds become available through national funds). Scaling up will require ensuring the current institutional arrangements are used for implementing MV interventions.
- Technical capacity building is another key part to ensure scalability. Training courses for health and nutrition, agricultural and environment, energy and transport services, water resources and sanitation, and business and communications; on-site facilitators in community management and oversight; agriculture and the environment; health and infrastructure (water, energy, roads); establishment of training/community centers; and developing community programs for "Master Farmers," Health workers, and Infrastructure Technicians to provide dissemination of information and services to the community at large can be planned to enable scaling up.
- Critical to the success of the initiative is the need to empower the entire community, including men, women, and vulnerable groups, from the beginning by building local technical, administrative and entrepreneurial capacity to provide many of the services. Concurrent processes will be empowerment of local groups to understand the pressing problems of most community members; their responsibilities in understanding these problems in terms of workable and cost effective solutions; and their central role in conceptualizing, communicating and designing the project, through to its execution and eventual hand-off to the community so the project can be locally managed. Where the need is warranted and desired, experts in building community empowerment and projects will be brought to the communities to conduct training courses in community dialogue, community action plans, gender equality, empowerment and project management.

Scalability (Cont'd.)

Scaling up and long-term sustainability of this project will ultimately depend on and be carried out by the national government. Therefore, partnering with national government and development partners at the initial planning stages is essential for future extrapolation of the evidence base to similar agro-ecological zone and farming system. To the greatest extent possible, we will maintain the collaboration with the national government to incorporate the MDGs into their national development strategies (DSNCRP and others).

Monitoring and Evaluation

Before implementation of the project, baseline data will be gathered to track project progress over the five years. Continual monitoring will permit mid-stream assessment and modifications to intervention strategies as needed. The exercise will help to gauge whether the village is on track towards the achievement of the MDGs and what needs to be done to hasten the process.

The approach will adapt to community-based participatory monitoring approach that focuses on community empowerment for self-monitoring and evaluation of progress towards achievement of well identified target outputs that will result in community desired outcomes. Hence the community will participate fully in the choice such output/outcomes, identify the measurable indicators and adopt a system of monitoring progress towards achievement of the same. The measurable indicators selected for monitoring purposes will be identified in collaboration with the community and will be based on the community's strategic priorities. Such participatory and systems-based monitoring and evaluative processes will allow for on-going learning, correction, and adjustment by all parties concerned.

The performance indicators will select both qualitative and quantitative performance indicators based on the need to assess whether progress is being made towards achieving success and/or whether success has been achieved. This will enable the community to identify areas of the intervention strength that need to be hastened, modified or changed to ensure timely success. Following the selection of these indicators, collection of continuous and basic monitoring data will be done using a number of methods.

The monitoring data, thus collected, will be used (together with the baseline data) to determine realistic targets upon which the monitoring for success will be based. It will also be used to establish a feedback mechanism between the activities on the ground and the decision being made by policy-makers.

In addition to monitoring, there will be evaluation of the various aspects of the intervention process using a number of evaluative tools and methodologies.

All the information gathered under M&E will be analyzed and reported to the relevant action groups in the community as well as to the government and civil society and any other group/individual UNDP may decide to give the report to. This information will be well targeted, be in the right format, and be prepared and availed on time.

In addition to the regular surveys used for monitoring progress, evaluations of the component interventions in terms of effectiveness of distribution of goods and services, capacity building, as well as project management, will occur on an annual basis. The village committees will conduct these on-going evaluations. Adjustments in interventions, methods of community engagement, and management will be made according to the recommendations of the formal evaluations and community dialogues.

Risks

Among the foremost assumptions for the Project's success is continued government support, at both national and regional levels. The Project will sustain government and stakeholder support to the project through district and national government involvement at each stage of project implementation, through clear linkages to national government development strategies through the joint work of UN Country Agencies (specifically the UNDP Country Office), Project Medishare and other partners.

The competency of staff is a primary risk factor. Here we have the advantage of competent local staff previously trained and Project Medishare's Community Health Program.

Lack of full support from national government and community members in regards to matching funds and in-kind efforts is also a significant risk factor. The project relies on partnership from government and partners to fund and implement portions of multiple initiatives. Every effort will be made to secure their commitment and interfacing with the community and national government remains a critical intervention in its own right. Partnering with the UNDP as the implementing agency and benefiting from its strategic and policy interactions with governments is therefore a core project feature.

Funding Modalities



Marmont Millennium Village

Site Selection

The initial village, Marmont was chosen as the first Millennium Village in Haiti as it meets all of the above criteria, and it is located in Haiti's poorest region, the Central Department, with a total population of

Marmont Situation Assessment

General Background

Marmont is located in the Department of the Center, one of the nine (9) territorial divisions of Haiti. The Department is commonly referred to as the Plateau Central. Marmont is located at approximately 300 meters above sea level and at 7 kilometers from Hinche, the capital of the Department, and is connected to other parts of the country via the National Road #3.

Marmont's population, originally estimated at 7,000, has been confirmed by demographic surveys at 15,770 people. Local government has donated land for health, education and agricultural projects. The community is approximately half-way between Thomonde, Project Medishare's administrative headquarters, and Hinche, a city of approximately 100,000 that will serve as a market for Marmont's improved agricultural productivity.

Project Medishare, as the lead NGO implementing the MVP in Haiti, is a registered NGO in Haiti and is mandated by the Haitian Government to provide access to health and development services to the community of Marmont. In collaboration with the Haitian Ministry of Health and several NGO's in the area (Zanmi Lasante and World Vision). Project Medishare has been providing access to health care services in the community since 2004. These services include a small cadre of health workers (eight) and a government clinic renovated and managed by Project Medishare since 2007. The health agents informed the community of the project, generated their support and gathered baseline data by visiting every household.

Climate

Data collected from the Service of Meteorology of the Ministry of Agriculture indicate the average temperature in the area of 25.5°C with a maximum of 34°C during July-August and a minimum of 21°C in December and February. The climate alternates between two seasons, the rainy and the dry season. The rainy season extends from April to October with maximum rainfall during the period of May and June. The dry season runs from November to March with minimum rainfall in December and January. The average annual rainfall measures 1,500 millimeters.

The soil in the Marmont region is mostly superficial and of clayish texture. It is constantly threaten by erosion because of steep slopes present in some areas (Josemarie, Garde Marmont) and weak top soil particularly in Savanne Plate, Doco and Lamesette. The humus cover is very thin and of insignificant permeability.

Administrative / Political

Marmont is the 2nd Communal Section of the Commune of Hinche in the Department of the Center. It covers an area of 108.56 m2 with 3608 buildings and 3173 households. Marmont is administered by the Conseil d'Administration de la Section Communale (CASEC), which is newly elected and working under the supervision of the municipality of Hinche.

Marmont consists of two (2) large communities:

- Haut Marmont which includes the following areas: Haute Cantave, Doco, Cour Cadichon, Cherival,
- Bas Marmont which includes the following areas: Centre Marmont, Haibon, Savane Plate and

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Marmont Situation Assessment (cont'd.)

Social / Cultural

According to the latest matrimonial indicators, 80% of the inhabitants of the area live in cohabitation, and only 20% are married. Women head fifty five percent (55%) of the household. The three main religions practiced in Marmont are: Protestant 60%, Catholic 35% and voodoo 5%. There are five (5) protestant and one (1) Catholic Church in the area. The main cultural event of the area is the Catholic feast that celebrates the patron saint of St Pierre and St Paul during the month of June. Catholics, Protestants and Voodoo faithfuls take part in the celebration.

Economic

Agriculture is the predominant economic activity in the communal section of Marmont. The secondary economic activities are commerce (micro enterprise), fabrication and sale of wood charcoal, production and sale of artisan items: broom, equipments for horses, mules (saddles, carrying pouches) and animal husbandry (horses, goats, hogs, and poultry).

The farm sizes vary from ¼ to 6 carreaux of land and belong to the landowner. It is estimated that over 70% of the population of the Department of the Center live below the poverty line.

Agro-Ecological Zone

The main crops raised in the area are: corn, millet, beans, yucca, plantain and sugar cane.

Health

Project Medishare operates and manages the only health clinic that provides ambulatory services to that population. The staff consists of one (2) physicians, one (1) Pharmacist, three (3) LPNs, one (1) pharmacy aid and support staff (secretary, archivist, guardian, maid). Community health services are also provided through a network of five (5) community health agents who organize activities such as home visits, group meetings, and rally posts in order to educate the population in health maintenance and prevention. Mobile clinics are organized to bring health services to areas most remote from the clinic such as Juana Bintouribe, La Begue.

Marmont Situation Assessment (cont'd.)

Baseline Information

Project Medishare conducted a needs assessment and demographic census in March 2008 for the implementation of the Marmont MV. After community meetings and discussions with local stakeholders (elected officials and community leaders), Project Medishare began the process of identifying 30 individuals for the week long training on how to conduct a census (based on the MVP guidelines and adapted to the Haitian context).

Demography

The communal section on Marmont has a population of 15,770 inhabitants. It contains 3,108 building and 2,873 households with an average of 4 people per household.

Land Use, Agriculture and Environment

- The communal section of Marmont can be divided in two parts, separated by the National Road #3
- The East side, to left looking toward Port-au-Prince represents 60% of the area of Marmont with a plant cover of approximately 8%.
- The West side, to the right looking toward Port-au-Prince represents 40% of the total area with a plant cover of nearly 20-30%.
- The farmers use only local seeds and use the hoe to prepare the soil. Only a minority use animal traction.
- The farmers do not have access to any kind of farm credit and face a multitude of farming problems such as: illness of livestock, limited market to sell their stocks and lack of transportation for their products.
- The excessive and abusive tree cutting, the inappropriate farming of the land explain the advanced state of soil erosion. It leads to flooding of the plots, decrease harvests yield and consequently decreased revenue for the farmers.
- There are two (2) organizations in the area that intervene in the field of agricultural development:
 - World Vision prepares and distributes seedlings of fruit trees to farmers and provides them with the necessary technical support.
 - Ministry of Agriculture promotes local production and helps farmers improve harvest.

Marmont Situation Assessment (cont'd.)

Energy Use

- The energy commonly used for cooking is wood fire. Wood charcoal is seldom used and is made mostly for sale to consumers in Port-au-Prince.
- Kerosene lamps are used for lighting the homes. Only a few local organizations use other alternate sources of energy such as generators, inverters among others.

Communications And Connectivity

Two mobile phone companies, Digicel and Voila, are currently installing base station antennas in the Marmont area. These services are expected to be available very soon.

Health

Statistical data collected at the 'Centre de Sante de Marmont' (health center) over a one year period indicate that the major illnesses in the area are:

- Acute respiratory infections
- Diarrhea
- Intestinal parasites
- Anemia
- Cuteneous infections
- Gastritis

In addition, 33% of children under five suffer from chronic malnutrition. It is worth noting that the Department of the Center registers a mortality rate in children under five of 187/1000. This is figure is the highest in the entire country.

Water Resources

The water sources in Marmont are the following: water conveyance system that only serves the center of Marmont, wells and unprotected water springs.

Sanitation

The vast majority of the houses (over 80%) do not have access to latrines.

Schools

The communal section on Marmont has fourteen (14) elementary schools, of which thirteen are private and one is government, and there are no secondary schools. These schools face major difficulties: inadequate physical structure, untrained teachers.

Supporting Features

- Political stability and good relationships with newly elected local representatives.
- Credibility and experience of Project Medishare and the current health program.
- The presence of collaborating parties, and spirit of cooperation.
- The proximity of Marmont to the Haiti/DR border.
- The mobilization of women organizations and women advocacy groups.
- Opportunities for agricultural and other economic development activities.
- Characteristics conducive for replication.

Challenges

- Mobility of the population living in the border areas
- High percentage of the population living in extreme poverty
- High level of illiteracy
- Degradation of the environment
- Urban migration
- Social and cultural taboos.

ANNEX 1:

Community Capacity Building Objectives of a Millennium Village

The objectives of the demonstration program are aligned to the Millennium Development Goals in order to address the impacts of extreme poverty in the community; and to generate sustainable community capacity in key areas of human and economic development, including health, nutrition, agriculture, microbusiness, water, sanitation, education, gender development, the environment and infrastructure. The activities to be pursued in each MDG area will be determined through a participatory community needs assessment, and in constitution with government, and local organizations and NGOs.

Objective One: Eliminate hunger and malnutrition in communities by increasing agricultural and livestock production, access and utilization of nutritious foods, with a specific focus on improving nutritional status of pregnant women, nursing mother and infants under 2. (MDG1)

Activities

Improve soil productivity, livestock production, vegetable & fruit production; Demonstration of alternative techniques for fertilization and harvesting; Providing access to local grain storage, Agribusiness, Aquaculture and Technical Assistance; Nutritional support & supplement through the distribution of Akamil and micronutrient supplementation.

Objective Two: Improve livelihoods of women and men, and increase incomes for both on- and off-farm activities through agriculture associated programs including watershed management and irrigation, animal husbandry, new farming techniques, increased varieties of seeds and fertilizer, technical assistance and access to micro-finance for agriculture. (MDG 1)

Activities

Providing access to improved seeds and tools, water management/irrigation and technical assistance; Business development focusing on women; Literacy programs and education of women; access to micro credit and jobs in agriculture & the informal sector; and protection and fight against violence (sexual and physical) against women.

Objective Three: Assure full attendance to primary schools for both boys and girls, and eliminate gender disparity in schools by improving school facilities, providing teacher training, establishing adult literacy programs, and providing school lunch programs supported by local agriculture programs. (MDG 2 & 3)

Activities

School lunch program; primary school rehabilitation and secondary school construction; educational technology, supplies and equipment; teacher training; elimination of school fees; student & parent outreach; educational promotion; and girls empowerment & wellness program

Objective Four: Improve access to medical services and increase the trained workforce, especially focusing on improving women's health and drastically reducing child and maternal mortality. (MDG 4 & 5)

Activities

Recruitment & training of health care professionals (health agents and clinic staff); Clinic renovation & maternity ward construction focusing on decreasing maternal and infant mortality; Improving access to reproductive health services and pre/post natal care; Ongoing community health program (mobile clinics, vaccinations, nutritional monitoring, health education, referrals to health clinic) and improved access to essential medicines.

Objective Five: Decrease the rate of infection of HIV/AIDS, malaria, TB and other major diseases, and increase access to essential medicines such as antiretroviral medication through prevention, treatment, and workforce development. (MDG 6)

Activities

 Access to Voluntary Counseling and Treatment, ARV's, TB screening & treatment, prevention, and education; and distribution of bed nets.

Objective Six: Integrate the principles of sustainable development to reverse the loss of environmental resources and enhance ecosystem services through training programs, replanting programs, agriculture demonstration programs, and improved conservation practices. (MDG 7)

Activities

 Housing & renovation finance program; safe water points; eco-sanitation program; alternative energy programs; and tree planting and soil conservation.

Objective Seven: Increase access to clean water and sanitation for households, schools and medical services through innovations in water testing and treatment; increase clean water access points; establish water storage facilities; and develop eco-sanitation solutions. (MDG 7)

Activities

Water treatment and testing; improved potable water sites; access to clean water/sanitation in schools; water management systems; sanitation education/training; and improved latrines in community (construction and reinforcement).

Objective Eight: Eliminate the digital divide by making available the benefits of communication technologies, especially access to the internet and mobile telephone services. (MDG 8)

Activities

 Construction of a community center to provide access to computers and the Internet; provide seminars and technical training.

Objective Nine: Improve infrastructure, energy and transportation. (MDG 8)

Increase production, shorten transportation time and facilitate marketing of agricultural products; supply electricity in the area to extend the network to the city of Hinche; and the construction of a community center.

Objective Ten: Increase community leadership and organizing capacity to facilitate community engagement and sustainability by establishing local and global partnerships; enhancing participatory community planning, networking, implementation, and global assessment; and strengthening grassroots development institutions and civil society. (MDG 8)

Activities

Meetings, training and workshops with local leaders and government representatives; policy development (Earth Institute).

