Thank you for the very thoughtful and detailed considerations you shared. I understand, and even agree, with some points. But having good reasons for allowing implementation that is contrary to a board motion is the concern.

As grading policy is something the board oversees, and there was specific action on the topic with exact language in Beth's motion, my concern and question was specifically directed at understanding how the implementation is within that directive. I was asking how/why it was decided this implementation is consistent with the very specific board directions (that students only earn bumps if they improve, and that the policy be applied consistently, which it is not). I'm not sure there is a response in the explanation. At this juncture, the only conclusion left to draw is it was decided (for the reasons stated) that it was acceptable to disregard the language of the motion because the division decided the result was preferred.

I remain concerned with giving a grade bump across the board for a mere 61% as that is grade inflation and remains no more equitable to our neediest kids who may not have been able to do ANY 4th quarter work because and may be as surprised as we are by this policy, and for the other reasons already stated. And, do not agree that allowing different schools to apply grading policy differently is in keeping with how the divsion should grade.

I will leave it to Beth and Jeff who made the two related motions to take this up further, if they choose.

Principals met with their department chairs following the approval of the grade improvement chart to discuss how to best apply the grade bump consistently at their school. Some schools chose a school wide application and others decided by department. Some agreed on the score of a 60% as the eligible mark to get the bump, after considering multiple points, and others did not. I've included some of these reflections from principals for context. I think this synthesizes with the motion, and I do also think that we will need to work toward more consistency in the fall. I think the new assessment and grading policy as well as the PD we are developing around the new policy will help with this consistency across schools.

The majority of the individuals on some teams were in agreement that given the circumstances, many of which we were unaware of in the households of our students, it would be difficult to expect all of our students to outperform, or much less equal, their performance from previous quarters. Schools discussed how the population of students who would likely be able to accomplish this task would be those who had the most supports at home, those who were already performing at the higher levels of academics, and those who were already engaged in learning prior to school closure. Schools also discussed how this expectation (to exceed their previous performance) was inequitable for many of our students; those without supports at home, those who had learning or

language difficulties, those who were already a part of a population disconnected from the learning environment. At the time of the conversations, teachers discussed specific examples they were already experiencing about student performance and how they felt as though this "bump" expectation was isolating our students with the greatest need. Schools also discussed how students at the top of the academic scale may just do enough to get by and complete 60% work. In that discussion, teachers shared how LCPS top performers were often in multiple upper level (AP, DE, and Honors) classes, and the additional stress that this alone caused, much less in our current circumstance.

In interpreting the grade bump and working with their teams to develop consistency, principals felt it important to keep students engaged in the content, to keep them motivated to stay connected, and not to overwhelm students with expectations which were beyond the current level of support schools could offer compared to what was previously provided in the face to face setting. In the end, staff were focused on what was best for the majority of our students, taking multiple factors into consideration.





Dear Beth,

I am writing hank you for speaking up for special education students at Tuesday's LCPS school board meeting. You did a wonderful job, with Mr. Serotkin and Mr. Morse, of pressing LCPS administration to act on heals of our SPED students, whose voices are often unheard.

This morning, I spoke with Mr. Serotkin about the concerns I have regarding the current school situation in Loudoun, and have also emailed Ms. Corbo with the following:

As the mother of three LCPS special education students, and a US Paralympic equestrian coach, I am deeply concerned about the lack of equity in education for children with disabilities during this Covid-19 crisis.

Our children have been out of school for over five months. By current calculations, it may be more than seven months before they see a classroom again. No matter how robust any synchronous learning program may be for some members of our population, it is inaccessible and inappropriate for many. Children with disabilities come from every socioeconomic, cultural, and religious background. Their families may be diverse, but all share the same concerns - their children are not being educated. Thousands of student Individual Education Plans are not being implemented, which violates the Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA), and puts LCPS outside of federal law concerning special education.

As a consumer and provider of services to children and adults with disabilities, I have been disheartened over the past few months at the poor planning by our

school system for special education programming for fall. At Wheatland Farm, we provide services every day to children with disabilities and their families, without interruption. Granted, we are a smaller program. We serve more than 100 families each week in a variety of adaptive recreation and support service programs. Thought we had to work hard to develop mitigation and distancing strategies for safe daily operations, we never shut our doors to our students during the Covid-19 pandemic. As far as I am aware, we are the only therapeutic program that continuously operated for students. We did this because, as a parent of special needs children myself, I watched the terrible impact that the sudden closure of school had on them - physically, emotionally, and developmentally.

I am very grateful for your voice on our school board, and I encourage you to keep the educational needs of more than 8,000 Loudoun County Public School special educations students at the top of the agenda. Our administrators need to answer some tough questions. Why was so little preparation done for special education students over the summer months? Why are we JUST developing plans with school opening so soon? By what metrics are they developing reopening plans for ALL special education students, not just those in self-contained classes?

The citizens of Loudoun Country deserve to know what the school system is planning, in a transparent and organized fashion. Instead, we have got much obfuscation. It is hard to imagine that this is, in fact, a one billion-plus enterprise. Last Tuesday evening, one might be forgiven for thinking that the schools were opening for the first time....ever! We are better than this.

I would be most grateful for your input on what we might expect at the September 8th school board meeting. In particular, I would appreciate it if the school board could let our community know what the gating criteria will be for the return to in-person learning for LCPS students overall. Loudoun families have been patient and willing to accept change when needed. However, the current climate of confusion and disenchantment among families and so many students unable to be appropriately educated is simply untenable and must be addressed.

Please do not hesitate to reach out to me if there is anything in particular I can do to help in this process, in any way. As a long term resident of Loudoun County, service provider, and proud LCPS parent, I stand ready to work with you and with the administration to improve the lives of our special education students.

That you again, Beth, for giving of your time to the Loudoun County School Board. Your generosity of time

and talent is greatly appreciated. I look forward to hearing from you.

I've spent a lot of time thinking about last night's school board meeting and the challenges therein, particularly during the last hour of the meeting, and discussing the same with a few other board members (although I'm only speaking for myself).

I appreciate you asking for the Board's input on numerous topics, as "baked in" to presentations throughout the night, with examples including:

- Asking the LCSB to join the LCPS Administration in extending a formal apology for the history of operating segregated schools.
- Numerous other questions embedded in the Equity Plan slides
- Should hybrid learning in Stage 1 be provided to the following groups whose families

selected or defaulted to the hybrid model? (ASOL SWD 18-22, self-contained SWD 18-22, MATA)

- Should teachers who expressed preference for distance learning, but do not qualify for a leave of absence, be required to teach in-person during Stage 1?
- Should cross-categorical special education teachers who expressed a preference for inperson learning be assigned to teach a self-contained class at their own school if they are licensed and experienced in doing so?
- Should students with disabilities who are eligible for the hybrid model in Stage 1 be assigned to a program at another school if there is not sufficient staff to operate the students' program at their home school?
- Should self-contained teachers who have expressed preference for the hybrid model be assigned to teach the self-contained class at another school of a teacher whose preference is for teaching 100% distance learning?
- Should LCPS focus on creating 100% distance learning schedules for the start of the 20-21 school year?

If these questions are merely meant to spark discussion, than that format is certainly appropriate. And certainly, some of the open-ended questions in the Equity Plan presentation fall into that category. However, for many others, particularly the ones relating to which groups of students would be included in Stage 1, it seems like a reasonable conclusion that you were hoping the board would take an action (either formal or through informal consensus) to provide you with answers to those questions. If that is the case, than I think the Board needs more help in structuring responses to avoid getting into situations like we did last night - Beth having to make up a motion on the spot to have the board vote on joining you in the segregated school apology, and then again later in the night when there were 5+ conflicting motions, some or all made up on the fly, to try and provide board guidance.

What I would propose as a solution is, when appropriate, for options to be presented to the board as alternate board actions rather than open-ended questions. For example (and purely just examples):

Plan A - No students in person during Stage 1

Plan B - MATA in person during Stage 1

Plan C - MATA + ASOL SWD 18-22 + self-contained SWD 18-22 in person during Stage 1

Plan D - MATA + ASOL SWD PreK-22 + self-contained SWD PreK-22 in person during Stage 1 Etc.

While board members could of course choose to deviate from the prepared options, it would at least give us a starting point and help guide the discussion. Combined with staff's efforts to ensure that the presentations are posted on BoardDocs several days before the meeting, this would give board members time to review potential courses of action in a concrete fashion.

As I intend this to be a positive "Board of 10" hope that we can have more focused deliberations in the future during SB meetings, I've blind copied the rest of the board on this email for their information.

School Boards and school district leaders have to genuinely collaborate with the black community, which means recognizing that although they are responsible for the education of all students, if they focus on a major overhaul of policies and systemic structures that have stifled the progress of black children, all children still benefit. Mental health and social emotional learning resources, Restorative Justice, culturally responsive instructional frameworks, and anti-racist curriculum for educators, students, families, and caregivers are essential to authentic equity work. A DEI training here and there and a minuscule equity budget won't cut it. The words "equity" and "inequity" can no longer be used to describe



While this school year will not look like any other in terms of new backpacks and lunchboxes, we continue to move forward with unique ways to meet our community's needs with distance learning.

I want to thank our teachers and administration for many hours of hard work over the summer and their continued commitment to meet the challenges that we will face on September 8th. We understand that the Loudoun Chapter of the NAACP has announced a public Zoom meeting for Tuesday, August 25, 2020, in which they represent that LCPS staff and School Board members will attend regarding matters related to pending litigation with the Attorney General's office. LCPS and the School Board received an invitation to participate in this event over the weekend and the event was announced before LCPS and the School Board responded. Upon the advice of legal counsel, LCPS and the School Board respectfully declined the invitation to attend after the NAACP declined to attend a Closed Session with the School Board to explain their proposals. As early as 2013, LCPS and the School Board created the Discipline Task Force to address student disciplinary proportionality in part, commissioned the Equity Collaborative Report in 2019, and LCPS and the School Board conducted and continue to facilitate equity-specific professional learning for staff to raise racial consciousness and build racial literacy, as well as issuing the multifaceted LCPS Action Plan to Combat Systemic Racism. We recognize the need to continue this important work methodically, yet with a sense of urgency and remain hopeful for an amicable resolution with the NAACP. The School Board remains open to a future closed session with the NAACP.

Amazon founder Jeff Bezos made a rare public appearance at Dunbar High School in Washington, D.C.

When Amazon.com Inc. (NASDAQ: AMZN) met with CodeVA about funding computer science programs in Virginia public schools, the e-commerce and cloud computing giant wanted to know how it could make a significant impact.

<u>Chris Dovi</u>, executive director and co-founder of the nonprofit, which works to make computer science training equitable throughout Virginia's schools, recalls responding, "Double our budget" of about \$1.3 million.

"They asked us to write us a proposal that doubles it," he said. "So that's what we did."

While the nonprofit has partnered previously with corporate giants like Microsoft and Capital One, Amazon's \$3.9 million <u>commitment over the next three years</u> is the single biggest to computer science education in the commonwealth's public school system. And that spending goes into action this school year.

Amazon referred questions on the subject to CodeVA.

The money will be used for programming at about 19 schools. The five with the most students are in Greater Washington — Leesylvania Elementary School and Swans Creek Elementary in Prince William County; Sterling Middle and Sterling Elementary in Loudoun County, and Braddock Elementary in Fairfax County.

Those schools were not selected for their proximity to Amazon's second headquarters in Arlington or its Amazon Web Services hub in Herndon, Dovi said. CodeVA and Amazon Future Engineer, the program from where these funds are coming, have a shared goal of bringing computer science education to students who are least likely to have access to the materials.

About 14 of the 19 schools had a majority student population last year that is considered economically disadvantaged — students receive free or reduced cost meals or their families accept federal assistance like TANF or are eligible for Medicaid — according to the Virginia Department of Education. And about a dozen of the schools had a majority-minority student body.

The students will take part in a 12-month pilot curriculum developed by CodeVA, while teachers will participate in professional development. All of this work has to be taken online because of the pandemic, Dovi said, but the launch will still act as a blueprint for how the program can expand in the following two years.

Dovi said it became very clear in those early meetings with <u>Mathew Wisner</u>, the senior manager for Amazon Future Engineer, that the company was deeply concerned about teachers' professional development. In June, Wisner joined the nonprofit's board.

Virginia's commitment to build a "tech talent" pipeline was a big draw for Amazon as it weighed its HQ2 choices in 2018. The state ultimately committed to fund some 31,000 computer science degrees over the next two decades while Amazon builds its second headquarters. But that pipeline has to start at the grade school level, Dovi said, and it requires teachers who know the material.

CodeVA has offered computer science training in public schools for seven years, well before Virginia Tech's Innovation Campus in Alexandria was pitched to Amazon or the state recognized computer science as a core Standard of Learning in 2016.

Through AWS and its academic arm, AWS Educate, Amazon <u>developed partnerships</u> <u>with several community colleges</u>, high schools and elementary schools in Virginia in the latter half of 2019. The company also has partnerships with George Mason University and Northern Virginia Community College to create four-year bachelor's degree programs focused on cloud computing.

Williams Plans Apology for Past School Segregation

Aug. 28 will mark the 57th year since the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, a landmark demonstration best known for the Rev. Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" speech.

Among the civil rights leader's visions on that day was that "my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character."

Next Friday, on the anniversary of that speech, Loudoun Public Schools Superintendent Eric Williams plans to issue a formal, public apology that it is taking so long to make that dream come true. Specifically, Williams, joined by the School Board and possibly other county leaders, plans to apologize for Loudoun's history of segregation that included keeping Black and white

students in separate schools for more than a decade aft er the U.S. Supreme Court's Brown v. Board of Education opinion made that illegal.

Williams said the statement also will apologize for the School Board—at the time comprised of members appointed by the Board of Supervisors—that agreed to build a high school for Black students only after families bought the land for the school giving it to the county. The families paid \$4,000 for the property that became the Douglass School in Leesburg; the School Board paid them \$1.

During last week's meeting, the School Board voted unanimously to join Williams in issuing the statement. Members also asked that the Board of Supervisors be provided the opportunity to join the event.

"This is something very important to our community. There is a lot of truth that we continued to operate segregated schools after it was ruled we should not," said Beth Barts (Leesburg), adding it was important to acknowledge that happened and then move forward in good faith.

The symbolic event is part of the school district's broader anti-racism initiative that has already removed a Confederacy-inspired mascot at Loudoun County High School and restructured admission procedures for the Academies of Loudoun, and also will revamp classroom curricula and expand teacher training and recruitment efforts.

Dear Dr. Williams and School Board Members:

First of all a big "Thank you" for all your efforts in serving during this difficult/challenging times!

We want to bring to your attention some major issues/concerns with distance learning and recommended solutions to consider.

I request you as a Parent of 4 Students in all levels (High School to Elementary Schools), as a spouse of an amazing LCPS High School Teacher for 7+ years and as LCPS well-wisher serving 10+ years volunteering in various capacities including PTO President, MSAAC representative etc.

Issues/Concerns with Distance Learning:

- 1. <u>Technical Issues:</u> The Schoology and Google-Meet has CRASHED Multiple times for the Teachers and Students in the past few days.
- 2. <u>Safety/Security Issues</u>: Anonymous people/students are able to join the Googlemeet with no restrictions.
 - Some interrupt the class, but some stay quietly and spy/learn from good teachers. This is a major safely/security concern since strangers are getting into our homes/living rooms when our teachers teach from home and some disrupt the class.
- 3. <u>Poor Quality Education:</u> The distance learning with reduced hours of synchronous learning, forces the teachers to limit/reduce the subject contents and teach Science with No hands-on labs which makes the education quality very inferior.
 - This is a major issue for our High School students taking multiple AP classes. With the Google-meet working so slow/bad, teachers have to spend about 15 minutes just to take attendance each block.
 - Some teachers end up just entertaining the students (to feel good) rather than teaching the education contents.
- 4. <u>Setup to Fail:</u> The Teachers and students feel that they are Setup by LCPS to fail this year since they are not equipped fully for 100% distance learning. Our Seniors had to go to West Virginia this summer to take their SAT exams.
 - It is heartbreaking to hear a 5th grader saying that he wants to repeat 5th grade again so that he can learn good in-person next year.
 - All the teachers are doing their best, but frustrated with the limitations/technical issues/Schoology/Google-meet issues.
- No Integrity: Assessments in Schoology is not working. So it is hard for the teachers to assess the students and unfortunately it enables some students to cheat in their tests/assignments.
- 6. <u>Asynchronous learning issue:</u> Some of the Students are not motivated in distance learning and unfortunately engage in other Social media/Netflix sites etc. than focusing on educational sites during asynchronous learning.
- 7. No Equity: There is no equity in this distance learning option for some teachers

and students.

For example, For Science teachers handling AP & DE, are overloaded/need to work over 12 hours a day for preparation to teach with new tools, but some teachers (with the same salary) have very less work as remote/virtual workers (even able to work second full time job during school hours). Similarly, some poor students are struggling to connect and participate in all the classes.

8. <u>Financial impact for LCPS Families</u>: Most families like ours had to spend hundreds of dollars to buy new Computes/Network/Internet upgrade etc. for spouses(LCPS Teacher) and Kids (Students) so that they can survive to run all the required Applications/tools without crashing.

Sadly, our Students/Children will have Major setbacks/impact in their Academic and Social life as they are forced with the distance learning option.

We can understand this are difficult challenges/issues, but there are some solutions we can come up with, when we collaborate and work together!

Recommended Solution:

- 1. For the Students/Parents who prefer in-person/hybrid learning, please consider opening the school just for half day (say from 8am 12 noon) with 4 blocks (60 minutes) everyday (Mon Fridays A & B days). The Students can do Asynchronous learning in the afternoon (going back home for lunch in the afternoon).
- 2. The Students/Parents who prefer distance learning can stay at home and participate along with the in-person learning students as the teacher teaches from the School (which is fully Equipped with fast internet, computer & camera).

Of course, the Social Distancing, recommended hygiene/washing hands/all best practices need to be enforced.

The short work days will help the Schools to be prepared and manage easier without worrying about the lunch time monitoring the social distancing, sanitizing lot of areas etc. This will be of a great benefit for all the Students, Teachers and Parents who prefer in-person learning as well as distance learning, with no schedule change for all five days just a reduced block size on all 5 days of the week.

Hope LCPS Administration will consider all the facts, solutions and recommendations to resolve the issues

and do the best for our Students, Teachers, Admins and Parents!

Dear LCPS Families:

During our first week of school in a virtual learning environment, incidents occurred in several classes in which students joined the virtual environment of another class or school, used a racial slur or displayed inappropriate sexual or racist images. These incidents are contrary to our core beliefs, our commitment to racial equity and other matters of equity as described in the LCPS Equity Statement, and to the expectations we have established for appropriate behavior by students in the virtual environment. LCPS' highest priority is the physical and mental well-being of our students and staff members, and we take these matters seriously. We reject and condemn the use of racial slurs and hate speech and we will not tolerate the display of inappropriate images; this behavior does not reflect our core beliefs.

Although some may believe that it is acceptable to use expressions that are defined as racial slurs as a term of endearment to their friends, LCPS will not tolerate such language in a school environment. The display of sexually explicit and

pornographic images is a violation of our Student Code of Conduct and will also not be tolerated. LCPS will also cooperate with local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies in investigations of computer intrusion, hate crimes, fraud, transmitting threatening communications, disrupting a public meeting, and any other use of an electronic device to commit a crime.

As we adjust to a virtual learning environment, we will continue to teach and encourage positive digital citizenship skills, as well as hold students accountable for their behavior online. Students and parents should familiarize themselves with the Student Code of Conduct and be aware that disciplinary actions are being considered for violations of the Student Code of Conduct, as they would if students were displaying these behaviors in person. Teachers and administrators have been provided resources to prevent and respond to these incidents. Additionally, administrators are continuing to use both the Student Code of Conduct and the LCPS Protocol for Responding to Racial Slurs and Hate Speech when addressing disruptions in distance learning.

We appreciate that these issues may cause concern for parents. We share those concerns, and school administrators are investigating incidents and taking additional steps to help eliminate these types of events from our learning environment. Actions include providing additional guidance and reminders to teachers about how to manage their environment, our expectations for effectively controlling classes, and sharing expectations for behavior with students.

We appreciate parents' and guardians' continued support as we address these issues.

School Board, Superintendent and staff,

I am not one to typically voice my opinion publicly, but over the past 6 months I have watched way too many poor choices be made to stay quiet any longer. The absolute top priority of the Loudoun Public School System is to provide a strong and comprehensive education to every one of its students. This SB, Superintendent and LCPS staff have failed miserably to meet this most fundamental responsibility.

The Superintendent, his staff and the SB members all seem to suffer from a lack of focus and backward priorities. An unreal and unsupported level of effort has focused on anti-racism, white supremacy and systemic racism based on a equity report published by a pro-social justice organization with an inherent bias. To say that there are individual racists who need some level of discipline and accountability, including some students, administrators and teachers, is one thing and fully supportable. The issue is that LCPS is unwilling to look at the root of the problem and thinks that just having organizations such as LEAP will solve the everything. It is more fundamental. As a concerned parent who has spent the past several years volunteering in schools 1-2 days/week to tutor kids in reading, spelling and math, I have see some kids with incredible potential who just don't have any support at home. Some of it is culture and they told me that if they let anyone in their own home or neighborhood know that they want to learn and be smart, they are teased and mocked. A lower minority enrollment in AP classes and ACL isn't due to inherent racism as defined by the Superintendent. It is due to mostly to a lack of immediate support so LCPS needs to focus on the actual source of the problem rather than fabricate a very ineffective and actually harmful fix.

