This is our first interim response to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request dated and received in this Office on August 11, 2022, in which you requested records of the Offices of the Attorney General, Deputy Attorney General, and Associate Attorney General, from June 1, 2022 to the present, concerning the search warrant executed at Mar-a-Lago on August 8, 2022.

Please be advised that initial searches have been conducted and records responsive to your request have been located. At this time, I have determined that fifty-one pages containing records responsive to your request are appropriate for release with withholdings made pursuant to Exemption 6 of the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(6). Please note that certain withholdings were made on behalf of the Department's Executive Office for United States Attorneys, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the National Security Division. Additionally, eight pages are being withheld in full pursuant to Exemption 5 of the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5). Exemption 5 pertains to certain inter- and intra-agency communications protected by civil discovery privileges. Exemption 6 pertains to information the release of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. Please be advised that we have considered the foreseeable harm standard when reviewing records and applying FOIA exemptions.

For your information, Congress excluded three discrete categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIA. See 5 U.S.C. § 552(c) (2018). This response is limited to those records that are subject to the requirements of the FOIA. This is a standard notification that is given to all our requesters and should not be taken as an indication that excluded records do, or do not, exist.

MOVANT JUDICIAL WATCH, INC.'S MOTION TO UNSEAL SEARCH WARRANT

Movant Judicial Watch, Inc., by counsel, respectfully requests this Court unseal the search warrant materials in *U.S. v. Sealed Search Warrant*, Case No. 9:22-mj-08332 as expeditiously as possible. As grounds thereof, Judicial Watch states as follows:

- 1. On August 8, 2022, FBI agents executed a search warrant at President Donald J. Trump's residence in Palm Beach, Florida. According to media reports, the warrant relates to an alleged dispute over the Presidential Records Act.
- 2. According to this Court's docket, all entries, including the search warrant are sealed.
- 3. Judicial Watch is a not-for-profit, educational organization that seeks to promote transparency, accountability, and integrity in government and fidelity to the rule of law. An integral part of Judicial Watch's mission is educating the public about the operations and activities of the government and government officials. To this end, Judicial Watch undertakes investigations of the federal government and federal officials by making extensive use of FOIA, among other

investigative tools. Judicial Watch subsequently analyzes all records it receives and disseminates its findings to the public.

- 4. Here, Judicial Watch is investigating the potential politicization of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the U.S. Department of Justice and whether the FBI and the Justice Department are abusing their law enforcement powers to harass a likely future political opponent of President Biden. If the Court were to unseal the materials, Judicial Watch would obtain the materials, analyze them, and make them available to the public. Unsealing the records therefore would further Judicial Watch's mission of educating the public.
- 5. Federal courts have long recognized a common-law right of access to judicial records. *Patel v. United States*, 2019 U.S. Dist. LEXIS 152670, *13 (S.D. Fla. Sept. 9, 2019). Such right extends to pre-indictment search-warrant materials. *See Bennett v. United States*, 2013 U.S. Dist. LEXIS 102771, *20 (S.D. Fla. July 23, 2013) (Courts have recognized that the common-law right to inspect judicial records applies where the record at issue is a sealed search-warrant affidavit.") (collecting cases).
- 6. "When deciding whether to grant a party's motion to seal or conversely the granting of a party's motion to unseal, the court is required to balance the historical presumption of access against any competing interest." *Id.* at *21 (*quoting In re Search of Office Suites for World and Islam Studies*, 925 F. Supp. 738, 742 (M.D. Fla. 1996). Specifically, courts consider "whether the records are sought for improper purposes, whether access is likely to promote public understanding of historically significant events, and whether the press has already been permitted substantial access to the contents of the records." *In re Four Search Warrants*, 945 F. Supp. 1563, 1568 (N.D. Ga. 1996) (*quoting Newman v. Graddick*, 696 F.2d 796, 803 (11th Cir. 1983)).

7. All three considerations support Judicial Watch's motion to unseal. First, Judicial Watch seeks access to the warrant materials as part of its educational mission. If the Court were to unseal the materials, Judicial Watch would obtain the materials, analyze them, and make them available to the public. Second, the public has an urgent and substantial interest in understanding the predicate for the execution of the unprecedented search warrant of the private residence of a former president and likely future political opponent. Third, no official explanation or information has been released about the search. As of the filing of this motion, the public record consists solely of speculation and inuendo. In short, the historical presumption of access to warrant materials vastly outweighs any interest the government may have in keeping the materials under seal.

8. Given the political context, and the highly unusual action of executing a search warrant at the residence of a former President and likely future political opponent, it is essential that the public understands as soon as possible the basis for the government's action. Any government interest in securing the identities of witnesses and confidential sources, if any, may be addressed by appropriate redactions from the search warrant affidavit.

For the foregoing reasons, Judicial Watch respectfully requests this Court unseal the search warrant materials in *U.S. v. Sealed Search Warrant*, Case No. 9:22-mj-08332 as expeditiously as possible.

Since I became Attorney General, I have made clear that the Department of Justice will speak through its court filings and its work.

Today, the Justice Department has filed a motion in the Southern District of Florida to unseal a search warrant and property receipt relating to a court-approved search that the FBI conducted earlier this week.

That search was of premises located in Florida belonging to the former President. The Department did not make any public statements on the day of the search. The former President publicly confirmed the search that evening, as is his right.

Copies of both the warrant and the FBI property receipt were provided on the day of the search to the former President's counsel, who was on site during the search.

The search warrant was authorized by a federal court upon the required finding of probable cause.

The "property receipt" is a document that federal law requires law enforcement agents to leave with the property owner.

The Department filed the motion to make public the warrant and receipt in light of the former President's public confirmation of the search, the surrounding circumstances, and the substantial public interest in this matter.

Faithful adherence to the rule of law is the bedrock principle of the Justice Department and of our democracy.

Upholding the rule of law means applying the law evenly, without fear or favor. Under my watch, that is precisely what the Justice Department is doing.

All Americans are entitled to the evenhanded application of the law, to due process of law, and to the presumption of innocence.

Much of our work is by necessity conducted out of the public eye. We do so to protect the constitutional rights of all Americans and to protect the integrity of our investigations.

Federal law, longstanding Department rules, and our ethical obligations prevent me from providing further detail as to the basis for the search at this time. There are, however, certain points I want you to know.

First, I personally approved the decision to seek a search warrant in this matter.

Second, the Department does not take such a decision lightly. Where possible, it is standard practice to seek less intrusive means as an alternative to a search, and to narrowly scope any search that is undertaken.

Third, let me address recent unfounded attacks on the professionalism of FBI and Justice Department agents and prosecutors. I will not stand by silently when their integrity is unfairly attacked.

The men and women of the FBI and the Justice Department are dedicated, patriotic public servants.

Every day, they protect the American people from violent crime, terrorism, and other threats to their safety, while safeguarding our civil rights. They do so at great personal sacrifice and risk to themselves.

I am honored to work alongside them.

This is all I can say right now. More information will be made available in the appropriate way and at the appropriate time. Thank you.

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Attorney General Merrick Garland Delivers Remarks

Washington, DC

Thursday, August 11, 2022

Remarks as Delivered

Good afternoon. Since I became Attorney General, I have made clear that the Department of Justice will speak through its court filings and its work.

Just now, the Justice Department has filed a motion in the Southern District of Florida to unseal a search warrant and property receipt relating to a court-approved search that the FBI conducted earlier this week.

That search was of premises located in Florida belonging to the former President. The Department did not make any public statements on the day of the search. The former President publicly confirmed the search that evening, as is his right.

Copies of both the warrant and the FBI property receipt were provided on the day of the search to the former President's counsel, who was on site during the search.

The search warrant was authorized by a federal court upon the required finding of probable cause.

The "property receipt" is a document that federal law requires law enforcement agents to leave with the property owner.

The Department filed the motion to make public the warrant and receipt in light of the former President's public confirmation of the search, the surrounding circumstances, and the substantial public interest in this matter.

Faithful adherence to the rule of law is the bedrock principle of the Justice Department and of our democracy.

Upholding the rule of law means applying the law evenly, without fear or favor. Under my watch, that is precisely what the Justice Department is doing.

All Americans are entitled to the evenhanded application of the law, to due process of the law, and to the presumption of innocence.

Much of our work is by necessity conducted out of the public eye. We do that to protect the constitutional rights of all Americans and to protect the integrity of our investigations.

Federal law, longstanding Department rules, and our ethical obligations prevent me from providing further details as to the basis of the search at this time. There are, however, certain points I want you to know.

First, I personally approved the decision to seek a search warrant in this matter.

Second, the Department does not take such a decision lightly. Where possible, it is standard practice to seek less intrusive means as an alternative to a search, and to narrowly scope any search that is undertaken.

Third, let me address recent unfounded attacks on the professionalism of the FBI and Justice Department agents and prosecutors. I will not stand by silently when their integrity is unfairly attacked.

The men and women of the FBI and the Justice Department are dedicated, patriotic public servants.

Every day, they protect the American people from violent crime, terrorism, and other threats to their safety, while safeguarding our civil rights. They do so at great personal sacrifice and risk to themselves.

I am honored to work alongside them.

This is all I can say right now. More information will be made available in the appropriate way and at the appropriate time. Thank you.

This is our third interim response to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request dated and received in this Office on August 11, 2022, in which you requested records of the Offices of the Attorney General, Deputy Attorney General, and Associate Attorney General, from June 1, 2022 to the present, concerning the search warrant executed at Mar-a-Lago on August 8, 2022. We previously provided you with an interim response on April 28, 2023.

At this time, I have determined that 422 pages containing records responsive to your request are appropriate for release with withholdings made pursuant to Exemptions 5, 6, 7(C), and 7(E) of the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5), (b)(6), (b)(7)(C), and (b)(7)(E). Please note that certain withholdings were made on behalf of the Department's National Security Division and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Additionally, four pages are being withheld in full pursuant to Exemption 5 of the FOIA. Exemption 5 pertains to certain inter- and intra-agency communications protected by civil discovery privileges. Exemption 6 pertains to information the release of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. Exemption 7(C) pertains to records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, the release of which could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. Exemption 7(E) pertains to records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, the release of which would disclose certain techniques and procedures or guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions. Please be advised that we have considered the foreseeable harm standard when reviewing records and applying FOIA exemptions.

For your information, the official Department email account of Attorney General Garland does not use his name. This practice is consistent with that of prior Attorneys General and protects the privacy and security of the Attorneys General, allowing them to conduct official business efficiently via email. Attorney General email account names are released once they are no longer in use, and in such circumstances requesters are advised that the account denotes emails to or from the Attorney General. Attorney General email account names in current use are protected pursuant to Exemption 6, and, in such instances, requesters

are advised that the withheld information consists of the email address of the Attorney General. These procedures ensure that all Attorney General emails released under the FOIA are identifiable as such.

For your information, Congress excluded three discrete categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIA. See 5 U.S.C. § 552(c) (2018). This response is limited to those records that are subject to the requirements of the FOIA. This is a standard notification that is given to all our requesters and should not be taken as an indication that excluded records do, or do not, exist.

Dear Director Wray:

Yesterday, agents with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) conducted a search of former President Trump's Mar-a-Lago residence, purportedly based upon a referral from the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) to investigate former President Donald Trump's handling of classified White House records. Former Archivist David Ferriero confirmed that NARA had been in communication with the Department of Justice over records that were previously transferred from President Trump because classified information was allegedly found within those boxes.² In addition, press reports indicate that Jay Bratt, the chief of the counterintelligence and export control section of the Department of Justice (DOJ) held a meeting in June with President Trump's attorneys about any additional materials being stored in Mar-a-Lago.³

I would assume that an escalation of this magnitude – for the Bureau to obtain a court ordered-search warrant and conduct an unannounced search, for the first time in our country's history, to seize documents stored at a former President's residence – would indicate that the Federal government perceived something in those documents posed a serious, ongoing threat to our national security. As such, the evidentiary basis presented to the court to justify the necessity of this warrant is of keen interest to the investigative and legislative activities of this Committee.⁴ Other matters of interest to this Committee include whether any formal criminal referral was made by NARA related to what was ultimately seized by the FBI yesterday. In addition, to understand the severity of the risk to our national security posed by the seized materials, this Committee is interested in a complete inventory of all documents seized by the FBI, including a statement for each confirming that the document is accurately categorized as a presidential record, and is not of a personal, business, or political nature, and the classification of the information contained in the document.

Please produce all documents and communications responsive to these matters to the Committee no later than August 24, 2022.

In addition, it is therefore necessary that you preserve all relevant documents and communications that may refer or relate to this matter, including those on official governmental accounts and on personal, non-governmental accounts. Specifically, this preservation request should be construed as an instruction to preserve all documents, communications, and other information, including electronic information and metadata, that is or may be potentially responsive to a congressional inquiry, request, investigation, or subpoena that may be initiated or otherwise undertaken by a committee of Congress or any other investigative entity.

For purposes of this request, "preserve" means securing and maintaining the integrity of all relevant documents, communications, and other information, including electronic information and metadata, by taking reasonable steps to prevent the partial or full destruction, alteration, testing, deletion, shredding, incineration, wiping, relocation, migration, theft, mutation, or negligent or reckless handling that could render the information incomplete or inaccessible. This includes preserving all compilations of documents that have already been gathered in response to requests, even if copies of individual documents may still exist elsewhere in the agency. I further request that you or your designee:

- 1. Exercise reasonable efforts to identify and notify all relevant individuals, including current and former employees, officials, detailees, contractors, subcontractors, and consultants who may have had access to potentially relevant information that they should preserve and return such information to the FBI;
- 2. Exercise reasonable efforts to identify, recover, and preserve any potentially relevant electronic information that has been deleted or marked for deletion but is still recoverable;
- 3. Remind all relevant individuals, including current and former employees, officials, detailees, contractors, subcontractors, and consultants that any federal records sent or received using a nonofficial account must be forwarded to the agency for proper archiving, and forward all such material in your possession; and
- 4. If it is the routine practice of yours, or any relevant individuals, including current and former employees, officials, detailees, contractors, subcontractors, or consultants to destroy or otherwise alter potentially relevant information, either halt such practices as they relate to the potentially relevant information or arrange for the preservation of complete and accurate duplicates (including metadata) of such documents, communications, or other information.

Please advise in writing as to how you will ensure all records relevant to this matter will be preserved. Thank you for your attention to this request.

PRESS BRIEFING BY PRESS SECRETARY KARINE JEAN-PIERRE

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Good afternoon, everybody.

Q Hi, Karine.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Hi, Peter. (Laughter.) You're like that kid in the class.

Q What kid?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: You're like --

I m expecting an apple -- like a nice, shiny red apple.

Q Next briefing.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Okay. All right.

Okay. So, moments ago, the President signed the Instruments of Ratification for the Accession Protocols to NATO for Finland and Sweden.

Before the signing, the President spoke with Swedish Prime Minister Andersson and Finnish President Niin- -- Niinistö -- Niinistö? -- okay, Niinistö -- to emphasize the United States' strong support for their decisions to apply for NATO membership and reiterate that the United States will continue to work with our NATO Allies to quickly bring Sweden and Finland into the greatest defensive alliance in history.

Finland and Sweden will make NATO stronger and deepen the transatlantic partnership at a time when Putin's invasion of Ukraine has shattered peace and security in Europe, and fundamentally disrupted the rules-based international order.

As the President said, this is a watershed moment for our Alliance and for the greater security and stability of the world.

As you all saw this morning, today the President signed the CHIPS and Science Act, which will supercharge our efforts to make semiconductors here in America, which power everything from our smartphones, to dishwashers, to automobiles.

You have heard us talk about the economic and national security benefits of this bill for months now, but I wanted to lift up one new story that we heard from the President directly today and from Joshua Aviv directly today, the founder and CEO of SparkCharge.

We know this bill is going to help major companies, like Micron, Intel, General Motors, Ford, and so many more. But when Joshua introduced the President today, we also heard how the CHIPS and Science Act will help young, diverse, and self-starting entrepreneurs as well.

Joshua's company, SparkCharge, is the first mobile, ultra-fast charger for electric vehicles, and he also started "Currently," which delivers a charge directly to u- -- to EV owners on the road. He manufactures all the products his company needs at their fa- -- factory in Buffalo, New York. And the CHIPS and Science bill will help Joshua build and grow his business.

As the President said today, this is a once-in-a-generation law that invests in America itself, a law that the American people should be proud of.

Also, as you may have seen yesterday, the -- Secretary Blinken was in South Africa and he announced the new U.S. Strategy Toward Sub-Saharan Africa.

This strategy articulates our new vision for a 21st century U.S.-African partnership. It recognizes the tremendous, positive opportunity that exist to advance shared interests along our African partners, and it reframes and recognize Africa's importance to U.S. national security interests.

This strategy also parallels many of the themes we look forward to addressing in December at the U.S.-Africa Leaders Summit here -- right here in Washington, D.C.

We encourage you to review the full strategy and factsheet posted on the White House website.

And lastly, the average national gas price -- I know you guys love us talking about gas prices going down -- dropped below \$4 per gallon according to a leading market analyst. That's delivering over \$100 a month in vital relief to American families with two cars.

This is the fastest decline in gas prices in over a decade -- nearly a dollar drop in just 56 days -- with gas prices dropping every single day this summer.

The most common price at gas stations today is \$3.79. And drivers in five states can now find gas below 2 dollars and 99 dol- -- 99 cents per gallon from at least one gas station.

President Biden promised he would address Putin's price hike at the ba- -- at the pump, and he has. He is releasing 1 billion barrels of oil a day from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve. He is rallying -- rallying international partners to release an unprecedent amount of oil. And under President Biden's leadership, U.S. oil production is up and on track to reach a record high.

More work remains, but prices are coming down, and the President will continue to call on domestic and international oil producers to increase output so that they can continue to come down.

With that, Zeke, you want to take us away?

Q All right. Thanks, Karine. Just briefly, at the earlier CHIPS signing, the President had several -- several coughing episodes. Is it possible to get an update from his physician about his -- his status after his recovery from COVID, please?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, as you know, we shared his -- his negative test today. He s -- he has tested negative Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, and now today.

We have also said many times, I think, during the briefing when we were talking about his COVID case, that he experiences coughs from time to time, independent of him getting COVID. And what he s experiencing right now is the lingering effects of COVID, which is something I m sure many of us who have had COVID have -- have been -- have endured or had to deal with. And so, that s what you re seeing at this time.

Q And so, no update from the physician --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No, there's no update needed. We had actually said that this was a possibility. We had been clear about that. We actually shared that he has an inhaler that he uses from time to time because he has -- he has experienced coughs, as you've heard him from even before COVID that he has dealt with.

