### STATEMENT BY CHIEF JAMI RESCH REGARDING MINNEAPOLIS OFFICER-INVOLVED DEATH

The death of George Floyd in Minneapolis has reverberated across the nation. The actions and tactics displayed on the video do not represent our profession's values and are contrary to our fundamental duty to protect and serve.



Despite the distance, these images have deep emotional impacts on our local community as well. PPB and the community have worked together to build relationships and trust over time and the actions of others can impact the progress we have made. This incident strengthens our resolve to work even harder to earn the trust of our community, especially with persons of color.

We are reaching out to community partners and collaborating with our Equity Team to identify opportunities for us to engage in conversation and share how these events affect our relationships and ongoing efforts for continued trust building.

We wanted to share the information below to answer questions and concerns our community members may have about our policies, trainings and community engagement.

### Policies and Use of Force

The Portland Police Bureau has done extensive work on its policies (directives) over the last few years. PPB's Use of Force directive can be found at: <a href="https://www.portlandoregon.gov/police/article/751998">https://www.portlandoregon.gov/police/article/751998</a>. Within the Use of Force directive, under section 5.4, "Members have a duty to reasonably intercede to prevent the use of unlawful force by another member."

PPB officers also have a directive on Bias-Based Policing/Profiling Prohibited: <a href="https://www.portlandoregon.gov/police/article/759106">https://www.portlandoregon.gov/police/article/759106</a>

During an administrative review for any force used (section 12 of the Use of Force policy), it is important to note a supervisor must respond to the scene and conduct interviews with the involved subjects and witnesses. They also must gather applicable evidence, such as security footage of the incident, if that is available.

#### Training and De-escalation

PPB engages in rigorous and in-depth training on use of force and its policies are beyond the Oregon State standards in order to provide its members with the most up-to-date information and practices. PPB officers also receive training about implicit bias and procedural justice.

All Portland Police Bureau patrol members receive at least 40 hours of crisis intervention training and are Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) certified. In addition, these members receive annual refresher training on these important topics. Additionally, there are 161 members who are vetted to receive advanced training and are certified as Enhanced Crisis Intervention Team (ECIT) officers.

### Equity

PPB has had an Equity and Inclusion Office for over five years. The Equity team is tasked with furthering equity within the Bureau. PPB has also committed to a five year Racial Equity Plan (REP) that will continue to operate alongside the strategic plan. An intensive plan outlining PPB's objectives for 2017-2022, the REP is made of eight primary focus areas covering priorities, recruitment and hiring, leadership development, staff development, communications and access, community engagement, data management and budget and contracting. The Equity and Inclusion Office (EIO) seeks to engage both with internal members and with the community around critical tasks and priorities. EIO hosts annual equity retreats with both internal and external stakeholders. EIO also oversees the bureaus own internal Police Equity Council (PEC) and has recently created an an external Police Equity Advisory Council.

### Community engagement

The Portland Police Bureau is committed to enhancing its existing community engagement efforts by reinforcing our external trust and legitimacy with communities we serve. The creation of the Office of Community Engagement (OCE) in March of 2017, demonstrated the Bureau's commitment to institutionalizing community engagement and community policing practices. The OCE strategic mission states: "To build and strengthen meaningful relationships between community members and the Police Bureau by providing opportunities to address and jointly resolve issues of livability and public safety affecting their neighborhoods."

The priorities of the OCE are to identify new pathways and opportunities to developing sustainable, efficient and meaningful partnerships in concert with tailored input and guidance from both community stakeholders and the bureau members. The OCE has been working with local social justice and civic society organizations in addressing a host of justice-related issues with the goal of enhancing collective livability, resiliency and justice advocacy.