Periodically in the weeks since the decision was made to pivot to 100% distance learning, there have been vague mentions of having administrators look into childcare service options that would allow school and government staffers to stay on the job.

Just a week before families all across the county face that same problem, the county rolled out a special program to address the concern.

Nothing will be perfect as county leaders struggle to respond to the unprecedented and evolving public health threat, but this one raises a number of red flags.

There was no public discussion of the program or its options. County supervisors,

once again, signed off on an important public policy in a completely untransparent way. If this indeed was an emergency that couldn't wait until as scheduled public meeting, supervisors should have followed the lead of the School Board, which gave up much of its traditional summer recess in an effort to work through many difficult decisions. With so many supervisors campaigning on pledges to improve the transparency of our local government, it is baffling to understand how this behavior can be defended. And School Board members would say their public discussions resulted in better decisions. Good government usually works that way.

As for using a couple of libraries for childcare space, someone forgot to consult with either the department director or the public body charged with managing their operation. Have we asked the more fundamental question of whether providing these services to government employees serves a greater public purpose than, say, to low income families, English learners or special education students? Should the same level eff ort have been put in to addressing their needs?

For example, one might ask: What other empty buildings could be available to safely house children in some sort of educational setting? How about our 94 schools? Is it really necessary to close libraries that otherwise would be available to provide similar services families not affiliated with the local government? According to the latest presentations to the School Board, classes could begin next Tuesday with some students set up in school or library parking lots just to get an adequate internet connection—and that was presented as an acceptable outcome even if only for a handful of students. How about setting up a couple of desks in the gym or cafeteria and let them get out of the weather?

As the superintendent has been reminding us, this is not an environment where we're likely to achieve perfection. But, he says, we should strive for progress. There is more progress we can make.

I was looking at the 2020-2021 LCPS Student Rights & Responsibilities and noticed there was no mention of gender identity or sexual orientation in the non-discrimintation section on page 25.

Did you know "Last week, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

(CDC) released the national <u>Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance</u> results for 2019. It's clear from the national data that many LGBTQ young people continue to suffer higher health and suicide risks than their peers. This follows the same trends present in an HRC analysis of the 2015 and 2017 data -- LGBTQ students are more likely to experience victimization, violence and suicidality. In many areas of the data, transgender students are facing more disparities in 2019 than they were in 2017.

The data show that 43% of transgender youth have been bullied on school property. 29% of transgender youth, 21% of gay and lesbian youth and 22% of bisexual youth have attempted suicide."

I spent some time looking over the document and would like to provide some initial feedback.

The Freedom of Expression section should have language regarding hate speech in schools (page 18)

There is no mention of gender identity or sexual orientation in the bullying and harassment section (page 18-19)

The Parent responsibility and involvement section (page 27-28) should contain language that supports and reinforces the Superintendent's statement on Equity

"LCPS calls for all students, staff, families, and other members of our community to engage in the disruption and dismantling of white supremacy, systemic racism, and hateful language and actions based on race, religion, country of origin, gender identity, sexual orientation, and/or ability. LCPS rejects racist and other hateful behavior and language, recognizing that it encourages discrimination, hatred, oppression, and violence."

The Prohibited behavior section (page 28-30) should have a section on hate speech. It should clearly state that it is unacceptable to use humor to cover up racist, discriminatory comments.

The Wellness section (page 39) should reinforce the Equity statement.

Good afternoon Superintendent Williams and Members of the Loudoun County School Board,

Thank you for taking the time to read this email.

As most of you don't know me and as I have never reached out before now, I feel it is best to introduce myself.

I'm a wife, mother of 3, a business owner and consultant and a long-term resident of Loudoun County, Virginia. My children have all attended school in Loudoun County Public Schools, since my first child started at Emerick Elementary in 2002. Over the years I have ensured that my children were well-prepared and willing to participate in school, were respectful of teachers, administrators, and other students, and that they took their education seriously. Two of my children have graduated from Loudoun Valley High School and in June 2021 my last child is set to graduate.

I must be honest, I'm ready for her to be done with this school year and for us to move on. After years of supporting and cheering for Loudoun County Public Schools, I cannot begin to express my disappointment in how things have been handled by each of you, separately and as a group, over the past 3 months. While you may feel that you have had a difficult job during this pandemic, this was the job you signed up for and your lack of a plan and clear lack of professionalism on the part of several board members, is disappointing at best. I'm so disheartened at the one-sided decisions and the message that's being portrayed. This is not ok.

Your lack of response when asked for plans for reopening, the bashing of families who want to return to school (by members of the school board) and the silencing of teachers who also want to return to in-school instruction has gone on long enough. You have put your focus on too many things are once and appear to be avoiding the most important topic of all; a way to return to school now; not at some unknown point in the future.

I have watched as you have listened to those who are happiest living in fear, who are willing to remain at home until there's a vaccine.

But there's always another side and it's time you heard from and listened to the rest of us. There is a way to create a plan to return to school and we need to work together to create it and put it in action.

And if you won't work with those of us who are willing to help, we will do what is necessary to find someone who will. We are your constituents too and as a whole, you represent us all, not just those who live within your election district.

Based on your recent actions and board meetings, it's clear that you do not have a workable long-term plan for a return to school. Without the possibility of returning to school, for those who want and need it, I fear many will suffer far worse than you and I could ever imagine.

We are 7 days into the new school year, and we are already seeing the following:

- Normally well-adjusted and willing students are breaking down from spending too many hours online trying to learn. How many will unnecessarily suffer anxiety or depression?
 - And we're seeing these same kids demonstrate a lack of interest in learning; like they're just going through the motions.
- Our teachers are left alone to manage online without support and expected to handle hackers and poorly behaved 'children' as if they are IT and Cybersecurity experts.
 - They're beyond stressed which cannot be good for their mental health or their ability to teach clearly and effectively.
 - That carries over to children; those we are all tasked with raising and who are being affected the most.
- And parents of young children (and teenagers as well) are stressed beyond belief trying to manage 2 or 3 kids at a time during their online hours while also trying to figure out how to work to put food on the table.
 - No, not every household in LCPS can afford to have a parent remain at home.

I have seen from my own experiences as a mother and as a physical therapist that children must learn from an early age how to handle themselves and coexist with others. That requires daily interaction with people outside of their usual, and many times, comfortable social circles. When kept in a bubble they wither emotionally and struggle to interact with others who may not be like them. This affects them and prevents them from being a strong and valuable member of society.

The mental and physical well-being of our most vulnerable, those who you've clearly identified as suffering from systemic racism and oppression, depend on schools being open, so they have a safe-haven available to them on a consistent basis.

- Have you ever looked at the 'back-pack buddy system in LCPS? Do you know how many children go hungry any time there's a break from school? Now imagine going hungry for 6 moths straight. Have you personally ever experienced that?
- And while providing meals at the schools is a great idea in an ideal world, how far does the average student travel to school? Do you think that all of those children who are most in need truly have a way to get to local schools to pick up food? Have you considered that the most vulnerable, the ones you are tasked with protecting, most likely don't have a way of accessing your food programs? And since you're not tracking who's coming to get the food, how do you know you're helping those most in need? Or like usual, are there those who have figured out how to abuse the system and you're turning a blind eye to them?
- I've learned a lot about human trafficking this year and how rampant it is in our country. And yet, for many this starts at such a young age and those poor children rely on teachers and other school staff to recognize that something is wrong.
 - In fact, many children become victims of human trafficking while online but you're asking them to be online 100X more now than ever before; with many of the most vulnerable not having supervision at home to prevent something from happening.
- You created internet cafes for those without internet, and yet you expect younger children's parents to sit there with them all day long. What about those parents with multiple children, how are they going to manage both? What about grandparents tasked with watching young children so parents can work.
 - And, while we're on the topic of internet access have you considered that the

same children who are most vulnerable, who likely can't get to schools for the free meal program being offered because their parents are working multiple jobs to survive, won't be able to sit in your internet cafes because their parents are unavailable?

And then there are the daycares. Great idea, poor execution. Again, many cannot afford it
while also not qualifying for the reduced fee option because they 'make too much money'.

Are you truly considering the well-being of all children? Or have you created this elaborate new system out of fear and an unwillingness to take immediate action, be held accountable for making tough decisions, and get kids in school?

Do you see us all? Or do you only see and hear those who supported your decision as "it wasn't an inconvenience to them" and they too cannot see all the children and families who may also live here, but struggle to survive every day?

Added to all of this, have you considered the effects your decisions will have on our society as a whole?

While no one wants to admit it or see it for what it is, school is necessary, not just for the education and betterment of our children. Since the 1960's (at least) our public-school system has supported the economic structure of our country. Without students attending public school during the day, parents cannot work to support their families. When a majority of the population is not working, they are drawing from the local, state, and national tax base, instead of supporting it. With schools closed and parents having to stop working to remain at home, a socioeconomic pillar has been forcibly removed without a workable replacement. And without this pillar there is a gap that will have long-term effects on children, their families, society, and the economy as a whole.

You may see and criticize this as selfish but by not looking at your constituents as a whole, you are discriminating against those most vulnerable, the ones who need this the most.

I truly want to help. I spend my days looking for outpoints in businesses and working to build strategic plans to help owners and their teams take action. With a plan in place, and metrics to guide you, you can take action and achieve the intended product.

When an organization has a plan, emotions are not the driving force, the end product is.

You may wonder why I've shifted topics. Well, with the amount of money that flows into our public-school system it's time you treat it for what it truly is, an organization.

Right now, LCPS is a money burning, inefficient, and poorly managed organization, but it is an organization; because it generates an income, spends tons of money, and it's supposed to have a product.

And, as a tax paying citizen and businesswoman, I'm tired of my extensive tax dollars being wasted and mismanaged by this poorly run organization. I'm tired of closed meetings and unilateral decisions at the expense of the children. And I'm disgusted that there are no metrics for measuring your production and your success or failure. You want to prove you're doing a great job, then prove it! Create real, trackable metrics and stop spending money on wasteful programs!

Because I honestly believe that our school system needs a plan in place, I'm writing to you today

with the hopes that I can educate you on what it takes to run a highly successful organization. I am more than happy to meet with each of you or the group as a whole to offer my services. I don't believe in complaining, I believe in being part of a solution.

In order to turn things around, and build a well-run, well-managed, highly efficient and effective public-school system that would be revered by all across the US, here is what it will take:

- 1. To build a strong, effective, and well-run organization, the first thing you need is to determine and make well-known is the product you are working to achieve.
- 2. Once you know your product, you MUST create a complete *Strategic Plan* to ensure that all areas that directly and indirectly contribute to that product are worked out in a clear and concise plan.
- 3. That will first require your purpose, broad goals and then more specific goals.
- 4. You will also need operational policy to work from. No emotional response is allowed.
- 5. Once that is in place you have your basis from which you work from. And you write specific procedures that clearly note each step and who is responsible for getting it done.
- 6. Your organization MUST have structure and leadership from the top down.
- 7. And everyone MUST have a known metric that directly impacts their contribution to the overall product.

For reference and so there is no misunderstanding created today:

The word 'product' is defined as: "a completed service or object that has exchange value within or outside the activity. Unless it's exchangeable, it's not a product at all". All products MUST be able to be tracked and measured.

The word 'strategic' is defined as follows: "relating to the identification of long-term goals or objectives and the means you will use to achieve them".

'Plan' is defined as: "a detailed proposal for doing or achieving something; decide on and arrange in advance".

'Resources' are defined as: "a stock or supply of money, materials, staff, and other assets that can be drawn on by a person or organization in order to function effectively".

As I mentioned earlier, as part of my position, I look for outpoints within organizations and create strategic plans to follow to get them back running smoothly and effectively. Right now, your actions and inaction are signaling that there are significant outpoints that need to be addressed in the LCPS organization.

No leadership. Leadership starts from the top down and works to make fair and equitable decisions for the greater good of all involved. To define <u>ALL</u> for you: it's not just teachers, or students; it includes families, businesses, and the economy as a whole. You no longer appear to be working off the survey you sent out in June that asked for feedback from your district. You have veered so far off that original plan, it's frightening. This alone has created a feeling of distrust by many hardworking, normally supportive people.

No long-term plan. With each board meeting, I have watched as you discussed other topics that

weren't working toward any specific product or goal. Each meeting brings some new idea, some new policy, but you still have not addressed the most important of issues, the return to school plan. It appears as if it's such a huge undertaking, you don't know where to start, so you're avoiding it.

No metrics. There were no clearly defined metrics for WHY you withdrew the hybrid option or why you did not offer in-school 5 days per week for those who wanted it. You just keep saying, 'until it's safe'. Who decides when it's safe? What metrics do you need? Do you think that even with a vaccine that this is going to magically disappear? And now, there are no clear metrics for when in-school will be an option. It's as if you've given up.

No communication. You have clearly ignored one half of your constituents through your lack of response to emails and contacts. Your decisions are unilateral, and it appears to many that you have your own, constantly changing agendas. This is not ok, and it does not instill confidence. It makes many of us question your competence to lead this organization and to ensure your focus is on those who are most vulnerable, those YOU chose to represent – ALL children within LCPS, not just your district.

Added to this, you have not reached out or responded to those who want to know the plan for getting kids back in school. And thus, you are not working fairly nor equitably for the greater good of all involved. To add insult to injury, some of you have chosen to fight openly with county residents when they question you. Not all of us are rude, crazy, or so angry we can't see straight. Many of us need and want answers. And we don't deserve your rude and ignorant responses. We deserve your respect as tax paying constituents of Loudoun County, VA.

For your own reference, when you communicate with your constituents, you build trusting relationships. When you say to someone, you are "not my constituents, I don't have to answer to you" this demonstrates unprofessionalism and incompetence and a lack of caring. I get many of you have been attacked, and believe me, I would not appreciate that either. But part of your responsibility as a representative, is to communicate effectively and respectfully and not treating us all as if we are crazy or evil for questioning the current status quo.

Questionable unethical decisions. This one is the one I am most concerned with and you should note that this is what finally made me reach out to each of you, the VA Board of Education, The Governor's Secretary of Education, the US OIG, and Betsy Devos.

As a parent and a taxpayer (both private and professional), I am concerned that my tax dollars are not being spent as they are intended. I have spent countless hours on the Virginia Department of Education's website trying to find statutes and updated information on the 2020-2021 instructional and school attendance requirements. Because I could not find any relevant codes that clearly lay out what is required of public school regarding 2020-2021 funding, I have requested assistance from state and federal officials. Here are the pertinent questions I have asked and my overall concern.

Since the start of the 2020-2021 school year I have noticed LCPS' strong push for good attendance in September and it has made alarm bells go off.

What does attendance in the month of September count toward?

Does this affect funding for public schools? Is it tied to State or Federal Funding of a public-

school system? Is this tied to the money a Public-School System receives toward hiring teachers? Toward teachers benefits. Is there some other financial gain for high attendance in the month of September.

My concern stems from the fact that prior to this pandemic, our students went to school 5 days per week – our high school students were in class from roughly 9:15am – 3:55pm daily.

Attendance was taken in school and as a result, schools received credit for students being present because in theory, while they were there, it was understood that they were receiving direct instructional time with an educator.

As we have begun the 2020-2021 school year, our children are only scheduled to have direct instructional time from Tuesday through Friday (and they go 6 days before ever having the same class again). Each day they are online participating in distance learning, they receive at most 4 hours of instructional time for high school students and then 88 additional minutes per day of "learning lab" (22 min at the end of every block).

Students 'can' reach out to a teacher on Mondays or work in small groups 'if needed'. But unless they actively choose to meet with a teacher, there is **no instructional time** on Mondays.

- So, does this lack of instructional time on Mondays legitimately count toward state mandated hours of instructional time? And if so, how is it relatable?
- How is it not unethical and/or fraudulent to have students log in and mark themselves as 'in attendance' when in fact no teaching or active instruction is occurring on Mondays?
- This is counting someone as present when they are not. Kids working alone at home is like the past when they did homework at home after hours. The schools did not get credit then and should not get credit now.
- And if this is tied in any way to school funding, this is not only unethical, it is fraud. (No ethical organization would ever take money without doing the work. That would be theft and we would likely be jailed.)

To be clear, I'm not writing this for my daughter, as my husband and I will make sure that she has everything she needs to have an amazing senior year and to succeed in life. I have no doubt that she will succeed based on her hard work and determination. But if she is struggling without the structure, mixed social interaction and support she finds at school, can you imagine how bad it is for many who don't have her level of support at home?

Yes, there has been a pandemic, but there's a much larger one coming at the expense of our children's education and well-being, and the current effects this nightmare is having on good teachers who want to return but can't speak up for fear of retribution. I fear that the long-term effects that our children will suffer from remaining at home long-term will far outweigh the worries we currently have over this pandemic.

I would appreciate your assistance in this matter and your consideration of my thoughts and concerns as well as a response.

At this point, it's time that we take action together to help those most in need. I am happy to sit down and discuss what I have written here today and I'm willing to be a part of creating a solution.

I make this offer because I have a personal and professional policy that you never lodge a complaint without the willingness and ability to contribute.

We have been very attune to teacher feedback regarding features they need to have more control over their virtual learning room. In response, we have been in close contact with Google regarding the deployment of new features and we have been looking at different extensions to expand controls for teachers including attendance. All extensions go through a series of testing to ensure compatibility. Many extensions are not fully supported so they can be very glitchy. The Grid extension was decommissioned over the summer and replaced with a feature within Google Meet. Each Google Meet allows for up to 49 people to be visual at one time. Related to the two primary Attendance extensions, neither give real-time views which is what we are hearing teachers want to have to quickly identify students who should not be in the class. A more detailed list of features we are evaluating and could possibly take action on as early as this week is on page 31 of today's COVID-19 Update.

From the beginning our Google environment was designed to prohibit the most severe infractions and nearly all of happens completely behind the scenes. Our Google Meets, only allow authenticated users to access a Meet. This means that a student cannot use a fake Gmail account and access the Meet. All external users are immediately sent to a lobby and must be admitted into the room by the teacher. Additionally, students cannot spoof (mask) their names. The students official name is used and displayed. You may have seen teachers refer to giving Meets, "nicknames". This is an important element because when the teacher (host) leaves the Meet, the Meet room closes permanently. It is also important that teachers are the last ones left in the Meet. EdTech provided training last spring and this summer that explained much of this information including how to setup a Meet. I can reach out to DOI and get more details about the training if you'd like.

In the first week of school we had a rash of incidents occur. Many of the incidents were done by a single student. Because of the items list above, the student was identified and disciplinary action was taken last Friday. DDI has the ability to generate a fairly robust report for each Meet. DDI works closely with school administration and Dr. Patterson to conduct discipline investigations.

In the event at Potomac Falls incident referenced in the article, the user used an external email address to mask their identity. The user attempted to gain access to the Meet. Google recognized them from not being an authenticated user and placed him/her in the lobby. The teacher despite not having a student by that name enrolled in class and knowing the user was not using an LCPS account, let the user enter the room. This event was reported to local, state, and federal law enforcement.

A look at the opening days of virtual learning in Loudoun County

One would be putting it mildly to say the COVID-19 health crisis caught Loudoun County Public Schools — and most school systems around the country — off guard.

"At the end of last year with all of the online learning, it was all asynchronous learning, which made it extremely difficult," Heritage High School junior TJ D'Onofrio told the Times-Mirror. "We didn't get a lot of hands-on learning."

Hands-on learning was just one of many customary elements of an LCPS education that were forfeited when Gov. Ralph Northam (D) in March ordered all Virginia schools closed for the rest of the year: Students did not receive fourth-quarter grades; sports fields and the bleachers that surround them were left empty; high school juniors and seniors stayed home on what would have been prom night; and graduates were only able to bring five family members to watch them receive their diplomas.

After the Loudoun County School Board voted in July to continue full-time distance learning for the fall, teachers, parents and students alike had less than a month and a half to prepare for the 100 percent virtual classroom environment, whether that meant setting a Web-friendly curriculum, ensuring quality Internet access, arranging and rearranging work schedules so the kids would not be alone, or finding or creating a suitable study space.

For 17-year-old TJ, that study space is a large table in the basement of his Leesburg home, upon which sits his Chromebook, an added monitor, a water bottle and a pile of books. A bulky pair of headphones keeps him tuned into the lecture streaming via Google Meet on the Chromebook screen to his left, while he keeps his notes and other learning materials active on the monitor to his right.

"I'm glad I'm old enough and I can manage myself ... but I can't work in my room," he said. "I think it's great to not be in the same spot that you're sleeping in or that you're having fun in — it's a change of scenery."

Relative to last semester's hurried shift to full-time virtual learning, this fall's return to classes has proven organized and well-structured. With grading and mandatory attendance reimplemented, teachers are able to once again instill LCPS's reputably high-performance standards.