And -- and basically what you're seeing right now is lingering effects of that. And we have talked -- we spoke to the doctor about this, and that's what he relayed to us specifically.

Q On a different topic, the FBI has served a search warrant on the former President's residence in Florida. Was the President or anyone at the White House aware of that search warrant? Or had -- has anyone at the White House or the President been briefed in the aftermath of that search warrant being executed?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No. The President was not briefed, did not -- was not aware of it. No. No one at the White House was given a heads up. No, that did not happen.

Q Is the White House at all concerned, given the domestic political climate but also the signal that it sends to the rest of the world, that the Department of Justice carried out this sort of operation on a former President, that it could even be --create the appearance of a politically motivated prosecutor?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, first off, and you've heard us say this many times at this podium, you've heard the President say this: The Justice Department conducts investigations independently, and we leave any law enforcement matters to them. It would not be appropriate for us to comment on any ongoing investigations.

I can say that President Biden has been unequivocal since the campaign: He believes in the rule of law, in the independence of Justice Department investigations, that those investigations should be free from political influence. And he has held that commitment as President.

I want to also remind you all of what he said on January 7th of 2021 when he then nominated Merrick Garland to be the Attorney General, and I quote:

"We need to restore the honor, the integrity of the independence of the Department of Justice in this nation that has been so badly damaged. And so many former leaders of that department, in both parties, have so testified" and that -- "and stated that. I want to be clear to those who lead this department who you will serve. You won't work for me. You are not the President or the Vice President's lawyers. Your loyalty is not me. It's to the law, the Constitution, the people of this nation to guarantee justice." End quote.

So I would refer you to the Department of Justice.

Q And then, just lastly, does the White House or the President believe it would be helpful, both domestically and the signal that sends abroad, for the Department of Justice to be more open about the reasons for that search warrant -- the underlying evidence there?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Again, this is not something I m going to comment on today or from here at all. This goes to the Department of Justice, and that s where I refer you to.

Q Karine? Thank you. The President this morning stressed that the CHIPS Act will create jobs, will grow the economy. But when will Americans feel the impact of this legislation? When will this law impact supply chains? When might prices go down because of this?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So Secre- -- Secretary Raimondo actually spoke to this a little bit, and the department is already taking steps to set up the office that will implement the bill. And so well -- well have more details on that -- on that soon.

But we are working hand-in-hand with private companies who are already announcing new investments here at home because we passed this bill. We had said for many months that we needed to send that signal for companies who were making decisions by the end of the summer.

So, by passing this and now the President signing this, we have sent that signal. So, there, you see companies working on that -- private companies.

So, Intel is going to break ground on next-gen semiconductor factories in central Ohio in early fall. So that is certainly a step forward.

Micron is announcing a \$40 billion investment in memory chip manufacturing, which will create up to 40,000 new jobs.

And Qualcomm and GlobalFoundries are announcing a new partnership, including \$4.2 billion in chips manufacturing. Qualcomm will increase U.S. chip manufacturing by up to 50 percent.

Just giving you a little bit of already what's happening. And we'll have more specifics on when we'll see a direct effect.

Q And on this raid, I understand you re underscoring the independence of the Justice Department, but just politically and in terms of the optics of this, are you concerned at all about how it looks for the Justice Department to be investigating and raiding the home of the former President, who may very well be the current President's rival in 2024?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Again, we re just not going to comment on any ongoing investigations from here.

Q And to Republicans who say it reeks of politics?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Look, I ll say this: You know, the President and the White House learned about this FBI search from

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public reports. We learned, just like the American public did yesterday, and we did not have advance notice of this activity.

President Biden has been very clear from before he was elected President and throughout his time in office that the Justice Department conducts its investigations independently. He believes in the rule of law and what -- we are nations of law -- are a nation of law.

And he -- again, we defer any incoming on this particular incident yesterday to the Department of Justice.

Q To follow up on that, Karine, Republicans have said that they will probe this raid if they take over the House or the Senate after the November elections. What s the White House's reaction to that?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Again, I m just not going to comment on any reaction to what happened yesterday. We are going to refer any incoming to the Department of Justice.

Q Okay. But that s not really about DOJ. It s more about what might be coming your way if the election does not go your way in November.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: That s a hypothetical, and I m just not going to entertain it at this time.

Q And another topic. The House is meeting on Friday to vote about the Inflation Reduction Act. Assuming that they go ahead and pass the bill, what are the President's plans for signing that?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Well, no plans at this moment to share with all of you. As you know, there s some -- there s an enrollment process; it takes some time before the bill can get signed. I have nothing to share at this time on what that looks like.

So we just are looking forward. We are grateful for what the Senate was able to do just a couple of days ago. And we are looking forward to the House passing it so that we can deliver for the American people.

Go ahead, and then I'll come back to you.

Q Just to follow up on the Republican criticism of this search warrant that was executed on Mar-a-Lago, does the President believe that the Justice Department acted accordingly here?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: That is not -- I ll say -- I ll say this again: That s up for the Department of Justice to decide. It is -- when it comes to the criminal investigation, it is independent. And they make that decision.

Q And has the White House been told whether or not Attorney General Garland signed off on the search warrant himself?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: We learned about this, the President learned about this just like you all did, through the public reports. And we learned about this just like the American people did.

Q So you don't know whether or not Garland signed off on it?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I don't have anything more to share.

So we -- like I said, we didn't lear- -- we did not know about this, and we have not been briefed on this. We learned about this just like the public -- just as you all were reporting it, through the public reports.

Q And on the President's agenda, how does he plan to use the string of wins that he s had lately and that Democrats have had lately to turn it into a sense of momentum -- not just for his own low approval ratings, but also to help Democrats in the midterm elections?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, look, you know, what we have seen this past week and, I would argue, the past 18 months has been a president who has a legislative success -- more legislative success than any modern President.

If you think about the American Rescue Plan, if you think about the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, if you think about what s going on with CHIPS, what s happening with the Inflation Reduction Act that s -- we are grateful for, and it looks like it s going to be passing out of the House in a couple of days, and so much more -- burn pits -- all of these successes certainly is something that the President has talked about for many years.

If you look specifically at the Inflation Reduction Act and those components that are incredibly popular, when you think about how the American people feel about these -- about lowering costs -- energy costs; lowering premiums -- healthcare premiums -- these are things -- and especially the Medicare to be able to negotiate -- these are things that Democrats have been fighting for for 34 years. And -- and special interest groups have said no and have not allowed -- you know, have [not] allowed congressional members to work really hard and pass bills to lower those costs for American people.

And finally, what we have seen this week is a win -- is a win for the American public. And so, the President, the Vice President, Cabinet Secretaries, congressional members are certainly going to be out there talking to the American people, talking about -- about these wins for them that we -- that we were able to work together on.

And so, that s what you're going to see in the upcoming weeks. And you have congressional Democrats right now in their districts talking about this particular bill and others -- CHIPS as well -- in their district and talking about how they were able to deliver.

Q And does the President think he ll get a boost from this?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I mean, look, I think our focus is always on delivering for the American people. This is a President who has been in office for some time. A lot of the components that we have seen delivered are things that he has fought for since he was a senator. And when you think about lowering prescription drugs, that's something that's incredibly personal to him, and that s what matters. What matters right now is the work that we re doing, which are very popular -- the components, the legislation are very popular with the American public. And that s going to be our focus.

Q The Archivist said in a letter to the Justice Department in February that classified material apparently was taken from this building down to Mar-a-Lago in Florida. What s the President's reaction to that general notion?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I'm -- I m not going to comment further from here from what I said. This is a -- this is a criminal investigation that the Department of Justice is running, and I leave it to them to speak to it.

Q The President is the original classification authority; all of it stems from him personally. He has no specific reaction to the way that classified material was apparently handled in this case?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Again, this is a criminal investigation that the Department of Justice is independently running. We will leave it to them to speak to this.

Q Once more on this question of the general reaction to what has happened since yesterday. Does the President feel that the FBI's legitimacy and its decision-making, the way that it handled this, is on the line now?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: The President has been very clear. I read his quote from when he -- on January 7th in 2021, when he nominated Merrick Garland, and how he felt the importance of not politicizing the Department of Justice, the importance of having that independence. And so I leave the -- I leave the quote that I read to -- to all of you just moments ago to you.

Q Separately, the President visited -- well, we know that the Speaker of the House was here visiting with the President today. Did they discuss the Speaker's visit to Taiwan?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I have not seen the President since the event, so I can't speak to that at this time.

Go ahead.

Q Thanks, Karine. Do you consider Donald Trump to be a political rival of President Biden?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I m not going to speak to that from here.

Q But you talk about Trump all the time. So do you consider him to be --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Mm, I don't talk about Trump all the time.

Q "Ultra MAGA." You guys were criticizing his handling of COVID last week. You've mentioned his January 6th response a couple days ago.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No --

Q So can you say, based on all that -- I didn't say anything about Mar-a-Lago. I'm just asking you if you consider the President to be --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I m -- I'm saying, from here, I m not going to comment on it.

Q Does the President still want to -- think that he would be very fortunate to run against Trump in 2024, like he has said before?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Again, I m not going to comment on --

Q It's just -- it's just a --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: -- I'm not --

Q -- a quote from the President: In "the next election, I'd be very fortunate if I had that same man running against me."

Does he still think that?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: All I can tell you, Peter, is that the President intends to run in 2024.

Q Is there a concern here that if you guys don't say more than these Republicans -- who are accusing this White House of weaponizing the Justice Department, weaponizing the FBI -- are, that that's going to become the public sentiment, if you guys don't say once and for all, "We are not doing that"?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: First -- first of all, we re just not going to comment on the Department of Justice investigation. We're just --

Q Okay, but I'll make it easier. Are --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: We're just not going to comment on that.

Q Is this White House weaponizing the Justice Department and the FBI against a political -- against political opponents?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: The President has been very clear from before he was elected, very clear on this. Hold on.

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Q It's just --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Throughout his time in office --

Q He is President now. I heard the quote. We will be playing the quote tonight at 6 o clock. Is this administration weaponizing the Justice Department and the FBI against political opponents?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Peter, the President believes in the rule of law. The President believes in the independence of the Department of Justice.

Q That's -- that's a yes or no.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No, that is --

Q Just, is the White House --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No, it's a yes-no for you. I'm answering the question. You may not like it, but I'm answering the question.

Q I'm just --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: And I m s- -- no. No. I'm answering the question, and --

Q I'm just trying to figure out what's happening --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: -- I'm telling you that we are not going to comment on a criminal investigation. The President has been very clear. I laid out what his thoughts were back on January 7th in 20- -- in 2021, about how he saw the Department of Justice. And I m just going to leave it there.

We re not going to comment from here, from this White House, on a criminal investigation that is currently happening.

Q And just one more about the Inflation Reduction Act. Who around here decided that Americans were crying out for more interaction with the IRS?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I -- I don't understand your question. You have to say more.

Q Do you think it s going to be popular when the 87,000 new employees hired by the IRS go around and start auditing people to pay for the Inflation Reduction Act?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So it s very clear. The IRS Commissioner was very clear on this. He said that -- on the record, that this only will -- it will only apply to those earning over \$400,000. The Commissioner said, and I quote, "These resources are absolutely not about increasing audit scrutiny on small businesses or middle-income Americans. As we have been planning, our investment of these enforcement resources is designed around... Treasury['s] directive that audit rates will not rise relative to recent years for households making under \$400,000." So this is --

Q So no audits?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: This is focused on those who are, you know, corporate, wealthy tax cheats that Republicans -congressional Republicans wanted to defend. That's who they wanted to defend. They wanted to defend those corporate
tax cheats. This is not about -- this is not about that. This is not about folks who make less than \$400,000.

Q So new audits on anybody making under \$400,000 a year?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No. Very clear, no.

Hey, Monica. Welcome to the briefing room.

Q Hi. Thank you very much. Former Vice President Pence called on the Attorney General to provide a full accounting of the FBI search at Mar-a-Lago. Is that something the White House would support?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I m not going to comment on the depart- -- I m not going to comment on this. It s going to -- I'd refer you to the Department of Justice.

Q And has the President spoken with the Attorney General today?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I m -- I'm just not going to speak further on any -- any conversations. There s no calls for me to preview.

Again, I'm just not going to comment on any ongoing criminal investigations.

Q When it comes to student loans and the current pause on the payments -- they re set to expire at the end of the month -- a lot of borrowers told us that they feel they ve been left in limbo, making it difficult to plan financially. Is there any update on that expected? When can they expect that? And would it possibly just be another extension, or what else is on the table for that?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So the President spoke to this when he was asked, I think about two weeks ago, about the student loan and his decision. He said by "the end of August." So we re still kind of at the beginning, getting into the middle of August. So when he s ready to make that decision, we will let you know.

Q And what would you say to the borrowers that these --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So --

Q -- three-month extensions are making it --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: -- I'll -- I'll say -- I'll say this --

Q -- very complicated --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: -- and we have been very clear on this: Like, the President understands how student loans could affect a family and -- and how the pressure of that can really be a lot and put a lot of weight on a family s purse or economic situation. So, we understand that. He is making -- he is going to make his decision on this, and when he has something to say, we will share that.

Q And just finally on Ukraine: What is the White House understanding of the situation at the Zaporizhzhia Nuclear Power Plant?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: The -- which -- which power plant?

Q Zaporizhzhia.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Oh, I spoke to this yesterday during -- during the gaggle. Basically, what we said then is that -- what I said yesterday is that we continue to closely monitor the situation at the ZNPP. The Department of Energy and the National Nuclear Security Administration report that radiation sensors are continuing to provide data. And -- and

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thankfully, we have seen no indications of increased or abnormal radiation levels.

We also are aware of reports of mistreatment of N- -- ZNPP staff and applaud the Ukrainian authorities and oper- operators for their commitment to nuclear safety and security under trying circumstances.

Fighting near a nuclear plant is dangerous, and we continue to call on Russia to cease all military operations at or near Ukrainian nuclear facilities and return full control to Ukraine.

For our part, we will continue to support the efforts of the International Atomic Energy Agency to fulfill its techn---its technical safeguards mandate to assist Ukraine with nuclear safety and security measures across its nuclear facilities.

Go ahead.

Q Thanks, Karine. President Biden is scheduled to leave town for South Carolina tomorrow. Can we get any details on how long he ll be away on vacation, what he ll be doing?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I -- I don't have more to share on that. I m sure as -- as the days go by, we'll share more about what -- what the timing will be. I just don't have any anything for you to share at this time on his schedule.

Q And would he -- I know you spoke to this before, but would he come back from that to sign the reconciliation bill?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Well, you know, first, we -- we got to -- we re going to work closely with the House to get that passed in the next couple of days. And once we have more to share, we will share your -- his schedule, if that changes.

Q Can you talk a little about the CPI data tomorrow -- what your expectations are, what you guys are looking at?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Yep. So, as you know, the President has -- his -- the President's number one priority is to making sure that America- -- that we lower costs for American families. That's what we have been saying the past couple of months, especially as it relates to inflation. We laid out our -- our plan on what that would look like.

So, we haven t seen the data yet for tomorrow. We know that gas prices have fallen --I just listed that -- for 56 days straight to below \$4.00 nationwide. And we hope those gas price declines will factor in into the CPI inflation data. And because of that, because of the work that the President has done these past several months, as I just mentioned earlier, we have seen a decline -- a steep decline, a decline that we haven t seen in more than a decade, saving families about -- families about 100 bucks a month.

But again, we haven t -- not seen those numbers yet. And -- and so well see tomorrow what that holds.

Go ahead.

Q Hey, thanks, Karine. A question about the Affordable Care Act. Does the White House plan to respond in any way to the Kelley v. Becerra lawsuit in Texas, which threatens provisions around preventive care?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I'm not going to respond to any lawsuits from here.

Okay. Anything else?

All right. Go ahead.

Q To the back?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I'll come to the back.

Q I know that you've spoken about conversations -- or not commented on any conversations today with the Department of Justice, but would the White House now rule out any briefings moving forward as this investigation continues, given the accusations around any sort of partianship impacting the investigation? I guess, the question --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Can you say more?

Q Sure. The question being: Is it -- is the -- moving forward, will the President or anybody from the White House be engaged in any briefings with the Department of Justice over this search or the investigation?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: We are -- when it comes to a criminal investigation, that is the Department of Justice to -- to investigate and deal with. We give them their independence on that.

Q But not -- but not clarifying whether or not there would be any sort of briefings -- whether any briefings would be made between the Justice Department and the White House, and whether they will be made public if those briefings happen?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No. I mean, this is not something -- again, they re independent. We are not -- we re not involved in their criminal investigation. That is not something that we do here.

We give them their independence when it comes to that. And so we leave it -- we leave it to the Department of Justice.

So, any particulars, any specifics on what they re going to do next or -- or anything to that fashion, I would refer you to the Department of Justice.

Q I want to ask student loans just one more time. The way this was described previously in reporting and just in conversations about it, even in this room, is around cancellation and a possible extension when it comes to a decision being made before August. And the President has said that, that a decision would be made before August.

Is it possible that that decision is just limited to whether or not there is an extension or not, and cancellation or any sort of relief is left for another time?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So when it comes to the -- to the pause -- I know there s the pause and the cancellation -- we haven t made a decision yet, so I m just going to go to -- go to the pause first.

The Department of Education will communicate directly with borrowers about the end of the payment pause when a decision is made. So, again, no decisions have been made.

When it comes to the cancellation -- look, I just said the President understands firsthand the burden -- the burden that student loan has on families, it puts on families. And we re just going to continue to assess our options for cancellations. So, no decisions have been made on that yesterday [yet]. And the President has made clear it will -- he ll have something before August 31st.

Q And would any decision impact public and private -- students of both public and private?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I'm just not going to get into specifics. Once we have more, we'll share that with all of you. Go ahead.

Q Thanks, Karine. Homeland Security announced yesterday that it is ending the Remain in Mexico policy, so I just wanted to see if the White House has any reaction to that.

Also, I m wondering, too, if you can talk a little bit about the timing of this decision. The Supreme Court ruled in June -- late June -- that the administration had the authority to eliminate the program. So I m just wondering: What took so long? Did the President want it to be done earlier?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, as we have said before, the Migrant Protection Protocol -- MPP policy -- under the prior administration was flawed, it was inhumane, and it was ineffective.

Now that the lower court's order requiring us to continue the policy has been lifted -- that happened just yesterday -- the Department of Homeland Secur- -- Security has restarted efforts to terminate it.

So, it was -- we were waiting for the lower court, and it made that decision yesterday.