PPB continues to prioritize community engagement. PPB's community engagement plan can be found here: https://www.portlandoregon.gov/police/article/744534

PPB continues to develop its advisory councils. Current advisory groups include African-American Advisory Council, Slavic Advisory Council, Alliance for Safer Communities (LGBTQ), Muslim Advisory Council, Behavioral Health Advisory Council and the Training Advisory Council. PPB is in the process of forming the Latino Advisory Council. These councils help the Police Bureau make decisions with the

PPB understands that building trust in our community is paramount. We continue to actively engage and build relationships. The show is called "Hands Up" I hope you saw it.
Using theater and research and monologues gathered, presented and then skillfully discussed with the audience after the show, the "Hands Up" writers and actors began a sorely needed discussion about Racism, Policing and community

. The play was free: rotating performances into different neighborhood venues who donated their community spaces for productions and discussions :Can we replicate this? Can we somehow show this play again and again and have community discussions skillfully to follow after the show?? (obviously live theater is best but we can't wait for Covid to end to address this...) Senator, this is just one tiny example that is a concrete start .We must create many more ways to stop this racism and police reign of terror. Please give Oregonians the tools we need. The police ,and the community need actions we can take if we are witnesses: No bystanders should be caught without a state wide plan on what to do if we see racial injustice. Prevention will be a hard job. But I leave it to your wisdom to help us: speak with your fellow colleagues: gather us in town halls , use all your power to help us unravel the entanglement of racism in the fabric of Oregonians, Minnesotans and our whole country . "I stand in solidarity with those who grieve for the senseless death of George Floyd. I have spent time this week reflecting on and mourning the murder of Mr. Floyd, who was unarmed, and what we continue to witness around this nation. George Floyd's murder has weighed heavily on my thoughts. So has the death of Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery and Atatiana Jefferson. #### Dear Mayor Wheeler:

The use of excessive police force is a persistent problem that hasn't received adequate attention in America. After hearing about the most recent horrific murder of Mr. George Floyd, I immediately reviewed the local police operations to ensure our officers are serving our communities with the highest level of transparency and accountability. As the largest law enforcement agency in Oregon, I was upset to learn that the Portland Police Bureau doesn't use one of the most beneficial resources in modern policing: body-worn cameras.

The strong encouragement of body-worn cameras began after the 2014 shooting of Michael Brown in Ferguson, MO. President Obama and the Department of Justice funded a \$20 million federal grant to encourage pilot programs in major cities nationwide. Los Angeles, Washington DC, and New York participated in the pilots and subsequently adopted body camera use. In 2015, 88% of Americans supported body cameras, and the studies explain why. The Rialto Study from southern California concluded that using body-worn cameras decreased the use of force by 59% and citizen complaints by 87.5% over 12 months. Studies from the United Kingdom show that body cameras positively influence police and citizen relationships, decrease crime, and enforce police transparency and accountability.

Five years ago, state-wide legislation passed to standardize body camera use. Shortly after, the city of Portland adopted a budget package to purchase and maintain equipment and created a policy draft. But the program has experienced repeated delays. In April, you announced eliminating the program funding from the 2020-2021 fiscal budget proposal. I implore you to work with the police chief and other city leaders to reconfigure the budget and include the pilot program funding. As protectors and representatives of our communities, law enforcement,

and city leaders must respond and uphold the request for increased safety measures and accountability.

How are we protecting our city from experiencing a similar situation as Ferguson, Missouri, or St. Anthony, Minnesota? As a current Criminal Justice student at Portland State University, I have studied criminal psychology and the theories behind criminology and policing. I have examined different corrections and enforcement tactics and their impact on community relations. I have studied our criminal justice system. The current climate in American policing stems from community skepticism and uncertainty about our police force. Half of Americans believe law enforcement doesn't do their job well, which is due in part to media exposure. In minority communities, over 75% of people question police legitimacy.

To fix these presumptions, we have to prove that our police force is ethical and fair. To prevent future unjust use of force or brutality, we must provide our community with constructive solutions and demonstrate change. Bodyworn cameras offer the accountability and additional safety Portland has needed and requested for the past five years. I encourage you to use your voice on behalf of Portland citizens and allocate funding for the program in the 2020-2021 budget.

We can't wait until we experience a tragedy like Ferguson. As Mayor, I know you prioritize community health and safety. You strongly denounce the excessive force and police brutality that is plaguing our nation, but change doesn't come from a press conference or tweet; it comes from action. I implore you to demonstrate these priorities and beliefs by putting them into motion. Please allocate funding for the Body-Worn Camera Pilot Program in 2020-2021 and demand the accountability and protection we need in law enforcement.