"The classes themselves, the content, seems more organized [than last semester]," said Sallie Hyman, whose son, Tristan Huckabee, is a freshman at Loudoun Valley High School. "The teachers are doing a really good job of getting the kids to understand what's going to be expected of them."

One of the key tactics teachers employ to keep their students engaged with learning via a computer screen is to instill a sense of regularity through a set schedule, something nearly impossible to enforce when learning is asynchronous. After only a week of classes, Connie Digges, whose son, Ian, attends first grade at Round Hill Elementary School, was easily able to recite her son's daily routine.

"They start with a little meeting in the morning," she said. "Sometimes the principal will get on the video and talk to the kids, engage with them. After that meeting, they get a little breakfast break, then they come back to do math for an hour, then they do P.E. ... Some days he'll have art or music. They'll do, like, an hour of reading."

Special education teacher and Loudoun County Supervisor Sylvia Glass noted younger students will likely need a bit more time to adjust to their schedules — after all, teachers are not there to walk children to their next class on time.

"When kids are at home, you're kind of depending on them to go ahead and get on the screen, to be at school on time, to not be tardy and know where to go, so that's the challenge — to get them used to this new way of learning," she said.

With means of synchronous interaction in place, teachers are also more readily equipped to work one-on-one when their students struggle to grasp the material. At the end of TJ's classes, students can get a teacher's help during 20-minute periods called "Learning Labs."

"We can stay on Google Meet with the teacher and we get extra help and we can do the homework with them. It makes it really easy to ask questions," he said. "It's been, obviously, a different experience, but it's a big challenge, and I think every teacher is doing really well in their own way."

There is, of course, a learning curve with online education. Attending class on the Internet means having to acquaint oneself with Schoology, a learning management software with which educators consolidate class files, learning and reading materials, quizzes and tests.

Last year, LCPS employed Edmentum for virtual classroom organization. While

Schoology is an apparent improvement over that software — Hyman called Edmentum "awful," citing its proclivity to boot students from online learning sessions if they remained "inactive" for too long — it still requires teachers, students and sometimes parents to spend some time familiarizing themselves with it.

"[The first day] was a bit nerve-wracking, because I didn't know what to expect," Glass said. "Because I'm not as computer-savvy, it took a lot just to do regular stuff that younger folks are probably used to doing. I think a person my age ... has a few more challenges than someone who uses a computer as their profession or uses it all the time."

Glass expressed her delight at seeing how easily some of her young students adopted the new technology and were able to help their classmates adjust to it.

Digges has also been impressed with lan's guickness to learn.

"I feel like technology with kids these days is not so hard anymore, so all they have to do is mute the microphone when they need to, unmute when they have to — it's been very basic," she said. "Whenever he needs help, he'll let me know."

Though she expressed longing for the day she could teach her students in-person once again, Gina Chaszar, who teaches nearly 170 sixth- and seventh-graders in Mercer Middle School's gifted-and-talented program, said the new online learning environment has made it easier to keep track of and administer equal attention to all of her students.

"I'm never afraid of the number of students I've had to teach, and ... the digital experience has enhanced working with a greater number of students for me," she said.

While being separated by a screen inhibits teachers' ability to form personal relationships with students, Chaszar took a creative approach to "plug in," in her words, with the kids by having them design what their ideal virtual classroom would look like.

As she observed the results, she noticed few children designed their classroom to look like what might typically be found in a brick-and-mortar school — they more often were set outdoors or seemed at home in storybook fantasy worlds. One seventh-grader made her classroom to "be a virtual hug, since we can't hug one another these days," which Chaszar said prompted her to become emotional on camera.

Communication via webcam has led families and faculty to rely heavily on a strong Internet signal, something many residents in western Loudoun lack. In order to speak to the Times-Mirror, Hyman, who lives in Purcellville, had to drive nearly eight minutes to find a strong enough cellular signal — and her family's Internet provider is a cellular-based service.

Though she called the signal "better than we expected," Hyman said Tristan still encounters some difficulties and lag while in class, which can cause particular stress

during his American Sign Language lessons.

"If you miss the teacher doing hand motions for a couple of signs and you don't realize it, or you don't ask them if you miss something, then that could come back to be an issue when it comes time for testing," she said. "I know it's caused [Tristan] a little bit of anxiety: 'What did I miss?' 'Was that an important concept that they talked about while I was gone?' We'll see how it keeps going."

As Hyman noted, LCPS families are able to apply to receive one of a limited number of wireless Internet hotspots — a device which, for Digges and her son, has been "working out great" — but they likely will not do much for families living in areas with poor cellular coverage.

"I think it's probably common knowledge that we wish we had better Internet service in western Loudoun. That would make it easier for all of the kids who are trying to get through this," she said. "But [Internet providers] won't run cable to us because they say it's just not economically profitable for them."

For TJ, who also takes ASL, being in a more Internet-friendly part of the county does not guarantee a total lack of hiccups. However, his teachers have shown him and his classmates a considerable amount of grace.

"The Internet's definitely had an issue or two, but we've worked through it and I've emailed my teachers afterward," he said. "I've said, 'Hey, I'm sorry, my Internet cut out.' They've obviously been very understanding; they've sent me anything that I've missed and they've been very helpful."

As for activities outside school, TJ said some of his usual extracurriculars — ASL club, theatre and improv — have yet to determine how they will continue to meet virtually, though he is able to participate in Student Council Association meetings during third block. School sports are not scheduled to be in full swing until December, though TJ and his fellow athletes are still working hard to stay conditioned before competitions resume.

"I'm really hoping high school sports come back in the winter," he said. "I'm hoping COVID will slow down enough or we get a vaccine soon, but right now for offseason stuff, cross country is meeting once or twice a week where we are all socially distanced — we wear masks. Soccer is not doing anything right now, but I'm playing travel soccer and I'm training as best as I can."

Though most of today's schoolchildren were already well versed in online communication before the pandemic, many have since made it perhaps the most essential part of their social lives, interacting with their peers through video chat, video games and instant message far more often than through in-person gatherings. And while going to school is perhaps less of a hygienic or temporal hassle now than it was before COVID-19 hit, the classroom is yet another public forum and interactive space that kids have had to give up for the time being.

"I just look forward to getting to Heritage safely, hopefully sometime soon, but

obviously no one has an exact date or anything, but hopefully sometime in the next semester or two," TJ said. "I definitely miss big gatherings with my wider group of friends, but obviously we have to take it slowly and safe."

As Chaszar noted, teachers also feel safety should be the top priority, but many are feeling more similarly to their students than they might realize — that online lectures, instant messages and "virtual hugs" simply cannot replace the real thing.

"There's a difference between seeing one another on the computer and seeing them in the same room," she said. "Just being in a classroom full of kids has a special magic about it. You can't get that online."

A letter to the officials at Loudoun County Public Schools.

I hope you read this entire letter. I know that at the end of it, some of you might feel some empathy, sadness, or guilt, but the next week it'll be out of your mind. <u>Some</u> of you will simply go back to the privileged lives and ignorant mindsets you have because you've never had to face the ingrained racism in this county. <u>All</u> of you should prove me wrong.

I don't speak on behalf of all the students or people of color in LOCO. I'm just sharing my perspective on the area and school district I grew up in all my life. I grew up in Ashburn and now that I've graduated and am attending a more diverse university, I've realized how racist this place is.

To put it into perspective the best I can, I'm going to share with you some of the racism myself and other students of color had to face while attending public schools in Loudoun, and how going to teachers for help was oftentimes useless and not a reliable option we had.

Throughout elementary, middle, and high school, I've been called the names of other Asian students. I can't even begin with how disrespectful and degrading that is. There are maybe ten other Asian students in my grade at all times and hundreds of white students. Asians look alike, sure, but so do white people. My teachers couldn't even distinguish between me and other Asian kids that I look nothing like. I'm talking drastic height differences, different hair lengths, different skin tones. They never mixed up white students, though, isn't it funny how that works? I know some instances were real slips of the tongue, but most times, it was due to the ignorance and ingrained, subconscious racism in them. Maybe they were great teachers and nice people, but that doesn't excuse their racism or disrespect. In elementary school, other Asian students and I would roll our eyes and laugh at how they mixed us up. Do you know how sad that is? We laughed at how we were being disrespected because we didn't know better. We were treated as less than the white students, unworthy of being remembered by our names, and thought we were too. Now, I know better. My name holds much of my identity. Calling me the right one is the bare minimum. Call me by the right name or don't call on me at all.

I can't tell you the number of times people have said to my face "she's smart because she's Asian," said "ching-chong-ding" as I walked by, been called "May Ling," or have kids pull their eyes at every chance to mock me. I don't care if these kids were young and "just kids." When kids are young, they're at their most influential state. If they think it's funny to be racist when they're in elementary school, they for sure will think it is years later too. I know this because it's the same people that have been racist throughout my K-12 experience. There is no way none of my teachers didn't hear them say those things to me in the hallways ALL twelve years of public school. Not once did I hear a teacher reprimand a student for being racist. I can assure, however, that if I had said to a white kid "Oh look at me, I'm white and racist! I live with privilege and eat bland tasting food! My ancestors were slave owners and colonizers!" a teacher would report me, and I'd be explaining to my mom what I said in the principal's office right away. I'm not telling you to change the behaviors of kids, because that's not your job. I'm telling you the system LOCO public schools operate on right now encourages such behaviors and allows people to uphold a racist environment.

A more specific racist experience occurred during my senior year of high school in class when a white male student sitting behind my friend (who is also Asian) and I told us Chinese is the ugliest language and made random noises like "ching, chong, ding, ping, ling." My friend started crying. Some of our friends sitting around us started yelling at him for being racist, but not once did my teacher speak up. He looked up, asked

my crying friend, "Are you okay?" and that was it. Are you okay... are you okay??? A student was just told her language was ugly and made fun of in a racist way and you're asking if she's okay? I'm not going to explain how shameful that teacher's response to the situation was because that should obvious.

Recently, Loudoun County schools were put on blast because social media accounts were created for the sole purpose of exposing the racist behaviors of students. To you, it was a bad week for publicity and the reputation of LOCO public schools. In the long run, you all know it won't hurt the system because it's backed by the parents of those racist kids and LOCO's population has a white majority. Being racist is the status quo here. To many students of color, however, it was a day we had been waiting for for years. The people who had humiliated us were finally being outed. We were holding racist students accountable, something most of our teachers didn't.

Systems of oppression in this country are durable and tend to reinvent themselves. I know change doesn't happen overnight. My purpose in writing this letter is to show you how humiliated POC students feel in LOCO. If this letter feels like an attack, it shouldn't. Accountability only feels like an attack when you're not ready to acknowledge how your actions and behavior harms others. Equality feels threatening to people who feel there will be less for them, less privilege, less comfort. I hope you feel uncomfortable. You see what's happening in the news. We see what's happening here. The Equal Opportunity For Equitable, Safe, and Inclusive Environment act does nothing if it's not being upheld in every aspect of the system.

I urge you to create a better space for the students in this county because a six-year-old person of color should never hate the way she looks from students making fun of her eyes and teachers letting them. A nine-year-old person of color should never have to tell her teacher she called her the wrong name again despite it being halfway through the year. A twelve-year-old person of color should never feel unwelcome in a class full of white students. A seventeen-year-old person of color should never have to console her friend because an ignorant white boy was racist. I should not have to write this letter to urge you to create an anti-racism school environment. I don't want to hear back words of empathy and I don't need a reply to this letter/e-mail either. I just want you to see how POC students have suffered in the system you uphold. Lack of action and change shows you don't care about students of color and are therefore undeserving of the jobs you have.

"In a racist society, it's not enough to be non-racist, you have to be anti-racist."

Provide students of color with a school environment they feel comfortable in as much as white students do.

Hello,

I am a Loudoun county resident of nearly 6 years and mother of two Loudoun County students.

I attended last week's school board meeting via zoom and to be frank, it was my first time attending. It's important to me, as the mother of sons who are Black, and as a Black woman, to understand the School Board and the County's position on the matter of systemic racism.

During a time of incredible racial tension, action is more important than ever. I have as much gratitude that I am living through a time of real change within this country as I have disappointment in the history that continues to linger its way into the present.

To say I was disappointed in the items addressed during topic 7.05 would be a gross understatement. I was embarrassed that a school system that has been nationally revered for its quality of education... can fall so short of the mark in addressing an important issue that impacts our children.

Instead of addressing policy change (LCPS is dedicated to teaching REAL events of the past so that ALL students can have a better understanding of what SYSTEMIC RACISM actually is), I felt the board was mostly silent... which echoed very loudly to those viewing the stream and discussing privately during the live feed. There are many parents who share my disappointment and we are largely silenced or ignored. The mascot is one very small issue; we need your attention on bigger priorities:

- curriculum improvements
- racial bias training
- no tolerance policy for racist words, behavior and/or racially motivated practices that disenfranchise and target a specific group of invididuals.

Following the school board meeting held via zoom earlier this week, I engaged with Beth Barts about her position during the "combatting systemic racism" portion of the session. This interaction occurred via her public official LCPS board member page, which she subsequently deleted the next morning. I did take screenshots of the exchange. Has there been a discussion with her publicly contradicting the board's commitment to combat systemic racism?

If it is truly a priority to LCPS and LCSB, why was this agenda item listed at the end of the meeting? Are you aware that at the height of streaming there were nearly a thousand people watching the meeting; by the time the board finally reached agenda item 7.05 (around 10:30 at night), there were less than 700 viewing. This topic is important and should be prioritized so that the message is heard by the largest number of Loudoun residents/parents.

This country has not made amends for its ugly history... and it doesn't matter that those of us living in present day may not be PERSONALLY responsible for the ugliness of the past, we all have a duty to do better going forward. I'd like to share a quick anecdote to support and summarize my point:

Dear Madam Chair, School Board Members and Administration,

I am writing in my capacity as SEAC Chair to share my significant concerns with the extreme actions and measures taken by the Department of Pupil Services to undermine the special education community's concerns, as well as the SEAC and the SSS Committee's recommendations on Policy 5310.

The changes recommended to Policy 5310 by the Reed-Smith Law firm completely restricts the collaborative and equitable process outlined in SEAC and the SSS Committee's recommendations allowing IEP amendments without a meeting. LCPS is now proposing changes to the policy that would allow school administration to create amendments, attempt to obtain parent input and **NOT** require the document to be presented to the parent(s)/guardian(s)/adult student in their communication mode as required for informed parent consent and Prior Written Notice per IDEA. SEAC's recommendation for Item 4 was intended to ensure parent(s)/guardian(s) are able to fully understand the amendment document (considering no meeting has occurred) and are able to fully participate discussions relating to the IEP amendment before providing informed consent.

LCPS suggesting that parents complete the ADA access form 5 days in advance of the "event" to provide them access to documents that are required under IDEA is very concerning. There is no meeting, therefore, there is no "event"- only an amended document. Providing documents in a parent's mode of communication as noted above is required by IDEA before requesting a parent to provide informed consent. This language aligns with the requirements for the LEA to provide prior written notice in a parent's native language or communication mode.

While LCPS states the county is very focused on providing an equitable education experience to all children, it appears the equity lens is not being applied equally to all groups of students. Clearly the proposed changes were not considered or equitably envisioned. SEAC does not support the proposed changes by Reed-Smith as further detailed in the attached document.

Given the level of confusion over the Prior Written Notice, I have attached a copy of the VDOE Guidance on PWN's with relevant areas highlighted for convenience (pages 1, 2, and 4 have pertinent language).

SEAC stands ready to work collaboratively with LCPS, please let me know if you have any questions or if I can be of further assistance. I fully understand IDEA and IEP language can be very confusing.

Good evening,

Below you will find summaries of updates from each department that has an update to share. There may also be links or associated attachments included.

Office of the Superintendent (includes Chief of Staff and School Board Attorney)

- 1. My schedule today included the following appointments, among others:
 - Cabinet and Rob Doolittle met again today to collaborate on COVID-19 and other matters.
 - Participated, along with Nyah Hamlett, Ashley Ellis, and Asia Jones in a bi-weekly webinar for Virginia Division Superintendents hosted by Dr. James Lane.
 - Joined a small group discussion with Principals.
 - Participated in a meeting of the Governor's Cross System Policy Alignment Subcommittee.
- 2. This note is particularly confidential as a personnel matter. Yesterday's Update included information regarding our preferred candidate for Director, Elementary Education. I received an email with concerns regarding the preferred candidate from two School Board members. I have reached out to each of these two Board members to provide additional information and to offer to discuss the preferred candidate further. If any other Board members have concerns, please let me know by 5 p.m. tomorrow.

I've attached an email from Ashley Ellis in which she provides additional information regarding the interview process, including information about the professional experience of the interviewed candidates. She notes that the preferred candidate's non-teaching experience includes 4 years of experience as an elementary school principal, 3 years of experience as an assistant principal, 4 years of experience in central office and special program leadership, and 2 years of experience as an instructional coach. The four years of experience in central office and special program leadership, as well as 2 years of experience as an instructional coach, were viewed as key assets by the interview committee. (p. 1)

According to School Board Policy 7302, "All full-time permanent employees must be appointed by the School Board upon recommendation of the Division Superintendent." This phrase includes two key parts: a recommendation by the Division Superintendent and an appointment (via approval of a personnel action) by the School Board.

It may also be helpful for me to elaborate on my purpose in providing information to the School Board regarding preferred candidates for select positions, such as principals and directors. A key purpose is to provide the opportunity for a dialogue between individual School Board members and me before School Board action on recommendations I set forth for new hires or transfers. In addition to providing the information in the preceding paragraph to Board members, I have invited the two Board members who expressed concern to speak individually with me by phone (I'd try to include Ashley Ellis as well) to ask any questions they have or express additional details about concerns so that I have the opportunity to provide additional information. Another purpose of providing the School Board with information regarding preferred candidates is that the preferred candidates sometimes announce their likely departure to their school or division communities on the day before or the day of our School Board meeting so that their communities do not learn of the individual's possible departure from their current position from a source other than the individual. The practice of preferred candidates making public announcements before School Board action is a common one across school divisions.

- 3. Business & Financial Services (BFS) and Human Resources & Talent Development (HRTD) collaborate closely on many matters, including managing positions (position control), employee pay, and employee benefits. The pandemic has highlighted functions that resided in BFS that would be better based on HRTD. In order to promote efficiency and effectiveness, we are shifting several responsibilities and six related staff positions from BFS to HRTD. These include employee leave administration, the disability program, ADA compliance, and workers comp. Additional details are provided in the attached email from Sharon Willoughby. (p. 2)
- 4. LCPS plans to use grant funds from the Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI) to fund the **creation** of a 1.0 Level Up teacher for Sterling Middle School for the 2020-2021 school year. This teacher will plan, design, implement and assess an instructional program that guides and encourages a diverse group of students. The attached memo and job description provides additional details. (pp. 3-7)
- 5. We received confirmation today that the meeting that Chair Randall is facilitating between Secretary Qarni, a few members of the LCPS community, LCPS School Board members and Administration is confirmed for Tuesday, July 14th at 1:00 p.m. Chair Randall indicated that she shared several stipulations with Missy Hillenbrand, the LCPS parent contact for the "Open Loudoun Schools" Facebook group For your awareness, they are as follows:
 - No more than 10 members of that group would be on the call with him;
 - The School Board members and School Administration would (could) be on the call;
 - There needed to be at least three parents who DON'T want the schools to reopen in the fall;

- Chair Randall will ask Dr. Goodfriend on the call to answer medical questions;
- Chair Randall will not express any opinion, or even talk except to start and end the conversation; and
- The Secretary will answer questions, however he will not contradict LCPS Administration staff.
- The County is setting up the virtual meeting. LCPS staff will ensure that the meeting is posted on the FOIA calendar and LCPS web calendar. Please let Nyah Hamlett know if you have any questions.
- Staff plans to announce a virtual town hall that will take place in early July for all LCPS stakeholders. I am also considering hosting a separate town hall for LCPS staff. More information will be forthcoming regarding the community town hall.
- 7. Now that we are transitioning into the summer and the Board and staff have resumed communicating via email, including communication via email regarding matters related to COVID-19 and return to school plans, staff plans to discontinue the use of the LCSB Questions document. The document will continue to be available for reference HERE.

Good afternoon. I am a Loudoun resident in the Dulles district and the parent of two LCPS students. I am writing today to share with you some of my concerns about current plans for reopening schools in Fall 2020 as presented to and by the School Board.

100% In-School Learning

As I understand it from board documents this option is not currently under consideration for Phase 3 of Virginia's re-opening plan. I am aware of a vocal minority of parents that are pushing for this option for Fall 2020, no matter the cost (financial or human). Without a significant change in the LCPS operating budget 100% in-person learning is not feasible within the best practices of experts and the guidelines put forth by the state. I do not believe it is appropriate for LCPS to disregard the guidance of public health officials and the state government in making decisions about opening public schools.