So, any further detail, I would just refer you to them -- to the Department of Homeland Security.

Okay. Go ahead, in the back.

Q On -- so CPI inflation is coming out tomorrow, and I had a question on that. So, you've pointed out the gas prices are now falling. You said the government spending won't really affect inflation going forward. So, then, has the American people seen inflation peak? And is it now coming back down?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Look, what I can tell you is -- I explained CPI. We dont -- we haven t seen the number yet. We ve seen the gas prices come down in the past 56 days, which is because of the work that this President has done. We hope to see that is reflected in CPI, so we will see what that looks like tomorrow.

As -- as it relates to inflation as a whole, what I can speak to is the work that we have been doing and what we have -- you know, what we -- the plan that we have put forth, including making sure the Federal Reserve has their -- has their independence to make sure that they can do the work that they re doing and have -- they have the strongest monetary policy to work on those things.

And, you know, it matters that the Inflation Reduction Act is going to -- is -- looks like it s going to pass. It matters because we have 126 economists, both on the right and both on -- on -- on the "D" side -- Republican and Democrats, who have said it is going to help fight inflation. That is important, including five Secretary -- Treasury Secretaries, also Democrats and Rep- -- under Democrats and Republican administration.

So that s going to be incredibly important. And we re just going to continue to doing the work.

Yes, gas prices came down by a dollar per -- per gallon, but we understand that there s more work to do, and we re going to continue to do that.

We leave -- any data, I ll leave that -- we ll see how -- what the data looks like.

Q On the CHIPS Act, the Intel CFO says that they don't expect to see the money until the end of 2023. You know, so then, the jobs the President is promising from this act, will they then have to wait until 2024 as the money cycles through?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Well, I mean, I was kind of clear on this, and we have been for the past several months, and I said this moments ago: One of the things about passing the CHIPS Act and now signing into law, as you saw the President do today, was sending that signal to private companies that we were -- we were going to -- we were going to take action to make sure that investments were happening here -- right? -- to make sure that manufacturers were staying in America and that we were being -- we were able to make sure that we were doing the work that our country needed to do to make sure that we re leading -- leading across the globe.

And so that sent a signal to private companies. And that s why I was able to lay out what Intel is going to do, what Micron is going to do, and Qualcomm and GlobalFoundries --

Q But when -- for those jobs? When will we see those jobs?

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MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Well, I think well have more to share. This is the question that I've kind of gotten, like, "When are -- when are the American people going to feel the impact -- impact?" Well have details on that very soon.

In the meantime, we're taking steps to set up the office to get this done as quickly as possible. But I think what's important here is that this commitment that we have made -- again, CHIPS -- bipartisan, very important; both Republicans and Democrats came together to get this done -- shows a very loud message to private companies that we want to make sure that we re investing in America and also can compete across -- across the globe.

Go ahead, Sebastian.

Q Thank you, Karine. So I m not asking you to comment on the Justice Department side of this, obviously, because I know you can't. But, politically, is the President, who is the country's leader -- is he confident that he has a plan to address the way that a lot of Americans, maybe even a very large number of Americans, are being told and may now believe that Donald Trump is being persecuted and the deep state is coming after you, that the IRS and the FBI are corrupt? All this kind of stuff -- this is really believed, apparently, by, really, a lot of people.

He s the leader of the whole country, as he often says. Does he have a handle on this?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Your question is still asking me to comment on what s happening, right? By me answering, it is still asking me a question to comment on it.

Q Not really.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Oh, absolutely. So I m going to stick to what I ve been saying, is that this is a criminal investigation that s independent of -- to the DOJ, and we leave any inquiry, any questions about what is happening to the Department of Justice.

Go ahead.

Q Thank you, Karine. One on NATO, one on Ukraine. The President urged the remaining seven NATO members to complete ratification process for Finland and Sweden, as he said, "as quickly as possible." What is desired timeframe when he wants other leaders to complete the process? By the winter? By the end of the year?

And what s his message to those leaders -- leaders of those seven countries, including Turkey?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So we don't have a timeline to share. I think what you were hearing from the President is his strong support, clearly, from -- not just from him, but from -- from Congress, from Americans about how we support the -- this expansion, this ratification that we saw today with Sweden and Finland.

As I just laid out, he spoke to both of them. We, hopefully, have put out a readout by now, so you'll hear directly from us on how those conversations came -- have went.

And so, you know, we re going to continue to work with our Allies and partners to strengthen defense and deterrence and to avoid -- to strengthen -- to strengthen that defense alliance.

It s one of the strongest that we have seen in modern times, and that s -- a lot of that is because of this President s leadership. And so we re going to just continue to make sure that -- that we make our voice clear.

But I don't have a timeline to share. You know, the President speaks to his -- to the NATO members very regularly, as we read out to all of you. But this is an important day. We think this is a very important day for NATO as we continue.

Q On Ukraine, there has been a series of explosions at the Russian air force base in Crimea. It s not clear yet what happened. But I m wondering if you consider Crimea a legitimate target for Ukraine when they use U.S.-provided weapons.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So we are supportive of Ukraine's efforts, as you know, to defend its sovereignty and territory interritory integrity, as we have said many times from here.

The fight has been in the east and the southwest of the country, and it s far from over. We have warned this could be a long and protracted war.

We will continue to ensure that Ukraine can push back against Russia's unprovoked aggression, and that's going to be our focus.

Q So is a legitimate target or not?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Say that one more time?

Q So is the Crimea a legitimate target for Ukraine when they use U.S.-provided weapons? Because in the past, Pentagon seems to -- seem to try to convince Ukraine not to use U.S.-provided weapon to attack Russia, Russian territory.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So I don't have anything else for you on this. I m saying to you that we are going to continue to support Ukraine as they re fighting for their freedom, as they re fighting for their sovereignty, you know, against a brutal -- a brutal attack from Russia.

Go ahead, Jenny.

- Q Thank you.
- Q Karine -- thanks, Karine.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I'll come to you. Go ahead, Jenny.

Q I know you said that you haven t seen the President since the bill signing and his opportunities to speak with Speaker Pelosi about his -- her Taiwan trip. Presumably, tomorrow they have another chance at the PACT Act signing. But since you have talked with him about the trip since it happened, does he want to have a conversation with Speaker Pelosi about it to hear what she's heard on the ground, what the Taiwanese government would want to see from the U.S. government? Does -- is he seeking at all a conversation like that?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, one thing I will -- I mean, they talk pretty regularly, right? This is the Speaker of the House and the President. They have a friendship; they have a relationship. I don't have anything specific to read out about any recent conversation on her trip.

What I can say is -- reiterate a little bit of what the President said yesterday when he was asked about the Speaker going, and he said, you know, it was -- it was her right to go.

Again, we re going to reiterate this: It was her right to go. There was precedence for this. As we know, Newt Gingrich, when he was Speaker, went a generation ago. And -- and, again, it does not change our policy, our One China policy. It does not change any -- any of that.

And -- and so I will leave it to the Speaker. She spoke to this earlier today. She was on some -- one of your colleagues' networks, talking about her trip, so I ll let her speak to it directly.

Q Does the President agree, since you just mentioned her appearances this morning, that President Xi Jinping is a "scared bully" and "in a fragile place"?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I actually did not watch the interview. (Laughs.)

Q (Inaudible.)

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I know -- I know she was on -- I know she was on.

Look, she's going to speak for herself. She is the Speaker. It is up to her to make decisions on where she will travel. It is up to members of Congress to make that decision on where they will travel.

What we provide -- we provide a briefing on what the geopolitics looks like in the region, in that country, the national security components of their particular specific trip. But we are not -- it's -- and you've heard us say this this: It is a -- you know, it is a co-equal branch of government but also separation of powers. And she has her right to make that trip. I will let her speak to -- speak to it and how she feels about it. I cannot speak from -- on -- for her from here.

Q One more on Russia. My colleagues reported today that a merchant ship carrying military equipment passed Turkey's Bosphorus Strait on the way from Syria to Russia. And I'm wondering if you can give us an update on, you know, how concerned the U.S. is about this, but also, was there any outreach to Turkish officials since it was a Turkish strait.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: We don't -- I -- we don't have anything to share on that from here at this time.

Okay, I'm going to try and go to the back. Go ahead.

Q Karine, thank you.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No, (inaudible) -- I'm going to go to Phil?

Q Yeah.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Okay, I'm sorry.

Q The President campaigned on binding up the wounds of the country and restoring norms. And I'm wondering, two years in, if the President believes that he has made progress in restoring the American public's faith in federal institutions.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Well, one of the things that we understand and the President understands -- and I ve been asked this question in different variations, and it s pretty much the same. He -- you know, when he -- when he ran, he understood that we were in a politic- -- politically polarized environment. He understand that it was going to be a lot of work to bring people together. And I think the work continues, even in his first 18 months. There s still a lot of work to be done.

And, you know -- but he has been able to do some things that people said he couldn't be -- he couldn't do. Right? The bipartisanship on the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, it brought the Right and the -- you know, the "R's" and the "D's" -- Republicans and Democrats together. That was because of this President's leadership that he was able to do that to deliver an infrastructure investment that was historical.

He was able to -- we were able to do that with the CHIPS --CHIPS and Science Act -- bring the two sides together to get something done, to make sure that we re leaders across the world when it comes to manufacturing.

And so there are things that this President has done because of his leadership -- somebody was asking me about NATO -- that is also important as well. NATO is the strongest that it s been in modern times because of his leadership abroad.

So I think there's still more work to be done. It's not like turning the light switch on. And so we're going to continue to do the work.

So there s no -- there s no "yes" or "no" answer. There is: We re going to continue to work towards that.

Q Gotcha. And then, you ve said repeatedly that the President learned of the news of the FBI visit to Mar-a-Lago the other day through news reports. Can you tell us anything more? Was he watching the news? Was he scrolling Twitter? Did someone in his staff flag it for him?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I can tell you this: He was not aware of -- of the -- was it the Mar-a-Lago raid? I don't know what you guys are calling it -- before it happened.

So, I can tell you that he did not know.

Q But, so did someone flag it for him?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: He learned about it, really, like all of us did. I m sure maybe someone on his team flagged it for him, but he was not aware.

What I can tell you definitively and for sure: He was not aware of this. He was -- we were -- nobody in the White House was. We were not given a heads up, and we did not know about -- about what happened yesterday.

- Q Karine, can you speak to the West Wing communication afterwards between the Justice Department and President Biden?
- Q One question for Africa, Karine?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I'm going to come back, guys.

Q Thank you. Why do we always have to beg for questions? Africans deserve questions as well, Karine.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Go ahead.

- Q Come on.
- Q What is the latest on communications with Beijing? And are there still efforts to find a meeting for a face-to-face with President Xi?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No -- no update on his schedule, on any meeting at this time. Look, we have said -- we have said this many times that we're keeping the line of communications open with Beijing. The President spoke with President Xi not too long ago. We read that out. It was more than a two-hour and 20-minute conversation.

He -- that was his fifth conversation with the President. And on staff levels, there's an open -- open dialogue that we're going to keep.

- Q Karine?
- Q Karine, we're getting -- we can tell that your staff is trying to give you the hook. I don't know if you (inaudible) --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Okay, I ll take -- I ll take a couple more questions. Okay, I m going to take -- I m going to take --

Q One for Africa. One question for Africa.

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MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I'm going to take -- I'm going to --
(Cross-talk by reporters.)
Guys -- go ahead. Okay.
Q (Inaudible) question on the back.
MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Give me -- give me a second.
Q We have been asking for a question, Karine, every time. And even when you give questions to Simon, it's because he
forced. We don't need to force for question. We also deserve to have a question. Why --
MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I will get -- I will get --
Q Do you have something against African reporters?
MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Go ahead. Go ahead.
Q On Afghanistan, Jake Sullivan --
   We deserve questions too, Karine.
   -- said last year that there was going to be --
Q You have to be fair.
Q -- an extensive top-to-bottom review of the withdrawal and how that went.
MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Can you start again?
Q Sure. Yeah.
MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Because someone was -- was yelling over you.
Q On Afghanistan, Jake Sullivan said last year that there was going to be a top-to-bottom extensive review on how that
withdrawal went.
MS. JEAN-PIERRE: The "hotwash."
Q There was some reporting today that that is not going to be ready for the one-year mark. I guess the question is: Why
is that process taking so long? What's been the holdup there?
MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, I know you re talking about the -- the "hotwashing" specifica- --
Q The hotwash, yeah.
MS. JEAN-PIERRE: -- specifically.
So, the update that I can give you from here is that departments and agencies have begun their independent after-action
reviews of the operations at the end of the U.S. military mission in Afghanistan.
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And again, once those internal reviews are done, we will have an opportunity to look at the full picture. Once they re done, we will give you the full -- have the full picture in a way that will help inform future operations. Department and agencies will share lessons learned consistent with operational and classification security. It s just still underway. Once we have that, we will -- we will share our lessons.

Q So that's the wait on, like, agency level and department level. You haven't -- the White House hasn't received anything

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: From what I understand, this is department and agency levels.

Q And there's no set timeline for when that's (inaudible)?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I don't have a timeline for you on this.

Q Can I get one question please?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Go ahead. Go ahead, Andrew.

- Q Can I have a question, Karine?
- Q Thank you. Adjacent to the news of the day from yesterday, since the news of the search of former President Trump s home in public, there s been a lot of reporting on chatter among extremists online about the possibility of violence, people talking about Civil War Two, et cetera, et cetera.

The President put out a domestic violent extremism strategy last year. Is the White House in contact with the Justice Department, DHS, or other departments about preparing for possible violence as a result of this?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, we ve been very clear, and so our message is this: that the President and this White House -there is no place for political violence in this country. People have the right to raise their voices peacefully. But we would
strongly condemn -- as we have many times from here -- the President has condemned any efforts to plan violent behavior
of any kind. And so we would -- we would ask Americans to remain peaceful in this time.

Again, this is something that we condemn. I don't have any -- anything more to share about the particular policy that you're asking me about.

Q May I have a question?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Go ahead -- right behind.

Q Thank you, Karine. Can you speak to the importance of the Inflation Reduction Act reaching Black and brown communities, which we know are -- they make up -- make up a disproportionate share of poverty rates and pay more in energy costs? And to what extent will the administration ensure that it s implemented equitably?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, clearly, we have to get this passed. We re going to work very closely, as we have been, with -- with Congress to get this done because this is incredibly important, and we want to make sure we deliver -- we deliver this for the American people.

I think if you look at how prescription drugs are going to go down, because Medicare will be able to negotiate with -- with companies, that is -- with pharmaceutical -- that is going to be incredibly important -- right? -- when you think about brown and Black communities are spending.

And not just them, but you think about Americans across the board that are spending so much money -- seniors -- our seniors -- just to get that vital -- vital drug that they need just to -- just to live their everyday lives. That s going to have an impact on brown and Black communities, I beli- -- we believe.

And when you think about utility bills coming down because of this investment that it s going to make in -- in really -- in lowering energy costs. And so those things are going to make a difference.

We think about the ACA premiums -- that s going to -- that s going to keep our lower costs on healthcare. That s going to make a difference in communities as well.

And so, when -- and when you think about the President's economic plan more broadly, it's always been about making sure that it is -- it is economically fair, that we don't leave anybody behind. It -- we talk about building it from the bottom up and the middle out. We don't want -- we want to make sure that no communities feel like they re left -- being left behind.

And so that is always been part of the President's agenda, and you see that here with the Inflation Reduction Act as well.

Go ahead, Simon.

Q Okay, thank you, Karine. I know you said that you don't really want to comment on an ongoing investigation. But what time did the President learn about the raid on -- the raid yesterday?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I don't have anything to -- more to share, Simon. I've shar- -- I ve said all that I can about -- about the -- the topic.

Q Yeah, and then also you said that the President believes in the rule of law. Does he believe in the rule of law when it comes to the former President or even his son?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: I m not going to -- I m not going to comment any more on --

Q And -- and --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: -- on both of those topics that you just mentioned.

Q (Inaudible.)

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: The Department of Justice is independent with their criminal investigation. The President has been very clear on that. And we -- I would refer you to Department of Justice on those -- those two topics that you just brought up.

Q Yes. So, one final question from me.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Sure.

Q The Secretary is in Africa. Yesterday, he unveiled the U.S. -- the new U.S. strategy for Sub-Saharan Africa. But that strategy doesn't really -- doesn't have any step to show how the U.S. will counter China or Russia in Africa. And why is that?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: So, I could say -- say this: We want to make sure that -- one of the things that we made sure about this, our strategy, it had a different approach on -- on what we -- a unique approach on -- about how we are doing it. So we seek to engage not only government leaders, but a wide range of African and U.S. stakeholders, such as youth, business, civil -- civil society, and the diaspora.

As you know, there s going to be a summit here in December -- December 13th to the 15th. And so that s something that I want to make sure that is said as we re going to -- as we re headed to -- as we re headed to the summit in just a couple of -- a couple of months.

And our relationship, as it relates to Africa, we believe is incredibly important. I just laid out what the President -- what the Secretary talked about. So we want to make sure we re reinvigorating and modernizing U.S. partnerships across the continent; building substantive, reciprocal partnerships with African governments, institution, and public, based on the principles of mutual respect, equality, and other shared values, and strengthened by our long-lasting historical and cultural connections.

So we want to make sure that our commitment is there. There is going to be many issues to talk about for the summit. And as we lay out our African strat- -- Africa -- our strategy for Africa, it s going to be about -- national security, we ll talk about. We ll talk about COVID. We ll talk about food security. And we ll talk about other items as well, that s going to be important to both global challenges, that s going to be important to African -- African nations and also the U.S.

Q And if I can ask you this last question --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No, I -- we got to move on. We got to move on.

Q No, one last --

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: No, no, no, we got to move on.

Way in the back, go ahead.

Q Thank you. On the CHIPS Act signing today. With semiconductors primarily being manufactured right now overseas in East Asia, what message does this send -- does the President want this to send to China, specifically, at a time when tensions are high?

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Look, the President talked about this in his speech as well. He mentioned the importance of being competitive, and that competition -- this is why this CHIPS and Science Act is so important -- so we show that we are committed in investing in us -- in "Made in America" -- and committed and making sure that we have manufacturing that s happening here.

As you mentioned, chips and semiconductors -- as you mentioned -- even our national security -- strengthening our national security is going to be important in chips. Strengthening our supply chain is going to be also important as a -- as we look at chips.

So, look, it doesn't stop us. Even the escalation that we're seeing and that we are being very clear about with our -- how we're communicating on that piece as well. But we also have to continue to do the work of the American people. We have to make sure that we are delivering for the American people. And that's what this shows.