Emergency Executive Order Declaring an Emergency and Implementing a Temporary Nighttime Curfew in the City of Portland Oregon

I, Ted Wheeler, Mayor of the City of Portland, Oregon, by the authority vested in me by the Charter of the City of Portland and applicable code and statutes, issue the following Executive Order: On May 25, 2020, George Floyd died while in custody of the Minneapolis Police Department. Since Mr. Floyd's death, thousands of Americans and Portlanders have expressed their frustration in a peaceful and constructive manner. Demonstrators have gathered in many cities to protest Mr. Floyd's death. Peaceful demonstrations are essential to our democratic system. Unfortunately, some individuals have engaged in unlawful and dangerous activity, including arson, rioting, looting, and damaging public and private property. These activities threaten the safety of lawful demonstrators, the surrounding communities, and first responders.

For these reasons, I order as follows:

- 1. A State of Emergency exists within the City of Portland under Portland City Code Section 15.04.
- 2. Nighttime Curfew. A curfew is imposed in all public places within the City of Portland during the following times: a. Immediately until 6:00 am on Saturday, May 30, 2020. b. From 8:00 pm on Saturday, May 30, 2020 until 6:00 am on Sunday, May 31, 2020.
- 3. Travel Prohibited. During the curfew, all persons must not travel on any public street or in any public place.
- 4. Exemptions. All law enforcement, fire, medical personnel, and members of the news media are exempt from the curfew. Individuals traveling directly to and from work, seeking emergency care, fleeing dangerous circumstances, or experiencing homelessness are also exempt.
- 5. Definitions. a. For the purposes of this Executive Order, "travel" includes, without limitation, travel on foot, bicycle, skateboard, scooter, motorcycle, automobile, public transit, or any other mode of transporting a person from one location to another. b. For the purposes of this Executive Order, a "public place" is any place, whether on privately or publicly owned property, accessible to the general 3 public, including but not limited to public streets and roads, alleys, highways, driveways, sidewalks, parks, vacant lots, and unsupervised property. 6.
- 6. Enforcement. I urge all Portlanders to voluntarily comply with this Executive Order. Pursuant to Portland City Code Section 15.08.040, enforcement of this Chapter may be by civil action as provided in ORS 30.315, or by criminal prosecution. In addition to any other penalty provided by law, refusal to obey an order issued under the authority of PCC 15.08.020 shall be punishable upon conviction by a fine of not more than \$500 per occurrence. Any peace officer may issue a citation for violation of this Section.

- On Friday, May 29<sup>th</sup> the day began with a community conversation about the impact of George Floyds murder by a Minneapolis police officer at the Community Police Collaborative.
- At 11:30 AM there was a eulogy for George Floyd sponsored by the NAACP in Terry Schrunk Plaza. The eulogy was well attended, somber and peaceful.
- At 6:00 PM there was a demonstration at peninsular park. Several hundred attended. The event featured numerous community presenters who shared their outrage, grief and anger. Subject: Reflections on what our city needs now

### Mayor Wheeler,

Early this morning I listened to an interview you gave on KGW, about the events of last night. I was speechless to hear your response to the question "Do you have any explanation for it, why it got so out of hand?"

You said "I'm sure there will be plenty of time in the days and weeks ahead to go back and do the analysis. But right now, frankly I'm not interested in analysis" and "What led to it? I don't know."

This left me deeply disappointed. Rioting, looting and arson aren't justifiable. But they are predictable responses, symptoms of needs going unmet. I hope a good deal of energy this weekend is put into this analysis.

I heard you ask for community leaders to reach out and get in touch to share thoughts. I would like to contribute to this conversation.

What we saw last night, and around the country this week, is a cataclysmic and historic and systemic response to the pandemic and racial and economic injustice.

It is entirely predictable that the city would see large scale protests and riots. Anger and grief and lament and fear pouring out into the common square. There's lots to be learned from the history of civil unrest during pandemics but here's a good start from Forbes- History - And Psychology - Predict Riots And Protests Amid Coronavirus Pandemic Lockdowns

"History has taught us that whether it's caused by fear, frustration, or the helplessness that comes with imprisonment, human beings do not respond well to forced lockdowns. These feelings are often exacerbated by sentiments that the

vulnerable are being taken advantage of. There is also outrage that accompanies the gained knowledge that in almost all cases, the resources needed are not available"

I am not a historian, or an expert in policing policy, or a person of color. I do know about economic injustice and the way it intertwines with racial injustice. And I've been working nonstop since March to help craft policy solutions to pandemic food access in our state. The above rings so true to me.