Objective Eleven: Link to local, district and national government. (MDG 8)

Activities

Seminars for community leaders to educate on program objectives; support of community organizations; and seminars with the community in conflict management.

encourage and support such a process, both in terms of diplomacy and resources. In northern Nigeria, the military and police appear to have quelled a series of deadly attacks this week by members of the Islamist militant group, Boko Haram. But the government needs to give serious and sustained attention to addressing the conditions that have allowed Boko Haram to gain ground, including reforming the police and reversing discriminatory policies against "non-indigenes."

Liberia: Liberia has come a long way since its civil war, but there remains much work to be done. The military has been impressively reformed, and now there needs to be the same level of focus given to improving the capacity and professionalism of the police. The UN Mission in Liberia (UNMIL) and the United States should do more in this regard. In addition, corruption continues to be a real challenge for Liberia. President Johnson Sirleaf has committed to address corruption, but she needs continued support and encouragement from all areas of government, including the legislature. One area that deserves particular attention is Liberia's timber sector. The Liberian government and international donors have invested tens of millions of dollars to ensure sufficient guards against future abuse and exploitation, and the progress made needs to be sustained.

Addendum to Memo to Secretary Clinton - August 2, 2009

Adding to the memo sent yesterday, I've put below some thoughts on key issues that are likely to come up during your visit to South

South Africa. As you are likely aware, the most immediate challenge facing President Zuma and his new administration is the economy. High rates of unemployment and inequality have long been problems for South Africa, but tensions are exacerbated by the country's first post-apartheid recession.

Your visit presents an opportunity to better understand these economic challenges and hear how the Zuma administration is planning to tackle them. Perhaps more than any other factor, the economy is likely to influence South Africa's foreign policy priorities in the coming years. Understanding South Africa's economic situation is therefore critical as we explore how we might strengthen our bilateral relationship in the years ahead.

I have been concerned for some time that the leadership has been drifting away from Mandela's vision of a human rights-guided foreign policy. Former President Mbeki's unwillingness to publicly criticize abuses in Zimbabwe or exert more pressure on the Mugabe regime was deeply disappointing. Furthermore, Mbeki strongly opposed UN Security Council action toward Sudan and the International Criminal Court's (ICC) indictment of Sudanese President Bashir. The new Zuma administration has a chance to reverse this course and there are some hopeful signs that provide excellent opportunities for productive engagement. Just this week, there were media reports indicating that while South Africa does not agree with the ICC warrant against President Bashir, it takes seriously its international obligations and will arrest Bashir if he visits South Africa.

Appealing to South Africa's role as a continental leader and key ally within the broader international community, we need to strongly encourage and help the Zuma administration to reclaim Mandela's vision, beginning with its role in the ongoing transition in Zimbabwe. As the Southern African Development Community (SADC) undertakes its six-month review of Zimbabwe's government this month, South Africa needs to take a strong line against continued abuses of power We also need to encourage South Africa to

play a positive and constructive role at the United Nations more generally, where among countries trying to seek positive movement to deal with global human rights concerns and anti-democratic trends, such as the troublesome internal situation in Burma, South Africa under Mbeki was particularly unhelpful

Finally, high rates of HIV/AIDS and tuberculosis (TB) continue to pose major challenges for the South African government. The United States continues to provide substantial assistance to help with these health challenges and I understand we are considering ways we might expand our assistance with regard to TB. This is positive, but at the same time, we need to ensure there is sufficient political leadership from the government devoted to combating these diseases. This has been a problem with regards to HIV/AIDS in the past and a recent New York Times article ("South Africa is Seen to Lag in H.I.V. Fight, 19 July 2009) suggests that it continues to be a problem. We should press the new Zuma administration to publicly express its commitment to fighting HIV/AIDS and to devote more resources and support toward prevention efforts.

CHF International Current Initiatives in Liberia

CHF International is managing an innovative combination of initiatives in Liberia aimed at: (1) Providing financing to help small and medium enterprises (SMEs) grow, and, (2) Building the capacity of entrepreneurs to help them grow their businesses and obtain financing from commercial sources. The two initiatives are described below.

Liberian Enterprise Development Finance Company (LEDFC)

LEDFC was established in 2007 as a result of commitments made at the Clinton Global Initiative. LEDFC is a Liberian-registered non-bank financial institution that provides financing to enable Liberian small and medium enterprises (SMEs) to start up, upgrade, and expand. The Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC) has committed \$20 million in loan capital while the Robert L. Johnson (RLJ) Foundation provided \$3 million to fund operating costs and a business development services program. CHF International owns and manages LEDFC.

After facing several months of start-up and operating challenges, LEDFC embarked on a turnaround program and is now poised for significant growth. So far, LEDFC has approved 16 loans for an aggregate amount of \$2.2 million, and has a healthy pipeline of loans under review. The types of businesses financed by LEDFC include hospitality, transportation, construction materials, retailing, agribusiness, and food services. LEDFC has an additional eight loan proposals in the pipeline.

With \$17.8 million of loan capital remaining to deploy, LEDFC presents a significant opportunity for the development of the Liberta private sector and the creation of new jobs. However, LEDFC will need additional operating funding so that it can continue to operate past the Spring of 2010.

The business environment in Liberia is rich in potential but highly constrained by the lack of capacity among local businesses. Financing needs are great, but bankable businesses are scarce and loan underwriting is labor intensive. Most businesses are unable to prepare proper business plans, accurately determine their financing needs, or provide reliable financial statements. Much needs to be done in the area of business training and the development of business development services.

Certificate Program for Women Entrepreneurs (CPWE)

To improve the capacity of local businesses – women entrepreneurs in particular -- Goldman Sachs provided a grant to CHF International to launch the 10,000 Women Certificate Program for Women Entrepreneurs (CPWE) program in Liberia. The aim of CPWE is to stimulate the supply and an effective demand market for practical business training in Liberia. As a part of the wider Goldman Sachs 10,000 Women Initiative, CPWE has several expected outcomes including the development of local business training capacity, improving underserved women's access to business education, and strengthening local business institutions. In the short-term, CPWE plans to provide business training to 60 women entrepreneurs to improve their skill sets and help them increase their chances of securing access to credit. Over the long term, CPWE is building the capacity of Liberian higher

As Liberians rebuild their economy following almost two decades of civil strife, CHF International is providing technical assistance, facilitating access to finance, and building human resource capacity to help Liberian businesses and entrepreneurs contribute to Liberia's economic growth.

Liberia Enterprise Development Fund (LEDFC)


In 2007, CHF International, the Robert L. Johnson Foundation, and the Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC) established the Liberian Enterprise Development Finance Company (LEDFC), a Liberian-registered non-bank financial institution. LEDFC was created to help Liberian small and medium enterprises (SMEs) access financing to support the growth and development of Liberia's economy.

Legal and financial infrastructure development is progressing but takes time. In the meantime, Liberian businesses need access to financing, especially long term loans to procure modern machinery and equipment. LEDFC is there to help fill the gap.



Loans can range in size from US\$10,000 to US \$1,000,000 and can be granted for terms up to five years. Interest rates are between 13 and 16 percent depending on the purpose and term of the toan. Loans are available for financing accounts receivable, inventory, and equipment. LEDFC is targeting Liberian owned SMEs that have capable management, a clear market opportunity, and the potential for growth and employment generation.

OPIC, an agency of the U.S. Government is providing up to US\$20 million in loan capital. As of June 2009, LEDFC has made ten loans for a total amount of US\$ 2 million. Types of businesses financed by LEDFC include hospitality, transportation, construction materials, retailing, agribusiness, and food services.



10,000 Women Program for Entrepreneurs

Launched in 2008, the 10,000 Women Certificate Program for Women Entrepreneurs (CPWE) program's goal is to stimulate a supply and an 'effective demand market' for the SME business and management training within Liberia. As a part of the wider Goldman Sachs 10,000 Women Initiative, CPWE has several expected outcomes, including:

- the development of a quality, localized training curriculum in business management;
- an increased number of underserved women receiving an education in business and management;
- an improvement in the quality and capacity of business institutions in Liberia;
- increased likelihood of women-run enterprises gaining access to credit to build their businesses; and;
- the building of a support network to sustainably provide ongoing skills and training to the SME sector.

In the short-term, CPWE plans to provide business training to 60 women entrepreneurs to improve their skill set and therefore help them increase their chances of securing access to credit. Over the long term, CPWE is building the capacity of two important Liberian institutions — Cuttington University and the Liberian Business Association — so that they will be able to sustainably provide skills training to the SME sector.

Park Programs

Facilitating Empowerment of Women

In 2008, CHF implemented the Facilitating Empowerment of Women through initiatives for Skills Enhancement (FEMWISE) program, in partnership with the Initiative for inclusive Security. FEMWISE had two distinct components: (1) implementation of a 6-month pilot project to train and empower women to actively participate in local leadership, governance and the 2008 elections in Lofa County, Liberia; and (2) a one-year period of technical support from IIS to increase CHF's organizational capacity for effective gender mainstreaming. FEMWISE was supplemented by WISE, an initiative to better integrate women into local decision-making and to gamer national attention and raise awareness about the importance of their involvement.

Helping Ex-combatants Help Themselves

This research-based program was a detailed case study of Lofa County, Liberia to produce guidelines and policy recommendations for supporting ex-combatants in sustaining employment and regular income. The findings were meant to be broadly applicable beyond Liberia to rural post-conflict settings where ex-combatant reintegration is a priority.

Locally Initiated Networks for Community Strengthening

With the support of the U.S. Agency for International Development, CHF recently completed the LINCS program, which worked to strengthen the prospects for peace and stability at the community and district levels in Lofa County. Program activities addressed the root causes and consequences of conflicts, facilitated dispute resolution between ex-combatants and their "host" communities, and improved communication at all levels.

I just have a couple of actually, I think I have just one thing for you at the top, just to give you an update on Secretary Clinton's Africa trip. The Secretary is in Pretoria, South Africa today, where she is holding meetings with South African Foreign Minister Nkoana-Mashabane, Deputy President Motlanthe, Minister of Health Motsoaledi, and former president Nelson Mandela The Secretary is also scheduled to give a speech at an event hosted by the South African Industrial Development Corporation and the Business Unity of South Africa. She is also scheduled to attend a National Women's Day dinner.

And with that, I'm ready to take your questions.

QUESTION: Do you have anything on the death of the Pakistani Taliban leader?

MR. WOOD: I've - we've seen reports, but we're not able to confirm anything at this point

OUESTION: You've seen news reports?

MR. WOOD: We've seen news reports, yes.

OUESTION: Okay.

QUESTION: How important is he in the fight against Taliban and al-Qaida and that region?

MR. WOOD: How important he is? Well, Mehsud has been responsible for a number of atrocious terrorist attacks against people from around the world, frankly. And we will continue to work with other countries around the world to fight the scourge of terrorism. Mehsud is just one individual who's been responsible for carrying out heinous acts of terrorism and aggression against innocent civilians, and we will continue to go after those people who countenance those acts So --

QUESTION: The Pakistani foreign minister has said that he has died. Haven't you got --

MR. WOOD: As I said, I'm not able to confirm that at this point.

We are very grateful for the efforts of the Government of Portugal, including its willingness to join our effort to close Guantanamo through this humanitarian gesture and for the leadership it exhibited in achieving a common European position on resettling Guantanamo detainees.

This position taken by the European Union has helped facilitate resettlement discussions We are encouraged that so many of our close friends and allies are also considering assisting us in our efforts to close the Guantanamo Bay detention facilities The United States and Portugal will continue to work closely on matters pertaining to the actual transfer. We have no further comment on this at this time.

QUESTION: Well, what - are they going to take them into custody or are they going to just let them - monitor them?

MR. WOOD: I think we're still working out the details to that, but it's a very important step that Portugal has agreed to take these two detainees.

QUESTION: Okay.

MR. WOOD: Yes, Michel.

QUESTION: On Iran, do you have anything on the report published by The Washington Post today referring to the State Department saying that Iran is not able to produce a nuclear bomb before 2013?

QUESTION: President Obama's chief counterterrorism advisor John Brennan has said yesterday that Hezbollah started out as purely a terrorist organization back in the early '80s and that it has evolved significantly over time. He added that, "I am pleased to see that a lot of Hezbollah individuals are, in fact, renouncing their type of terrorism and violence and are trying to participate in the political process in a very legitimate fashion." Can you elaborate on this issue? Have you changed your policy toward Hezbollah and have you started to differentiate between its military and political wings?

MR. WOOD: Let me be very clear: Hezbollah is a terrorist organization. U S. policy toward Hezbollah has not changed. We do not make any distinction between the political and military wings. And that is our policy. Until Hezbollah decides that it's going to change and stop carrying out the acts of terrorism and other acts that are causing instability in the region, there's no reason for our policy to change.

QUESTION: And how do you make the distinction between that and what Mr. Brennan said?

MR. WOOD: Well, I haven't seen a transcript of his remarks, but what I can tell you is what U.S. policy is with regard to Hezbollah.

QUESTION: But he seemed to say that there were some moderate elements that might be changing there, too.

MR. WOOD: Well, that remains to be seen whether there are or not. I'm not an expert on Hezbollah and the inner workings of that terrorist organization But what I can tell you is that our policy has not changed.

QUESTION: But he differentiated between the two wings, between politicals and terrorists.

. MR. WOOD: Well, our policy, the U.S. Government policy, remains the same with regard to - I haven't seen the remarks, but I'm sure that he was not saying that the United States makes a clear distinction between those two branches, because we do not.

QUESTION: But it certainly was opening up the door to the possibility that if certain members of Hezbollah were to renounce violence that the United States could do business with it

MR. WOOD: Well, again, without seeing his remarks, I mean, it appears that he may have been speculating on what may happen if Hezbollah does this or that. But Hezbollah has not done this or that. They are still a force of instability in the region. And as a result, our policy has not changed.

QUESTION: Are you sure there's not a different opinion between the White House and the State Department on this? Because this is an advisor of President Obama that's talking about how, you know, there could be certain members of Hezbollah that are changing their tune, and he. found it an encouraging sign.

MR. WOOD: Well, that's - again, there is - our policy is very clear on Hezbollah. The question of whether or not there are people inside of that organization that may want to take a different approach, a different track, change their stripes, that could very well be. I don't know. But in terms of dealing with Hezbollah as an organization, it is still a Foreign Terrorist Organization. It is, as I said, a force of instability in the region. And our policy has not changed.

Anything else?

QUESTION: I have a - just, actually, one on Moldova and the elections, I guess, just about a week ago. There's some reports of election monitors who were harassed and ultimately kind of gave up their mission there because they were - some were detained. Do you have anything to say about that?

MR. WOOD: No, I don't. What I recall is that on the July 29 elections there were U.S. Embassy observers and international observers that found the elections were generally orderly and calm. And I know that the OSCE and the Council of Europe issued a preliminary assessment of the elections. But beyond that, I really don't have anything.

QUESTION: Could you kind of just take the question? There were some European observers who have been detained and --

MR. WOOD: Absolutely. We'll take a look at it."

The Settlers' Lawyer (or, Elliott Abrams Is At It Again)

June 25, 2009, posted by Lara Friedman

On May 23, 2005, the Washington Post ran a an incisive op-ed by former State Department negotiator and Middle East advisor Aaron Miller, entitled "Israel's Lawyer," in which Aaron argued "For far too long, many American officials involved in Arab-Israeli peacemaking, myself included, have acted as Israel's attorney..." I was reminded of that article when I read today's piece by Elliott Abrams in the Wall Street Journal, which should, I believe, have been entitled "The West Bank Settlers' Lawyer."

Before anyone accuses me of casting aspersions on Mr. Abrams' honor or motivations, let me be clear: I have no doubt he has taken the case pro bono. For him, advocating for the settlers is clearly a labor of love And the settlers are fortunate to have Elliott volunteering for the job. He brings a unique combination of expertise and experience, combined, it would seem, with a shameless willingness to cherry-pick the facts and, when the facts don't support his argument, to fall back on the "I was there and I know what happened."