It s going to create jobs. And it s going to create those important chips.

When you think about the automobiles, when you think about the smartphones -- all of these things -- it s going to be important in lowering costs for the American people.

And so that s our -- our message to the American people is that we re going to make sure that we deliver for them and lower costs and create jobs at the same time.

Q Thanks, Karine.

Q And one more on inflation with numbers coming out. Wanting to get more details about what the White House is prepared to do to help families on a fixed income who are still struggling.

MS. JEAN-PIERRE: Look, that's top of mind for this President. We've -- we talk about that, you know, pretty regularly -- how lowering costs for Americans is so important, how lowering costs for Americans is critical.

We understand what is happening. The President personally understands what's happening around the kitchen table and the conversations that people are having -- about how are they going to put food on their table, how are they going to put gas -- you know, gas in their car.

That s why one of the things that we have been talking about and working on with the gas prices coming down -- the last 56 days matters. It gives Americans a little bit more of breathing room.

So the President laid down what his inflation plan is -- is. He knows there s still more work to do. But again, the ifla--- the Inflation Reduction Act, once that gets passed, that is going to make a difference in people s lives. Prescription drugs, utility bills -- that -- and we think about ACA bringing down the premiums for folks. That s going to make a difference in people s lives.

The CHIPS Act I just laid out -- that s going to make a difference in people s lives. And so that s the work that we re going to continue to focus on. And we re going to make sure that we deliver for the American people.

As you are both well aware, the American people are justifiably alarmed by the conduct of your agencies. This alarm has arisen not only because of the unprecedented nature of the raid conducted at the personal residence of a former president, and potential future political opponent of the sitting president, but increasingly because of the lack of transparency by you and the Biden administration in the face of repeated questions seeking the legal justification for such extreme action.

Let me be clear: no one is above the law and no government agency, especially the Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), is immune from accountability to the American people. Your refusal to fully and transparently answer legitimate questions about the motivations and justifications for such provocative conduct by your agencies serves only to further damage the integrity of the DOJ and FBI, is unacceptable, and will not be tolerated.

Please respond to the following queries no later than Friday, August 19, 2022:

- Please provide an unredacted copy of
 - a. The search warrant application and any additional materials or documents submitted to the federal magistrate judge in support of the search warrant application.
 - b. All internal memoranda, briefing documents, and supporting materials of the FBI and DOJ developed and used in the drafting and review of the search warrant application in question.

- 2. Did you or any member of your respective agencies inform the president, or any personnel at the White House, of the search warrant application prior to its submission to the federal magistrate judge?
- 3. Did you or any member of your respective agencies inform the president, or any personnel at the White House, of the execution of the search warrant before the raid was made public by former President Donald J. Trump on August 8, 2022?
- 4. Did you personally review the contents of the search warrant application prior to its submission to the federal magistrate judge?
 - a. If so, when did you review the search warrant application in question?
 - b. If not, who within your agency was responsible for reviewing the search warrant application prior to its submission?
- 5. What "less-intrusive means" were considered and pursued by the FBI and DOJ as an alternative to conducting a forcible raid of the former president's personal residence to obtain the documents or materials sought through this search warrant?
 - a. In reference to the subpoena reportedly issued to former President Trump for certain materials and records earlier this year, what steps did the DOJ take to enforce that subpoena before pursuing the search warrant in this case?

To the extent responses to these requests include confidential or sensitive information, I am willing to receive an in-person briefing and review such documents and materials in a classified setting.

A recent report indicates that the search conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) of former President Trump's Mar-a-Lago residence was based upon information provided by an informant. This report raises a number of questions in furtherance of ongoing Committee oversight on this topic. Please provide written responses to the following:

- 1. Did any undercover FBI officer provide information used in the affidavit in support of the search warrant for the search of Mar-a-Lago conducted on August 8, 2022? If so:
 - a. Has this undercover FBI officer ever been paid, in full or in part, with National Intelligence Program funds?
 - b. Is this undercover FBI officer posing as a current employee of any other U.S. Government agency, such as the U.S. Secret Service?
 - c. Is this undercover FBI officer posing as staff at Mar-a-Lago?
 - d. When did the Bureau place this undercover FBI officer in a position to have intimate details about and/or access to Mar-a-Lago?
 - e. When did the Bureau meet with this undercover FBI officer to receive the information used in the affidavit in support of the search warrant?
 - f. What FBI division is directly responsible for employing this undercover FBI officer?
 - g. Does the undercover FBI officer have any direct or indirect involvement with the Counterintelligence Division? If so, please explain the nature of this relationship.

 - b. Is this source a current employee of any other U.S. Government agency, such as the U.S. Secret Service?
 - c. How long has this source been on the Bureau's payroll?
 - d. If the FBI recruited the source, when was this source recruited and for what purpose?
 - e. If the source approached the FBI without being recruited, when did the source contact the FBI and for what purpose?
 - f. When did the Bureau place this source in a position to have intimate details about and/or access to Mar-a-Lago?
 - g. When did the Bureau meet with this source to receive the information used in the affidavit in support of the search warrant?
 - h. What FBI division is directly responsible for managing this source?
 - i. Does the source have any direct or indirect involvement with the Counterintelligence Division? If so, please explain the nature of this relationship.
- 3. Does the Bureau have any internal policies or guidance regarding the use of current U.S. Government employees as a paid FBI confidential human source? If so, please provide all relevant documents.
- 4. Does the Bureau have any internal policies or guidance regarding the proper handling of any information provided by a paid confidential human source that pertains to a current or former U.S. Government official, if the source is tasked with providing security and protection for that official? If so, please provide all relevant documents.
- 5. Does the Bureau have any internal policies or guidance regarding undercover FBI officers posing as a member of a protective detail of the U.S. Secret Service? If so, please provide all relevant documents.

In addition, it is necessary that you preserve all relevant documents and communications that may refer or relate to this matter, including those on official governmental accounts and on personal, non-governmental accounts. Specifically, this preservation request should be construed as an instruction to preserve all documents, communications, and other information, including electronic information and metadata, that is or may be potentially responsive to a congressional

inquiry, request, investigation, or subpoena that may be initiated or otherwise undertaken by a committee of Congress or any other investigative entity.

For purposes of this request, "preserve" means securing and maintaining the integrity of all relevant documents, communications, and other information, including electronic information and metadata, by taking reasonable steps to prevent the partial or full destruction, alteration, testing, deletion, shredding, incineration, wiping, relocation, migration, theft, mutation, or negligent or reckless handling that could render the information incomplete or inaccessible. This includes preserving all compilations of documents that have already been gathered in response to requests, even if copies of individual documents may still exist elsewhere in the agency. I further request that you or your designee:

- A. Exercise reasonable efforts to identify and notify all relevant individuals, including current and former employees, officials, detailees, contractors, subcontractors, and consultants who may have had access to potentially relevant information that they should preserve and return such information to the FBI;
- B. Exercise reasonable efforts to identify, recover, and preserve any potentially relevant electronic information that has been deleted or marked for deletion but is still recoverable;
- C. Remind all relevant individuals, including current and former employees, officials, detailees, contractors, subcontractors, and consultants that any federal records sent or received using a nonofficial account must be forwarded to the agency for proper archiving, and forward all such material in your possession; and
- D. If it is the routine practice of yours, or any relevant individuals, including current and former employees, officials, detailees, contractors, subcontractors, or consultants to destroy or otherwise alter potentially relevant information, either halt such practices as they relate to the potentially relevant information or arrange for the preservation of complete and accurate duplicates (including metadata) of such documents, communications, or other information.

Please provide written responses to the above questions, and all documents and communications in the custody of the Bureau that refer or relate to the above questions, to the Committee no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 24, 2022. Additionally, please advise in writing as to how you will ensure all records relevant to this matter will be preserved. Thank you for your attention to this request.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Okay. Happy Friday. We're excited to have Deputy Director of the National Economic Policy [Council] Bharat Ramamurti here with us again today to discuss the student loan announcements this week and how they will benefit working middle-class families.

And with that, Bharat. Okay, thank you again.

MR. RAMAMURT: Hey, good afternoon. Good to see you all. Before taking questions, want to just talk a little bit more about the economic impact of the administration's student loan plan.

This plan will lift a large weight off of tens of millions of middle-class Americans, peoples who -- people who came, by and large, from working families and who are working class now: teachers, nurses, firefighters, police, members of the military, and more.

By lifting this weight, we are not only benefiting them and their families, we are benefiting the communities that they live in and the economy as a whole.

So, for example, there's good evidence that student loan debt makes it harder for people to start new small businesses. These relief actions mean that more middle-class Americans can open more businesses in their communities. That means more job opportunities in the years to come.

Student loan debt also makes it harder for people to buy a home. These actions will mean that more middle-class Americans may be able to finally afford a down payment, buy a home in the years to come, and start building wealth that they can pass along to their kids.

As the President has said, his core economic plan is to strengthen the middle class because that helps everyone. And these actions are targeted right at America's middle class.

Nearly 90 percent of people receiving the relief are making under \$75,000 a year. The extra money for Pell recipients helps provide additional relief to people who are more likely to have less family wealth to rely upon.

And when the President says that he's committed to growing the economy from the bottom up and the middle out, he's serious. That's why, over the course of the last year and a half, we've been able to provide support to small businesses, support to people facing the risk of eviction or foreclosure, to people at risk of going hungry, and more.

t's why the President's infrastructure bill is focused on creating hundreds of thousands of good-paying jobs, nearly 90 percent of which won't require a college degree. And it's the reason why our economy has roared back and the unemployment rate now stands at a historic low, even as the economies of other leading countries are faltering.

So this plan is working. And the student loan relief is the next part in it.

With that, also want to address an issue that know has been coming up recently, which is the cost of this proposal.

Our estimate is that the debt relief proposal will reduce average annual receipts in the student loan program by about \$24 billion a year over the next 10 years.

So the way to think about this is that because we are providing debt relief -reducing the outstanding balance for some people, eliminating it for other people -that means we're not going to be collecting certain amount of payments that we
otherwise would have been collecting. And that total is about \$24 billion a year on
average over the next 10 years.

So let's put that \$24 billion in context. That represents 1.5 percent of the deficit reduction that we are projecting for this fiscal year before the announcement. And it is far less than the \$350 billion-plus that we've already done in PPP loan forgiveness since last July.

Now, consistent with longstanding budget practices and consistent with the comments that made on Wednesday here, the official budgetary score will be produced by the Education Department and the Office of Management and Budget in the coming weeks. And, actually, the Office of Management and Budget is going to be putting out more detail on this process and how it's slightly different than the preliminary estimate that provided later today.

So, with that, happy to take questions.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Okay. All right, guys. We're going to take as many as possible. Go ahead.

Q Good morning. My first question is -- thanks for the number -- why was this a number that we didn't have the past couple of days?

And then, this is -- this modeling is based off of -- you said 75 percent of people taking advantage of the program. f 75 percent of people -- if 25 percent of people aren't taking advantage of the program, do you consider that a flaw in the program? Would you consider the program a success with that number? f you could talk us through those two.

MR. RAMAMURT: Sure. So, look, we -- we have to make an assumption about how many people take advantage of the program in order to provide this preliminary estimate. The reason that we chose 75 percent is that it's, broadly speaking, in line with the take-up rate of the most similar Education Department initiative that we could find.

n other words, there was another Education Department initiative in the past that was supposed to provide targeted debt relief to a set of borrowers who were eligible for it. And roughly 75 percent of the borrowers in that particular program took advantage of it.

Now, we are hoping to get as close to 100 percent as possible. But we -- you know, for the purposes of putting out a preliminary estimate on this, we had to choose a number. And we felt like 75 percent was the most defensible.

As for why you're getting it today, you guys asked us for it, so we're providing you with information.

Q So the way you're explaining where -- how this is being paid for, how -- you just went through this is \$24 billion per year. Are you considering that there was a bit of a -- like a -- we're trying to get -- are you still considering this self-paid for -- right? -- because mitigation and compensating it for other -- in other ways are not necessarily having internal paysfor for this bill. So are you still phrasing this as "it pays for itself," or are you phrasing it in a different way?

MR. RAMAMURT: What would say is that, yes, this is paid for; it is paid for and far more by the amount of deficit reduction that we're already on track for this year.

ike said, we're on track for \$1.7 trillion in deficit reduction this year. That means, practically speaking, compared to the previous year, 1.7 trillion more dollars are coming into the Treasury than are going out. And we're using a portion of that -- a very small portion of it -- to provide relief to middle-class families, consistent with the President's plan.

So, yes, we consider it fully paid for.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Go ahead, Peter.

Q Bharat, thanks for doing this.

MR. RAMAMURT : Sure.

Q The median household income in this country right now is roughly \$67,000, which means that -- this is going to go for those up to \$125,000. Those individuals are already making, individually, almost twice the median household income in this country.

What do you say to those critics who say you're not just helping the middle class -- though understand 90 percent will be making under \$75,000 -- you're still helping what is a smaller percentage, but a significant percentage, of individuals who most Americans would view as making a lot of money?

MR. RAMAMURT: Sure. So, look, -- you know, in our view, this, as you noted, nearly 90 percent of the benefits go to people making under \$75,000 a year. And our view is that the folks that you mentioned -- under \$125,000 -- they are middle-class families. And -- and think that they would widely be considered as such.

And, look, it's extremely consistent with what the President has said on the tax side. Now, on tax side, he said that nobody making under \$400,000 a year should face a tax increase.

So the economic story of this country over the last couple of decades, if we're going to look at it, is that there has been a relatively small sliver of folks who have done extremely well -- the top 1 percent, top 5 percent or so. And our goal was to make sure that people below that -- the bottom 95 percent -- get a little bit more relief, get a little bit more breathing room. And that's exactly what this policy does. But, by the way, targeted even more narrowly than that -- primarily, overwhelmingly, to people making under \$75,000 a year.

Q And then to follow up, if can quickly, the White House, yesterday, was pretty vocal on Twitter, which it isn't always, criticizing some of the critics of this program -- Marjorie Taylor Greene, Matt Gaetz among them -- saying how much money they received in PPP loans in the past.

think you would agree that there is a difference between a loan program, as it existed, which was conceived to be -- the PPP program that was conceived to be forgivable, assuming you spent a majority, think, 80 percent on the payroll, as opposed to these loans, which were for individuals with the expectation when they made money, they'd be paying it back.

So is that a fair comparison, and why?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah, we absolutely think it's a fair comparison, and here's why: So, you know, since last July, we have forgiven, under the statutory terms of the PPP program, more than \$350 billion worth of loans. Right? Those are loans that the government has forgiven, turned into turn into grants. And those are loans, by the way, of up to \$10 million per business owner.

Now, look, we believe that providing support to small businesses is the right thing to do. We didn't design PPP. Maybe we would have designed it a little bit differently if we were in charge. But, broadly speaking, providing support to small business is a priority of the President.

But, look, has any Republican in the last year stood up and said, "nflation is really high. You guys should stop providing this loan forgiveness to PPP recipients. You should slow it down because it --" or "You should change the rules, because it's unfair that these people should get up to \$10 million in grants"?

No, in fact, it's the opposite. The pressure that we've gotten from Republicans on the Hill has consistently been "Do this faster. Make it easier for people to get forgiveness."

So our view is: Why is there a double standard here? Why is it, from the perspective of Republicans, great to forgive a loan of up to \$10 million to a business owner, but if we want to provide \$10,000 or \$20,000 in loan relief to a teacher or a bus driver or a nurse, all of a sudden, it's socialism? That's -- that's what doesn't

Q Thanks. was wondering if you could talk about the \$24 billion number, because it's a little different when you guys canceled the TT or Corinthian, you know, we were given a lump sum of the total amount. So 'm wondering if it is fair to extrapolate this to say that you believe \$240 billion in loans will be canceled? Or, if not, what are the underlying assumptions that goes to the 24? Right?

Are you kind of cutting out -- are you assuming economic growth that will offset some of it? Are you cutting out folks who would have defaulted on their loans but wouldn't -- wouldn't repay? Does this -- think it doesn't include the other Education Department rules that would have been included, so can you just kind of get us to --

MR. RAMAMURT : Sure.

Q -- that number, and if there is a topline number?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah, so, look, this is a cash flow estimate, which basically says, you know, there's a subsection of borrowers who are going to get relief under this proposal. We estimate that 75 percent of them are going to take advantage of the relief that they are offered. And if that debt is cancelled, that means that, you know, if they were scheduled to make \$400 worth of payments a year for the next 10 years, that cash flow is no longer going to come in to the -- to the government. You know, it's that -- it's that straightforward.

Now, as the OMB item that's going to come out later is going to describe, there's some really key differences between what we are doing, which is a preliminary estimate, and the more complicated and, frankly, more precise score that is required by federal law.

And to give you a few examples, number one, you know, under federal law, to do a budget estimate of this, you have to take the net present value of all of the payments that are -- that are forgone. That estimate is going to look at some really important technical implementation decisions that the Department of Education is going to have to make.

So, for example, if you're a borrower, you have multiple loans over \$10,000. Well, if you get \$10,000, in relief, which of these loans is going to get cancelled? t depen- -- it matters for the -- for the cash flow.

That's the kind of more sophisticated, drilling-down type of analysis that's going to happen as part of that process, consistent with our -- with budget scoring. But in an effort to provide you all with more information and a ballpark, that's what we're doing here.

Q And just because have you right now and Jay Powell spoke earlier today, he said that, you know, the Fed was likely going to continue to pursue interest rate hikes but that it could result in pain, both in a slower economy and job losses.

Obviously inflation is a major concern and that's what the Fed is looking at here

But the President has not only said that the Fed is independent but he has sort of endorsed their vision. And if their vision results in job losses and an economic slowdown, has the President's opinion of that changed in any way?

MR. RAMAMURT: Well, 'm not going to answer that hypothetical, but will say that we have great respect for the independence of the Federal Reserve. 'm not going to comment directly on Chair Powell's comments. But there's been a lot of good data released about the economy, including this morning, that, to us, gives us a lot of hope about the future trajectory of where things are going and how middle-class families are going to be doing.

So, for example, PCE, which is a measure of inflation, came out this morning. n fact, it's the one that the Federal Reserve prefers to the CP. And what PCE said is that prices fell last year 0.1 percent, and at the same time, incomes increased. So that tells a good story about the state of the economy.

The University of Michigan put out its consumer sentiment survey this morning. Consumer sentiment is up quite a bit over the last month, and consumer inflation expectations are down. So again, all good signs there.