People have lost their jobs. Lost wages. Gone bankrupt. Will miss another rent payment Monday. Are still waiting for unemployment checks. Have been excluded from federal stimulus relief. Hunger has doubled in Oregon in a matter of weeks. People don't know what to do to provide for their families. We have stood in line in the rain with our children to pick up meals. We have no child care, to be able to keep the jobs we still have, and are facing a summer of the same with no P&R or SUN programs to care for our kids. We heard from the state the recession will last until at least 2024 and more cuts are coming. We're emotionally burnt out, cut off from family and spiritual support. Have had to sacrifice so much.

And then you watch a man be strangled to death by a police officer. Who refused to check his pulse, as his life drained away. You watch a woman in a park use the police as a weapon against a black man bird watching.

You mix the fear of getting sick and dying from a cough with the anger and desperation of forced poverty and hunger because of government responses to the virus. You mix that with the fear of being arrested and dying because of your race, with the exhausting grief and anger of seeing it happen over and over.

I would have hoped someone in your office, if not you yourself, would have been doing this analysis since March. With all the emergency planning, surely someone in the city predicted that civil unrest would be the expected outcome of people not having their needs met and their rights respected? It's happened after every pandemic lockdown in history, after all.

I agree that looting and lighting fires is not ok, and violence is not the way. 99.9% of the city agrees. Going forward, I ask you to please stop focusing your public statements and your policy responses there. Please focus on saying what the community deeply needs to hear you say- give voice to the pain, to the anger, to the desperation and fear from injustice. Align yourself firstly with people who are suffering. And then enact swift policy change- as swift as you enacted a public curfew this morning.

I began this note at about 7am, with strong emotions after listening to you on the news. While writing this email, I watched your press conference. I see that you have since reflected, and no doubt taken feedback, and modulated your response to acknowledge the community's pain. I appreciate that.

I felt it was still important to send this letter, though. Commissioner Hardesty had to step in even during the press briefing, to remind the room "it wasn't about what the police did or didn't do to respond to the riot. It's about what we didn't do, as community, as the government, as the responsible parties, actually to represent the people in our community" and Fire Chief Sara Boone "If you really want to help understand and change the system, that we have been living in since the day we got here, see the world through our eyes, through black and brown

people, our perspective."

And yet even after these leaders showed the way, you still got it backwards. In response to the question "What are actionable steps you want the public to take today" you led with "I hope that we will be as strong in our voice opposing vandalism as we are in supporting free speech and assembly rights." Those peacefully protesting were giving you valuable information, which it doesn't seem like you heard. None of your suggestions for action-steps involved city policy change to address racial injustice.

I am very, very sorry to hear that your mother is dying. I hold you in this wide circle of Portlanders who is experiencing grief and who cannot be with family during the hardest moments of our lives. This is what pulls us together as humans, as we empathize with each other's suffering and shoulder each other's burdens.

Mayor Wheeler, the above is a note from me, a "community leader".

The below are specific policy actions we as an organization, Partners for a Hunger-Free Oregon, are asking you to take to demonstrate your commitment to making it right and rebuilding trust. This list comes from <u>Marcus Mundy and the Coalition of Communities of Color</u>, with whom we stand in solidarity.

### We must, and immediately:

work to remove any policies on our existing jurisdictions' books similar to those in Minneapolis, which may permit the use of the procedure used to kill George Floyd;

work to facilitate and codify the implementation of suggestions developed by groups such as the Portland Police Reform Network, the Albina Ministerial Alliance Coalition for Justice and Police Reform, etc., in a formalized process;

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The CCC urges all of you to take the steps we have outlined, with us. There is more than one pandemic raging in America, and none will be solved without collective action.

I look forward to the response from your office, and on the actions the city plans to take to address the root causes of what we have seen this week.

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

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

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# PORTLAND AND THE PATH FORWARD





Good afternoon. I'd like to thank you for inviting me to stand alongside you, particularly during a time where the black community is in deep mourning for the lives needlessly lost to police violence - most recently, George Floyd - and for the steady and persistent reminder of this country's disregard for black lives.

I don't take my participation or presence here this afternoon lightly, and so I'll keep my remarks brief.