An interesting approach from a man who does not have a spotless record when it comes to truth-telling and foreign policy (for anyone who has forgotten the history. "Elliott Abrams - Pleaded guilty October 7, 1991, to two misdemeanor charges of withholding information from Congress about secret government efforts to support the Nicaraguan contra rebels during a ban on such aid. U.S. District Chief Judge Aubrey E Robinson, Jr., sentenced Abrams November 15, 1991, to two years probation and 100 hours community service. Abrams was pardoned December 24, 1992.")

But that was a long time ago. Let's forgot the ugly and embarrassing Iran-Contra history and focus on the "facts" in the current case, as Elliott sees them:

HA 09/01/2015

In today's WSJ article, Elliott offers an almost completely unverifiable history of what he says transpired between June 2003 and August 2005 (the date of Israel's "disengagement" from Gaza). Predictably, he focuses on the letter President Bush gave to Prime Minister Ariel Sharon on April 14, 2004. In that letter, Elliott notes (correctly), Bush wrote: "In light of new realities on the ground, including already existing major Israeli populations centers, it is unrealistic to expect that the outcome of final status negotiations will be a full and complete return to the armistice lines of 1949."

What Elliott neglects to mention is that in the letter Bush also re-stated his commitment to the Roadmap ("the United States remains committed to my vision and to its implementation as described in the roadmap"), which in stage I states that "Consistent with the Mitchell Report, GOI freezes all settlement activity (including natural growth of settlements)."

Elliott then goes on to assert that "On settlements we also agreed on principles that would permit some continuing growth." His evidence of such an agreement? Exhibit A: A statement by Prime Minister Sharon, not President Bush: "Mr. Sharon stated these clearly in a major policy speech in December 2003. 'Israel will meet all its obligations with regard to construction in the settlements. There will be no construction beyond the existing construction line, no expropriation of land for construction, no special economic incentives and no construction of new settlements."

Is this extremely experienced lawyer and foreign policy professional seriously arguing that a statement by Sharon should be understood as an accurate articulation of US policy, even in the absence of any corroborating statement by the US President? Even when that lengthy policy speech went into a range of issue where - at least officially - there was public disagreement with the US? (for example, in this same speech Sharon makes clear Israel views the Roadmap commitments as sequential - the Palestinians do everything they have to do, and only then does Israel act.) Apparently so.

But it gets better. For further evidence, Elliott asserts that, really, the US agreed with everything Sharon was saying His evidence? Exhibit B: A letter from Ariel Sharon's Chief of Staff, Dov Weissglas, Secretary of State Rice.

It is like saying "your honor, I swear my client did not sideswipe that car in the parking lot. I was there and I saw the whole thing. And as proof I give you my statement and a statement from my client and his wife, written to the owner of the damaged car, making clear that they were not the ones who hit his car. I rest my case."

So there are not quotes from President Bush or Secretary Rice to support Elliott's narrative - only statements by Israeli officials.

But Elliot has more proof to bring before the court: media reports. Exhibit #C: Elliott notes that "Stories in the press also made it clear that there were indeed 'agreed principles.' On Aug 21, 2004 the New York Times reported that 'the Bush administration . . . now supports construction of new apartments in areas already built up in some settlements, as long as the expansion does not extend outward."

Interesting. So if the NYT reported it, it must be true, right? Or rather, what must be true is that they were reporting what someone told them, at the time. And according to the first paragraph of the article Elliott cites, the source is "American and Israeli officials." Who could these officials be? Could they be Abrams himself (who at this point can no longer deny that he is personally invested in such a policy), and maybe Dov Weissglas? There is no way to know, but regardless, this is clearly not definitive proof of anything, other than the fact that there were Israeli and US officials spinning the story this way.

The rest of Elliott's article is simply hearsay and innuendo, speculation, and conjecture - not a single "fact" that can be examined, let alone refuted. Elliott rests his case on statements by two Israeli officials who never hid their desire to do everything possible to keep building West Bank settlements, and press reports based on unnamed US and Israeli officials.

With this kind of evidence, it is hard to see why the jury is still debating this case at all. Clearly the settlers' have a really excellent lawyer.

And since some of us prefer to rely on facts, rather than clever argumentation and bombastic statements, here are some actual statements by President Bush about settlements, from the same period Elliott is addressing:

President Bush 9/21/04. "... Israel should impose a settlement freeze, dismantle unauthorized outposts, end the daily humiliation of the Palestinian people and avoid any actions that prejudice final negotiations..."

President Bush, <u>11/27/07</u>: "... Israel must demonstrate its support for the creation of a prosperous and successful Palestinian state by removing unauthorized outposts, ending settlement expansion, and finding other ways for the Palestinian Authority to exercise its responsibilities without compromising Israel's security."

President Bush, <u>1/9/2008</u>: "... The second track is to help both parties deal with road map issues. Settlements is a road map issue "

President Bush, <u>1/10/2008</u>: "... Each side has got obligations under the road map. Settlements are clearly stated in the road map obligations for Israel We have made our concerns about expansion of settlements known, and we expect both parties to honor their obligations under the road map."

"Madame Secretary,

Under the Obama Presidency and your leadership at the U.S. State Department, the U.S. Government has shifted its strategic focus from a predominantly military-led approach to one using "smart power" based on diplomacy, defense and development. The direction you've chosen and the commitments you have made - to international organizations that advance collective security, to embracing and implementing global solutions to security - are a vast improvement over prior policy and constitute the best approach to safeguarding the United States and countries around the world against terrorism.

During my eight years as INTERPOL's Secretary General and based on having visited 123 countries to learn firsthand what their security concerns were and how to best address them, my INTERPOL team and I have identified a number of serious global security gaps which put Americans and citizens all over the world at risk to acts of terrorism and other serious crimes but which could be easily closed. Surprisingly, and until now, no government has made INTERPOL and the role of international law enforcement in protecting its citizens from acts of terrorism a real priority. Consequently, significant gaps in global security remain which require the immediate attention of Heads of State or Ministers of State, Justice and Interior and the private sector.

These dangerous but resolvable problems include

- 1. The 850 million international arrivals that pass through the world's airports each year without being checked against the only global database of over 10 million stolen and lost passports developed and managed by INTERPOL.
- 2. The culture which discourages countries from issuing international alerts when terrorists escape from prison.
- 3. The gap in policing where terrorists are arrested without their fingerprints and DNA profiles being compared against global databases.
- 4. The failure of far too many countries to notify INTERPOL when their citizens' passports have been reported lost or stolen, which significantly undermines any screening of passports used to enter the U.S. or other countries.

- 5. The lack of global anti-crime and anti-corruption centers, which leaves us under-protected against the scourge of human trafficking, slavery, and other serious transnational crimes.
- 6. The absence of robust facilities world-wide where police can work, train and exchange information under the umbrella of INTERPOL.
- 7. The threat to the rule of law that requires well-trained police at the national and international levels especially in postconflict areas like Afghanistan.

INTERPOL has launched its Global Security Initiative in order to enhance support for developing effective and growing programs in each of these seven areas. Our capacity to address these threats can grow not only with greater resources but also with a larger personal commitment to the kinds of policies that reflect the direction that you and President Obama have chosen in the name of national security.

INTERPOL is a global international police organization with 187 member countries. Our Constitution prevents us from getting involved in matters of a political, religious, military or racial nature. We have one goal and one goal only: to help law enforcement worldwide keep their citizens and visitors to their country safe from terronsm and other forms of serious international crime.

Our successes over the last several years have been nothing short of extraordinary. More terrorists and dangerous international criminals have been identified, located and arrested than ever before. The security of more borders has been enhanced. More police information has been exchanged globally. More international pedophiles have been caught. More transnational crime groups have been exposed.

Against the backdrop of this success, it remains the case that neither Heads of State nor Ministers of Foreign Affairs, Justice and Interior have made the kind of investment in INTERPOL worldwide that can help to keep their citizens safe at home and abroad. They should and you can be a leader among them.

It is my strong belief that in your capacity as U.S. Secretary of State, you can show the world that by making INTERPOL an integral part of the U.S.'s new "smart power" strategy, all of the world's citizens will be safer than they otherwise would be. I would welcome any opportunity to travel to Washington or anywhere in the world to meet with you to offer recommendations for solving the problems outlined above and to discuss the range of resources required to meet these challenges.



Failed to discuss a concern I have about Iraq. The security we established has enabled significant political progress, particularly the provincial elections in January, which fundamentally strengthens and changes how the Iraq people relate to their government and, in general, the maturation of the political process. Certainly watching the Council of Representatives check some of Maliki's grab for increased power is a welcome development.

Yet, there are significant challenges ahead: the territorial dispute between the Sunni Arabs and Kurds, resolution of Kirkuk, oil revenue sharing, a final reconciliation with the Sunnis and Maliki's strongman tendencies. This is work where USG can play a vital role in assisting the GOI and the key constituencies to work toward common goals for the betterment of Iraq. And they are achievable; how far the Iraqis have come since 2006 is nothing short of remarkable. It could not have been done without our help.

I am concerned that the GOI and other key Iraq influencers believe the USG is no longer committed to their long term development and stability (I also pick it up from Sunni Arab leaders in the region). Believe they draw this conclusion, primarily from POTUS remarks about Iraq which carry far more emphasis on ending the war than a long term strategic partnership with Iraq. Notwithstanding, how we entered the Iraq war and the three years of a failed strategy, which helped to divide our nation, there is a real strategic opportunity in front of us, that involves our support for a democratic, stable Iraq that is aligned with the US. The Strategic Framework Agreement(which both govts signed) pretty much lays this out and is a far more significant document than the Status of Forces, which, by necessity, is narrow in scope. The SFA is about a long term relationship which goes well beyond our current military one and appropriately involves a political, diplomatic, economic and cultural relationship. This agreement should be followed up with substantive implementation by both governments, but it won't happen unless we push it. Its a fact, the Iraqis want to be our partner but it is also true they have choices if that doesn't materialize, and it is this reality which concerns thoughtful leaders in and outside of Iraq. The Iranians understand this and are threatened by a US/Iraq partnership which helps to realize the democratic and human rights aspirations of the Iraq people.

One of the failings of incoming administrations is their inability to accept, at times, the success of their predecessors as they are so preoccupied with the failures. The Bush team failed to accept Bosnia and Kosovo for what they were: foreign policy successes, by the Clinton team, that stabilized southern Europe after 4 debilitating wars in the region. Preoccupied with "nation building" as a failed Clinton strategy and their desire to do the minimum to avoid dependency of the host nation on USG, it lead the Bush team to a grossly under resourced Afghanistan that we are just beginning to address after 8 years and a similar mismatch in Iraq which came dangerously close to strategic failure.

Am afraid the Obama team is doing the same in Iraq as it fails to come to grip with the success of Iraq, due largely to Bush's "surge" decision, and is somewhat paralyzed by the previous investment in an opposing strategy. As such, we are failing to forge a strong relationship with our Iraqis partners, to help them to move through their challenges and to continue to stand with them as a strategic partner. They are the only Arab Muslim state which genuinely elects its leaders. This is a dagger to the heart of the extremists in the region and it offers so much hope and potential for so many in the autocratic and, in some cases, repressed regimes.

Dear Madame Secretary:

As you may know, General Electric has a longstanding and broad relationship with India. We continue to expand that relationship in a number of areas, including renewable energy, rural healthcare, and defense. As you embark on your upcoming trip, I wanted to bring to your attention two particularly significant initiatives that would enhance U.S.-India relations, help India address the challenge of controlling greenhouse gas emissions, and support thousands of U.S. jobs.

Civil Nuclear Agreement

The first initiative is full implementation of the U.S.-India civil nuclear agreement. We, like many others in the U.S. business community with strong interests in India, applaud your longstanding support for this historic agreement. Fully realized, the agreement has the potential to help India achieve energy security, reduce India's rapidly growing greenhouse gas emissions, and redefine the U.S.-India partnership.

As the sole remaining U.S.-owned supplier of large scale commercial nuclear reactors, GE is eager to see nuclear trade commence promptly, which we believe could pave the way for the export of up to six reactors over the next decade worth \$10-20 billion and the creation of thousands of U.S. jobs.

Three things currently stand in the way of such trade: (1) We continue to await the Indian Government's assignment of a site for GE's Advanced Boiling Water Reactor (ABWR) technology. Site assignments have already been made to French and Russian suppliers, but not to any U.S. supplier, notwithstanding the Indian Government's clear commitment in a Letter of Intent ("LOI") dated September 10, 2008 to designate two such sites. GE has a preference for the Mithivirdi site in Gujarat, which we have communicated to the Indian Government. (2) The Government of India must provide assurances under 10 CFR Part 810 to enable the U.S. Department of Energy to issue GE licenses for the export of U.S. technology to India. We understand that the two governments are now discussing such assurances. (3) India must adopt a nuclear liability law consistent with the International

Gorgier Decree for port

Atomic Energy Agency's Convention on Supplementary Compensation, again as contemplated by the LOI. While we have heard for months that such a law is being considered, we have seen no tangible sign that it is forthcoming.

It is our hope that significant progress can be made on all of these during your visit to India.

Rail Transportation

The second initiative is in the area of rail transportation. As you may know, India has one of the most extensive and heavily used rail systems in the world. With traffic growing at double-digit rates over the past five years, India clearly requires significant investment in its rail infrastructure, including the addition of new locomotives. Recognizing this need, Indian Railways last year sought tenders for a public-private partnership that would supply it with over 1000 locomotives.

GE worked for more than two years with Indian Railways on the project, even designing them a new locomotive and, together with its Indian partner BHEL, submitted a highly competitive bid this past February. GE was the only bidder for the project and was positioned to be selected until the former Rail Minister cancelled the tender just prior to the Indian elections.

Much like civil nuclear, I believe that U.S.-India cooperation in the area of rail transportation could be a significant accomplishment for the bilateral relationship. The GE proposal would have provided India with a flagship foreign investment, manufacturing locomotives that are among the cleanest, most powerful and most energy efficient in the world. A \$5 billion opportunity, it also would have supported thousands of U.S. jobs. GE now seeks to have the initial tender process reinstated and carried through to a contract award.

Your Department and other U.S. Government agencies have been tremendously helpful in advancing U.S. interests on both of these matters. I would greatly appreciate it if you could give your personal attention to reinforcing the importance of both of these initiatives with the Indian Government during your visit.





Subject: Jack passes HRC greetings from Babacan

Among his bilateral meetings today at the OECD ministerial, Jack met with Turkish FM Ali Babacan who made a very explicit request that Jack send to Secretary Clinton Babacan's expressions of concern about her recent mishap and all the best wishes for a rapid recovery. I'm sure that this has become a near constant refrain, but Jack asked that I pass it along, as well as a note that Jack and Babacan talked in further detail about how Turkey and the US might be able to work together in assistance programs in Afghanistan.

Jack also met today with Korean PM Han, who is chairing the OECD ministerial, and Chinese Vice Minister Yi – and had, as I mentioned this morning – a chance to coordinate statements with Ron Kirk. Tomorrow Jack will meet with Japanese State Secretary Ito and Russian Minister for Economic Development Nabiullina, as well as a Canadian focused on Afghanistan. Jack said the Germans were ready to conclude that the economic crisis is over and it's time to turn the corner and shift focus to fiscal policy, however he spoke early to stress that we need to continue to manage carefully and not shift gears prematurely. Subsequent interventions tended to favor that position. Jack's other mission was to try to curb OECD's creeping efforts to broaden their jurisdiction; he thought he made some headway.

(The one question to which I do not have a good answer is exactly what Kirk intends to say. Still working on that.)



On June 9, Shangri-la Entertainment applied for a license from OFAC (Office of Foreign Assets Control, U.S. Department of the Treasury) under 31 CFR § 515.564(b), for a group of film professionals to travel to Havana, Cuba to conduct professional research for a docu-drama film (currently titled "Miramar"), that the company is preparing to make.

2. Stephen Rivers, representing Shangri-la, has been communicating with OFAC for several weeks regarding this license application, by phone and fax. (He also tried a number of times, via phone and fax, to reach Bisa Williams, director of the Office of Cuban Affairs at the State Department, but never heard back from her or anyone else in her office.)

of OFAC informed Stephen Rivers in a phone conversation that the State 3. Today (Thursday, June 16), Department had reviewed the license application and advised OFAC that the application was inconsistent with the Administration's policy towards Cuba. She said OFAC would be willing the license only one person to go to Cuba to conduct the research.