And, of course, if you look back to some of the data releases a little bit earlier, for July, we had 528,000 new jobs. CP, which came out in July, that was flat, so no price increases in July. And, of course, everyone -- everyone's favorite measure of the economy, gas prices, are down over \$1 since their peak.

So, a lot of good news in the economy. We're going to let the Fed do its work. And our focus here is to support households, keep our eye on the ball on inflation, and hopefully come out the other side with a -- with steady and stable growth, which is what the President has said is his goal.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Go ahead, Matt. And '11 come to the back, too.

Q had two sort of technical questions, but thankfully you're here to answer some technical questions. The first is: You guys have argued about the one point trillion dollars in deficit reduction. t sounds like it's hard to get to like a \$240 billion figure over 10 years with this new estimate. But is it fair to say that that \$1.7 trillion becomes 1.5, or it becomes a lower figure given that it's not paid for? s that a fair way for us to sort of think about what you guys are doing?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah. That's a fair way of thinking about it. Another way of thinking about it is that we go from the single-largest deficit reduction in the history of this country to the single-largest deficit reduction in the history of this country. (aughter.)

Q So the second question is about whether you guys have estimates. You've argued that this is potentially a deflationary move. Do you have any estimates in terms of how much money will start to come in come January and how much money is going to be not coming in? And to articulate a little bit more of how you guys are arriving at that conclusion.

MR. RAMAMURT : Yeah, we -- we've looked at those numbers, and they informed our view that we put out on Wednesday -- that we view that the impact of restarting payments

and providing relief are largely going to offset each other. And there's different assumptions about, again, as we -- as we've covered, there are different assumptions that go into figuring out exactly how much is that going to mean. But in our -- in our mind, with a pretty broad range -- range of assumptions that are going to largely offset. And there have been a host of independent experts who have said the same thing.

n fact, Goldman Sachs put out an analysis of this proposal. And they said quite clearly that they felt that restarting payments and providing targeted relief would actually be disinflationary. In other words, more money would be coming into the government than going out in the short term, which would help further -- further our efforts to bring down inflation.

Q But, guess, if you guys are saying \$24 billion is the estimate for what won't come in per year, is there an estimate for next year once you kick on -- once people start paying?

MR. RAMAMURT : Yeah.

Q s it \$30 billion is coming in --

MR. RAMAMURT : Yeah.

Q -- and \$24 billion is not? Or --

MR. RAMAMURT: Sure. mean, one way to think about it is this: So we've had a student loan pause in place now for over two years. No federal borrowers were being required to make any payments. People are voluntarily making payments. So we're actually collecting, roughly speaking, \$2 billion a month in payments voluntarily. Under normal time, so pre-pause, we were collecting about \$6 billion in payments a month from student loan borrowers. So the difference between those two is \$4 billion.

f we turn the loans back on without making any -- any other changes, roughly speaking -- because things have changed in the world in the last two years -- roughly speaking, we would expect to collect about \$4 billion a month in addition to what we're collecting right now. Right? So, roughly speaking, \$48 billion coming into the government that wouldn't have been coming in before.

As you can sort of piece together, if the average annual cost of this is \$24 billion, that means that on net, about \$20- to \$24 billion is coming into the government, even after we do the relief. Right? Now, again, that's not -- there's some play in those numbers, but just want to give you a general sense of how we're doing the math there.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Go ahead.

Q Two just, like, brass tack questions -- people are trying to navigate this still.

MR. RAMAMURT : Sure.

Q We got this new information today that the form is maybe available for folks who think they're eligible in mid- October. t's going to take about four to six weeks -

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MR. RAMAMURT : Yep.

Q -- for that to be processed. So can you guys guarantee to folks that if they are on time and they put in their application in mid-October, they will definitely see their balance shrink the appropriate amount --

MR. RAMAMURT : Yeah.

Q -- before repayments have to be due again?

MR. RAMAMURT : Yeah.

Q And then just another sort of question, too. So a lot of confusion. f you recently zeroed out your balance in the last few months, can you request a refund and then still apply to get some of this forgiveness?

MR. RAMAMURT: Right. All right, so let me -- on your first question, let me just provide a little bit of detail, because want to make sure that people get the full story here.

So the application will be available by early October. n the meantime, borrowers can go to StudentAid.gov, which has been up now for the last 48 hours, and they can provide their email address so they can get notified when that application goes live.

Once the borrower completes the application, they can expect relief within four to six weeks. So borrowers are advised to apply by roughly November 15th in order to receive relief before the payment pause expires on December 31st.

And, of course, the Department of Education will continue to process applications as they're received, even if the pa- -- even after the pause expires on December 31st.

So one more point here, which is that we encourage everyone who thinks that they're eligible to go to the website and go to the application when it's available and fill it out. But as we noted during the announcement, there's actually 8 million people -- 8 million borrowers -- that's about 20 percent of the borrowers -- for whom the Education Department already has data about their income on file. And if those people qualify based on the income on file, they will actually get relief automatically.

So would refer you to the Education Department for any other questions about that and your question about refunds. would refer you to them.

Q So if they apply -- right? --

MR. RAMAMURT : Yeah.

Q -- when the application is available --

MR. RAMAMURT : Yeah.

- Q -- they should be good to go --
- MR. RAMAMURT : Yes.
- Q -- before December 31st?

MR. RAMAMURT: Four to six weeks after they submit the application. So, yes, in our view, if you submit by early to mid-November, you should get your relief before the restart happens at the end of December.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Go ahead.

Q Thanks. wanted to ask for a second about the legal justification for this program. You're using a 2003 law to justify why COV D is a national emergency and why student relief -- or debt relief is needed. What's your response to critics that say that that's a stretch in the law? And do you plan or do different agencies that are involved here plan to put out more legal justification for why this is okay?

MR. RAMAMURT: Well, look, again, 'm not a lawyer, so don't want to get into too much of the legal nitty-gritty here. But what can tell you is that both the Department of Justice Office of egal Counsel and the General Counsel's Office of the Department of Education have looked at the text of the statute and believe that the action that the Secretary took and that the administration took here is legally justified.

There's more detail available in some of the memos that they've written. And you --would recommend that you talk to them about it. But -- but the President was clear from the beginning that he did not want to move forward on this unless it was clear that it was legally available to him.

And, you know, one of the first things that he did when he came to office was asked for that legal opinion and got the answer that, yes, options were available to him that were legally permissible under that -- under that law. And it's worth noting, by the way, that law that you're talking about is the exact same legal authority that the Secretary of Education has been using since 2020 to impose a pause on student loan payments for 45 million borrowers. And that has not been challenged in court. thas not been found improper by a court. t's the same statute that the previous administration used and that we've used, that we are now using for this action.

Q also wanted to ask: You, as an administration, have taken existing statutes and -- don't know if "stretch" is the right word, but you did it with the eviction moratorium, you did it with vaccines, and we've seen courts push back. In this case, you have people who are really excited and really making plans with this money that they think they're going to save. What's your response to them? Are you preparing for a legal challenge? What's your response when people are reading that there could be legal uncertainty to your position?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah. Well, look, -- you know, what we can say is that we believe we're on strong legal ground in taking this action. Of course, people can challenge actions in court. thappens all the time. thappens to this administration. t's happened to every administration in history. t's going to be up to the courts to decide whether those are valid claims or not. But we believe that we're on very

strong legal ground.

Q Thank you.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Go ahead, Niels, and then we'll come back.

Q f you -- a follow-up to that: f a judge somewhere were to attempt to put a stay on the implementation of the student debt relief, would the payments still resume in January?

The other -- so the other side of the coin: So if the student debt relief were to be stopped by a court, would the -- would the other side of it -- payments -- still resume?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah, -- 'm not in a position to answer that hypothetical right now, but it's a good question.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Jacqui.

Q Thank you. want to just go back to your comparison between this and the PPP loans --

MR. RAMAMURT : Sure.

Q -- because what Republicans and critics are saying is that there's a difference between those decisions being voted on by Congress and, you know, those loans that turned into grants being, by and large, for -- you know, to cover businesses that were shut down by the government involuntarily because of a natural disaster versus students who willfully took out their loans and are now unable, for whatever reason, to repay them -- there is a difference there.

MR. RAMAMURT: Well, would say they're -- both actions are based on laws that Congress passed. You know, we're -- we are implementing a law that Congress passed -- actually a Republican Congress and Republican President in 2003: the HEROES Act. And again, that's the exact same legal authority that the previous administration used to put a pause on student loan payments. That's the authority that we're using in this instance. So, you know, we are acting consistent with the law.

And, look, to go back to my earlier point, we're not against PPP. We're supportive of the idea that small businesses should get relief. The point is that over the past year, we have been forgiving hundreds of billions of dollars' worth of loans to business owners.

And remember, that program was stood up very quickly. Money went out the door quickly. And Congress could have come back at any time and said, you know, "We should look a

little bit more carefully at these loans, maybe we shouldn't be providing forgiveness to people if they clearly did extraordinarily well during the pandemic. Remember, these are really low-interest loans; maybe we should just make them pay back their loan at a low interest rate, rather than forgiving it."

None of that happened. We didn't hear from a single Republican pushing for any

of that. Everyone was on board with forgiving up to \$10 million in loans.

And so, all we're saying is that it's hard to credit those same people who are highly supportive of that program and that amount of debt forgiveness, turning around and saying that forgiving a fraction of that amount for working people -- not business owners, but working people -- somehow that crosses the line over into socialism. That's not how we view it.

Q Okay. What's the difference, though, between -- guess, how are you justifying using a 2003 law that was, you know, designed to help military families for this purpose, where you're now helping bail out people who took out loans and cannot pay them? Do you view people who can't pay their debt as heroes like those who are in our armed services and were fighting after 9/11?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah, no, look, think, as the President has said, there is a real problem here with the burden that student loan debt places on people from low-income and middle-income families. You know, we used to have a system where a Pell Grant, which is federal support to low-income families, used to cover 80 percent of the cost of going to a four-year public college. And as of today, it covers 33 percent of the cost.

So what are people supposed to do? They want to get a degree. They're being told that's the right thing to do. They think it's going to help them --

Q Why go after the universities? Why not build in something to make sure that borrowing moving forward is limited or that universities don't just ratchet up the cost?

MR. RAMAMURT: Sure. Yeah, 'm glad that you brought that up, because want to address it. Remember, the President put out a three-part plan on this. And the third part of it was accountability for colleges. And it detailed a few things.

Number one, unlike the previous administration, which loosened the reins on colleges and universities, rolled back rules that were intended to hold them accountable for raising costs, this President and this administration reinstituted an enforcement office at the Department of Education that goes after these types of colleges.

t kicked out in an accreditor, which is a private company that basically says that this institution, this college is -- is good enough so they should get federal loans. This accreditor allowed colleges like TT and Corinthian to get access to federal loans. And then that -- those colleges defrauded people, defrauded students.

So this administration responded by kicking that accreditor out of the program. They're not going to be able to accredit colleges anymore.

And would note that a central element of the President's community college plan was accountability so that neither colleges or states that took that money could raise prices on students unfairly.

So, all of that said, think that we believe that the department should have

even more authority to go after bad actors and to hold colleges accountable. And we're eager to work with Congress to advance any proposals along those lines.

Q guess wanted to ask -- know the President last month, when he made remarks about the nflation Reduction Act, really highlighted the fact that it would reduce the deficit. And if a larger percentage of those student borrowers end up availing themselves at this program, you know, it would cost \$320 billion -- right? -- if you had 100 percent uptake, essentially, over 10 years. And that's the goal.

So, you know, is there -- guess, can you acknowledge that some people would feel disappointed that this could basically wipe out the savings from that law?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah, 'm glad you asked about that because think that there's a nuance here that's important to understanding why that doesn't quite work.

So when -- when the budgetary score comes out for this proposal, like talked about -- we're going to get a little wonky for a second here -- what it's going to do is say that all the loans that are being modified or eliminated here, we have to look over the lifetime of that loan and figure out how many dollars are we not collecting because of that modification.

And so, as you know, many, many loans -- the repayment lasts over 10 years. You know, people are repaying for 20, 25 years in instances. So, really, that score is going to reflect the cost over a much longer time horizon than your standard 10-year budget window.

As a result, in our view, the thing that we should compare that score to is not just the first 10 years of the nflation Reduction Act, it's the -- at least the first two decades of it, and maybe the lifetime impact of that.

And if you look at outside analyses of the long-term impact of the nflation Reduction Act, they find that it would reduce the deficit by a trillion dollars over the next two decades.

So, in our view, that is the relevant point of comparison on that.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: MJ.

Q Yeah, wanted to ask you about the updated Penn-Wharton estimate, which says just the debt cancellation piece alone would cost up to \$519 billion over 10 years, and then the total plan would cost upwards of \$1 trillion.

Obviously, there is a significant gap between the \$24 billion per year that you're assigning, or \$240 billion over 10 years. Just wanted to give you the chance to walk us through why we might see that difference in the two models.

MR. RAMAMURT: Sure. know it just came out today, and didn't have too much time to look carefully into it, but got a chance to skim it.

My view is that there's a couple of things. Right off the top, getting to that trillion dollars, they rel- -- they have a massive range on estimating the impact of our reforms to the income-based repayment plan.

They say that their baseline estimate is that it costs about \$70 billion, but then they say it could cost \$450 billion more than that if you make certain assumptions. So, you know, in our, in our view, you can lop off that \$450 billion right there because it seems to be somewhat speculative and clearly the top end of the range.

Beyond that, the debt relief analysis doesn't do a few things. Number one, it doesn't account for the fact that -- it assumes 100 percent of people will take it up. You know, in our mind, that's not necessarily a reasonable assumption.

And look, estimating the cost of forgiving certain debt is more complicated than just looking at the face value of the debt that's being canceled. So, gave the example when was here last time that -- let's say you canceled debt for somebody who has been in default for more than seven years. There's actually millions of borrowers in that position. f the face value of their debt is \$10,000 and you cancel it, it's not reasonable to say that the cost of that is \$10,000 because you were sitting here collecting zero dollars on that loan year after year after year. So some of those elements are also going to affect -- affect the score.

So, you know, the Education Department has the best data on it. thas all of the data about who repays, what to expect about repayment horizons and payment rates, how this interacts with the existing income-based repayment program, and all of that. So we feel confident in our numbers.

Q Just one follow-up. Given that the upwards of \$1 trillion that they are estimating, that obviously is a number that's a lot closer to the \$1.7 trillion in deficit reduction that you all have been citing. So, 'm just curious: Was the total cost that this plan would amount to -- was that a factor when the President and all of you were deciding what the total amount of forgiveness should be? Or was the forgiveness amount -- did you get there, sort of, regardless of the cost and then you sort of figured out what the general cost would be after?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah, want to make totally clear that we don't think that a trillion dollars is anywhere in the ballpark of what this is going to cost.

Number two, you know, yes, the President was quite focused on what the -- at least a good estimate of what the cost of this proposal was going to be. t was a big factor in -- in his decision. He was looking into and thinking about how that would compare, versus the deficit reduction that he had been able to secure over the last year -- last two years, frankly -- of his presidency. Remember, in the first year of his presidency, he brought down the deficit by \$350 billion.

So it was a factor. We provided him with estimates along the lines of what we have provided -- provided you, and that did play a role in thinking through how to design the policy.

- Q Was there a percentage that he was determined not to cross?
- MR. RAMAMURT: Not that recall.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Okay. Just, like, two more.

Q For students who are about to take out new loans, what should the message to them be about whether their loans could be forgiven in the future? And does the White House have an obligation to emphasize that this could very be well be a one-time thing so they're not taking out additional loans?

MR. RAMAMURT: would say two things. Number one, this is going to be a one-time thing, in terms of the blanket relief. You know, use this as an authority that is conditional on an emergency, as said, and the President believes that this relief is warranted in this instance, coming out of the pandemic and as we transition back into repayment. t's not the kind of authority that you can use over and over again.

But what would say to that student is that these income-based repayment reforms that are also part of this proposal are designed to help people who go to school and then end up having lower-income, middle-income jobs going forward.

Remember, we had some examples in the factsheet that we put out alongside the proposal showing that, for example, somebody making \$30- or \$40,000 a year, after they have some debt, the income-based repayment reforms represent a savings of \$1,000, \$1,500 a year or more, depending on their exact circumstances.

So it was really important to the President that this package of proposals not just be relief for current borrowers; it's a reform to the system so that future borrowers also get more manageable debt loads going forward.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Okay. think the pool -- the in-town pool has to gather, so if folks need to go, feel free. 'll stay a little bit longer.

Go ahead. You're being very --

Q '11 just ask my question. Many comparisons have been made from the American system to foreign governments, where higher education is government-funded, taxpayer-funded at no cost to students. How did foreign systems inform the decision for loan forgiveness? And is there any economic data we can glean from those countries that we might -- might see as a result of the loan forgiveness decision?

MR. RAMAMURT: Yeah, as we've talked about, part of the reason that we're in this position, part of the reason why the cost of college -- even after accounting for inflation has tripled in the last 40 years, since 1980 -- part of it is that there has been a significant amount of disinvestment, especially at the state level.

So states used to put more money into funding public education, public higher education in their states. And that helped keep tuition down, especially for in-state students. What we've seen in recent decades is pulling back on that and basically shifting the burden onto students who come from lower-income and middle-income families.

And as noted, the federal government hasn't done enough to step in and fill that void and the value of the Pell Grant has deteriorated from 80 percent to 33 percent.

Obtained via FOIA by Judicial Watch, Inc. so, you know, what the President has called for, as you know, is a series of increased federal investment that would make it easier for folks from lower-income and middle-income families to go to college, right?

Doubling the Pell Grant. Right now, the Pell Grant is about \$6,500 a year. He wants to double it to \$13,000 a year. That represents a significant amount of relief for people from lower-income, middle-income families.

And as talked about, he's also pushing to make community college free.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: All right. You got to wrap it up. 'll stay a little longer for folks to take some questions.

MR. RAMAMURT : Thanks, everyone.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Thank you so much, Bharat. That was very helpful. Thank you. Good to have you.

Okay. So 'll stay a little bit longer and take some questions for -- for folks who are still here. Okay, just a -- just a topper for you.

And this is something that Bharat already alluded to, talked about, which is the PCE. While there is more work to do to bring prices down, we received several pieces of encouraging economic news today from PCE.

The new data on the personal consumption expenditures -- what economists call, again, PCE -- show that in July, incomes went up while prices went down. So, based on this measure, inflation went down in July.

This was largely driven by the fastest decline in gas prices in a decade. The national average is now down to \$3.87 per gallon. The American people are starting to get some relief from high prices. And that's underscored by new data that shows consumer sentiment is up 13 percent since July. And one-year expenditures of inflation dropped by nearly a half a percentage point. That's encouraging news as well.