But first, I'd like to take a moment to acknowledge many difficult but necessary conversations I've had with friends, colleagues, and partners in the black community. I want them to know – without a doubt – that I understand the moment we are in – that the rioting we are seeing is a direct response to years of systemic injustice.

I will not condone violence. In maintaining the safety of this community, I will not support the looting and rioting we have seen.

But I also know and understand that agitation – yes even violent agitation – has historically occurred with purpose and resulted in change that has moved this country forward.

People are hurting. Our community is grieving. It didn't just happen in Minneapolis. To assume so disrespects the legacies of those black men <u>and</u> women who have been killed here in our city.

And Portlanders, I recognize we have our own deep reckoning to do.

Educational disparities. Health disparities. Housing disparities. Employment disparities. All placing the Black community at a worsening disadvantage.

To our community: I asked for your voice and I hear you. I see you. I recognize your pain and frustration. What is abundantly clear to me is this: the terms of forgiveness should not come from the entity inflicting the wrongdoing.

Which is WHY WE <u>MUST</u> center the Black community. Black voices <u>MUST</u> be elevated when we are talking about impact, when we are talking about restorative justice, when we are talking about reconciliation, and when we are talking about healing.

Today we are surrounded by many leaders in the Black community, standing together, calling on all of us to do more and to be better.

We have been in crisis, but our government has been too slow to act. Here in Portland, that means me, as Mayor. Lened to do more. Much more.

Going forward, I will continue to work with community to develop anti-racist policies and vetting recommendations from civic groups engaged in this work. I recognize this isn't enough, but it is another step towards unpacking and dismantling a racist history of systematic oppression.

And we will, no matter how long it takes, do that so we all -- most acutely our Black community -- can feel safe, heard, and valued.

We need accountability. We need justice. We need You. It's not acceptable to rest responsibility with the Black community, which has been doing this work for decades.

This does not always come as naturally for me as I would like. As a white person, I understand that I have privileges that others do not; I know that I speak on behalf of a power structure that has excluded people of color for far too long. I am committed to using my privilege to end the long history of injustices wrought against people of color.

I pray for humility. I pray for strength. And I pray for the wisdom to see with clarity and lead with purpose.

There may be times when I do not communicate with clarity, or even the sensitivity necessary. For that I want you to know that it is always my intention to understand, to articulate and support. I won't always get it right, but I will do my best. And no matter what, I will be standing with you.


I want you to know that we share the same vision and goal toward achieving our collective humanity.

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

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

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

I have been told there is an upcoming Town Hall for the Black community Wednesday or Thursday. I would be great to have details about this event so I can be present.

Finally, I was told there was a proclamation coming to Council on Wednesday related to the Asian/Pacific Islander community and the horrible, racist acts

## PORTLAND & THE PATH FORWARD



#### Portland,

We are at a moment of reckoning for Portland, and for America. A little more than a week ago, the brutal murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis laid bare a harsh reality: racism continues to rob our Black communities of safety, health, and prosperity. Black Americans have remained resilient in the face of police violence, racist housing policies, income inequality, and educational inequities. Too often, the very institutions that are supposed to protect and support our community instead fail people of color and deny them their basic rights.

This isn't new news to Black colleagues, neighbors and friends. It is the reality they live with every day. Mr. Floyd's murder announced that reality so loudly, so obviously, so unconscionably, that Americans of every race said **enough**.

We cannot look away.

People are grieving. They are angry. They are hurt. And those emotions are boiling over into the streets of America, including right here in Portland. For the past four nights, thousands of protesters have marched through the city demanding justice for our Black community. The majority have demonstrated peacefully, and I want to thank them.

I am proud to stand with the Portland community, seeking a just future for the

black community, which the government has failed. We have witnessed moments of solidarity and glimmers of hope, such as protesters and Portland police officers kneeling together last night.

Our public safety teams are doing everything within their power to protect people's right to protest, and to avoid confrontations. But a small minority of violent protesters are hurting our community – setting fires to buildings with people still inside, harassing journalists, destroying small and large businesses, and threatening our first responders.

I do not believe that violence and destruction are the answer to healing the deep racial wounds harming Portland and America. Quite the opposite. I have implored the Portland community to channel their justified anger toward the difficult and necessary work of seeking justice together.