4. Stephen Rivers replied, on the phone call and in a follow-up fax, that this decision is inconsistent with the previous licensing practice by OFAC on licenses issued to him on another film project, which licenses allowed several persons, not just one, to travel to Cuba to conduct the research. He explained that this one vs. several issue had been previously discussed and decided by OFAC in favor of licensing several people to travel under a license for professional film research. (He further explained, as he had in a phone call with on Tuesday, that filmmaking is a collaborative process that requires the participation of many people, and sending only one person to conduct the research is wholly insufficient.)

5. Shangri-la is requesting that OFAC and State simply follow their previous precedent under very similar (if not identical) circumstances and issue the applied for license by mid-day on Friday, June 17. (That is the deadline for reserving the flight to Havana, which is scheduled for June 29; we need to have the license in hand to reserve the plane, and if we cannot reserve the plane by the end of the afternoon tomorrow it will be impossible to do so.)

6. If the concern of OFAC and State is the number of people who would travel under the license (13 were listed in the application), then we would be willing to reduce the number of travelers to a mutually agreed-upon number that would fulfill the professional research purposes of the trip while reassuring OFAC and State that only those who absolutely needed to travel will do so.

SUBJECT: Summary of Initiatives in Africa

In preparation for the Secretary's upcoming trip to Africa, please find the attached summary of various initiatives for your review. The list of initiatives provides an overview of existing and new collaborative efforts being forged by the public, private, and civil sectors throughout Africa and focused on the following six countries: Angola, Democratic Republic of Congo, Kenya, Liberia, Nigeria, and South Africa.

This summary is compiled from the information found in our Clearinghouse database, gathered from a variety of private sector organizations of which our office has close ties, and collected during recent meetings. For example, we recently met with the United Nations (UN) to discuss a proposal for the establishment of a Regional Centre for Partnerships in Africa - a joint initiative of the African Union, the UN Office for Partnerships to promote multi-stakeholder partnerships and serve as a Centre of Excellence for training within the Region which could be an important initiative to support.

In looking at the various initiatives, a few key themes are apparent:

- The private sector is engaged in many initiatives supporting economic growth, mainly focused on providing access to finance, entry into new markets, and business training for the economically disadvantaged.
- The wide array of organizations active and the richness of activities throughout Africa demonstrate a need to convene a large group of people when visiting each country.

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 Health is a major issue affecting many communities in Africa and various private sector initiatives are helping to address basic living standards, such as access to clean water and sanitation, along with fighting the devastating effects of diseases, such as HIV/AIDS.

African Diaspora Marketplace: In recognition of the important but largely untapped potential that diaspora communities can play in the economic growth and development of their countries of origin, USAID and Western Union (WU) have partnered to launch the African Diaspora Marketplace (ADM), a \$1.4 million business competition open to U.S.-based African diaspora members. Between 10 – 20 winners will receive up to \$100,000 in matching grants to further their business proposals for sustainable, commercially-oriented start-up and established businesses that will boost economic opportunities and employment in sub-Saharan Africa. To date, the competition, which was launched on June 2, has already received nearly 400 applications and lots of press both in the US and in Africa. In addition to providing grants, USAID will also provide credit and/or technical assistance opportunities through existing programs in Africa. The competition closes on July 30, 2009.

Frontier 100: The Initiative for Global Development (IGD), an alliance of business leaders that champions effective solutions to global poverty, is launching Frontier 100 in collaboration with Dalberg Global Development Advisors, a strategic consulting firm advising senior management on the challenges of business and development. Launched in May 2009, Frontier 100 is a network of the most successful CEOs operating in frontier markets with leading CEOs from the United States and Europe. The program has two primary components: first, it is a forum for relationship building and knowledge sharing about effective business models in poverty reduction among other issues; second, it is a vehicle for the CEOs to pursue targeted initiatives in areas such as access to finance, workforce development, entry into markets, and advocacy to improve investor perceptions.

Moving The World: In December 2002, TNT and the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) launched a ground-breaking, multi-million dollar partnership to help fight global hunger. TNT is committed to sharing its highly qualified staff, skills and resources in transportation and logistics to generate cash and in-kind donations. The partnership with TNT focuses on the following 5 initiatives consisting of subprojects on which a joint TNT-WFP team works closely in planning, development and planning: emergency response, joint logistics supply chain, private sector fundraising, school feeding support, and transparency & accountability.

Books for Africa: This NGO that collects donated text, library and reference books and ships them to Africa has partnered with the **UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR)** to provide books to refugee camps on the continent. Under a pilot project, 25,000 books were shipped to Dukwe refugee camp in Botswana. Books for Africa is now seeking to arrange a shipment of 400,000 books to camps in Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania and Uganda.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative: This initiative has become the largest public health initiative the world has ever known, utilizing the skills and talents of WHO, UNICEF, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), USAID, Rotary International, the UN Foundation (UNF) and hundreds of other NGOs. The Initiative has worked closely with more than 200 national governments, UN agencies, local NGOs, traditional and religious leaders, multilateral organizations, donor governments and foundations, vaccine manufacturers, and 20 million volunteers to ensure that every child under age five years of age is vaccinated. Roughly two billion children around the world have been immunized against polio, backed by an international investment of over \$4 billion. Innovative partnership efforts have included a financing mechanism whereby UNF, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, Rotary International and CDC will "buy down" the IDA loans from the World Bank provided to Pakistan, Nigeria and Afghanistan to procure oral polio vaccine, and effectively turn the loans to grants, as well as

successful outreach to new partners such as the African Union, the G8, the European Union, the Organization of the Islamic Conference, the Organization Internationale de la Francophonie, and the Commonwealth.

Roll Back Malaria Initiative: Launched in 1998 by WHO, UNICEF, UNDP, and the World Bank to halve the world's malaria burden by 2010, this initiative is growing rapidly, bringing together the private sector, foundations, academic institutions, civil society and governments. The program's prevention efforts include providing bed nets, researching new medicines, monitoring disease incidence, treating disease, and strengthening health services. Major private sector partners include Sumitomo Chemical and ExxonMobil. Sumitomo Chemical has developed a mosquito bed netting with Insecticide embedded directly into the fibers of the net material and has provided the technology at no cost to a local netting manufacturer in Tanzania, to establish a base for mass production. ExxonMobil provides essential education and training programs to needed areas and supports RBM efforts in Angola, Cameroon, Chad, Equatorial Guinea and Nigeria.

Coca-Cola Tackling AIDS in Africa: In June 2001, the joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) announced a partnership with the Coca-Cola Africa Foundation to help coordinate local support for AIDS programs in Africa through the Coca-Cola system and local bottling partners. Coca-Cola provides logistical support to HIV/AIDS activities managed by other actors and contributes to activities already identified as national priorities. Coca-Cola Africa Foundation provides marketing expertise to develop public awareness and information campaigns for UNAIDS and other partners across Africa.

Sustainable ICT Solutions for SMEs: The United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) and Microsoft joined forces in a strategic partnership to tackle the root causes of poverty by promoting innovative uses of Information and Communication Technologies (ICTs) that support entrepreneurship, help promote investment and create business opportunities, especially for SMEs in Africa. Areas of focus for the partnership are concentrating on improving IT skills and awareness through localized UNIDO portals, delivery of online SME business services and training tools, facilitating exchange of information online and developing local software applications. The partnership recognizes the importance of harnessing the use of ICT for promoting sustainable industrialization throughout the developing world as a means of improving livelihoods in developing countries.

Cisco Networking Academy Initiative in the Least Developed Countries (LDCs): Cisco Systems, Inc. and UNDP jointly launched the Least Developed Countries (LDCs) Initiative at the G-8 Summit in July 2000. The goal of the initiative is to help train students for jobs in the Internet economy. Since the announcement of the partnership, Cisco Systems, UNDP, the United Nations Volunteer program (UNV), and USAID have been working together to train students (and trainers) for the internet economy by establishing the Cisco Networking Academy Program in economic institutions. The partners established 200 academies in 40 LDCs with over 10,000 students enrolled and an outstanding achievement of 30% female participation, a total of 2,901 female graduates. The Networking Academy Program provides students with skills that enable them to design build and maintain computer networks.

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ANGOLA

Agricultural Development and Finance Program: Chevron and the Cooperative League of America are partners in this \$8.4M initiative, which will carry through September 2011. This program improves food security by giving farmers and agribusiness access to finance and related services, and by increasing the sector's reach from production through processing and marketing of bananas, coffee and potatoes. Partners deliver technical assistance to increase agricultural yields and improve productivity; provide technical assistance to improve processing practices; expand producers' access to market information systems; train producers on how to identify market opportunities, enter contracts and form business alliances; and foster productive and sustainable relationships between commercial banks and agricultural enterprises, including farmer organizations.

Angola Pro-Agro: In the wake of a 27-year civil war, USAID partnered with Chevron and World Vision to meet the subsistence needs of 210,000 vulnerable and food insecure households in five of the Planalto provinces of Angola. The Consortium for Development Relief in Angola encouraged sustainable food production and labor practices. Since launching in 2002, the partnership has helped hundreds of thousands of Angolans rebuild their lives by supporting activities to restore agricultural capacity (i.e. increase yields and link up profitably to markets created by oil industry operations) in the war-torn Planalto region of the country. This partnership also focuses on strengthening agricultural institutions, such as facilitating the start-up of Novo Banco, which in its first two years of operation, extended a remarkable \$20 million in loans to Angola's underserved micro and small entrepreneurs.

Rural Development Institute (RDI): RDI is a nonprofit organization of attorneys helping the rural poor in developing countries obtain legal rights to land. RDI attorneys are experts in land law and policy who work with governments of developing countries, foreign aid agencies, and other partners to reform land law and consult on land policy. RDI is working through Rede Terra in Angola to ensure that the land rights formalization process incorporates gender-sensitive procedures, that women participate in that process, and that their land rights are formally recognized. RDI recently released a report as part of the USAID funded project Strengthening Land Tenure and Property Rights in Angola that explores both the formal and customary laws that affect women's property rights. The report examines women's property rights in cases of widowhood, divorce, polygamy and girls' inheritance rights and provides recommendations for strengthening women's rights to land.

Junior Achievement (IA) Angola: JA Worldwide is the world's largest organization dedicated to educating students about workforce readiness, entrepreneurship and financial literacy through experiential, hands-on programs. As part of the \$1.655M initiative in which USAID partners with Alcatel-Lucent, Chevron, Coca Cola, and ExxonMobil (Esso Angola), JA in Angola has introduced three programs to Angolan youth: the Company Program, upper grade students organize, operate and liquidate an actual business enterprise with the support and guidance of their teachers and volunteer consultants from the local business community; the Personal Economics Program, middle grade students explore career options, and learn fundamental skills about managing money, budgeting, and the pros or cons of using and abusing credit; and the Job Shadow Program introduces students to future, possible careers through one-day, on-site orientation or through more extensive internships. Local businesses participate by supporting program operations through cash contributions, making staff available to teach and mentor young people; serving on the board of directors and sponsoring events.

Private Sector Alliance Against HIV-AIDS: Conceived by the National Institute of Fight Against HIV/AIDS (INLS), in a partnership with USAID and Odebrecht, this alliance provides opportunities for companies to develop HIV/AIDS programs and exchange experiences in HIV/AIDS prevention. The alliance is channeling private sector resources, energy and capabilities to reinforce Angolan efforts to deliver AIDS prevention and behavior change messages to employees, their families and communities; providing a forum for companies to share their HIV/AIDS related experiences and materials; and improving communication and feedback between the private sector and the INLS. USAID has been able to leverage in-kind support from the alliance's private sector partners to store and distribute USAID's 15 million condoms throughout the country to communities for free.

Winrock International: Winrock's "Angola Women in Extension and Education Project" is training women leaders to provide agriculture extension services to women farmers which will strengthen the capacity of women to actively participate in local and national development. By providing scholarships and training programs that women need to succeed and to enter new fields, Winrock emphasizes working in partnership with community leaders and male leaders to understand local development through a gender framework. The following outcomes are expected of program activities: expanded maize production in tons/ha among female farmers (Angola, Namibia); higher protein intakes of households, especially of children, in rural areas (Angola, Namibia, South Africa); expanded consumption of wheat flour products in Angola; greater capacity of agricultural industries to supply the needs of farmers and consumers in all three countries; local markets opened for U.S.-produced wheat flour; greater implementation of gender-sensitive agricultural projects at the provincial level in the Republic of South Africa; decreased time required to perform basic household chores, such as hauling water or firewood.

The Chevron Foundation: Chevron launched the Angola Partnership Initiative in 2002 with the goals to promote peace and stability and improve health and education. It also seeks to help build the capacity of Angolan nongovernmental organizations and government development agencies and to help reduce poverty through agribusiness and the development of micro, small and medium-size enterprises. Chevron's initial \$25 million investment was matched by \$31 million from partnerships from national and multilateral development organizations. They have invested in community and economic development projects in 15 of Angola's 18 provinces. In 2008, they joined partners in committing more than \$10 million dollars in aid.

Search for Common Ground (SFCG) - Angola: SFCG established an office in Angola in 1996 to support the peace and reconciliation process in the post-Lusaka phase. During eleven years of its operation, SFCG-Angola has carried out activities with media, civil society, community members and the Angolan government that include civil society empowerment, peaceful elections education, and reintegration of former combatants. With offices in Luanda and Cabinda, a full-time radio production studio, and a community outreach toolbox that includes conflict resolution training, community organizing, facilitation, and youth empowerment, SFCG seeks to transform Angolan society into a culture of coexistence, security, social justice and popular participation. An innovative music project, "Angola Solta a Tua Voz" (Angola Lift Up Your Voice), involved the production of a new CD in Angola that features the most popular musicians from across Angola. Each song is a duet between musicians who normally would not perform together – merging generations and blending different styles of music from around the country – symbolically marking the beginning of a new era in Angola characterized by inclusion, participation, and unity.

Strengthening Women's Contribution to Conflict Prevention and Resolution: The aim of this project, led by UNIFEM and supported by the UN Foundation, is to protect and assist women affected by conflict and to support their role in conflict prevention, resolution and post-conflict peace-building in Colombia, Somalia, Angola, Melanesia and Sierra Leone. The three focus areas are the development of gender sensitive tools for early warning and conflict prevention; strengthening humanitarian protection and assistance for women affected by conflict; and supporting the capacity-building of women and their participation in peace negotiations.

Prospective Partnerships

Proposed US-Angola Dialogue: Foreign Minister Dos Anjos has designated Angolan Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MIREX) Vice Minister Exalgisa Gamboa as the lead for the Angolan side of a proposed US-Angola high-level dialogue. The Foreign Minister broached the idea with Secretary Clinton in their meeting in May, the subject of further discussion in June between A/S Carson and the Angolan Ambassador. Most recently, MIREX Americas Desk Deputy Director met with the DCM in Luanda to offer additional detail on the proposal. Post strongly supports development of the mechanism. MIREX has suggested that the high-level dialogue could be a useful tool for fasttracking military-to-military cooperation, creating a PEPFAR framework, and establishing a Peace Corps presence.

English language training: Many Angolan government officials have informed the Ambassador that English language training is a priority need for Angola's economic and social development. Post has signaled that 75-100 Peace Corps volunteers teaching English at secondary schools in Angola's provincial capitals and other major cities could help address this pressing need.

Ex-Im 101 Seminar: On June 17, Post, in conjunction with the U.S. Angola Chamber of Commerce, organized a half-day "Ex-Im 101" seminar for Angolan businesses wishing to access ExIm's new \$120M credit facility. More than 200 businesses and Angolan government officials attended the event, led by a joint delegation of Exim and OPIC officials, who visited the country at that time. Entrepreneurs represented all sectors with concentrated interest in agriculture and construction. The US officials' visit and the seminar received heavy print, radio and television coverage.

DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO

Collaboration for HIV/AIDS Prevention and Treatment in Matadi: USAID's GDA, Family Health International and Seaboard Corporation along with its local non-governmental organization CCLD, partnered to develop a comprehensive HIV/AIDS prevention and treatment program in Matadi, a sea port town in the DRC. The partnership dedicated just under \$1M in resources to the CCLD by supplying rapid tests and other equipment, initiating procurement of lab equipment and pharmaceuticals, and training 16 staff members in syndromic management. The partnership concluded its work in September 2008.

Extractive Industries Alliance: This alliance among USAID, Anvil Mining, TFK, First Quantum Minerals and Angol Gold Ashanti promotes sustainable and equitable economic recovery and improved governance in Katanga and the DRC, through: (1) establishing a regional development fund to efficiently and effectively channel social development needs of local populations, with the ultimate goal of self-sustainability; (2) implementing sustainable and participatory community development projects based on identified needs of the community, linked with improved governance at local, territorial and provincial levels; (3) supporting improved governance, tax and royalty transparency and society responsible investment in the mining sector in the DRC. Partners have built six classrooms; trained 350 men and women in conflict resolution; reached more than 1,000 people from at-risk groups through conflict mitigation activities; strengthened more than 50 non-governmental constituency groups engaging sub-national governments, all of which has directly benefited 1,275 rural households. Resources dedicated to the effort total \$25M.

National HIV/AIDS Hotline: In partnership with major cell phone companies VODACOM, ZAIN and TIGO, the Kinshasa School of Public Health has increased information available on HIV transmission and the consequences of AIDS. The companies will provide hardware, free cell phone access and small scale publicity for a proposed 24/7 service, and make available at least ten phone lines for the HIV/AIDS national information hotline. They also will provide mechanical recording of all incoming calls to identify usage, peak hours, unanswered phone calls, location of caller and other valuable information that will be used for monitoring and evaluation of quality of response and care. The companies have committed to a nationwide publicity campaign for the hotline to increase access to the service, which will be phased in to avoid creating a larger demand than the system is able to handle. The partnership will operate with total resources of \$1.7M.

Central Africa Regional Program for the Environment (CARPE): CARPE is a long term initiative by USAID supporting the activities of the Congo Basin Forest Partnership which consists of 41 members including governments, intergovernmental organizations, international environmental associates, and businesses. The partnership supports a network of national parks, protected areas, and forestry concessions, and assists communities that depend upon the conservation of forest and wildlife resources. The partnership has advocated for improved environmental policies, and was responsible for creating a clause in the Congolese forestry code that allows communities to create "community forests," with rights to collectively manage land and associated wildlife and forests, so as to provide incentives for the community to invest in forestry preservation. As a result of these and other projects currently underway as part of the CARPE program, 45,000,000 hectares of terrestrial and marine habitats of biological significance are under improved management reducing the rate of biodiversity loss.

Dikembe Mutombo Foundation: This Foundation is dedicated to improving the health, education and quality of life for the people of the DRC and strives to accomplish this goal through an emphasis on primary health care and disease prevention, the promotion of health policy, health research and increased access to health care education for the people of the Congo. One of the foundation's major projects is the Biamba Marie Mutombo Hospital and Research Center in Kinshasa opened in July 2007.

Women for Women International: This organization mobilizes women to change their lives through a holistic approach that addresses the unique needs of women in conflict and post-conflict environments. Through its work in the DRC, the majority of women affected report that their personal and family health improved, their economic situation advanced, confidence in their abilities increased, knowledge of their rights deepened, and they became more active in their community and in family decision making.

Tenke Fungurume Mining (TFM): TFM is a DRC-based mining concession project of Canadian firm Lundin Mining Corporation, which acquired Tenke Mining Corp in 2007. On May 7, the U.S. Ambassador visited TFM's site 100 miles northwest of Lubumbashi in Katanga province. TFM has invested approximately \$1.75B in the first phase of its development to bring copper and cobalt production online. TFM is funding several social responsibility programs, which target the local community of approximately 61,000 inhabitants. TFM reported expenditures of \$9M for community development (schools, clinics, clean water wells, markets) and \$2M for malaria control programs, and \$12M to resettle 350 households in three villages too close to mining operations. TFM is also working with PACT Congo, an NGO, to provide microcredit to small business entrepreneurs engaged in brick and fence construction and other activities.

KENYA

Partnership for an HIV Free Generation: In a partnership coordinated by PEPFAR, leaders from the private sector have joined forces with the public sector and non-governmental organizations to revolutionize HIV prevention for youth by engaging the partners' core competencies to help drive down rates of HIV infection among youth by 50% over the next five years. The partnership brings together an unprecedented coalition to address HIV prevention for youth, including Accenture Development Partners, The Africa Broadcast Media Partnership Against HIV/AIDS, APCO Worldwide, The Coca-Cola Africa Foundation, The Draper Richards Foundation, Girl Scouts of the USA/Girl Guides of Kenya, Grassroot Soccer, The Global Business Coalition on HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria, Hasbro, Intel, Junior Achievement, AmericaShare/Micato Safaris, Microsoft, Mitchell Silberberg & Knupp LLP, The MTV Staying Alive Foundation, Nike Foundation, Rotarians for Fighting AIDS, TechnoServe, and Warner Bros. Initially in Kenya, this alliance combines PEPFAR's technical and programmatic capacity with the expertise of the private sector in messaging, branding, new technologies, and real-time market research to promote and maintain behavior change. A key piece of HIV Free, "Pamoja Mtaani" ("Together in the Hood"), is an open world, multi-player PC video game created by Warner Bros. Interactive Entertainment in collaboration with technical experts within PEPFAR. The game can be played at select youth venues in Nairobi, which are an integral component of this new initiative to revolutionize HIV prevention. The game engages youth through its fun interaction while helping to influence HIV risk perceptions, attitudes and behaviors among young.

Mbita Ice Plant: This initiative seeks to increase rural household incomes by strengthening the value chain and expanding capacity of small scale fisher folk to participate more effectively in the fish market. The partners, including Mbita Ice Plant Limited, Osienala, and W.E. Tilley, promote production and distribution of ice to the fisher folk along Lake Victoria in the Suba District; increase access to and utilization of ice input for preserving the quality of fish and reducing the rate of fish rejection; and increasing the fisher folks' bargaining power to obtain better market prices for their catch. The fishing project will reach 384,000 people, including 65,000 at the production level (primarily men) and 319,000 in the distribution and retail level (primarily women). The Mbita ice project is estimated to increase real wages of fisher-folk by 20%-30%.

International Small Group Tree Planting Program: The Clean Air Action Corporation, Dow Chemical Company Foundation, and Institute for Environmental Innovation have joined efforts and resources exceeding \$3.5 million to empower small groups of subsistence farmers in combating the devastating effects of deforestation, drought, disease and famine. Small Groups accomplish their stated goals by planting trees, adopting new approaches to identified problems, and implementing sustainable agriculture methods. The initiative is providing immediate benefits through the promotion of sustainable development approaches; over the longerterm, the initiative may generate revenue for the Small Groups through the sale of Greenhouse Gas credits.

Child and Familiy Wellness Shops: USAID and the HealthStore Foundation have partnered with ExxonMobil, IFC, Acumen Fund, and the Oswald Family Foundation to help Kenyan entrepreneurs open their own franchise pharmacy chains. These Child and Family Wellness (CFW) shops, which are either drug shops or medical clinics, are owned and operated by health workers trained to diagnose conditions and prescribe the appropriate medications. A centralized procurement operation drives down the costs, while maintaining the quality of pharmaceutical drugs. To date, more than 60 CFW shops provide high-quality essential drug treatments and have

provided over 1 million treatments since the inception. The alliance plans to expand beyond Kenya's borders to open an additional 225 CFW Shops.

Carolina for Kibera's Binti Pomoja: Carolina for Kibera (CFK) is an international, nongovernmental organization based in the Kibera. Is run by Kenyans and advised by American and Kenyan volunteers. CFK's primary mission is to promote youth leadership and ethnic and gender cooperation in Kibera through sports, young women's empowerment, and community development while also focusing on improving basic healthcare, sanitation, and education in Kibera. The Binti Pamoja (Daughters United) Center is a reproductive health and . women's rights center for 11 to 18 year-old girls in Kibera. The Center has helped girls explore the issues that are prevalent in their daily lives; violence against women, rape, prostitution, HIV/AIDS, female genital mutilation, poverty, sexual abuse, unequal access to education, lack of reproductive health care and information, and demanding domestic responsibilities by using photography, drama, writing, and group discussion to investigate such issues in depth. A new group of girls is recruited into the Center each year, and after two years they graduate take on leadership roles as alumni at the Center and start new girls groups in the community.

The Green Belt Movement (GBM): GBM Kenya was established in 1977 by Prof. Wangari Maathai with the vision to create a society of people who consciously work for continued improvement of their environment and a greener, cleaner Kenya. Tree planting has been the focal point of GBM Kenya by working mainly across nine districts nationwide and planting more than 40 million trees in Africa. Achieved results include soil erosion reduced in critical watersheds, thousands of acres of biodiversity-rich indigenous forest restored and protected, and hundreds of thousands of women and their families standing up for their rights and those of their communities to live healthier, more productive lives. GBM has expanded its programs to include indigenous tree planting, civic education, advocacy, food security, greenbelt eco-safaris, and "women and change." These projects have enabled GBM Kenya to succeed in promoting environmental consciousness, volunteerism, conservation of local biodiversity, self-empowerment, community development, and accountability.

Jamii Bora: Upon retirement from a career advocating for the poor and homeless in Kenya, Swedish founder Ingrid Munro created Jamil Bora with the conviction that "any family, however poor, miserable, and hopeless, is capable of getting themselves out of poverty." Beginning with 50 women, she developed a microfinance model and now works via various funds to support her mainly homeless (or formerly homeless) clients in skill building while also providing business development training, housing, health care, etc. A once-small savings matching program has grown into a nationwide microfinance institution with ambitious growth and impact plans. Their holistic approach to poverty alleviation includes alcohol rehabilitation, orphan outreach, and street beggar transition programs.

Alliance for a Green Revolution in Africa (AGRA): AGRA is working to break the cycles of hunger and poverty in Africa through a set of initiatives that will provide small-scale farmers with the tools and opportunities they need to boost their productivity, increase their incomes, and build better lives. In addition to working in areas to address key aspects of a functional, sustainable food production system in Africa, AGRA promotes opportunities to strengthen mixed crop-livestock systems throughout all of its areas of work.

<u>Kickstart</u>: Nick Moon and Martin Fisher founded **ApproTEC** (now **KickStart**) in 1991 to promote sustainable economic growth and employment by offering people technology to run profitable small-scale enterprises. Working in developing countries in Africa, mainly in Kenya, **KickStart** introduced low-cost, human-powered irrigation pumps that enable farmers to grow more crops and sell produce in the dry season. Since its inception, the organization has helped 77,000 families in Africa to create profitable businesses, generating \$85 million per year in new profits and wages. These revenues are equivalent to 0.6 percent and 0.25 percent of the Gross Domestic Product of Kenya and Tanzania, respectively.

Mothers to Mothers: While pediatric AIDS has virtually been eliminated in the developed world, in Sub-Saharan Africa, hundreds of thousands of babies are needlessly infected with HIV each year. To confront this tragedy, long-time friends Mitch Besser, a doctor and medical researcher, and Gene Falk, a media executive and AIDS activist, developed mothers2mothers. A grass-roots program for under-resourced health care systems, mothers2mothers trains and employs new mothers with HIV to provide education and support to their peers, empowering them to access lifesaving treatment for their babies and themselves. Currently operating in 462 locations in seven countries, (with 50 sites in Kenya) by 2011, mothers2mothers aims to support over 3.6 million women and children in 11 nations.

Nike Foundation & Novo Foundation: In September 2008, Maria Eitel (Nike) and Peter & Jennifer Buffet (NoVo) announced a partnership of \$45 million over three years for projects related to "the Girl Effect" - the ability of adolescent girls in developing countries to bring unprecedented social and economic change to their families, communities and countries. Liberia & Kenya are two of the project sites. In addition, the Nike Foundation, with the support and collaboration of the NoVo Foundation, has made grants to programs directed at men and boys. These investments include \$1 million to PATH in Kenya. The program is designed to test the effectiveness of merit badges for Scouts to reward them for gender equitable behavior. Men and boys are central to defining and shaping the life experiences of girls. The Nike Foundation's work has been building the case for international investment in girls through its a unique portfolio that funds new approaches, creates funding pipelines, nurtures models for scale and replication, makes girls a priority of institutions and proves the girl effect.

Open Society Institute: The Open Society Initiative for East Africa (OSIEA) promotes public participation in democratic governance, the rule of law, and respect for human rights by awarding grants, developing programs, and bringing together diverse civil society leaders and groups. OSIEA plays an active role in encouraging open, informed dialogue about issues of public importance in East Africa. Launched in 2005 and based in Nairobi, the OSIEA team supports work in Kenya, Tanzania, and Uganda as well as regional organizations whose mandate encompasses East Africa. In 2007, OSIEA's grant-giving budget was \$3 million, and grants focused on four key areas of activity: governance and accountability, justice and human rights, media and access to information, and regional initiatives.

Women's Institute for Secondary Education and Research (WISER): Truman Scholar Andy Cunningham founded the first all-girls secondary boarding school in Muhuru Bay, Kenya. In doing so, he completed an effort he began as a Duke University student, receiving financial and in-kind support from Johnson & Johnson, Goldman Sachs, and the Robertson Foundation. WISER also houses a research center dedicated to expanding the social and economic capital of women in the southern Lake Victoria region. WISER alleviates poverty by introducing new sustainable green technologies for both the school and surrounding community, including: wind

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and solar energy, potable water pumped from Lake Victoria, and computer and Internet access, which enables the adolescent girls to remain at school and community members to access green collar jobs and training as part of WISER's infrastructure and maintenance programs.

LIBERIA

Liberia has received crucial contributions from a small but growing group of philanthropic organizations and individuals who have supported Liberia's reconstruction and development since the end of the country's 14-year civil conflict in 2003. In efforts to strengthen and expand the already transformative impact of foundations in Liberia, the Government has established a Philanthropy Secretariat unit within the Office of the President to assist and coordinate the work of foundations in Liberia. It is the first country in the world to create an office of this type, funded through generous support from the **NoVo Foundation**, **Humanity United**, and the **Daphne Foundation** and launched in April 2009. An important component of the Philanthropy Secretariat's mission is to serve as a resource for those seeking to support Liberia. As part of its outreach efforts, the Government of Liberia also convenes an annual Liberia Foundations Meeting in New York city chaired by President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf.

Humanity United (HU): HU has developed a series of ambitious initiatives to strengthen civil society and independent media. HU's flagship effort with TrustAfrica provides grants and capacity training to a cohort of leading civil society groups such as local radio stations. HU's grant-making in Liberia relies heavily on key contacts in the Liberian Government, private donor community and Liberian civil society to provide a composite picture of the accomplishments and challenges on the ground. HU focuses on areas of clear and compelling need – structural or catalytic – and directs funding toward issues (rule of law, voice and transparency) where results have been slow to materialize. The following activities have been funded in Liberia: Carter Center-Liberia Program, 1 million USD over 2 years to expand rural access to justice efforts; Liberia Law Fellows Program, 164,000 USD over 18 months to support Ministry of Justice fellows (see Scott Family Foundation entry below); Liberia Senior Executive Service (SES), 1 million USD over 3 years to recruit and train senior civil servants; Star Radio, 130,000 USD over 1 year to support the oldest independent radio station in Liberia; TrustAfrica Liberia Partnership, 2 million USD over 2 years to strengthen top Liberian civil society groups engaged in governance monitoring, community empowerment and independent media; and the Women Leaders Intercultural Forum, 250,000 USD over 18 months to organize an International Colloquium on Women's Leadership, Empowerment, International Peace and Security in Liberia.

The McCall MacBain Foundation (MMF): The MMF has chosen Liberia as its first and only developing country within Africa due to the urgency of ensuring the country's successful post-conflict recovery and MMF's confidence in the leadership of President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf. MMF has been supporting 10 programs in Liberia since June 2007 through focused one-to-five- year grants to local NGOs, international NGOs and the Government of Liberia. In total, MMF has committed approximately 10 million USD to Liberia; 5 million USD has been granted during the period between June 2007 and September 2008. Programs have focused on reducing maternal mortality, helping to secure Global Fund grants, supporting Right to Play, funding 21 buses for a city-wide bus system managed by the Monrovia Transport Authority, reducing deforestation, and building legal capacity, among other things.