Hybrid Model

Initially I thought the hybrid model might provide the best of both worlds however upon further reflection and discussion, particularly with LCPS teachers, I believe the hybrid model will not provide a quality education for our children and seriously over-work our teachers. Here are a few thoughts/scenarios that illustrate some of my concerns:

- My daughter will be a senior in the Fall of 2020 at Freedom HS. She is a high-achieving student who is taking seven AP classes next year. Because she has reached the highest levels in the subjects she has studied many of her classes can only be taught by one or two teachers at FHS. For example, she is planning to take AP German and AP 3D Art and Design (two subjects where she has been recognized by LCPS and the VDOE). What happens if the AP German teacher decides to commit to the 100% Distance Learning model and the AP 3D Art and Design teacher commits to the Hybrid model? Will my daughter be forced to choose a model of learning based upon which classes are available to her in each model? Will we even know which classes will be offered in each model before she needs to decide? Perhaps LCPS will suggest she simply drop those courses but it is not hyperbole to be concerned that her schedule could be whittled down to AP Government and AP English as they are the only two classes required for her to graduate. How is this equitable?
- If this Spring showed us anything it was that truly effective online teaching is not the same as classroom teaching. In the hybrid model LCPS is asking our teachers to produce their curriculum in two very different mediums. When exactly are they going to have time for that within their contracted day? If they are in-person teaching four days per week are we actually expecting them to plan in-person learning plus high quality asynchronous learning in one day per week? It seems to me this will play out in two ways: some teachers will likely plan and produce content as if they are teaching in the 100% Distance Learning model (even though they are actually teaching in the Hybrid model) and on in-person days students will sit at their physically-distanced desks with their chrome books and the teacher will just be there to keep them focused and behaving; other teachers will focus their planning efforts on their in-person days and then on asynchronous days provide students with worksheets, canned videos, and already produced content (exactly what "didn't work" for many students last Spring). How is this providing a quality education for our students?
- Will there be guidelines about appropriate exposure risk for LCPS staff? Will there be some kind of mechanism for people to report "violations" to those guidelines? What will be the public's responsibility for reporting risky behavior by LCPS staff? Presently I know of two households with students that traveled to beach week that also contain teachers. I know of a teacher that went to beach week themselves and that multiple members of their group have tested positive for COVID-19. What if that teacher chose not to self-quarantine or report, would I be responsible for alerting the principal of their school? Even worse what happens when students see their peers

bragging on social media that "you know your beach trip was great when everyone is positive" and "worth getting covid" and then show up at school or LCPS events? Will our students be required to report their peers? I have significant concerns that parents, in particular, will feel empowered to police LCPS staff and students for exposure and that privacy rights will be violated. How is this creating an environment of community care?

100% Distance Learning

I think it is obvious that no group is particularly enthusiastic about our students participating in 100% distance learning, however I think we all know that we are likely going to have additional complete school closures next academic year, Given the very limited amount of time LCPS staff have to prepare for these unprecedented circumstances it seems to me that time would be best spent in creating the most robust 100% distance learning model as possible. If LCPS pursues a 100% distance learning model for typical students it would allow space (both physically and mentally) for staff to tackle some of the important issues facing special needs and ELL students as well as teachers with elementary aged students or technology/access related issues. Perhaps certain students with needs would be able to attend school multiple days per week, perhaps mental health specialists could be available at school buildings for scheduled individual or physically distanced small group activities, perhaps groups like clubs and sports could still gather in the school building with physically distant measures in place for their meetings and practices, perhaps certain classes that require hands-on learning could still meet in a physically distanced way inside the school building, perhaps PRCS could provide a CASA like daytime program in school buildings for the elementary aged children of teachers, perhaps teachers with technology/access issues at their homes could spend a portion of their day in their classroom to access the LCPS WiFi to provide online synchronous instruction and receive work from students. I am confident with the knowledge and experience of LCPS staff there can be lots of opportunities to creatively solve the issues and continue to provide quality instruction to our students.

These are exceptionally challenging and unprecedented times and I think that it's important for all LCPS stakeholders to acknowledge that our normal education solutions are not going to fit these highly abnormal circumstances. But I also believe that LCPS is uniquely equipped to devise new solutions that can have positive impacts on students now and in the future. I encourage the school board, superintendent, and staff to challenge the conventional thinking, consider options outside the box, engage local partners, and to view all potential solutions through the lenses of equity and quality of education. I really appreciate your tireless work on this herculean task, especially when faced with attacks on social media and in the press. Please know that, while loud, those voices do not speak for all or even most of LCPS stakeholders.

Dear Dr. Williams,

Thank you for the hard work, study and planning you have put into the resolution which was reached last night during the school board meeting.

I am the parent of a rising black senior at Potomac Falls High School. In addition to a stellar academic record including Honors, AP and DE classes, my senior is an accomplished swimmer. She is a Potomac Falls record holder and has participated in the State Championships since her Freshman year. She has been a Potomac Valley Scholar Athlete for the last three years. She was recently elected to be Vice President of the National Honor Society, she is in Science National Honor Society and Spanish Honor Society, she is active in the African American Student Union and is involved in a number of other community service and club activities. We are currently engaged in pre-reads for early decision admission and financial scholarships and awards with Williams, Amherst, Washington & Lee, Grinnell, Middlebury and Swarthmore.

I watched the entire meeting last night. While it is important for the process of reopening to move forward on a schedule that can meet an opening date, there is absolutely NO way that a parent in my position or in any of the many circumstances related during the open mike, to make any sort of informed decision as to which plan, hybrid or distance, serves the best interest of a child between now and July 10 without a significant amount of additional personalized information being provided. There also seems to be no meaningful or fair way to address teacher concerns, which is going to result in students in both models being taught by teachers who resent them which is not going to result in a positive outcome for anyone.

During the next scholastic year, my daughter has planned to take 5 AP classes, one independent science research course and is enrolled in Photojournalism as she was anticipating being one of the co-editors of the yearbook. What guidance is going to be provided regarding the content of AP and DE classes in the various models? What courses will still be held and which will not? What classes have been cancelled because the collaborative, lab or other efforts that make it impossible to maintain social distance? Since guidance counselors are all on vacation, who will address revising class schedules, discuss with parents the impact of choices made at this point on college applications? How can AP class instruction at a meaningful level occur in either of the reopening models and is one preferred over the other? Are all courses being offered in both models? My list of questions could go on, and on, but the point is that your plan has not addressed the level of information necessary for parents and students in high school to make any sort of meaningful choice about which plan suits their needs and there are no counselors available to address these issues in the time frame you have set forth.

Your plan also includes little to no student input. My student and her peers are anxious to do something to assist LCPS and the community in providing a positive experience for everyone during

these very challenging times. We do not understand why the administration does not call upon the school honor societies, student unions and future medical professionals to provide input and volunteer to assist with childcare, tutoring, homework assistance, etc. Rising juniors and seniors are innovative thinkers who under your educational plan have learned to collaborate and meld differing viewpoints far better than the adults we see posting their opinions on social media. While it was valuable for me to learn the opinions of various well-heeled educators on CDC guidelines, equity and reopening in the face of the pandemic, I valued just as much the views expressed by the students and young people who spoke last night (although their comments were primarily directed to racism) and would be interested, as you should be, as to what views and concerns our high school students have.

While I appreciate the Board's decision on the Raiders' mascot, I find this to be merely a token gesture. I urge you to take swift action to remedy systemic racism at LCPS. Frankly, it runs rampant at Potomac Falls High School and many of your teachers are seemingly unaware and perpetuate it. I cannot tell you how many times I have observed a group of Caucasian teachers in the hallway, at sports events or at other gatherings who when approached by a black colleague say "Sup Bro" or "Gurl, whats up?" with an accompanying high five gesture. This sort of dialogue is just demeaning. Do you expect to be addressed this way by a professional colleague? This behavior by adults filters down to the children without question. During my daughter's freshman year, for example, she was awarded the "Chantal" award by the other members of the varsity swim team. The award was accentuated with watermelons and "Beyonce" logos. My daughter does not sing, nor does she bear any resemblance to "Chantal," the only other black female member in the memory of other members of the team. This award was presented to her at the end of year banquet, sanctioned by the coach (a prominent science teacher), and in front of an entire room of parents and students. The award followed an entire season during which other members of the team touched my daughter's hair and asked "Are you related to Chantal?" and made statements like "Chantal only liked watermelon she would never eat with us at IHOP." When my family and I brought this to the athletic director's attention and described the humiliation, anxiety and depression my daughter was feeling as a result, he said he would speak to the involved students, but since there is no formal way to report incidents like these, we were never informed if they were educated or disciplined. While I believe the coach was terminated from that position as a result of this incident, she is still teaching in your system with absolutely no re-education or repercussion. Beside the conscious and unconscious subtle racism, there are regular violent incidents at the school. Have you seen them on Instagram and Snapchat? I have. Kids standing around in a circle around an ongoing fight chanting "Kill'em Nigga!" while other students are walking by in order to use a locker room or walk home from school. We all simply must do better than this, and you need to spearhead an immediate accountability and educational plan.

Dr. Williams, I feel like all parties concerned with these issues are looking for you to be more thorough and to do more. Too many questions are unanswered. Parents are left unable to access the implications of the choices we are making on our children's lives without more specificity. Since there is not another Board meeting until July 21, I urge you to provide detailed information to each family so a well thought out selection can be made in the timeframe which has been resolved.

Dear Superintendent Williams and School Board Members,

Thank you all for your your service to our community and our children. Thank you for the 1 minute provided to me and 290 others tonight to talk about COVID return to school issues.

My husband and I have a rising 9th grader at Riverside High School and live in Lansdowne. We are 20 year members of this county.

I am also the daughter of a 30 year public school administrator and take seriously the health of teachers and students. My husband and I both work full time.

I represent a very large group of parents who were extremely disappointed in the lack of instruction which our children received last quarter and the pass/ fail grades which resulted in obscuring the real declination of GPA's.

Our personal experience was watching an honor roll student dive to 3 "F" grades with corresponding levels of depression. We all have the same stories of our students - a fact which is a painful bond. After watching your vibrant child suffer in this way, you become resolute that it can't happen again.

A real use case: An Honor Roll Student whose grades plummeted and whose depression became real:

I vividly remember the day that our son excitedly got up and dressed thinking he was FINALLY going to virtual live school - only to find it was a 5 minute google meet to tell everyone how to learn on their own. The absolute depression on his face was horrible.

Unfortunately, both my husband and I work and our schedules did not change- they simply moved online - leaving my son alone in his room for 7-8 hours a day to try to learn and perform within 3 competing platforms - with teachers whose equipment often failed, platforms which often locked up and lost work and worksheets that we could not determine how to complete.

After 9 hours of work each day, we attempted to fill in the tons of gaps for our son- teaching him about the economy and stock market, attempting to watch enough videos to relearn match and to understand Spanish. Worksheets had no instructions or provided direction referencing work never learned- we frequently spent hours online learning the back stop materials to the instruction.

Despite 16 hour days and several college and advanced degrees, we were unable to help him- and his grades plummeted.

Communication between parents and teachers came in the form of platitude emails- "hang in there", "do your best", "don't stress if they don't learn". But no real communication - how to teach your kids, where to go for help, why is my kid failing a class and you aren't calling me?

It was a disaster and we were all exhausted. And, that is the collective "WE" - teachers agreed.

We were all very understanding at first. We were all in a new experience with no preparation. However, we, as parents, quickly lost patience as weeks turned to months and nothing improved. I, like many others, made calls to our Principal and offered suggestions, attending virtual PTO meetings, begged teachers for help in writing and on the phone. Nothing worked. Our teachers were as frustrated as our kids. Some of us had more experienced administrators than others. Ours, unfortunately was new and

had young children at home to watch.

We, fortunately, could hire tutors (teachers, individuals and organizations) who provided that missing Zoom full instruction experience. I took frequent vacation time to change up my son's days/ nights and hoped that I would retain my job. We were fortunate - 1 child and options. Others were not.

Inequalities in Education- Despite the final decision on days in/ out of school, how do we provide an equitable learning experience?

Unfortunately, last semester, the school board allowed a completely inequitable learning experience for our LCPS children to persist, while, across town, Flint and Paul VI had rigorous teaching and live classes every day for full sessions- with 8th grade learning plans including an advisory period (live), 4 hours of live instruction a day, every subject on alternating days and live google meets (required). Other counties across this country provided their children with the same qualify of education. We, as a county, allowed the pandemic and a banner of "no child left behind" to keep us from teaching our children. We are now officially a semester behind.

As someone who has watched public policy be set many times as a part of my professional career, I am familiar with the tools which have been employed during this discussion. Of note, the survey with no supportable standards of administration, taking on multiple controversial topics in one night at the board meeting, etc. — it would appear that the public comment period is not intended to change or influence the course of following the Fairfax and Arlington County decisions. With that in mind, (ans assuming a what would appear to be a less than ideal return—one that seems to be intended to appease multiple factions), let's please determine facts vs. myth and then set a course of action that puts the children first:

Facts:

1.As a professional leading large teams servicing the federal government, I can tell you that most offices will return to some form of in person work this Fall- many after Labor Day.

For much of your community, some form of the Federal government agency, contractor or company selling to the government employs (directly or indirectly) much of your constituency. For those who support the classified missions, the only current method of delivering work is in person. As the Federal government reopens (including the extended ecosystem), your working parents will be in chaos.

- 2. The County has reopened most parks, public spaces, restaurants and sports have restarted. Our children are interacting with adults and other children and will continue to do so. While school is out, hoards of children roam the neighborhoods, and, sadly, have tragic outcomes- such as Fitz's drowning (which occurred during school hours). Our children will experience more exposure to covid during county reopening than in the classroom of 30 or less children that is a fact.
- 3. The reopening plan contention is largely about limiting teacher liability and supporting parents who want a remote learning experience.
- Every employer in Loudoun county is dealing with limitation of liability of workers. In the classified work space where work can't be remote, for in person health care, etc. this is not unique to LCPS and should be able to be addressed without holding hostage all of the children and parents in the county.
- A remote learning experience is available on schoology, zoom, MSFT teams, etc.

With that in mind, note that a great majority of your parents support 100% choice - in person full time and 100% zoom / at home full time instruction - give parents the option.

We implore you to go ahead and make a decision and then move onto defining how you will provide EQUITABLE QUALITY of education on a full time basis.

What Parents Define as Equitable Education

We, as parents, insist on **demonstration** of a plan for the FALL that:

1. Creates Parity and EQUITY OF Zoom / Distance learning to the standard classroom experience.

NOTE: 14 hours a week for a teenager to sit home alone and self instruct is not only unacceptable, but it also creates inequality for those who can't afford tutors and can't be home, for those without parity of technical access or devices for their household and for those without proper childcare. (Of note is the fact that it is illegal to leave your minor child at home alone for period of time matching those outlined in the current plan.)

- 2. Creates Parity and Equity for LCPS to that of other counties, states and private schools. We, as parents, should not (after paying taxes) have to leave the county or state or enroll in private school to get parity of education (either in the classroom or in distance learning). Loudoun county is one of the most well funded counties in the state. Our educational plan should propel our children not hold them back.
- 3. Defines and directs Administration and teachers on acceptable teaching and learning experiences and standardizes parent / student instructions. This plan should model those, measure those and monitor those so that any needed "course correct" is fast/ swift. You must show parents that there will be real grades for students and teachers, real measurements of learning that will match SOL or national standards and prove to us that learning will occur at a rate which will not put our children behind other states/ counties as they compete on the national stage for college.
- 4. **Do something proactive about mental health**. Read the Journal of American Medical Association article on the impacts of COVID on isolation and Depression (June 24) and design a plan of engagement with each student which monitors mental health. You have got to take accountability for the mental health of children who would normally be in your care during school hours and are now home alone and struggling.
- 5. Demonstrate a measurement of return to school, defining "SAFE" and based upon sample groups of others schools.

Use models from other school systems—it is time to start giving facts about the low risk of child/ child infection—taking bold steps like the Australian Chief Medical Officer did when Australia returned their children to school during what is their "winter". If the State or CDC is not giving you acceptable data, pool it from other schools nationally and internationally so that you are not held hostage to decision making bound by liability.

I place that article below for your review.

We can't stay out of school until a vaccine is found, tested, deemed safe and made broadly available. When will we define "SAFE"? What is safe?

Summary:

It is time to move out- make a decision, take a stand and then demonstrate how you are going to equitably meet the needs of our children in a way that addresses ALL of the community of your constituents. Transferring liability and responsibility for instruction to your parents is not acceptable. Let's work together to create a plan that works and get to it.

Please provide a plan of action with depth (not pages of CDC guidelines) that builds trust with your community. We are all far too tired to be tied up in litigation of any kind this Fall. So, let's all get to the business of real solutions for real kids - including those whose parents have no access to backstop the county.

Thank you, again, for your tireless service and willingness to hear from the community. I have worked with some of you in the broader community and can note here your willingness to dig in, get your hands

dirty in the details and to act boldly. If you don't have what you need to do your work, please let us know how we can help.

Getting our kids back to school – a matter of trust

An opinion piece by the Australian Government's Deputy Chief Medical Officer, Nick Coatsworth.

One word has become a common theme in all the discussions around face-to-face teaching during the COVID-19 pandemic: confusion.

As a country, we are largely heading in the same direction in relation to how best to school our children while we battle coronavirus. However different states and territories are moving at different pace and this has led to a sense of confusion.

To address this confusion which is so frustrating for parents, teachers and students, we need to go back to the evidence, and then we need to go beyond that, and build our community's trust in our schooling recommendations.

When school closures were initially proposed to control an epidemic, planners had influenza in mind. Flu spreading within schools and children are the main source for transmission in the community. But COVID-19 is not the flu.

Far fewer children are affected by COVID-19, and the number of transmissions from children to children and children to adults is far less.

Some have said the evidence on this is not clear. In any health debate, evidence can be cherry-picked to support a particular view. As an infectious diseases specialist, I

have examined all of the available evidence from within Australia and around the world and, as it stands, it does not support avoiding classroom learning as a means to control COVID-19.

The national position remains that face-to-face teaching is safe, particularly given the current very low rates of community transmission of SARS-CoV-2.

By contrast, there is plenty of public health evidence that stopping face-to-face teaching can damage society. It is clear this intervention (school closures) can cause harm, but the benefits (on disease transmission) are unknown, and likely to be marginal when the disease burden is low.

I would like to touch on a couple of the more negative public health effects school closures can have.

Firstly, the disruption to routine and socialisation, while temporary, tends to have a disproportionate effect on our more vulnerable children, including those with disability or particular learning needs. School is a critical element of good health across all age ranges.

Secondly, it increases stress within the family environment, with parents having to juggle home schooling and work. Sixty-two percent of Australian families have two working parents. Parents extend their working day into the evening to compensate for the need to home school.

The main risk of going back to school is that it increases the movement and interaction of adults in the community and puts staff back in contact with each other. Importantly, this can be managed. Staff and parents must maintain their distance from each other in the school environment, avoid the school if unwell with a cold, and keep children at home when they are not feeling well.

NOTE: 14 hours a week for a teenager to sit home alone and self instruct is not only unacceptable, but it also creates inequality for those who can't afford tutors and can't be home, for those without parity of technical access or devices for their household and for those without proper childcare.

(Of note is the fact that it is illegal to leave your minor child at home alone for period of time matching those outlined in the current plan.)

- 2. Creates Parity and Equity for LCPS to that of other counties, states and private schools. We, as parents, should not (after paying taxes) have to leave the county or state or enroll in private school to get parity of education (either in the classroom or in distance learning). Loudoun county is one of the most well funded counties in the state. Our educational plan should propel our children not hold them back.
- 3. Defines and directs Administration and teachers on acceptable teaching and learning experiences and standardizes parent / student instructions. This plan should model those, measure those and monitor those so that any needed "course correct" is fast/ swift. You must show parents that there will be real grades for students and teachers, real measurements of learning that will match SOL or national standards and prove to us that learning will occur at a rate which will not put our children behind other states/ counties as they compete on the national stage for college.
- 4. **Do something proactive about mental health**. Read the Journal of American Medical Association article on the impacts of COVID on isolation and Depression (June 24) and design a plan of engagement with each student which monitors mental health. You have got to take accountability for the mental health of children who would normally be in your care during school hours and are now home alone and struggling.
- 5. . Demonstrate a measurement of return to school, defining "SAFE" and based

upon sample groups of others schools.

Use models from other school systems—it is time to start giving facts about the low risk of child/ child infection - taking bold steps like the Australian Chief Medical Officer did when Australia returned their children to school during what is their "winter". If the State or CDC is not giving you acceptable data, pool it from other schools nationally and internationally so that you are not held hostage to decision making bound by liability. I place that article below for your review.

We can't stay out of school until a vaccine is found, tested, deemed safe and made broadly available. When will we define "SAFE"? What is safe?

Summary:

It is time to move out- make a decision, take a stand and then demonstrate how you are going to equitably meet the needs of our children in a way that addresses ALL of the community of your constituents. Transferring liability and responsibility for instruction to your parents is not acceptable. Let's work together to create a plan that works and get to it.

Please provide a plan of action with depth (not pages of CDC guidelines) that builds trust with your community. We are all far too tired to be tied up in litigation of any kind this Fall. So, let's all get to the business of real solutions for real kids - including those whose parents have no access to backstop the county.