It was my honor to join leaders and friends in our city's Black community, talking about the path forward over the weekend. If we are serious about change, we must create more spaces for Black voices to be centered and elevated.

We must acknowledge the pervasive anti-blackness in our culture, identify the anti-blackness in every one of us, and eliminate it. That applies to our workplace, too. I want to speak directly to Black employees: Please take care of yourselves, your family and your community.

Please know that I am committed to your safety and your success.

I invite each and every one of you, as public servants, to join me in insisting that we never return to business as usual.

I'm committed to examining my privilege, doubling down on equity and ensuring that here at the City of Portland, when we lead, we lead with racial equity, always.

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

Hi Eileen,

This is an incredibly difficult time for our city and our country. In the midst of a pandemic that has taken lives and livelihoods, we saw yet another Black American murdered in broad daylight.

This is a time of tremendous sorrow and of righteous anger.

It's also an inflection point — a moment that we must seize to take action to end the scourge of racism.



We must carry forward the names of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and so many others to ensure their legacy becomes the change our country so desperately needs. And we must take action to redefine public safety so that it recognizes the humanity and dignity of every American.

I vow to continue, and redouble, my work to tackle and correct the inequities born of structural racism. Like everyone who is peacefully demonstrating here in Los Angeles and across the country, I am eager for change — and our city government will change to deliver progress and advance racial justice.

#### **Our next steps**

The movement for racial justice is bigger than a budget, but budgets are statements of our values. That's why we will be working to identify \$250 million for further investments in community programs, including cuts to LAPD's budget.

#### That's just one of the many new steps forward we are taking:

- We will put a moratorium on putting people in the CalGang database. We will also expand the juvenile diversion program to ensure that as few young Angelenos as possible see the criminal justice system.
- We will require officers to intervene when they see inappropriate use of force and always report misconduct. We will have more regular departmental training in implicit bias.
- We will expand our Community Safety Partnership sites and program throughout the city to build stronger relationships between officers and the Angelenos they serve.
- All LAPD officers will complete de-escalation and crowd control training by

the end of the year to better support peaceful protests.

- We will also expand LAPD's mental health intervention training program to train a minimum of 900 additional officers this year.
- The Police Commission will review our early warning system to better identify problematic behavior and intervene earlier with officers who have exhibited a pattern of high risk behavior.
- We will convene our first meeting of the Civil and Human Rights
   Commission late next week, and set up the Civil and Human Rights
   Department and its office of Racial Equity months ahead of schedule.

These new steps build on the reforms we've already put in place at our police department in recent years:

- Becoming the first big city in America to put body cameras on every officer and release videos to the public.
- Hiring the most diverse and representative police department of any major city in the United States.
- Mandating training in implicit bias for every officer, because racism and prejudice must never be part of police work.
- Instituting training in de-escalation for every officer, because not every encounter or confrontation should result in a use of force.
- We have developed long-term relationships between youth and our police department, including Summer Night Lights to keep parks open late in the summer and expanding our Gang Reduction Youth Development programs by 50%.

Free community college, raising the minimum wage, housing the homeless, helping reduce prison populations, keeping up our reentry programs, and expanding job training and placement — we must double down on our work in these areas as well, and we will.

We have work to do to build trust between officers and communities — and to help businesses damaged and looted to recover.

The protests speak to Angelenos' determined drive for progress in our policing,

policies and laws.

Every step we take forward to protect people's rights, to enact smart and overdue reforms, to undo structural racism — all of it is meant to build a more fair, equal, and just Los Angeles.

Black lives matter, and the future depends on what we do now.

Thank you for your email regarding the Portland Police Bureau's budget.

The Mayor, the Portland Police Bureau, and the City are grappling with the tragic murder of George Floyd, and how we as a City can build a safer future for communities of color. The Mayor understands that the City budget reflects our values. This is why the Mayor's proposed budget prioritizes Portland's unsheltered population, undocumented immigrants, and organizations that work to prevent hate crimes. Given the budget shortfall due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Mayor called for a 6% reduction across all City bureaus, including PPB. To be clear, the increases to PPB's budget are part of the discretionary General Fund. They reflect changes to pension benefits and a planned technology project. The Mayor is aware of concerns around PPB specialty units and is committed to reassessing their efficacy and impact in the Portland community.