The President's number-one economic priority is lowering cost while sustaining our historic economic recovery. The recently signed CH PS Act and Inflation Reduction Act will do just that.

Once again, we have more work to do, as we have said over and over again. We continue to face real global challenges. And we are always careful to not read too much into any one month's data.

But what we saw today is encouraging evidence that we are on the right course and we are making progress.

Q Does the President believe that it was appropriate for the former President to have classified information and -- unsecured in his home?

MS. JEAN-r EKKE: SO, as Obtained via FOIA by Judicial Watch, Inc. under stand why to ke have an interest in this. We totally get that. But as it relates to any -- any comments, on anything related to this independent investigation, even any underlying materials, we feel that it is not appropriate for us to comment on this.

This is an independent investigation that the Department of Justice is leading.

That's something that the President finds is an important thing to do -- for the

Department of Justice to have that independence. We're just not going to comment.

Q The President yesterday suggested that Republican ideology is veering towards "semi-fascism." Can you just clarify what exactly does the President mean by that?

And secondly, the President also said he respects conservative Republicans, but he does not respect MAGA Republicans. More than 70 million Americans voted for Trump in 2020. Does he not respect those voters?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: No, mean, that's not what he said. 'm going to -- think he was pretty clear. And he was very powerful last night.

ook, what the President said last night was that when it comes to MAGA Republicans, when it comes to the extreme, ultra wing of Republicans, they are attacking democracy. Right? They are attacking -- taking away rights and freedoms. They are using threat of -- threats of violence. They are taking away voting rights. And he called it what it is. That's what he did. He called it what it is and what many, we would argue, you know, historians would agree with us on.

And so what Joe Biden believes is, as President, he should and Presidents should be the strongest voice for democracy. And so, he was making that very clear. He was making that contrast to what congressional Democrats have been doing, which is fighting for our rights, fighting for freedom, delivering on an economy that is historic, 10 million jobs that have been created, lowering healthcare, lowering prescription drugs, and making sure that we take on those special interest groups. And we saw, just a couple of weeks ago, that we won.

So, he's making that contrast, trying to make that very clear, of what we are seeing today. And so, he was passionate about this, he was eloquent about this. And he also, when it comes to what you're asking me about Republicans who are conservative, clearly, he said that he believed there are traditional conservative Republicans. He was very clear on that. He specifically called out and mentioned Maryland Governor arry Hogan as one of them.

So -- but we have to really, you know, make sure that we -- we -- we make it clear that there's a choice in front of the American people -- right? -- and we have to make sure that we make it loud and clear that when it comes to MAGA Republicans, we call that out -- and that's what he did -- and what they're doing -- right? -- what they're doing in attacking our democracy.

And so, he wanted to be clear on that. And he made that contrast. And that's what you heard from the President.

Go ahead.

- Q Has the White House made any changes, in light of the revelations of the former President's handling of classified material, to its own processes or training procedures for handling, sort of, protected and secret information?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: don't have anything to share with you. Again, we're just going to be really mindful. know -- get the question that you're asking. We're just not going to share any change of processes; we're not going to share any information, anything that's related to this -- any content, any underlying materials to the investigation that the Department of Justice is doing -- again, an independent investigation. We're just not going to comment at this time.
- Q Just to hop back to loan forgiveness for a second. NPR has done a lot of reporting on sort of administrative processing failures at the Department of Education for these loan programs. These are kind of lapses in income-based repayment and sort of profession-based repayment that Secretary Cardona has acknowledged.
- s the administration concerned at all about similar issues for the, sort of, coming loan forgiveness program or ways that it might give up the -- leave borrowers in the lurch?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, look, you just mentioned Secretary Cardona has been really clear about the previous -- the previous loan forgiveness programs and other programs that have been before him and in his agency.
- ook, we take this very seriously. We believe that this is an important plan that's going to give relief, again, to up to 43 million Americans. t's a very targeted plan that's going to give relief to 90 percent of Americans that are making less than \$75,000 a year. That is important.
- This is a campaign promise that the President made and kept. And he went beyond -- not just to \$10,000, but up to \$20- -- \$20,000.
- So, we're going to do everything that we can to make sure that that gets delivered. But, of course, we're going to hear from folks and see if they will take us up on it.
- Again, this is an important piece of -- an important plan that is historic. We have not seen any President do this before. And we're going to do everything that we can. Of course, Secretary Cardona is going to do everything that they can with -- he can with his team to get this done.
 - Go ahead, April.
- Q Karine, this Sunday will be the 59th anniversary of the March on Washington. And how is this White House, how is this President marking that moment, particularly as he decided to run for office because of the massacre in Charlottesville, as he walked in talking about equity and equality?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, let me first say a couple of things, because this is a -- it is an important day, and want to give it the due, as you're asking me this question.

You're right. What -- when the President -- when the President and so many Americans saw what was happening not too long ago, back in 2017 -- just in August of 2017 -- and we saw what was happening in Charlottesville, that moved him. What we saw -- the hatred that we saw there -- that moved him and that moves so many of us. And he actually wrote an op-ed talking about what he thought that meant for this country and how sad and devastating it is -- it was to see that type of behavior, that type of hatred, and that type of sentiment that was very public and also someone lost their life. So, want to make sure that we don't forget that day as well, that weekend as well.

And when the President came into office, he took that, when -- talking about racial -- dealing with racial equity -- he took his -- he took that very seriously. And you see that across -- across the agency. He had signed an executive order talking about how we -- he wanted to make sure that there was racial equity within the -- within the agencies across the federal government. And you've seen him do that.

And Susan Rice, as you know -- you know, the ambassador is leading that effort with her -- with her department and dealing with the different agencies and making sure that we deal with -- we deal with racial inequities, even here in the agencies.

So as it relates to March on Washington and that anniversary -- the President has said this before and 'll reiterate: The March on Washington and Dr. Martin uther King Jr's " Have a Dream" speech changed the course of history. We continue to reaffirm our commitment to fulfilling America's founding promise.

And the President has made advancing equality core to his administration, as just laid out. We can't rest until justice truly rings out for all of us.

don't have anything specific on what the President is going to be doing on this. But we will share if we have anything more.

Q And there was a missed opportunity, if you will. Civil rights leaders wanted to mark the anniversary Sunday by having a meeting with the President this week. Could you talk about that? s there an effort to try to have this meeting happen soon? Was it a missed opportunity, et cetera?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, mean, 'll say this: don't have a meeting to read out or speak to at this time, but, you know, we have stayed in regular touch with civil rights leaders. Funding is also available through FEMA's Emergency Food and Shelter Program to eligible local governments and not-for-profit organizations upon request to support humanitarian relief for migrants, as we have done many times in response to Governor Abbott's repeated attempts to create chaos -- and, really, to create chaos and confusion. That's what he's doing at the border, and costing his own constituents over -- well over a million dollars.

So we will work to manage the consequences of this latest political charade that we see from the governor. And we do take this very seriously and are continuing -- going to work with Mayor Bowser and Mayor Adams.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, you know, just a couple of things. And have a few things that want to say, because this is an important question.

So President Putin is weaponizing energy. Right? You've heard us say that before, and that is exactly what is happening. This is why President Biden set up a task force with the EU back in March to work on ways to increase alternative sources of natural gas to Europe, including from the United States.

We've made progress since March. Global NG exports to Europe has risen by 84 percent compared to 2021, while the U.S. share of those NG exports have been nearly tripled. 

BIDEN FLIPS THE SCRIPT ON DEFUND THE POLICE — As a policy issue, crime, like inflation and immigration, has consistently been a political vulnerability for JOE BIDEN and Democrats. A Fox News poll in June showed Republicans with a net advantage of 13 points on the issue, the party's second best rating, behind inflation and border security. An ABC News/Ipsos poll this month found a similar 11-point

advantage for Republicans on the issue of crime, which was Democrats' worst issue tested in the poll.

Republicans have seized on the national spike in murders (almost 30% in 2020, when, um, Trump was president), the "defund the police" movement, and criminal justice reform policies pursued by unpopular progressive presecutors who have faced a backlash even from liberals, such as San Francisco's **CHESA BOUDIN**, who was recalled, and Los Angeles' **GEORGE GASCÓN**, who recently dodged a similar effort.

Biden has responded in three ways. (1) He has tried to talk more about "gun safety" or "gun violence." When pollsters use those phrases to ask voters which party they trust more, Democrats suddenly have the upperhand. In the ABC poll this month, Democrats had a 5-point advantage over Republicans when asked about gun violence. **(2)** Biden has also sharply dismissed any notions that he supports defunding the police, the activist-driven slogan that gained sympathy among progressives two years ago but has been almost universally rejected by elected Democrats. **(3)** Finally, Biden has downplayed progressive criminal justice reform and tweaked the way he talks about it.

"Fund the police and promote effective prosecution of crimes affecting families today" is now the White House's preferred framing about those two issues (in that order).

For more than a year, Biden has been on the defensive on these issues, tacking to the middle and adjusting his language. Now, suddenly, White House aides tell Playbook they believe Biden can play offense.

Today in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Biden will not just defend his record and spotlight the recent bipartisan gun safety package he signed into law, he'll **attack the GOP as soft on crime** — for its record on guns, its defense of Jan. 6 criminals and, most interestingly, its recent response to the FBI search of Mar-a-Lago.

Here's how a White House official previewed today's 3:15 p.m. speech at Wilkes University for Playbook:

"President Biden will ... talk about his Safer America Plan and the simple, basic notion that when it comes to public safety in this nation, the answer isn't to defund the police, it's to fund the police.

"The president will talk about how he brought together Democrats and Republicans earlier this summer to pass the most significant gun safety law in 30

years. He'll say we must build on that momentum and **act to ban assault weapons**. A majority of Americans support it. The NRA opposes it. Do Republican Members of Congress side with the American people or the NRA? It's time to hold every elected official's feet to the fire.

"The president will make clear that Congressional Republicans' extreme MAGA agenda is a threat to the rule of law. He will say that you can't propose defunding the FBI or defend the mob that stormed the Capitol and attacked and assaulted police officers on January 6th and be pro-police.

"And he will highlight how his plan would invest in 100,000 more cops who will be trained and supervised consistent with standards in the president's Executive Order to advance effective, accountable community policing that builds public trust and strengthens public safety. As part of the American Rescue Plan that President Biden signed into law last year, we sent \$350 billion to local governments to keep cops on the beat. Every Republican in Congress voted against that funding for law enforcement. And, Trump cut \$400 billion from his budget for state and local law enforcement."

This is a significant escalation for Biden in terms of how he will attack the GOP in the final 10 weeks of the campaign. Raising the GOP's ties to the NRA and its response to Jan. 6 isn't new. Going after Republicans for wanting to "defund the FBI" is, and it represents the first time that Biden will be weighing in on the political fallout from the FBI search of Mar-a-Lago. We'll be eager to hear how he talks about it, considering the sensitivity around any hint that the White House is politicizing the document investigation.

MARK KELLY leading Republican BLAKE MASTERS by 3.3 points, but GOP gubernatorial nominee KARI LAKE ahead of Democrat KATIE HOBBS by 0.7 points. Nobody topped 48%.



MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Hi. Good afternoon, everybody.

Q Good afternoon.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Thank you. All right, today the Vice President and the Second Gentleman visited NASA's Kennedy Space Center in Florida to attend the launch of the Artemis mission. Despite the launch being pulled down, we look forward to it happening when NASA says all systems are ready.

While at the Kennedy Space Center, the Vice President and Second Gentleman met with STEM students, astronauts, and workers building the crew modules for Artemis , which will be the first crewed Artemis mission, and Artemis , which will return American astronauts to the Moon, including the first woman and person of color.

As you may have seen, today we announced that the Biden Harris administration will

host the White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health on September 28th in Washington, D.C.

As the President said a few months ago, this will be the first conference of this kind in more than 50 years. The conference will bring together government leaders, academics, activists, and Americans from all walks of life to achieve the goal of ending hunger and reducing diet-related diseases in the U.S. by 2030. A key additional focus will be reducing disparities among the communities who are impacted the most by these issues.

At the conference, we will announce a national strategy that identifies actions the government will take to encourage the public and private sectors to drive transformative change and address the intersections between food, hunger, nutrition, and health.

With that, Zeke, you want to take it away?

- Q Thanks, Karine. Over the weekend, the Office of the Director of National ntelligence said they were conducting a risk assessment of the classified documents found at former President Trump's home in Florida. Does the President intend to get briefed on -- on that risk assessment once it's completed?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, look, we have seen the letter from ODN to Congress on this, but would refer you to either ODN or the Justice Department by any specific questions on this.

As we have said, this involves material that is part of an ongoing criminal investigation, and we just aren't going to comment on that at this time. hear your question; we just don't -- we're not going to say anything at this time while the investigation is going on.

- Q This is about the President's actions, not what they're doing there. So does he -- you can't say whether or not he'll be briefed on --
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Well, can say that he has not been briefed. know folks have asked, you know, if he has been briefed via the PDB or otherwise on any classified materials. That -- can say, as a general matter -- we just don't get into information included in the President's classified materials -- this is what this would be considered -- or daily briefings on sensitive national security or intelligence matters. This is ODN -- a decision that they've made. So talking about any PDB specifically would be inappropriate or any classified, again, material.

On this specific issue, we have been very clear the President was not briefed in advance of this Justice Department's recent actions. We have not been involved in this matter as part of the Justice Department's ongoing criminal investigation. We see this as part of the underlying material that is connected to this.

So, you know, we're -- as we've said, we are committed to the independence with -- as it relates to any legal matters that the Department of Justice has. And that is something that the President has been very clear about and is going to continue.

Q But just to, again, put a finer point on it: The President will get briefed or

will not get briefed when ODN finishes the risk assessment?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: just -- am just saying to you this is an underlying material -- underlying matter that is related to this. We're just not going to comment. And as it relates to any classified materials or anything that's related to PD- -- PDB, we don't comment on that at all.

But, you know, again, this is a part of an investigation. The President hasn't been briefed on any of this. He -- none of us have been briefed. The White House not has been briefed on any of this. And so, we are just going to leave it to the Department of Justice and to ODN on this.

Q And on a different topic, tomorrow marks the one-year anniversary of when the President marked the end of U.S. -- the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan and the end of the war there. How does the President plan to mark that occasion? Does he plan to speak to the American people? Does he plan to honor the lives of the 13 servicemembers who were lost at Abbey Gate?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, as you know, last week, on Friday, we did put out -- the President put out a statement -- released a statement where he named each of the 13 troops who were tragically killed that day.

The President feels deeply about the loss that was suffered one year ago. And as he said in that statement just this past Friday, he feels strongly that we owe their families support for the rest of their lives. We are never going to stop seeking justice for those who were involved in planning of the attack or for terrorists who threaten our homeland in any way.

No President feels more strongly about this than this President -- about our troops than this President and their families. And this President -- and he and the First ady have taken action to support our servicemembers and their families through Joining Forces and signing the historic pits legislation.

don't have anything else to share with you on any future statements that he may make.

Q Nothing (inaudible)?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Nothing to share about any -- anything on his schedule. As you know, he's going to be traveling tomorrow.

Q One more question on the DN . They're assessing whether bringing those classified documents to Mar-a- ago damaged national security or jeopardized national intelligence operations. Does the President feel that the public has a right to know the conclusion of that assessment?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Again, 'm -- we're just not going to comment about conclusions. We're not going to comment on anything related to this at this time, any specifics to this. We are going to refer all these questions to ODN and also the Department of Justice. We're just not going to com- --

Q But it's a question about transparency not --

- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: No, --
- Q -- on the investigation.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: understand. understand the question. Any underlying materials, any underlying questions to this, we're just not going to comment. Of course, it's important to have transparency, but we're just not going to go any further than that.
- Q And then, on another topic, the President has a lot of travel coming up. He's been getting out more in the country, mostly, you know, doing events sort of touting his agenda, things that -- his accomplishments and the like. Are we going to see him actually, as we approach the midterms, stumping for individual candidates? Are we going to see more big rallies, like -- like he did last week?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, as you know, can only speak to official travel from here; can't speak to any of the campaign or political travel. The President, the Vice President, Cabinet Secretaries, our Hill allies, governors, mayors, and allied groups will take the message directly to the American people.

As you know, we had a string of successful legisla- -- legislative pieces just a couple of weeks ago. And so, in the coming weeks, the President will host a Cabinet meeting here; host an inflation Reduction Act celebration event at the White House, which is going to happen on September 13th, as you all know; and will travel across the country to highlight how the inflation Reduction Act will save money on prescription drugs, cut healthcare premiums, and cut energy costs.

Other upcoming events will illustrate how President Biden worked to get things done, including passing a historic gun safety law and making smart investments to keep our competitive edge and rebuild American manufacturing through the CH PS and Science Act and bipartisan law.

The President will attend a groundbreaking at ntel in Ohio, as you all know, to address his safe -- Safer America plan that helps fight crime and make communities safer while in Pennsylvania, which is happening tomorrow, and highlight the American Rescue Plan along the way.

And so, that's going to be our focus: to get our message out, to talk -- to speak directly to the American people on how congressional Democrats and this President delivered.

Again, can't get into specific -- specific or any campaign trail or what we're doing politically, but that's what we're doing on the official side.

- Q The President has at least two trips scheduled to Pennsylvania in the next week. He's -- and he traveled there more than any other state last year. Obviously, he's from Pennsylvania, but is there any other significance to him visiting that state?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: All can say is Pennsylvania is close and dear to his heart and he is glad to be traveling there these next couple of trips, as you just mentioned.

Go ahead, Nancy.

- Q Thank you so much. Going back to the topic that Zeke brought up, there's been a lot of confusion. 'm wondering if you can shed any light on this question of whether this White House or this President believes that a President has the ability to declassify classified documents simply by saying so.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: ook, we want to be very careful here, as you know. We're just not going to speak -- it is really -- the question that you're asking me is related to everything that is happening currently right now with the Department of Justice and even ODN as they -- as said, we're aware of the letter. We did not have any advanced knowledge of the -- of the letter.

Right now, we are -- at this time, we're just not going to make comments on any questions related to this, any underlying questions, any content that is related to what we're currently seeing, that -- the Department of Justice is independently working on an investigation that is independent, and we're just not going to comment at this time.