Thank you, again, for your tireless service and willingness to hear from the community. I have worked with some of you in the broader community and can note here your willingness to dig in, get your hands dirty in the details and to act boldly. If you don't have what you need to do your work, please let us know how we can help.

Getting our kids back to school – a matter of trust

An opinion piece by the Australian Government's Deputy Chief Medical Officer, Nick Coatsworth.

One word has become a common theme in all the discussions around face-to-face teaching during the COVID-19 pandemic: confusion.

As a country, we are largely heading in the same direction in relation to

how best to school our children while we battle coronavirus. However different states and territories are moving at different pace and this has led to a sense of confusion.

To address this confusion which is so frustrating for parents, teachers and students, we need to go back to the evidence, and then we need to go beyond that, and build our community's trust in our schooling recommendations.

When school closures were initially proposed to control an epidemic, planners had influenza in mind. Flu spreading within schools and children are the main source for transmission in the community. But COVID-19 is not the flu.

Far fewer children are affected by COVID-19, and the number of transmissions from children to children and children to adults is far less.

Some have said the evidence on this is not clear. In any health debate, evidence can be cherry-picked to support a particular view. As an infectious diseases specialist, I have examined all of the available evidence from within Australia and around the world and, as it stands, it does not support avoiding classroom learning as a means to control COVID-19.

The national position remains that face-to-face teaching is safe, particularly given the current very low rates of community transmission of SARS-CoV-2.

By contrast, there is plenty of public health evidence that stopping face-to-face teaching can damage society. It is clear this intervention (school closures) can cause harm, but the benefits (on disease transmission) are unknown, and likely to be marginal when

the disease burden is low.

I would like to touch on a couple of the more negative public health effects school closures can have.

Firstly, the disruption to routine and socialisation, while temporary, tends to have a disproportionate effect on our more vulnerable children, including those with disability or particular learning needs. School is a critical element of good health across all age ranges.

Secondly, it increases stress within the family environment, with parents having to juggle home schooling and work. Sixty-two percent of Australian families have two working parents. Parents extend their working day into the evening to compensate for the need to home school.

The main risk of going back to school is that it increases the movement and interaction of adults in the community and puts staff back in contact with each other. Importantly, this can be managed. Staff and parents must maintain their distance from each other in the school environment, avoid the school if unwell with a cold, and keep children at home when they are not feeling well.

As a teacher, I am gravely concerned about the hybrid model you have chosen for us. More concerningly, the county, as demonstrated with their robust preparation of only one resolution, has not listened to the concerns of those who would vastly affect the success of such a model. Many of us are struggling with the idea of having to make such a huge decision with very little logistical information (and such information that would impact our decision). To ask us to make this decision, uninformed, is morally wrong. Please listen to your teachers and provide them with information, such as the items listed below, so that they can be educated in the decision they make (this is parallel to buying a car without test driving it, buying a house without being able to see it/inside it, taking medication without knowing the name of it, etc).

- What will you do to ensure **equity of workload** between a hybrid and DL teacher? As is stands, you are asking the hybrid teacher to accomplish two jobs and the DL teacher one. This is not sustainable and will likely cause the hybrid teacher to present mediocre learning experiences in two platforms rather than a fine-tuned experience in one.
- As it stands, in order to preserve our mental health, many of your teachers deemed hybrid will be **working during contract hours only** which means: when the afternoon end time hits, there will be **no** duties performed (grades in Phoenix, planning lessons, providing feedback, recording progress). We cannot be expected to do the jobs of two teachers/platforms it is literally impossible within contract hours (if you expect the DL portion to be as thorough as many teachers made it). This will likely impact the depth of instruction we are able to provide.
- Mental health the load and stress that this hybrid model puts on teachers (as you have designed it currently) WILL lead to mental health concerns
- **Planning time** you are deeming us with an incredibly significant increase in workload yet providing us with less time to plan/prepare. Please tell us how this is possible to do our jobs well?
- Storage with limited desks, we will need storage for student belongings (ie: this could easily be done with cube storage units for each student to place their belongings at the end of their day this would allow desks to be cleaned properly in between days/groups...but the county needs to provide that, NOT teachers)
- Curriculum please tell us how the curriculum will be modified to fit our situation (FYI Unit of Studies/Lucy Calkins does not work and contributes to student disengagement, especially in this format!) Will you empower us with the flexibility to modify how we execute the curriculum to meet the needs of our students, especially when we see that something is not working?
- Hazard Pay/Workman's Comp please tell us how you will support teachers when they are forced to quarantine; when they contract Covid by being put in the situation you have chosen for us; will you foot the bill of our treatment/hospital stay if we contract it in your building
- **Honesty** how will you ensure that parents are not sending their kids to school with a masked fever on Tylenol?

Childcare - please tell us how you will support us with this

- Attire many of us are requesting the "ok" to wear scrubs so that we can easily remove and intensely launder our clothes
- Movement between phases how does this look on the hybrid teacher's side? And, does a child who contracts covid/is quarantined move to the DL model?

More than ever, we need your support. We need answers. And most pressingly, we can't do our jobs (which we so eagerly want to do) unless you create a sustainable and safe environment for us.



And honestly it didn't even register that anything I had written would be an issue because I knew my intent was not to cause harm or invalidate the feelings of anyone else.

First and foremost, it is not now, nor has it ever been my intention to threaten or intimidate anyone into silence and I fully respect the right of everyone to exercise their first amendment rights. It was a poor choice of words and while I did not personally post on the official MSAAC social media pages, I have to take responsibility as they are my words.

Moreover, I realize that this is now a case of impact versus intent. My intention was and is to have the voices in support of equity in education be heard and supported, and I was actually thinking "hopefully those voice will eventually ring louder and drown out those against equity". Sadly, the impact has been received as negative and perceived as wanting to force people who disagree into silence through coercion, violence or any number of false narratives.

Unfortunately, the tweet and replies on Twitter seem to have grown legs over the past few hours and The Daily Wire has again written an article referencing the statement.

My initial thought was to write a statement of clarification but I fear that would just add fuel to the fire and because we are a committee supported by LCPS I want to be cautious about how we proceed as not to cause anymore unnecessary negativity toward the school system.

The words were those of a tired, overworked mother volunteering to help ensure all kids get what they need before the start of a much needed break. What they are not is veiled threats toward anyone or any group who is against equity work within LCPS.

I wanted to reach out to you both as LCPS MSAAC staff liaison and the Public Information Officer to make sure you had all of the facts from me directly in the event LCPS and/or Dr. Ziegler has to issue a statement.

Please let me know how you would like to proceed with this matter.

Congressional Update

House Releases Community Project Funding Guidance

On Tuesday, March 23, the House Appropriations Committee formally published <u>guidance</u> regarding the process for Members of Congress to request "Community Project Funding"—the committee's new term for appropriations earmarks. As previously shared, House appropriations leaders have sought to ensure the new process for requesting earmarks ensures transparency and accountability as reflected in this new guidance. Of note for the K-12 community the "Innovation and Improvement" account for elementary and secondary education, composed of programs most recently funded at \$1.1 billion, is eligible for requests from Members of Congress for the upcoming FY 2022 appropriations cycle—a process that must be completed by October 1, 2021 before current funding is set to expire.

Senate HELP Committee Considers Deputy Secretary of Education Nomination

On Wednesday, March 24, the Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP) Committee held a hearing to consider President Biden's nomination of Cindy Marten to be the next U.S. Deputy Secretary of Education. Since 2013, Marten has been the Superintendent of San Diego's Unified School District in California. During the hearing, Marten promoted summer learning programs as an effective strategy for districts to consider when determining how best to combat student learning loss due to the ongoing pandemic. In addition, she highlighted her own experiences as superintendent when addressing the issue of school reopening's. Marten also voiced support for the U.S. Department of Education's recent decision to require states to move forward with federally mandated standardized assessments. The committee is expected to formally vote on Marten's nomination in the coming weeks and she is widely expected to be confirmed by the full Senate shortly thereafter.

House Hearing Explores Educational Equity Post-Pandemic

On Thursday, March 25, the House Education and Labor Committee's Early Childhood, Elementary,

and Secondary Education Subcommittee held a hearing titled, "<u>Lessons Learned</u>: <u>Charting the Path to Educational Equity Post-COVID-19</u>." Witnesses included:

- Marc H. Morial, President and CEO, National Urban League
- Jennifer Dale, Parent, Lake Oswego, OR
- Selene A. Almazan, Legal Director, Council of Parent Attorneys and Advocates, Inc.
- Alberto M. Carvalho, Superintendent of Schools, Miami-Dade County Public Schools

The hearing focused on a slew of K-12 education topics and issues brought to the forefront due to the ongoing pandemic. Much of the discussion centered on schools returning to in-person instruction, along with an exploration of how states and school districts plan to make use of federal pandemic aid made available through the recently passed American Rescue Plan. The topic of standardized assessment was also brought up a number of times—by both witnesses and subcommittee members —with some arguing that testing should be suspended during the pandemic, while others defended testing as a key way to ensure an equitable educational recovery for all students. Administration Update

USED Hosts School Reopening Summit

On Wednesday, March 24, the U.S. Department of Education (USED) hosted a "National Safe School Reopening Summit" which brought together education stakeholders from across the country to discuss and share best practices related to school reopening's. The summit was comprised of three separate sessions focused on implementing the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) K-12 operational strategy regarding school reopening's (recently updated by the CDC on March 19), lessons learned during these efforts, and how schools and districts can best address students' academic, social, and emotional needs throughout the pandemic.

In addition to these discussions, Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona also announced that his department was making nearly two-thirds of the approximately \$122 billion in K-12 funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) available to states and school districts (\$81 billion total). In a related press release, the department noted that "The remainder of ARP [K-12] funds will become available after states submit the plans they are developing and implementing for using ARP. . ." funding to safely reopen schools.

Following the summit, the department also announced plans to launch a school reopening listening tour and "Summer Learning and Enrichment Collaborative" which will seek to share best practices for summer learning. This announcement came after 11 Senators, led by Sen. Murphy (D-CT) wrote to Cardona urging his department to provide further information and guidance regarding how states and school districts can best provide summer enrichment activities.

USED Releases New School Survey Data

Shortly after his inauguration, President Biden signed an executive order supporting the reopening of K-12 schools. As part of this order the President directed USED's Institute of Education Sciences (IES) to survey K-12 schools and districts regarding the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, including collecting data on the status of inperson instruction at schools. On Tuesday, IES released the first in what will be a series of findings from an ongoing survey of public schools throughout the country. This newly released survey showed that more than three-quarters of all fourth and eight grade public school students attended schools that provided hybrid or in-person instruction during the past few months. The survey and related data collection will continue monthly through June of this year with additional results published periodically. The full survey results from this most recent release can be accessed here.

Hi Denise,

I am not sure who you are referring to when you say "they" but we have heard from staff and community members of multiple races asking what the difference is between the Comprehensive Equity Plan and the Plan to Combat Systemic Racism. We have also heard some concern about the draft of the Comprehensive Equity plan not have measurable goals. The plan is going before the Equity Committee on the 16th which will incorporate their input and add more measurable goals.

In addition, we are working on a draft Q&A to clearly outline a distinction between the two documents. Here is a draft that I plan to share with cabinet tomorrow. I plan to make additional revisions to the highlighted sentence and potentially other areas of the answers based on cabinet feedback. This is not final yet and not quite ready to be shared.

Q: What is the difference between the Equity Plan and the LCPS Action Plan to Combat Systemic Racism?

A: The Comprehensive Equity Plan will have goals to denote specific actions/work underway and future work as it relates to Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion for the division. It is a multi-year outlook with goals and action steps to show our deliberate intentionality toward eradicating inequities across the division. The Equity Framework at the outset of the plan's goals display the various components to be addressed in the plan. Focus areas from three different departments (HRTD, DOI, and DPS) are outlined in the plan by use of the Strategic Goals from the Vision 20/20 Strategic Action Plan along with the pairing of an Equity Emphasis area. Recent quantitative data (discipline disproportionality, course enrollment, etc.) as well as qualitative data from the LCPS Systemic Equity Assessment served as a foundation for the types of goals and areas of focus to be outlined by the Equity Plan. The five emergent themes from the Systemic Equity Assessment revealed foundational information related to unconscious bias, the discomfort of conversations about race and racism, and the need for professional learning for adults to better support every student (particularly marginalized and traditionally underserved groups) in experiences with stronger, equitable outcomes. Although the Comprehensive Equity Plan is intended to address inequities by taking a preventative as well as a responsive approach, the Action Plan to Combat Systemic Racism has a laser focus on systemic racism, oppression, and the need for the disruption and dismantling of ineffective systems (referenced in Superintendent's Division-wide Equity Statement issued August 19, 2019) in particular, which fail to serve every student. The reiteration here is that even with a forward-facing multi-year strategy for improving equitable outcomes through a Comprehensive Equity Plan, none of the goals or actions outlined in the plan can fully come to fruition without recognizing where true interruptions in our current practices and even policies need to occur as foundational work to truly move the needle in combating systemic racism.

Q: Will both exist as separate documents?

A: At this point, these documents are in stand-alone format to give them both the individualized attention needed to address equity comprehensively and systemic racism specifically. In this work, which is more adaptive and less technical in nature, it is important that we place these documents in the center of the table to allow for the necessary dialogue and bold action steps that foster transparency and accountability. As you know our internal and external stakeholders need time to discuss the nature of the plan and the implications for the community and division as a whole. In the future, the action plan *may* be embedded (linked) into the Equity Plan, as part of the Action Steps listed beneath specific goals throughout the plan.

I would like to express my appreciation for the very difficult work the School Board members are carrying out. You will invariably not please everyone; such is the nature of public service. I commend you for taking upon yourselves these difficult tasks. So long as you review all matters objectively, listen to all your constituents fairly, and employ sound data and science to reach your decisions, everyone will ultimately be satisfied, even if not happy. I do not agree with your decision, but I commend your work, nonetheless.

I would like to specifically recognize Mr. Morse for his efforts to include information from the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) in which "...the AAP strongly advocates that all policy considerations for the coming school year should start with a goal of having students physically present in school." Certainly its position doesn't preclude the proposals put forth by Dr. Williams, only that decisions proceed from the starting goal of a physical return to school. Regrettably, the Board, in taking the affirmative action to exclude highly-relevant, science-based information by voting down the amendment to add the AAP guidance (and by at least one of the reasons cited - that including it could lead to consideration of a 100% in-person return that at least one member could not support) has permanently negated the Board members' ability to credibly and truthfully claim their decisions and votes on the matter were grounded in the available science.

We will press forward and explore all available options necessary to ensure a safe and quality education for our daughter. However, that effort does not mean we will have stopped our oversight of the LCPS School Board and Administration. These actions have awakened in many a need to dig and challenge LCPS decision-making far more deeply. I, personally, will be examining with a fine tooth comb any new or changed/unchanged policies put forward in support of the modifications to the 2020-2021 school year, including the privacy issues raised in my previous email, as well as grading, attendance, and attire. I will also be looking for appropriate equity between policies for students and those for staff.

Bottom Line Up Front: Tonight the LCPS School Board is expected to vote regarding how to proceed with returning students to school in the fall. The board is charged with considering and representing the views of all parents, staff, and students in Loudoun County; I don't envy you that responsibility. I am unable to speak this

evening, but am writing today to ensure that my and my family's views are heard, listened to, and considered. The positions proposed to-date by the Superintendent include 100% return to in-person education (which he seems to have summarily and unilaterally dismissed), 100% distance learning, and a hybrid approach of two days in-person and three days distance learning. Our background is that we are a dual-income family with one daughter, a rising Junior, still in LCPS. For the record, my family and I prefer 100% in-person education for those who choose WITH 100% distance learning for those not yet comfortable with returning to in-person education.

There are a number of points I want to be sure are raised, many of which may be duplicative to those you've already heard or read elsewhere, or which may be raised this evening. I hope you will review them all, in case they include new ones not previously considered.

- 1. The Governor's office has been very clear that, though it has provided guidance, that guidance is not directive in nature and decisions regarding how to open schools are in the hands of local school boards. Past efforts by Northern Virginia municipalities to seek exemptions from the Governor's guidance namely to keep NoVA closed while the rest of Virginia entered Phase 1 demonstrate strict adherence to guidance is not always the preferred path.
 - There are many and varied assessments in the public space from credible education and medical communities, and I stress that includes the mental health community, that must be considered, and I am not confident the Superintendent is giving all views due diligence. That, of course, is why the board, as representatives of the entire community, has directive oversight of the Superintendent's actions.
- 2. While I strongly support including survey results in order to assess the views of constituents, I also must push back on over-reliance upon, as well as possible misinterpretation of, the data found in the survey that was sent to the LCPS community. I'm specifically concerned about the following:
 - The response rate may not be properly representative of the population set. Raw numbers of responses alone do not account for population variances across the county, multiple responses from the same household, etc.
 - The proposals identified within the survey were not fully described and have morphed since it was conducted (e.g., a fuller description of the hybrid and the possibility of combining 100% in-person with 100% distance), leaving the validity of some responses now questionable.
 - The 43% of staff who indicated they meet one or more criteria making them eligible to remain home were not asked the correct question. The question asked respondents about meeting eligibility criteria, not about their *willingness* to return to in-person school (irrespective of eligibility). That is an important distinction, especially as possibly erroneous assumptions have been made based upon this question. Some have already misquoted the results saying 43% *won't* return, which is not what the survey stated.

- Finally, the survey did not provide the granularity necessary to make sound decisions. Specifically, because staff are not fungible, either by academic discipline or by assigned school, a sweeping statement regarding "43%" does not tell the Administration the make-up of the 57%-plus staff population willing to return. Are they all Elementary teachers? Are they all HS teachers? Are they all from 25% of the schools, leaving 75% of schools with no personnel? How many math and science teachers are willing to return vs how many languages and arts teachers? Are the football coaches among those who won't return, in which case the larger question of fall football (and likely many other teacher-led extracurriculars) is moot? The list goes on.
- 3. Our schools are only one place in the community from which the virus any virus can be acquired. If Virginia remains in Phase 3 this fall, every family is just as likely to be exposed from work, shopping, etc. I would assert we're more likely to be exposed from elsewhere because the disciplined conditions under which the schools will carry out protocols (masks, distance, washing, etc) will likely exceed those found in shopping malls, grocery stores, restaurants, etc.
- 4. We live in a society that has come to rely on full-day in-school education that enables parents to work full-time. In many cases, that means both parents, particularly in an exceptionally affluent county such as Loudoun. I assert that remaining at home to support distance learning, particularly with regard to younger children, will not be a realistic option for many without incurring substantial economic harm. The greatest harm will be to those least able to economically carry the burden.
- 5. Delivering distance education requires more skills than simply operating a virtual meeting platform. Building a curriculum that works at a distance is different from one that works in a classroom setting. Our older daughter used distance learning for her high school freshman year because of our overseas assignment, but that was through an experienced, private on-line high school. Based upon this past spring, I am very concerned our teachers do not have all the training and tools necessary to successfully deliver an on-line curriculum, particularly one that retains the high quality educational experience for which LCPS is known.
- 6. We have not heard any discussion of grading policies, or where LCPS will allow policy exceptions (e.g., granting of credit for non-LCPS courses). If students and parents are expected to adapt and make unique allowances under these circumstances, we have a right to expect LCPS will be equally lenient and proactively supportive of alternative educational methods.
- 7. Lastly, privacy rights: there is at least one anecdotal report from another community of an instance in which a teacher conducting distance learning observed a BB gun in the bedroom of a student, shared the image of the student's bedroom with other staff, and ultimately called the police to the student's house. The police responded, found nothing wrong, and left. This is deeply disturbing from a privacy rights perspective, and I will be looking for specific and detailed protections in place and codified for both students and teachers regarding privacy when using on-line systems. Inviting someone into one's home, even virtually, is not an invitation to "rummage through the

medicine cabinet." I absolutely respect teachers and the profession; however, let's not pretend that all are saints (true of <u>any profession</u>). There are too many instances in the news that demonstrate otherwise. This is partly why SafeSport requires parents of minors to be present during virtual training sessions.

I'm not sure this is comprehensive enough, based upon what I've read elsewhere, but I need to send this email in time for you to read and digest its contents. I look forward to listening to the conversation tonight. Good luck.

I recognize the hour however this topic is weighing heavily on my mind and I felt it necessary to address this with both of you sooner rather than later.

As you may be aware by now, on Friday 3/26, MSAAC issued a call to action to our supporters to ask for their assistance in speaking up in support of equity in education.

In doing so, I also quickly drafted some verbiage to go along with the graphic. Within that verbiage I wrote the phrase "we will silence the opposition" toward the end of the statement, without realizing the firestorm my words would cause unintentionally. And honestly it didn't even register that anything I had written would be an issue because I knew my intent was not to cause harm or invalidate the feelings of anyone else.

First and foremost, it is not now, nor has it ever been my intention to threaten or intimidate anyone into silence and I fully respect the right of everyone to exercise their first amendment rights. It was a poor choice of words and while I did not personally post on the official MSAAC social media pages, I have to take responsibility as they are my words.