The NoVo Foundation: NoVo is currently funding two projects in Liberia through the International Rescue Committee: the 15 million USD LEGACY Initiative (within four/countries: Liberia, Cote D'Ivoire, Sierra Leone, and Guinea) is working to improve local educational opportunities, bolster national education policies, and focus international attention on education in fragile states; and the Women and Girls Rebuilding Nations (WGRN) project working with communities, governments, and women and girls to make sure they are able to participate in

the process of rebuilding their nations, free from discrimination and the threat of sexual and physical violence. WGRN is part of a 15 million USD, three-country initiative (Liberia, Cote D'Ivoire, and Sierra Leone). In September 2008, Maria Eitel (Nike) and Peter & Jennifer Buffet (NoVo) announced a partnership of \$45 million over three years for projects related to "the Girl Effect" - the ability of adolescent girls in developing countries to bring unprecedented social and economic change to their families, communities and countries.

The Scott Family Fellows Program: This program funds young professionals from the U.S. to serve as "special assistants" to senior Liberian government officials to address the severe capacity gap existing at the subministerial level after 14 years of civil war. Fellows provide technical and administrative support to Liberian Ministers to drive the implementation of the Poverty Reduction Strategy. Initially financed through a generous contribution from philanthropist Ed Scott, 15 total Fellows are now supported by Open Society Institute (OSI), Humanity United (HU), McCall MacBain Foundation (MMF) and the Nike Foundation.

The Daphne Foundation: To date, the foundation (President Abigail Disney) has provided assistance to the Liberian Education Trust and the Women in Peace Security Network – Africa (WIPSEN). WIPSEN is an NGO that promotes women's strategic participation and leadership in peace and security governance in Africa. Most recently, the Daphne Foundation has embarked on an effort to launch alternative energy enterprises in Liberia. The Foundation has released a Request for Proposal to assess how alternative energy, including solar, can be most effectively introduced in Liberia in a way that stimulates entrepreneurial opportunities for rural women. Up to 500,000 USD in grants and/or investments will be issued in 2008. In addition, the Foundation is seeking collaborators in this initiative and will soon be convening a meeting at the Pocantico Conference Center (date TBD) of subject experts, country leaders, NGOs, donors and other stakeholders to discuss the creation and support of alternative energy sources in Liberia. Finally, Ms. Disney is also executive producer of the recent documentary *Pray the Devil Back To Hell* (best documentary at the Tribeca Film Festival in New York); a movie depicting the remarkable story of how the women of Liberia, under the leadership of Leymah Gbowee, after 16 years of war, were able to help achieve a peace accord, disarmament and expedite the democratic transition in their country.

The Nike Foundation: The Nike Foundation is partnering with the Government of Liberia and the World Bank to smooth the path of approximately 1,500 adolescent girls in Greater Monrovia and Kakata to productive employment through skills training and business development services. The training offered to participants will focus on the provision of technical skills as well as the integration of life skills to address some of the crucial barriers to the development of adolescent girls in Liberia, such as wage employment, business development skills training and links to microfinance. The partnership also works to increase the capacity of the Ministry of Gender and Development to execute the project and improve the ability of the Ministry and other stakeholders to formulate and execute policy and programming for adolescent girls. The Nike Foundation is also supporting two Liberia fellows (as part of the Scott Family Fellows Program), serving as special assistants to the Minister of Gender and Development and the Minister of Youth and Sports.

RLI Companies: Robert L. Johnson, the owner of Black Entertainment Television (BET) in the U.S. and head of RLI Companies, chose to invest in Liberia because he was inspired by President Johnson Sirleaf when she spoke at former President Bill Clinton's Global Initiative (CGI) in New York in 2007. As part of a CGI Commitment, RLI Companies created a \$30 million Liberia Enterprise Development Fund, which is designed to make credit available to Liberian entrepreneurs working to build viable, job-creating businesses. The fund began with a \$3 million

donation from Mr. Johnson to provide the initial capital needed to open the fund, which is operated by CHF International. Short and medium-term impact will be created by direct inputs, including the provision of credit, select equity investments, and targeted technical assistance. Longer-term impact is expected to include functional commercial linkages between a significantly increased number of businesses and the Liberian financial sector, as well as the creation of a stable, commercially viable business sector. Estimates project that a \$30 million loan portfolio will meet the credit needs of more than 1,500 businesses.

Promoting Literacy in Poor Rural Areas: Alfalit International - Liberia, Inc. is a faith-based, nondemoninational, non-profit, grassroots organization, that provides literacy and numeracy education to Liberia's most needy citizens in communities that are the most difficult to reach. Established in 2006, Alfalit - Liberia has enrolled 7,177 students, most of whom are women, through a partnership with USAID by leveraging USG funding along with local community contributions (i.e. space for classes and volunteer teachers/facilitators) and private funding provided by Alfalit and its private donors for training workshops, generators, transportation, and all other program implementation costs. Alfallt also trains local community members to be teachers and facilitators in their own community, and works with community leaders to support and cultivate interest in its programs. Readings on malaria, tuberculosis, HIV/AIDS, first aid, nutrition, and even building solar cookers help introduce life skills and inspire students to want to read as a tool to readily improve their lives.

Investment in the Small Holder Rubber Sub-Sector: In 2007, Firestone and the Rubber Planter's Association of Liberia began working in partnership with the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture, USAID and the Ministry of Agriculture to create commercial opportunities that help increase smallholder incomes from rubber production and other agriculturally based activities. The program provides technical and financial assistance through the promotion of sustainable smallholder rubber production; appropriate cropping systems that increase productivity and conserve biodiversity; and long-term economics incentives. The partnership stalled due to lack of reliable data and other reasons, but was reactivated in 2009 with expanded representation and a USAID-funded consultant hired to draft a Rubber Sector Master Plan to be completed in October.

Locally Initiated Networks for Community Strengthening (LINCS) Program: CHF International's LINCS program is working to strengthen the prospects for peace and stability at the community and district levels in the northern Liberia. Program activities focus on enhancing local capacity to mitigate conflict and violence by addressing the root causes and consequences of conflicts, facilitating dispute resolution between ex-combatants and their "host" communities, and improving communication at all levels. In 2008, Goldman Sachs committed to work in partnership with CHF International to train 300 underserved Liberian women over five years in business and management in order to create a larger pool of potential loan recipients for the Liberian Enterprise **Development Company (LEDFC).**

Open Society Initiative for West Africa: OSIWA's Liberia program works with governmental and nongovernmental organizations to promote good governance, respect for human rights and accountability and transparency by expanding on former and current initiatives while identifying strategic interventions that will help the nation's postwar recovery efforts. OSIWA has supported projects and built partnerships in Liberia since the foundation's establishment in 2002, and the Liberia office was established in 2007 with priority focused on the following areas: promotion of human rights and good political and economic governance, support for information communication technologies and free media. Liberia is also one of the OSI International Women's Program's five priority countries in Africa with a commitment to developing Liberian women's leadership and strengthening their participation in post-conflict reconstruction and rehabilitation. The OSI Education Support Program, together with OSIWA, the World Bank and UNICEF, is contributing to the renewal of the education system in Liberia through a number of projects. The West African Civil Society Institute was established by the OSIWA to enhance the capacity of civil society in the region by bridging the institutional and operational gaps identified in civil society.

The Liberia Forestry Initiative: This program is a coalition of donors, multilateral institutions and NGOs dedicated to helping the government improve forestry management and increase the transparency of its revenue collection. The U.S. Department of State launched the initiative in early 2004, with shared involvement by the U.S. Forest Service, USAID, Treasury, Conversation International and the Environmental Law Institute; a number of multilateral organizations jointed the initiative in late 2004 and 2005.

West Africa Power Pool Alliance: USAID partnered with Electricite de France International and the international donor community supporting a \$45M investment to develop the region's electricity infrastructure, increase energy supply and enhance energy security. The project terminated 2007.

Simandou Alliance: USAID partnered with Conversation International and Rio Tinto valued at \$350,000 to help mitigate the impact of mining activities on biodiversity in the southeast of Ginea through support of local institutions and policy change. The project ended in 2007.

Prospective Partnerships

Palm oil is a tree crop with great potential; the oil can yield cooking oil, animal food and raw materials for the manufacture of cosmetics, detergents and pharmaceuticals. A number of state-owned palm oil plantations are available for rehabilitation.

Liberia's rubber sector provides 5.5% of its economic output, 85% of its exports and work for an estimated 50,000 Liberians. Roughly 40% of Liberia's rubber comes from small, Liberian-owned farms, with the remainder produced on large foreign-owned concessions. Revitalizing the rubber sector will take years and producers face challenges from theft, land disputes and access to finance. Foreign-owned concessions have been the first to invest in largescale replanting, but many concessions are just recently reverting to private management as the government seeks to renegotiate new terms on old concession agreements. The Liberian Government amended its concession agreement with Firestone in 2008 and that now serves as a model for other current concession negotiations.

The Government of Liberia requested expressions of interest from private sector firms interested in a concession for management and operation of the Port of Monrovia. The deadline for submissions was February 26th. The management contract is the centerpiece of a broad Port Sector Reform Program that will reorganize the National Port Authority and convert the port of Monrovia into a "landlord port" model.

NIGERIA

West Africa Seed Alliance: USAID has partnered with the Alliance for a Green Revolution (AGRA) in a five-year, \$61 million initiative to develop a commercial seed industry in West Africa. The West Africa Seed Alliance seeks to develop an industry that will provide small-scale farmers in Ghana, Mali, Nigeria, Burkina Faso, and Niger with affordable, timely, and reliable access to high quality seeds and planting material. Partners expect to establish a network of more than 800 agro-dealers in five focus countries, reaching more than 500,000 farmers.

Higher Education for Development: This project seeks to improve the employability of faculty and students from selected departments at the University of Lagos Business School. Program aspects include internships, curriculum development, and collaboration with the Nigerian private sector. Partners include Kansas State University, Microsft, British American Tobacco, Ocean Energy Nigeria Limited, and Zinon Technologies. The combined investment is \$2M, with \$500,000 in financial support from the private sector partners.

Casava Enterprise Development Program: In the Niger Delta, cassava production is not commercially oriented and farm management practices are poor, resulting in high production costs and low yields. USAID, the Shell Petroleum Development Corporation, Bayelsa State Government and the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture are working to change this with the Cassava Enterprise Development Program. This \$11.7 million, five year partnership seeks to develop and strengthen the entire cassava value chain so that farmers and entrepreneurs participate to generate greater incomes. The activity which is particularly designed to benefit women provides improved cassava varieties that resist cassava mosaic disease; develops sustainable cassava processing technologies and identify commercial markets for value-added products from cassava.

OLAM Nigeria Partnership: Nigeria is the largest net importer of rice on the African continent (roughly 3.1 million metric tons annually) and the second largest importer in the world. **USAID** and commodity trader Olam Nigeria LTD have partnered to expand the market for domestic rice consumption, a key factor in ensuring Nigeria's food security, by providing smallholder farmers with higher quality seeds, fertiziler, and formal training so that they can produce more, better rice. **Olam** supplies equipment and buys directly from farmers; local banks developed new credit schemes for farmers previously deemed too risky to finance; while **Olam** and **USAID** serve as guarantors for the loans opening up a world of financing options to farmers who wished to expand their productivity. To date, more than 8,000 farmers have gone through the **Olam-USAID** training program. Farmers have doubled their productivity and increased their net incomes by 230 percent thanks to better rice yields and higher prices. Even younger generations are becoming interested in farming again.

Action Health Incorporated: AHI is a non-profit organization dedicated to improving the health of Nigerian adolescents. Since 1989, AHI has worked with youths, community leaders, policy makers, parents, state and federal government officials to design and implement innovative and participatory projects in education, healthcare and youth development, providing models that have been adopted and expanded by government and other civil society organizations. With an annual budget of over US \$1,000,000, AHI's work is supported with funds from grants and contract awards from international organizations that include, the Ford Foundation, MacArthur Foundation, International Women's Health Coalition, Packard Foundation, WHO, UNICEF, UNFPA and Futures Group International, amongst others.

Fate Foundation: FATE's Executive Director, Osayi Alile, was previously vice president of Junior Achievement of Nigeria and was named a Young Global Leader in 2007. FATE began a pilot project in 2008 "Fate on wheels", to offer Lagos university students entrepreneurship training, a business plan competition, and microfinance opportunities in advance of graduation, as an intervention responding directly to Nigeria's persistent unemployment and underemployment trend. Their new goal is for FATE-assisted businesses to contribute 3% of GDP, so they are looking for innovative ways to realize this.

Kiwanja.net: Since 2003, kiwanja.net has been helping empower local, national and international non-profit organizations to make better use of information and communications technology in their work. Specializing in the application of mobile technology, it provides a wide range of ICT-related services drawing on over 22 years experience of its founder, Ken Banks. Non-profits in over 40 countries have so far benefited from a range of kiwanja initiatives, including FrontlineSMS and nGOmobile.

Rural Africa Water Development Project (RAWDP): RAWDP was founded in 2000 by Joachim Ezeji. Previously working with Shell Petroleum Development Company, Joachim has effectively piloted the affairs of RAWDP including its work with African Development Bank, the UN-Habitat, the World Bank and the Gender and Water Alliance amongst others. The project's mission is to collaborate with relevant local and international groups as well as other stakeholders to bring clean drinking water and improved sanitation to marginalized rural groups especially those living in the environmentally degraded oil producing communities in southeastern Nigeria. Programs are centered on clean water provision, sanitation improvement and hygiene promotion through Research, Networking and Advocacy, Action intervention and Capacity Building. 2008 budget was \$250,000 USD.

Search for Common Ground: The Station is a television drama series created and produced by Common Ground Productions in Lagos, Nigeria, aimed at providing peaceful alternatives to handling conflict and positive role models for Nigerians, especially youth. Developed and written by a team of young Nigerians, The Station addresses issues that have been identified as the main impediments to the country's development, including tribal violence, domestic abuse, corruption, unemployment and HIV/AIDS. Founded in 1982, Search for Common Ground works to transform the way the world deals with conflict by collaborative problem solving. They work with local partners to find culturally appropriate means to strengthen societies' capacity to deal with conflicts constructively: to understand the differences and act on the commonalities.

Benue Swine Improvement Project: In May 2008, the central Nigerian state of Benue began working with Iowa State University's Global Extension program for help with the Benue Swine Improvement Gov. of Benue was interested in working with ISU Extension because of the organization's reputation and as the leading university in research and education in the production of hogs, corn, soybeans and eggs. Funding for the ISU Extension team assistance and training is solely from the Benue State government. The program focuses enhancing the capacity of the Ministry of Agriculture along with training of Benue personnel to increase maize and soybean production, use appropriate mechanization, and bring new swine genetics and artificial insemination to Benue State.

Prospective Partnerships.

Food Security - USAID has set aside \$25M to work with Nigeria on the Global Food Security Response Program. USG is interested in focusing on agricultural productivity as a key engine for growth.

Oil and Gas major players are Chevron, Schlumberger, Halliburton, ExxonMobil, Shell and Total, each of which has a Managing Director in Nigeria.

The U.S. Embassy successfully facilitated Delta's direct routes from Atlanta to Lagos and New York's JFK to Lagos. Delta added 777 service in its Atlanta-Lagos route as part of the deal.

Standard Chartered Bank of Nigeria is headed by American citizen Chris Knight.

SOUTH AFRICA

Partnership to Strengthen Laboratory Systems: In a pioneering public-private partnership, PEPFAR and BD (Becton, Dickinson and Company) are supporting the improvement of overall laboratory systems and services in African countries severely affected by HIV/AIDS and tuberculosis. Through this five-year partnership, valued at up to \$18 million, PEPFAR and BD will work on the ground with national reference laboratories, Ministries of Health, and implementing partners to provide direct support to countries to assist with their efforts to strengthen laboratories. This collaboration has targeted Uganda, Mozambique and South Africa, with expansion plans for Côte d'Ivoire, Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania, and Malawi.