- Q So, you can't say what this President believes the process is that he needs to go through when he wants to declassify that?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: 'm just not going to -- because it's related to what we're all hearing and you all are reporting about, 'm just not going to comment on it at this time.
- Q When the President speaks about guns tomorrow in Wilkes-Barre, is there a new policy he's going to be laying out? What can you tell us about what he's going to say on that issue tomorrow?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: have some -- some preview for you on this. So, tomorrow, President Biden will be traveling about -- about his Safer America Plan and the simple, basic notion that, when it comes to public safety in this nation, the answer isn't to defund the police, it's to fund the police.

He will highlight how his plan would invest 100 more cops for effective, accountable community policing that builds public trust and strengthens public safety.

And as part of the American Rescue Plan -- you've heard us say this -- that President Biden signed into law last year, we sent \$350 billion to local governments to keep cops on the beat. And in contrast, every Republican in Congress voted against the funding for law enforcement. And Trump -- also Donald Trump cut \$400 billion from his budget for state and local law enforcement.

So, the President is going to talk about how he brought the Democrats and Republicans together earlier this month to pass the most significant safety law in 30 years. He'll talk about how we have built on that momentum and how we must act on ban assault weapons. You'll hear that from him as well.

So, again, a majority of Americans support this when we talk about banning assault weapons; the NRA opposes it. And so we are going to hear from the President about -- about the importance of making sure that we protect our communities.

You know, the President has been really clear that congressional Republicans -- that extreme MAGA agenda that you heard him talk about last week is a threat to the rule of law.

Q And then, finally, Senate candidate ieutenant Governor John Fetterman says he is going to be at the parade in Pittsburgh on abor Day and, quote, he "looks forward to talking to the President there about the need to finally decriminalize marijuana."

The President has said in the past we need to rethink our approach. Has he decided how he wants to rethink the approach? Does he agree with John Fetterman?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So don't have anything right now to announce. But just want to talk a little bit and take a step back to talk about the drug -- our drug policy that we -- that we have been very clear about, but 'll leave some stuff here.

We're -- we're at an urgent moment when it comes to an overdose epidemic. You've heard the President talk about that. More than 100,000 lives lost in the -- in the most recent 12-month period.

The bulk of our early efforts have been focused on addressing the addiction and overdose epidemic. That's what we have talked about these past 19 months, which has worsened during the course of the pandemic, sadly.

Untreated addiction and overdose deaths require urgent attention and having evidence-based policies in place -- in place is critical. That is incredibly important to this President. But at the same time, President Biden believes that there are too many people serving unduly long sentences for nonviolent drug crimes -- a disproportionate number of whom are Black and brown. That's why, in April, during the Second Chance month, President Biden announced 17 sentences, commutations, and three pardons, which are more grants of clemency at this point in a presidency than any of his five recent predecessors.

As 've said before, the President supports leaving decisions regarding legalization for recreational use up to the states; rescheduling cannabis as a Schedule drug so researchers can study its positive and negative impacts; and, at the federal level, he supports decriminalizing marijuana use and automatically expunging any prior criminal records.

don't -- we don't have anything to announce today at this point, but just wanted to lay that for you.

Q On the Federal Reserve, Elizabeth Warren has said that she's concerned that if the Fed raises rates again that it could put people out of work or tip the economy into a recession. Does the President share any of those concerns about an overreach or a possible overreach?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, as you know, we've been very clear when it comes to the

Federal Reserve their independence to -- to make the monetary decision on how to deal with inflation. That is something that, again, we give their independence. We believe they have the strongest tools to deal -- to deal with that.

But we know that Americans are feeling the pain of higher costs, higher prices. That's why we have worked so hard to bring down gas prices. We've seen, for 76 days, gas prices have gone down. t is the fastest decline, as you've heard us say, in over a decade. And so that is important. That's why the nflation Reduction Act was so critical in dealing with -- that's going to deal with lowering costs, that's going to deal with that \$300 billion. t's going to deal with reducing the deficit, which is important, which is now -- that \$1.7 trillion deficit that we have seen under this President in the past 19 months; \$380 billion was done last year. And so, this is important as well.

t's important for the President, but he's going to continue to do the work. But we want to say -- a couple of things that we wanted to share is, like, you saw the new data on Friday that showed prices came down nationwide last month and personal income went up. So that is a sign of inflation that is easing. And latest CP- -- the latest headline, CP inflation was flat. Prices in the aggregate had no increase versus the prior month.

And this morning, we lear- -- and yesterday morning -- pardon me, sorry -- Friday morning, we learned that consumer sentiment is up 13 percent since July and one-year inflation expectation dropped nearly half a percent from -- from the month -- from the month before.

We have more work to do. We understand that. We know that there are families who are -- and Americans who are still feeling the pain. And we're going to continue to do the work to do --

So the White House doesn't disagree with Senator Warren?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Well, 'm just -- we're just saying that this is something that the Federal Reserve is going to -- we don't want to step on, you know, what the Federal Reserve is going to do.

Our goal is to -- to keep bringing down inflation without sacrificing the historic and lifechanging economic gains that we've seen this country has made over the last 18 months.

And, you know, as Powell said -- as Powell also said, the economy continues to show strong, underlying momentum. We have regained all of the jobs lost during the pandemic. And if you look at the labor market, it -- you know, consumers are spending; as said, what businesses are investing; and what American industry is producing, you continue to see the resiliency in our -- in our economy and that's what matters.

Thanks, Karine. Can you -- can you talk a little bit about the free COV D test program going away? What does that mean for the COV D testing industry? And does it mean that rapid tests will be harder to come by if there's a fall surge?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, on Friday, the administration announced that it wis suspend
taking orders for free tests through COV DTests.gov because Congress hasn't provided
the COV D funding we need to replenish the nation's stockpiles of tests. As simple as
that.

The last day to place new orders will be Friday, September -- this is September 2nd. And -- but just to give you a little bit of what we have done and what we've had to do, we've already distributed over 600 million tests through this program, and every household has had the opportunity to place three orders for a total of 16 tests.

Americans will continue to have other options for free testing, including free at-home tests through private insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, and 1,500 community-based free testing sites. So that is available to Americans.

So, look, the administration has been very clear about our urgent COV D-19 response funding needs for months. We've been talking about it for months. The COV D Response Team has been talking about it for months. We've warned that the congressional inaction would face unacceptable tra- -- trade-offs and harm our preparedness and response, and that the consequences would likely worsen over time.

So this is an action we've been forced to take that will help preserve our limited remaining supply, ensuring we have a limited of tes- -- supply of tests available in the fall. So that's what we're trying to be forward thinking, forward leaning here when we might face a new rise in infections and more acute need.

Q Has the administration given up on getting COV D funds in the CR? And on that realm, mean, what does that mean for free COV D vaccines? mean, is it no longer -

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So are you talking about the booster that's -- that we're about to announce?

Q Well, just --

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Or that is first --

Q -- providing for the costs.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Okay. So -- so let me just be clear: These decisions about the vaccines, including when will be -- who and when will be eligible are made by FDA and CDC. So just want to make sure, based on their experts and their review, as we talk about vaccines.

So, you know, in the meantime, the administration has been working with state and local health departments and other partners to prepare operationally for all scenarios.

This includes working to ensure vaccines remain available in a range of trusted convenient loca- -- locations, including local pharmacies and community health centers, and easy to access.

So, we're planning for this. We're planning for a robust plan and education program,

And so, you know, while we're preparing, we are doing so with the limited funding we have left. So, we have some funding for this. We've had to take money away from just mentioned, to help fund the procurement of these things like testing, as vaccines. So, that's one way, as said, we had to be really mindful in why we're doing the testing -- made the testing announcement.

So, needs to help strengthen our vaccination program and reach more folks are limited. And so, the COV D team will share more on this in the following -- when the decisions are made on how -- from the CDC and FDA -- how we're going to move forward.

But yes, we had to make some tough decisions to make sure that we're able to do this fall campaign once the CDC and FDA makes that decision.

Go ahead. Go ahead.

wanted to drill down on the degree to which there was White House involvement in the Trump documents story earlier this year.

ast week, we learned that the Archivist -- the Acting Archivist of the United States approached the White House Counsel and a determination was reached here to allow the Acting Archivist to make a determination with respect to executive privilege.

Can you -- what more can you tell us about that and why the determination was reached to defer that to the -- to the Archivist?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, the -- the letter from the National Archivist and the search are completely different. We've been very clear about that. They're not the same. And so just want to restate that.

The recently published letter from the Archives is not about the search and, in fact, underlines how closely the President has honored his pledge to restore the independence of the Department of Justice concerning investigations.

f you read the letter, you'll see that -- the way we were able to defer. that DOJ made a request for access to an older set of documents independently and the White House affirmed it, which is standard. Nothing unusual there. And when former President Trump attempted to assert executive privilege to block the FB from assessing the document, President Biden deferred to the National Archives and the DOJ Office of egal Counsel on the issue.

So, again, we deferred that decision. So, this -- the decisions here have been made by the National Archives and the Department of -- Justice Department.

Just to clarify, you're saying that President Biden himself was personally approached and he made the decision himself?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: What 'm saying is the White House was -- they're -- we are the ones that were able to defer, which is we affirmed -- which is normal, nothing unusual -we deferred to the -- to the National Archives and the Department of Justice legal office. And we let them make the decision.

t was not made here. We deferred it so that they can make the decision.

- Q But just to pin it down: What -- are you saying that it was not the President himself who arrived at the decision or did the President himself make a decision?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Well, what can tell you is the White House affirmed it. can't 've been asked this question: "Who, specifically?" can tell you the White House,
 here on this campus -- the White House actually affirmed it and also deferred it.

 Go ahead.
- Q Thanks, Karine. Continuing on this theme -- the President last week was asked about former President Trump's claims that he declassified all these documents. And President Biden said, quote, "'m not going to comment. mean, because don't know the detail. don't even want to know. 'll let the Justice Department take care of that."

understand that he wasn't given advance notice about the search, the Justice Department is independent. But when it comes to national security questions, shouldn't the President want to know the details?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Again, when it comes to national security questions and even classified materials, it is something that we just don't speak to. We don't get into information included in the President's classified materials or daily briefings on sesinive [sic] -- on sensitive national security or intelligence matter. Right? That is something that wouldn't even be able to talk about because that is the protocol that we have here.

ook, the President was asked a question. He answered it in -- in -- as -- as it relates to -- right? -- this is also relating to -- we've said this -- any content, anything that's related to underlying materials related to this. This is something that we are just not informed on.

This is something that it is the independence of the Department of Justice as it relates to ODN . That is something that -- that assessment that they are doing that we are not involved, we are not briefed, we are not aware of. And 'll leave it at that.

Q just want to be really clear: You can say that he was not briefed about the warrant execution, but you can't say whether he's been briefed on any --

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Oh, no --

Q -- national security issues?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Oh, -- can tell you right now, when it comes to the ODN , the letter, can surely tell you that the President was not briefed on that, he was not aware --

of m not asking about just about the letter --

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: know -- -- but this is all -- it's all connected, right?

Right? t's all connected So 'm trying to give you answers for what can give you

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answers to, right?

So 'm sure -- we have not been asked about that. And 'm telling you, for that particular piece, we were not briefed, we were not made aware of. That is something that ODN -- that is their assessment. That is something that they're doing as it relates to the ongoing investigation that the Department of Justice is doing as it's connected to national security materials.

What can say, if asked -- if 'm asked if the President has been briefed on classified materials -- we have said this before at the podium -- it is -- it is something that can't even speak to, right? can't even speak to what classified materials he's been briefed or daily briefings when it even comes to his PDA [sic] -- PDB.

That is -- it is -- it is classified information. So it is not even something that we can speak to. That's what 'm -- 'm spea- -- 'm talking about.

Go ahead.

Q So, Karine, you're saying he hasn't been briefed so far, but are you implying that he won't be briefed as long as the DN assessment is taking place?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: All -- can't even get into hypotheticals right now. can speak to this moment. can speak to what is currently happening right now, which is -- which is we're just not going to comment on an ongoing investigation. Right? This is an ongoing investigation -- an independent investigation.

We're just not going to comment. And we have not been briefed on that. cannot get into hypotheticals. don't know -- we don't know what's going to happen next. So not going to go into a hypothetical question of what is going to happen --

- Q Broadly --
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: -- in the future.
- Q Broadly, though, the White House supports this damage assessment?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Again, this is -- again, 'm just -- am just not going to comment on that.
- Q Was there anybody in the White House who requested this assessment ahead of time before --
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: No.
- Q Okay. And then Senator indsey Graham said, last night, "there would be riots in the streets" if former President Trump is prosecuted for taking classified government documents to Mar-a- ago. What is the White House response to that?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, we have -- you know, we have seen MAGA Republicans attack our democracy. We have seen MAGA Republicans take away our rights, make threats of violence. including this weekend. and that is what the President was referring to when

you all asked me last week about the semi-fascism comment.

And he was clear: not all Republicans -- there are some mainstream Republicans -- he mentioned the Governor of Maryland, arry Hogan and talked about -- about him and what he's been doing and how he said -- called them out of being that mainstream Republican.

But we have seen these MAGA, extreme Republicans making these kinds of comments, which is -- which is dangerous. And -- and this is what we are talking about when Joe Biden -- when Joe Biden was making his comments -- President Biden was making his comments last week.

ook, this is a President that believes when you are President of the United States, it is your duty, it is your responsibility to have the strongest voice of -- when it comes to democracy, when speaking about democracy. And that's what you're going to continue to hear from this President.

Q Thank you, Karine. Just to follow up on the Pennsylvania trip: You mentioned the assault weapons ban as being kind of a key priority for the administration. But are you kind of out of things that you can do from an executive standpoint? know months ago you were reviewing what other additional executive actions you could take on gun violence. Are you -- are you out of options there?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Well, -- we don't have -- don't have anything else to share on what else we can do. But can say this: This is a president who has taken the most action -- most executive action than any other President when it comes to curtailing and really dealing with gun violence. And that's how seriously he's taken this.

just laid out what he did in the American Rescue Plan -- that \$350 billion that helped -- that went into communities to make sure that communities were safer. That's -- only Democrats in Congress voted for the American Rescue Plan. That matters.

He's going to go tomorrow and talk about what else we are doing as an administration to make sure that -- that we're -- that we're -- that communities feel safer.

And -- but as far as what we're doing from the -- as far as executive actions, certainly don't have anything to share to you -- for you at this time.

But he has called -- he's called on Congress to take actions on -- on assault weapons ban, something that we haven't seen in 30 years.

And you've heard him say this: When -- when assault weapons ban sunset 10 years after it was put into law -- 10 years after he worked very hard to make sure that we had that piece of legislation -- we did see crime go up with assault weapons ban -- assault weapons.

So that is something that the President has been fighting for throughout his Senate days, as Vice President. And he'll continue to fight for this as President.

Q And did you have any more color about why this part of Pennsylvania is the appropriate place for this message?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: You know, no -- no specific color on that. You know, we're going to his hometown, which is important to him, which is very close to him. But don't have any specifics. t's just -- you know, we go to -- we go to places where we can actually be able to deliver our message to the American people, especially all the work that we have -- we have done here in Washington with congressional Democrats.

Q One quick one on abortion. There's been kind of a number of incidents nationwide where medical providers have been unsure if they can provide certain procedures for women, even if they feel that it's medically necessary, if they're going to run afoul of state law. What is kind of the White House guidance to medical providers about whether they should consider running afoul of state laws in providing medically necessary abortions?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: ook, this is something that we are acutely aware of, that certainly that we are a monitoring. ook, a lot of this is -- you know, when we talk about that MAGA agenda, the MAGA extreme Republicans, this is it. This is congressional Republicans who are touting this MAGA agenda, including banning abortion in cases of rape, incest, and the health of the mother. And so this is something that the President certainly is going to call out.

We saw the Texas district court affirm that medical providers can deny lifesaving and health-preserving care for women, even if they are suffering from hemorrhaging or life-threatening hypertension. Thankfully, we saw in daho -- a federal daho district court determine that women there will continue to receive lifesaving and health-preserving emergency care, including abortion care.

But, you know, this is -- this is something that the President is going to continue to speak to: how extreme this agenda is. The Department of Justice is looking into it and answering your question. Again, this is -- you know, we refer folks to them. They're going to do what they can to protect -- to protect women as they're crossing over into states and -- and make sure that, you know, we can do everything that we can so that women can make their decision -- their own decisions -- on what they can do to protect their health and to protect their life.

Q guess 'm asking: Should providers risk it? ike if if -- if it's a close call on whether it's legal or not in the state --

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: mean, look, it's not -- it's not for me to decide. Right? We're going to do everything that we can to provide any assistance that we can so that women can get the care that they need. Clearly, that's a decision that they have to make. The Department of Justice is doing that every -- everything that they can as well in states, working with states. We have HHS working with states on how to provide care for -- to women. You've heard us talk about the waivers. You've heard us talk about the executive actions that the President has taken.

But again, that is -- that is not something that 'm going to speak directly to. That is something that they would have to make a decision on. And every state is different, right? Every -- every law is different.

Q Thanks, Karine. One thing that the White House has said about the ODN 's review is that the White House sees this as appropriate action. wonder whether you could help us understand why the White House sees this as appropriate -- appropriate action,

whether that's based on any specific concerns that have been discussed within the White House?

- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: 'm -- 'm just not going to get into any anything further there.
 -- again, we have seen the letter from ODN to Congress on this. would refer you to either ODN or the Department of Justice for any specific questions, any underlying materials. We're just not going to speak to this. This is an assessment that ODN is doing. And we -- we did not know anything about this beforehand. And 'm just not going to go any further.
- Q ast week, when we were having discussions about the student loan forgiveness program, the White House made clear that you all see this program as basically paid for because of the deficit reductions achieved during the President's term.

 wonder if the President is open to pursuing any other programs, any other actions that could be offset by deficit reductions if it means that he can pursue his agenda further.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: don't have anything to announce on this. The President does believe -- and you heard him say this directly, not just here at the podium -- that the amount of deficit reduction we've seen is enough to pay for this program. This is what Bharat -- you -- think you were here when Bharat was our guest just on Friday. That's one of the many reasons this action was -- is well justified in our eyes.

And remember, you know, we're on track to cut, as you were alluding to, the deficit down by \$1.7 trillion by the end of this year, and -- and including the nflation Reduction Act will reduce the deficit by another trillion over the next decade.

So, the plan the President announced provides important breathing room -- a little bit of that breathing room that he talks about -- for middle-class Americans in particular. And it goes after -- it goes towards helping targeted Americans who are -- 90 percent who are making less than \$75,000 a year. t is incredibly important, we believe, the student lan [sic] -- the student loan plan is, the cancellation plan. And he -- something that we are very proud of. And that's also historic.