For years, the Portland Police Bureau has been working to create a more equitable and just policing system in Portland. The City has achieved substantial reforms under its Settlement Agreement with the U.S. Department of Justice, and recognizes that there is more work to be done to ensure a safer and more equitable future for Portland. #### **COMMUNITY RESPONSE:**

Hey everyone, I want to let you know about what's been going on recently between myself and Mayor Ted Wheeler of Portland. First of all, I've been speaking out against the Mayor ever since he issued stand down orders to Portland Police officers while my family was brutally attacked by Rose City Antifa. Seeing the reality of his political actions play out in front of my eyes was one of the most despicable things I've ever seen, and from that moment onwards, I knew it was my place to make sure the people of Portland remember this, and that it never happens again.

Mayor Wheeler, sensing where this was going, went out of his way multiple times to attack my group, including unfounded accusations that there were snipers on the rooftops, in an effort to get Rose City Antifa to feel threatened, and attack us. Every time conservatives hold a rally in Portland, Patriots are subjected to weapons checks and must follow strict orders from local law enforcement, when obtaining a permit.

The far left bias permeates into these checks, by allowing Rose City Antifa to carry weapons to the same events conservatives are denied the ability to carry weapons. The police that are assigned to protect us, in place of carrying weapons, have proven their ineptness again, and again, and again, disappearing right before Rose City Antifa members commit attempted murder, only for the same law enforcement officers to show up after conservatives have been attacked. In response, conservative groups formed community self defense groups to protect themselves, but left wing media, for a time, seemed to side with Antifa in their acts of terror. In January, conservatives were attacked after leaving a DSA meeting at the Burnside IWW, two of which were put in the hospital. We were blamed for this, and attacked by 25 Antifa carrying Asps, brass knuckles and sticks. This same IWW then vandalized their own building to raise funds, putting the blame on us, despite the fact that the owners of the building were in debt until their fundraiser, and that no Patriot took credit for the event. The media ran with that story as well. The same story happened at the Womxn's March, and the same at May Day and Cider Riot. Despite Rose City Antifa always, always showing up to indiscriminately attack conservatives at their rallies, such as at the #HimToo event, or the Pro-life March for Life, if conservatives of any group affiliation try to do the same at Antifa events, their hypocrisy can be seen when they claim they're underattack. Mayor Wheeler has supported the Antifascist domestic terrorist's actions for far too long, and this long train of hypocrisy is finally being seen after Mayor Wheeler's criticism of Conservatives after the June 29th event, Portland's Liberation, "United Against Domestic Terrorism". After innocent Conservative citizens of Portland were brutally attacked, by Rose City Antifa, who attempted to murder them, including one journalist whose only crime was holding a camera, Mayor Wheeler showed his true colors by once again turning a blind eye to the problems that he has directly caused in this city. Rather, he dodges any questions on the matter, and opts to place blame on his sworn officers and conservatives for holding rallies. As such, it lies on the people of Portland to let their Mayor know that none of us are going to put up with his inaction anymore. Either the police will protect our first amendment rights, or we're going to defend our right to free speech, granted to us as citizens of the United States of America. I had a personal interaction with Greg Isaacson in front of my house recently where he tried to intimidate me and some neighbors by sitting on his bike in front of our house yelling at us. I let it go because it's during his personal time; however, after Saturday's event, I wonder when the City will deem it appropriate to discipline or fire a man who time after time shows up at Nazi/White Supremist rallies, associates himself with the Patriot Prayer/Proud Boys groups, and choses to intimidate his coworkers and community. He is known as "bike Nazi" in the alt-right and antifascist groups.



Moving forward, I will be sending your office, Mr. Turner's office, and Mr. Iboshi an email every day to remind all of us what has been allowed to happen in our city unchecked during most if not all of your tenure as Mayor and more importantly Police Commissioner. The resolution I am seeking is for you to either enforce existing laws or work within the legislator to overturn poorly thought out decisions in being able to enforce the law for unlawful assembly, possession, drug dealing, and theft.