Moreover, I realize that this is now a case of impact versus intent. My intention was and is to have the voices in support of equity in education be heard and supported, and I was actually thinking "hopefully those voice will eventually ring louder and drown out those against equity". Sadly, the impact has been received as negative and perceived as wanting to force people who disagree into silence through coercion, violence or any number of false narratives.

Unfortunately, the tweet and replies on Twitter seem to have grown legs over the past few hours and The Daily Wire has again written an article referencing the statement.

My initial thought was to write a statement of clarification but I fear that would just add fuel to the fire and because we are a committee supported by LCPS I want to be cautious about how we proceed as not to cause anymore unnecessary negativity toward the school system.

The words were those of a tired, overworked mother volunteering to help ensure all kids get what they need before the start of a much needed break. What they are not is veiled

threats toward anyone or any group who is against equity work within LCPS.

Dr. Ziegler,

Thank your for this balanced and sensible email. I recently moved to Loudoun Co. (May 2020) and am the parent of a LCPS high school student, and your email has helped to ease some of my worries.

I am not on social media so I was not privy to the misinformation you referred to in your email below.

But I must say that last fall when I read the LCPS Draft Professional Conduct Policy (7560) I was horrified and disgusted at several lines that made me feel like we were entering into a second McCarthyism:

(e.g. "Behavior that will not be tolerated includes....speech or other telephone, electronic, or social media communication that...can reasonably be interpreted as...undermining the views, positions, goals, policies or public statements of the Loudoun County School Board or its Superintendent")

The chilling effect that such a policy would have on teachers would create a toxic environment where teachers, and thus their students could not thrive. And so some backlash from this draconian version of the policy is understandable in my opinion. But I was relieved when I heard from Reps. Serotkin and Morse that this draft policy had been sent back to committee. However, I have been wondering ever since what will happen next.

Therefore, to hear your words below that "LCPS has not adopted Critical Race Theory as a framework for staff to adhere to" and similar statements provides some comfort.

Personally, I do hope that equity and a welcoming environment is achieved for all students in LCPS. And my personal experience at my previous residence in Ohio, as well as with the Virginians I have met in the year I have been here, is that virtually everyone agrees with these goals; but not everyone agrees on the best way to achieve these goals. And while I disagree vehemently with many of the tenets of Critical Race Theory, I do not have a problem with its content being presented or discussed with teachers, as long as it is not presented as dogma, and as long as other viewpoints are also given the same latitude in the discussions. It is my view that as long as these issues can be discussed openly, without fear of retribution or discipline, that the truth will eventually rise to the top.

Since I have only been here a year I'm afraid I don't yet know what to expect from you or LCPS. However, I am "hopefully expectant" that you and LCPS will follow through on your statements made in your email below.

Today, I am releasing the Interim Superintendent's Update: Rumors Concerning LCPS Equity Work. I hope this statement will help to clarify many of the misperceptions being reported by certain media outlets and social media and reemphasize our commitment to equity for all LCPS students and staff.

Interim Superintendent's Update: Rumors Concerning LCPS Equity Work

In recent days, media reports and social media posts have sought to distort the equity work by Loudoun County Public Schools. Misconceptions and misinformation persist. I want to take a moment to clarify LCPS' efforts to ensure every student, employee and member of the community is treated in an equitable, respectful manner.

In explaining LCPS' equity priorities, it might be helpful to state what they are not. They are not an effort to indoctrinate students and staff into a particular philosophy or theory. What they are is an effort to provide a welcoming, inclusive, affirming environment for all students.

LCPS' equity plan is outlined on the Equity webpage on the LCPS website.

LCPS is not alone in this work. The <u>Virginia Department of Education</u> and school divisions across the Commonwealth and America are engaged in similar efforts.

To start the process to improve its learning environment, LCPS hired The Equity Collaborative in 2019 to perform a <u>Systemic Equity Assessment</u>. This assessment asked students, parents and educators about their experiences with LCPS based on social and cultural factors and their race. The assessment, submitted to the school division in June 2019, identified five barriers that could prevent students from attaining the world-class education LCPS strives to provide. These barriers included race, poverty, learning disabilities, academic expectations and discipline practices. Of these five factors, the assessment identified race as the most prevalent problem.

Areas where LCPS was found to need improvement included accountability, hiring practices and professional development. The Equity Collaborative recommended professional development for staff in the area of recognizing the social and cultural differences in our diverse student body. Professional development was undertaken using both nationally recognized consultants and LCPS staff trained to facilitate such work. The goal of this work was to raise the racial consciousness and equity literacy of LCPS' staff.

The professional development offered to LCPS employees explores issues that have traditionally been ignored in professional development. It asks employees to examine their own personal biases and how they might affect student instruction and interactions with the community. Concepts such as white supremacy and systemic racism are discussed during professional development. LCPS has not adopted Critical Race Theory as a framework for staff to adhere to. Social media rumors that staff members have been disciplined or fired for not adhering to the tenets of Critical Race Theory or for refusing to teach this theory are not true.

It should be noted that students do not receive equity training. LCPS has not adopted a uniform equity curriculum, but does have a <u>Culturally Responsive Framework</u>. This framework speaks to providing a welcoming, affirming environment and developing cultural competence through culturally responsive instruction, deeper learning, equitable classroom practices and social-emotional needs for a focus on the whole child. Individual schools incorporate these best practices to meet the needs of their school community. This framework is in-line with emerging guidance from the Commonwealth of Virginia and <u>Virginia Department of Education</u>.

LCPS' work on equity is a journey that requires the commitment of staff at all levels. I feel the staffs' work, which has been sustained, honest and undertaken in good faith, has been misrepresented recently by some members of the public.

It has come to my attention that individuals, including some identifying themselves as LCPS employees, have made statements across social media about parents and their thoughts about the school division's equity work. LCPS recognizes the right of its employees to free speech, but does not condone anyone targeting members of the community for their viewpoint.

LCPS remains committed to its equity work. At the outset, we knew this work would create many hard, but necessary, conversations. I ask only that these conversations be based in fact. In the near future, LCPS will be sharing more communications about our equity work so that our community has a deeper understanding of the journey we are on to provide the best education for all of our students.

Mrs. Spurlock and Mr. Byard,

I recognize the hour however this topic is weighing heavily on my mind and I felt it necessary to address this with both of you sooner rather than later.

As you may be aware by now, on Friday 3/26, MSAAC issued a call to action to our supporters to ask for their assistance in speaking up in support of equity in education.

In doing so, I also quickly drafted some verbiage to go along with the graphic. Within that verbiage I wrote the phrase "we will silence the opposition" toward the end of the statement, without realizing the firestorm my words would cause unintentionally. And honestly it didn't even register that anything I had written would be an issue because I knew my intent was not to cause harm or invalidate the feelings of anyone else.

First and foremost, it is not now, nor has it ever been my intention to threaten or intimidate anyone into silence and I fully respect the right of everyone to exercise their first amendment rights. It was a poor choice of words and while I did not personally post on the official MSAAC social media pages, I have to take responsibility as they are my words.

Moreover, I realize that this is now a case of impact versus intent. My intention was and is to have the voices in support of equity in education be heard and supported, and I was actually thinking "hopefully those voice will eventually ring louder and drown out those against equity". Sadly, the impact has been received as negative and perceived as wanting to force people who disagree into silence through coercion, violence or any number of false narratives.

Unfortunately, the tweet and replies on Twitter seem to have grown legs over the past few hours and The Daily Wire has again written an article referencing the statement.

My initial thought was to write a statement of clarification but I fear that would just add fuel to the fire and because we are a committee supported by LCPS I want to be cautious about how we proceed as not to cause anymore unnecessary negativity toward the school system.

The words were those of a tired, overworked mother volunteering to help ensure all kids get what they need before the start of a much needed break. What they are not is veiled threats toward anyone or any group who is against equity work within LCPS.

I wanted to reach out to you both as LCPS MSAAC staff liaison and the Public Information Officer to make sure you had all of the facts from me directly in the event LCPS and/or Dr. Ziegler has to issue a statement.

Please let me know how you would like to proceed with this matter.





Dr. Ziegler,

Thank your for this balanced and sensible email. I recently moved to Loudoun Co. (May 2020) and am the parent of a LCPS high school student, and your email has helped to ease some of my worries.

I am not on social media so I was not privy to the misinformation you referred to in your email below.

But I must say that last fall when I read the LCPS Draft Professional Conduct Policy (7560) I was horrified and disgusted at several lines that made me feel like we were entering into a second McCarthyism:

(e.g. "Behavior that will not be tolerated includes....speech or other telephone, electronic, or social media communication that...can reasonably be interpreted as...undermining the views, positions, goals, policies or public statements of the Loudoun County School Board or its Superintendent")

The chilling effect that such a policy would have on teachers would create a toxic environment where teachers, and thus their students could not thrive. And so some backlash from this draconian version of the policy is understandable in my opinion. But I was relieved when I heard from Reps. Serotkin and Morse that this draft policy had been sent back to committee. However, I have been wondering ever since what will happen next.

Therefore, to hear your words below that "LCPS has not adopted Critical Race Theory as a framework for staff to adhere to" and similar statements provides some comfort.

Personally, I do hope that equity and a welcoming environment is achieved for all students in LCPS. And my personal experience at my previous residence in Ohio, as well as with the Virginians I have met in the year I have been here, is that virtually everyone agrees with these goals; but not everyone agrees on the best way to achieve these goals. And while I disagree vehemently with many of the tenets of Critical Race Theory, I do not have a problem with its content being presented or discussed with teachers, as long as it is not presented as dogma, and as long as other viewpoints are also given the same latitude in the discussions. It is my view that as long as these issues can be discussed openly, without fear of retribution or discipline, that the truth will eventually rise to the top.

Since I have only been here a year I'm afraid I don't yet know what to expect from you or LCPS. However, I am "hopefully expectant" that you and LCPS will follow through on your statements made in your email below.



Dear LCPS Community,

Today, I am releasing the Interim Superintendent's Update: Rumors Concerning LCPS Equity Work. I hope this statement will help to clarify many of the misperceptions being reported by certain media outlets and social media and reemphasize our commitment to equity for all LCPS students and staff.

Interim Superintendent's Update: Rumors Concerning LCPS Equity Work

In recent days, media reports and social media posts have sought to distort the equity work by Loudoun County Public Schools. Misconceptions and misinformation persist. I want to take a moment to clarify LCPS' efforts to ensure every student, employee and member of the community is treated in an equitable, respectful manner.

In explaining LCPS' equity priorities, it might be helpful to state what they are not. They are not an effort to indoctrinate students and staff into a particular philosophy or theory. What they are is an effort to provide a welcoming, inclusive, affirming environment for all students.

LCPS' equity plan is outlined on the Equity webpage on the LCPS website.

LCPS is not alone in this work. The <u>Virginia Department of Education</u> and school divisions across the Commonwealth and America are engaged in similar efforts.

To start the process to improve its learning environment, LCPS hired The Equity Collaborative in 2019 to perform a <u>Systemic Equity Assessment</u>. This assessment asked students, parents and educators about their experiences with LCPS based on social and cultural factors and their race. The assessment, submitted to the school division in June 2019, identified five barriers that could prevent students from attaining the world-class education LCPS strives to provide. These barriers included race, poverty, learning disabilities, academic expectations and discipline practices. Of these five factors, the assessment identified race as the most prevalent problem.

Areas where LCPS was found to need improvement included accountability, hiring practices and professional development. The Equity Collaborative recommended professional development for staff in the area of recognizing the social and cultural differences in our diverse student body. Professional development was undertaken using both nationally recognized consultants and LCPS staff trained to facilitate such work. The goal of this work was to raise the racial consciousness and equity literacy of LCPS' staff.

The professional development offered to LCPS employees explores issues that have traditionally been ignored in professional development. It asks employees to examine their own personal biases and how they might affect student instruction and interactions with the community. Concepts such as white supremacy and systemic racism are discussed during professional development. LCPS has not adopted Critical Race Theory as a framework for staff to adhere to, Social media rumors that staff members have been disciplined or fired for not adhering to the tenets of Critical Race Theory or for refusing to teach this theory are not true.

It should be noted that students do not receive equity training. LCPS has not adopted a uniform equity curriculum, but does have a <u>Culturally Responsive Framework</u>. This framework speaks to providing a welcoming, affirming environment and developing cultural competence through culturally responsive instruction, deeper learning, equitable classroom practices and social-emotional needs for a focus on the whole child. Individual schools incorporate these best practices to meet the needs of their school community. This framework is in-line with emerging guidance from the Commonwealth of Virginia and <u>Virginia Department of Education</u>.

LCPS' work on equity is a journey that requires the commitment of staff at all levels. I feel the staffs' work, which has been sustained, honest and undertaken in good faith, has been misrepresented recently by some members of the public.

It has come to my attention that individuals, including some identifying themselves as LCPS employees, have made statements across social media about parents and their thoughts about the school division's equity work. LCPS recognizes the right of its employees to free speech, but does not condone anyone targeting members of the community for their viewpoint.

LCPS remains committed to its equity work. At the outset, we knew this work would create many hard, but necessary, conversations. I ask only that these conversations be based in fact. In the near future, LCPS will be sharing more communications about our equity work so that our community has a deeper understanding of the journey we are on to provide the best education for all of our students.

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

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

Good afternoon,

Please see attached document of questions/concerns that I've collected from my LCPS discussion Facebook group of almost 11k parents in the county. I'd appreciate if you could address this at your next school board meeting or in a reply that I can post to my page. Many parents are still exploring their options with homeschooling, private schools, etc. and really need answers from you in order to determine the best path for their children.

Secondly, I have consulted with a virologist in my group that believes with proper symptom tracking/testing and diagnostics, we could start the safe phase in of children back to school when the school board determines timing is correct. Please see message below from him along with links to testing diagnostics:

(Brian Carey/Virologist PhD) In terms of the symptom tracking and diagnostics system, I'll preface anything I say with that I'm a research virologist not a public health virologist so while I can explain how the systems work and what works best, I'm not certain how to best implement it for a school system of 80,000 kids. That being said, symptom tracking can be done in a number of ways. I believe that the easiest would be an app or internet based system that parents could go on daily and certify that their children (or

anyone in their home) have not been exposed (knowingly of course) and do not exhibit the primary symptoms. This could also be achieved by having a team at the school every morning and literally screening the kids as they come in similar to how hospitals do at their entrance. Basically asking if they have any symptoms (with kids they'd for sure need to list them out) and maybe even doing a temperature with one of those infrared heat guns (https://buythermopro.com/knowledge/infrared-thermometer-gun-temperature-

screening/#:~:text=You%20can%20rely%20on%20a,the%20surface%20temperature%20of%20foods.). That method could cause a bottleneck in terms of getting kids into school though. Alternatively, a better and probably more functional method would be a hybrid system with an app/internet based system as well as screening such that if a parent forgets or neglects to certify their child is symptom free, that kid can be screened at school.

Kids that present at school with symptoms (or an exposure is identified) can be taken for further diagnostic screening. LCPS would need to make everyone aware that any diagnostic done at school is preliminary and that any positive result would need to be confirmed by a physician/diagnostic lab. That would be a legal thing that I have no idea how to address. Plenty of diagnostics are available to rapidly identify disease (types of diagnostics described below). I'll place links below to different options. The problem that will arise is procurement of said tests. I can make a test at my job in a day or less but 80,000+ tests are difficult to make. A lot of the manufacturers are having difficulty keeping up with demand but if anyone has any clout and ability to get these tests, it is Loudoun County. If the richest county in America can't get the tests, I don't know who can. I do not know how much these tests cost as we make our own tests at work for the most part and most places just have a "request quote" button. That being said, for 80,000 tests (I know not all kids will be tested but enough should be on hand to do so if need be), I'd say 150-200k could get the job done. Then you need to have people who can do it but frankly training the school nurses and some teachers wouldn't be too difficult.

Diagnostic methods:

Reverse transcriptase quantitative polymerase chain reaction (RT-qPCR): Gold standard COVID diagnostic. It detects the presence of viral genetic material (RNA) with extreme accuracy. Essentially a definitive test to diagnose or rule out COVID. Very low false positive/negative rate. Unfortunately, it is not a feasible method for rapid diagnostic as it takes an 1.5 to 2 hours from sample to result (if done immediately). Kids can't be waiting for 2 hours in a nurse's office or somewhere for a result.

Loop mediated isothermic amplification (LAMP): This is a variant of the above described PCR. The test also detects viral genetic material with a lesser degree of sensitivity and accuracy. This is probably the best bet for rapid diagnosis at schools. A sample is taken the same as it is for any other COVID test (nasal swab) and placed in a buffer. That sample is put in a machine that heats up the sample and can detect the viral RNA. The way this works though allows for more false negatives/positives. A student who tests positive should be sent for confirmatory testing. A negative test should be evaluated by symptom (ie any kid with

a fever should be going home regardless). Procurement problems for this would be getting enough instruments to have at each school.

Antigen lateral flow assay: If you've ever had a flu test or a strep test at minute clinic or your doctor's office, you've had an antigen lateral flow assay. This would be wonderful if we could implement these. The issue is that these tests are not nearly as sensitive, can give a lot more false positives, and are not as available yet due to increased regulations on this type of test (due to their higher rate of false positives). That said, I'd much rather have a non-sick kid sent home for a week or two due to a false positive than have a sick kid get by and infect others. These tests are cheap and super easy to administer. They also give results very fast and detects actual virus instead of viral RNA (that can persist after infection is cleared).

<u>Antibody lateral flow assay</u>: This test isn't appropriate to give in this situation. While a positive result can mean someone is actively infected, what it really means is that this person was exposed in some way to an antigen similar to COVID. That could mean they have COVID, had COVID, were vaccinated against COVID, or had another coronavirus that somehow generates similar antibodies.

Please see link below to see examples of classroom configurations, modifications, etc. A final recommendation that has been presented from many pediatricians across the area are to install HEPA filters at our schools to ensure quality air filtration.

Schools are moving toward closing for the fall. That is not their fault.

THE WHITE HOUSE has made it unmistakably clear that it wants schools to open this year with full in-person instruction, and that nothing — least of all the science — should stand in the way. But the actual decisions on whether to allow children back into the classroom are thankfully being made not by a president hellbent on making a political point, but by school officials who are listening to public health experts and consulting with members of their communities. Many of them are coming to the reluctant conclusion that the failure to contain the novel coronavirus — something that actually *is* the responsibility of President Trump's administration — makes it unwise to return children to the classroom.

As back-to-school season approaches, an increasing number of school districts have abandoned plans for in-person classes or hybrid arrangements and, instead, are opting for an all-virtual start to the fall semester. Some districts have committed to distance learning only for the first few weeks of the school year, holding out the possibility — and hope — of in-person instruction, but many others plan for students to learn remotely through the rest of 2020. Montgomery, Fairfax and Loudoun counties most recently decided to switch to all distance learning, joining districts in Maryland and Virginia that include Prince George's County, Arlington and Prince William. D.C. has yet to announce its plans.

School officials describe a wrenching process in deciding to keep classrooms closed. There were strong feelings on both sides of the debate and no one, even those who favored remote learning as the safest approach at this point, could argue that virtual learning is any kind of a satisfactory replacement for in-person learning. Children — particularly those from at-risk populations — suffer academically, and there are social and health benefits when children interact with their teachers and each other, not to mention the hardships to working families when children are forced to stay at home. That the crash rollout of online learning in March as the pandemic hit proved disastrous only added to the dilemma.

But, as Fairfax County Schools Superintendent Scott Braband said in explaining why remote learning was the best option, "The numbers do not lie." There has been a surge of covid-19 across the country and many communities are having to deal with higher rates of infection than were present at the start of the outbreak. If Mr. Trump wanted to take constructive action to get children back in the classroom, he would put in place the testing and other safeguards needed to control the virus rather than just browbeating the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention into becoming a cheerleader for his political agenda or trotting out his education secretary with <u>absurd theories</u> of how children actually block the virus.

Children may be less at risk of contracting the virus but the science is not at all clear

and there are many uncertainties; the concern about transmission to teachers and other school staff is quite real. We urge schools to continue to explore safe ways for children to return to school as soon as possible. In the meantime, it is important they significantly improve remote learning. There is not much time before the start of school; districts must focus on getting teachers prepared, improving lesson plans and equipping students with the tools they need to learn outside the classroom.

I have been a resident of Loudoun County for 18 years. Both my kids have gone to LCPS schools. My son, who is in college now, went to TJ in high school. My daughter is a rising 7th grader at Belmont Ridge Middle School. We consider ourselves fortunate to live in this county, and we are active members of the community.

Recently, I became aware of the changes that are being proposed in the Academies of Loudoun admission process and my email to you is related to that. The Academies of Loudoun are important to me as a parent because my daughter plans to apply to AOS in 8th grade. My son was offered admission in AOS many years ago but he chose to go to TJ because he considered the TJ program more rigorous than AOS at that time. Subsequently changes were made in the program and the Academies were introduced. The expanded program gave more students an opportunity to benefit from an advanced STEM program. My daughter, who was in FUTURA in elementary school and is in SPECTRUM now, is planning to take the tests needed to apply to AOS.