- Q just had one last quick one. s there an official estimate of additional funding that the administration would want to deal with monkeypox? And will there be an official request made to Congress at some point?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So could say this -- just want to make sure, because we had some good updates on this on the monkeypox. know that folks were really curious about what we were doing or concerns, rightfully so.

As you know, we've been working day in and day out on -- across the government and with cities and states and healthcare providers, public health officials, and the impacted community to execute a strategy to accelerate the fight against the monkeypox outbreak. We're making a lot more doses available and working closely with jurisdictions to operationalize all of this.

ast week, HHS made 360,000 additional vials of vaccines for jurisdictions to order. That is on top of approximately 780,000 vials that we already delivered that we have talked about here. Seventy-five percent of jurisdictions have moved to this method, and another twenty percent working to do the same.

This is a significant progress in a short term of time and will mean more shots in arms. This is a cumulative of 1.1 million vials are delivered to jurisdictions. And as we get more supplies, we are approaching the point where we can offer two doses of vaccine to the entire high-risk population via intradermal administration.

So, again, this is something that -- wanted to just lay that out, because we have seen some movement, and we're trying to meet that moment, as we have talked about. And that funding that you're talking about that is connected to the COV D and the CR, that's something that we're going to continue to work with Congress on to make sure that we have the funding needed to do the work on monkeypox and also to -- the continued work with COV D.

Q Do you have an estimate on the funding amount?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: don't have -- don't have an estimate for you at this time, but just know that we're going to continue to work on -- with Congress.

Go ahead.

Q Yeah, thank you. Revisiting the marijuana question, specifically what John Fetterman is calling on President Biden to do is use executive authority to deschedule marijuana as a Schedule drug. Several other Democratic senators have called on the same -- called for the same. s President Biden looking at that specific action? And why hasn't he taken that action so far if that's something he has considered?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, again, we don't have anything new to share on -- or any announcement to share. laid out the President -- our drug policy. Wanted to just give a little in-depth of what we have done in the last 19 months and what is important to the President. This is something that he has talked about -- right? -- during the campaign. And you've heard from him many other times talking about the -- our -- his drug policy -- drug policy focus and what's important to him. We just don't have anything to speak to.

As mentioned in April during the Second Chance Month, President Biden announced 75 sentence commutations and 3 pardons, which are more grants of clemency at this point than any other President, than any of his five recent predecessors. He's going to continue to evaluate further uses of his clemency powers.

And as it relates to marijuana decriminalization, just don't have anything at this time.

Q Does the White House believe he has the authority to do that executive action?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, look, again, 'm just not going to get into the specifics. ook, the administration has made progress on its promises regarding marijuana. An example is the DEA issued its first license -- licenses to companies to cultivate marijuana for research purposes after years of delay during the previous administration. This is a key step in promoting research because it broadens the amount and quality of cannabis available for research purposes. And we will continue to explore -- explore what else we can do.

As far as reforms, we just don't have anything to share for you today.

Q And one last question. John Fetterman, the Democratic nominee in Pennsylvania, will not be at the event tomorrow with the President. Has he -- has their campaign given you a reason? s the President disappointed that he won't be there for that event?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So can't speak to -- to the lieutenant governor. My understanding is he had an existing event. So would refer you to his -- to his office or his campaign.

Okay. Go ahead.

Q Thanks, Karine. Getting back to the FDA authorization of the new COV D booster vaccine, your answer to Franco. When you said that you're planning for a robust education program and plan, but you said you're doing it with "the limited funding we have left."

So, just to clarify, when you're trying to combat some of the hesitancy questions right now -- you know, right now only half of Americans eligible for a booster have gotten one. s the White House -- as you prepare for public messaging ahead of this new shot, are you doing a more scaled-down version compared to previous rounds because you have limited funding to do that? s this different than what we've seen in previous booster public messaging campaigns?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So it's going to be a robust education program that -- we're going to continue to do that. And we're going to build on the lessons we've learned and focusing on the most at-risk communities. This will include leveraging deep partnerships across sectors to meet people where they are with facts and answers to questions, and empowering trusted local messegers [sic] -- messengers with messaging they need to engage with their communities about the importance of vaccination.

So this is what we've learned -- because we have learned from some lessons from the COV D-19 outreach, our comprehensive program that we had from the beginning of this administration. So we're going to use those lessons and -- and do that and do the -- the things that we've learned that worked for the fall booster campaign.

And, again, we're going to be -- targeted at-risk -- at -- do a more at-risk campaign. t will be robust. We're going to make sure that we have those trusted local messengers, which, by the way -- think you remember; you covered this so closely last year -- it worked. t worked. When you have those trusted voices, that -- that does help make sure that people go get vaccinated and, in this case, get their booster.

Q And are there any concerns about supply with this new booster? And will everyone who wants to be able to get one be able to get one for free?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, look, we're -- 'm not going to get ahead of the FDA and CDC. They're going to lay out who is going to -- who is going to be able to receive -- or how the process is going to go. And they're going to lay that out, so don't want to get ahead of them.

But look, mean, we've -- that's why we're -- we're kind of -- we made the announcement on testing, right? That's why we've had to, you know, actually end some things and -- and cut some -- cut away, take some money away from things like testing to help -- to help fund the procurement of these vaccines. And so this is a priority. We're going to do the best that we can to get vaccines to folks -- folks who are most at risk, as just mentioned.

But, you know, we're going to continue to do the work that's needed to make sure we protect the American public.

Q Thank you, Karine. This weekend, we saw U.S. warships going through the Taiwan Strait. Considering the buildup of tension since the Speaker's visit, what was the necessity of seeing U.S. warships during this time?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, NDOPACOM put out a statement, as you probably saw, on Sund- -- on Saturday, detailing the transit -- the warships that you're speaking of -- the Navy -- the U.S. Navy warships, to be more specific.

We conducted a routine Taiwan Strait transit on August 28th in accordance with international law and demonstrated our commitment to a free and open ndo-Pacific, as you've heard us say many times before from this podium and from the President.

As we have said, you will see in the coming days and weeks and months that our presence, posture, and exercises account for China's provocative and destabilizing behavior with a view towards guiding the situation in Western Pacific towards greater stability.

This is not about U.S.-China. This is about what is in the interest -- the best interests of -- Taiwan's interests, specifically, and the region's interest as well.

So, our policy towards Taiwan has remained consistent for decades and across administrations. We remain committed to the -- our One China policy. And in accordance with that policy, we'll continue to fly and sail and operate where international law allows, consistent with our longstanding commitment to freedom of navigation, as you've heard us say. And that includes conducting standard air, maritime transit through the Taiwan Strait. So, we're committed to doing that and protecting the region.

- Q Hey, Karine --
- Q And another topic on --
- O Karine --

WH TE HOUSE A DE: Karine, we got to -- to go.

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Oh, got to go?

Q Sorry, another topic on -- on the ran -- potential new ran deal. ran is studying the U.S. response, but we are -- we're receiving information here and there about a potential release of prisoners and all this. know you don't want to

negotiate in public --

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Yeah.

Q -- but does the administration feel that the discussions are going in the right direction?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So as far as the status of negotiations, as said -- as you have said, we're not going to negotiate in public.

ook, we have taken a deliberate and principled approach to these negotiations from the start. f ran is prepared to comply with its commitments under the 2015 deal, then we're prepared to do the same.

As it relates to last week and the EU, we conveyed our feedback about ran's comments on the EU's proposal directly to the EU. We will not negotiate, again, in public, and are going to -- not going to go into details of how the process is going.

'm going to -- go ahead -- do --

- Q Karine, know Abdullah is trying to give you the hook.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Yeah, know.
- Q Can you get a few more questions here?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: know. 'm going to take them.
- Q -- thank you.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: That's why -- could have walked away and not taken your question, Peter. But will take your question.
- Q 'll make it worth it.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: 'm sure. 'm sure you will.
- Q Different topic.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Okay.
- Q How come migrants are allowed to come into this country unvaccinated but world-class tennis players are not?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: Are you -- you're talking about which world-class tennis player?
- Q Novak Djokovic.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So as far -- you know, just to -- just since you asked about me -- about him -- you asked me about him. So, visa records are confidential under U.S. law. Therefore, the U.S. government cannot discuss the details of individual visa cases. Due to privacy reasons, the U.S. government also does not comment on medical

information of individual travelers.

As it relates to the tennis -- the tennis pla- -- player, look, those questions regarding vaccination requirements is -- is -- defer you to CDC. This is a CDC requirement for foreign nationals. This is something that they decide. This is -- so, this is something that is up to them -- the U.S. Open and their participant protocols. 'd refer you to them; they have their own specific protocols as well.

- Q But just --
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So they're two different things. They're two --
- O As -- but --
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: -- different things.
- Q But -- so, how is it two different things? Somebody unvaccinated comes over on a plane; you say that's not okay. Somebody walks into Texas or Arizona unvaccinated; they're allowed to stay. Why?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: That -- but that's not how it works.
- O That's --
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: ike, we actually --
- Q That's what's happening.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: No.
- Q know that that's not what you guys want to happen, but that is what happ--what is happening.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: But that's not -- it's not like somebody walks over and -- (laughs) -- that's not -- that's not how --
- Q That's exactly what's happening.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: We -- look --
- Q Thousands of people are walking in a day. Some of them turn themselves over. Some of them are caught; tens of thousands a week are not. That is what is happening.
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So let me just lay out what we have done under this administration:

We have installed new border technology and set up joint protocols with Mexico and Guatemala to catch more human traffickers.

We have already made over 3,000 arrests in the first three months of launching an unprecedented anti-smuggling campaign with regional partners.

We've secured record levels of funding for the Department of Homeland Security.

We've put in place dedicated immigration judges so asylum seekers can have their cases heard faster.

We've expanded la- -- labor pathways, including H-2B visas.

And through the os Angeles Declaration on Migration and Protection, President Biden brought 20 leaders -- world leaders together to manage increased migration flows across the Western Hemisphere.

By contrast, core to the prior administration, immigration strategy was to build a wall and they couldn't even come accomplish that in the four years. And they also, by talking about building a wall -- which would have taken billions of dollars from veterans, billion dollars from schools -- which is also a policy that just does not work. t is not that simple. t's not just that people are walking across -- across the border.

We have a -- we have a plan in place. This is not like switching the lights on. Right? This is going to take a process. We are fixing a broken system that was actually left by the last administration.

And as it relates to the tennis star, that is totally different. That is a different process. That is the U.S. Open that he is part of, and there are a CDC -- federal guidance --

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So don't want to get ahead of what we're going to see in a couple of days. We have talked about how we're coming off a historic economic growth. And it's no surprise that the economy is slowing down.

You've heard me say this, you've heard Brian Deese say this, you've heard others from NEC sl- -- say this: slowing down as -- as we're going into a transition -- right? -again, from a historic -- from a historic economy to now a more stable and steady growth. And that is important.

We see that as an important -- as an important next step. And so -- and we've talked about how we're -- as the -- as we see the job growth numbers, we're expecting that to cool off just -- just a bit as we're going into that transition, making sure we do not lose the gains that we have seen this past year.

And right now, we're still seeing a strong labor market, which matters. Consumer spending is strong, which matters. And -- and so, we're going to always look at every economic data. That's going to be very important as we move forward and continue to try and deliver lower costs in particular, which is so important at this time for the American people.

But 'm not going to get ahead of the numbers. But we have talked about how we're expecting to see a bit of a cooling as we go into a transition to more stable growth.

So, in that transition then, you're expecting job losses by the end of the year?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: 'm just not going -- we've talked about how we anticipate a cooling -- right? -- for the job numbers to -- to not be at the -- at the high job growth that we have seen these past several months.

That is something that we have talked about many times. Any time you all ask me about what we expect for jobs numbers, we always talk about "we expect a cooling," especially as we're in a transition for a stable and steady growth. And that is something that is important as we're looking at the resiliency of our economy.

Okay. 'm trying to see -- go ahead.

wanted to go back to what you were saying about the COV D-19 rapid Thanks. tests. s it that you need more money to buy more tests or you're out of money to send the tests? What's the funding issue exactly that prompted you to shut this down for now?

MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So we've been very clear that the COV D-19 response funding needs -needs for months, right? We've talked about it. You've heard us talk about it in here. You've heard the COV D Response Team talk about it. You've heard the President talk shout it - Walve warned that the congressional inaction would force unaccentable

trade-offs and harm our preparedness and response, and that consequences would be likely worsened over time. And that is what you're seeing here.

So this is an action we've been forced to take because of the lack of funding and not continuing getting that funding that we need from Congress that will help preserve our limited remaining supply. That's what we're seeing.

So, ensuring we have limited supply of tests available in the fall -- right? We are -- we are preparing -- that's what we're doing in this administration. We make sure that we prepare for what can come next. And so -- you know, what we might face: a new rise in infections and more acute need. So that's why we're taking this action so we have some limited supply for down the road.

But again, we're going to continue to call on Congress for the funding. We're going to continue to work with Congress to get that extra funding. But that's what you're hearing from this announcement. Yes, we had to make some tough decisions, and this is part of that.

Q The other question wanted to ask you is on Afghanistan, specifically the Afghans that have come into the country in the last year and don't have a path to permanent legal status, or at least not an easy one.

wanted to ask: The White House made a push to get Congress to create such a path earlier this year, and then it kind of cooled down. With Congress coming back next week and a lot of these Afghans heading toward a lot of uncertainty, will the White House make a fresh push on Congress to get this done?

- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, as you know, this is an issue that's important to this President, important to the administration. 'm going to check in with our Office of eg Affairs and the team here to see what the plan is for the next steps. We don't have anything to share specifically on the legislative component to that.
- Q Okay. s there anything else that you can do from an administration perspective to help these people be able to apply for asylum more quickly or be able to have that certainty that they know they'll be able to stay here long term?
- MS. JEAN-P ERRE: So, look, we all know that legislation is always the best way to move forward with more certainty when it comes to, you know, asylum or coming here and getting the -- getting the security that they need.

But, look, one of the things that do want to say is that, you know, this -- the Biden administration -- the Biden-Harris administration is going to continue to demonstrate its commitment to the brave Afghans who stood side by side with the United States over the past two decades. And so that is a commitment that we have made.

And just to give you a little bit of an update on the S V process, because we had made some changes to that since taking office: The President's -- at the President's direction, we have undertaken substantial efforts to improve the Afghan Special mmigration Visa -- S V program -- make it more efficient and process S V applicants more expeditiously while continuing to safeguard our national security.

Ouickly after taking office President Biden signed an executive order as you all

know, in February of 2021, requiring agencies to surge resources, streamline the proc-- the application process.

We've restarted S V interviews -- which had been paused by the previous administration, allowing a massive backlog of applications to build -- and have surged resources to this vital program, increasing the number of staff processing S V applications more -- by more than fifteenfold.

So, this is something that wanted to just make sure that you had.

And another update is: As of August 9th, over 17,000 individuals have submitted all documents required to apply for Chief of Mission review, or have beyond the Chief of Mission stage. We're working to process those cases as quickly as possible. The Afghan S V program remains active and the Department of State continues to receive the process -- to process new S V applications as expeditiously as possible.

So anything specific or anything more about that, certainly would refer you to Department of State.

Dear Dr. Baker:

On August 8, 2022, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) raided the home of former President Donald J. Trump. ¹ This raid was unprecedented. Unfortunately, the Department of Justice (DOJ) has refused to be transparent with the American people about the details of this unprecedented action. The raid was apparently necessary to collect certain documents sought by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) allegedly in former President Trump's possession. According to the recently released affidavit predicating the issuance of a search warrant, NARA's Office of the Inspector General (OIG) referred the matter to DOJ. ² Republicans on the Committee on Oversight and Reform request information and documents regarding this referral, including the OIG's role in reviewing this matter.

On August 10, 2022, Committee Republicans requested documents and information from Acting Archivist Debra Steidel Wall about NARA's role in the Mar-a-Lago raid.³ However, in response to our request, NARA denied possessing any responsive documents despite publicly available information indicating otherwise.⁴ We requested NARA amend what appears to be an incomplete response to our first request for information.⁵

While Committee Republicans pursue answers from NARA, the affidavit filed by the FBI before the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida described the need for a search

warrant for the Mar-a-Lago raid when unsealed in a heavily redacted form and revealed the OIG's participation in referring this matter to DOJ. According to the affidavit, on February 9, 2022, "the Special Agent in Charge of NARA's Office of the Inspector General sent the NARA Referral via email to DOJ." Transparency is particularly important in the post-pandemic era when Americans are lacking trust in our nation's institutions. Congress, and particularly the Oversight Committee, has a duty to provide transparency and accountability for the American people.

Please provide the following documents, covering the time period from January 20, 2021, to present, no later than September 15, 2022:

- 1. All documents and communications between any employee or agent of the NARA OIG and NARA regarding documents in the possession of President Trump;
- 2. All documents and communications between any employee or agent of the NARA OIG and the FBI or Department of Justice, including the Offices of the United States Attorneys, regarding documents in the possession of President Trump; and
- 3. All documents and communications between or among employees or agents of the NARA OIG regarding any documents in the possession of former President Trump.

To ask any related follow-up questions, please contact Committee on Oversight and Reform Republican Staff at (202) 225-5074.

The Committee on Oversight and Reform has specific jurisdiction over NARA under House Rule X. Additionally, the Committee on Oversight and Reform is the principal oversight committee of the U.S. House of Representatives and has broad authority to investigate "any matter" at "any time" under House Rule X. Thank you for your attention to this matter.

Dear Messrs. Corcoran and Garten:

As you are aware, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) executed a search and seizure warrant at your client's Mar-a-Lago property on August 8, 2022. We understand that your client, via the Trump Organization, maintains closed circuit television (CCTV) surveillance footage from cameras placed at various locations on the Mar-a-Lago property. It appears likely that at least some of those surveillance cameras would have captured footage of law enforcement personnel engaged in the judicially-authorized search.

The FBI is concerned about threats to law enforcement personnel that appear to be connected to the FBI's execution of the August 8, 2022 search. For your awareness, threats have been made against the two agents who were identified in copies of the search warrant released to the press without redactions (even as their names were redacted from the version unsealed by the court). While you are within your rights to make any lawful use of material in your possession, we trust that you appreciate that video footage of law enforcement personnel engaged in conducting this court-authorized search could, if released publicly, be used to identify those personnel and subject them to threats and harassment.

To protect the health and safety of law enforcement personnel, we ask that you be mindful of such risks should you or your client decide to make public any camera footage that depicts government personnel, including by taking appropriate steps to ensure that any footage released by you obscures the faces and identifying information of law enforcement personnel who may be depicted.

If you wish to discuss these matters, please do not hesitate to contact me.



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