There are 3 points I am asking you specifically to react to as Police Commissioner and not as a politician. I have had to wash and disinfect my shoes and my dogs paws multiple times for coming in contact with human feces and there is garbage all over Powell. It is disgusting and This is not the way a progressive mayor should allow people to live. It is wrong. unacceptable.
- 3. This may not seem like a big deal but it goes towards the morale of the city you are allowing our city to get defaced by spray paint. I left you a voicemail directing you to where Powell goes under the UP and Max tracks around 18<sup>th</sup> and it tells the story of much of our city. It is unacceptable and needs to be addressed

When I moved to this city in 1994 it had its share of issues. The end stages of an overt skinhead contingent and more crime in general. Mayor Katz was a strong democratic Mayor with a lot of your progressive ideals but she was not afraid to enforce the law and she kept this city clean. Was it smaller yes, but not drastically to use that excuse. Clashes between riot police and radical leftists and anarchists resulted in more than 160 arrests and an estimated \$1 million in property damage.

- 7) You must be operating in the awareness that you are under a national spotlight in whatever you do. Following the disturbances last August, President Trump tweeted. "Major consideration is being given to naming ANTIFA an 'ORGANIZATION OF TERROR. Portland is being watched very closely. Hopefully the Mayor will be able to properly do his job!" This must put you in a very difficult position politically.
- 8) The City Council passed a resolution last year denouncing "White Supremacist and Alt-Right Hate Groups." But am I right in assuming this has no legislative teeth? What was the thinking behind that, and what it might achieve?
- 9) Portland seems to embody this cultural divide in more subtle and nuanced ways. I'm thinking of

some issues that, minor as they may appear, have attracted national, even international attention: The Back To Eden bakery incident. The burrito cart incident. The Ristretto Roasters incident. These point to some of the more complex issues around social justice and equity and what may result from those demands.

Clearly, it's not the job of City Hall to manage those kinds of incidents, but I'd be interested in your thoughts about what they say about what is happening in America right now.

- 3) It's self-evident (to me at least) that the election of Donald Trump as President has exacerbated the political and cultural divisions in America driving them to increasingly extremist position. Portland has been a microcosm of this.

In the four months after the election Portlsand was the scene of some 30 marches and rallies, including half a dozen where stand-offs between militant right and left wing ended in violence. Clashes between riot police and radical leftists and anarchists resulted in more than 160 arrests and an estimated \$1 million in property damage.

There have been numerous clashes since then, a serious one last August.

Have these diminished in number - and if so is that a consequence of particular actions and policies??

4) How would characterise the groups at opposite ends of the spectrum - anti, on the one hand, Patriot Prayer and the Proud Boys at the other. What do you think they want? And how can their demands be met - if they should?

5) It seems to me that the city is between a rock and a hard place here.

First of all, how can you actively prevent these sort of stand-offs from happening - without interfering with people's constitutional rights.?

Secondly, can you describe the policy the city and the police have adopted to these clashes. It appears to be separation but not intervention.

- 6) I understand there have been two proposals over the last year or so to address the problem, neither of which have gone anywhere; one, a proposal by the Mayor's office to introduce legislation that restrict the timing of protests; and two, a proposal by the chief of police that there should be some kind of enhanced charge if people committing crimes while wearing masks. (I understand Berkeley have dealt with this issue by forbidding protesters wearing masks). Why did these proposals fail?
- 7) You must be operating in the awareness that you are under a national spotlight in whatever you do. Following the disturbances last August, President Trump tweeted. "Major consideration is being given to naming ANTIFA an 'ORGANIZATION OF TERROR. Portland is being watched very closely. Hopefully the Mayor will be able to properly do his job!" This must put you in a very difficult position politically.
- 8) The City Council passed a resolution last year denouncing "White Supremacist and Alt-Right Hate Groups." But am I right in assuming this has no legislative teeth? What was the thinking behind that, and what it might achieve?
- 9) Portland seems to embody this cultural divide in more subtle and nuanced ways. I'm thinking of some issues that, minor as they may appear, have attracted national, even international attention: The Back To Eden bakery incident. The burrito cart incident. The Ristretto Roasters incident.

These point to some of the more complex issues around social justice and equity and what may result from those demands.

Clearly, it's not the job of City Hall to manage those kinds of incidents, but I'd be interested in your thoughts about what they say about what is happening in America right now.

At one level, these kind of incidents serve to allow people to be heard, but at the same time push other people's buttons and create divisions. The question of equity, white privilege seems a very present one in Portland, with all the divisions that come with it