The changes that have been proposed to the admission process will be detrimental not only to truly deserving students in LCPS, but will seriously harm our high school STEM program. As a matter of fact, if put into effect, these changes will reduce the lure of Loudoun County to many families. With their stellar STEM education, FCPS schools (in particular TJ) have also been a big draw for the best students in both LCPS and FCPS.

While I have gone through the list of proposed changes, I don't understand the details. What I understand is not favorable to many students for many reasons. The proposal will lead to a watered down version of the current program. Apart from reducing the rigor of the program, it is unjust to many deserving students. The idea of a lottery for admission in an academic program is ridiculous. Imagine a lottery for selecting candidates for an athletic program or singers/performers/song writers for a music program! I understand the need for diversity and equity, but I believe that a lottery system cannot achieve either.

I also don't understand why parents are hearing about the proposed changes at the eleventh hour. It makes the whole process look furtive. As is, families and children are dealing with a lot due to Covid-19. My request to you is to bring in experts in gifted STEM education to do a comprehensive review of our education system and then come up with a proposal.

I am really hoping you will not disappoint my rising 7th grader who has her heart set on the Academies.

ACL Entrance

Respected LCPS Administration, Curriculum and Instruction Committee, and LCPS School Board.

I am a resident of Loudoun County, and a parent of a rising eighth grader at LCPS.

I am writing because I am deeply distressed by the most recent proposal of LCPS regarding revisions to the admissions process for Academies of Loudoun (ACL), both as a concerned parent and a citizen and resident of the county. The following details my concerns of why I am strongly opposed to the changes, and why I would encourage you as a Board Member to vote against it:

- 1. Lottery System This is probably the most egregious of the changes proposed. As an esteemed institution and a magnet program for STEM students, its stated purpose is to provide Advanced academic math and science courses for students interested in STEM, and an active learning environment to challenge and develop the brightest kids in the County. This is not akin to a County or State Sports team, where the brightest, most talented and well-suited candidates are picked to be on the team. Just like you would not have a lottery system to pick those sports team players, similar to that a lottery system is highly inappropriate and counters the stated mission of the County to provide advanced STEM learning and be a magnet school for the brightest kids in the County. Every kid has their unique strengths, and a merit-based, not a lottery-based system would be equitable based on recognizing and encouraging those strengths.
- 2. Academic Success Unless the Academies want to lower their standards to the average for the County school system, in which case it would no longer be a magnet school, students admitted based on a lottery system would run the risk of not being able to survive the more challenging environment at a magnet school, and the County would have to either then lower the standards for the Academies, or have a significant number of students dropping out in the middle of their high school years, going back to regular schools, thus wasting the opportunity that a more deserving merit-based student could suitably take advantage of.
- 3. <u>Discriminatory</u> The proposed rules change to a lottery-based system, and apportioning seats proportionately based on Middle school attendance is highly discriminatory to students who have studied hard in Middle School and before, and have attained a certain level of proficiency, that makes them well-suited to a magnet STEM program. Again, just like the County does not, and should not, select players on their basketball and football teams based on a lottery system, or based on proportionately doing it across Middle Schools, they cannot and should not do so for a magnet STEM school like the Academies of Loudoun.

- 4. <u>County Prestige</u> The Academies are also a source of pride and recognition for the County, adding also value to the County in terms of being a desirable place for families to locate to for providing good educational opportunities for their kids. A lottery based and a middle school based proportionate discriminatory system will lower the reputation and prestige of Loudoun County, making it a less desirable place for people to live, especially technology and other high-value workers and jobs that the County has been working hard to attract, who may look for STEM-based magnet school opportunities for their kids.
- 5. Social Equity I think it wouldn't be inappropriate to conclude that some of the sudden impetus to change the ruling has come from taking advantage of the social equity based thinking that is currently prevalent. While some of those concerns may be justified, sacrificing well-deserving students at the altar of social equity is highly inappropriate. Before the County Board even considers this change in ruling by the Superintendent, they should test public acceptable for social equity based lottery and proportionate school representation for all sports teams, and if the conclusion is that that would not be appropriate, then this proposed ruling would also not be. A social equity based sports program would make the County teams lose every game, lose their prestige, demoralize students, and would run the risk of preventing even the next 'Michael Jordan' to gain a seat on the County sports team, thereby denying not just the County, but the State, the Country, and the World of a superb sports player and their accomplishments. To that end, they would demoralize that next 'Michael Jordan' into not being all he could be. Well, make no mistake about it. That's exactly what this new ruling will do to the most academically gifted and STEM-focused students.

I urge the Board to not let ACL lose its credibility as an esteemed education institute by making its selection process so discriminatory.

I request that you vote against the proposed changes.

Hope all is well with you and your family during these challenging CV19 times. I am a parent of a rising 8th grader at Trailside Middle School as well a 3rd grader in Newton Lee Elementary School, both in your Ashburn District. I recently learnt that LCPS Board is leaning towards making some radical changes to the AOL & AET admissions criteria for 2021-2022 school year.

Like most Indian American parents in Loudoun County, I am very alarmed to learn that LCPS board is planning to use a "Lottery" system to determine which students would receive final admission offers among the finalists who make it after years of hard work and dedicated learning. Why is LCPS adopting such a non-merit based "lucky draw" to determine the faith of hard-working talented kids for Loudoun County's premier STEM high school program? It really defeats the entire purpose of AOL & AET to pick the very best on a strictly merit basis that should continue to be determined only by multi-faceted STEM testing standards.

In addition, adopting a policy of "a predetermined number of students" to be included in the finalists pool, and then prior to the lottery, a "fair representation from all middle schools in LCPS, followed by a "specified minimum number of applicants" to be included in the finalist pool from all middle schools aka "quota" and lastly a fair representation of economically

disadvantaged aka SES kids to be included in the finalist pool before the "lucky draw" takes place. If LCPS ultimate goal is to represent a wider section of society and school population, then why even have the AOL & AET program as the outcome of your admission policies would be to "make everyone happy" instead of a merit-based STEM contest! Some would even call it a "rigged system" with a predetermined outcome!

If the purpose of adopting such radical, backward thinking, non-merit based changes is to promote kids from economically disadvantaged students (SES) to AOL & AET program, then it's a self-defeating education policy as these kids will really suffer among highly competitive & talented pool of other kids irrespective of their parent's economic status. I spent the day calming down my neighbors and their kids. We agreed to change the Raider Name with LCPS funding. My community was assured this would happen. I stated publicly I was very worried about the cost when Ian brought this forward. This was our first step on the action plan to end systemic racism. We need to manage the PR on this.

The following message was sent to the LCHS community from LCHS admin:

"I have received inquiries about the funding for this process, and at this point in time, we have not been provided a funding source from LCPS to re image our campus and purchase items to proudly promote and celebrate our new mascot. I will keep our community posted with funding information as it becomes available."

We need to share a message with the LCHS community Asap letting them know we are funding these things. It is going to be expensive —we knew that. Or we delay the change until we can fund it. This is not fair at all to the kids and the families of the oldest high school in the district. They accepted this change trusting us. Let's not let them down.

I am hopeful we can give them some answers before this goes public with the papers and social media. Parents are really really upset. I worked hard today trying to calm them down.

Good evening members of LCPS Administration, Curriculum and Instruction Committee, and the LCPS School Board,

With the School Board meeting coming in tomorrow, we as parents want to reach out to you all to highlight the criteria that is being proposed to be accepted for Loudoun County's premier STEM High School admissions.

Lowering the testing criteria standard by only requiring a C average grade for 6/7th grade, and Algebra 1 instead of Geometry, will undermine the primary goal of accepting the talented, driven STEM Students.

In addition, it will demotivate future driven students not to push themselves to get A/A+ grades and become mediocre average students getting C grades. Is that the correct message to send to our kids? What about the kids who have worked so hard to get A and B's in 6/7th grade to now lump average C grade students in the same acceptance pool of applicants? It's very demoralizing! Why are we trying to punish hard working, talented, and driven kids for the sake of promoting racial diversity? There are better ways to accomplish it by directing this exercise to the C&I Committee which can do it's due diligence and come up with suitable recommendations after a deliberate thoughtful process after paying close attention to data of students applying from different middle schools, acceptance rates vs a broad high school representation among applicants.

LCPS also needs to raise the intensity of bringing awareness of STEM based programs to parents of SES students in certain geographic areas & socio-economic conditions much earlier on during elementary school days vs waiting until students reach middle school. In addition, to help SES students raise their level of understanding STEM courses, LCPS should be offering free or subsidized tuition STEM classes. LCPS should be focused on raising the standards vs lowering them. They need to accomplish any admission criteria changes by directing this exercise to the C&I Committee which can do it's due diligence and come up with suitable recommendations after a deliberate thoughtful process after paying close attention to data of students applying from different middle schools, acceptance rates vs a broad high school representation among applicants. Replacing the lottery draw with a **subjectivity panel** who are supposed to guess which students will be successful or not, is a travesty in itself and belongs in sport betting and casinos. Since this panel is composed of educators from a diverse racial & ethinic background and has a core goal of promoting equitable results across students with diverse backgrounds, is that really the "true purpose" of making these radical backward thinking changes? This panel sounds more along the lines of a Death Panel in countries where socialized medicine is rationed among its people.

Furthermore, the selection process seems to lack transparency in terms of weighted average for the subjectivity this panel will exercise after comparing their STEM & &

writing scores. Plus the selection process would take into consideration the principle of geography/Socio-economic equity. What's really the goal here, is it to grant the very best gifted & talented driven STEM students or merely focus on granting admissions based on geographic zip codes and socio economic factors? Again, there are better ways to achieve the goal of helping SES students get admission in ACL by assisting them to increase their standards of STEM courses.

We earnestly request the C&I committee to explore this deeper and come up with suitable recommendations.

Dr. Hamlett forwarded to me the email that you sent her shortly after midday (see below). I am writing to comment on responses to recent inquiries.

Reflecting my commitment to robust communication with the School Board, I offered to meet with Board members in pairs early last week to discuss the start of the new school year. Subsequently on Tuesday, August 4, Ashley Ellis and I met with you and Jeff Morse on this topic, one of four meetings we held with pairs of Board members early last week.

During the meeting on August 4, you asked why we were planning towards providing "very limited exceptions" starting September 8. I referenced the Board-approved motion that stated that LCPS "will start the school year" with 100% distance learning with "very limited exceptions" and proceed with implementing the hybrid model in stages. And I noted that the School Board had approved a calendar identifying September 8 as the first day of school for students.

On Thursday, August 6 you raised this topic again in an email, writing, "I understand the board made an amendment to your original recommendation, however why are we pushing for September 8th?" I answered this question again in the attached email entitled "Delayed Hybrid Plan."

On Friday, August 7 at approximately 4 p.m. I sent the attached email, entitled "Implementation of the Hybrid Model in Stages", to the full Board. In that email, I explained that Dr. Jones would be at a small, out-of-state family gathering that weekend but that Board members could ask her to call them. Eric,

I've spent a lot of time thinking about last night's school board meeting and the challenges therein, particularly during the last hour of the meeting, and discussing the same with a few other board members (although I'm only speaking for myself).

I appreciate you asking for the Board's input on numerous topics, as "baked in" to presentations throughout the night, with examples including:

- Asking the LCSB to join the LCPS Administration in extending a formal apology for the history of operating segregated schools.
- Numerous other questions embedded in the Equity Plan slides
- Should hybrid learning in Stage 1 be provided to the following groups whose families selected or defaulted to the hybrid model? (ASOL SWD 18-22, self-contained SWD 18-22, MATA)
- Should teachers who expressed preference for distance learning, but do not qualify for a leave of absence, be required to teach in-person during Stage 1?
- Should cross-categorical special education teachers who expressed a preference for inperson learning be assigned to teach a self-contained class at their own school if they are licensed and experienced in doing so?
- Should students with disabilities who are eligible for the hybrid model in Stage 1 be assigned to a program at another school if there is not sufficient staff to operate the students' program at their home school?
- Should self-contained teachers who have expressed preference for the hybrid model be assigned to teach the self-contained class at another school of a teacher whose preference is for teaching 100% distance learning?
- Should LCPS focus on creating 100% distance learning schedules for the start of the 20-21 school year?

If these questions are merely meant to spark discussion, than that format is certainly appropriate. And certainly, some of the open-ended questions in the Equity Plan presentation fall into that category. However, for many others, particularly the ones relating to which group's of students would be included in Stage 1, it seems like a reasonable conclusion that you were hoping the board would take an action (either formal or through informal consensus) to provide you with answers to those questions. If that is the case, than I think the Board needs more help in structuring responses to avoid getting into situations like we did last night - Beth having to make up a motion on the spot to have the board vote on

joining you in the segregated school apology, and then again later in the night when there were 5+ conflicting motions, some or all made up on the fly, to try and provide board guidance.

What I would propose as a solution is, when appropriate, for options to be presented to the board as alternate board actions rather than open-ended questions. For example (and purely just examples):

Plan A - No students in person during Stage 1

Plan B - MATA in person during Stage 1

Plan C - MATA + ASOL SWD 18-22 + self-contained SWD 18-22 in person during Stage 1

Plan D - MATA + ASOL SWD PreK-22 + self-contained SWD PreK-22 in person during Stage 1 Etc.

While board members could of course choose to deviate from the prepared options, it would at least give us a starting point and help guide the discussion. Combined with staff's efforts to ensure that the presentations are posted on BoardDocs several days before the meeting, this would give board members time to review potential courses of action in a concrete fashion.

As I intend this to be a positive "Board of 10" hope that we can have more focused deliberations in the future during SB meetings, I've blind copied the rest of the board on this email for their information.





Eric,

I've spent a lot of time thinking about last night's school board meeting and the challenges therein, particularly during the last hour of the meeting, and discussing the same with a few other board members (although I'm only speaking for myself).

I appreciate you asking for the Board's input on numerous topics, as "baked in" to presentations throughout the night, with examples including:

- Asking the LCSB to join the LCPS Administration in extending a formal apology for the history of operating segregated schools.
- Numerous other questions embedded in the Equity Plan slides
- Should hybrid learning in Stage 1 be provided to the following groups whose families selected or defaulted to the hybrid model? (ASOL SWD 18-22, self-contained SWD 18-22, MATA)
- Should teachers who expressed preference for distance learning, but do not qualify for a leave of absence, be required to teach in-person during Stage 1?
- Should cross-categorical special education teachers who expressed a preference for inperson learning be assigned to teach a self-contained class at their own school if they are licensed and experienced in doing so?
- Should students with disabilities who are eligible for the hybrid model in Stage 1 be assigned to a program at another school if there is not sufficient staff to operate the students' program at their home school?
- Should self-contained teachers who have expressed preference for the hybrid model be assigned to teach the self-contained class at another school of a teacher whose preference is for teaching 100% distance learning?
- Should LCPS focus on creating 100% distance learning schedules for the start of the 20-21 school year?

If these questions are merely meant to spark discussion, than that format is certainly appropriate. And certainly, some of the open-ended questions in the Equity Plan presentation fall into that category. However, for many others, particularly the ones relating to which groups of students would be included in Stage 1, it seems like a reasonable conclusion that you were hoping the board would take an action (either formal or through informal consensus) to provide you with answers to those questions. If that is the case, than I think the Board needs more help in structuring responses to avoid getting into situations like we did last night - Beth having to make up a motion on the spot to have the board vote on joining you in the segregated school apology, and then again later in the night when there were 5+ conflicting motions, some or all made up on the fly, to try and provide board guidance.

What I would propose as a solution is, when appropriate, for options to be presented to the board as alternate board actions rather than open-ended questions. For example (and purely just examples):

Plan A - No students in person during Stage 1

Plan B - MATA in person during Stage 1

Plan C - MATA + ASOL SWD 18-22 + self-contained SWD 18-22 in person during Stage 1

Plan D - MATA + ASOL SWD PreK-22 + self-contained SWD PreK-22 in person during Stage 1 Etc.

While board members could of course choose to deviate from the prepared options, it would at least give us a starting point and help guide the discussion. Combined with staff's efforts to ensure that the presentations are posted on BoardDocs several days before the meeting, this would give board members time to review potential courses of action in a concrete fashion.

As I intend this to be a positive "Board of 10" hope that we can have more focused deliberations in the future during SB meetings, I've blind copied the rest of the board on this email for their information.

Dr. Hamlett forwarded to me the email that you sent her shortly after midday (see below). I am writing to comment on responses to recent inquiries.

Reflecting my commitment to robust communication with the School Board, I offered to meet with Board members in pairs early last week to discuss the start of the new school year. Subsequently on Tuesday, August 4, Ashley Ellis and I met with you and Jeff Morse on this topic, one of four meetings we held with pairs of Board members early last week.

During the meeting on August 4, you asked why we were planning towards providing "very limited exceptions" starting September 8. I referenced the Board-approved motion that stated that LCPS "will start the school year" with 100% distance learning with "very limited exceptions" and proceed with implementing the hybrid model in stages. And I noted that the School Board had approved a calendar identifying September 8 as the first day of school for students.

On Thursday, August 6 you raised this topic again in an email, writing, "I understand the board made an amendment to your original recommendation, however why are we pushing for September 8th?" I answered this question again in the attached email entitled "Delayed Hybrid Plan."

On Friday, August 7 at approximately 4 p.m. I sent the attached email, entitled "Implementation of the Hybrid Model in Stages", to the full Board. In that email, I explained that Dr. Jones would be at a small, out-of-state family gathering that weekend but that Board members could ask her to call them. I stated that I was also happy to try to connect with Board members.

In fact, we connected within hours of that conversation. You contacted me at 5:21 and asked me if I was available for a call with Brenda Sheridan that evening or during the weekend. I responded to you three minutes later to say that I could speak that evening or later in the weekend. We subsequently spoke by phone with Brenda Sheridan that evening from 5:30 p.m. to 5:54 p.m. Three minutes after the call I sent you the attached email entitled "Questions" as we had discussed during the call.

On Saturday, August 8, you sent an email to me that is embedded within the attached email entitled "Motion." This email again raised the topic of why we were planning towards "very limited exceptions." The attached email entitled "Motion" includes the response I sent you on Monday. Dr. Hamlett also emailed you on Monday (see below) relating to other aspects of your email from Saturday.

I appreciate you taking the time to read this summary of examples of recent timely, responsive communication steps with you.

Also, yesterday afternoon (approximately one and a half business days after your Saturday inquiry), Mr. Devita sent you an email entitled "CONFIDENTIAL SPED Questions Legal Advice" on the behalf of Dr. Jones. Additionally, some information on the topics that were addressed to Dr. Jones and Mr. Lewis were also presented at the School Board meeting last night.

My understanding is that the intent in the creation of this practice was to apply this practice with regularly scheduled Board meetings, scheduled at least two weeks apart. We continue our efforts in this area, and will also seek to implement the practice, when feasible, with special meetings of the Board.

You mentioned copying the full Board for their information so I am copying the Board Chair and Vice-Chair.

Eric,

I've spent a lot of time thinking about last night's school board meeting and the challenges therein, particularly during the last hour of the meeting, and discussing the same with a few other board members (although I'm only speaking for myself).

I appreciate you asking for the Board's input on numerous topics, as "baked in" to presentations throughout the night, with examples including:

- Asking the LCSB to join the LCPS Administration in extending a formal apology for the history of operating segregated schools.
- Numerous other questions embedded in the Equity Plan slides

- Should hybrid learning in Stage 1 be provided to the following groups whose families selected or defaulted to the hybrid model? (ASOL SWD 18-22, self-contained SWD 18-22, MATA)
- Should teachers who expressed preference for distance learning, but do not qualify for a leave of absence, be required to teach in-person during Stage 1?
- Should cross-categorical special education teachers who expressed a preference for inperson learning be assigned to teach a self-contained class at their own school if they are licensed and experienced in doing so?
- Should students with disabilities who are eligible for the hybrid model in Stage 1 be assigned to a program at another school if there is not sufficient staff to operate the students' program at their home school?
- Should self-contained teachers who have expressed preference for the hybrid model be assigned to teach the self-contained class at another school of a teacher whose preference is for teaching 100% distance learning?
- Should LCPS focus on creating 100% distance learning schedules for the start of the 20-21 school year?

If these questions are merely meant to spark discussion, than that format is certainly appropriate. And certainly, some of the open-ended questions in the Equity Plan presentation fall into that category. However, for many others, particularly the ones relating to which groups of students would be included in Stage 1, it seems like a reasonable conclusion that you were hoping the board would take an action (either formal or through informal consensus) to provide you with answers to those questions. If that is the case, than I think the Board needs more help in structuring responses to avoid getting into situations like we did last night - Beth having to make up a motion on the spot to have the board vote on joining you in the segregated school apology, and then again later in the night when there were 5+ conflicting motions, some or all made up on the fly, to try and provide board guidance.

What I would propose as a solution is, when appropriate, for options to be presented to the board as alternate board actions rather than open-ended questions. For example (and purely just examples):

Plan A - No students in person during Stage 1

Plan B - MATA in person during Stage 1

Plan C - MATA + ASOL SWD 18-22 + self-contained SWD 18-22 in person during Stage 1

Plan D - MATA + ASOL SWD PreK-22 + self-contained SWD PreK-22 in person during Stage 1 Etc.