Grassroot Soccer: Founded by former professional soccer players and a practicing pediatrician, Grassroot Soccer (GRS) trains soccer stars, coaches, teachers, and peer educators in the world's most HIV-affected countries to deliver an interactive HIV prevention and life skills curriculum to youth (aged 10-18) – providing them with the knowledge, skills, and support to remain HIV-free. In addition to the funding received from The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, GRS has received funding from a number of committed individuals and prestigious foundations and corporations including, Draper Richards Foundation, Thrive Foundation, Byrne Foundation, Kellogg Foundation, DeBeers, Barclays Bank, DaimlerChrysler and Johnson & Johnson. As of June 2009, GSR has graduated more than 285,000 youth in 13 countries, with long-term follow-up data showing strong behavioral outcomes and marked changes in knowledge and attitudes, including HIV stigma. Through a partnership with PEPFAR's New Partner Initiative, GRS's flagship site in South Africa is in Cape Town, with the goal of educating more than 230,000 youth over a three-year period (2009-2011), using soccer as the universal language.

African Leadership Academy: ALA seeks to transform Africa by developing and supporting future generations of African leaders. Opened in September 2008, ALA brings together the most promising 16-19 year old leaders from all 54 African nations for an innovative two-year program designed to prepare each student for a lifetime of leadership on the continent. Students are selected to attend the Academy based on merit alone and complete an innovative curriculum with a unique focus on leadership, entrepreneurship, and African studies.

HIV/AIDS Awareness Project & Youth Development: HAPYD was established in 2000 to work with HIV-positive children who have lost one or both parents to AIDS. The organization provides families with referrals to counseling and welfare services, emergency food, and transportation costs to and from daycare, and is expanding its programs to include home-based care, income-generation projects and other activities. HAPYD works with Orphans, Vulnerable Children, Child-Headed Households and Parents in Soweto.

International Network of Women's Funds: Based in Cape Town, INWF brings together women's funds from Africa and around the world. This unique network brings funders in both the North and the South are organized democratically, and are organically linked to the feminist movement - from which almost all of them emerged. Currently the INWF has seventeen members committed to expanding the resources available to women's rights organizations around the world: including Urgent Action Fund for Africa (based in Kenya).

<u>MaAfrika Tikkun</u>: This non-profit organization's mission is to empower and transform previously disadvantaged South African communities by focusing on vulnerable children, their guardians and environment

achieved by investing in and delivering service excellence in the areas of education, economics, health and social services operating out of community centers. MaAfrika Tikkun uses a "bottoms-up" approach within each community that it operates working extensively with community-based organizations, leaders of the community and members of each community to identify areas of critical need.

Rural Women's Movement (RWM): The RWM is an independent non-profit rural women's land rights organization that seeks to eliminate poverty through programs designed to provide training on women's land and property rights, and enhance women's participation in local governance. RWM advocates for women's independent land and property rights and lobbies for public policy changes while also providing training on how to respond strategically to the AIDS pandemic. The organization helps orphaned children to deal with the loss of their parents, and strives to deepen children's commitment to pro-social values such as personal responsibility, helpfulness, respect for others and kindness - qualities we believe are essential to leading humane and productive lives in a democratic society.

The Leadership and Innovation Network for Collaboration Fellowship: LINC is a multi-year effort to help improve quality and quantity of care for the increasing numbers of orphaned and vulnerable children. In partnership with Convene Venture Philanthropy, the Synergos Institute, and the South African Department of Social Development, the program created a cross-sector leadership development plan to contribute to improving the quality and quantity of care for children in South Africa. LINC engages senior civil servants of key government departments, heads of the major civil society organizations active for children, directors of corporate responsibility in some of the country's largest companies, and leading academics, international donors, and community leaders. Midvaal Children's Leadership and Innovation Partnership is an innovative multi-sector local level partnership to develop leadership and care at scale for children in Midvaal, a small municipality south of Johannesburg.

The Community Development Foundation Western Cape: This organization set out to play a mediating and facilitating role by strengthening relationships and building partnerships within communities, with donors and other development players.

Ubuntu Education Fund: This organization's integrated services are composed of four programs: Empowerment; HIV Prevention Outreach; Clinical; and Care and Support. Tthe Ubuntu Model is a communitybased strategy that ensures ownership and sustainability of our educational initiatives. Programs engage in the continued struggle to make the free South Africa a prosperous South Africa for all. Ubuntu provides a continuum of support that follows each child until they themselves become leaders in their community. Initiatives generate a cycle of empowerment in the Port Elizabeth townships, emboldening vulnerable children and their families to lead their communities toward healthy futures.

WHEAT Trust: This organization is committed to grassroots women's empowerment for community development through education and training. WHEAT awards grants to individual women and women-led community based organizations (CBOs/CSOs) to ensure active participation of women in the development of their respective communities. One of the leading women's development funds in South Africa, based in Cape Town, Part of Synergos Grantmakers Leadership Coop.

David Gregory Moderator, "Meet the Press"

David Gregory was named moderator of NBC News' "Meet the Press" on December 7, 2008.

In addition to his "Meet the Press" responsibilities, Gregory is a regular contributor for "Today" and serves as a back-up anchor for the broadcast. He is also a regular contributor and analyst on msnbc, and lends his voice and reporting to all NBC News broadcasts including coverage of special events.

Gregory first joined NBC News in 1995. He served as White House Correspondent during the presidency of George W. Bush, reporting extensively on the 9-11 attacks as well as the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq. Gregory has also covered three presidential campaigns in 2000, 2004 and 2008.

Earning a reputation for being one of the toughest questioners of President Bush and his press secretaries, Washingtonian magazine named Gregory one of Washington's 50 best and most influential journalists, labeling him the "firebrand in the front row."

On the campaign trail in 2004, and during his years covering the White House Gregory was among the most heavily utilized network correspondent on television, according to the Tyndall Report.

Beyond politics, he has covered nearly every major story for the network: from the O.J. Simpson trials, to the trial of Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh, to the impeachment of President Clinton, and the death of Pope John Paul II.

Previously, Gregory worked as an NBC News correspondent based in Los Angeles and Chicago. He began his journalism career at the age of 18 as a summer reporter for KGUN-TV in Tucson, Arizona. Gregory also worked for NBC's flagship West Coast affiliate KCRA-TV in Sacramento.

A native of Los Angeles, he graduated from American University in Washington, D.C. with a bachelor's degree in International Studies. In 2005, Gregory was named the School of International Service's alumnus of the year and now sits on the Dean's advisory council.

Gregory lives in Washington, D.C. with his wife Beth Wilkinson, an attorney, and their three children.

Working with our European allies, China, and Russia, we have laid the groundwork for fruitful negotiations with Iran, with a view to ensuring that Iran can secure the benefits of peaceful nuclear energy while providing assurance to the international community that it no longer seeks to acquire a nuclear weapons capability.
- Continued to make significant progress toward responsibly ending the war
 in Iraq. We have moved forward withdrawal of military forces from Iraq
 and, per the Security Agreement, withdrew U.S. combat forces from Iraqi
 cities in June, transferring security responsibilities to the Iraqi Security
 Forces. Levels of violence have decreased and the security situation has

- We are working to ensure stability and security in Pakistan and Afghanistan through a new strategy for dealing with common threat of violent extremism in both Afghanistan and Pakistan. We have appointed a Special Representative for the two countries and established the US-Pakistan-Afghanistan Trilateral Dialogue, which has met twice already and is taking concrete steps in areas including border security and management, customs harmonization, agricultural cooperation, transit trade, and fighting violent extremism and has led to the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding as a first step towards finalizing a new transit trade treaty this year, to replace the 1965 agreement.
- In Pakistan the United States has committed a total of more than \$380 million since August 2008 to support humanitarian relief and long-term reconstruction efforts and already disbursed more than \$171 million

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through USAID. We have successfully supported the Tokyo Donors Conference and pledged \$1 billion towards Pakistan economic recovery and established the Text SWAT campaign, allowing Americans to donate via mobile phone to the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) efforts to assist thousands of affected people in northwestern Pakistan.

- In Afghanistan we have started to deploy the 17,000 more soldiers and 4,000 additional military trainers to help build up Afghan security forces and committed \$40 million to help fund Afghanistan's upcoming elections. In the coming month, we will be sending out the first of twenty district support teams to push out U.S. assistance and strengthen capacity at the community level.

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



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Background: Specific examples across Africa include:

- Mortality among children under five has fallen Africa-wide by 14 percent since 1990, from 187 per 1,000 live births in 1990 to 160 in 2006.
- USAID along with other donors have increased the proportion of children receiving Diphtheria, Pertussis, Tetanus Vaccine (DPT3) across most of sub-Saharan Africa from 70 percent in 2005 to 74 percent in 2007
- The number of children enrolled in primary school across Africa has been increased by 36 percent (to over 70 percent of children) and training has been provided for over 1 million school teachers and principals since 1999.
- In the last two years, over 17 million people were protected from malaria through indoor residual spraying, and over 4 million insecticide treated bednets, over 7 million Artemisinin-based combination therapies (ACTs) and over half a million Intermittent preventive treatment for pregnant women (IPT) have been distributed.
- Through PEPFAR over 1.7 million Africans have been put on antiretroviral treatment for HIV/AIDS.
- The Initiative to Lind Hunger in Africa (IEHA) has facilitated expansion of intra-regional trade by \$225 million every year since 2005. IEHA has increased agricultural productivity with 625 new technologies and helping 1.3 million farmers adopt these new technologies in 2008.
- Exports directly attributable to programs under the Africa Growth and Opportunity Act, increased from \$2.2 million in FY 2007 to \$4.3 million in FY 2008.

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Specific country impacts include:

- The President's Malaria Initiative (PMI) has cut malaria child deaths in Zambia by 30 percent and the number of children infected with malaria by half;
- In Guinea, only 40 percent of girls were attending primary school in 1999 and by 2007 nearly 80 percent were enrolled; in Mali girls' participation has increased from less than 30 percent in 1999 to over 70 percent in 2007. From 1999-2007, on average, girls' participation in education across Africa has increased by a total of 25 percent.
- In Zimbabwe, USAID support during March 2008 elections enabled a
 statistically sound vote tabulation showing the opposition plurality which provided the basis for negotiations with President Mugabe leading
 to the current unity government.
- In Rwanda, USAID's program improved governance and decentralization of the health sector by assisting the Government of Rwanda in developing contracts with dozens of the country's mayors to ensure greater accountability of health funding, services and supplies. As a result of the program, outpatient services jumped from 33 patients per 1,000 in 2005 to 72 per 1,000 in 2008, reflecting a greater effectiveness and improved public perceptions towards the health services



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



Op-ed by Vice President Joe Biden (Running in the Sunday NYT)

SIX months ago, when President Obama and I took office, we were confronted with an economic crisis unparalleled in our lifetime. The nation was hemorrhaging approximately 700,000 jobs a month, the housing market was in free fall, and the fate of the financial system hung in the balance. Credible economists were handicapping the probability of a new depression. The actions we took - passing the Recovery Act, stabilizing the banking system, pressing to get credit flowing again and helping responsible homeowners — brought us back from the precipice. Monthly job losses are down, financial markets are improved, and economic contraction has slowed. We still have a long way to go, but clearly we are closer to recovery today than we were in January. The Recovery Act has been critical to that progress.

Notwithstanding this progress, the nature of the Recovery Act remains misunderstood by many, and misconstrued by others: critics have suggested that the "entire \$787 billion" is being "spent on pet programs." As the person leading the administration's efforts to implement the Recovery Act, I want to set the record straight.

The single largest part of the Recovery Act - more than one-third of it - is tax cuts: 95 percent of working Americans have seen their taxes go down as a result of the Act. The second largest part - just under a third - is direct relief to state governments and individuals. The money is allowing state governments to avoid laying off of teachers (14,000 in New York City alone), firefighters and police, and preventing an explosive doubling of states' budget gaps. And those hardest hit by the recession are getting extended unemployment insurance, health coverage and other help to get through these tough times. The bottom line: two-thirds of the Recovery Act doesn't finance "programs," but goes directly to tax cuts, state governments and families in need, without red tape or delays.

As for the final third, the act is financing the largest investment in roads since the creation of the Interstate highway system; construction projects at military bases, ports, bridges and tunnels; long overdue Superfund cleanups; the creation of clean energy jobs of the future; improvements in badly outdated rural water systems; upgrades to overtaxed mass transit and rail systems; and much more. These investments create jobs today - and support economic growth for years to come. Far from being a negative, the wide array of these investments is necessary given the incredible diversity of the U.S. economy.

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Projects are being chosen without earmarks or political consideration, and many contracts let to date have come in under budget. More than 30,000 projects have been approved, and thousands are already posted on recovery.gov — providing an unprecedented level of transparency and accountability. Taxpayers should know that we have not hesitated to reject proposals that have failed to meet our merit-based standards.

The care with which we are implementing the Recovery Act has led some people to ask whether we are moving too slowly. But the act was designed to provide steady support for our economy over an extended period — not a jolt that would last only a few months. Instead of quick hit rebates, we are giving Americans a tax cut in each paycheck. Instead of pushing out all the state aid immediately, we are spreading it over the two years that it will be needed. Road projects, energy projects and construction projects are being started as soon as they pass review, contracts are competitively bid and reporting systems are in place. Even with such care being taken, we have already committed more than one-fourth of the Recovery Act's total funding, and we are on track to meet the deadline set when the act was passed in February —spending 70 percent by the end of September 2010.

The Recovery Act is not the cure for all our economic ills — no single piece of legislation could be. But as the Government Accountability Office has said, we are ahead of schedule in a key aspect of implementation: aid to state governments. Because of its effort to address multiple problems simultaneously, the Recovery Act has been an easy target for second-guessing. Critics have argued that the tax cuts are too small (or too large); that too much (or not enough) aid is going rural areas; that too little (or too much) is being spent on roads. Recently, some have even criticized the act for helping support — soup kitchens and food banks.

But the way I see it, our balanced approach recognizes that there is no "silver bullet" — no single thing — that can address the many and complex needs of America's vast economy. We have needed relief, recovery and reinvestment to cope with our multifaceted crisis — and only 150 days after it was signed by President Obama, the Recovery Act is already at work providing all three.

SUBJECT: Two initiatives to fulfill the President's Cairo Vision

As you will recall, S/P, in partnership with others, has been developing two flagship initiatives to allow State/AID to deliver on the President's vision of partnership and opportunity - as put forward in his Cairo speech.

The Education-to-Economic Opportunity (EEO) initiative puts forward a suite of targeted employment-geared educational tools and platforms to better prepare young adults for the job market and to be agents of economic growth, as entrepreneurs and business leaders. Networks for Economic Opportunity (NEO) is an initiative aimed at bringing together a wide and deep range of partners (governments, companies, universities, foundations, NGOs, diasporas, investors and more) to put forward programs that will tackle the main impediments to job creation (education, access to capital, business support services, business environment) - in the service of a shared vision for job creation.

In the past two months, S/P has partnered with NEA, who has taken ownership of the initiatives. We have also partnered with Ambassador Bagley and GPI on designing a strategy to leverage private sector resources and capabilities and Undersecretary McHale and R to work with us on a public diplomacy strategy. At the NSC's direction, we have now launched an Interagency Working Group - with various bureaus at State, AID, Treasury, OPIC, USTR, USTDA, Commerce, Education and others - to further refine the initiatives and ensure that they

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exemplify "whole-of-government" efforts.

Working with the NSC and other partners, we have preliminary Implementation Plans with timelines that would allow us to launch both initiatives in the next several months. We believe that the Education-to-Economic Opportunity initiative could be ready for launch in early November, perhaps for you to announce on your trip to Morocco. The White House has expressed strong interest in announcing the Networks for Economic Opportunity initiative as a key deliverable for the Entrepreneurship Summit that the President will host in January.

We have designed EEO and NEO to be flagship initiatives in our regional strategy, in substantiating the President's vision for partnership and for a New Beginning with Muslims around the world - and in operationalizing smart power: using education and job creation to address vital national security interests; harnessing the capabilities, resources and innovative potential of technology, networks and partnerships; supporting and developing local capacity; utilizing the dynamism of the private sector; and creating platforms to spur local stake-holders to take ownership of these efforts – the key to far-reaching and self-sustaining progress.

NEA and other partners have asked for \$250 million in 2011 for these initiatives. We aim to bring-in a matching amount from the private sector (to provide a 2 for 1 value proposition for the U.S. taxpayer). S/P and our State/AID and interagency partners believe these initiatives answer the President's call to deliver on the promise of the Cairo speech – and add vital pieces to our Middle East and North Africa strategy, standing development up alongside diplomacy and furthering our strategic objectives and foreign policy goals in the region.

An Open Hand That Weakens Chavez

Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez is a liar and a troublemaker. Congressmen and columnists can say this, but President Obama is correct not to do so, even though his critics want a tougher U.S. policy against the Venezuelan.

A testament to the success of diplomatic finesse is that Chavez and his pan-regional socialist dreams have been losing ground in Latin America since the inauguration of Obama and his appointment of Hillary Clinton as secretary of state.

In the past week alone, two Chavez allies have broken ranks. Ecuador and Venezuela were teamed against neighboring Colombia over a guerrilla war there. But Ecuadoran President Rafael Correa has just accepted an olive branch offered by Colombian President Alvaro Uribe.

Ecuador's vice president went so far as to add that his country would not let Chavez drag it into war with Colombia, and its defense minister snubbed a renewed Venezuelan attempt to classify Colombia's FARC guerrillas as legitimate state actors. The minister said that Ecuador had "zero tolerance" for the FARC. While Venezuela clearly harbors and funnels arms to the FARC -- despite Chavez's patently false denials -- American and Colombian officials say that Ecuador has been cracking down on the guerrillas along its border. A Colombian raid of a FARC camp inside Ecuador in 2008 led to a rupture in relations between the two countries.

Meanwhile, the Paraguayan Congress forced leftist President Fernando Lugo to withdraw a bill that would have allowed Venezuela to join the Mercosur trade pact that also includes Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay. Brazil had rejected Venezuelan membership last year.

In Honduras, the Chavez-led move to restore his friend Manuel Zelaya as president has been losing steam as much of the rest of the continent has come to grudgingly accept that Zelaya was at least partly to blame for forcing a constitutional crisis. His ouster was hardly a standard coup. The military sent him out of the country after the Supreme Court ordered his arrest for violating the constitution. Zelaya was attempting to follow Chavez's demagogic example of using plebiscites to gut the country's democratic institutions. The de facto civilian government there continues to insist that it will allow Zelaya's return only to stand trial.

Chavez's allies in Argentina, President Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner and her husband, recently lost congressional elections and are now minority lame ducks in that country. This reduces Chavez's greatest influence to two small countries -- Bolivia and Nicaragua. Further limiting him is that Venezuelan economic ills and mismanaged oil reserves have sharply curtailed his largess. He has provided only \$6 billion in foreign assistance this year, compared with \$79 billion last year.

A crucial test of Chavez's influence will come when Unasur, a new Brazilian-led association of South American presidents, meets next week in Buenos Aires. The emergency session was called to respond to the expanded use of Colombian military bases by American forces that was agreed to in principle this week.

Chavez condemns the agreement as a threat to him and the region, citing past American interventions. The final details are still being negotiated, but Obama, Clinton and Uribe insist that the 10-year agreement is merely an extension of the existing training and intelligence-gathering to fight drugs and guerrillas under Plan Colombia. There will be no offensive U.S. weapons such as F-16 fighter aircraft or combat units stationed in Colombia, and no change in the current force cap there of 1,400 Americans, they say. By clumsily working in secrecy, however, the negotiators allowed leaks to frame the project as an American plan, and not as the Colombian idea it largely was.

The administration has been winning over the Brazilians and other key players, though just how much remains to be seen. Still, the declining influence of Chavez and possible regional acceptance of the Colombian agreement are due in large part to the administration's adept ability to extend an open hand and attentive ear to all, even Chavez, and thus not play into Latin fears of a Yanqui bully. It has won influence by going along with the rest of the hemisphere in condemning Zelaya's ouster and in making overtures to Cuba, while staying true to American democratic values.

Critics who demand bellicose policies that might lead to a break in relations with Venezuela should look at the failure of such policies to sway events in Cuba, Iran, North Korea and prewar Iraq. Chavez is a nuisance but not a threat to the United States, and he has to be treated with the hemisphere in mind. So far, Obama and Clinton are doing just fine.

Information Note on the 2009 Forum for the Future

Italy and Morocco are honoured to inform the BMENA, G8 and other Partner Countries as well as international organizations and civil society partners on the preparation of the sixth Forum for the Future to be held in Morocco on 2 and 3 November 2009.

Following the announcement at the Abu Dhabi Forum for the Future (18-19 October 2008), the Italian and Moroccan co-chairs started preparatory consultations with parties involved in the Forum for the Future from both the government and civil society sides. In this process, the two civil society representatives, Organisation Marocaine des Droits Humains (OMDH) and No Peace Without Justice (NPWJ), were given the responsibility to coordinate the participation of the civil society.

The aim of these consultations was to come to an understanding on the policy priorities for the year 2009 and to reach a decision on the organisational modalities (themes, dates and the calendars of the activities programmed for the 2009 FfF).

It has been underlined that the success of the Ministerial meeting of the 2009 FfF will be primarily due to the participation of all the concerned countries (at a Ministerial level) and to its project-based approach. It has been equally recognized the essential contribution of women and youth in political, economic and social development as well as the importance of further encouraging them in particular to participate in all activities taking place in the framework of the FfF.

The Italian and the Moroccan co-chairs underline the opportunity to undertake an evaluation work of our Partnership by engaging in a critical and open assessment of the various initiatives launched since its inception aiming at adapting and improving it, by reinforcing our gains and bringing changes where necessary.

With this in mind, the 2009 Forum for the Future hopes to provide a setting for an informal, flexible, open and inclusive dialogue, devoted to strengthening the initially set principles.

Further to preparatory consultations, the Italian and the Moroccan co-chairs have set up the following calendar of events, on the basis of the policy priorities agreed for the FfF:

Calendar of Events:

The 2009 FfF foresees to reconfirm and reinforce the traditional two segments: the Ministerial Meeting scheduled on November 2 and 3 2009 in Marrakesh –Morocco- and a Sub-Ministerial meeting, to be held in Rome – Italy- on October 23. The Sub-Ministerial meeting will be aimed at finalizing the agenda and the documents for the Ministerial Meeting in Morocco.

The Forum for the Future will be fed by three thematic interrelated workshops aimed at widening the space for discussion and reflection between government and civil society representatives on the selected themes for this year's Forum for the Future.

Conceptual and policy priorities:

The agreed policy priorities for the FfF will be addressed by the three workshops as follows:

✓ 1 workshop on: "the impact of the international financial crisis on the BMENA region", to be held in Beirut (Lebanon) on 26th and 27th September 2009. NPWJ will prepare alongside the Lebanese partner-NGOs, the concept and background paper to detail the organizational and technical modalities. The Beirut workshop will focus on the challenges which the region has to face in the current systemic economic and financial crisis and the role of governments, civil society and the private sector in addressing them. The workshop aims at discussing those issues related to the role of the corporate social responsibility, transparency and private sector in addressing social justice, unemployment and poverty as well as at discussing strategies which could enable broader development in the region, in the light of the outcomes of the UN conference on the world economic and financial crisis. The discussion will aim at elaborating and proposing new tools and instruments that can help in renewing the linkages between political, economic and social rights-based reform strategies and reinforcing a democratic and open environment for the benefit of the whole society.


- √ 1 workshop on :"political reforms and local governance", to be held in Rabat (Morocco) on 5th and 6th October 2009. OMDH and Morocco, as co-chair, will prepare the concept and background paper to detail the organisational and technical modalities. The purpose of the Rabat Workshop is to assess issues and initiatives relating to the development of local government in countries of the BMENA region. The workshop will particularly focus on addressing the status and issues of local administrations, and local branches and units of central governments and will aim to analyse and discuss the capacity of local governments to run their affairs and explore the relationship between local administrations and local constituencies.
- ✓ 1 workshop on: "human development and human security", to be held in Qatar between 10 and 14 October 2009 (date tbc). The Arab Democracy Foundation (ADF), as a partner NGO, will take the lead in preparing the concept and background paper.

Invitations to the activities:

The objective of having three regional workshops is to discuss themes of mutual interest by governments and civil society representatives. The Italian and the Moroccan co-chairs invite the Countries participating in the G8-BMENA initiative to participate actively in these workshops as they will feed the parallel civil society forum, the sub-ministerial and the ministerial meetings.

Each participating Government will take charge of the costs of its own delegation to the aforesaid events.

Jake, Huma, Lona --

When S chaired the Higher Coordination Committee of the U.S.-Iraq Strategic Framework Agreement on July 24 with Iraqi PM Maliki, she agreed that the next session should be in Baghdad and that she'd chair. I think we should try to pencil in the dates for that.

In theory, the meetings should be every six months. That puts the next one smack dab in the middle of iraql elections in January -- not a good idea. And in the immediate aftermath of elections, there will be a caretaker cabinet and lots of jostling around for cabinet formation. So we could be three months late, say, if we wait for the new cabinet to be sworn in.

Thus, I think we need to have the HCC meet in Baghdad later this year, i.e. before the six-month deadline for the next HCC and before Iraqi elections. The question is when. If S goes (as we believe she is) to Morocco for the Forum for the Future in early November, we could do a Baghdad trip just before or after. That is a bit early for another HCC, but we'll get the subcommittees working to have progress to report. But is that the only window? Is there an opportunity in December for a trip to Baghdad? Any other suggested openings?



Status of the Civilian Staffing Effort

RELEASE IN FULL

- At the end of March, as part of the Strategic Review process, Principals endorsed plans to nearly double civilian staffing. The goal was to improve the effectiveness of our civilian assistance, particularly outside of Kabul, to build the capacity of the Afghan government and private sector to lead their own reconstruction and development efforts. The increased positions are to emphasize agriculture, power, governance, and rule of law.
- The civilian effort is directly connected to the COIN focus on protecting government and people from insurgents to enable our civilian programs to strengthen the Afghan state and provide alternative livelihoods and economic opportunities. Our assistance approach is integrated with our civilian staffing strategy, as civilians in both Kabul and the field engage directly with Afghan officials (federal- and district-level) to augment technical skills and monitor the flow of U.S. funds into ministries. U.S. civilians leverage locally engaged staff and implementing partners, expanding both our footprint and the effectiveness of U.S. assistance programs.
- The initial schedule was to fill 62 new positions in June/July 2009, 225 positions between August and November, and 140 positions between December and March 2010. Deployments would be coordinated with the military's operational schedule, as well as with the creation of platforms for new district support teams.
- Subsequently, Deputies decided to accelerate the staffing effort in order to get all new staff in country by December 2009 -- and identified a limited number of additional positions to be filled by USDA. Total positions in Afghanistan are set to increase from the 530 positions on the books at the beginning of 2009 to 974 by the end of the year.
- Of the total 444 new positions, 162 are State positions and 178 are USAID for a total of 340. The other 114 positions are USDA, DHS, DOJ, Treasury, DOT, and HHS
- The bulk of funding for the new positions was requested in the FY 2009 Supplemental signed into law June 24, State's financial plan was cleared by Congress July 28, all Treasury accounts were established and transfers to inter-agency partners were completed August 19. (State had moved ahead with establishing positions and hiring using 3161 authority in advance of the appropriation)
- Since early August, State has been conducting a weekly SVTs chaired by Deputy Secretary Lew with all civilian agencies and Kabul to monitor recruitment and identify any areas which require special attention.

• In addition to identifying and deploying staff for the new positions, agencies must refill existing positions given the normal, one-year rotation cycle. (Nearly 80 percent of positions at Embassy Kabul have been re-filled in the last three months.) A significant number of the pre-existing positions were unfilled in early 2009, creating extra positions to be filled at the same time we were proceeding with the civilian increase.

Based on the most recent SVTS with all agencies, as well as the September 8-9 visit to Kabul by Deputy Secretary Lew, Acting Administrator Fulgham and Deputy SRAP Jones, most agencies are on track to fill remaining positions by year end, with some deployments possibly lagging by a few weeks.

Mobility is a challenge - from the beginning, the civilian plan has presumed that the military would ensure civilian mobility. While our senior military leadership has pledged to ensure that our civilian experts get outside the wire, there are several hurdles that we have had to overcome to clarify the military's commitment to providing mobility.

Current status: Ambassador Eikenberry and General McChrystal signed a Memorandum of Agreement August 12 on safety and security arrangements. The next day Ambassador Mussomeli and General MacDonald signed an agreement on life support issues There is, however, a still-to-be-negotiated supplement to the August 12 MOA which will address some important mobility issues. There is no MOA, and therefore very limited mobility, for civilians from non-US PRTs including Lashkar Gah in Helmand province where the existing private security transportation agreement expires September 30. Nor is there an existing life support agreement for any non-U.S. PRT. Embassy Kabul will be requesting State's approval for a solution in Helmand relying on the UK's security arrangements, as we develop a broader solution to security in non-US-led PRTs. DoD is urging State to consider private security contracts for additional civilian security and transportation; there is an ongoing discussion about who would assume these expenses.

Other main issues identified in the SVTs and trip:

> USAID is on track to fill positions at PRTs, but during meetings with Deputy Secretary Lew and Acting Administrator Fulgham September 9, Embassy Kabul flagged that the pipeline of candidates for positions in contracting, engineering, and USAID's agriculture program has fallen off. The Embassy has identified the need for more engineers and quality control specialists in the field.

Solution: USAID has already reviewed a list of DOD civilians, looking for possible skill matches. USAID also is looking to expand its use of Foreign Service Limited Career personnel, its Active Civilian Response Corps, U.S. Personal Service Contractors, and its use of personnel from other civilian agencies through the use of Participating Agency Service Agreements (PASAs). We also are looking at possible State candidates for these positions. While a number of 3161 candidates recently dropped out of the application process, the Department is confident

the process can be expanded and additional candidates identified The Department of Transportation indicated on September 11 that they may be able to identify staff for some of these positions. State also reached out to the Army Corps of Engineers, and will approach other civilian agencies as necessary.

> USDA wants to wait until full year funding is available before hiring all of their additional civilians. They have identified candidates to fill 64 positions but will only extend offers to 21 staff unless we can provide assurances that FY 2010 funds will be available.

Solution: Other civilian agencies are proceeding to recruit with part-year commitments to be extended when 2010 appropriations are available. USDA and State are continuing to pursue an understanding that would permit recruitment immediately.


> Kabul accommodations are reaching their limit, while we work on arrangements for adjacent land and a conversion of the Ministry of Health facility.

Solution: Embassy will be requesting approval for use of several additional residences near the mission, and is exploring other temporary housing solutions. The Embassy will be insisting on Country Clearances, carefully screening such requests, and restricting visitors during the near term crunch, until more housing solutions come on line.

Comparing Assistance to Afghanistan and Pakistan

Assistance to Pakistan will increase more than 300% from FY08 to FY11 while Afghanistan increases 150% during that time.



Total assistance levels to Pakistan are proposed to grow from \$740 million in FY 2008 to a FY 2011 OMB submission of \$3 billion, with the non-military portion growing from \$440 million to \$2.0 billion.

Total assistance levels to Afghanistan are proposed to grow from \$2.103 billion in FY 2008 to \$5.291 billion in the FY 2011 OMB submission. The non-military portion will grow from \$2.102 billion to \$5.289 billion.

Note: The military portion of assistance provided to Pakistan via State is significantly higher than the portion of military assistance provided to Afghanistan – where DOD administers significant funds directly. The above charts and figures track only State-administered funds, but demonstrate the significant increase in funds – and pipelines – to both countries.

Embassy Kabul has submitted requests for additional personnel and additional resources in FY 2010 which are not reflected in this paper, which focuses solely on already approved levels of staff and assistance.