While board members could of course choose to deviate from the prepared options, it would at least give us a starting point and help guide the discussion. Combined with staff's efforts to ensure that the presentations are posted on BoardDocs several days before the meeting, this

would give board members time to review potential courses of action in a concrete fashion.

As I intend this to be a positive "Board of 10" hope that we can have more focused deliberations in the future during SB meetings, I've blind copied the rest of the board on this email for their information.

Good afternoon,

I commend the LCPS leadership and every employee who is working tirelessly (the word I struggle with) to communicate and meet the needs of our children and families. At Friday's meeting, I shared a great deal of information, concerns, and questions in regard to reaching our most at-risk students and families, as we know these students will be the most negatively impacted by the school closure.

- Distance Learning What is the protocol to ensure ALL students are connected and have support? Suggestion: Perhaps teachers take attendance and then instill the help of the parent liaisons, specialists, teaching assistants, and other staff to make phone calls and reach out to the families who are not connected. Perhaps this can be managed through a google doc and admin can assign a specialist to manage the mission of having every student connected. Have each teacher report students who are not connected and assign staff to make phone calls and assist.
- Chromebook Distribution What is the protocol to ensure ALL students have
 Chromebooks? (Including the charter school students.) Suggestion: Create a protocol to
 ensure all students, especially our most at-risk and disadvantaged students in grades 3-12
 receive a computer and hotspot. The protocol may look similar to the suggestion outlined
 above.
- Chromebook/Hotspot Instructions What is the protocol to ensure parents understand the safety concerns, the suggested usage and have the equipment and directions need for connectivity? Suggestion: When distributing Chromebooks, ensure that each student/parent is provided printed instructions to include, how to use the computer, how to connect to the internet, how to access platforms to allow students to connect with teacher and most importantly, safety precautions (as Mr. Beatty suggested) etc. and where to find technical support in printed in English and Spanish.
- Food Distribution How do we evaluate to distribution of food to ensure we are reaching our needlest students? Suggestion: Use meal distribution data to figure out areas where participation is low and expected to be high and increase the communication by launch Connected Ed calls to neighborhoods and/or target our free and reduced population and EL population across the county.
- Communication How are we communicating with families who do not have internet.
 computers, and cannot read? Suggestion: Provide ConnectEd phone calls of updates all and information targeting families who rarely use ParentVUE and StudentVUE, families of EL students and free and reduced families.
- Community Outreach How can we proactivly use the community to help inform parents of support programs and updates? Suggestion: Within each Connect Ed call encourage

families to share the information with other families and community members to help with communication efforts.

 Special Education - How will we ensure our special education students are provided services? Please provide a plan/protocol to share with parents.

Additional concerns from parents:

"So friends in the know think the Governor's "big announcement" tomorrow is that he will close schools for the rest of the year. Sounds fine and dandy, HOWEVER, some of us have students who need to make up work and within our legal right to do so and if they don't, their GPAs will suffer. Also, our seniors will NOT get a proper graduation ceremony and our kids who are still in high school will miss out on over a quarter of work. This does NOT sit well with this mama when her rising junior is signed up to take Calculus next year and will not be provided with her right to an education, which we have paid a pretty price for in real estate taxes. I understand the equity angle, believe me, but then a kid who was promised by her teachers that she would get chances to improve her grade over the next two quarters and who has accommodations loses their rights to improve their GPA due to no fault of their own. So my question is, how will LCPS handle these concerns?"

Is there a way to continue learning for HS students? Perhaps we can engage all contracted and paid employees to help service special needs students. We already have some classes that are provided through virtual Loudoun, would be be able to enroll students in these courses?

Once we have direction, I am sure staff is already considering next steps. I would also hope when decisions are made, teachers who are delivering instruction are included in the process.

Dr. Goodfriend asked that I make that clear since he did not want their to be a perception that there was any knowledge of presumptive position cases of individuals connected to schools.

Here is a graphic providing data pertaining to viewership of the livestreamed press briefing, which was publicized via Social Media. I have not reviewed the graphic carefully, but I'm told that it illustrates that there were 2,554 total views, each with an average watch time of 11 minutes and 38 seconds.



I've also attached Dr. Hamlett's sequence of emails with updates to the School Board, including each of the emails that were sent to community and staff members this morning. And I've attached an update from this afternoon that we just sent recently. We anticipate sending another update tomorrow. You may have noticed that the Public Information Office implemented a pop up notice to visitors to our website yesterday. Today the pop up message referenced the closure and provided a link to the FAQ page.

It may be of interest to you that Cabinet members, Rob Doolittle, and I met for approximately 90 minutes this afternoon to coordinate our

various efforts relating to COVID-19. A group of approximately 25 staff members (Cabinet members, select Senior Staff members, and a few others) for approximately 90 minutes this afternoon to further collaborate across departments. We identified many of the tasks we will focus on during the closure, while also identifying and discussing the highest priority items. Much of the conversation was collaborative although I was directive with several matters, such as my request that we announce a hotline tomorrow that will start operation on Monday and will be staffed full-time by individuals from several departments. This hotline will complement the FAQs, and the opportunity for individuals to submit written questions via the COVID-19 page.

This afternoon I also was interviewed by PBS News Hour.

I've attached an email from Advantus that includes the announcement from the Governor of his declaration of a state of emergency.

Cabinet members are holding a webinar to update principals tomorrow morning regarding COVID-19 matters. The two lead groups that met today (cabinet and the broader group) will each meet again tomorrow.

This morning I spoke directly to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction regarding our closure. And a team of us participated in a conference call this afternoon with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

We have heard from six of nine Board members in support of cancelling committee meetings and other meetings scheduled in the Admin Building next week; therefore, the only two meetings that will occur are the special permissions meeting (via WebEx) and the Special Meeting of the School Board. We will work with the PIO to encourage the public to watch the Special Meeting of the School Board remotely.

I'll continue to update you periodically regarding our ongoing work relating to COVID-19.

I want to acknowledge that this is a stressful time to be a School Board member. I know one aspect of the difficulty is that community members demand a lot of elected officials during times like this. Thank you for your difficult service during this time.

Good afternoon Dr. Williams,

I respect that we need to channel questions and specific issues in an organized manner to the Chair. This particular email is to share how my community is feeling and I feel that needs to come from me, their elected official.

Many in my district watched your video last night. I got a significant number of emails and phone calls after the Governor's announcement and additional ones after your video.

I am reassuring Leesburg families that LCPS is spending this time addressing basic needs such as food and making sure our students have devices in order to connect to LCPS. Now that school is closed for the duration of the year, I want to make it clear to LCPS that my community expects their children to be learning NEW material by April 6th at the very latest. The biggest concern many have shared are your references to opportunity gaps and equity and why we are reviewing starting March 30th instead of starting new content.

Some common themes....we have had opportunity gaps for the last two decades and that did not shut down any schools. Our reading scores are quite dismal in certain areas and yet we have continued to purchase additions to the Units of Study program knowing it did not meet the needs of all students. We know our gifted programs have not been inclusive when it comes to making sure we have representation from students of color yet we did not stop admitting kids into the Academies.

I do agree that we can make sure our students excel without all students being on the same timeline. Many students need to start now in order to excel in their classes. Not 1,2 or 3 weeks from now. Maybe the goal needs to be that everyone is at the same place by the beginning of next school year and not that we all start at the same time.

I understand we have special concerns with our SPED students. I am committed to making sure we address gaps that this situation may create. It is not safe for teachers to physically work with our students and this will mean some students will not progress as well as they would in a face to face setting. This is the reality. FAPE requires that we offer a free and appropriate education. It does not say the best. Not a single student in LCPS is going to be getting the "best" education over the next 3 months. Not a single one.

I appreciate all that you and your team are doing every day. To be clear I want to continue to support paying our teachers and staff despite knowing we are potentially facing a great recession by making sure they have the opportunity to teach what is needed to move their students forward.

know our community wants that as well.

Below you will find summaries of updates from each department that has an update to share. There may also be links or associated attachments included.

Office of the Superintendent (includes Chief of Staff and School Board Attorney)

- 1. Confirmed LCPS Cases There is a 3rd confirmed case at Waxpool Elementary School and a confirmed case associated with Moorefield Station Elementary School. Messages to each community went out today. Tomorrow, the cabinet will be discussing next steps as they relate to future communication regarding confirmed cases. We are exploring posting an update on our website regarding confirmed cases, similar to the updates provided by the Virginia Department of Health. See emails that went to the Waxpool and Moorefield Station communities. (pp. 1-4)
- 2. Nyah Hamlett and I participated on a conference call with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction one hour prior to the Governor's Press Conference. Please note that in previous calls, the State Superintendent provided updates to Superintendents and provided an opportunity for Superintendents to ask questions. With today's call, the communication was one-way (from Dr. Lane) and Superintendents were instructed to keep the information shared confidential until the Governor made his announcement. (pp. 5-8)

Below are a few notes from the call that may answer a few questions that you have:

- a. Within the next 24 hours VDOE will provide information and guidance regarding graduation, standard credits, continuity of learning and grades;
- b. Guidance on special education came out this weekend from the USDOE
 - i. Taking the position that we should continue with new instruction and students with disabilities or the services that they require should not be a barrier; however, the guidance indicated that local education agencies (LEAs) are still responsible for providing free and appropriate public education (FAPE) and ensuring equity for students.
 - ii. VDOE recommends that LEAs focus on that aspect with their School Board Attorney; VDOE will work with LEAs to provide guidance, not legal advice.
- c. There is no requirement to make up days; however, LEAs without virtual learning may wish to extend next year, but VDOE will not mandate that.

- d. With a continued focus on continuity of learning, there should be an added focus on providing meals to students.
 - i. There may be a potential to offer EBT cards for students eligible for free and reduced meals; VDOE encouraged Superintendents to continue to do what we are doing now and potentially expand those services, as needed.
- e. There is an anticipated heavy burden on the healthcare system in the coming weeks; need to have solutions for child care for essential personnel (i.e. healthcare, public utilities, first responders, etc.)
 - i. VDOE strongly encouraged Superintendents to open facilities (no more than 9-10 kids in a room) for child care for essential personnel and partner with groups like YMCA, local Parks and Recreation departments, Boys and Girls Club, etc.

Office of the Superintendent (includes Chief of Staff and School Board Attorney)

- Confirmed LCPS Case There is a confirmed case of a staff member at The Academies of Loudoun. See emails that went to the Academies staff and community. (pp.1-2)
- 2. I participated in a conference call, along with Asia Jones, Ashley Ellis, and Nyah Hamlett, in order to receive information from the State Superintendent. On the call, the State Superintendent and his staff walked us through the guidance that was released late last night and opened it up for Q&A. We are still processing information and the local implications. No discretionary decisions have been made as a result of the guidance released late last night or today's call.
- 3. We continue to work methodically, yet swiftly, to make operational decisions to ease the hearts and minds of our students, staff, and broader community to the maximum extent possible. We also want the Board to know that we are hopeful that the display by the School Board and senior leadership of Board-staff collaboration. Keeping in mind the guidance provided by Steve DeVita related to virtual meetings for COVID-19 matters, we are planning for potential School Board agenda items, either as separate items or embedded within the COVID update presentation related to policy and resource allocation that will further display our collective efficacy and leadership. A few examples included in today's update include COVID Time Limited Emergency Pay (CTLEP), income replacement after April 10, future plans for Distance Learning Guidance, and options for Charter Schools Chromebook distribution and/or support.

As mentioned in my video message that was released last night, VDOE is now suggesting that learning of new additional content and skills should be part of distance learning plans. This is a shift from the previous language used. Superintendents have been instructed to continue to consider equity issues that may arise in development of our plan, which is why distance learning is defined as both digital and non-digital learning experiences. The Virginia Department of Education set forth <u>guidance</u> late last night to help Superintendents execute plans to continue instruction. For now, with minimal time to process the guidance released and the takeaways from this afternoon's conference call, I can confidently share with you a few things:

- There will be significant flexibility as the State Superintendent has the authority to waive most graduation requirements. Anyone who was on track to graduate as of March 13 will graduate.
- Nothing should preclude a student from moving on to their next course and grade level, but for students who are working for a standard credit we will need to document a process of completion.
- With K-8, those students expected to be on track to move to the next level/course should be able to do so and no student will be required to take an SOL in order to move on.
- The VDOE anticipates flexibility from the Office of Civil Rights (OCR), but school divisions will still be held accountable to FAPE, IDEA, and Section 504. We are encouraged to provide new learning and DOI and DPS are diligently collaborating to prepare to do so for students with and without disabilities.
- VDOE is not recommending grading at this time nor do they plan to issue new guidance on grading. Their recommendation still stands - do not grade, consider pass/fail with considerations for GPA and other local issues.

The bottom line is that as of this moment we are continuing to work on detailed plans of what continuity of education looks like in Loudoun considering the newly released guidance from VDOE. We anticipate moving forward with plans outlined in the guidance provided to teachers last Friday (summarized below). We also anticipate that revisions to the current plan may occur in mid-April following further guidance from VDOE, forthcoming information regarding waivers, and collaboration with the School Board. We do not plan to make a decision without the School Board's review and are also remaining agile as we work toward a moving target.

Here are highlights of the current plan that is subject to change for the period that will begin March 30:

- Most teachers of students in grades 3 through 12 will use Google Classroom to communicate information about both digital and nondigital learning experiences.
- K-2 teachers will use Google Classroom or other platforms they've already been using with their students and their families.
- At this time, but with anticipated changes in the near future, all learning experiences presented by teachers will provide reinforcement of previously taught content.
- At this time, teachers will give students feedback, but not grades, regarding student work through Google Classroom.

- As of March 30, and subject to change, we've asked elementary school teachers to provide daily learning opportunities of up to 60-90 minutes, depending on a student's grade level.
- As of March 30, and subject to change, we've asked middle and high school teachers to provide daily learning opportunities of up to 30 minutes per class.
- 4. In monitoring some social media traffic and a Board member's email to me today, there have been questions and/or concerns regarding my reference to equity in the video, particularly ensuring equity for specific groups. LCPS remains committed to doing the right thing for every student. Reminding viewers of the groups for whom equity and opportunity gaps historically exist helps to keep our focus on all meaning all LCPS students. I would like the School Board to know that needing more time to ensure that we get continuity of education right is not about equity issues, it is about doing it right for all kids and seizing the opportunity to be innovative in the midst of a time of crisis.
- 5. I was invited by the County to participate in the Board of Supervisors' Emergency Business Meeting tomorrow at 2:00PM. We are coordinating schedules to see if I can provide an update via telephone on behalf of LCPS, likely between 3:15 and 4:00PM.

Good afternoon,

We are not sure who is communicating what you have documented in your email, but below is the first Q&A regarding instruction on the <u>VDOE website</u>.

Additionally, please know that staff is working as hard and as fast as we can to manage expectations regarding communication and decision making while also balancing the needs, interests, and community care approach that we have committed to.

Staff is prepared to communicate information regarding distance learning plans and teaching new content as early as this evening. We plan to do so in a thoughtful and systematic manner recognizing that the Board has asked for information regarding our plan and has a meeting on Tuesday. I hope that this information is helpful. Have a good weekend.

Please share guidance related to online or distance learning during an extended school closure.

The impact to students during an extended school closure can be significant. The learning time and support students receive at school are not easily supplemented or replaced. Understanding the desire and responsibility of parents and educators alike to provide continuity for every student in their thinking and learning, many school divisions are assessing the feasibility of providing online learning in the event of extended school closures. In looking at this option, it is important to consider the practical steps necessary to appropriately serve every student equitably and the extent to which a traditional school environment can be quickly replicated online. It is not a simple task, nor is it one that should be attempted without serious consideration of equity and access. Schools should thoughtfully evaluate their approach, understand their legal obligations, and maintain the standards for delivery of instruction and student supports. Services, programs and activities online must be accessible to persons, including individuals with disabilities unless equally effective alternative access is provided in another manner (U. S. Department of Education, Office for Civil Rights, 2020). Divisions may have the capacity to explore expanding or offering online learning. Divisions should apply an equity lens and consider the impacts on underserved groups, including students of color, students with disabilities, emerging bilingual students, students experiencing poverty and homelessness, and students who belong to other protected classes. Consider whether the model will improve or worsen disparities between populations. Consider barriers to equitable implementation and unintended consequences. Shifting from a "brick and mortar" school environment to online learning that meets the regulations of holding "school" is a complex task that requires thoughtful planning, serious consideration of practicality, and assessment of risk. This assessment of risk should consider the impact of compensatory education and exposure for local school divisions to dispute resolution. Additional guidance is also available from the U. S. Department of Education (USED) including a short webinar on online education and website accessibility and a fact sheet (PDF) on addressing the risk of COVID-19 in schools while protecting the civil rights of students.

I greatly appreciate your emphasis on serving ALL children. I share that focus.

Prior to the School Board meeting on Tuesday, LCPS started to implement and further develop plans to identify students who had not yet picked up a laptop with the aim of providing a laptop to every student. A more detailed expression of that aim would include the phrase "that wants one" since parents across the division have declined the Chromebooks because their students have access to other devices at home (although these families are not the ones we are focused on in terms of equitable digital access).

Prior to receipt of your email, we launched plans for personalized outreach to families who did not pick up a laptop as part of the recent laptop distribution. We look forward to the opportunity to provide the School Board more information regarding this topic at our next School Board meeting.

The intent behind input from Board members following the email from FedEx is appreciated because it reflects Board members' commitment to thorough communication. The specific feedback provided did not change our course of action because our approach has been to explore other ways of providing laptops before home delivery, while still implementing the motion approved by the School Board. Of course any steps we take will be informed by our primary focus on the health of all involved (staff members, parents, students). I'm optimistic that Board members, staff members, parents, and students will be pleased with the additional progress we make following the Board's approval of the motion.

I'll include your email and this response in today's Update for the School Board as an fyi for other Board members.

Eric,

We can all agree it is the responsibility of our school division and the school board to service ALL children. We have children at every school in every district who are disadvantaged and need us more than ever during this crisis. In collaboration with a group of principals, teachers and staff who are working on the frontline, we created the motion I presented on Tuesday to ensure distance learning equity throughout the county.

As a district, we can be so proud of our proactive efforts in purchasing and providing 1:1 devices to students in grades 3-12. However, we cannot say we are fully 1:1 if there are presumably 1,800 children without a laptop and we have made no attempt to find out why. In my opinion, if we don't take action, we have failed 1,800 children and families.

We know every school is tracking students who have picked up their computers through a database. Within 15 minutes or less, each school is able to compile a list names and contact information for students who have not picked up computers. I would suggest each school principal hold an online meeting and task a group of staff who have a "light load" or who are key players (attendance secretaries, counselors, specialists, parent liaisons, instructional facilitators, teacher assistants and all other staff) to call or email each family to find out why the laptops have not been picked up. Perhaps some students have moved, some families may not want laptops, some might be able to pick them up in coordination with food delivery, some may need home delivery through drop off and as a last resort we would mail them

through FedEx.

The inadvertent transparency of the FedEx email sent to the board was a blessing. It provided an opportunity for the board to offer clarity and direction. I would hope outreach to students and being fiscally responsible is among our highest priorities as we move forward.

Below you will find summaries of updates from each department that has an update to share. There may also be links or associated attachments included.

Office of the Superintendent (includes Chief of Staff and School Board Attorney)

- 1. Cabinet and Rob Doolittle met again today to collaborate on COVID-19 and other matters.
- 2. I just wanted to take a moment to express appreciation for the Board's support, meaningful questions, and due diligence throughout yesterday's 6 hour School Board meeting. There were many examples of you skillfully fulfilling governance responsibilities and demonstrating our unified commitment to serving the students and families of LCPS, while also working to address the needs of employees. I am grateful for our display of collaboration through a governance team approach. In the midst of a stressful season for everyone, it certainly is not expected that we will always be on the same page, but I thank you for trusting me and my team to make operational decisions with your input and support. My hope is that with the School Board and Cabinet's collective efficacy and track record, we will continue to lead and model the way together through these unprecedented times.
- 3. I also met this afternoon with Vince Scheivert, Ashley Ellis, Nyah Hamlett, and Justin Donovan (the DDI Director taking the lead with Chromebook distribution, under the supervision of Vince). We discussed how we might build on previously planned follow-up outreach to the initial Chromebook pick-up opportunities in order to implement the motion approved by the School Board last night relating to Chromebooks.

PIO/Communications

- We will distribute another update to the community later today. The update will address the following topics: continuity of education; quarter 3 grades and make up work; April 6 to April 10; April 13 and 14; meals program during spring break, and refund requests.
- In response to a request from Ms. Corbo, today's attachment includes a spreadsheet documenting the 239 queries received by LCPS through a form on

the <u>COVID-19 FAQ</u> webpage. Personally identifiable information of community members submitting questions has been removed to protect their privacy. Responses to these queries have taken several forms, including individual email responses from subject matter experts within LCPS departments; individual responses through the public information office, using content from the prepared FAQs; summary responses, providing generalized information about a subject area (such as building access or cleaning processes); and, in some cases, responses indicating that decisions about topics have not been finalized. A complete record of individual responses has not been maintained, since multiple LCSP respondents have been answering queries. (pp. 1-14)
